editorial

Back to boom

For some time now, local homeowners have pined for the return of the pre-2008 real estate boom.

All signs indicate

it's back.

Between January and April of this vear, 42 detached homes sold in Pender Harbour.

That's a 117% increase from the same period in 2015.

In April, the median number of days a house sat on the market was 21 with an average price of \$678,000.

With only 80 listings in Pender Harbour, demand has overtaken supply.

Cue the cries of overdevelopment.

Cue fears that growth will jeopardize what we love about the top end of the Sunshine Coast.

I don't think so

When I look at the list of looming threats to our community, overdevelopment still trails behind rattlesnakes.

For eight years we have witnessed a move towards more seasonal residency and it can be partially chalked up to a shortage of year-round industry.

According to the Sunshine Coast Community Foundation's 2014 Vital Signs report, the building trades is the Sunshine Coast's third highest employment sector, accounting for 1,530 jobs.

Only retail trade and health care beat it out.

But not here.

In Area A, construction and tourism surely surpass both.

So, let's welcome what seems to be a resurgence of interest in this place.

But in order to maintain a vibrant community, someone has to live here through the winter.

That caretaker population has thinned out in recent times, while those who can escape to Arizona or West

Vancouver to wait out spring.

I'm not judging.

If I had my way, the Harbour Spiel would only publish May to October in Pender Harbour, that is.

The winter issues would still be available but on Kauai's north shore.

The headlines in the *Hanalei Spiel* might sound eerily familiar to local readers:

"No work in off-season."

"Tourists drive funny."

"Haoles ruining everything."

As a homeowner, I can now say I have witnessed a complete cycle of boom and bust when it comes to the real estate market.

Others have experienced the cycle many times and accept it.

They know the exceptional qualities that keep the locals here will always bring new ones.

But let's also acknowledge that we face significant challenges.

Our rocky, marine-constrained geography ensures that, for the population centres of Egmont, Garden Bay and Madeira Park, parking will continue to pose a challenge to growth.

How will Madeira Park accommodate cars that will deliver an audience to the proposed marine science centre's 200-seat amphitheatre?

We now have a rental housing crisis — rentals are rarer than someone who isn't related around here.

If you visited Craigslist a year ago, you would have found a bounty of rental homes.

Now, a big chunk of the listings are from people needing a place to live.

The homes being built or renovated aren't those that typically land on the rental market and often sit empty for much of the year.

Yes, we now have employment but nowhere for the employed to live.

But I think that's better than the reverse.



Area A official community plan nearing a first draft

The SCRD and the Area A official community plan advisory group are close to releasing a first draft of the Area A OCP.

SCRD senior planner Andrew Allen has been guiding the 15-member group through the process since April 2015.

"We have an OCP for the area and it's treated us well over the years," said Allen.

"So, the idea was not to blow it up and start again but simply to refresh and modernize and, in some cases, improve on the existing plan."

The group has met repeatedly over the last year to tackle issues associated with 21 sections included so far in the first draft:

- Community involvment;
- Cultural and historical setting;
- Upland environment;
- Aquatic environment;
- Geotechnical assessment areas;
- Lake watershed protection areas, marine study area and marine upland study area;
- Residential, comprehensive residential, rural residential and country residential lands;
 - Agricultural lands;
 - Tourist commercial areas;
 - Commercial areas:
 - Industrial areas:
 - Land transportation system;
 - Marine transportation system;
 - Public use areas;
 - Institutional areas;
 - Public utilities:
 - Domestic water service areas;
 - Sewage disposal areas, and
 - Solid waste disposal services.

"I make recommendations to the committee, they make recommendations back to me on how to improve," said Allen.

"Then I was writing the chapters

one at a time, distributing them for review before we'd move on to the next."

Allen said new to this OCP will be a "community vision" statement to guide the document's creation:

"Our vision is to foster a unified, vibrant, healthy, safe, and diverse community within our unique lake, mountain, and marine coastal landscapes that balances economic opportunities with the natural environment."

Allen said the group is currently reviewing a rough draft of the results of this process and hopes to have a first draft by late summer or early fall.

At that time it will be presented at a public meeting to provide an opportunity for community members to offer input before moving ahead with further refinements.

"I absolutely anticipate changes coming out of the first draft," said Allen.



EXPLOSIVES DISPOSAL UNIT

Around 6:15 p.m. on April 21, a resident in the 11800-block of Sunshine Coast Highway, Madeira Park, reported hearing several loud explosions.

It was confirmed that the RCMP explosives disposal unit was in the area disposing of some explosives that had been collected by the Sunshine Coast RCMP.

The explosives disposal unit attends on an as-needed basis when items such as ammunition, fireworks or flares are turned over to Sunshine Coast RCMP.

Water restrictions focus on odd and even addresses

Stage one outdoor water use restrictions came into effect on May 1.

These restrictions apply to all SCRD water customers on the Sunshine Coast and are guided by the region's drought management plan.

Outdoor water use restrictions are part of the SCRD's goal to reduce water consumption per person by 33 per cent by 2020.

Sprinklers, soaker hoses, irrigation systems and other watering devices can be used for outdoor watering according to the stage one schedule:

- For even addresses, outdoor watering is allowed Tuesday, Thursday and Sunday from 7 a.m. to 9 a.m. and from 7 p.m. to 9 p.m.
- · For odd addresses outdoor watering is allowed Monday, Wednesday and Saturday from 7 a.m. to 9 a.m. and from 7 p.m. to 9 p.m.

Rain sensors are required on all irrigation systems to prevent watering in the rain.

Low-flow and low-pressure drip

irrigation systems are exempt from the watering restrictions because they are water-conserving systems.

This exemption is particularly useful for the agricultural community.

Hand held hoses with shut-off devices can be used anytime for watering.

Permits are available for watering beyond the allowable times to establish new lawns (seed or sod).

Permits are only available during stage one outdoor water use for a period of 21 days and are available at the SCRD Field Road office at a cost of \$35.

Campfire only burning ban now in effect

A Sunshine Coast-wide burning ban has gone into effect until further notice.

In a community mailout, the Pender Harbour Fire Protection District warns only "screened barrels and small campfires (0.5 metres in any direction) are permitted except when

climatic conditions require a total burning ban."

The Coastal Fire Centre reports seven fires have already been recorded in our geographical area this year and all were caused by people.

Of these, two Sunshine Coast fires were reported on May 17 — one near Dakota Ridge and another in Jervis Inlet near Malibu.

Both have now been extinguished.

From the May 6 edition of the Coastal Fire Centre's Wildfire News:

"With about 70 per cent of the wildfires in the Coastal Fire Centre last year caused by humans, we are once again urging everyone to adhere to any open burning prohibitions and use extreme caution wherever open fires are allowed."

The Coastal Fire Centre covers an area west of the the Coast Mountain Range, the Sunshine Coast, the Lower Mainland, Vancouver Island, the Gulf Islands and Haida Gwaii.

April Tools crowns new champions

Something shifted at this year's running of the April Tools Wooden Boat Building competition.

For the 15th year, the volunteer organizers had to come up with a novel twist to challenge the participants, many of whom have taken part a number of times before.

After 14 years of forcing participants to turn a limited supply of materials into catamarans, stand up paddleboards or even paddlewheelers, the volunteers who run the event have hinted that it's getting harder to come up with new ideas.

But there wasn't any evidence of that on April 30 when participating teams learned they would receive some strips of doorskin, plastic sheeting, a tiny bit of lumber and some duct tape to build... a coracle.

It's likely few contestants even knew what a coracle was until the competition but they do now.

A coracle is a small, oval basket and skin boat traditionally used in Wales and parts of western and south west England, Ireland and Scotland.

The frame is built using wooden strips over which animal skin or some other waterproof material is stretched over in order to make it buoyant.

The coracle is typically intended for one person who paddles with a sculling stroke at the front of the craft for propulsion.

From the outset, spectators could predict that not every team would complete the race around the docks at the Madeira Park Government wharf — and they were right, as many didn't even make it to the start line.

Every year, the moment of truth comes when contestants put down

their tools and try out their design for the first time.

If the unmistakable sound of snapping door skin strips wasn't a clear sign of a particular coracle's lack of integrity, its paddler's chilly swim back to the beach surely was as many of the little boats had to be pulled from the water in a sodden mess of plastic and wood splinters.

They were the lucky ones as those teams that did make it to the start line were about to take part in one of the slowest and most physically arduous races in recent memory.

In the first heat, a team that has won April Tools more times than any other, the Garden Bay Fire Hall's Fireflies, were beaten by old rivals the Cheap Oars who went against the suggestion of organizers and double manned their boat with traditional paddling on the side.

It was a sign the Fireflies could be beaten and the other competitors took notice.

In the next heat, another double

Behind them came The Cheap Oars followed by Persephone to take third place.


The Madeira Park and Garden Bay firehall team both finished but failed to crack the top three, likely for the first time in the event's history.

Catching up with recent SCRD matters

LILLIES LAKE WALKWAY

The new walkway along the west side of Lillies Lake has been almost

complete for some time.

There remains a gap between the completed sections along Lillies Lake and through Tyner Park.

It was originally planned that the sections be joined by a short bridge across the corner of the lake.

The property owners have kindly offered to grant a right of way across the land to join the two sections.

The planning for this section is being finalized and work should be completed by early summer. The developed sections of the walkway have been well used and appreciated by many and completion of the work will only increase its popularity and usefulness as a connection between the Madeira Park business area and the Francis Peninsula/Highway 101 intersection.

EARTHQUAKE PREPAREDNESS

The Insurance Bureau of Canada, Sunshine Coast Credit Union, the Co-Operators and the Sunshine Coast Regional District are sponsoring a Quake Cottage simulator at the Raven's Cry Theatre parking lot in Sechelt on Tuesday, June 7 from 11a.m. to 5 p.m.

The trailer is outfitted to resemble a typical workspace to demonstrate the need to secure various items.

A simulated earthquake will illustrate the importance of securing

cabinets, furniture, TVs, refrigerators, cabinet doors and much more.

Up to three people at a time will be able to feel and see what happens to their environment when an 8.0-magnitude earthquake occurs.

A major earthquake can occur at any time and it's important that everyone plans and take steps to protect themselves.

The Quake Cottage simulator should provide much information and insight so should be very helpful in making your own plans.

ILLEGAL ANCHORING

Across Canada, for some time, there has been an issue with boats and other structures being permanently anchored or left derelict at various beaches, anchorages or moorages.

The problem has been raised

www.scrd.ca 604-885-6800 info@scrd.ca by many communities, including the SCRD and has been the subject of much lobbying of senior governments and many resolutions at Union of BC Municipalities conferences.

Research is currently being done and a bill is in the process of being introduced federally to deal with the issue of derelict vessels.

Pender Harbour has not been immune to the problem.

Lately there have been more and more vessels and assorted structures anchoring, it seems permanently, in Garden Bay.

The practice has raised the concerns of many of the residents.

In some cases the structures are quite large and not appropriate for anchoring since they would be subject to significant wind forces, thereby posing a risk to people and property.

In any case, these structures, such as floats, boathouses and other floating devices are improperly marked for anchoring and, since they are not vessels, undoubtedly have no tenure or permit to be there, so are "in trespass" on Crown land.

I have contacted the Ministry of Forests, Lands and Natural Resource Operations regarding the trespass and the RCMP and Transport Canada regarding the illegal anchoring.

Both are committed to taking action on the structures.

Regarding the "permanently" anchored boats, they are also illegal as they are not obeying laws regarding anchoring with lights and markings.

The RCMP will be looking at enforcement options regarding those.

I am hopeful that the owners of these vessels and structures voluntarily take action to move them to appropriate moorage facilities.

Permanently anchoring on Crown property is not appropriate, not neighbourly and most certainly illegal.





Friends of Caren for 25 years

June 11 will mark the 25th anniversary of the founding of Friends of Caren, a local group formed to push for a park protecting the ancient forests of the Caren Range.

The original intent was to create a park that would extend from Sechelt Inlet across the Caren Range down to the Cheekeye Dunsmuir power-lines above Kleindale in Pender Harbour.

Two forest companies, Terminal Forest Products and Interfor had active logging interests on the Caren Range old growth at the time.

Terminal was waiting to resume logging as soon as the snow left the mountain in 1991 when Friends of Caren announced they had found marbled murrelets, a small threatened seabird, occupying the Caren forests.

Throughout its range along our Pacific Coast, this elusive species breeds only in old-growth forests.

The presence of this seabird, which clearly might be breeding on the Caren, effectively shut down the logging operations of Terminal without any blockades.

Interfor also ceased operations while awaiting word from the BC Forest Service.

The province did not rescind the cutting permits of either company but made it known to Friends of Caren

that they would save any tree with a nest and perhaps one or two others around it.

But logging would eventually resume.

They argued that they wanted a "dynamic" young forest to replace the decadent ancient forests of the Caren.

Not long after the Second World War, the Klein brothers built a road up to the Caren from which they logged two square miles of the forest above the big waterfall visible from Pender Harbour.

They found many defects in the old hemlock trees and barely broke even.

On Aug. 7, 1993, four members of Friends of Caren found the first marbled murrelet nest ever recorded in Canada with a chick inside.

That same year, the group, under the guidance of the late Marian Parker, found a yellow cedar tree stump that was 1,845 years old, a slice of which was loaned to the Iris Griffith Centre and can still be viewed there.

It remains the oldest documented tree in Canada.

The murrelet nest find made ornithological history as people had been looking for a nest of this once plentiful species for more than 100 years.

A subsequent nest was found

Madeira Park 604.883.9551 12390 Sunshine Coast Hwy. and eventually Spipiyus (the Shíshálh name for the murrelet) Provincial Park was created in 1998.

The Friends of Caren still insist the 2,979 hectare park needs to be a shore-to-summit park which would allow recreation and conservation to exist and function side by side.

Now FoC is calling for a much larger park that would serve as a biosphere reserve covering the entire watershed, including diminishing ice-fields and the pristine marine environment of Jervis Inlet.

In 2011, Friends of Caren worked with Sechelt elders to come to an agreement in principle for the biosphere reserve to include sacred areas.

A group calling itself the Jervis Inlet Park Reserve Committee has been formed.

The group seeks support of the Sechelt and Squamish Nations, the federal government, the tourist industry and other stakeholders to set aside a park reserve.

The Jervis Inlet Park Reserve, similar to the model established on Haida Gwaii, would be some 3,000 square kilometres and the second largest conservation and natural resource management area in the Pacific Northwest.

This spectacular area remains virtually untouched and unspoiled by development.

It is unknown to millions who live near its edge.

There are species and vulnerable ecosystems we need to protect like the grizzly bear, the mountain goat, the murrelet and a diverse marine habitat.

Visit the Skookumchuck in Egmont or take a boat trip up to Chatterbox Falls, in famous Princess Louisa Inlet, to get a real idea of what needs your protection. Remember this is a huge land and marine area with exceptional vistas and beauty on our doorstep.

Look for, join and support the efforts of this fledgling group to make this park a reality.

A meeting of Friends of Caren and the Jervis group, open to the community at large, will be held on June 11 to mark the anniversary and talk about the new park reserve.

The meeting and potluck supper will take place from 5 p.m. to 8 pm at the P. H. School of Music in Madeira Park.



Shingles

Shingles is a painful rash caused by the varicella zoster virus (Chicken pox).

The virus stays dormant in your body after you have the chicken pox.

It lives in a nerve root and can become active again causing a shingles outbreak later in life.

Shingles is more common in adults older than 50, but anyone can get it.

It is seen more often in older adults because our immune systems become weaker as we age.

Stressful life events, illness such as diabetes and HIV, and even chemotherapy can also weaken the immune system and cause an outbreak.

SYMPTOMS

Before you develop the rash you might feel like you have the flu, but you will not have a fever.

You may also have a tingling, itching, or burning sensation in the affected area before you see the rash.

The shingles rash looks like red blisters, and usually happens in a strip of skin on one side of your body.

Blisters will pop and crust over.

After the rash is gone some people have strong, long-lasting pain.

This is called post-herpetic neuralgia.

Shingles in or near your eye, or along the side of your nose is very serious as it can cause permanent eye damage.

You cannot pass shingles to another person when you have it.

However, you can pass chicken pox to someone who has not had the virus.

This is rare and only happens if the person touches the fluid from one



of your blisters.

TREATMENT

If you think you have shingles please visit your doctor right away as shingles responds best to treatment when it is caught early.

Your doctor can prescribe antiviral medications that will reduce the duration of your rash and decrease your pain now, and after the rash.

In addition to the antiviral medications, you can take over the counter pain medications like Tylenol to help you while you are sick.

SHINGLES VACCINE

Another thing you can do for yourself is to speak with your doctor about the shingles vaccine.

The vaccine is available to people over the age of 50, and can cut

your chances of getting the rash in half.

If you do still get shingles your rash may not last as long and may not be as painful.

You have less chance of developing serious consequences from shingles, such as post-herpetic neuralgia.

The shingles vaccine costs \$200 and may be covered by your extended health benefits plan.

While you cannot always avoid shingles, you can decrease your chances of an outbreak by getting the shingles vaccine.

If you do get shingles you can shorten your illness and decrease your pain by seeing your doctor quickly to start antiviral treatment.

Early treatment will also reduce your likelihood of having serious long-term effects of the virus.

CHAPTER 28. THE BORDERLAND

I hear so many stories—in the lunchroom or at the Legion or on the road when I get a ride. Walter for example has fished up at the tops of the inlets, where the glaciers creep down to meet the ocean. Up there, he says, it is not like around here.

The inlets reach far into the mountains. It makes for a sort of borderland, Walter says, where different worlds meet. Sometimes they mix and sometimes not, like the two words he uses together. Rain shadow—on one side of the mountain, we get tree frogs and rain forest, but on the other side this is what he tells me—sagebrush and scorpions and rattlesnakes. Sometimes when a storm comes at us across the water, I can see the curtain of rain and I know that soon it will draw over us, and I think of those words, rain shadow, and when it passes over us, everything will have changed.

But I am always wrong. We zip our jackets, the storm passes over and nothing is changed except that the wind is up and there is a bit of chop.

What I am told is that some people will not go up those inlets. They refuse. They have heard the stories about wendigos and sasquatches and ghost bears, and other things that come out of the gorges at night,

or slither up from the dark bottom of the saltchuck, their dorsal spines a white hiss along the black surface.

It is the borderland, so what is true one minute is sure to change, even more than you might normally expect. Deer that lead hunters far into the woods then vanish. Rogue bigfoot that heave rocks down at prospectors, but disappear before a rifle or a camera Ghost houses rotting away in the trees, the people who built them never heard from again

(there are lots of stories about the bush). They went into these forests to build new lives for themselves. They didn't come out.

I have heard that sometimes there are strange lights and sounds up on Mount Hallowell at night, but if

you come close, the lights fly up into the sky. A fisherman told me that one sundown when he was crossing over the deepest part of Hotham Sound, a huge shape glided under his boat. He thought it was a whale, until it turned in the water and he saw its dead black eyes and its pale belly. "I swear it was a Great White," he told me, his eyes wide, "big as a bloody submarine!"

The bush is beautiful from a distance but it doesn't let you in easy, and sometimes if you get in, you want out ASAP. It is a place full of shadows, shadows that whisper there is no place for you here. No light comes from above, only from sideways,

wherever you can find a break in the trees—that light through the trees, it is the ocean, and you must learn to walk toward that light, and walk fast, if you want to be saved.

I would rather look at a postcard of those hills—"Greetings From Beautiful Jervis Inlet, British Columbia"—than go into that borderland,

and find what's in those trees. Sometimes you do not come out. I have heard about them finding boats that are just drifting, radio on, cups of coffee half-finished, nobody on board.


I hear so many stories, and it is hard for me to believe that people would keep telling them if they weren't true.
