#### Surfing the second wave

If the dreaded second wave is finally here, its arrival has been met with a

collective, "Meh."

Sure, all but the dim and selfabsorbed wear masks now but those other things that were so popular in the spring, like avoiding non-essential travel, clanging pots and shrieking at each other to stay home, seem to have gone out of fashion.

Going into our ninth month of this pandemic stuff, how well we are doing just depends on who you ask.

Many say we've achieved a good balance between managing the spread and maintaining our economic and social health.

Maybe that's true, and maybe it's about to change.

On Oct. 22, Canada broke another record with 2,700 new infections.

Globally, we break records everyday — yesterday notching half a million new cases in 24 hours.

Based on averages since the pandemic began, 15,000 of them will die.

Some will still insist that we must ignore those casualties and soldier on to preserve the economy.

Though you might not hear that argument from someone in a care home, others will counter that we can't put a price on a human life.

Except we are.

According to a story in the *New York Times* in March, calculating the economic costs of curtailing social interaction compared with the lives saved is a metric policy makers have been using since the virus began.

One U.S. government agency placed the "statistical value" of your life at about \$9.1 million.

If that's the case, COVID-19 has been costly — according to a University of Washington study, trends in-

dicate the U.S. death toll could reach one million by late February.

That maths out at \$9.1 trillion.
But are all those deaths equal?
Statisticians use the term "harvesting" to describe COVID-related deaths of elderly people who, statistically, were likely to die within a few years anyways.

Terms like this come in handy when translating population trends, or justifying not wearing a mask, but they don't console the grandchildren.

Even good news is a matter of opinion.

On Oct. 21, the CBC reported that B.C.'s provincial health officer said it is possible some British Columbians could have access to a COV-ID-19 vaccine by early next year.

"More than 150 vaccines are in development worldwide and 10 of those vaccine candidates are now in Phase 3 clinical trials, meaning they are being tested on hundreds of volunteers to make sure they are safe."

If that sounds like victory, it shouldn't.

Just ask the hundred or so people fighting off hypothermia outside the Legion on Oct. 20 — fears of a "twindemic" pushed many to wait for hours to get a flu shot.

It hopefully served as a good lesson for health authorities who may soon be called on to immunize on a much larger scale.

But even with a healthy supply of vaccine, just one weak link in the administering of the dose — like supplies of syringes and alcohol swabs or the ability to sterilize on a scale never before seen — will slow progress.

So, if you're a healthy 19-yearold, don't start lining up just yet.

Vast amounts of money thrown at this virus should inspire confidence that an end may soon be in sight.

Until then, it's still up to us to protect each other.

If you develop any of the above symptoms, please call your family doctor or contact the Respiratory Assessment Clinic directly for further assessment and testing (if indicated). Most of the time this will be on the same day. Anyone who is seen at the clinic will also receive a follow-up phone call or appointment within 24 to 48 hours. #### SCRD passes short term vacation rental bylaws

After years of gathering input and deferring a decision, the Sunshine Coast Regional District has passed specific bylaw amendments to regulate short term vacation rentals on the Sunshine Coast.

On Oct. 8, the SCRD board unanimously passed bylaw nos. 310.184 and 337.118 in an effort to bring peace to neighbourhoods suffering from poorly managed STVRs.

These amendments now regulate commercial bed and breakfast providers and STVRs under the same rules.

Stays will be limited to a maximum of 30 days for both, and B&Bs will no longer be required to serve breakfast.

The bylaw also states that "no external indication or advertising associated with a bed and breakfast shall be permitted on the property except a single sign not exceeding 3500 square centimetres."

Also included are zoning and parcel size dependent limitations on the number of bedrooms — now limited to either two for "bed and breakfast home" or up to five for a "bed and breakfast inn."

In all cases, the total number of occupants "shall not exceed two per each permitted bedroom."

But perhaps the most significant outcome of the amendments are tighter restrictions aimed at STVRs.

Residential properties offering vacation rentals will now be required to be "operated by an operator who resides on the property where the bed and breakfast is located and for the duration when the bed and breakfast is in operation."

Leonard Lee, Area A director, told the *Harbour Spiel* that the reason the bylaw includes an onsite operator requirement is "strictly so they can be

self-policed."

He cites out of town ownership of some properties as the root cause of problems.

"When the noise got out of hand, there was no one to say, 'Hey stop it, it's quiet time.'

"So, it wasn't being managed like a respectful neighbour would manage their place and some of them became party houses."

Up until now, there were very few rules that applied to STVRs.

"We needed to put some controls in place if we were going to allow them because they were outside the former B&B bylaw," said Lee.

"Under that, they weren't allowed, yet they were here.

"They were never legal."

Lee said that, like all SCRD bylaws, they will be primarily complaint driven.

The new bylaws allow for fines up to \$1,000 for infractions but Lee concedes that there is work to do now on updating the SCRD's bylaw enforcement capabilities.

"The problem with our bylaw enforcement is that it is basically written to get compliance and its primary (continued on p.7)

focus is building bylaws.

"So, we give you chances before you're out and that doesn't work very good for noise complaints or operating a STVR."

The SCRD board and staff is currently investigating the possibility of instituting a business licensing model to aid ongoing enforcement issues with businesses like STVRs and cannabis production.

In 2006, the District of Tofino passed a bylaw requiring STVRs to apply for a business licence to operate, thereby enabling the district to simply yank the licence of problem operators after a suitable number of warnings.

In a 2016 CBC news story, Josie Osbourne, the mayor of Tofino, admitted that wasn't necessarily the answer to their enforcement issues either.

Osbourne told the CBC that when she last searched for Tofino listings on Airbnb, 273 properties came up — even though the city only issued 120 short-term rental business licences that year.

"Clearly there's a major discrepancy between how many properties are listing themselves and how many properties actually have business licences," she said.

"The enforcement aspect is still a work in progress," said Lee.

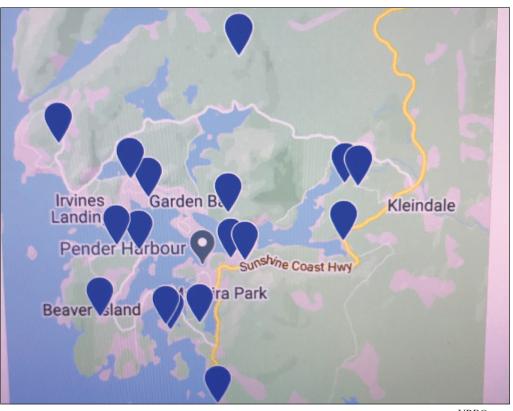
The bylaw isn't popular with some operators who will see reduced profit or be shut out altogether.

A public hearing held on June 30 recorded 50 submissions in support of the bylaw while 25 were opposed.

"They were all business owners," said Lee.

One of them, Allison Brownlie of Madeira Park, suggested that not all operators are the same.

"As the cabin is a rather small

property there is no reasonable way that I can be onsite during rentals.

"It would also be cost prohibitive to renovate the property to create a new guest suite."

Brownlie's case was a minority in the stack of submissions received by the SCRD with the majority echoing the sentiment of Dan Leland:

"As a resident of Madeira Park,

I am only several houses away from a currently operating Airbnb property that is owned and run by a nonresident individual who lives in North Vancouver.

"As a result, there is little, if any, supervision of this Airbnb site and there have been numerous incidents of excessive noise and occupancies exceeding the limit restrictions."

The Sunshine Coast Credit Union recently contributed \$6,500 towards the purchase of Pender Harbour & District Health Centre's new telephone system. 'Our current system is antiquated,' said Susann Richter, PHHC chief operating officer. 'We have no capacity for individual voice mails, call forwarding is not possible to every phone, it is very difficult to change the main phone voicemail which makes it difficult to leave messages for the public regarding sudden closures and any other changes to service.' The grant from SCCU comes at an opportune time for the health centre. 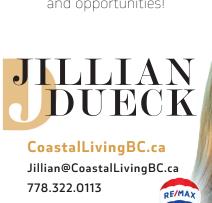

#### Payne relief: Firearm and drugs seized in Sechelt

On Saturday Oct. 10 at approximately 2 p.m., Sunshine Coast RCMP performed a traffic stop with an older model blue SUV on Wharf Avenue by Friendship Park in Sechelt.

The driver and lone occupant, known to police to have a suspended licence, was arrested without incident.

During the search, police located a handgun concealed on his person.

A search of the vehicle located ammunition, thousands of dollars of cash and illicit drugs believed to be cocaine and methamphetamine in quantities consistent with drug trafficking.

Matthew Alan Payne, age 37 of Sechelt, was held in custody and made an appearance in Sechelt Provincial Court on Oct. 13.

Payne remains in custody facing multiple Criminal Code firearms charges.

Charges under the controlled drugs and substances act are anticipated as the investigation continues.



Sunshine Coast RCMP

Sunshine Coast recently seized a firearm and a large quantity of illicit drugs believed to be cocaine and methamphetamine during a traffic stop in Sechelt Oct. 10.

In a media release, Sunshine Coast RCMP said this is the 28th firearm seized through ongoing investigations over the past six weeks on the Sunshine Coast.

Payne seems to have a history of similar offences.

A 2018 *North Shore News* story reported that a Matthew Alan Payne and 23-year-old Chelsea Lea Paul

were found with "216 grams of crystal meth, 370 grams of cocaine, 134 grams of red rock (cocaine and heroin), 14 grams of brown heroin, \$2,000 in cash, and items associated with the drug trade" after a traffic stop near Horsehoe Bay in Aug. 8, 2018.

In that case, Crown counsel approved three charges of possession for the purpose of trafficking for the two.

#### IMPAIRED DRIVING

On Sept. 28, police responded to a possible impaired driver leaving the Earls Cove BC Ferries Terminal.

Witnesses provided a vehicle description including licence plate, and police located the suspect vehicle and driver in Egmont a short time later.

The driver, who was exhibiting signs of possible intoxication from alcohol, was given and failed a roadside alcohol screening test.

The driver was issued a 90-day roadside prohibition and his vehicle was impounded for 30 days.

#### THEFT

Between Sept. 22 and Oct. 1, a

suspect stole a late-1990s model ubilt boat trailer from where it was locked and stored on Sakinaw Lake Road, Garden Bay.

The grey coloured trailer had BC licence plate ULT26F on it.

#### **MVA**

On Oct. 13, police attended a single vehicle incident in the 12600 block of Highway 101, Madeira Park, after a vehicle rolled over in the ditch.

The vehicle had gone down the embankment and into a tree, sustaining severe damage.

Fortunately, the lone driver and occupant only needed treatment for non-life-threatening injuries.

On Nov. 11 at 11 a.m., the Royal Canadian Legion No. 112 will hold a small service at the Pender Harbour cenotaph that will be restricted to a colour party, pipers, an emcee, chaplain and a limited number of local representatives.

Appropriate music will be played.

"In short, it will be a small but dignified COVID appropriate ceremony," Bill Charlton, RCL 112 representative, told the *Harbour Spiel*.

"There can be no parade, no

spectators and the Legion itself will be closed.

"It is imperative that people respect the no spectators rule due to crowd size restrictions during this pandemic."

Due to this restriction, the ceremony will livestream via Facebook beginning at 10:50 a.m. on Nov. 11.

The Pender Harbour Legion asks that community members observe their restriction to spectators to keep attendees safe.

"Wherever you are, please observe a minute of silence at 11 a.m. in tribute to our fallen and our first

responders," said Charlton.

"Thank you all for respecting the COVID-19 restrictions for Remembrance Day this year."

#### Navvy Jack and Portugese Joe

A recent *Van-couver Sun* article by John Mackie focused on John "Navvy Jack" Thomas and

his Squamish Nation wife, Row-ia, whose lives are ensconced in BC history and parallel those of our own "Portuguese" Joe Gonsalves and his Squamish Nation wife, Susalot Harris.

Gonsalves and Harris established their business in Irvine's Landing, created "the farm" in Madeira Park, and donated substantial property to the community, including the location of today's P. H. Community Hall and Madeira Park Elementary School.

Their hard work and generosity inspired their descendants to name the

area Madeira Park in honour of Gonsalves's Madeira Islands birthplace.

Wales-born Navvy Jack Thomas hauled washed gravel (navvy jack) from Capilano River "to construction sites across the inlet" and built his home on a 160-acre West Vancouver waterfront property in 1872.

This summer, 138 years later, West Vancouver council ordered demolition of the "Navvy Jack House," the oldest house in West Van and one with significant indigenous history, but in extremely rough shape.

In objection, a dedicated citizens group presented a history of the house to council, and Nicole Preissl, Navvy Jack and Row-i-a's great-great-grand-daughter, explained, "For us, it was really important to say, yes, this was a settler house, but it is also an Indigenous house.

"It's a very beautiful example of Indigenous people in this colonial time, and what it was like to grow up in a mixed marriage."

Council cancelled their demolition order and applied for provincial funding towards a \$2 million-plus restoration.

In Pender Harbour, citizens' groups, most residents, and the many Gonsalves descendants feel the same as Preissl, and strongly urge the province, SCRD, and the shishálh Nation to retain the name Madeira Park in honour of this blending of people and cultures that formed our community.

management plan working group, now integrated with the shishalh-BC foundation agreement, and expressed a desire for representation in planning and decision-making, as an opportunity to join the shishalh and the province along the path to reconciliation.

# METAL RECYCLING WILL CONTINUE... AT A COST

Last month the SCRD was faced with the hard decision of either ending the metal recycling program at the Pender Harbour Transfer Station and Sechelt Landfill, or increasing the fees to fund our disposal costs.

We chose to continue the service but, with tipping fees increased from \$70 to \$140 per tonne.

We will continue to accept fridges and freezers, along with the additional charge for the recovery of ozone-depleting substances.

When the price of metal is high, private operators on the Coast will often take it for free, but now only By-Pass Auto, past Gibsons, is currently doing so, resulting in an expensive and time-consuming chore for people in Pender Harbour and Egmont.

Small amounts of metal would likely end up hidden in the garbage and thus buried in the landfill without the option to easily recycle it.

# SHORT TERM RENTALS ELIMINATED

On Oct. 8, the SCRD odyssey called "short term rental accommodation regulations" came to end with the adoption of bylaw amendments including these highlights:

- The bed and breakfast bylaw will incorporate short-term rentals, eliminating the short term rental designation;
- A B&B is no longer required to provide a breakfast;
- In-home B&B rentals are lim-November 2020

ited to two guests per bedroom and no more than two designated B&B bedrooms;

- B&B Inn rentals allow no more than 10 guests, and
- A homeowner or caretaker must be on-site while rented.

Bylaw infractions can be fined up to \$1,000.

#### **GOOD DOCK NEWS**

The SCRD recently partnered with the P. H. Living Heritage Society to "green light" plans for a community lakeside dock in Hotel Lake Park.

The plan, led by Rick Crook and the PHLHS, with strong support from Pender Harbour Rotary, will be implemented in two phases.

Phase one includes establishment of a path to the water, ramp to a dock, and a dock to be used for launching human-powered boats.

Phase two will be development of a public picnic area across the road from the dock, complete with a gazebo, picnic tables, and interpretive signage to celebrate the Indigenous and natural history of the location.

Environmental impact approval has been received, and we must now identify and meet requirements of the shíshálh Nation.

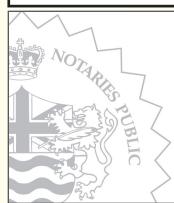

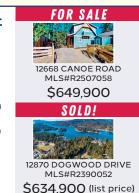

# REPORT A WILDLIFE VIOLATION

MARINE VIOLATIONS 1-800-465-4336 NON-MARINE VIOLATIONS 1-877-952-RAPP (7277)

One way you can **help protect the environment, fish and wildlife** is to stop violations before they happen. The watchful eyes of the community can deter possible violators. If you see an offence, **think O.R.R.: Observe, Record, Report**.

#### **OBSERVE WHAT THE PERSON IS DOING**

Some common violations are:

- Illegal waste disposal (household or business waste, e.g. dumped on Crown Land)
- Unlawful open burning (e.g. dense smoke); excludes backyard burning
- The discharge of chemicals or sewage to lakes or rivers
- Damage to fish or wildlife habitat
- Exceeding the daily bag or catch limit
- Use of illegal hunting or fishing gear
- Fishing or hunting out of season or in closed areas
- Unauthorized collection or sale of fish and wildlife or their parts

#### **RECORD WHAT YOU OBSERVE**

As soon as possible, write down what you've seen. Include these details:

- The date, time and location (e.g. nearest town, fishing location, stream, address)
- The violator's identity or description (e.g. height, weight, hair colour, age, clothing, number of violators)
- The boat or vehicle description (e.g. vehicle licence, boat registration number, vessel length, colour, make, type, distinguishing features)
- Evidence that might still be at the scene (e.g. catch, fish offal, gear used)

The barred owl (*Strix varia*) is often a silent companion on walks through forested hiking trails.

The owl's hooting, "Who cooks for you? Who cooks for you-all?" is likely familiar to most, especially those who go outdoors at night.

Barred owls can be distinguished by their dark soulful eyes (most species of owl have yellow eyes) and vertical streaks of white across the chest region.

The birds usually weigh between 0.5 to 1 kilogram with a wingspan often stretching over a metre.

Though they can be spotted on branches, as on the cover image in the day, the owl is most active at night when they're out hunting.

This silent predator hunts by waiting on a perch until a small animal like a squirrel, chipmunk, mouse, rabbit, reptile, other birds (up to the size of grouse) or even fish appears.

They nest in elevated tree cavi-November 2020 ties in mature forests and rarely migrate.

One study found that of 158 birds that were banded and tracked, none had moved farther than 10 kilometres away.

The owl's population has increased approximately 1.5 per cent per year between 1966 and 2014, according to the North American Breeding Bird Survey.

Partners in Flight estimates their global breeding population at 3 million, with 91 per cent spending some time in the U.S., 7 per cent in Canada,

and 3 per cent in Mexico.

Though much more common in eastern North America, the barred owl has moved west during the 20th century, spreading through the Pacific Northwest and south into California.

Mating rituals begin in January with the males calling out loudly to the females.

To lure a barred owl in for a photo, experts suggest imitating the call with your voice and waiting quietly.

If you're lucky, a territorial barred owl may fly in for a closer look.

"As for the gillnetter, I don't think it was really a local boat. I vaguely see a face when I look at the boat but can't quite place who it is."

## It's never been more important to boost your immune system

These are worrying times.
With COVID in our midst, and
the flu season upon us, it can be hard
to know how to maximize our health
and resistance to disease.

It might be reassuring to know that our immune systems are working for us 24/7 to detect infections and cell mutations and activate immune responses quickly.

How best to support this process?

#### **NUTRITION**

Many nutrients are needed for a healthy immune system, including vitamins A, C, B6, B9, D and E, zinc, selenium, iron and protein.

The good news is that a diet rich in whole fruits and veggies, whole grains and legumes will provide most of what we need.

You don't have an ideal diet?

In that case, current recommendations are to add a simple multivitamin daily.

For seniors, extra vitamin D is a good idea, 650 to 1350 milligrams daily, for bone health and immunity.

Turmeric shows promise in enhancing antibody and antiviral processes, but more good quality research is needed.

#### WHAT ABOUT VITAMIN C?

This nutrient does so much for our bodies.

Research is clear that it does not decrease the risk of catching a virus, unless someone is engaged in extreme exercise (like marathon running).

Once we are sick, there is evidence that extra vitamin C may reduce the duration of symptoms by 1.5 days for some people.

The safe upper limit is 2,000













BOOST YOUR IMMUNE SYSTEM

mg per day, but even this intake can have side effects like irritation of the gastrointestinal tract and bladder and kidney stones.

The best bet is to eat plenty of fruits and veggies, with that extra multivitamin if needed.

If you drink fruit juices, the vitamin C in frozen is better absorbed than in ready-to-drink beverages.

#### **LOWER STRESS**

Stress increases the hormone cortisol, which inhibits immune function.

Finding healthy ways of dealing with stress is so important to our lives.

Exercise, laughter, sharing our burdens, spiritual beliefs, creativity, relaxation exercises, better time management and counselling are just some of the things that can help us feel better.

#### LOWERING ALCOHOL INTAKE

Chronic alcohol use negatively affects the immune system, in complex ways.

It damages cells in both the gut and the lungs.

Also, when our bodies metabolize alcohol, a valuable antioxidant called glutathione is depleted.

Glutathione is critical to immune response, and we produce less of it as we age.

A deficiency can lead to severe

lung injury in the presence of infection or trauma.

Reducing alcohol intake is the best option during this time of concern regarding respiratory viruses.

#### **SLEEP**

During sleep our bodies have a chance to refresh and repair tissues.

Lucky folks get the recommended seven to nine hours per day.

For others, doing our best to maintain a regular sleep schedule, along with regular exercise and exposure to daylight, will help us maximize the hours we have.

#### **EXERCISE**

Regular exercise will improve circulation and sleep, and reduce stress — all factors involved in immunity.

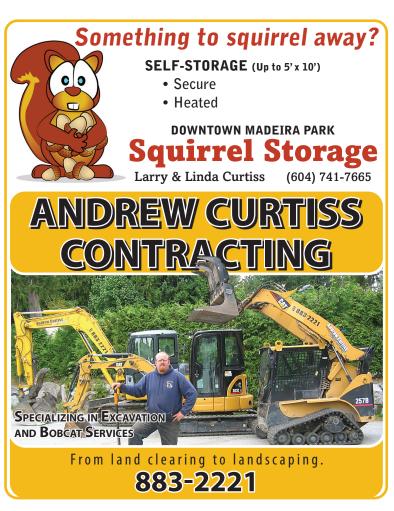

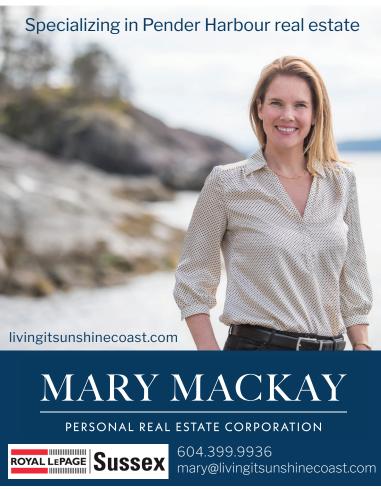

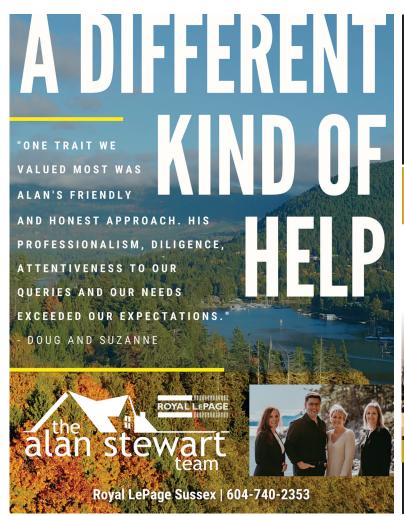
