# The answer to fantasy questions

For some reason. we like to entertain ourselves by asking fantasy questions:

What would you do if you won the lot-

tery?

Here, we also fantasize about what it would take to make our community economically self-sustaining.

What single entity could deliver year-round employment and reverse our schools' declining enrollment?

A penitentiary?

A tram up to the Caren Range, like the one Squamish recently built?

Maybe large-scale marijuana facilities or the headquarters of a tech company?

As with the lottery question, everyone has a different answer when it comes to what that shot of economic Viagra might be.

Until now.

The riddle has been solved with the Ruby Lake Lagoon Society's PODS marine research station.

Work is underway to secure the Irvines Landing marina property.

Now a derelict site, it was once the centre of commerce for a fledgling community.

But even now, 100 years later, our community is still struggling to find its way.

Despite an uptick in a real estate economy and the frenetic pace of the summer season, many businesses still can't cut it through the winter.

A local cafe recently announced it will shutter four days a week because of anemic winter sales.

Pender Harbour and Egmont seem to lack the momentum to spark a transition from seasonal economies.

The proposed Pender Ocean Discovery Station will change that with a world class pull for students and visitors.

And with jobs.

PODs will require administrators, biologists, groundskeepers, lab technicians, cleaners, servers and cooks.

Someone will maintain a fleet of boats, others may be hired to operate them.

The \$10 million or more in construction costs alone will help fill schools and empty seats in winter coffee shops, and PODS is projected to be profitable by year three.

It will also put this area at the forefront of marine research to interpret some of the changes taking place in our ocean.

If nothing else, a few more smart people in town could provide a welcome boost to the local gene pool.

But to appreciate how thoroughly PODS will impact this community is to understand how it will become the symbol and brand of Pender Harbour.

Not only will PODS provide a visual first impression for visitors arriving to Pender Harbour by boat, it will provide continued media exposure to the rest of the world.

It will be what we are known for.

Site and business plans are in place, and support has come from a long list of influential people that includes the lieutenant-governor of BC.

So, it's time to stop asking fantasy questions about what our Hail Mary might be and recognize that it's here now, and we need to catch it.

As one local shopkeeper interviewed in the "PODS Away" video said, "It's a game-changer."

When PODS opens in 2020, imagine your family's pride in finding their name listed with others who contributed to its necessary first step — the purchase of the land on which it sits.


#### P. H. MUSIC SOCIETY PRESENTS DAWN PEMBERTON: Sunday, Jan. 15, 2 p.m.

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# Ruby Lake Lagoon Society kicks off its push for PODS

With their eye on a property and a conceptual design for it in hand, the Ruby Lake Lagoon Society officially kicked off fundraising efforts to build the Pender Ocean Discovery Station.

As reported last month, the society is pursuing the purchase of the Irvines Landing marina property.

At an invitation-only event held at the Painted Boat Resort on Dec. 3, Michael Jackson, executive director of the RLLS, premiered a new promotional video laying out the project.

The five minute "PODS Away" can be viewed at www.openpods.com.

Afterward, Jackson cited recent statistics showing a decline in younger people on the Sunshine Coast to explain why the project is so important to the community.

"It's very worrying when there is virtually no post-secondary education here on the Sunshine Coast," said Jackson.

"So, we see PODS as a way we can start to reverse that trend because when you have a centre of excellence, where you bring in universities and students and people from all over the world, you're sure to attract more young families and we need that to keep our schools going."

Jackson said the RLLS is close to signing a memorandum of understanding with Simon Fraser University.

He also announced plans to resurrect a diving school to be be run out of PODS — the Jim Rossi School of Diving.

Jim Rossi ran Capilano University's diving school, now closed, and was an RLLS director until he died earlier this year.

Jackson described Rossi's death as a great loss for his friends and students.

"He was such a brilliant mentor and such a fascinating man," said

Jackson.

"He just encouraged people, kids in particular, to take up a whole new role in life and he changed the lives of so many young children."

Jackson then introduced architect Jeremy Deutscher of Deutscher Architecture Inc.

Deutscher is responsible for the conceptual design and artwork for PODS.

"A good chef can't cook a great

meal unless he has great ingredients and that's one thing we have to give a round of applause to Michael (Jackson) for because he gave me the great ingredients," said Deutscher.

"The first one was a research centre.

"The next is a strong connection to nature and he said that time and time again, that this building, when people come there, they have to feel recon-

nected to nature in a new way.

"He also wanted something iconic
— he told me he wanted the Sydney
Opera House for the Sunshine Coast."

Deutscher said he had a mentor who instilled in him a passion for "sustainability and looking to architecture to really inspire people and push towards a carbon-neutral future."

Deutscher showed a building he designed at UBC built with crosslaminated timbers and structural wood panels.

"It can go up four times faster than concrete and is moving us away from a resource that is very carbondemanding," said Deutscher.

"When Michael first came to me it was all about innovation and CLT was the first thing that came to mind because it is such an innovative product and you're using something that is renewable and abundant in BC."

But PODs will be more than just an iconic building.

"We didn't just want this to be an aquarium," said Deutscher.

The Restaurant at Painted Boat, packed with PODS supporters on Dec. 3.

"For this to survive on the Sunshine Coast, it needs to be flexible and it needs to take on different roles.

"So, a restaurant, musicals, aquarium, day camps for schools — it needs to be flexible."

It also still needs to be built and it's no coincidence the premiere of "PODS Away" also kicks off what must be an intensive fundraising campaign if it is to be built by 2020.

Diana Rae is the treasurer of the RLLS and, as number cruncher for PODS, it fell on her to make the "ask." "We all love this idea but what we

really need now is to make this happen, and we need money to do it," said Rae.

"So if you know anybody."

Rae has lived in Pender Harbour since 1980 and thinks PODS would revitalize the community.

"I've seen the ebb and flow but I've never seen such a downturn in my 35 years here," said Rae.

"It's always been a commercial fishing and forestry and tourism-based place but this has the potential to make this a whole new way of living here that would benefit all ages of people."

Jackson ended the evening by congratulating the board for getting this far and describing the level of support he's received for PODS.

"There are so many people interested in helping to get this thing off the ground that, honestly, I don't think \$10 million is that much."

By early 2017, the society must raise over \$2 million to purchase the property.

If that is accomplished, completion and possession is set for March 31.

Jackson said they have raised 20 per cent of the amount so far.

# New Testing and Disposal Requirements for Materials that May Contain Asbestos Now In Effect

A wide variety of building materials in the home may contain asbestos. These materials are not hazardous if left intact, but if disturbed, they can release asbestos fibres into the air which are a serious health hazard when inhaled.

Before conducting a renovation or demolition, have a qualified company test for and safely remove any materials containing asbestos.

To protect worker safety, new asbestos testing requirements (and disposal procedures should material contain asbestos) are now in effect.

Asbestos testing is now required for the following materials:
Ceiling tiles, Cement (Transite) panels, Drywall joint compound (testing already required), Fire retardant cement board, Flooring: vinyl tiles and linoleum sheet flooring; flooring adhesive, Stucco,

Textured ceiling and coatings, Vermiculite (no testing required, contains asbestos)


If materials test negative, deliver to Sechelt Landfill or Pender Harbour Transfer Station accompanied by negative test results within 6 months of test. If materials test positive, special preparation and disposal requirements are required. Contact a qualified company before work commences.

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# 2016 SCRD year in review

It is astounding how quickly time seems to pass these days.

2016 was an eventful year; here is quick look back at a few of the major events.

# AREA A OFFICIAL COMMUNITY PLAN REVIEW

Our very strong review committee released the first draft of the revised official community plan in September and a community information session was held in November.

The approximately 80 people who attended thought the revised plan was well presented.

Several constructive comments were received and will be considered by the committee before presentation to the SCRD board and the subsequent public hearing scheduled in early 2017.

#### **DOCK MANAGEMENT PLAN**

The Barry Penner report issued in February provided a balanced, thorough and reflective view of the concerns raised regarding the draft dock management plan for Pender Harbour.

The ministry said it will undertake further environmental and archaeological studies related to Pender Harbour before finalizing the draft dock management plan.

These studies may take up to a year to complete.

Existing Pender Harbour dock

tenures have been extended for two years while the environmental and archaeological studies are undertaken.

I continue to communicate with the ministry as it is important that the province follow through on their stated commitment to inform and engage further with the public and Shíshálh Nation before finalizing the plan.

#### LOOKING FOR COST SAVINGS AND KEEPING TAXES LOW

While there were some unavoidable costs during the 2016 budget, we managed to hold the average overall tax increase for the entire regional district to 1.5 per cent.

This translated to an average regional residential tax decrease of 0.73 per cent.

Area A fared better than the aver-

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age with a smaller overall tax increase (0.14 per cent) and, for the first time in a long time, a residential tax decrease of 2.73 per cent.

The coming year has presented a whole new set of cost pressures so the challenge will continue.

#### **COAST-WIDE REGIONAL ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT**

The Sunshine Coast regional economic development organization has been formed, a board of directors has been appointed, they have incorporated as a non-profit society and they have been meeting to set up the structure of the organization.

The three municipalities on the Coast and the SCRD have approved funding of about \$300,000 per year.

SCREDO has released its strategic to the public so the organization is now up and working.

#### **WATER ISSUES**

While we were comparatively fortunate in our area with respect to the drought conditions this past summer, the residents on the Chapman supply system, who make up approximately 85 per cent of the residents on the Sunshine Coast, were faced with stage 3 restrictions for a time.

Much work was done in planning projects and strategies including an

AAP, loan authorization, and environmental studies to enable further drawdown at Chapman Lake, land expropriation to allow access to the intake structure, investigation of other water supplies, and the installation of universal metering to conserve water.

#### **WALKWAY PROJECTS:** MADEIRA PARK, GARDEN BAY **AND EGMONT**

Significant work has been done on the Madeira Park project, and the walkway along the lake between the clinic and Lagoon Road at Lily Lake Village has been completed.

With great co-operation from the landowners at Lily Lake, the last piece, connecting Tyner Park and the lake walkway has just been finished.

Work on the Madeira Park business area roadsides and the Garden Bay and Egmont walkways has been halted at the end of the engineering stage due to a technical issue with the Ministry of Transport regarding the use of SCRD gas tax funds.

Hopefully the issue will be resolved soon, enabling work on those sections to proceed this spring.

In closing, I wish everyone a happy, healthy and prosperous New Year.

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



A toast to her with eggnog (her home-made version was sinfully scrumptious) would be a festive tribute.



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# Pender Harbour fire protection turns 50 in 2017

With the coming of 2017, the Pender Harbour fire protection district and the Pender Harbour volunteer fire department will mark the 50th anniversary of their founding.

Prior to this, Pender Harbour had been well served by the Pender Harbour volunteer fire brigade.

At a meeting on May 15, 1967, the PHVFB voted to dissolve and turn over its assets to the newly formed Pender Harbour fire protection district.

Back in 1962, it had become obvious that Pender Harbour needed a fire truck and a new source of funding would have to be found.

In the past, funds had been raised by going door to door but the department did not want to spend all its time raising funds to operate.


The earliest firefighting vehicle was the nearest boat that a portable pump could be placed on.

As most places in Pender Harbour were built along the waterfront at the time, this was a workable strategy.

If the fire was inland the first available car became the fire truck.

A portable pump was borrowed from the Columbia Coast Mission along with a few lengths of hose.

It was decided to investigate the process of incorporating a fire protection district and in May, 1967, the Pender Harbour fire protection district

and volunteer fire department were formed.

The PHVFD looks forward to celebrating its history in 2017.

It should be noted that a lot of this history has been put together by reviewing old minutes, photo albums, memorabilia and old newspapers.

Some interviews have been conducted but, unfortunately, many of the original Pender Harbour firefighters are no longer with us.

We have also lost contact with many former members.

Now, those bits of historical importance can be viewed online also.

The PHLHS recently acquired museum-quality software, Past Perfect, to catalogue its growing collection and invites the public to visit its website at www.penderharbourliving-heritage.ca.

To find the archived material, visit "collections" at the top and then "digital collection."

Options allow for random viewing or a "click and search" function, both easy ways to start.

If you don't see an item which you have loaned or donated to the society, chances are it has not yet been catalogued.

Check back often as items are catalogued weekly.

If you can identify any "unknown" people, places, dates or find any errors, please let the society know.

The digital collection was made possible through the support of many people who have contributed items, time and/or money.

The P. H. Women's Connection group initially helped get the book, *Women of Pender Harbour: Their Voices, Their History*, underway.

Published by the Pender Living Heritage Society in 2010, the book provided the start of what later became the PHLHS archives.

All proceeds from sales of the award-winning book were used to preserve history in the Harbour.

This museum-quality database is the result of some of those proceeds.

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# We're just walking each other home

If you are living with a lifethreatening illness, if someone in your circle is near the end of life, or if you are grieving the death of someone close to you, hospice is here for you.

There are so many unfamiliar things to deal with and emotions get ragged.

Where do you turn?

What do you do when your friends and family don't want to listen anymore but you still need to talk?

The Sunshine Coast Hospice Society has trained volunteers in Pender Harbour who can support you and your family and friends through this journey.

Our volunteers have participated in a rigorous curriculum set by the national Hospice Palliative Care Association.

Everything you tell a hospice volunteer is kept confidential.

Our volunteers offer friendship, a listening non-judgmental ear or a break for the caregiver to get out of the house and know their loved one is safe.

Some people seek out hospice only after a loved one has died and they want to talk to someone who has been through a similar experience.

There is such a relief in meeting with others who have experienced something similar to you, where you don't have to pretend that everything's OK, or worry that you're "not moving on fast enough."

Caron Hawrychuk and Sharon Halford lead an eight-week grief group in Pender Harbour.

While most of us want to die at home surrounded by our loved ones, this is not possible for many families.

The Sunshine Coast Hospice



Society offers two hospice rooms at Shorncliffe in Sechelt, which provides a home-like environment with the benefit of 24-hour nursing care, where family and friends can be with their loved one in those final days.

Hospice volunteers offer respite for families at this time so their loved one is not alone if they don't want to be.

You probably know some or all of our hospice volunteers in the Pender Harbour area: Caron Hawrychuk, Sharon Halford, Krista Maurer, Wendy Haddock and Sharon Crawford.

Perhaps you'd be interested in exploring being a companioning volunteer?

Readers first met *Balandra* and learned of her genesis at the 2008 Pender Harbour wooden boat show (*Harbour Spiel*, July 2008) after which she was to be donated to the SALTS (Sail and Life Training Society), in Victoria.

She was built by the late Collin Hanney and launched in 1945.

Unfortunately, the SALTS's Heritage Shipyard proved to be inundated with boats, and the spars of the tall ships crowded the shed for their maintenance.

SALTS manager at the time, David Eggert, suggested *Balandra* be restored at A&G Boats in Brentwood Bay on Vancouver Island.

And so it was that *Balandra* arrived at the 2009 Wooden Boat Show, fully restored.

I expectantly outlined her future following the boat show in an article, "Balandra's Journey: A Metamorphosis and Safe Haven" (Harbour Spiel, June 2009) documenting her return to Brentwood Bay to be part of the sailing fraternity there there.

Unfortunately, circumstances evolved that prevented that from happening too and I brought her home to Bargain Bay in late 2010.

Now, six years later, it is hard to describe the wave of euphoria that swept over me, when out of the blue, the opportunity arose for *Balandra* to sail to a new home and a new career.

At the age of 71, she is to be the flagship of a newly-evolved sail training program.

The timing could not have been more perfect as I would soon undergo hip replacement surgery and planned to be immobile.

The program is ran by Pacifica Paddle Sports which operates out of Brentwood Bay on Vancouver Island.

Coincidentally, Brentwood Bay is where *Balandra* was first restored in 2009 by A & G Boats.

Peter Harris, CEO of Pacifica Paddle Sports, has a keen interest and appreciation in heritage sailing vessels and he intends to instil that appreciation into sailors of this generation as they learn to sail a classic yacht.

Balandra will be based at the Canoe Cove arm of Pacifica Paddle Sports on the Saanich peninsula.

A website will be set up for the sail training program which will allow others to follow *Balandra's* new adventures.

Serendipitously, I met Peter Harris to discuss the transfer on Collin Hanney's birthday, Aug. 30.

Without any conscious planning, one month later, *Balandra* sailed for her new home on Sept. 27.

That would have been mine and Collin's 40th wedding anniversary.

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#### LEADING UP TO THE LAUNCH

In the intervening 28 days, a series of major hurdles had to be met before she could be launched.

Every step was fraught with uncertainty.

Collin built the whole system for her winter storage in 1969 — the rails, her cradle, a block and tackle system for re-stepping the mast and a power winch to haul the load.

Would it still be strong enough to safely launch her?

Balandra had rested here, sheltered under a carport for six years.

Like magic, sailor friends — old and new — came to help.

Don McLaren stepped up first to expertly check the engine and repair the water pump.

Peter Robson enthusiastically offered his help, first with repairing the concrete supports for the rails, and then going on to become an integral part of the mast re-stepping team, along with Zorro Szabados, Charles Manisto, and Cathy Jenks, and then to be part of her launching.

On Sept. 16, Charles and Zorro were on hand, along with neighbour Julian Craddock, as we eased *Balandra* down her tracks to wait for high tide that evening

Strong southeasters were predicted for the next day.

After her launch, I slept aboard that night and toasted Collin with a glass of champagne to our 30 years of sailing memories before he passed away in 1997.

Peter Harris and crew Sandra arrived on Sept. 26.

Peter Robson and Bill Charlton were on hand to tweak the details of the anchor winch and sails in prepa-

ration for departure the next day.

Just before Peter and Sandra boarded for take-off, we three hugged.

It was a symbol of the exchange of stewardship and a moment I'll hold in my heart forever.

As euphoric as I was for Bal-

andra's future, I was equally euphoric about my hip surgery which has released me into a pain-free future allowing infinite possibilities and adventures to unfold.

As I watched her sail away, I mused that *Balandra* and I were both at a pivotal point in our life journeys.



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
