

Invasive European green crab arrives in Pender Harbour

According to Fisheries and Oceans Canada, the European green crab (*Carcinus maenas*) "is one of the 10 most unwanted species in the world."

And they're here.

The recent discovery of two males in a shallow mud bay on Francis Peninsula has put the Loon Foundation's (formerly Ruby Lake Lagoon Society) Coastal Waters Monitoring program on high alert.

Each year for the past eight, biologist Jenn Blancard has led 50 to 60 volunteer "citizen scientists" in efforts to monitor the health of 10 segments of the local marine ecosystem.

"We've been proactively monitoring for green crab for two years now," Blancard told the *Harbour Spiel*.

"We didn't know they were around here; we just knew they were moving north."

To keep an eye out for the voracious predator, Blancard and dozens of CWMP volunteers have been setting traps.

"We put them out at low tide because the European green crab is a shore crab — it's not very deep," she said.

These crabs are more active at night so the traps are typically checked the next day.

After two years of successfully *not* finding a green crab, Blancard was contacted by Fisheries and Oceans Canada this past spring after someone found one in Malcolm's Bay (also known as Churchill Bay) on southwestern Francis Peninsula in 2020.

Up to that point, Blancard's team had only tested sites within Pender Harbour but quickly switched their focus and reset their traps on the shallow mud bottom of Malcolm Bay.

Almost immediately, on May 26, they collected two male European green crabs, each 3 to 4 years old, from the exact location of the 2020 sighting.

Blancard said the problem with green crabs is that, like many invasive species, they are a voracious predator.

But, in the case of green crabs, they also have a nasty habit of rooting around muddy eel grass beds searching for soft shell clams.

As they do that, they literally rip out eel grass.

"In Boundary Bay and other places, they have had huge impacts and have killed off entire sea grass beds," said Blancard.

Blancard describes eel grass beds as the "nursery of the sea" because they provide habitat for a huge variety of species that depend on them for food and shelter.

Their productivity makes eel grass beds crucial habitat for many of the species and it's exactly why the green crab likes it there — there's plenty of food.

Though eel grass is collateral damage, the effects the crab is having

elsewhere signal huge consequences for ecosystems within the Salish Sea as their numbers grow.

According to DFO, green crabs were first found in Canadian waters in 1951 in southwest New Brunswick and have since expanded to many other locations in Atlantic Canada.

The species arrived in B.C. likely through larval transport, between

Blancard said that, for some reason, the crab bypassed the Strait of Georgia at first and established itself in Washington State, on the west coast of Vancouver Island and around BC's north coast.

Since Blancard's discovery in May, another sighting of a green crab was recorded in Ladysmith, making it likely that the crab is now becoming established throughout the Salish Sea.

Blancard said it is inevitable that more will be found locally.

"On the East Coast, they've been there for a long time and they've just started using them as bait in lobster traps," she said.

"They've seen some of the habitat start to recover as they've been targeted commercially."

As her team spreads out in search of the nasty crustacean, Blancard welcomes tips from those who think they might have found a green crab but she cautions against killing them in case they are misidentified.

Blancard said green crabs can be confused with others like the northern kelp crab (*Pugettia producta*).

Rather than their colour, Blancard said the European green crab's defining feature are five distinctive "teeth" or peaks found on either side of the crab's carapace, from their eye to the widest point.

Red rock crabs (*Cancer productus*) have nine per side and Dungeness (*Cancer magister*) have 10 per side.

Identifying features of the European green crab

(source: Fisheries and Oceans Canada)

- Adult size: Up to 10 centimetres.
- Shell is serrated and trapezeshaped, with three spines between the eyes and five on each side.
- Two claws of different sizes.
- Tips of its back legs are pointed, slightly flattened and hairy.
- Colour variable: green, red or yellow.
- Aggressive, territorial and vigorous, can survive out of the water for several days

BC Hydro negotiating the sale of Nelson Island's Sunray property

A 125-hectare property on which Harry Roberts historic Sunray cabin sits may soon be sold.

BC Hydro spokesperson Ted Olynyk told the Harbour Spiel that the Crown corporation is in the midst of negotiating its sale to the shishalh First Nation who he said "expressed an interest" in it.

Since 1989, Margaret Pearson has leased two small waterfront lots on which Sunray cabin and a smaller guest house sit.


Pearson and her late husband Barry restored the cabin and have maintained it to let visitors enjoy its unique design.

Now, Pearson admits the cabin is in rough shape and as the work required to maintain the buildings became too much, she worked to have the properties folded into the existing 4.2-hectare regional park fronting what is known as Roberts Beach.

"The SCRD said that we would have to form a society and promise to tend to the house and the buildings because they didn't want to assume the maintenance," said Pearson.

In 2014, Pearson and her supporters formed the Harry Roberts Sunray Society, with help from the late Billy Griffith.

Pearson said her group was willing to do whatever was needed to maintain the buildings as part of an

expanded park.

"After years, there was nothing, so I sent a letter to the SCRD and, of course, they didn't answer," said Pearson.

"Then I sent a note to BC Hydro asking the same kinds of questions and I got this phone call last week (mid-July) that my lease would soon be terminated and the property sold."

BC Hydro said it is following protocol.

"When we dispose of property, and we determined the property was surplus to our needs, as a Crown corporation there's a certain process we have to follow," said Olynyk.

"We offer it to other Crown agencies and then following that, it is first made available to First Nations.

"And that happens with all properties."

Olynyk said BC Hydro plans to retain approximately 10-12 hecatres acres for the hydro corridor that passes through the middle of the property but the rest of DL 1425, which includes Sunray cabin, would be sold.

"I'm still kind of reeling because it's been 30 years since we've been there and always I thought I could let

"But it doesn't seem like it's going to be."

HARRY ROBERTS AND SUNRAY

Harry Roberts spent half his life in "Sunray" the cabin he built on his 141-hectare Nelson Island homestead.

Roberts finished the cabin in 1938, the date inscribed in the fire-place in the main room.

To withstand southeast storms, Roberts built Sunray low to the ground with the south-facing roof extending only five feet off the ground. Sunray has at least 16 different standing walls, designed in a labyrinthine spiral.

Each room is constructed on a different level, often with dangerously low beams that ambush the unwary adult — Roberts wasn't very tall.

Another example of Roberts' flair for building design — and one often missed by visitors — is his quaint guest cabin.

A short walk from Sunray west along a deer trail a few feet above the high tide line, it too boasts unique features.

Late in his life, Roberts sold the

land to a developer with the provision that he could live there until he died.

Roberts lived in Sunray until the mid-1970s when severe arthritis in his knees made walking impossible.

He was moved to a home in nearby Hidden Basin where he died in 1979 at the age of 95.

After his death, the property was subdivided into 35 lots with four hectares along the beach beside the house becoming SCRD park land.

The property was later purchased by BC Hydro to put the Cheekeye Dunsmuir hydro line through to Texada Island.

Egmont and Pender Harbour assessments explained



Leonard Lee Area A director, SCRD

Presented in June, the SCRD 2020 annual report shows the year's activity versus the first year of

a five-year plan or forecast.

The report, full of data, graphs, and charts, shows "net taxable property value" for Area A at about \$2.05 billion, the second-highest on the Coast.

Assessed values determine the percentage of taxes each area pays for joint services like solid waste, 9-1-1, planning, and general government.

So, Area A pays 15.45%, Sechelt pays 27.83%, Area E (Elphinstone) pays 14.39%, Area B (Halfmoon

Bay) pays 12.36%, Area F (West Howe Sound) pays 11.60 %, Area D (Roberts Creek) pays 10.71 %, and the Sechelt Indian Government pays 1.54%.

When only rural areas are in a service, such as elections, rural planning, and bylaw enforcement, Area A pays 26.40%, Area B, 21.10 %, Area F, 19.82%, Area D, 18.30%, and Area E, 14.39%.

There are services only Area A contributes to, paying 100%, including the P. H. Health Centre, P. H. Aquatic Centre and the P. H. Reading Room.

We are not in all services (the Sechelt and Gibsons arenas and pools, ports, transit, and animal control for example) so, overall, our contribution of 11.5% is less than other areas.

Although our population is equal to or less than most other areas and average house prices are significantly lower than all areas except the SIGD, our total property assessments are higher than everyone but Sechelt's.

Looking at the graph totalling permanently occupied and seasonally occupied homes, we have more homes than shown in the stats, so in spite of a lower average value per home, our total assessed values are second-highest.

Only permanent residents are counted for our population, so when you multiply the number of homes by the number of taxpayers per home (two on average), Area A has the second-highest population in the SCRD, second only to Sechelt.

There is a wealth of information in the annual report including depart-

mental activities and accomplishments, vehicles we bought, money borrowed for water projects, pools, etc. will be paid off, the amount put aside for parks acquisition and more.

WATER METER AAP

Electors, through an alternative approval process, approved financing of up to \$7.25 million over 15 years to install water meters in Sechelt.

Area A residents voted in the AAP, but North and South Pender is excluded from regional water service area taxpayers who will contribute to repaying the loan.

Meters should reduce consumption by 20-30 per cent with leak repairs and more mindful water use, which we saw after meters were installed in rural areas and Gibsons.

Software to automate leak detection and provide usage data is under development, and it could be used in a pay-per-use system.

COOPERS GREEN HALL IS A GO

After years of discussions, planning, and necessary government work, the Coopers Green Hall replacement project, a partnership with the SCRD and Halfmoon Bay Community Association, will proceed.

HBCA has raised \$345,000 so

far, and will continue, but we can expect a property tax increase between \$1.13 to \$2.87 per \$100,000 of assessed value.

RETURN TO THE WORKPLACE

As part of Phase 3 of the BC Restart Plan, the SCRD Field Road offices are returning to pre-pandemic opening hours and directors will gradually move back into the boardroom.

On July 15, director Darnelda Siegers and yours truly were joined by CAO Dean McKinley at the boardroom while the other directors and public attended via Zoom or YouTube.

Zoom technology and recent boardroom media upgrades have made it a seamless experience, proving that a mix of in-person and work-fromhome meetings are not only possible, but desirable.

In-person meetings and work days are extremely valuable when working through complex issues, as written communications are a painfully slow way to resolve complex issues and can't replace the give and take of individual, face-to-face discussions.

Zoom will never replace casual interaction where directors, staff, guests and the public can be actively or passively involved in discussions of emerging issues, as staff are free to chat off the record, you get to hear what others think about issues and

solid friendships are forged, which greatly helps with governance.

So, we have opened our boardroom to the public for committee and board meetings, but participation of staff and elected officials in these meetings will continue to be a mix of virtual and in-person attendance.

Members of the public can attend board meetings or participate from home via the Zoom platform.

Falconbridge Rd. residents oppose Katherine Lake improvements

This letter was sent to the P. H. and Area Residents Association, SCRD, Leonard Lee, Area A Director, and cc'ed to the Harbour Spiel.

Editor,

I am writing in regard to the proposed Katherine Lake improvement, pathway and boardwalk around Katherine Lake.

There are great concerns about the environmental impact this infrastructure will create by increasing future recreational use.

Creating access from all sides will only increase the amount of users year-round.

It will negatively impact the wildlife and shoreline and increase contamination to the water.

The residents do not want any more trail development at Katherine Lake Park.

Katherine Lake beach and campground is jam-packed all summer from opening days in May until it is closed in September.

Its popularity for dog walkers and recreational use continues even through its closure.

The impact of existing recreation on this small lake has already reached its threshold.

The proposed trail and board-walk will invite easy access from all sides of the park.

Users will be able to easily access the trails from Falconbridge Road and increase the amounts of visitors to the lake.

Where will the users park?

Katherine Lake Park cannot host an influx of cars and parking for hikers, nor can Falconbridge Road.

Who will control the campfires and number of recreational users who will be accessing the park year-round?

How do we prevent others from creating their own swim access points that further destroy the shoreline, increase contamination and drive out wildlife? Pender Harbor is a recreational destination.

Instead of densifying small parks why not increase the number of parks?

We are seeing an incredible influx of visitors to the Garden Bay area.

Rows of cars line Garden Bay Lake.

Users remove vegetation from the shorelines, create random campfires and leave behind garbage on a regular basis.

More parks are needed for the amounts of recreational users, not overpopulation of existing sites.

I strongly encourage you to think about the impact this new trail will have and reconsider the proposed project.

Create a new park somewhere else to share the load and conserve Katherine Lake.

Harrison: Hotel Lake faces numerous threats

Editor,

Hotel Lake is just above Irvines Landing, which was established as a Union Steamer stop and hotel by Charles Irvine in 1865.

For the past 50 years of my experience with local government, potable water contamination has been a continuing concern in Hotel Lake.

Today the outlet creek from Hotel Lake flows east and north down to Mixal Lake and then down to Sakinaw Lake before finally meeting the ocean though a short unnavigable creek.

In the 1970s, various subdivisions around Hotel Lake sprang up, accessed by road or small boat from the current domestic water intake near the Irvine's Landing Community Hall (now Sarah Wray Hall).

Ever larger volumes of untreated, contaminated residential groundwater from sewage drain fields around Hotel Lake now flow into Hotel Lake or Garden Bay Lake before draining into Mixal and Sakinaw Lakes.

This is especially so during our wet winters.

Occasional high coliform bacteria counts in Hotel Lake require continuous testing and chlorination of all domestic tapwater by Garden Bay water district (SCRD) staff.

The use of treated wood for docks and toxic boat exhaust are also significant health concerns, but these are largely unregulated.







Record number of sailors vie for top spot at Malaspina Regatta

Great wind and great weather made for a great race.

The start for Garden Bay Sailing Club's annual Malaspina Regatta on Saturday, July 3 saw near perfect conditions.

This year was the 32nd running of the race and saw 39 boats register — the largest turnout in the club's history.

Boats and crews from other clubs in Vancouver, Gibsons and Schooner Cove sailed to Pender Harbour to join in the race. Sunny warm weather this year with stronger than usual winds provided the perfect venue for a longer race course of 18 nautical miles (34 kilometres).

By 10 a.m. Saturday morning the sailboats were circling near the mouth of the Harbour awaiting the five minute countdown for the start.

It is always a stressful time for skippers and crew as they maneuver in close quarters vying for an advantage without crossing the start line before the horn sounds.

When it did, at 10:30 a.m., a clean start saw all boats head out between Martin Island and Pearson Island towards Texada Island and the first mark at Hospital Reef.

The strong winds saw some of the smaller boats fighting to maintain speed in the choppy waves.

Larger boats reveled in the conditions with *Cheeky Monkey*, the eventual winner of the "first across the line" trophy, flying past all others to round the Hospital Reef mark with a strong lead.

The second leg was another beat north into the wind to Ackland's Rock by Quarry Bay on Nelson Island.

Strong winds provided tight racing with several boats swapping

places in the standings.

The tough conditions led to damage on four of the boats causing them to withdraw from the race.

After rounding the buoy at Ackland's Rock, the boats flying spinnakers provided a spectacle of multicoloured sails racing back towards the Harbour.

All boats then rounded Pearson Island and headed once more out to Hospital Reef before making a final second spinnaker run back into the Harbour.

The finish line was inside Pender Harbour this year near Duncan Cove where the committee boat recorded each sailboat's time across the line.

First across the line by a large margin was *Cheeky Monkey* owned August 2021

by Kim Alfreds with the winner of the fastest boat under handicap rules going to John Polglase on *About Time*.

Polglase usually sails out of Vancouver but came to Pender Harbour for the race.

"Overall the course, the organization and the community vibe made for a really fun event," said Polglase.

"We were happy to be part of it and hope to be back next year."

Watch out for creeping cholesterol

If you have high blood cholesterol, you are more likely to have a heart attack or a stroke.

You are at higher risk for high blood cholesterol and heart disease if someone in your immediate family (parent, brother or sister) has high blood cholesterol.

It is especially dangerous for people who smoke and for people with high blood pressure or diabetes.

Extra cholesterol can lead to blocked arteries and if one of those happens to supply blood to your heart, you experience a heart attack.

If an artery that supplies blood to the brain becomes blocked, a stroke occurs.

There is "good" cholesterol and "bad" cholesterol.

The good stuff is called HDL, or high density lipids, and it helps to clear out the bad cholesterol from inside the arteries.

The bad stuff (LDL or low-density lipids) tend to block the arteries.

Getting your blood cholesterol checked requires fasting and a blood test.

You must fast for 10 hours and have no alcohol for 48 hours before the test.


The lab will report on both types of cholesterol, as well as triglycerides.

Triglycerides are the most common fat in the diet and in the blood.

If you have a high reading of LDL or a low reading of HDL, you may have a higher risk of having heart disease.

TOTAL CHOLESTEROL

Ideal: less than 5.2 mmol/L



Borderline high: 5.2 to 6.2 mmol/L

High: 6.2 mmol/L or more

HDL OR "GOOD CHOLESTEROL"

Desired: more than 0.9 mmol/L

LDL OR "BAD CHOLESTEROL"

Ideal: less than 3.5 mmol/L Borderline high: 3.5 to 3.9 mmol/L

High: 4.0 mmol/L or more

TRIGLYCERIDES

Ideal: less than 2.0 mmol/L Borderline high: 2.0 to 3.0 mmol/L High: more than 3.0 mmol/L

If you already have heart disease or other risk factors, your doctor may advise you to lower these levels even further. You need to be responsible for your cholesterol values.

Six ways to control your blood cholesterol:

- Eat less fat and cholesterol.
- Eat more vegetables, fruits, whole grains and legumes.
 - Control your weight.
 - Be active.
 - Don't smoke.
- If you are taking medication for cholesterol, take it as your doctor prescribed it.




