## Playing hickey at May Day

I felt like one of those U.S. First Amendment auditor guys who get accosted for filming people in public after my camera triggered a shy group of weirdos at May Day.

Despite the pervasiveness of security cameras and smart phones, some have gained a false sense of empowerment that they can control when and where they are photographed.

Generally, there should be no expectation of privacy in public spaces like streets, parks or beaches.

Photographing anyone in these areas for journalistic or artistic purposes is legal in BC and almost everywhere else.

That said, legal does not always mean ethical and most photographers try not to be jerks.

But that gets hard when faced with a population that gobbles up misinformation.

On May Day, I was taking photos of the school field when a small group of young adults demanded I not take their photo.

I couldn't tell if they were emo, alt, e-punks or longboarders and only noticed them at all because one displayed a remarkably thick blanket of hickeys on his neck — more than I'd ever seen in my life.

And I've seen a lot of hickeys.

It was like someone had assaulted him with a purple Bingo dabber.

I squeezed past them on the steps to the IGA where I thought I'd take a panorama of the crowd on the field.

That's when one commanded me not to take their pictures.

Since I hadn't, I ignored him and continued snapping shots of the field.

Only later did I regret not taking a photo of the group because they have me intrigued.

A young woman near Hickey Boy had much of her neck covered with matching injuries, so I assumed they were a couple.

And, possibly, aspiring vampires.

Encouraged by his friend's bold rejection of photographic tyranny, Hickey Boy decided that he would be the spokesperson for the group.

He informed me that not only was I forbidden to photograph them, I must hand over my camera so he could confirm that any images of them were deleted.

I was so shocked by his naive audacity that all I could do was laugh.

"It's not cool, man."

I'm only in my 50s but I identify as a senior — far too old to be escalating an argument with a coven of post-pubescent half wits.

So, I might have felt threatened if Hickey Boy wasn't so small.

He was brave though and seemed indignant as I, perhaps a little mockingly, informed him of Canada's laws with regards to public photography.

I briefly considered letting off a staccato of shutter bursts on his face but I stifled that instinct.

Instead, I assured him that I hadn't taken any photos of his clique of hickey fetishists but, if that was a concern, they might feel safer in their bedrooms.

Hickey Boy wasn't convinced that I didn't owe him access to my camera but he seemed equally unsure about what leverage he possessed to test his theory of privacy law.

Later, to understand why my Nikon triggered them so, I scoured the hundreds of shots I took that day looking for them in the background.

The fact that an image of them doesn't appear here stands as evidence that I didn't find one.

Which is a tragic pity — their hickeys were magnificent.

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## Madeira Park Ambulance Station moves to former fisheries office

By early June, local ambulance crews will have moved into the former Department of Fisheries and Oceans building in Madeira Park beside the Royal Canadian Legion 112.

For decades, BC Emergency Health Services had been leasing a bay with a small office in the Madeira Park Fire Hall to house an ambulance.

According to Steven Reed, BC Emergency Health Services interim manager of clinical operations Sunshine Coast, it has long been inadequate for the needs of paramedics.

Reed said not only was there little room to move around in the bay to service the vehicle, but crews slept and rested between calls in a “very small, dumpy cottage next door.”

No more.

The fisheries building has been undergoing renovations for the past year to provide crews with expanded sleeping quarters, a larger stock room, a kitchen and exercise room.

“One of the nice things about that building is it’s large enough that we can do all of our training sessions in there without having to rent a space,

which we’ve had to do for many, many years because our other stations are too small to hold classroom size groups,” said Reed.

“As well, the garage itself is large enough to do regular maintenance on the vehicles.”

Reed estimates the bays could probably allow up to six ambulances if required but, for now, the building will house two active vehicles and a spare ambulance.

“We are going to house our regional 911 response unit, the Madeira Park ambulance, as well as one of our

spare units which will be outfitted for response as well and then one of our community paramedicine cars,” said Reed.

Aside from the obvious comforts and ease, the building provides closer access to the highway for a quicker response without having to pass through a school zone during calls.

Reed said BCEHS may even be able to use the large parking lot at the site as a helicopter landing zone without having to impact the school field.

“There’s options with it,” said Reed of the new location.

## S.D. 46 announces Jennifer MacInnes as new principal at MPES

School District 46 recently announced leadership updates for the 2026 to 2027 school year.

Locally, Nicole Zilkie, current principal of Madeira Park Elementary, will take on the role of principal at Gibsons Elementary next year.

Zilkie was principal at MPES for the past three years.

Incoming principal at Madeira Park Elementary will be former Pender Harbour Secondary School teacher, Jennifer MacInnes.

MacInnes brings 21 years of experience in education, including international teaching and a wide range June 2026

of classroom roles within S. D. 46, working with students from kindergarten through Grade 12.

She previously served as principal of Cedar Grove Elementary during a maternity leave in 2023, where she supported students, staff and families with care and continuity.

From an S.D. 46 statement:

“Her professional background includes a strong focus on fine arts and performance, and she has created meaningful, experiential learning opportunities for students through school productions, concert bands, and choirs.”

### VOLUMETRIC BILLING HITS PENDER HARBOUR

Residents in the North and South Pender Harbour water service areas have now received their first volumetric water bills, marking a change in billing from a flat-rate system.

Water charges are now based in part on how much water a property uses, as measured by water meters.

The first quarterly volumetric bills covered January 1 to March 31.

Under the new system, each property will receive a quarterly (every three months) bill that includes a base charge of \$212.50 per quarter (or \$850 annually), which includes up to 46 cubic metres of water use (approximately 500 litres per day)

A volumetric charge of \$4 per cubic metre will be charged for any water used above the included amount.

According to an SCR D statement, the move to volumetric billing is designed to more fairly distribute costs among users, encourage water conservation and support the long-term sustainability of local water systems.

Multiple stolen items were located in the vehicle including identification linked to a previous theft from a vehicle on May 2 in Sechelt.

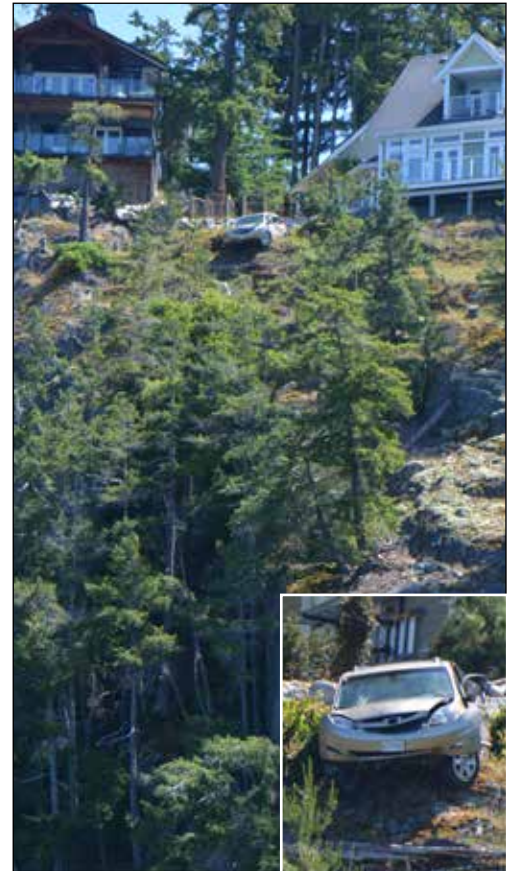
“Prolific offender” Kyle William Schroeder was arrested on an outstanding unrelated warrant and has had additional charges approved

### DELIVERY DRIVER RUN OVER BY OWN VEHICLE

On May 7 at 3:30 p.m. Sunshine Coast RCMP, the Pender Harbour Fire Department and paramedics were all dispatched to a report of a delivery driver who had been run over by his own vehicle in Irvines Landing.

According to Sunshine Coast RCMP, the male in his 30s from Gibsons was conscious, but having trouble breathing and was suffering from significant lower body injuries.

He was airlifted to Vancouver General Hospital.

The vehicle was located down a steep driveway partially hanging over a cliff above a rocky shoreline.

The driver did not show any sign of impairment by drug or alcohol.

WorkSafe BC will be conducting an investigation into the incident.

## Wildfire breaks out May 11 in East Egmont

A wildfire that broke out on a hillside in East Egmont on May 11 is now under control.

A smoky haze enveloped the Egmont area and could even be seen in Pender Harbour on the morning of May 12.

The BCWS listed the fire as “human-caused,” and, according to multiple sources, it is thought to have started after a tree fell across a power line.

“Helicopters and airtankers supported ground personnel with initial response operations.

“Crews will work into the evening with additional resources due to arrive May 12.”

By the morning of May 13, the fire had grown to three hectares and was still listed as “out of control” by the BC Wildfire Service.

By that afternoon, the fire had

grown to 8.54 hectares.

Cooler temperatures and rain on the evening of May 13 helped fire crews gain on the blaze and by the next morning the fire had been

held to 8.54 hectares listed as “under control,” or a “wildfire that is not projected to spread beyond the current perimeter.”

It is now listed as “out.”

## Campfire ban lifted for now

A campfire ban that went into effect May 7 was lifted May 15 after a forecast of cooler, damp weather.

While campfires (any fire smaller than 0.5 metres high by 0.5 metres wide) are permitted for now, as of press time (May 24), a ban applies to all Category 2 and Category 3 open fires until Oct. 31, or until the order is rescinded.

This ban also applies to the following activities and equipment:

- Fireworks (Fireworks Act);
- Binary exploding targets;
- Burn barrels or burn cages of any size or description;
- Controlled air incinerator;
- Air curtain burners, and
- Carbonizers.

This prohibition does not include the use of outdoor stoves, a “CSA-rated

ed or ULC-rated device used outdoors for cooking, heat or ambiance that burns charcoal briquettes, liquid fuel or gaseous fuel, and has a flame height that is less than 15 centimetres tall.”

Anyone found in contravention of an open fire prohibition may be issued a ticket for \$1,150, required to pay an administrative penalty of up to \$10,000 or, if convicted in court, fined

up to \$100,000 and/or sentenced to one year in jail.

If the contravention causes or contributes to a wildfire, the person responsible may be ordered to pay all firefighting and associated costs.

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# Stop-work order issued after Garden Bay Pub site activity

Recently we saw the burned-out shell of Garden Bay Pub demolished and new construction initiated with building materials onsite, but then a stop-work order appeared on May 15.

A stop-work order is issued when a formal complaint is filed with the SCRD which triggers an investigation and, depending on the result of the investigation, further action.

A building permit is required to build any structure except an auxiliary building no larger than 10 square metres, to repair a damaged building, to demolish or move a building, and to construct a retaining wall 1.2 metres

or higher.

Most alteration and new construction projects need a building permit, although not all projects require a development permit.

It turns out there was no permit issued for any of the work on the Garden Bay Pub site, which I confirmed and you can too, by going to [www.scrd.ca/planning](http://www.scrd.ca/planning) and clicking the “active development application” link, which will take you to a map with details of all issued permits.

At [www.scrd.ca/permits](http://www.scrd.ca/permits), you can scroll down to view annual lists of issued permits.

The complaint-triggered stop-work order was inevitable with all the attention paid to this iconic landmark in its prominent location.

My hope is the owners will work closely with the SCRD to rectify the

permitting problems as I am very aware that our community wants their waterfront pub back, and so do I.

## DÉJÀ VU ALL OVER AGAIN

A new encampment seems to be developing in the same Garden Bay Road area where one existed in 2023, and dealing with it remains outside SCRD jurisdiction.

The SCRD has no authority over Crown land, including Ministry of Transportation and Transit rights-of-way, but it is legal to live (camp) for 14 days on Crown land.

It’s up to the province to enforce the numerous, ongoing violations throughout BC, but that’s often complicated and the court rules that squatters cannot be removed when adequate shelter space isn’t available.

All levels of government, and

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the majority of citizens, agree that homeless people deserve support and compassion, and that they have legal and human rights.

On the Sunshine Coast, we have provincial outreach programs to determine if squatters and illegal tenants risk homelessness if removed, but not everyone qualifies for, or will accept, subsidized housing or shelter.

The SCRDR can step in only when a bylaw violation occurs on private property, e.g. an RV on property not zoned to allow long-term residency in such an auxiliary dwelling.

Although it's rarely done, if an illegal auxiliary dwelling unit is reported to the SCRDR, we may, in egregious situations, issue fines and court orders to pressure the property owner to rectify the situation.

### SSMUH IN PENDER-EGMONT

With Bills 44 (2023) and 25 (2025), the province accommodated small scale multi-unit housing to allow secondary suites and accessory units in appropriate rural residential zones.

This demanded that the SCRDR meet SSMUH compliance by eliminating blanket zones restricting use to single detached homes and duplexes by Dec. 31, 2026.

We intended to incorporate the changes in our updated bylaws, part of the official community plan renewal project, but the province refused to allow us the luxury and now we have to amend bylaws 337 and 722 by the end of the year, which will add extra work and cost to the project.

To comply with SSMUH, Area A's bylaw 337 must allow self-contained secondary suites and auxiliary dwelling units on parcels meeting requirements such as wastewater service availability and capacity.

We will likely increase the al- June 2026

lowed size of an ADU from 55 to 90 square metres, but other details such as permitting both a secondary suite and an ADU on parcels already allowing an ADU, are still being considered.

Staff is recommending that we postpone these decisions until the OCP is completed, and our area planning commission will be consulted to ensure that legislative requirements are met in a way that aligns with our community vision for Pender Harbour and Egmont.

The local government act prohibits a public hearing being held for adoption of the required bylaw changes when the sole purpose of the change relates to residential development, as it does in this case.

So, a public information meeting in Q3 of this year will explain the proposed zoning changes that will increase allowances for suites and ADUs beyond the minimum provincial requirements.

This could result in recommendations of more of the other amendments being approved at the board meeting after the committee recommendations are considered.

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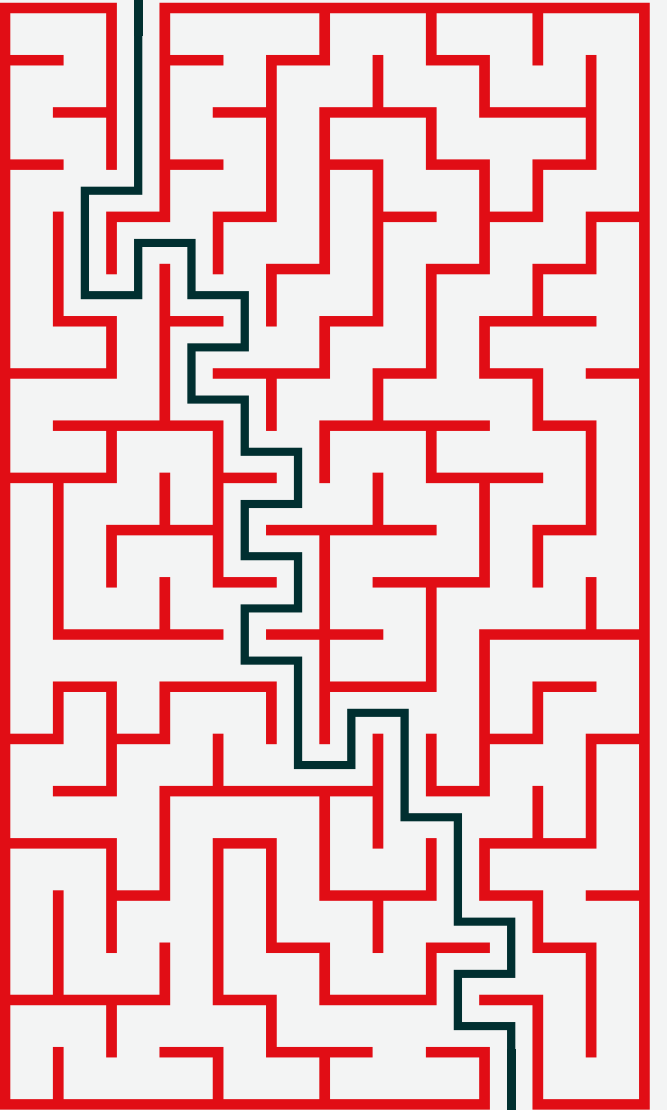

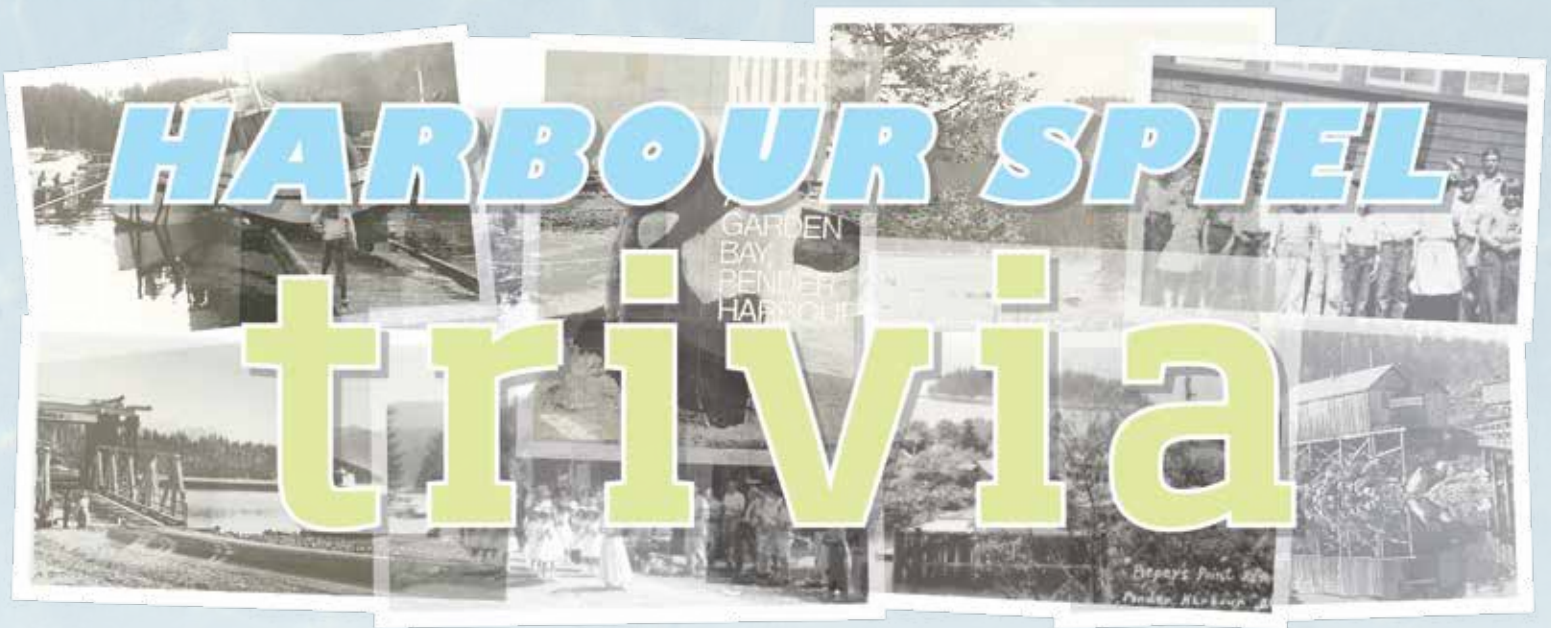

This photo and caption originally appeared in the May 2016 issue of the *Harbour Spiel*:

If you've seen this odd looking boat at the Madeira Park government wharf, you won't be alone if you wondered aloud, 'What the heck is that thing?' At its core, Curt Sample's work of naval architecture contains his 32-foot x 10.5-foot gillnetter the *Hawkeye*. This winter, Sample took another boat, a 32-foot Silverton yacht and cut it down the middle. After much scribing and fitting in his backyard, Sample fibreglassed the Silverton hull pieces around the existing boat to produce the unusual dimensions of 30-feet long by 18-feet wide. The beamy craft is commercially licensed to fish prawns, shrimp and salmon (gillnet). Its first test will come on May 12 with the opening of the commercial prawn season.

**2026 update:** Sample still owns the boat, moors it in Madeira Park and it has been actively prawn fishing for the past decade.

He inspired us to leave our dog-patch days — the remnant of a declining forestry and fisheries era.

That first step was enshrined in Mary Freeman Cain’s photo presentation “Pender Harbour: A Community in Bloom.”

John became our Area A representative and focused on improving our community.

The community continued to benefit from their generosity — we have the Sea-Creature Triangle (Madeira Park wharf entrance) and Appletree Turnaround (past the post office).

His accomplishments (and Mar-

lene’s too) contributed so much and inspired others to help our community become a place to be proud of — look at the community hall gardens and all that followed.

What made John so very special to us, during all this, when our new house burned to the ground in 1999, he told us he would help us rebuild

even better.

He taught us “rock picking 101” and added rock fascia to our home.

Even though we moved to Sechart to be closer to our hospital, in our hearts, we still will be Pender Harbourites forever because of people in our community like John.

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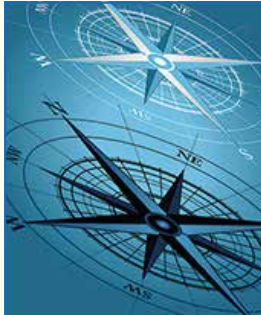

# Pender Harbour Library adopts TinyCat

You will notice some updates the next time you visit the Pender Harbour Library.

Between vibrant new signage, a revitalized kid's section, a DIY printing station and much improved building insulation, there's a lot going on up in the former forestry building.

But, perhaps the biggest addition has been one tiny cat.

Or, rather, TinyCat, the recently adopted independent library computer software.

While TinyCat is new to the Pender Harbour Library, its developer, LibraryThing, is not.

The PHL has been using an older version of the LibraryThing cataloguing software for years and recently took advantage of an opportunity to upgrade to the newer TinyCat program.

This was not only for the sake of the library's beleaguered 30-plus volunteer librarians but also for its patrons.

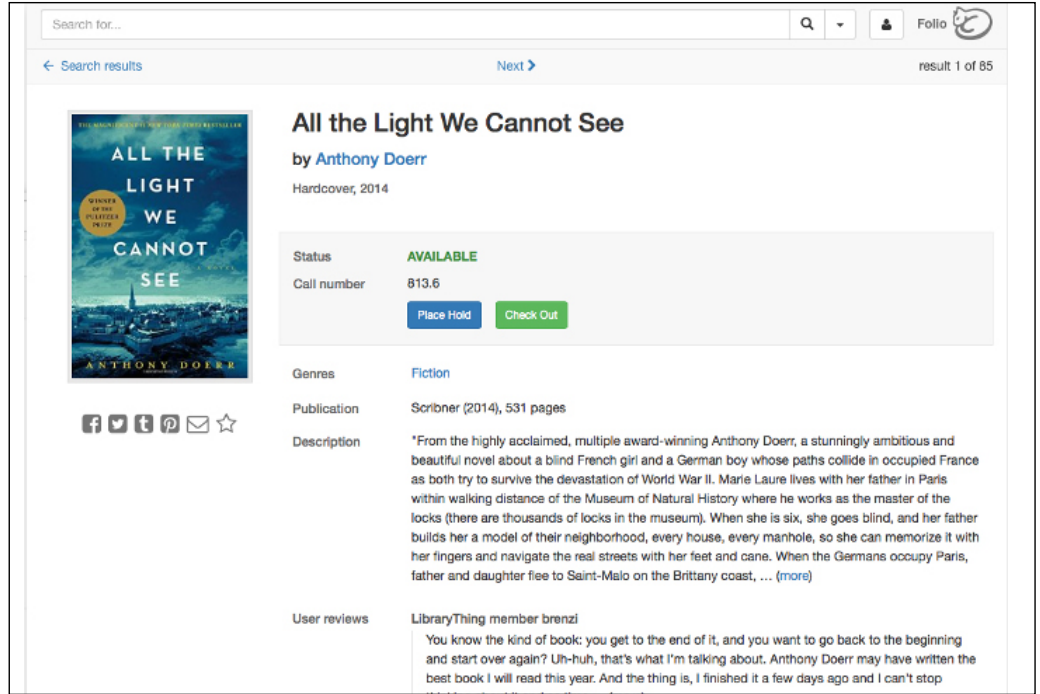
Manually processing dozens of new books a month with a typewriter and pen was a laborious task and inevitably led to discrepancies between the catalogue and what was actually present on the shelves.

TinyCat's new barcode and scanner system brings the PHL's circulation desk into the 21st century, allowing volunteers to focus their time and efforts elsewhere in the library — all with increased accuracy and efficiency.

While some might miss the simplicity of the old date stamp and card pocket, others are thrilled for features of the update which delivers an accurate online catalogue for browsing titles and increased patron privacy.

Features to stay the same include in-person browsing of titles, the weekly Sechelt to Pender Harbour Library transfer service, free-to-use internet and an exciting selection of fiction and non-fiction for the whole family.

The library is celebrating its 60th year of community service in 2026 and a lot has changed in the world of reading

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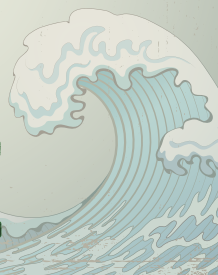

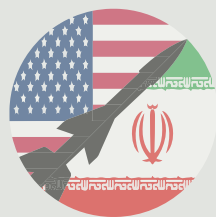

# Princess of Borneo: The Camp Leakey Orangutan Sanctuary

The following story took place during a 13-year world cruising adventure with my husband Bill aboard our 35-foot sailboat *Canik*, named after our two daughters Candice and Nikki.

My encounter with orangutans occurred in the jungles of Borneo at the Camp Leakey Orangutan Sanctuary established in 1971 by Dr. Birute Galdikas.

I dedicate my story to Galdikas, a Canadian anthropologist, primatologist, conservationist, ethologist, author and professor at Simon Fraser University.

She died on March 24.

Galdikas' 55 years of groundbreaking work and dedication established her as an extraordinary scientist, renowned conservationist and the world's foremost authority on orangutans.

## ORANGUTAN ENCOUNTER

On Sep. 16, 2001, Bill and I slipped our lines from Bawean Island, Indonesia, and set out under cover of darkness for an overnight sail to Kumai, Borneo.

The sea was calm, the sky endless, and I felt that familiar thrill of the unknown.

I had no idea that within days, this journey would leave a mark on me, both physically and forever in memory.

We entered the Kumai River at first light, butterflies — brilliant, multi-coloured — floated lazily around us, delicate and dreamlike.

The illusion did not last.

Beneath them lay the reality — the Crocodile River, thick with debris, logs jutting at odd angles, the water

dark and unwelcoming.

Navigating upstream demanded complete focus.

When we finally anchored at Kumai, venturing ashore in our dinghy, the atmosphere shifted again.

The market was chaotic, littered with garbage, the air heavy and sour.

The locals were distant and unfriendly.

It was unsettling and so out of place in a country that had otherwise shown us such beauty and welcome.

There were 13 of us in our little band of cruisers when we met up with Harry, our tour guide to Tanjung Puting National Park.

His warm smile and fluent English were reassuring, a steady presence as we pushed deeper into the wild in his motor vessel en route to the Orangutan Rehabilitation Sanctuary at Camp Leakey.

The river began to transform.

The banks closed in with lush, vibrant green foliage.

Life was everywhere — crocodiles slipping silently beneath the surface and monkeys watching us with bright, curious eyes.

At the first camp, we met the babies, orphaned orangutans, small and vulnerable, yet full of life.

The rangers cared for them, teaching them, patiently, how to survive on their own.

They encouraged the little ones to stay in the trees as orangutans are chiefly arboreal, tree-dwelling specialists.

They descend to the ground to find food and water.

The babies were enchanting, they gathered eagerly at feeding times on platforms, reaching for bananas, yams, cucumbers or tender shoots.

Their tiny hands, their expressive eyes, it was impossible not to feel drawn in.

But the jungle has its own rules.

Gibbons circled nearby, restless and unpredictable.

These smaller, lesser apes, moved with startling speed, tugging at clothing, nipping, grabbing anything left unguarded.

Their playfulness had an edge to it.

I kept my distance, uneasy. It felt like a warning I didn't quite understand.

We moved on.

At the second station, the jungle seemed to close around us as we trekked to the feeding platform.

Here, the orangutans were older, stronger, more self-assured and more unpredictable.

One adolescent male made that abundantly clear.

He erupted without warning, flinging objects, spilling milk, lashing out in what could only be described as anger.

The air shifted instantly, laughter disappeared.

In its place was something sharper, more serious.

These were not gentle creatures performing for our benefit.

They were wild, powerful, entirely their own.

By the time we reached Camp Leakey, I felt it, that subtle tension that marks an awareness that we were no longer observers, we were intruders.

The forest was quiet, until it wasn't.

A deep, resonant rumble rolled through the trees, low and primal.

Then he appeared, the "King."

He moved with unstoppable force, branches cracking under his weight, his presence filling the space before him.

It wasn't just strength, it was dominance, absolute and unquestioned.

We had been warned, stay back. In that moment, there was no doubt why.

And then — Princess.

Harry spoke of her with affection, even pride.

She was special, he told us, extraordinary.

She knew sign language taught by an anthropologist.

She had once graced the cover of *National Geographic*, (June 1980) as a baby.

"Gentle," he said.

"Trustworthy, safe."

Visitors could hold her hand.

Unfortunately, Harry neglected to tell us that Princess bit the anthro-

pologist the week before, information which could have averted this personal disaster.

I remember the hesitation flickering through me, but it was brief.

Everyone else was stepping forward, cameras ready, smiles wide.

And then everything shattered.

"Oh no, Princess, get off!"

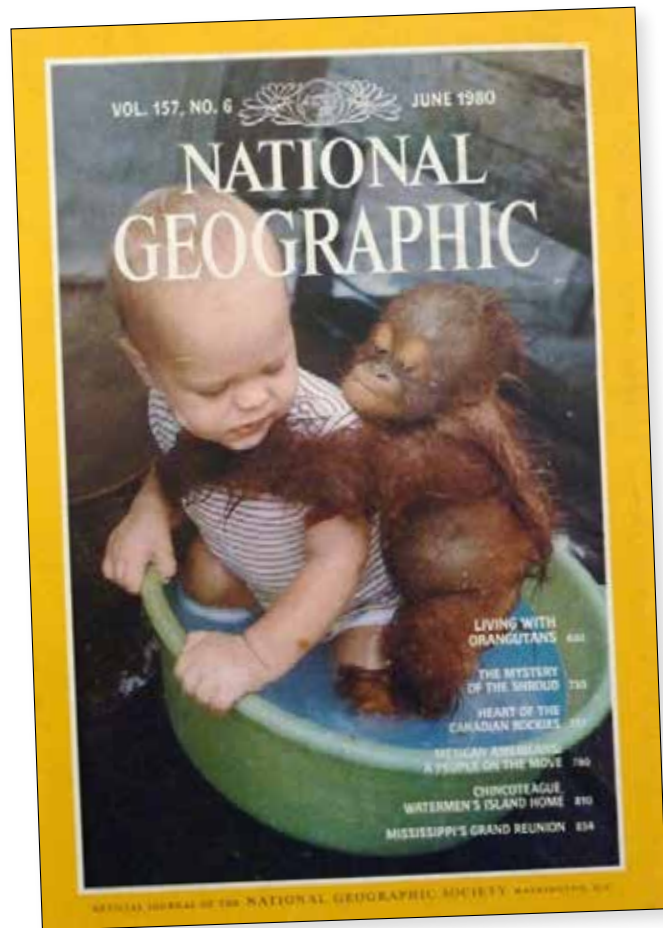
Harry's voice cut through the air, sharp with panic.

In an instant, the world collapsed into chaos.

People ran toward me, voices blurred into noise and in the centre of it all, stillness, mine.

I looked down and saw her.
