Powell River rage and other Garden Bay hazards

Five years ago, I abandoned Madeira Park for Garden Bay.

It's been mostly positive but I have a few caveats.

First, some Garden Bay dog owners let their pets take a dump anywhere it pleases them — and, mostly, they are pleased to let them do it in front of someone else's property.

Each time I weedeat the frontage around my driveway, I'm gifted with a face shield of dog poo.

But, aside from the lack of nightlife, my only other complaint about Garden Bay is when I try to leave.

Anyone acclimatized to the relatively chill roads of Garden Bay understands the shock of being greeted at the highway with ferry traffic.

Powell River lunatics launch off the *Malaspina Sky* in an impenetrable stream — bumper to bumper like a military formation moving dignitaries through hostile territory.

So fast, trucks get air on the bump at the Kleindale crossroads.

If you are able, and brave enough, to join this conga line of urgency, be prepared to be pushed, because Powell River drivers have one single-minded goal — to pass every other sucker in front of them.

They know their best chance to do that is Misery Mile — the two-lane stretch past GRIPS.

Every two hours, it turns into a perilous drag strip of impatient qatheters working to gain on their competition before hitting the squigglies south of Madeira Park.

In July, I found myself in the midst of this mayhem.

Anyone who has lived here more than a fortnight understands that passing is pointless — the highway is saturated with vehicles, so if you do pass anyone, they'll likely just end up right behind you at the Norwest Bay Road light anyways.

Absent of reason, the Powell River driver is undeterred.

On this day, when I rounded the corner and entered the Misery Mile arena, I sensed grave urgency jockeying behind me.

I was happy to move to the right lane but also moving over in front of me were two plodding motorhomes.

So, I decided to pass them first.

I wasn't quick enough for the driver of a white Ford Expedition who was already on my ass like a dog greeting a new arrival at the park.

He (I didn't see this person but I recognize male driving habits) immediately started flashing his lights in a frantic attempt to show me how critical it was that he should get past.

I reacted poorly.

Struck with stubborn indignation and a desire to educate this interloper about proper habits while passing through my community, I remained in the line of cars in the left lane.

The qatheter took it personally.

He bleated away with his horn while aggressively rushing up on my rear end the entire way up the hill.

Finally, he found an opening in the right lane for a passing attempt — just as the lane ended.

Out of options, he made a desperate effort to pass on the shoulder.

What he didn't realize is that at the top of Misery Mile, the shoulder disappears into a steep embankment.

Not *really* wanting to see him die a fiery death, I braked and let him in.

Then, I followed him, at a safe distance, to Madeira Park where luckily for both of us, he didn't turn in.

My agitation subsided as soon as I passed back over Mt. Daniel hill.

But it all came rushing back when I turned into my driveway — and spotted fresh dog poop.


P. H. MUSIC SOCIETY PRESENTS OVER THE MOON: Sunday, Oct. 26, 2 p.m.

Forest fire in Middlepoint sends smoke to Pender Harbour

Residents in the Pender Harbour area were smoked out Sept. 13 after a forest fire broke out approximately 3.5 kilometres to the southeast of McNeill Lake.

The fire was reported that morning and listed as "human-caused."

By the afternoon it had grown to 2.3 hectares.

From a 12:48 p.m. update from the BC Wildfire Service:

"It is burning at Rank 2 (low vigour surface fire) and is in mature timber.

"Three helicopters, two initial attack crews, one local fire department crew and one faller pair were assigned."

A brisk southeast wind likely

hampered the fire response and directed smoke north.

By the next morning, the fire was still listed as out of control and had grown to 6.3 hectares overnight but the BC Wildfire Service said the fire "received significant precipitation overnight and fire behaviour has been reduced to Rank 1 (smouldering ground fire)."

"Today 10 firefighters, one response officer, two faller pairs and one helicopter are actioning the fire."

Rain continued through Sept. 14 and by Sept. 15 the fire was listed as under control — "a wildfire that is not projected to spread beyond the current perimeter."

It is now out.

Though the Langdale ferry terminal catches most of the criticism, Dianne Smith wanted to illustrate a daily hassle for Earls Covers. 'When you leave your house, you pray that no one is blocking your road while lining up for the ferry. They did put a sign up but it doesn't always work. I had to drive over the neighbours lawn to get off our street the other day,' said Smith. It's no better returning. 'Coming home is nerve racking,' she said. 'The ferry traffic is usually backed up almost to the Egmont road. You have two choices. One, sit in your car and wait with everyone who is going to get a ferry or, two, put on your four way flashers and drive down the wrong side of the road praying nobody is coming up. If the ferry is unloading, they fly up both lanes trying to beat everyone and it's a game of Russian Roulette if you need to go down.' Smith said she has spoken to Earls Cove terminal ferry staff but, according to her, they said 'it's not their jurisdiction.'

A NOTE ABOUT THE DELIVERY OF THE HARBOUR SPIEL

As a result of an ongoing labour dispute with Canada Post, the Canadian Union of Postal Workers has introduced a ban on the delivery of unaddressed direct mail starting Sept. 15. This ban applies to the delivery of the Harbour Spiel to mailboxes in our area. The CPUW announced a full strike on Sept. 18.

Should this job action continue, the Harbour Spiel won't arrive in mailboxes as normal. Instead, it will be available in larger quantities at familiar retail outlets including the Oak Tree Market, Madeira Park IGA, Earthfair Bookstore, Madeira Park Liquor Store, Grasshopper Pub, JH Marina, Backeddy Pub, Bathgate's Store, Sechelt Library, Lighthouse Pub and many more locations, until the job action is rescinded.

Pender pool suffering ongoing staffing issues

Check opening the opening hours before you go because the Pender Harbour and Aquatic and Fitness Centre might be closed.

Due to an ongoing shortage of lifeguards at the facility, hours of operation were reduced last month when the pool reopened for the season.

According to an Aug. 26 SCRD statement, "These changes are necessary to maintain safe and reliable service across our facilities."

Swim lessons at the pool were also "temporarily paused," but, on Sept. 25 it was announced they would

resume Oct. 12.

While the weight room remained open from 7 a.m. to 1 p.m. each weekday, morning access to the aquatic facility was reduced in September from 7 a.m. to 1 p.m. to 7 a.m. to 8:30 a.m. for three days (Wednesday, Thursday and Friday).

Starting Oct. 5, those reduced morning aquatic hours will only be in effect Wednesday and Friday.

The entire facility (pool and gym) will open on evenings on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday from 3:30 p.m. to 8 p.m. and close Thurs-

day and Friday evenings

Staffing shortages last season caused full weekend closures but the pool and gym are open on Saturdays and Sundays from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.

"Interviews are underway, and we look forward to welcoming fresh faces to our facilities soon," said the SCRD statement.

"As new staff join our aquatics team, we will review pool schedules and adjust hours accordingly."

"Guided by regulation 1290, the student trustee role ensures that student perspectives are represented in decisions that shape the future of education in our community."

Supporting Makenzie Arnet in her new position is a "District Student Leadership Team," a group of students from all four secondary schools in the district.

The DSLT "provides opportunities for collaboration and ensures a wide range of student experiences and ideas are shared."

With mentorship from the superintendent of schools, the district October 2025 principal of Indigenous learning and school leaders, the team meets regularly to address topics that matter most to students.

The DSLT is made up of students in Grades 10 to 12, selected through an application and interview process.

Each year, the team elects a Grade 12 student trustee to represent them at the board table.

"I am so excited and grateful to be able to represent the students of our district through this position," said Makenzie Arnet.

"Student voice is something that I am very passionate about, and it's incredibly important to me that every student feels that their experience and voice are valued."

Fundraising goal to 'Raise the roof' reached

A large donation by the Rotary Club of Pender Harbour (see below) and funds raised from a recent "Homecoming" gala fundraiser at the Pender Harbour Community Hall (see photos, p. 29) has allowed the Pender Harbour Community Club to reach their fundraising goal to rebuild the aging roof of the Pender Harbour Community Hall.

Alain Catteau, PHCC roof placement project manager, told the *Harbour Spiel* that the club has the funding to move ahead with the project which is estimated to cost \$665,000.

Included in that total is a federal grant from the 'Green and Inclusive Community Buildings' program for \$532,000 (*Harbour Spiel*, May 2025).

Catteau said that although it has been "approved in principal," the

PHCC has yet to receive the funding.

"While this is an exciting milestone, we know that unexpected costs still lie ahead and for this reason, we are extending our fundraising target to ensure we can cover every expense and deliver a project we can all be proud of," said Catteau in an email.

"We are incredibly grateful for the ongoing support, generosity and partnership of our community as we move forward with this project."

According to Catteau, the PHCC has hired an architect as required as part of the building permit application.

Construction is scheduled to commence on June 1, 2026.

CFIB report on on inefficiency misleading

You've read the headline:

"SCRD is BC's 'least efficient' regional district says national

business association."

The scathing accusation is made in a recent Canadian Federation of Independent Businesses report, "Bureaucracy Over Basics: An Examination of Regional District Spending," which was emailed as a news release to newspapers in the province.

The submitted article either wasn't fact-checked or the Coast Reporter editor opted for sensationalist copy over accuracy, including such laments as, "the SCRD... is massively overspending" and "there is a lack of

accountability in the regional district system, meaning bureaucracy and red tape can continue to grow unchecked."

I could choose to ignore the misleading and sometimes blatantly false content in the published news release, but this spreads misinformation and I value the accuracy of information.

Most regional 1 districts consider the CFIB study used to support the CFIB claims as seriously flawed, and the conclusions CFIB reaches are not supported by the statistics contained in its own report, e.g. regional districts taking too long to provide services which in fact they do not offer, such as business licences.

The report states that SCRD administrative expenses rose by a high percentage, which is true, but the report also shows that we have the fourth lowest administration expenses of all 27 BC regional districts examined and we're in the middle of the pack for per capita administrative costs.

That didn't show we were the "least efficient," so they pointed out that our total expense budget per capita is the highest of any regional district but neglected to explain why it was a good or bad thing.

It's a good thing because we partner with our municipalities and assume responsibility to deliver emergency management, recycling, green waste, solid waste, recreational facilities and more, which eliminates duplication of effort and inefficiencies.

To evaluate administration efficiency, rather than comparing the spending of regional districts to provide its services with other regional

Page 10 Harbour Spiel districts providing similar services, it focused on overall administration expenses and the per cent increase from 2018 to 2023.

Although administration expenses don't directly create infrastructure and services, they are essential to their smooth operation and include salaries and expenses of executive officers, administrative support, board remuneration and expenses, accounting, finance services, human resources, staff training and development, professional fees, insurance, office supplies and more.

Many directors agree with some of the statements made in the report, such as reinstating the auditor general for local government, focusing on operating costs, doing a better job of finding efficiencies, merging teams, balancing services and implementing clear key performance indicators with measurable impacts.

I also agree, and the SCRD has provided a number of news releases and public disclosures to support and update the public about our efforts.

A 2023 SCRD news release announced that an organizational review was being undertaken and that no staff increases would even be considered.

By Feb. 5, 2024, staffing increases were being deferred to 2025, pending implementation of the 2024 organizational review

On July 25, 2024, in a corporate and administrative services semi-

annual report, it was disclosed that the internal review of organizational structure and leadership was concluded in Q1 2024, and that its recommendations were being implemented to support efficient and effective service delivery.

KEY PERFORMANCE INDICATORS

The CFIB report recommends ensuring internal oversight mechanisms that include clear KPIs.

A KPI is an tool used to define whether an organization, team or employee is meeting a predefined goal to determine if a current course of action is succeeding as intended.

Common government KPIs include measurements of how quickly services are provided, how well departments meet their budgets, how efficiently resources are used, how satisfied are taxpayers and how well projects are completed on time and within budget.

The SCRD already uses KPIs in our various departments, and they are publicly reported approximately every quarter of every year, such as the most recent one on July 24 at our committee of the whole meeting.

The SCRD has multiple projects underway to ensure we have established clear service levels and to measure success in meeting them, including our evolving corporate work plan, transit service expansion with

BC Transit, a parks service review and an infrastructure service review.

Our directors are also taxpayers, which is one of the strengths of our local government structure; we all want our tax dollars to be wisely spent, and ensure proof is available to show they were spent effectively and efficiently.

KPIs are the best tool to ensure that happens, and we're using them.



The end of our community gardens?

Editor,

Pender Harbour has been blessed by the beautiful gardens surrounding the community hall in Madeira Park.

They exist thanks to the vision, hard work and generosity of Don Fraser, who not only created them 25 years ago, but also personally did most of the labour and continued to fund their upkeep.

That era has now come to an end, and the cost of keeping the gardens alive is estimated at \$35,000 per year.

Over the past year, the Pender Harbour and Area Residents Association has explored every option we could think of.

We first considered relying on annual donations, but it quickly became clear that small contributions of \$10 or \$20 would not add up to the tens of thousands needed each year.

Donations might help in the short term, but they cannot be counted on year-after-year to cover such a large expense.

We then turned to the idea of volunteer labour; no organization has stepped forward, and only a handful of people offered to help.

The truth is that these gardens require the steady hand of a professional gardener.

After decades of care, their scale and complexity cannot realistically be managed by occasional volunteer efforts.

Finally, we pursued a more formal solution — a modest property tax increase to be managed by the SCRD.

For six months, we circulated petitions in Madeira Park and Garden Bay, seeking signatures from half the households in order to take the first step in an "alternate approval process."

Without funding for the Madeira Park Community Gardens, we risk a return to early 2000s Madeira Park, before the gardens were installed.

Despite our best efforts, we collected only a fraction of the signatures required.

We are frustrated to say that every avenue we tried has reached a dead end.

The gardens cannot maintain themselves, and without reliable funding or another group stepping forward to take responsibility, they will inevitably fall into decline.

That would be a loss not only to

the P. H. Community Hall but to the spirit of Pender Harbour itself.

The time for hoping someone else will solve this is over.

If the community values these gardens, it must find a way to secure their future — before the hard work and generosity that created them is lost to weeds and neglect.

The future of the community gardens is at risk

Editor,

For the past five years, I have had the privilege of maintaining and caring for the Community Hall and Bargain Barn gardens.

It been my joy to nurture them and I know how much they mean to all of us.

Unfortunately, the private funding that supported this work is no longer available and despite efforts to secure backing from local organizations, no solution has been found.

Reluctantly, I will be putting the gardens to bed this fall and waiting for new funding to materialize.

The Madeira Park Community Gardens are a source of pride for residents and a warm welcome to visitors.

They were originally brought

to life through the dedication of Don Fraser, who gave generously of his time, leadership and resources so that our town could enjoy these vibrant, flourishing spaces.

I understand that the Sunshine Coast Regional District has advised that one way to secure reliable funding is through a community referendum that would add a very small fee to our local property taxes.

We need to send a widely-supported petition to start this process in order to create a sustainable fund to maintain our shared green spaces.

Until such a mechanism is in place, or another private donor comes forward, we risk losing the gardens that add beauty to our community, support local businesses by drawing foot traffic and stand as a living legacy of Don Fraser's vision.

The gardens cannot simply remain as they are.

They are living spaces — without skilled, ongoing care, they quickly become overgrown and lose the beauty and welcome we all cherish.

These mature gardens require professional maintenance; they are far too large and complex to be sustained by volunteers alone.

I do not want to walk away, however I cannot afford to work without fair compensation, or take on the task of securing funds.

I am committed to returning once proper funding is in place and I believe that, together, we can ensure the gardens continue to thrive.







Raincoast Chronicles 25: Mamata goes fishing

CHAPTER TWO: 'SALMON SEINE'

In my high school, the kids of fishermen were admired when they returned to class in the fall a month or so late and often driving a fancy car.

Suddenly I found myself about to join this elite group, though I would not be returning to school in the fall.

But fishing, even then, was not all about fancy cars.

Vicki's uncle Buddy Roberts did own a nice new Ford Edsel the day that he set out to cross over from the Mainland in the tide-churned and wind-whipped waters off Cape Mudge, at the southern tip of Quadra Island.

Buddy also had a wife and several children.

As a boy, I had heard of the horrific shipwrecks in these waters, but this was all made real when, in the springtime of 1960, a memorial was held for Buddy.

His body was never found, and only ragged bits of his boat ever came ashore.

The memorial began in what had been the one-room school in the village at Cape Mudge.


There were several speakers, but there is only one that I remember.

Speaking in the Kwakwala language, which I do not understand, Chief Billy Assu, then in his nineties, uncoiled his aging frame to stand tall and erect.

I understood that he spoke of the powerful tradition of the Liğwiłdaxw people on the surrounding waters.

He used his cane to strike the floor for emphasis.

I further understood that I was in

the presence of powerful people who lived on powerful waters.

In a token acknowledgement of the traditional potlatch gift-giving ceremony, at that time much weakened, two or three oranges were distributed to each guest.

Young people were assigned to pick up the dozen or so large wreaths and lead us in a solemn procession through the length of the village to the dock.

They then led us down to the flat, where we all boarded Harry Assu's classic seiner, the *W No.* 8, and Ivan Dick's beamy *Eva D II*.

Tied together, the two boats idled

out into the swift running flood tide in Discovery Passage, a short distance off the village.

Once there, the wreaths were dropped from the stern to be carried southward toward the tide rips off Cape Mudge one by silent one.

For all of us standing on the decks of those two seiners, it was a solemn, moving ceremony.

It was a sea-silence that I would come to know more of, and one that I would never forget in all my time at sea.

That first summer, we fished salmon with the 77-foot *San Jose*.

I learned that the boat had

belonged to Herb's father, Dan, until he drowned when he drove his car off a wharf.

Her hull was newly painted green to signify that she now belonged to the Nelson Brothers fishing company.

But the company, owned by two Norwegian immigrants, saw mutual advantage in having the Assu family run the boat.

Herb also owned the smaller 57-foot *Departure Bay No. 3* (DB No. 3), which was skippered that year by Art Chickite, who, like Herb and his family, came from Cape Mudge village of the We Wai Kai people, members of the Liğwiłdaxw nation.

The *DB No. 3* was built by Jimburo Sawada on Nanaimo's Newcastle Island in 1928 for the Japanese Canadian twin-seine herring fishery.

This was a technique that these fishermen had brought from their homes in Wakayama Prefecture.

Many years later, my Japanesespeaking wife, Ananya, and I would discover a pair of such boats on a beach near the Wakayama town of Mio, from which many had immigrated to Steveston.

The original owner of the *DB No.* 3, Ryutaro Kita, also salted the herring for export to Japan.

Like so many other Japanese Canadian vessels, the *DB No. 3* was confiscated by the Canadian government following the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor in 1941.

She was sold by the Canadian government into a fishing company fleet, and Herb bought it from there.

I was told by older crewmen that *DB No. 3* was a seized Japanese Canadian boat, but it would be decades before I was able to trace the full story.

In high school, the Indigenous guys, with their good looks and with money from summers spent commercial fishing, were the leaders of the October 2025 "cool" group.

I knew and occasionally hung out with them but didn't have that level of cool.

I soon saw more of that group, as several were members of the Assu/ Roberts family that I had married into.

As the child of immigrants — my mother from the U.S. and my father from the U.K. — my cousins were distant ideas.

Now, through marriage, I became part of an extended family with dozens of relatives, old and young.

The *San Jose* was very much a family boat.

Herb was the captain.

His wife, Leoda "Mitzi" Assu, cooked three big hot meals daily with the diesel-fed stove in our compact galley.

Herb's brother-in-law, Jimmy Mitchel, was the deck boss.

He was in his forties, moody, and could be impatient with greenhorns like me.

He also possessed a wealth of

knowledge, which he doled out when he saw fit.

It was Jimmy who taught me to splice the heavy four-strand manila purse lines that we used.

Over the decades, I have added to Jimmy's teachings.

Company-owned boats were painted distinctive colours: Canfisco used black hulls and reddish cabins, BC Packers had black hulls and buff cabins, while Nelsons had green hulls and white cabins.


When a fisherman bought a boat, he usually painted it all white.

One day I observed to Jimmy that a particular white-coloured boat must be privately owned.

"Just 'cause it's painted white don't mean he owns it," Jimmy said bitterly.

It was an important intro to corporate debt control of so-called "independent fishermen."

I was to become more conscious of what I would call "corporate debt bondage" in the fishing industry.



In Raincoast Chronicles 25, Roderick Haig-Brown recounts his formative years as a deckhand in the 1960s and early '70s on a fishing boat run by the We Wai Kai family he married into as a teenager. The history of commercial fishing and of British Columbia itself, in all its twisting relations with Indigenous peoples, is mirrored in Haig-Brown's vivid account of life aboard, where "there are no typical days" despite the tightly choreographed tasks and immense local knowledge required by this ever-risky business.


