Consultation fatigue

Folks in Area A now have three reasons to mistrust the "consultation" processes adopted

by various levels of government

After the closure of the Pender Harbour landfill and the delivery of Pender Harbour's dock management plan — controversial decisions that survived overwhelming local opposition — some feel Area A has been snubbed again.

The Area A official community plan review committee, the Area A advisory planning commission and the P. H. Advisory Council have all come out publicly in opposition to the inclusion of a prominent five page-reference to the Shíshálh Nation's "Strategic Land Use Plan" in our OCP.

When I read it in July, I didn't see a problem with the OCP's SLUP inclusion.

As the largest single landholder in Area A outside of the Crown, the Shíshálh Nation deserve a seat at the table — which they received in the form of SIB resource director Sid Quinn on this and the last (1998) OCP review committee.

SCRD planner Andrew Allen found himself in a tough spot and did an excellent job referencing the document without over committing to it.

But it's hard to ignore the optics of yet another issue in which the objections of three local planning groups are ignored.

After all, the SLUP is a bold document dictating the SIB's vision for their traditional territory with unwavering terms — and it's written without any other stakeholder input.

Within that territory is at least one community that has shown it doesn't always align with their vision. And that community is in the process of completing its OCP.

If nothing else, the SLUP inclusion unnecessarily politicizes the document at a time when people are unsympathetic to its author.

The SIB has caused real damage in the Pender Harbour community through the dock management plan.

It shouldn't surprise anyone that their SLUP is tough to swallow for many Pender Harbour elders who are looking at hundreds of thousands of dollars lost in property value and unnecessary dock rebuilding.

And is the SLUP inclusion actually useful in planning?

The entire document can be found online if staff don't already have a copy on their desk.

So, is it symbolic?
Is it politics?
Or is it a suck-up?
Maybe it's all of those.

If a three-page reference worked for Halfmoon Bay's OCP, what does it mean that Area A's OCP now has five?

It's left some wondering what it might take before governments refuse a demand from the SIB or, perhaps at the same time, acknowledge a duty to provide non-Indigenous residents a fair say in guiding community values.

Yes, sometimes government must ignore the wishes of citizens to accomplish tasks for the greater good.

But now that we're 0 for 3 on the only serious issues to pop up in recent memory, a pattern has developed.

Perhaps the prospect of amplifying our community's voice is another reason to take a look at incorporation.

The topic of applying to the Province for a feasibility study always pops up at election time but seems to get shelved once a director gets surrounded by new friends at the SCRD.

Maybe it will be different this time.

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Area A OCP set to receive final reading after public consult Sept. 5

With only a public hearing left before the Area A official community plan goes before the SCRD board for a third and final reading, the OCP is almost complete — but not without controversy.

SCRD senior planner Andrew Allen kicked off the process to update the OCP at the P. H. Community Hall on Jan. 17, 2015.

At that time he told the *Harbour Spiel* that the process was an "update" to the 1998 document and that he hoped to have a draft completed by December 2015.

That draft didn't appear until Nov. 2016.

"Quite frankly it was just work-load," said Allen.

"An increase in development — not so much an inability to solve the problems."

After receiving its first reading by the board in April 2017, the document was referred to various agencies including provincial ministries, Shíshálh Nation and the Egmont/ Pender Harbour Advisory Planning Commission.

When it reappeared before the board for a second reading in July 2018, it did so with what some say is too prominent a reference to the Shíshálh Nation's "Strategic Land Use Plan."

The SLUP document was created in 2007 by the Shíshálh Nation and intended to set a "vision for the long-term future of our territory."

(See p. 40 for an excerpt of the SLUP.)

That upset some who were closely involved with the process including Peter Robson, chair of the 12-member Area A OCP review committee.

"When we last had a meeting before the first reading, we were told we would have another meeting after all the referring agencies gave their stuff and then we'd look at it once more," said Robson

"We didn't get a chance to do that until the document was actually released with all the changes on it."

Robson told the *Harbour Spiel* that many in his group oppose the inclusion of the SIB's SLUP altogether.

"We had no problem with referencing the document, but that would be a sentence or two, right?"

The Halfmoon Bay OCP was completed in 2014 and includes three pages of reference to the SLUP; Area A's OCP includes five pages.

Robson said he feels the process has been "hijacked" and that some of the opposition to the SLUP's inclusion comes from the recent controversy surrounding the SIB's role in Pender Harbour's dock management plan.

"I think the regional district is in bed with the Sechelt band a little bit too much," said Robson.

"They are afraid to do anything without the approval of the Sechelt band — it's a duty to consult, not to let them dictate."

Robson and some members of the committee are not alone in their opposition to the SLUPs inclusion.

Both the SCRD Area A advisory planning commission and the Pender Harbour Advisory Council penned letters opposing the SLUP reference.

In a letter dated Aug. 16, 2018, Alan Stewart, chair of the PHAC, wrote:

"We submit that this level of integration of policies developed and maintained by a body which is not elected by most of the population is unprecedented.

"We have not been able to find similar commitments in the OCPs of other comparable BC communities."

In a July 12 SCRD staff report, Allen defended the reference:

"Staff observe that Part 4.2: Shishalh Nation Strategic Land Use Plan provides background information as it is intended and indicates the duty to consult.

"Furthermore, it articulates the working relationship between SCRD and Shíshálh Nation.

"The chapter does not include the entire plan nor decision-making policy but points to it as a summary and a reference."

Robson and others fear that including the SLUP might set a legal precedent for future claims in the area.

"And there's some bullshit in there," he said.

"It talks about rainbow trout in Sakinaw Lake — there's never been rainbow trout in Sakinaw.

"So what else might not be accurate in that document?

"It's all according to what the band says."

Allen noted the opposition from the three groups in his staff report but insists the inclusion of the SLUP will help guide planning in the area.

"With our original project plan, we really determined that the Sechelt Nation was going to be a key partner with us," said Allen.

"We continue to stick with the plan that we have and we feel we have a good OCP that recognizes both local and regional initiatives that impact community development."

A public hearing will be held at the P. H. Community Hall on Sept. 5 at 6:30 p.m. before the OCP goes before the board for final adoption.

Allen expects a third and final reading could take place as early as October.

We have a race: Price and Hegyi toss their hats in the ring

With less than two months before Sunshine Coast Regional District voters choose a new board of directors on Oct. 20, Area A suddenly has two candidates vying for the position.

MIKE PRICE

Mike Price was the first candidate to announce his intention of running for a Area A's top post when he did it at a Rotary of Pender Harbour meeting on Aug. 10.

When asked why, he said it was peer pressure.

"I was kind of curious and then when Frank (Area A director Mauro) said publicly that he wasn't going to run again, I kind of said to a bunch of other people at Rotary, 'Who's going to run?'

"And they said, 'I don't know
— we can't think of anyone else to
run except . . . ,' and then they just
looked at me and said, 'You know
the municipal system inside out and
backwards.""

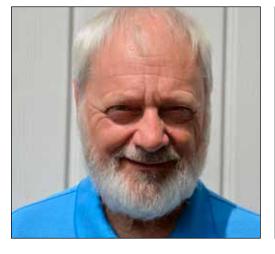
Price is a civil engineer whose last job was running the City of Toronto's water utility, Canada's largest and the fifth largest water utility in North America.

Prior to that, he worked as commissioner and city manager for the City of Scarborough, which has a population of a 500,000 people.

Price has lived in Area A for four years but says he is being forced to move to Sechelt at the end of the month because of a lack of housing availability here (living outside of a rural area doesn't disqualify a candidate from being eligible to run).

Price said that has given him personal experience with the local housing crisis.

As a member of Rotary and director on the P. H. Advisory Coun-

cil, Price said he has become well acquainted with local issues.

"Of course, I see all these issues coming forward and the big concern everyone has is the process that was or was not followed with respect to public consultation on the OCP," he said.

"There's also issues related to seniors and lack of transportation.

"If we want folks to stay in their homes as long as they can, then we have to do what we can to help them."

SANDY HEGYI

Sandy Hegyi lives in Garden Bay and joined the race on Aug. 21.

"I think that I have a lot to offer the area," he told the *Harbour Spiel*.

"I've been here for six years and know the issues and have made many friends and acquaintances here.

"And I'd like to give something back to the community that has become my home."

Hegyi said he worked for 35 years in the film industry as chief lighting technician for everything from feature films to commercials.

Originally from Ontario, Hegyi came out west to Vancouver in 1987 and said he rode the wave of the resur-

gence in the film industry.

While doing so, he became involved in organizing two film industry union affiliates in the west, the NA-BET 700 and ACFC.

For the last five years he's worked as wharfinger at the Harbour Authority of Pender Harbour and he's seen first-hand the effects of a lack of rental housing.

"There's not a whole lot of services for these people," he said.

As evidence, Hegyi points to the public showers where he works at the Harbour Authority of Pender Harbour office in Madeira Park.

"We pull \$75 to \$100 per week out of the showers in the winter when there are hardly any boaters around.

"These are people that have jobs but no showers."

Hegyi said that Whistler had a similar problem and they successfully dealt with it by changing their zoning and bringing in temporary housing.

"I can't see why we can't do that."

He also hopes to push efforts to improve infrastructure.

"Hiking and biking trails are fine but there are horrible issues with some local roads."

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COLLISION

On July 28, police attended a single-vehicle incident in the 4600-block of Beaumont Road, Garden Bay, after a "learner" driver decided to go for a drive on his own and lost control on a gravel road, ending up in the ditch.

The driver was unhurt but the vehicle sustained significant damage and had to be towed from the scene.

The driver, who was not impaired, was issued tickets for driving contrary to restriction and driving without consideration.

The matter has been referred to ICBC.

IMPAIRED DRIVING

On July 27, police initiated a traffic stop with a vehicle associated with an unlicensed driver on Lagoon Road near Sangster Road, Madeira Park.

Upon speaking with the driver, police noticed the driver showing signs of alcohol impairment.

The driver failed a roadside alcohol screening test and was issued a 90-day roadside prohibition.

His vehicle was also impounded for 30 days and he was issued a ticket for not having a driver's licence.

The matter has been referred to RoadSafetyBC.

IMPAIRED DRIVING

On Aug. 3, a witness reported a driver drinking alcohol on a vehicle on the Powell River ferry heading to Sechelt, and provided vehicle details and description.

Police stopped the suspect on Highway 101 near Madeira Park and spoke with the driver who said that he'd consumed alcohol on the ferry.

The driver was given a roadside alcohol screening test and after two "warn" results, was issued a three-day roadside prohibition.

The matter has been referred to ICBC.

IMPAIRED DRIVING

On Aug. 4, two witnesses reported an impaired driver leaving Ruby Lake headed towards Gibsons, after the vehicle was seen swerving in the road with occupants tossing bottles out the windows.

Police located the suspect vehicle on Redrooffs Road, Halfmoon Bay.

Police noted the driver exhibiting signs of intoxication and was given a roadside alcohol screening test.

After two "fail" results, the "N" driver was issued a 90-day roadside prohibition and the vehicle was impounded for 30 days.

The driver also received a ticket for driving contrary to restriction.

The matter has been referred to RoadSafetyBC.

COLLISION

On Aug. 8, police attended a single-vehicle incident on Highway 101 at Middlepoint Road, Halfmoon Bay, after a northbound vehicle drove into the right-hand ditch, collided into a driveway and rolled onto its side.

Emergency Health Services arrived and took the lone occupant to Sechelt Hospital.

Police spoke with the unimpaired driver who said she was making a left hand turn and looked over while trying to stop her dog from sliding off the passenger seat.

A witness who stopped to assist said the vehicle went straight into the ditch and no other vehicles were involved.

The driver was warned about driving distractions and it was suggested that she secure her dog in the back with a pet seat belt.

The vehicle was towed and the matter has been referred to ICBC.

OWWWEEE

On Aug. 19, police attended a single motorcycle incident in the 14300 block of Highway 101, Pender Harbour, after witnesses reported a southbound motorcyclist had crashed on a curve and slid down an embankment

Fortunately, the unimpaired rider was able to climb back up to the road where emergency health services waited to take him to hospital for non-life threatening injuries.

Police determined that rider inexperience and unfamiliarity with the roads were factors.

The motorcycle was towed and the matter has been referred to ICBC.

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Pender's harbour authority bearing the cost of illegal dumping

Illegal dumping isn't just a problem in the bush anymore.

This summer has seen the Harbour Authority of Pender Harbour overwhelmed by people using the wharfhead at the Madeira Park dock as an illegal dumping ground.

HAPH wharfinger Sandy Hegyi told the *Harbour Spiel* that much of the discarded material is left after hours and it's an expensive burden.

The HAPH leases and operates Fisheries and Oceans Canada-owned docks in Madeira Park, Hospital Bay, Gerrans Bay and Secret Cove.

FOC is responsible for capital upgrades but the HAPH pays for operational costs through fees collected through moorage or the boat launch.

The HAPH maintains a dumpster and recycling bins for moorage customers but Hegyi said that he often arrives at work in the morning to find anything from construction materials to used appliances.

Hegyi said it is often community members avoiding dumping fees but customers of vacation rentals are also a growing problem.

"I talked to one person and she said that it's in their information sheet at their place that they should take their garbage to the marina," said Hegyi.

"The people from Nelson Island are also a big contributor."

And it's not just garbage.

The HAPH doesn't officially collect used motor oil but that doesn't stop it from appearing at the end of the wharf.

"Bilge water I can't get rid of," said Hegyi.

"Pender Harbour Diesel will only take uncontaminated oil and most of the oil left here is contaminated so we have to pay a minimum \$200 every

time the truck comes."

On Aug. 4, during Pender Harbour Days, five gallons of used motor oil sat on the dock over the water without a lid.

On Aug. 20, a box of three fourlitre plastic milk containers filled with oil was left over the weekend.

"I've had it left in coffee tins before," said Hegyi.

Because the HAPH doesn't have a storage area, discarded contaminants remain on the dock, over the water, until it gets collected by a truck that comes from Vancouver Island.

But the main issue is garbage and it's only a problem in Madeira Park.

"The dock at Secret Cove has a similar population of cottagers from Thormanby Island that are served by the two water taxis there and they pack all their garbage in and out."

The end result is that it is costing the HAPH a lot of money — \$1,206 in July — to dispose of it.

"Every dollar we spend on garbage, we're taking it away from something else."

After 37 years, Richard Paton pulls out of Mountainview Service

After 37 years of working in and owning Kleindale's Mountain View Service Petro Canada gas station, Richard Paton and his wife Gail have sold the business.

Paton is quick to respond when asked why he chose to get out, "Age," he laughs.

"And no holidays.

"I've said this to many people that my biggest regret is, because summer time is the busiest, I never had holidays with the three girls (Paton's daughters) because I had to work."

New owners of the business, Ian and Stella Choi, took over on Aug. 18.

"Ian is from the Lower Mainland and he has a service station in Saskatchewan," said Paton.

He said the Chois have rented a house in Madeira Park.

Paton has pledged to remain nearby to help ease the transition on this day, a day after he officially handed over the keys, he looks like he is putting in a normal day.

The sale includes a five-plus-acre property that stretches from the storage area and service station over to and including the automotive shop on the property's northwest border.

Paton said he started working there in 1981.

In 1986, he and Ken O'Coffey partnered up with Joe McKay.

In 2002, the Patons teamed up with the O'Coffeys again to purchase the business from McKay.

"Our relationships and our partnerships were just wonderful," said Paton

"I couldn't have asked for two better guys."

In 2001, the O'Coffeys sold their interest to the Patons who have been the sole owner since.

Throughout that time, Paton has

worked full-time behind the cash register or filling propane.

Paton said the biggest change over the four decades was the technology required to operate the business.

The storage yard was added in the 1980s and then, in the 1990s, they added a convenience store.

"Kleindale is growing and Garden Bay is growing," said Paton.

"If people need something coming off the highway, we wanted them to be able to grab it here."

Later in 2004, the convenience store was expanded after he converted both service bays to meet the retail demand.

As the Kleindale gas station grew into a community hub, Paton became its face.

"What I'm really going to miss is the people," Paton said.

Mornings at the PetroCan have

long been known for intense conversation and the exchange of information of varying authenticity.

Regular customers might linger over their coffee as they wait for their last Keno disappointment.

Others quickly grab something for lunch on their way to work.

All received a cheery greeting.

Paton says it will be a big change to his daily routine not taking part in the morning banter but, after 37 years, he's looking forward to the change.

"We're going to do some travelling," he said.

"We've only ever had a handful of holidays of two weeks or better in 37 years."

When asked if, after taking a little time off, he see himself landing in another business in the future, Paton was once again quick to reply.

"Gail would kill me."

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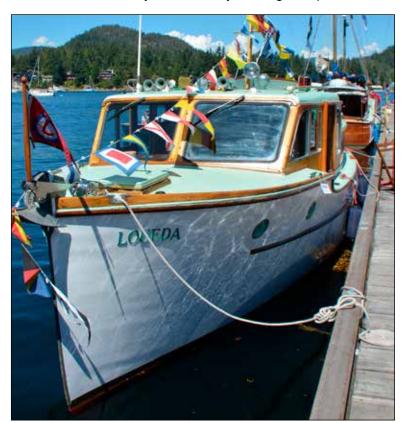

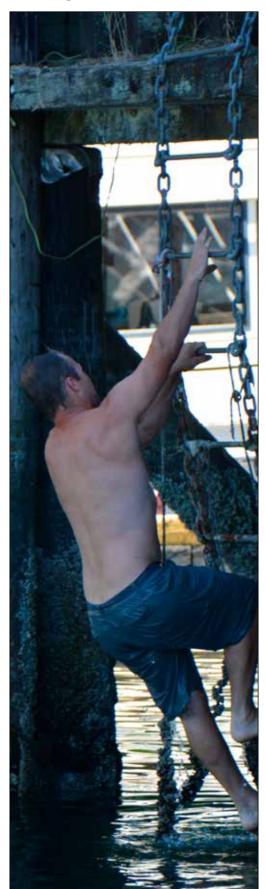

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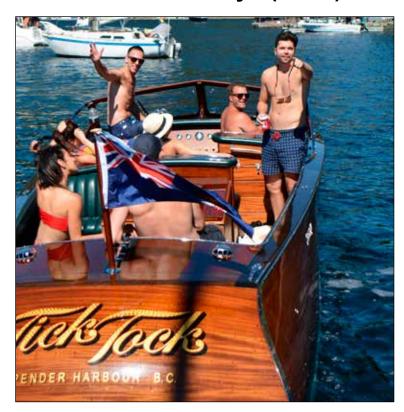

He loved to make the part he needed, rather than making it easy on himself and simply buying it.

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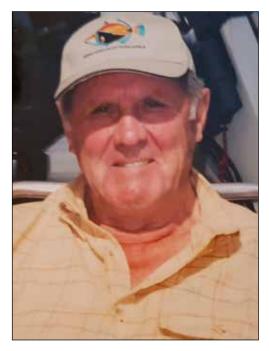

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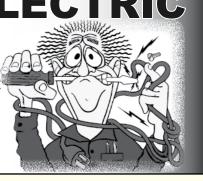
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Sneaking a peek: P. H. Music Society's 2018-19 concert series

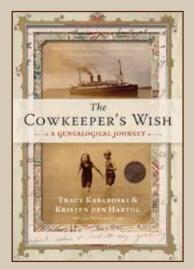

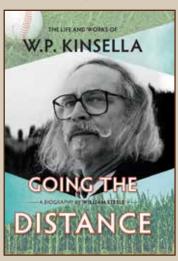

Gardening on the oceanfront: Salt-tolerant plants

This column first appeared in the September 2008 issue of the Harbour Spiel.

Well, the kids are back in school and its a perfect time of the year to enjoy your garden.

FALL TIPS

With iris, oriental lilies and the like, cut off the bloom head but leave the foliage to die down on its own.

The plant needs to make and store sugars for next season's blooms.

When watering, give the plants a real soaking, and then let them dry out somewhat between watering.

This is to develop deep roots so the plant can take those scorching hot sunny days that we get once in a while.

Fertilizing now will perk up your plants for the rest of the season.

Use a fertilizer with a high phosphate count — that's the middle number on the label.

Then switch to a general fertilizer to strengthen the plant for fall.

SALT-TOLERANT PLANTS

Mango pines are an easy place to start.

They take easily to pruning to give you that windblown look.

Just don't let them get to 15 feet or you'll be using a chainsaw to get your view back.

That's also true with umbellularia, California laurel, which, though slow growing, can be 20 to 25 feet high.

It grows best in deep soil and, once established, will tolerate dry conditions.

It will grow in deep shade and get big enough to become a shade tree itself but can be thinned.

Eucalyptus and palms can take it but to me seem a little out of place here.

ELAEAGNUS

Don't go without this shrub, seaside or up the hill, because it's an easy to care for broadleaf evergreen.

Eangustifolia, Russian olive, is a vigorous shrub to 20 feet high and makes an excellent screening plant.

Golden elaeagnus have large gold blotches in the centre of the leaves and make a nice highlight shrub.

All the elaeagnus family can take seashore conditions, heat and wind.

Escollaonia is just a great shrub to work with and really makes the foundation of any oceanside bed.

It's wind tolerant with shiny green, clean looking foliage.

The inflorescence may be insignificant but being drought-tolerant and easy to prune makes up for all that.

Prune taller ones by cutting out about one-third of the older wood each year after blooming to maintain control.

PERENNIALS

Yuccas — now everybody knows about them and grasses are so in.

Any miscanthus will do, from 10-foot giants to little shorties.

In the fall, when the wind has battered the bloom so it looks untidy and the stems are broken, cut them off and later, when the grass has naturally dried off, cut them off to about two inches above ground level.

Carex is not really a grass, but is treated as one.

Ice sedge is an evergreen carex that's really easy to plant.

PHORMIUM OR FLAX

Flax make a great focal point.

They take almost any soil, little to regular watering, hot or cold conditions and do well by the seashore.

Their blossom stems are twice the height of the foliage and very unusual.

A large established plant can be divided but it's brutal.

Lift the entire clump and, where you see a natural cleft, take a sharp axe and chop through the root mass.

Regular physical activity improves your physical fitness and gives you a better quality of life.

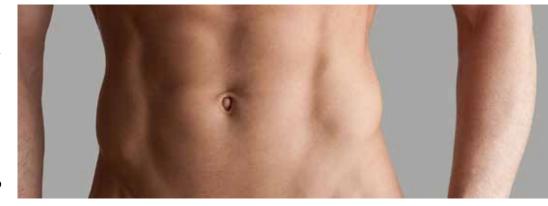

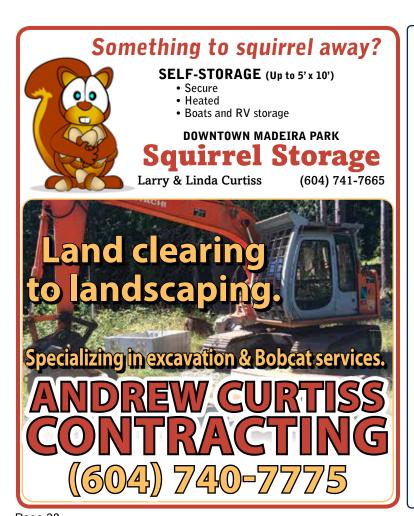

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P. H. Wildlife Society whisks us away to Madagascar Sept. 18

Madagascar, often referred to as the "eighth continent," offers a rare look at evolution in action.

All are welcome on Tuesday, Sept. 18 for a presentation by Rand Rudland on Madagascar's unique wildlife — lemurs, chameleons, geckos, frogs, birds, and even insects like the Kung-Fu cricket.

Wonder at the many variations of plant life on this remote island situated off Africa's east coast where 70 to 80 per cent of the 12,000 plant species are found nowhere else.

Around 100 species of lemurs have evolved on the island.

The other 30 endemic mammals include tenrec, mongoose, rodent, carnivore and bat species.

Birds, not to be outdone, offer 120 species: grebe, coua, flufftail, owl, eagle, asity, warbler, sunbird and weaver.

There are 290 endemic species of frog, 90 varieties of chameleons and 95 species of geckos — and the list goes on for each major lineage.

Rudland will take you to famous national parks like Ranomafana, Mantadia, Isolo, Ampijoroa and Zombitse while exploring the southern dry spiny forest areas around Berenty Reserve and the island of Nosy Ve.

Madagascar offers a unique setting for exploring the web of life dictated by climate, geology and over 80 million years of geographic isolation.

The Shishalh Nation's 'Strategic Land Use Plan'

Completed by the Sechelt Indian Band in 2007, the 110 page *Strategic Land Use Plan* intends to be "a living document for the land use planning within the Shíshálh Nation teritory."

1. INTRODUCTION

This document, *lil xemit tems* swiya nelh mes stutula (which roughly translated means "we are looking after our land, where we come from"), is a draft land use plan for the Shíshálh Nation that sets out our vision for the long-term future of our territory.

This plan was developed with extensive input from our members, and has been formally approved by the Shíshálh Nation.

1.1. SCOPE AND PURPOSE OF THE DOCUMENT

This land use plan represents our best efforts to date to summarize the values found across our territory, and to describe how we would like to see terrestrial and inter-tidal (beach) resources as well as the land protected, managed and utilized now and into the future.

We expect to review and refine this plan over time, as our knowledge and understanding of our land and the interrelationship among all living things improves.

Over many years, we have seen our land and much of the resources within our territory developed without our consent.

Areas that have great cultural and historical importance for our people have been impacted and access to some areas that we have used for generations has been denied.

Particularly in recent years, development pressures within our territory have increased, from activities such as:

- Land dispositions that result in permanent alienation of parts of our territory;
- Forestry activities that continue throughout our territory in many areas of cultural and economic importance to our people;
- Fish farms that have been located in the territory without any regional planning and that raise particular concerns for the health and the well-being of wild fish stocks and which impact marine conditions around the farm sites:
- Commercial backcountry tenures, that allocate to third parties rights and interests for the use of key

areas within our territory;

- Residential development that in recent years has dramatically increased in pace with local population growth at nearly five per cent (approximately three times the average rate for BC as a whole) as the Sunshine Coast becomes a more desirable recreational area and a bedroom community for the Lower Mainland;
- Foreshore development, including the building of docks without approvals and log dumps that impact foreshore areas;
- Multiple applications for independent power projects along key rivers and creeks and in high value watersheds, and
- Proposals for industrial development, including large-scale aggregate mining, in areas that are of special significance to the Shíshálh Nation.

As development pressures have increased, we are inundated with requests from various levels of government to assess proposals for projects through the referral process.

This approach puts the Shíshálh Nation in a reactive position, and also places a significant burden on





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our technical staff as we attempt to respond meaningfully to every project on an individual basis.

The referral process also fails to address fundamental questions regarding our rights and title and leaves our Nation without a meaningful role in planning or management decision-making.

Through such experiences, we have come to understand the risks of coping with development pressures one project at a time.

We have developed this land use plan in order to provide a more comprehensive and integrated view of our territory, so that we can be proactive in determining what happens in the future.

Therefore, the objective of this land use plan is to:

- Provide summary information about the land and resources within the territory of the Shíshálh Nation, and a brief profile of our people and community;
- Articulate our vision for the future of our land and our people's place within our territory;
- Identify our goals for the management of our land and resources, and to establish priority actions to achieve these goals;
- Clarify priorities for the use, protection and management of areas within our territory;
- Highlight opportunities for economic development, and
- Explain how we envision the plan's implementation, including opportunities for capacity building and for the Shíshálh Nation to assume greater responsibilities for management decisions affecting land and resources.

This document does not attempt to demonstrate the extent of our his-

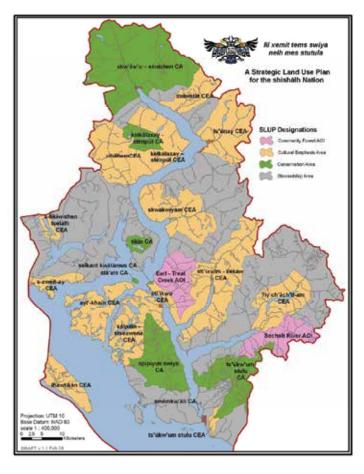
toric or current use and occupation of our territory for the purpose of establishing aboriginal rights and title.

Our presence on the land has been substantiated through other studies, including Aboriginal Interest and Use Studies that build on and strengthen our earlier Traditional Use Study (1996 and 1998).

Our efforts in this regard are ongoing.

This plan also does not attempt to provide management direction for the full scope of marine resources within our Nation's territory.

While selected marine and foreshore issues are addressed briefly in this document, more comprehensive planning for the marine environment will be undertaken in the future by the Shíshálh Nation through separate processes.

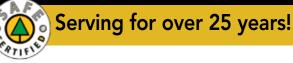
