BC Liberals: More information please

There will be plenty of political discussion as we approach May's provincial election but there's at least one critical issue on which we

should hold both parties accountable.

It's the growing trend to restrict public access to information on how our government operates.

A report released last month by information and privacy commissioner Elizabeth Denham said that, while the Liberals are complying with Freedom of Information laws to assist the public, they have also shown "evidence of the practice of 'oral government."

The review found that 45 per cent of all requests to Premier Christy Clark's office last year failed to find a paper trail of any kind.

Across government, Denham found that no records turned up for 25 per cent of all requests last year, doubling from 13 per cent four years ago.

During a time of slippery "communications" specialists and politicians giving hockey player interviews, FOI is the last hope for a journalist or concerned citizen to access even the simplest details about government activity.

With the provincial Libs plagued by any number of shady deals and allegations of underhanded politicking, they have the gall to send Chilliwack MP John Les up to the mike to tell us that a "paper trail" isn't practical.

It seems the practice of hiding behind personal emails was fairly entrenched before the Liberals' "ethnic plan" exploded into view, giving us a glimpse into how they conduct business.

When Clark's caucus grew uncomfortable with auditor general John Doyle meddling in that business — he described a "culture of entitlement" in the BC legislature — they tried to get rid of him.

We have a right to learn what motivates a decision by government — or lack thereof.

You may wonder why the *Spiel* doesn't report more about the progress of local issues like the Pender Harbour foreshore lease moratorium.

For close to 10 years now, any question posed to the ministry in charge gets a polite:

"... the province is continuing to work with the Shishálh nation to resolve the various issues to the benefit of all parties."

And good luck speaking directly with a government employee these days. Questions are often first directed (via email) to a ministry communications officer and after they consult, you are left with a watered-down response that usually leaves more questions than what you started with.

The BC Libs didn't invent the formula for neutering access to information — they copied Stephen Harper's habits of restricting press conferences and muzzling government scientists.

But whether we're talking about a government that goes out of its way to hide its tracks or one that restricts the publication of research identifying the environmental costs of Canada's petroleum industry, it should be considered an abuse of power.

If Clark and the government she inherited from Gordon Campbell aren't corrupt, then their evasive communications policies surely makes it seem so.

But we don't know for certain either way and for that reason, they have to go. And if they do, it should be taken as a warning to the NDP to take solid steps in restoring the public's confidence in how government handles our business.

Because we aren't voting them in, we're voting the others out.

It ain't real if it's not in the Spiel.


P. H LIONS PANCAKE BREAKFAST & EASTER EGG HUNT: March 31

Vandals shoot up BC Hydro power poles

Sunshine Coast RCMP are investigating an act of vandalism on a forest service road in Pender Harbour on Feb. 24.

RCMP received a report of mischief from BC Hydro crews after crews discovered several hydro poles on fire on a forest service road near Menacher Road while responding to a power disruption in the area.

The power disruption is said to have occurred between 6 and 7 p.m.

Soon after, hydro crews discovered hydro poles on fire forcing them to wait for the fires to burn down due to the possibility of electrocution.

Crews say the electrical current caused the ground around the affected area to turn to glass.

Police discovered several spent

shotgun and .22-calibre shells in the area and concluded that vandals had shot up the hydro poles which ultimately caused the fire.

A vehicle was located in the area, along with several discarded beer bottles.

The vehicle was towed and the registered owner contacted.

The cost of repairing the damage is estimated to exceed \$35,000.

The Sunshine Coast RCMP have identified a suspect and the file is currently under investigation.

Kleindale becomes hub for local e-commerce

Watch out eBay.

Pender Harbour's newest business is an online auction site catering exclusively to the Sunshine Coast.

Myrtle Winchester and business partner Jane Reid went live with their website *auctionbay.ca* on March 13.

Winchester says she's only made pocket change from it so far but she hopes as traffic grows she might start to see a return on her investment.

The auction site is unique in that the software is designed so that only residents on the Sunshine Coast can register to list items or bid on them.

"The whole idea is to save shipping costs," says Winchester.

"We tried to figure out what you would actually pay by using eBay and they just nickel-and-dime you to death on shipping charges."

Winchester says her site takes a commission via PayPal on successful listings and bids.

April 2013

The site charges five per cent from both the buyer and seller on successful bids under \$100 going down to one per cent for items sold over \$10.001.

After a deal is struck, the site connects the buyer and seller who will then communicate on their own to conclude the transaction.

When asked how she came up

with the idea, Winchester said it was the economy.

"So many people are struggling financially.

"They can't afford to go out and buy the brand new stuff now and it's also a way for people to sell things they don't use anymore for a little bit of pocket money."

What are the symptoms and treatment for a tooth abscess?

If you have continuous pain described as "extreme, gnawing, sharp, shooting or throbbing," you more than likely have an abscess. Warmth or pressure on the tooth may induce extreme pain and there may also be swelling at the base of the tooth, the gum or the cheek.

Treatment often includes antibiotics and drainage. If the tooth can be restored, root canal therapy can be performed — if the tooth can't be restored, it must be extracted.

If left untreated, a tooth abscess may become large enough to perforate the bone and extend into the soft tissue surrounding the tooth. From there, it will follow the path of least resistance,

spreading internally or externally. Severe complications requiring hospitalization may occur when the growing infection closes the airway leading to suffocation in extreme cases. Infection can also spread down the tissues posing significant consequences to vital organs like your heart.

The hallmarks of infection are: pain, fever and or swelling. If you experience one of these three complaints you visit the dentist.

The best prevention for infection? Practice good oral health including regular hygiene appointments and examinations.



Two films argue that there's still room for hope

Locals looking to take in a movie can save themselves a trip to Sechelt this month.

And they can do it twice.

Two film screenings are scheduled to take place in the Pender Harbour area this month.

Both are documentaries and both offer messages of hope for those who may be questioning humankind's capacity for good.

URBAN ROOTS

Urban Roots is the story of how Detroit's residents took control over the city's unused land and reclaimed it to produce food.

In doing so, they become more self-reliant, healthier and some become entrepreneurs.

"Now, where nature has reclaimed vast stretches of the abandoned rust belt, Detroiters are reclaiming their spirits," says director Mark MacInnis, who grew up in Detroit.

"Wherever there is grass, there is a chance."

A special screening of *Ur-ban Roots* will take place at the Iris Griffith Centre on Saturday, April 6 at 2 p.m.

There are plans for a plant and produce sale afterward attended by local food sustainability activists and growers.

The film is part of the Sunshine Coast's Green Film series, a partner-



ship between the Sunshine Coast Film Society, *Sustainable Coast Magazine* and the Gibsons Green Team.

The Green Film series is dedicated to using film as a tool for community engagement on environmental and sustainability issues.

The screening events are meant to foster the role of film as a catalyst for dialogue, networking and action.

Admission for this special screening is by donation and no membership is required.

OCCUPY LOVE

The Pender Harbour Community School will be hosting a special screening of *Occupy Love* as part of a global community film launch.

The film screening will be held at the P. H. School of Music on Thurs-

day, April 11 at 7 p.m.

Occupy Love is a moving documentary that asks the question: Is it possible the current global economic and ecological crisis could become the world's greatest love story?

Director Velcrow Ripper is a former resident of Gibsons (and Elphinstone student) and he takes us on a journey deep inside a global revolution that is erupting around the planet.

From the Arab Spring to the European Summer, from the Occupy movement to the global climate justice and indigenous movements, the film asserts that a profound shift is taking place — humanity is waking up to the fact that the dominant system of power is failing to provide us with health, happiness or meaning.

The old paradigm that concen-

On April 27, boat-building teams will anxiously wait to see what materials they have to work with and what the "twist" in their design requirements will be.

Then, working with only hand tools and battery-powered screw guns, they will construct the boat they hope will carry them around the Harbour race course and into the victory circle.

Teams (up to four builders per team) have only an hour to set up and decide how to deal with the "twist" and then three hours of building time.

Why do they do it?

Cash prizes, of course.

But there is also the Spiffy Skiffy award, in which spectators get to vote for the best-looking boat.

Also, race marshals award the Broken Paddle trophy to the team that perseveres in the face of adversity.

But the real reason?

It's bragging rights.

Presented by the Pender Harbour Living Heritage Society with the sup-

Of course, there will be food and lots of activities for the little kids.


After all, what would April Tools be without free mini-boatbuilding?



Some 2013 SCRD budget details for Area A

The budgetsetting process for this year is complete.

The summary change for 2013 is

that taxation for Area A will increase by 3.58 per cent.

This is close to the average increase for the regional district of 3.14 per cent.

The good news is that the increase is about what I expected with the new initiatives that will be undertaken this year.

Priority for the budget has been to fund programs that encourage recreation and business activity.

A summary of the functions with

the largest budget changes are listed below.

WATER

North and south Pender water will see an increase in parcel tax/user fees of 10 per cent.

This was an expected increase and part of the Area A Water Master Plan of 2011.

It will pay for some water main upgrades, the south Pender water treatment plant, McNeill Lake dam stability analysis and upgrade and north and south Pender meter installations.

Egmont users on regional water will see an increase of four per cent due to water main and metering upgrades in the regional system.

RURAL PLANNING

Work will include finalizing the Area B and D official community plans and the start of a new OCP for Area A.


This will require significant community engagement toward the end of 2013 and throughout 2014.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

This function has seen a large budget increase in our area for 2013.

The Pender Harbour and Egmont Chamber of Commerce has put forward some initiatives such as a "shop local" program aimed at enhancing the business climate.

Also, some budget funding has been earmarked for potential Coastwide economic development initiatives.



As well, funding has been allocated for the Sunshine Coast Tourism Society, a group that has been very successful in promoting and providing marketing exposure for the entire Sunshine Coast including Powell River.

REGIONAL SOLID WASTE

This function has seen an increase in costs due to regulatory requirements for lab analysis, environmental monitoring, geotechnical assessments, contributing to landfill closure reserves, handling contaminated waste such as asbestos and treated wood and a significant increase in the cost of handling "green" waste which is accepted free of charge at the solid waste facilities.

A modest tipping fee increase was expected this year.

However, in order to cover the increased cost of handling green waste, funding will need to come from both a larger tipping fee increase and from operations savings.

The tipping fee will increase by \$25 per tonne and the hours of operation for the landfills will be reduced.

Starting in September, the Pender Landfill will close all day on Tuesdays instead of the current half day and the Sechelt landfill will close all day Monday instead of the current full day operation.

These changes are expected to be permanent.

TRANSIT (FEASIBILITY)

Area A currently has no transit function but some funds have been budgeted in our feasibility function to do some analysis towards a potential pilot project for transit in the area.

RECREATION FACILITIES

Funds have been allocated for the

Pender Harbour Aquatic and Fitness Centre to extend operation into July and also to replace some of the exercise equipment.

PARKS AND RECREATION

A replacement park service vehicle such as a John Deere Gator will be purchased and some electrical supply upgrades will be performed at Katherine Lake Park.

The Area A bikeways/walkways function will get underway with some planning and work on the Lily Lake area to connect with the Madeira Park business core.

This was identified as a high priority project and will be the first to be worked on.

Also the community will be engaged to determine the next projects going forward.

For those who love the musical riches of the piano and string trio repertoire, performances by Trio Hochelaga are a rare treat.

Residents of Montreal, the trio takes their name from the 16th century French settlement situated on the island of Montreal near Mount Royal.

The name Hochelaga means "beaver dam" or "beaver lake" in the Iroquois language.

The Trio Hochelaga means violinist Anne Robert, cellist Carole Sirois and pianist Marie Fabi, three women who are recognized internationally for their deft ensemble work and their exceptional musicality.

Building on a friendship that goes back to their student days and following successful careers as individual performers, their collaboration in Trio Hochelaga allows them to create music that is all the more powerful and profoundly human.

Of particular interest are littleknown and neglected musical treasures that they delight in presenting to a contemporary audience.

Rhododendron: The king of shrubs

by Jim Rutherford (This article originally appeared in the April 2009 issue of the Harbour Spiel.)

They're so regal but also so easy to grow and because of that they are a common sight on the Sunshine Coast.

The propagation of rhododendrons on the Coast is made easy by our usually temperate climate and acidic soil.

This time of year is a great time to go hunting for a rhodo that's just right for you in colour and height as you can plant in your borders, even when in bloom.

Let's not quibble here on nomenclature — whether hybrids or species, concentrate on "available."

Gree's *Guidebook to Available Rhododendrons* is an industry standard reference book and your nursery may have a copy.

The plant label may also give you valuable information you need such as blooming period, height and fragrance.

The Pink Pearl variety can get to 18 feet.

PLANTING

Our best results for rhodos are in the transition between meadow (lawns) and woodlands.

That is, the foliage is in sun but the roots are in dappled shade.

Too deep a shade can prevent the

rhodo from blooming.

Rhodos are tough and very resilient in transplanting/planting and pruning but evenly moist soil is the rule.

The roots are surprisingly shallow but dense and even large rhodos will take transplanting if you take care not to dry out the root ball.

Submerge the roots in a bucket of water while digging a new hole

to size. As a general guideline for all planting efforts, the hole should be twice as deep and wide as the root ball.

We're looking for an acidic soil with a pH of 4.5 to 6 that is rich and well-drained.

Peat moss and bark mulch are good additives to lighten the texture of heavy soils and provide aeration.

Tamp the soil in well but leave the fibrous root mass just below soil level.

Don't bank the soil on the stem, but cup it around the plant so water runs in.

CUTTING

March and April is a great time — if you have the heart to cut rhodos to bring inside.

The flower head should have a little blush of colour.

Smash the woody cut end with a hammer for water absorption, add floral preservative and arrange in a tall vase.

Let the wild zen character of your cut branches show off with their twisted stems going every which way for the natural look.

PRUNING

Don't be afraid to hack away at branches because rhodos will take a severe and brutal pruning.

You may lose a season of bloom, but the plant will bounce back.

Pinching back encourages new growth, making the shrub fuller and thicker.

This is important for the first two or three years of growth so you can shape the plant to suit your space.

For leggy and bare-stemmed rhodos, there isn't much you can do but prune off the growing tips.

That restarts growth from the bottom.

Make you cut just above a leaf rosette and the new growth will appear from the dormant eye.

For major surgery and recovery time, look further down the branch to find small bumps (growth buds) under the bark.

Just above the bumps should be rings which mark ends of growth periods where once there were leaves.

Prune some every year, up to a third, then you'll still have blooms and new growth happening all the time.

DEADHEADING

Deadheading is not essential, but is helpful.

A question at one of Ron Knight's rhodo classes:

"Do I have to deadhead?"

"Mother Nature doesn't," Knight answered.

That said, removing the old blossom head does focus the strength of the shrub in producing buds.

FERTILIZING

All this pruning and shaping is best done after the rhodos bloom and offers a good chance to add a nitrogen/phosphorus-rich fertilizer (16 - 20 - 0) to encourage new growth.

Rhododendrons are not heavy feeders so if the plant is flowering well and producing new growth (six to eight inches per year) then they don't really need much help.

Perhaps a light application of a balanced (complete) fertilizer won't hurt.

A rhodo fertilizer with not too high a nitrogen count (4 -12 - 10) will keep the foliage that glossy green that you want but still encourage the plant to set buds.

Aluminum sulphate will reduce soil pH levels which is ideal for acid-loving plants like rhodos or other broad leaf evergreens like camelias and pieris but keep it away from lilacs and clematis.

Natural mulching is still the best but not all mulch materials are created equal.

For rhodos and other broadleaf evergreens, look for an acid mulch like bark mulch from acid-loving evergreens (fir, hemlock and cedar).

Sometimes you'll be offered bark mulch for free, which will be bark chips from alder or maple.

These chips and deciduous leaves decompose to be alkaline (pH +7) which makes a great mulch for perennials but not so much for acidloving plants.

All hail the king of shrubs.





Cocaine and crack cocaine

Cocaine is a drug extracted from the leaves of the coca plant.

It is a potent brain stimulant and one of the most powerfully addictive drugs.

Cocaine is distributed on the street in two main forms: cocaine hydrochloride and crack cocaine.

DESCRIPTION

Cocaine hydrochloride is a fine powder often diluted with sugar, cornstarch or talcum powder.

This form of the drug is usually snorted or dissolved in water and injected.

Crack, the chunk or rock form of cocaine, is a smokeable freebase form of cocaine which is made by adding baking soda to a cocaine solution and allowing the mixture to dry.

EFFECTS

The intensity of cocaine depends on the dose and rate of entry to the brain.

Cocaine reaches the brain through the snorting method in three to five minutes.

Intravenous injection of cocaine produces a rush in 15 to 30 seconds, and smoking produces an almost immediate intense experience.

However, the faster the absorption, the shorter the high lasts.

The high from snorting may last 15 to 30 minutes, while that from smoking may last five to 10 minutes.

Once the drug leaves the brain, the user experiences a "coke crash" that includes depression, irritability, and fatigue.

To avoid withdrawal, repeated frequent doses are taken.

Long term effects of high doses



of cocaine can trigger paranoia.

Smoking crack cocaine can produce particularly aggressive paranoid behaviour in users.

When addicted individuals stop using cocaine, they often become depressed.

Prolonged cocaine snorting can result in ulceration of the mucous membrane of the nose.

Injectable cocaine users are at risk for infections such as hepatitis and HIV.

There is some evidence that people who use cocaine may participate in HIV- related risky behaviours, such as sharing needles and unprotected sex, more often than people who inject other drugs.

Nasal blood found on straws used for inhaling cocaine can carry hepatitis C and be a source of infection.

DETOX

Cocaine detoxification usually involves the user suffering a crash which is marked by irritability, sleepiness and anxiety.

Typically, the detox involves plenty of rest and a return to a regular

meal schedule.

Clients are typically underweight and dehydrated due to neglect from an extended period of preoccupation with cocaine.

Fiction that searches for truth about grief and suffering

In local writer Patricia Morrison's first novel, *Shadow Girl* (Tundra

Books, 2012), we're introduced to Jules, an 11-year old girl living a difficult life. In prose that is at once simple and direct, the author takes the reader into a troubling world of neglect and abandonment.

It's not just that Jules is poor and often doesn't have enough to eat. She is a child without a true home, though she does live in a run-down house with her alcoholic father (Jules's mother left when the girl was four). However her father is unreliable, often failing to return after drinking with friends. When he is around, he's

often violent. He doesn't provide food in a reliable way; nor does he provide emotional sustenance. There's no one to guide her through her girlhood, offering advice on personal hygiene or behaviour. Teachers miss the

obvious signs of neglect and in any case Jules is good at covering up for her father's lack of care. She imagines that if she just says the right things and keeps the house tidy, everything will be fine.

In many respects, Jules hovers on the edge — in her school, where bullies find her an easy target for her messy uniform and

meagre lunches; at the local plaza where she hangs around the Zellers toy department for its warmth and the kindness of one of the employees; and in her own father's consciousness where she is at best a burden, if occasionally "a goddam leech, a bloody stinking leech..."

When the inevitable happens and Jules enters the care of the Catholic Children's Aid Society, things improve only marginally. The foster home is not exactly welcoming, though Jules is given a room, regular meals and chores.

This novel, aimed at young readers, is bleak. Its setting is suburban Toronto — grey streets and strip malls. The school is a period piece, where kids are strapped for playing tag. Jules's foster mother is not completely unkind but she doesn't un-

derstand her ward's deep uncertainty and unhappiness. The ending offers a small glimmer of hope for Jules but the reader is left with anger at a system that offers society's most needy

children so little.

Have things changed? If you've been following the reports coming out of Mary Ellen Turpel-Lafond's office (she is B.C.'s representative for children and youth), you'll have to conclude that no, they haven't changed enough.

Every now and then, I read a novel that completely

captivates me from the first page. Anakana Schofield's *Malarky* (Biblioasis, 2012) is one of those books.

PATRICIA MORRISON

The first page contains the key elements of this exhilarating book. Its accent is Irish but not stage Irish. The voice of the main character, a farmwife who is newly widowed and coming to terms with her loss, is as crisp and original as the scent of turf in the air as you drive out of Galway into the country. You've never smelled anything like it but it's intoxicating. In this passage, "Our Woman" is talking to "Grief," the counsellor woman, about the intrusive thoughts she is having.

Tell me about these thoughts?
You're sure you want to know?
I've heard it all, she insisted,
there is nothing you can say that will
surprise me.

I disbelieving, asked again. You're sure now?

Absolutely.

Men, I said. Naked men. At each other all the time, all day long. I can't get it out of my head.

Well now, she said and fell silent.

Not only has Our Woman's husband recently died, but her beloved son has left under a cloud and so one grief compounds upon another until predictable chaos ensues. Half the time

we are in the present and half the time we're not sure where we are. But Schofield is never boring and her writing sparkles.

The novel not only explores emotional chaos but Schofield has found an elastic narrative form with which to do it. It moves from straight narration to first-person outbursts and wailings which directly echo the protagonist's state of mind. It might take a reader new to this kind

of story-telling some time to become accustomed to the verbal and technical

gymnastics of the book but it's worth it.

This is a wildly funny book. One of Our Woman's solutions to grief is sex, never an exciting activity with her husband:

"Too much participation from her, unsettles Himself. Say she grabs for him, he'll readjust himself beyond her reach."


She finds a willing subject in a young Syrian she meets in a small-town library:

"Our Woman is reporting to you

from Ballina, where she is walking boldly into the PJ section of Penneys with one thing in mind. I want to find the Syrian, if he is to be found. I want to make it clear today that I am officially looking for him..."

Malarky is one of five titles shortlisted for the Ethel Wilson Fiction Prize at this year's BC Book


Awards and I think it deserves all the attention that comes its way.







The continuing story of Wei Hsu, the first non-native resident of



Vague recollections have persisted for many years that the first non-native person to live in Pender Harbour was a Chinese man who operated a fish saltery in Irvines Landing.

Before Charles Irvine landed here and lent his name to the stretch of beach at the western entrance to Pender Harbour, a family named Hsu had settled there in 1873.

The historic events depicted here are loosely based on the author's own imagination and should not be interpreted as fact — unless it suits the reader to do so.

As the 1880s wore on, Charles Irvine's trips to Pender's Harbour became solely for purposes of delivering goods rather than returning with Wei Hsu's processed fish. The markets Irvine had established in Gastown and beyond for the Hsu's salted and smoked fish were overrun with product from local cannery processors.

The Fraser River area was producing well over 150,000 cases of salmon a year and still growing. With a massive fishery flowing under its pilings and fishermen who would work for next to nothing to catch them, the big cannery owners had advantages in scale that Wei Hsu and his family couldn't compete against.

But Wei Hsu had always maintained a reputation for being lucky and, as he liked to explain to his daughter, it wasn't by chance. Mary Hsu wrote that, according to her father, his luck was a direct result of adhering to strict principles of Chinese superstition. For instance, it was strictly forbidden to turn a fish over on the plate while eating. Mary understood from an early age that when eating fish, you must use your chopsticks to pull the flesh from beneath the fish in order to avoid a bad omen.

The value of Wei Hsu's commitment to practices like these was reconfirmed after his orders from Gastown slowed to a trickle but a growing supply business quietly replaced it. Small logging operations had sprung all over the area and many had come to rely on Pender's Harbour as an important supply stop. The Hsu operation was al-

ready well-known for their fish but quickly gained a reputation for stocking staples like flour, sugar, homemade jam or even rope and caulk boots.

It created an uneasy truce between the mostly white loggers and the "chinks and siwash" that ran the trading post. The men who stopped in for supplies would bite their tongue, not out of respect for Wei Hsu and his family, but out of an urgent need for the goods they provided. Still, there were often arguments over payment, or manners, and Wei Hsu was occasionally forced to lead a drunken logger back to his boat with a hunting rifle.

Arguments rarely reached the point of violence thanks to the charms of Wei Hsu's daughter, Mary, who had an uncanny ability to defuse potentially dangerous situations. At 18 she was taller than both her mother and father and by all accounts possessed a beauty that would have stood out on the streets of New York or San Francisco. Her mother would joke with her that the effect she had on some of the bachelor's who called in at Pender's Harbour was like that of opium on her father. An aggressive logger would often go limp and shy when she entered the storehouse. She wrote in her journal that she received six proposals of marriage before the age of 18. Not once did the scribbles imply that she'd ever taken an interest in any of the men who might have passed through her life and only once did she write in detail about a man.

Had she not, we may have never known that one of her most persistent suitors was none other than her father's friend and business acquaintance, Charles Irvine.

Charles Irvine recognized better than most the growing potential for commerce throughout the islands and bays of the BC coast. As the government

encouraged people to move from the bustling centres of Gastown, New Westminister and Victoria, pockets of settlement began to appear throughout the Strait of Georgia. Irvine was in a perfect position to observe its development. He was a city merchant but had also built a steady business as a travelling salesman, stopping in wherever he found smoke to offer whatever he might be carrying in his 24-foot schooner, *Packer*.

When news reached him about the imminent development of a large mine on Texada Island, he surely must have realized then that Wei Hsu and his family sat on a very profitable enterprise.

Whether it was his advanced age or whether she suspected ulterior motives, Mary Hsu turned down Charles Irvine's advances. During every visit he made during the early 1880s, he would ask her to accompany him for a walk. At first she agreed, considering him an important business ally and a family friend. But

when he made clear his intention to marry her, she was startled and found any excuse to avoid him. As the spring of 1884 wore on, Charles Irvine's visits to the Hsu family increased.

He began arriving up to three times a month for mostly legitimate reasons as business was also booming, but rarely caught sight of her. Her mother would tell him she had gone to forage for food plants or placate him with some other excuse but it quickly became obvious that she was avoiding him.

Undeterred, Irvine proposed to Mary Hsu on April 22, 1884. Mary would write in her journals that he became angry after she rebuffed him and he quickly dropped the facade of a charming English gentlemen. Her mother was forced to step in as he hurled expletives at Mary before furiously stomping down the dock and shoving off, leaving Wei Hsu to wonder if his luck had turned and if he would see him again.
