

Stewart finds home in the Sahara

Local Realtor Alan Stewart found a little piece of home recently while taking part in a 100-kilometre trek across the Sahara Desert for charity.

"We were raising money for the Royal LePage Shelter Foundation," said Stewart.

"It's a corporate charity but all that money goes towards the Yew Transition House and Sunshine Coast Community Services," said Stewart.

Stewart told the *Harbour Spiel* that he was one of 120 Royal LePage realtors from across Canada that took part but was the only trekker from the Sunshine Coast.

Stewart said he raised over \$12,000 on his own with the entire group raising \$1.2 million.

The Realtors were divided into smaller groups and hiked for about 20 kilometres each day for five days through open desert.

Stewart said only one injury was reported — a woman had to be helped off the trail due to a sprained ankle.

"But there were lots of blisters and sore feet."

A company called Charity Challenge hosted the trek and provided a doctor with each group and local guides to ensure safety.

Perhaps the most remarkable story of his journey came before the trek even started.

Stewart said the Canadian trekkers were stopped for lunch at a restaurant near Medina, a UNESCO heritage site made famous in *Raiders* of the Lost Ark and Game of Thrones.

One of their drivers, who didn't speak English, found a hat lying on the ground and, assuming it was dropped by someone in their group, was showing it around.

It was a relatively untarnished

pink ladies' Pender Harbour Golf Club hat that was likely dropped only moments before.

A fellow Realtor from Vancouver recognized the name and ushered Stewart to have a look.

Stewart said when he exited the restaurant and the driver handed it to him, it gave him chills.

"So, we all spent a bunch of time talking about it and then I posted it on Facebook and that's when Roberta (Oleksyn) chimed in from the golf course that it looks like her friend Beth's hat from Saskatoon," said Stewart.

Not long after, Beth confirmed through social media that she had lost her hat earlier in the day.

"She was on a 10-day Morocco tour, according to what Roberta told me, so I tried to get in touch but we never actually got it touch."

Stewart said he still has the hat and is working to return it to its owner.

On water, waste water and land-use

WATER

How best to ensure an adequate and affordable supply of fresh water to the

lower Coast continues to be a major concern of all SCRD directors.

We need water to support the new jobs and senior housing opportunities that are generated in the Sechelt area and at the same time costs are of special concern to those in the regional water function, including Egmont.

I do note that regional water parcel taxes and user fees are lower than North and South Pender but where they will be when the dust settles is quite a different matter.

Constructing a man-made Chap-

man Creek reservoir, known as site B, would cost in the range of \$53 million while a Granthams Landing well field at Church Road, when actually put into production, would cost only \$8 million and be completed in 2022.

The Church Road well field is expected to produce 57.6 litres per second which would total 25,000 litres of new water in a dry season.

By my calculations, that's 25 per cent of the ideal solution, or as a recent directors' update said, 46 per cent of the existing shortage if we can reduce demand by 10 per cent.

Water metres in the Sechelt area should accomplish that.

The other good news is that exploration is continuing into the possibility of a Tuwanek well-field near Gray Creek.

It is a possibility but a lot more

hurdles need to be overcome before this one is real.

So, what is next?

The decision was made to explore for more well sites as previous studies indicated there is a good chance they are out there.

Some directors are questioning the current "bullet proof" strategy of getting a third Chapman reservoir shovel-ready as new well sources become closer to a reality, making the long-term solution less certain.

Diversifying our water sources so we have options in emergency situations is a very desirable goal and wells are definitely one environmentally friendly solution.

WASTE WATER IS AN ASSET?

Asset management is a term the users of waste water plants here in

This is the start of a plan that will set the course for expenditures for all phases of each plant's life, from the original installation, operational life span and then replacing them with the next generation of technology.

The users of the systems always pay the freight and the SCRD strives to manage everything to the level that the majority wish, or at a minimum as the senior governments' mandate.

This whole asset management program can be achieved in multiple ways but we think a plan developed in an open and transparent manner is the best long-term approach.

It is a new journey and it will likely increase taxes in the short term, but in the long term we and our children will both benefit from starting with a solid foundation.

LAND-USE PLANNING

The community charter acknowledges that consultation on matters of mutual interest is a defining principle of the local-provincial relationship.

It recognizes that the citizens of BC are best served when both orders of government respect each other's jurisdiction and work together.

At the recent UBCM conference

a resolution was passed asking the provincial government to recognize local governments as orders of government that need to be consulted and engaged on matters that affect them.

An example is the province's new land-use planning process that envisions a province-First Nation developed framework.

Local governments are listed as stakeholders to be consulted with industry and other interest groups.

The purpose of the resolution was to ask the province to ensure local governments are at the decision-making tables as a partner, not as a stakeholder to be informed after decisions have been made by others.

Land-use planning is one of many decision tables listed in the recent foundation agreement between the Shishálh Nation and the province and they are actively working on forestry and land-use planning.

Unfortunately, at a recent joint meeting between the three levels of government, the SCRD was again listed as a stakeholder instead of a partner at the table.

We expressed our disappointment at the lack of progress in resolving the issue and were assured that we will be engaged, consulted and informed.

I am interested to see if the provincial government can deliver the required changes and will be delighted if it happens.





REPORT A WILDLIFE VIOLATION

MARINE VIOLATIONS 1-800-465-4336

NON-MARINE VIOLATIONS 1-877-952-RAPP (7277)

One way you can **help protect the environment, fish and wildlife** is to stop violations before they happen. The watchful eyes of the community can deter possible violators. If you see an offence, **think O.R.R.: Observe, Record, Report**.

OBSERVE WHAT THE PERSON IS DOING

Some common violations are:

- Illegal waste disposal (household or business waste, e.g. dumped on Crown Land)
- Unlawful open burning (e.g. dense smoke); excludes backyard burning
- The discharge of chemicals or sewage to lakes or rivers
- Damage to fish or wildlife habitat
- Exceeding the daily bag or catch limit
- Use of illegal hunting or fishing gear
- Fishing or hunting out of season or in closed areas
- Unauthorized collection or sale of fish and wildlife or their parts

RECORD WHAT YOU OBSERVE

As soon as possible, write down what you've seen. Include these details:

- The date, time and location (e.g. nearest town, fishing location, stream, address)
- The violator's identity or description (e.g. height, weight, hair colour, age, clothing, number of violators)
- The boat or vehicle description (e.g. vehicle licence, boat registration number, vessel length, colour, make, type, distinguishing features)
- Evidence that might still be at the scene (e.g. catch, fish offal, gear used)

REPORT THE VIOLATION

Former highways building toast

There was little firefighters could do but contain a blaze that engulfed the former highways works building on Francis Peninsula Road.

The fire in the vacant building started around noon on Dec. 12.

Some members of the Pender Harbour Volunteer Fire Department were attending a training session in Middlepoint when they received a call for an unrelated incident.

Minutes later the call came in for the fire, which caused some initial confusion.

"We originally got paged out for some wires down on Pollock Road," said PHVFD fire chief Bill Gilkes.

"As that truck was heading out, dispatch came on the radio and said we got a report of heavy smoke at this place here and asked if it was possible these were the same calls."

"So, they were presented with a fully engulfed building when they thought they were going to a wiresdown call," said Gilkes.

"That gets the heart pumping."
Gordon Sanders leased the prop-

erty from its owners, brothers Don and Howard White.

Sanders operated the Memory Lane Thrift Store on the site until recently closing for the winter.

He said he had the stock bundled in the middle bay awaiting transport.

The building and contents are said to be insured and an insurance investigator attended the site Dec. 14.

Sanders told the *Harbour Spiel* that he lit scented candles to reduce odour before leaving to do errands.

The building was the former mechanical shop for the Department of Highways, which operated out of the property for many years.

One of the owners guessed the shop was likely built in the late 1960s.

Shopping centre expansion set for completion 'sometime in 2012'

A new building to be built on the eastern end of the Madeira Park Shopping Centre is planned to be completed by 2012.

A planned expansion of the Madeira Park Shopping Centre is expected to be finished "sometime in 2012," said Marketplace IGA owner Troy Callewaert.

Callewaert says planning for the relocation of his store into a new building located at the back of the property is in the preliminary stages of the development permit process.

To accommodate the building, the septic system will likely be moved to an adjacent property that is also owned by H. Y. Louie.

The grocery store will occupy a 16,000 to 18,000 square foot addition separated from its former location by a parking area and walkway.

Callewaert says his operation currently employs 43 employees and he expects he'll need at least four to eight more full-time positions when the new store opens.

The space where the IGA currently sits will be turned into new retail premises.

Phillip Locke, whose company Locke Property Management manages the H. Y. Louie-owned shopping centre, says there have been discussions with current tenants including the Madeira Park Liquor Store and the Marina Pharmacy.

Medical assistance in dying in British Columbia

In 2016, the government of Canada passed legislation supporting a person's right to receive medical assistance in dying.

Since this time, hundreds of patients each year in BC are accessing MAID at the end of their lives.

MAID is defined as the administration of medication to intentionally bring about death, at an eligible person's request.

The medication is administered by a doctor or a nurse practitioner.

MAID is different than palliative care, which seeks to treat the symptoms of an illness.

However, a person who chooses to access MAID can still be cared for by palliative specialists.

In BC, only certain people are eligible to access MAID.

The strict eligibility requirements are intended as a safeguard to protect vulnerable people.

In order to access MAID, a person must have a serious and incurable condition that causes them intolerable suffering.

Additionally, the natural death must be "reasonably foreseeable."

Whether or not a person meets these criteria is determined by two doctors or nurse practitioners.

A person wanting to access MAID must be 18 years or older and provide consent for the procedure, both at the time they request it and immediately before their death.

The process for accessing MAID starts with a conversation with a health care provider, followed by a more structured assessment.

Sometimes a formal assessment of competency is required as well.

There is usually a waiting period



of ten days between the initial request and the provision of MAID, though this can be waived under special circumstances.

Pharmacists then dispense MAID medications to the provider (MD or NP).

MAID can be provided in hospital, in hospice or extended care or in the home.

An MD or NP and a support RN attend to the patient and family on the day of the MAID provision.

Most people choose to have the medications that cause death given through an intravenous, but some have chosen to drink the medicine. The medicines cause the person to quickly fall into a deep sleep before they die.

MAID has been a part of health-care around the world for many years.

Though it is relatively new to

us in BC, MAID is changing the way that we talk about and think about the end of life.

5.9. ENERGY RESOURCES

5.9.1 DESCRIPTION OF RESOURCE & SUMMARY OF MANAGEMENT ISSUES HYDROELECTRICITY

There are a number of hydroelectric projects within Shíshálh Nation territory, including both conventional dams at the head of Lois Lake and ?iy ch'ách'tl-am (Clowhom Lake), and a great number of current or proposed run-of-the-river projects.

The Clowhom hydroelectric facility was commissioned in 1958, after the construction of the 21 metre high dam and flooding of the valley that previously held two smaller lakes.

This project contributes some 30 megawatts of power to the provincial grid, via transmission lines that run from the site.

Research by the Shíshálh Nation has provided evidence of use and occupation in this watershed dating back to between 8 and 11,000 years and the area continues to be used for hunting by our members.

Several smaller power plants operated in the past, including two — on the slhílhem (Brittain River) and on Seschel Creek — that have since been decommissioned.

There is also a micro-hydro facility near the head of lékw'émin (Jervis Inlet) that provides power for a camp at the mouth of swiwelát (Princess

Louisa Inlet).

The Shíshálh Nation has expressed interest in a similar, smallscale power project for future tourism development at the head of stl'íxwim (Narrows Inlet).

In recent years, British Columbia has created incentives to stimulate interest in electricity generation from independent power projects.

IPPs are run-of-the-river projects, usually situated on steeper sections of moderate-sized creeks, operated by private interests that generate and sell power into the provincial grid.

Advocates suggest there are a range of benefits of such projects, noting that the water diverted into the turbines is returned to the river and that the projects can be situated at natural barriers such as waterfalls, thus reducing impacts on fish passage.

Despite this, there has been some

opposition to IPPs in other areas of British Columbia because of concerns over the privatization of a public resource, and uncertainties over community and environmental impacts from both the facility itself and also from the related transmission lines and access corridors.

Among these, there are concerns over the impacts of IPPs on long-term water supply, fisheries values, wildlife, hunting opportunities and access.

One IPP is already in place within the territory on Sechelt Creek in skwúpa (Salmon Inlet).

This project generates 16 megawatts of power for the provincial grid.

Regional Power, the operator of this facility, worked closely with the Shíshálh Nation as the project was being constructed, and was subsequently awarded a Blue Planet prize by UNESCO at the 2005 Climate

Change Conference in Montreal, for innovation and good practices in the development and operation of a hydropower scheme, based on criteria established by the International Hydropower Association.

In this case, RP worked with the elders to design the facility so that it was consistent with Coast Salish longhouse architecture, used Shíshálh Nation environmental monitors as the project was being built, and also agreed to construct salmon spawning channels as value added.

The Shíshálh Nation has recently been asked to respond to proposals from numerous other IPP proponents in the territory, including several in the Clowhom watershed (Bear Creek, and two more on the Upper and Lower Clowhom River) and on Tyson Creek which discharges into the kékaw (Tzoonie River) and many others at the head of lékw'émin (Jervis Inlet).

These projects require new utility corridors, but propose to link up to the existing transmission lines from the Clowhom hydroelectric facility.

There is an additional IPP proposal for a project on East Toba/
Montrose Creek, and although this lies outside of the Shíshálh Nation territory, the transmission lines required would pass down into lékw'émin (Jervis Inlet) near Saltery Bay.

The Shishalh Nation has requested BC investigate how any potential utility corridors associated with these projects will be managed.

A proposed terrestrial habitat management program will be be considered, that would include vegetation management strategies intended to enhance wildlife habitat, particularly for k'éyich (elk) and máyukw (Grizzly bear) recovery.

Other fisheries habitat enhancement or rehabilitation is also being considered as value added components of proposed energy projects including areas where there are no direct fisheries impacts.

The scope of IPPs is typically such that several of these new projects fall below the threshold for an environmental assessment.

The Shíshálh Nation is concerned over the potential individual and cumulative impacts from these projects and others that may be proposed in the future, and is committed to further assessment before our consent for any future projects is given.

To address this concern, the nation is seeking to negotiate a participation agreement with each of the IPP proponents to cover the period during which the project is being assessed for feasibility and potential impacts, the PAs are intended to:

- Establish a constructive and respectful working relationship, including recognition of aboriginal rights and title:
- Facilitate communication and information sharing, including the recognition of our cultural wisdom, knowledge and expertise;
 - Support capacity building;
- Provide business certainty for the proponent, and
 - Provide resources for the

Shishall Nation to participate meaningfully in consultation with the proponent and BC.

Such PAs do not imply approval of the project by the Shishálh Nation.

Where projects are approved for construction, the Shíshálh Nation may also negotiate a more comprehensive impact benefit agreement that confirms our support for the project and consent for access to the site, and commits the proponent to provide benefits to the Shíshálh Nation.

Such agreements are an example of a constructive relationship with a third party that ensures recognition of aboriginal rights and title for the Shíshálh Nation and greater certainty for investment and operation for industrial and commercial interests.






