The SCRD's great betrayal (2010)

Last month the SCRD announced that the Coast's only landfill in Sechelt has a shorter life span than previously thought — less

than 10 years.

CAO Janette Loveys' Feb. 22 report should serve as a starting point for her staff and the SCRD board to set out on a search for a solution.

That will include locating a site to build a new landfill — not an easy task.

It's ironic then, that in 2010, the SCRD board forced the closure of a perfectly good landfill in Kleindale, one their consultant's report predicted had at least 60 years of further viability.

Of the current SCRD board, only Area B's Garry Nohr and Area E's Lorne Lewis took part in the debate that makes their current Chapman Lake water scrap seem cordial.

In 2008, the SCRD was forced to deal with the end of its current phase of landfilling at the Pender Harbour site.

The resulting Sperling Hansen report provided options for the landfill's expansion of 16 and 29 years.

Naturally, the consultants also weighed options for closing the land-fill and maintaining a transfer station (to truck our garbage 50 kilometres to Sechelt), resulting in an eight- to 13-per cent cost savings by doing so.

Despite an SCRD staff report estimate that the Sechelt landfill had only 20 years capacity left, from the first meeting I attended, it was clear the five directors from the south favoured snuffing our landfill.

At the time, Nohr and Lewis were joined on the board by Area A's Eric Graham, Sechelt Mayor Darren Inkster, Area F's Lee Turnbull, Gibsons' Mayor Barry Janyk and Roberts Creek's Donna Shugar.

Oh, the cost.

And what about the danger to the environment?

I wrote in an editorial that "leachate" had become the battle cry of the hysterical after opponents made false claims that the landfill could be "leaching into our watershed" of Garden Bay Lake.

That assertion was refuted by the presence of Mt. Daniel, a Nov. 2009 SCRD staff report and the 2008 Sperling Hansen report itself:

"Overall the system should be able to cope with the western expansion and continue treating leachate at the present standard."

And, by all accounts, the "present standard" was excellent.

But claims of environmental liability fit the narrative of the landfill's opponents and it was trotted out whenever convenient by the board.

But the central argument for closing the landfill and trucking our waste to Sechelt was the fact that the Pender dump was costing money.

Tipping fees at the larger Sechelt landfill created a surplus that offset the cost of maintaining our dump — similar to how Area A's waterfront property assessments ensure we often carry a disproportionate burden in shared functions at the SCRD (like solid waste).

Regardless of cost, I made the point in an editorial at the time that a licensed landfill is something that should be preserved as a long term resource.

Polling of Area A residents indicated we were even willing to pay it alone.

In reply, directors and staff insisted Sechelt needed Area A's garbage to qualify for a fancy methane gas recapture system that would turn it back into energy to be sold to the BC Hydro grid.

As if we yokels weren't already blinded by the sheer greenness of that idea, a late deal sweetener promised a resource recovery centre. The regional district painted a happy picture of transfer station recycling elves separating our waste into reusable resources (for artists and the like), thereby eliminating garbage — and transport trucks — altogether.

Unfortunately, the gas recapture idea was investigated further after our dump was closed and a 2015 SCRD staff report concluded that the "landfill gas to electricity project scope is not found to be economically viable."

And we're still waiting for the resource recovery centre.

At the March 2010 SCRD board meeting, while considering whether to proceed with a referendum (to be paid for by Area A), Janyk suspiciously returned from a short recess and moved to convert the landfill to a transfer station.

I quoted Janyk at an earlier meeting (Nov. 5, 2009), explaining how he felt the board should ignore the wishes of Area A and vote to close the landfill:

"I would prefer the method of explaining to your child why he needs a flu shot."

Though this item wasn't even on the agenda, it quickly passed five to one, with Graham voting against it and Turnbull abstaining because she felt that, "we didn't complete the process on this."

The landfill was lost but as Howard White wrote in a letter to the *Harbour Spiel* (Nov. 2009), the issue had already shifted to something much more serious:

"Local autonomy has been abused over the years but never on an issue of such high profile as closing the landfill and never when local opinion had been stated so strongly."

Now, here we are — the addition of Area A's garbage has pushed us to less than 10 years to site, permit and open a new landfill large enough to accomodate the entire Sunshine Coast.

And thanks to some shamefully misguided politicking, we have no choice but to go along for the ride.

MP Goldsmith-Jones delivers funding in person

Pamela Goldsmith-Jones, Member of Parliament for West Vancouver–Sunshine Coast–Sea to Sky Country, dropped by the Royal Canadian Legion in Madeira Park March 15 to announce two local recipients of recent funding awards.

The Royal Canadian Legion No. 112 received \$25,000 through the New Horizons for Seniors program.

That money will used by the Legion to renovate the washrooms in order to make them more accessible.

Goldsmith-Jones told the 20-plus people in attendance that the RCL No. 112 received the maximum available under this program.

The MP's second announcement came as part of a \$1.3 million federal funding initiative — the Oceans Protection Plan Abandoned Boats Program — aimed at removing

abandoned and derelict vessels from coastal communities.

The Pender Harbour Advisory Council received \$10,000 for the "assessment" of two infamous sunken vessels in Gerrans Bay — the *Kwatna* and the *Lulu Island*.

Goldsmith-Jones acknowledged this funding is only sufficient to assess options for the boats' removal but she said she expects next year's budget will bring funding to complete the project.

Goldsmith-Jones also recognized the hard work of Penny Harrison and Eliza Kinley of the PHAC for submitting excellent applications.

Kinley said at the meeting that they are currently working on submitting funding applications to tackle issues with three other vessels in Gerrans Bay.

Egmonsters and Telus talk 'connectivity'

Six Telus representatives visited Egmont March 19 to discuss connectivity options for the community.

The meeting came after two previous meetings, scheduled in October and November to tackle issues surrounding Egmont's lack of cellular service and high-speed internet, were abruptly cancelled.

Ned Hodaly, Telus general manager for the Sunshine Coast, apologized to the dozen people gathered in the Egmont Community Hall before describing the connectivity issues facing the community.

"We're spending about \$220,000 to upgrade [the telephone service] to fibre from Earls Cove to Egmont," said Hodaly.

"It should improve the quality and the stability of the service for our landline customers in those areas." April 2018 "On the wireless side, we've explored a multitude of options.

That includes considering building a cellular tower, he said but, "the cost of that was significant."

According to Hodaly, the challenge of installing wireless service in the area has much to do with its topography.

"It's not a flat region where we could put in one cell site and it could

cover most of Alberta.

"We could spend hundreds of thousands of dollars and only cover a small area."

A common theme of discussions afterward was the prospect of pursuing federal funding to help solve what is seen as serious safety issue, esecially during the busy summer months.

Notably, not one cell phone went off during the meeting.



Deutscher Architecture

Michael Jackson and the Ruby Lake Lagoon Society presented architect Jeremiah Deutscher's latest design for the proposed Pender Ocean Discovery Station on March 17 and 18 at the Pender Harbour School of Music.

New plans show the Pender Ocean Discovery Station in Irvines Landing will contain much much more than the iconic pod buildings that front its exterior.

On March 17, the Ruby Lake Lagoon Society hosted a "St. Paddy's PODS presentation" at the Pender Harbour School of Music.

Michael Jackson, RLLS executive director, ran though the latest submissions from a team lead by architect Jeremiah Deutscher.

Jackson still aims to open the facility in 2020 and said these latest

plans will be close to the final design.

"This is the third round of design changes and there will probably be just one more now before we have to start setting things in stone because if we don't, we're going to get way behind schedule."

A four-level main building will sit behind the iconic pod-like buildings on the foreshore of Joe Bay.

Contained within will be a caretaker's residence, greenrooms and dressing rooms, a staff kitchen area and a large lobby that will serve as an exhibition space. Occupying much of the top levels will be a 200-seat auditorium with retractable seating to allow it to be used for a variety of events.

"This is the major source of revenue for the whole PODS, said Jackson.

"And the other thing is that it is mainly going to be used for conferences in the winter, not the summer.

"Conferences tend not to happen in the summer."

The auditorium building will also house a two-level parking garage that will accommodate 50 cars.

Jackson said the two parking levels are extremely expensive — costing about \$1.5 million each.

"So we are looking at acquiring another piece of land somewhere else for parking."

With expectations of large crowds in the summer, the PODS plan will see the delivery of most summer visitors by boat from Madeira Park rather than road.

Jackson said this meshes perfectly with their operational plan in

which the public will visit PODS via scheduled tours leaving Madeira Park rather than random drop-in visits.

Below the auditorium building will be the "gallery experience."

Besides housing a dive school, classrooms, mechanical systems and research labs, the gallery will provide high-tech interactive educational experience that follows a series of live tanks tracing the water cycle through habitats ranging from the top of Mt. Caren to the depths of the ocean.

"Each one will be a representative habitat to show how valuable each is in terms of what it provides in ecosystem services," said Jackson.

Three exterior pod-like buildings will each house separate attractions.

The "learning pod" will contain a mini aquarium and interactive displays, the "memory pod" aims to provide visitors with a historical multimedia introduction to the area.

The "gastro pod" will house a two-tier restaurant.

"In one corner of the Gastro pod, we're hoping to have a little micro-

brewery," said Jackson.

Outside will be "a beautiful place to sit," incorporating Nelson Island granite into steps with "some kind of water feature that comes down through it."

Artwork will be displayed throughout the site and Jackson said that is a key focus of PODS — to merge science with art.

"Scientists are absolutely useless at putting messages across," he said.

"You need artists to convey messages that resonate in a pictorial or performance form."

The cutting-edge interactive and multimedia technology planned for this most recent design isn't cheap and Jackson admitted that he expects it to push PODS' cost higher than the original estimate of \$10 million.

That doesn't seem to faze PODS' leader.

"Our experience with talking to potential funding partners is that they don't want to see another research station — they want to see something really different."

Fixed-link advocates still pushing for 'third crossing'

The dream of a fixed link from the Arbutus Coast isn't dead yet.

The *Powell River Peak* reported last month that the Powell River-based Third Crossing Society is pushing for a new route that would connect Powell River to Squamish.

The plan for the proposed "Ashlu River route" includes connecting to a

deepwater port at St. Vincent's Bay in Hotham Sound.

The highway would carry on up Jervis Inlet and cross it at its narrowest point at Prince of Wales Reach.

A 1.5-kilometre suspension bridge would connect the road to the opposite side where it would follow the Vancouver River up to a 1,311-metre summit.

The route would then follow forestry roads along the Ashlu River into Brackendale.

A previous route from Powell River was investigated by consultants R. F. Binnie and Associates in a report commissioned by the Christy Clark government and completed in 2017.

It estimated a route that travelled overland behind Powell River, skirting Jervis Inlet altogether, would cost between \$4- and \$4.4 billion.

The report also investigated the less expensive land-based route along Howe Sound and a bridge option across Howe Sound.

Though the report concluded both routes were "technically feasible," high construction and operating costs "made their overall feasibility less clear"

Images released of suspects' vehicle in Rona theft

If you know someone with a white sedan who recently came into some new tools, you are urged to contact Sunshine Coast RCMP.

As reported last month, on Feb. 7 at approximately 10 p.m., a break and enter occurred at the Rona store in Madeira Park.

The theft resulted in several thousand dollars worth of tools being stolen, including brand names like Milwaukee, Dewalt and Makita.

Sunshine Coast RCMP said the suspects were captured on security cameras but were well disguised.

Both suspects are believed to be male.

One has a medium build approximately five foot ten to five foot 11 and

the second, five foot seven to five foot nine

The suspect vehicle is described as a white or light-coloured sedan and appears to be a late-90s model Toyota (possible Tercel or Corolla).

It is a four-door, with a distinct

light-coloured "B" pillar between the driver's window and the rear passenger window.

IMPAIRED DRIVER

On March 5, police witnessed a southbound vehicle on Highway 101 near Secret Cove cross over the double solid yellow centre lines, at times by almost half a car, or crossing over to the wrong lane completely.

Police attempted to stop the vehicle which then accelerated, passed another vehicle, and continued in an erratic manner until police stopped it in West Sechelt.

The driver, who was determined not to be impaired by alcohol, was found to be impaired by prescription

medications and other medical issues.

The driver was taken to hospital for assessment and issued violation tickets for failure stop for police and crossing a double solid line.

Police have also requested a driver's medical fitness review.

The lone driver and occupant of

Local authors and publishers vie for BC Book awards

Once again, the Sunshine Coast literati are well represented at BC's annual book awards.

The shortlists for the 2018 BC Book Prizes were recently announced, with Madeira Park publishers Harbour Publishing and Douglas & McIntyre garnering three nominations.

Both publishers have been recognized in the Bill Duthie booksellers' choice category, awarded to the publisher and author of a book published in 2017 that is most successful in terms of public appeal, initiative, design, production and content.

BC and Yukon booksellers determine the winner of this category by ballot vote.

Titles in the running for this

prestigious prize include *Hello Hump-back!* (Harbour Publishing) by Roy Henry Vickers and Robert Budd.

Also vying for the bookseller's award is *Spindrift: A Canadian Book of the Sea* (Douglas & McIntyre).

Edited by Michael and Anita Hadley, Spindrift collects the best maritime writing from Canada's most significant literary voices into one volume.

Another Douglas & McIntyre title, *Dirty Windshields: The Best and the Worst of the Smugglers Tour Diaries*, a rock and roll memoir by bestselling author and CBC broadcaster Grant Lawrence, is also up for the same prize.

Ruby Lake author Theresa Kish-

kan is shortlisted for the Hubert Evans non-fiction prize for *Euclid's Orchard and Other Essays* (Mother Tongue).

Halfmoon Bay's Caitlin Press (and author Andrea MacPherson) received a nomination for the Ethel Wilson fiction prize for *What We Once Believed*.

The BC Book Prizes, awarded in seven categories, annually celebrate the finest books published in the province.

Recipients of the awards receive a prize of \$2,000 and a certificate.

This year's winners will be announced at the 34th annual Lieutenant-Governor's BC Book Prizes gala on Friday, May 4 at the Pinnacle Hotel Harbourfront in Vancouver.







That means that if the total SCRD budget spending remained the same as 2017, the apportionment would result in increased taxation of 0.22 per cent overall and a

decrease of 0.24 per cent residential property tax.

So, basically, insignificant changes in taxation amounts are caused by the change in assessments for Area A.

The result of the budget will be an overall tax increase of 4.35 per cent for the SCRD considering all property classes.

For Area A, the overall increase is 3.68 per cent when considering all property classes and 3.21 per cent when considering residential classes, the lowest in the regional district.

It must be remembered that these are all averages, so if your property assessment increased above the average your taxes will increase more than the average tax increase for the area.

The overall SCRD budget for

2018 is \$55.5 million, consisting of \$37.83 million operating and \$17.52 million capital.

To put the number into perspective, the 2017 total budget total was \$53.45 million, with approximately the same ratio of operating and capital.

By far the largest portion of this year's capital budget is for water and wastewater infrastructure, which accounts for 71 per cent of the total.

A large chunk of that percentage is made up by the carryover of the Area A water grants totalling close to \$3 million, and the Chapman expansion totalling some \$5 million.

New water projects include universal metering for the District of Sechelt at \$5.9 million, Chapman water treatment upgrade at \$610,000,

These projects are funded mostly from long-term borrowing, grants and also from reserves.

Other larger infrastructure capital costs included transit, ports, Sechelt landfill and Pender transfer station improvements.

Also, the islands cleanup service was extended to include Nelson Island, something the residents there have been requesting.

These projects were mostly funded from reserves and taxation.

The budget deliberations considered a total of 65 projects and most were approved, some with amendments.

Also considered were stakeholder requests such as libraries, Sunshine Coast Tourism, chambers of commerce and Pender Harbour Health Centre, totalling some \$357,000 in new requests and of those about \$71,000 were approved.

I am pleased to say that some small increases were requested by stakeholders in Area A and they were all approved.

A bit of a reprieve was realized with the Sunshine Coast Regional Hospital District taxation as a scheduled debenture debt reset occurred during 2017 resulting in a reduction in

interest payments producing a reduction of \$300,000 in required taxation.

The last of the \$46.7-million hospital project is complete with the opening of the \$6.5-million phase three renovation.

The SCRHD share of the \$46.7 million was \$16.2 million, for which a portion remains outstanding as long term debt.

PROGRESS ON DERELICT VESSELS

MP Pam Goldsmith-Jones attended the legion in Madeira Park to announce, among other items, two \$5,000 grants to the P. H. Advisory Council for the assessment to remove two derelict vessels in Gerrans Bay south of Dusenbury Island (the sunken one and the one on the shore).

We all need to thank the advisory council and, in particular, Eliza Kinley and Penny Harrison, who answered my call and formed the committee spearheading the grant application.

We all appreciate what they have accomplished and are grateful that they have continued their work and have submitted more applications.

Our bus drivers have informed us that too often people are driving right by without stopping while children are trying to cross the street.


The most notable and dangerous bus stops are the stops on the highway heading north.



After 31 years, the Madeira Park hamburger stand is hauled away

Whatever you called it: the Tiki Hut, Frances's, Willa's, the Hamburger Stand, Tony's or Bud-A Bing Burgers, that venerable old trailer—renowned for serving up the best burgers in town for the last 31 years—is gone.

The iconic little shack has been replaced with a fancy new unit, sparkling with a stainless steel kitchen, ample room for staff and air conditioning.

It was originally used as a mobile Kiwanis Club cook-shack until IGA owner Morley Luscombe and his butcher brought it to the Madeira Park Shopping Centre in May of 1977.

Its first home was in the parking lot by the ball diamond across from the IGA entrance.

Luscombe hired Frances Laijlar to run it and she bought it from him less than a year later, renaming it Frances's Hamburger Stand.

Laijlar ran the burger shack for 21 years until she sold it to Willa Schroeder in 1998.

In November 2004, Tony Mc-Mullen and the Massulo brothers (Oak Tree Market) partnered to purchase

the hamburger stand and to carry on the burger tradition.

Donated to the Sunshine Coast Rod and Gun Club, the trailer still has the original grill, estimated to have cooked over 285,000 hamburgers.

That's over 71,000 pounds of ground beef — or 300 cows.

Had those cows lived out there lives, they would have been responsible for emitting 66 million litres of methane and 694 million litres of carbon dioxide into the atmosphere.

It proves, once and for all, that eating hamburgers is our environmental responsibility.



Understanding chronic pain

Remember the last time you stubbed your toe?

You may have grimaced in response to the sensation or called out words that aren't in your everyday vocabulary.

Stubbing your toe, biting your tongue or touching a hot stove are examples of acute pain.

This type of pain doesn't last long and when the injury heals, the pain stops.

Chronic pain is different from acute pain in that it lasts beyond the usual healing and recovery time.

It is usually defined as pain that persists longer than three to six months and can vary in intensity from mild to severe.

It may be felt in one area of the body or several areas all at once.

Chronic pain can be caused by a chronic disease such as arthritis or spinal stenosis.

It can have no known cause such as, for example, chronic back pain or neurologic pain.

Studies have shown that approximately 17 per cent of Canadians aged 15 and over live with chronic pain which makes it very likely you, or someone you know, is experiencing chronic pain.

Chronic pain affects a person's quality of life and can interfere with daily activities and family dynamics.

It can also interfere with a person's ability to work.

Poor sleep and insomnia are often experienced by those with chronic pain.

Because chronic pain is frequently long-term, it can lead to additional symptoms such as fatigue, stress,



anxiety, and reduced physical activity.

These additional symptoms can make the pain feel worse.

This cycle of pain combined with these additional symptoms can greatly affect how a person feels every day.

It can be hard to stay happy and optimistic when feeling the effects of chronic pain.

Managing chronic pain can be frustrating and difficult.

The following are some tips to living with chronic pain:

- Learn ways to manage stress so you can better cope with pain;
- Learn meditation and deep breathing exercises to aid relaxation;
- Cut back on caffeine and alcohol, which can affect sleep quality;
- Keep a pain journal and track activities and pain level;
- Find activities or interests that help distract you from the pain;
- Speak to your health care provider about pain management options;
- Seek out alternative therapies including massage, chiropractic treatments, and acupuncture, and
- Don't suffer alone talk with someone who can support you or join a group with others who are experiencing chronic pain.

The Pender Harbour Healt Centre offers a free seminar aimed at supporting members of the community to live a healthy life with chronic pain.

This seminar runs a few times a year and provides knowledge and skills to those who are experiencing chronic pain.



(Continued from Feb. 2017 issue)

When the news came that Japan had declared war, we had just moved from Beaver Creek and our houses were still on floats tied up in the bight just east of Egmont Point.

I remember telling Ted (Hiyashi)

the news and his answer was, "This is bad for us."

It was afterwards that the government told all of the Japanese on the Coast that they should be prepared to be evacuated at any time.

Time passed and nothing happened.

Maybe it was thought only those under suspicion would be taken.

Local people could report noth-

ing suspicious against the Japanese except that Ted was interested in radio and photography.

It was said that Maeda Sr. had gone back to Japan and had been called up because he was in the naval reserve.

About 2 a.m. one morning, something crashed into our float.

My husband awoke with imprecations on the head of the one who bashed his boat into our float.

A loud knocking came at the door.

There stood Ted.

"The police have come for us and we have to be ready to go at 8 a.m.

"Please tell everybody in the bay to come down to the store before we go so we can straighten up and arrange for the payment of their accounts."

One of them was making the rounds on the other side and another had gone through the Chuck to Doriston, making the same request.

It was said that Nakashima, a real old-timer, had lit out in his boat but was soon found and taken into custodv.

The next day, we went down to the store but they were all gone.

We had forgotten it was daylight saving time.

It was something new then and everyone in Egmont were ignoring it because the tides and fish knew nothing about these man-made laws.

All the Japanese from here and Pender Harbour were put aboard the Union Steamship that morning and sent to Vancouver.

They were not allowed to take more than they could carry.

All of their boats, some of them very fine ones, were towed willy-nilly to the Fraser River where they were

eventually sold for whatever they would bring.

It was said that when Kay Hatashita received the news that she had to be prepared to leave by 8 a.m. the next morning, she tore upstairs and flung open the cupboards and drawers trying to decide what to take and then she sat weeping in the middle of the floor.

As she said afterwards, she had just begun to make the store pay and was very proud of that fact.

It was some time since she had taken stock so she had no idea of its value.

It was only a long time after and with a great deal of pleading that she was allowed to come back alone and take stock.

By that time, stuff had already been sold from the store.

What has since become of the rest of the Japanese families I do not know but Ted and Kay are now married and in the photography business back in Ontario.

Some of the finest pictures of the Chuck were taken by Ted.

He camped out on one of the islands in the middle of the rapids for six hours in order to get them.

He said at the height of the run, the noise was so terrific that the whole island seemed to vibrate.




