The film is sponsored by the Ruby Lake Lagoon Society and Sustainable Coast BC magazine.

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

Residents of Pilothouse Marina forced out in lease dispute

Residents and moorage customers of Garden Bay's Pilothouse Marina have been caught in the middle of a dispute between the Sechelt Indian Band and the marina's owners.

Pilothouse Marina sits on SIB land in Garden Bay leased by Morgane Oger and Judit Haranghy.

Oger was an NDP candidate in the recent provincial election, losing to Sam Sullivan in a tight race for the Vancouver-False Creek riding.

On June 16, Oger and a handful of tenants and moorage customers were notified by the SIB's legal counsel to vacate the property.

The notice also advised tenants "must cease making payments" to their landlord and that the SIB "requires immediate possession of the lands in order to facilitate environmental remediation."

A "notice of termination" addressed to the marina owners and signed by SIB Chief Warren Paull indicates the reason for eviction was a "failure to pay rent."

Oger told the *Harbour Spiel* that she admits her rent was due before Jan. 1 but says she is frustrated that she hasn't been able to discuss any of the issues with the band itself.

Oger has leased the marina property since 2009 and said she has invested more than \$200,000 into the property including renovations to two cabins, dock improvements and landscaping.

"The marina has been for sale for some time and we notified them that, after the sale, we would work it through," said Oger.

"Unfortunately none of the people that we have put forward, who have applied to take over the lease, have been accepted by the band."

Oger said the contract stipulates

that the band must approve of any prospective buyer for the business but "in each case when the application went through to the band, either the band refused the buyer or the band took so long and made the process so difficult that the buyers withdrew."

"Ultimately, it's contract law and there is a clause that says they can do it but, in this context, one expects time to manoeuvre," she said.

Oger owns the docks and said if they can't come to an agreement, she will remove them.

Peter Vaughn is one of the tenants caught up in this dispute.

"I just moved in in January and this came as a total surprise.

"I'd like to stay here, I just set the place up nice and now it's going to cost me quite a bit to move," said Vaughn.

"I'm not happy and nobody in the Harbour will forget the band has done this."

Vaughn said they were told in June to leave immediately but the bailiff later informed them they could stay until midnight on July 31.

By July 24, all moorage customers had left the docks and Vaughn said just he and one other tenant remained.

Both planned to be out by July 31.

By press time, SIB Chief Warren Paull had not returned calls for comment from the *Harbour Spiel*.

SCRD to consult public on short term vacation rentals

The Sunshine Coast Regional District recently announced it will soon seek input and feedback from residents, tourism and housing sectors, community groups and organizations on short-term rentals.

"We have heard from the community that they want action on shortterm rentals and the SCRD board has responded," said Garry Nohr, SCRD board chair, in a press release.

"The popularity of short-term rentals impacts housing affordability and can affect neighbourhood character.

"This public engagement is an opportunity for the community to have a say and to view all aspects of the issue."

At the May 11 planning and community development committee meeting, SCRD staff brought forward a two-phase, short-term rentals public engagement program.

"Phase one will include an online workbook-style engagement where the public can study information about the issue and then share their perspective by answering a series of questions," said Andrew Allen, SCRD manager of planning and development.

The information and feedback collected through the online STR workbook will assist the SCRD in identifying preferred approaches and options for managing short term rental accommodations in the SCRD.

"Phase two of the program will include discussions and recommendations on the preferred option," said Allen.

A report on the recommended options is expected to come before the SCRD board this fall.

Members of the community are encouraged to visit www.scrd.ca/STR to review the workbook and complete the online questionnaire.

Feedback will be collected until Aug. 15.

IMPAIRED DRIVING/THEFT OF VEHICLE

On July 17, police attended a single vehicle incident on Garden Bay Road near Katherine Lake Road after a witness reported a vehicle had gone into a ditch and rolled over.

The lone occupant, who turned out to be a prohibited driver, attempted to leave the scene on foot but was detained by a passerby until police arrived.

The driver, who was exhibiting signs of intoxication and suffering non-life-threatening injuries, was taken to hospital for treatment.

It was also determined that the driver had stolen the vehicle so, along with impaired operation of a motor vehicle and prohibited driving, the driver is being charged with theft of a motor vehicle.

The file is still under investigation.

THEFT FROM A VEHICLE

On July 10, a theft from an outof-country vehicle occurred at a park in the 15500 block of Highway 101, Egmont, after the occupants went into the public washroom.

A witness, also headed to the washroom, reported seeing a Caucasian male in his 20s sitting in a small silver sporty Mazda vehicle appearing to watch until everyone was inside the washroom, and then heard a smashing sound.

When the visitors returned to their vehicle, they found the passenger window smashed and a large black purse containing foreign passports, a wallet, and other items, missing.

The male in the silver vehicle was also gone from the scene.

BC Bike Race third stage rolls through during Pender Harbour Days

The seven-stage BC Bike Race rolled through local trails as part of its third stage on July 9.

This year marks the 11th anniversary of the race that starts in Cumberland and ends in Whistler a week later.

Over 619 riders from around the globe started from Earls Cove, climbed up to Klein Lake and followed various local trails to end in Sechelt later in the day.

American Stephen Ettinger won the stage but four days later, when the race ended in Whistler, Ettinger had to be content with second place as fellow American Geoff Kabush won overall.

The Czech Republic's Katerina Nash took the women's crown.

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Wind buffets Garden Bay Sailing Club's record Malaspina Regatta

For 28 years the Garden Bay Sailing Club has hosted the annual Malaspina Regatta but never in its history has the race seen 30 boats line up to start the race.

Greeting this record number of participants on July 1 was a 15-knot southeaster with whitecaps stretching across Malaspina Strait.

Even the conditions at the startline, between Martin Island and Nares Rock, were too rough for the committee boat to anchor.

Two skippers withdrew before the start as the wind and sea were beyond their comfort levels.

The rest of the fleet jockeyed for position and when the horn finally sounded, a few were off to really good starts with the remainder following in ragged procession.

The course is a 10-nautical-mile triangle.

The first leg takes the boats to a mark set out at Hospital Reef.

By the time most of the racers reached this point, the wind had increased to a steady 17 knots from the southeast.

The sea was still rough but as it was crossing the course, it was manageable.

The first boat to reach the mark was *Wings II*, skippered by Andy Paulus in his Ariel 48.

Paulus was followed closely by *Elua Makani*, a Beneteau 42s7 helmed by Sean McAllister.

The second leg was more relaxing as it was almost straight downwind towards Nelson Island.

Normally we might see a splash of colour on this leg as boats hoist their spinnakers, but the wind and rough seas proved too daunting to all

and none was used.

Most of the skippers decided to go "wing-on-wing" instead, which means they sailed downwind with their genoas and mainsails trimmed on opposite sides of the boat.

At this point, the wind was gusting to 20 knots.

The second mark, just northwest of Ackland Rock off Nelson Island, seemed to cause problems for a number of skippers.

One boat got tangled in the mark's anchor chain while others rounded the mark and promptly went "into irons" (head to wind and unable to move).

These situations caused problems for the following boats whose skippers were then forced to take evasive action.

The last leg to the finish was the hardest as the boats had to either tack out into the strait or to stay close to the shore along Nelson Island.

Whichever way they chose they had to beat into the wind as well as the three- to four-foot waves.

This favoured the larger boats, which were able to cut through them, while the smaller boats had a rough and wet ride.

On this leg one boat tore its sails while another suffered a broken mast.

Fortunately no one was hurt and the RCM-SAR vessel was quickly on hand and towed it into the harbour.

The first boat to cross the line was McAllister's *Elua Makani*.

Other winners, based on the PHRF handicap system, were *Bedlam II* (Alan Slater) in first place, followed by *Wings II* (Andy Paulus) and *Free Spirit* (Stu Harrison) in second and third respectively.

The four division winners were:

AA — *Elua Makani* (Sean McAllister);

A — Bedlam II (Alan Slater);

B — Frendy (Charlie Park), and

C — Wild Side (Wayne Stremel).

After the race, a celebratory barbecue was held at the Royal Canadian Legion in Madeira Park, attended by 120 sailors, crews, friends and families.

The reduction of water distribution system leaks due to metering has also helped maintain supplies.

By the time you read this, stage two restrictions will apply to south Coast residents due to the continuing dry weather.

Area A will remain on stage one for the time being.

The last time this situation occurred and the south Coast residents were subject to restrictions, Area A residents responded responsibly by also reducing consumption voluntarily.

I have had questions about the survey work along Garden Bay Road and Francis Peninsula Road.

It is in preparation for water main replacements made possible by infrastructure grants awarded this spring by both the provincial and federal governments, providing \$2,855,200 of the \$3,440,000 total cost of the projects.

The construction phase will cause some minor traffic disruptions but it will be well worth the inconvenience to have these replacements completed.

Another project underway is the installation of accessibility improvements to Katherine Lake Park.

Making the use of this great facility available for use by people with mobility difficulties will be a benefit to everyone.

We should be grateful that these improvements are enabled by a very generous contribution from a local resident.

WILDFIRES

We all sympathize and send good wishes to the residents, firefighters and all those who have come from across Canada and from overseas to help in the Interior of the province.

We remember well the fire near Sechelt in 2015 and empathize with the folks affected.


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Sunshine Coast writers' festival: There are still tix for four top picks

THE METER'S **RUNNING V**

Saturday, Aug. 19, 4 p.m.

This year's poetry event features

three of the five finalists for the 2016 Governor General's award for English language poetry — Joe Denham, Steven Heighton and Rachel Rose.

Of the three, Denham is a local poet and author from Roberts Creek.

Denham has a rare ability to make a reader see what he sees and feel what he feels.

He has done so in three collections of poetry and a novel.

His time as a commercial fisherman has afforded him the opportunity to observe the natural world of the British Columbia coast in a way that most of us never will.

His latest book of poetry is Regeneration Machine, an extended eulogy for a lost Pender Harbour friend.

His most recent project is an album of songs entitled 'Lost at Sea.'

Steven Heighton, with 14 published books to his credit and reams of awards and honours, could be considered the veteran of this trio.

His book of poetry, The Waking Comes Late, was the winner of the 2016 Governor General's Award.

His work has appeared in practi-

cally every serious literary journal in this country and many more around the world.

Rachel Rose is currently the poet laureate of Vancouver.

In addition to her four

collections of poetry, she has written works of both fiction and non-fiction.

Her latest book of poetry, and the one for which she was a Governor General's Award finalist, is Marry & Burn.

Her non-fiction book. Gone to the Dogs: Riding Shotgun with the K9 Cops, is slated for publication this

Frustrated with dope-growing neighbour

(This letter was sent to SCRD Area A director Frank Mauro and copied to the P. H. Fire Dept. and the Harbour Spiel)

Portions of this letter have been removed to avoid identifying persons and property.

Frank,

I'm writing to you as a result of sheer frustration with the inability to obtain help concerning a grow-op house in our neighbourhood.

We are extremely concerned with not only the smell from this operation but the danger present in this treed area with the summer dry season that is starting.

We know that there is a lot of heat used in this house because of no frost on the roof and rapid snow melt this last winter.

There is a RCMP file opened but we're told that they can't do anything unless power is being stolen.

The SCRD said they can't do anything (even with the smell) and the fire department can't do anything unless there is a problem such as a fire.

The registered owner has a mortgage with the Scotia Mortgage Corporation.

Calling Scotia Mortgage has resulted in the same answer of nothing can be done, which seems strange since their funds are affected by the probable worthless value of this house due to the growing of marijauna and the damage this does to the interior.

Any insurance obtained by the owner to obtain the mortgage will not be valid given the operation going on there so the investment is lost.

My wife and I live across the street from this house and our tenants,

who live right behind it, have told us that they are having to consider moving from our rental property because of the smell and possible danger.

This is very serious to us because of the chance of lost income.

The house windows are all blacked out and they have put plywood up on one side and around the back under the deck.

Are there propane tanks there (propane is used for heat apparently)?

We don't know.

Has it being inspected by our building department — which definitely appears if anyone erects a shed etc. without a permit?

Probably not.

I realize the possible changes concerning this subject given our government's involvement with changing the laws concerning marijuana but what are we to do right now?

We have Realtors enabling sales to these people and no control of what happens to the properties.

When are our levels of government (local and up) going to realize that subjects like this are what concerns us citizens?

What can we do?

We're not supposed to take the laws into our own hands — our law/ bylaw enforcement people rightly discourage this — but what else is there?

There is no one to help and rumour has it that one person owns about 10 of these properties on the Sunshine Coast.

Is this true? Who knows? Who knows anything?

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
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




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The Promise of Paradise: Utopian Communities in BC

FROM CHAPTER 8 LIVING ON THE LAND: THE AGE OF THE COUNTERCULTURE

By the mid-1970s, though, most of the coastal communes had disappeared; their inhabitants had discovered the realities of country life.

Summers were a blast, but growing enough food for winter was harder than it looked.

Flimsy structures thrown up in haste provided scant protection against cold weather.

Many individuals from this hopeful period ended up living in the area, but they lived mainly as other people lived, not communally.

In a 1980 Vancouver Sun story, a Sechelt RCMP officer was asked if there were still any communes around, he could name only one: Storm Bay, on Narrows Inlet.

This remote spot, a refuge from strong winds that blow up and downadjacent Sechelt Inlet, deserves particular mention.

It was perhaps the most idiosyncratic of the Sunshine Coast countercultural communities, and still exists today.

It's not really surprising that the

RCMP at Sechelt remembered Storm Bay, because in 1975 members from this detachment, supposedly acting on a report that missing newspaper heiress Patty Hearst was hiding out there, raided the site at four in the morning.

According to the Coast News, "a young lady who looked like Ms. Hearst" was found, "but that's all."

"Storm Bay was a neighbourhood, not a commune," said artist Joan Payne, one of the original landowners.

It was colonized in the late 1960s by members of the Western Front, a renowned Vancouver artists' co-operative and their friends.


The bay was a summer hangout for the creative crowd, which included such well-known performance and conceptual artists as Glenn Lewis and Hank Bull, videographer Kate Craig (who died at the bay, of cancer, in 2002), filmmaker David Rimmer and dancer Karen Jamieson.

They lived collaboratively and derived great inspiration from their coastal surroundings.

Some Western Front members also purchased, and strata-titled, an acreage at Roberts Creek, dubbed Babyland.

Odd homes are hidden among the trees at both locations.

"I had five solar panels for electricity," recalled Payne, who disposed



of her Storm Bay property in 2010.

"A propane hot-water heater, a woodstove and a giant porch, where most of the living took place.

"In the early days we paddled up there by canoe. It was pretty nice."

Water came from a nearby lake.

Another early settler at the bay was Peter Light who, for more than a decade, with his family, enjoyed "a very simple but far from rude lifestyle in a very small space leaving a very small footprint... we lived lives surrounded by wealth."

But bears and vandals could be a problem, especially in winter.

"Some kayaking magazine wrote that the bay was a deserted hippie commune," Payne said.

"We had to hide our valuables.

"But it's a beautiful spot, very healing for those of us who lived in the middle of the city.

"It was so quiet up there. It was wonderful."

Another cove, a little farther north, was also home to a coastal

commune and became the subject of a book by Paul Williams in 1976.

Apple Bay, or Life on the Planet, describes a year in the lives of a dozen young folk, most of them from California.

The place names are fictionalized but the action probably takes place at Galley Bay on Desolation Sound, where an isolated farm harboured, at times, as many as 100 people.

Galley Bay was notorious with local yachtsmen, for whom the sound had long been a prime recreation site.

Unclothed maidens swam out to nearby vessels and cadged cigarettes from gawking skippers or else enticed speedboat owners into letting them practise a little nude water-skiing.

Author and broadcaster Grant Lawrence, who spent summers in the area as a youngster, neatly skewers the hippie settlement in his 2010 book, Adventures in Solitude: What Not to Wear to a Nude Potluck and Other Stories from Desolation Sound.

For the straightlaced Lawrence family, a neighbourly invite to the bay turned into an excruciating, if hilari-

ous, embarrassment.

The title says it all.

But while *Adventures in Solitude* is humour at its broadest, *Apple Bay* is a diary of sexual experimentation, personal conflict, tension and jealousy; few jocular moments are portrayed.

For one unlucky individual, Sunshine Coast communal life was devastating rather than merely tense and conflicted.

In *The Eden Express* (1975), Mark Vonnegut, son of novelist Kurt Vonnegut, Jr., chronicled with great insight a frightening descent into schizophrenia, most of which took place at a commune on Powell Lake near the pulp mill town of Powell River, not far from Galley Bay.

A mescaline trip that never ended saw him committed to a New Westminster psychiatric hospital.

One aspect of Vonnegut's illness, a crazed insistence on nudity, could be seen as an impaired echo of the familiar Doukhobor protest, designed to remind onlookers that unfettered simplicity was at the heart of atrue spiritual life.







Reducing harm for opioid users

In this ever-changing, diverse world, harm reduction has become a reality.

We know that all communities continue to see individuals who choose to lead a life that includes high-risk behaviours, despite the risks involved, and therefore a range of services is available.

The Pender Harbour Health Centre recognizes the need to provide and inform the community about the harm reduction services available.

Some of these services include peer support meetings such as Alcoholics Anonymous, condom distribution, a youth clinic providing education, birth control and STI testing, needle exchange and, most recently, the take-home naloxone kits.

The THN program started in BC in August 2012.

It was introduced to reduce the harms and deaths associated with opioid overdose.

Canada is one of the largest per capita consumers of prescribed opioids in the world.


Morphine, heroin, methadone, fentanyl, codeine and oxycodone are opioids which are most often prescribed for pain relief.

These medications are considered depressants, which slow the body down and can affect breathing.

Opioids are safe when used correctly but can also lead to misuse when used inappropriately or when in the wrong hands.

They can be taken by mouth, injection, placed on the skin, smoked, or snorted.

It may be difficult to determine if someone has had an opioid overdose if you have not witnessed the act but



here are some symptoms that may help you recognize an overdose:

Shallow, slow, irregular breaths or not breathing at all; someone who is unresponsive; unusual snorting or gurgling sounds; choking, blue lips or nail beds; pale, cold or clammy skin and tiny pupil.

Naloxone is a medication used to temporarily reverse the effects of an opioid overdose.

It has been used in Canada for over 45 years in emergency settings and can be administered via injection or intranasally.

Naloxone is available in BC without a prescription.

It acts within three to five minutes when injected into a large muscle but after 20 to 90 minutes, its effects wear off, so additional doses are usually required.

If the individual is not having an overdose, this medication will not harm them.

Free take-home naloxone kits are

available at the P.H.H.C..

Instruction on the use of the kits, contents and the administration of the medication is available from the nurses or other trained staff.

Refill supplies for the kits are also available and free of charge.

It is not mandatory for a person to receive the training to obtain a kit as there is a brief outline that the kit provides:

- 1. Stimulate. If they are unresponsive, call 911;
 - 2. Open their airway;
- 3. Ventilate by giving one breath every five seconds;
- 4. Evaluate and then inject one dose of Naloxone into a large muscle, if needed, and
- 5. Evaluate— is a second dose needed?

If you use opioids for health reasons or recreationally, or know somebody who does, you should think about obtaining a kit.

It could save a life.

In the 1920s, Gladys Disney married Egmont logger Fred McNutt and moved to Egmont.

She had previously taught school in Roberts Creek and Wilson Creek and would later teach at the Egmont School.

McNutt wrote a series of articles about the history of Egmont that appeared in the Coast News in 1955.

McNutt died in 1968.

Mrs. Points, from Belfair, WA, writes:

"I bought that property, 246 acres of land at Secret Bay, as an investment.

"That was in 1912. I was Miss Fuller then.

"When I went up there with the surveyors, I was so taken with the scenery and the land that I refused \$35 an acre for it shortly after I bought it.

"I called it my 'Old Lady's Home.'

"Mr. Waugh didn't have anything to do with the property.

"The surveyors called Fuller Lake after me." (It is now Waugh Lake on the maps.)

Mrs. Points says she did not live any length of time at Egmont until the Depression but she worked hard to have a road built by the government and encloses a long clipping from the *Vancouver Sun* of Feb. 4, 1935 entitled, 'Woman's plan for BC Riviera Tour."

It suggests a system of roads and ferries such as we now have.

At that time, relief camp men at Wood Bay had the road within two miles of Pender Harbour.

Mrs. Points suggested that the local men who were being employed

to make trails with hand tools be given machinery and allowed to build a road to the Harbour instead of leading nowhere.

She also suggested a ferry from Powell River to Vancouver Island.

Says Mrs. Points:

"I talked with men from different organizations, a couple MPs and Mr. Scoffield of the CPR.

"Mr. Scoffield was the man who first ran excursion boats up Jervis Inlet and he knew that wonderful country.

"I finally made him see the light about roads and connections to get US tourists. Unfortunately, he died.

"I found myself paying very high taxes — about 10 times higher than I had been paying.

"I thought the road to Egmont must be in and property values had gone up.

"When I decided to go to Egmont to live until the Depression was over, I found I was mistaken.

"One day the school inspector, Mr. Pollock, was at my cabin.

"He told me how Mr. Browne, the assessor, worked.

"He said Egmont was a \$10,000 district and they must find a way to get the money for a school.

"A new one-room school had been built on land donated by Mr. Griffith.

"It seems they considered everyone's ability to pay.

"I was described as a wealthy American widow, so it was decided to soak me.

"When I told him I wasn't wealthy and never had been, he laughed heartily and said,

"The joke is on us."

"I had a talk with Mr. Browne and he said he would do his best to

rectify the mistake.

"He died!

"I asked the government if I could sell some of the land to people who wanted it to pay back taxes but I was told the land would have to be sold in one lot.

"A friend offered to pay the taxes for me but I refused as I did not

know how I would ever pay her.

"I let the property go. I am glad it is of some use and people did get places there.

"My memories are happy ones and in my mind I am there lots of times, rowing, fishing or visiting nice people.


