

Not to bother though... we know you're not from here.


I can say all this now because I've had my fill of summer and look forward to the change of pace that fall brings.

### Chapman Creek protesters blare at Wilson in town hall meeting



Blair Wilson had to be quick on his feet to answer a mixture of questions thrown at him at the Pender Harbour Community Hall Aug. 15.

Local folks were outnumbered four to one at a town hall meeting hosted by federal M.P. Blair Wilson Aug. 15.

It was Wilson's last of 10 such town hall meetings held at various locations throughout his riding of West Vancouver–Sunshine Coast–Sea to Sky Country this summer.

The majority of the 40 or so people at the Pender Harbour Community Hall were there to push for action against Western Forest Products' logging activities in Sechelt's Chapman Creek watershed.

Wilson addressed the broader issue of water safety at the start of his address by announcing a proposal he'll soon put forward at the national caucus level for a National Water Strategy.

"The emphasis is on two things. One is mapping out the watersheds we have all across Canada and quantifying where they are and what's the extent of their capacity" Wilson said.

"The second is to come up with some basic standards as to what we are going to allow with respect to development, with respect to logging in those watersheds and set a basic minimum bar saying this is acceptable and this is unacceptable on a national level."

George Connell of Earl's Cove brought the meeting back home when he proposed the idea of pushing for the Skookumchuck Rapids area to be designated as a UNESCO World Heritage site.

"After conversations with some folks at UNESCO, the possibility of having the Skookumchuck area declared a World Heritage site is not unrealistic, as far as they're concerned, on the record," Connell said. "The issue has to be sponsored by a government entity or something like a university."

Wilson indicated he was intrigued by the idea and would like to follow up with Mr. Connell online to pursue it further.

General concerns continued to be raised about the perceived erosion of the power of the people and the danger of locally elected officials being held liable for damages when attempting to oppose industrial users such as large forest companies.

Others had more pointed concerns.

"What are you going to do about the Department of Fisheries and Oceans?" one man asked.

Wilson said that he believes Fisheries needs to be split in half into separate East Coast and West Coast departments but seemed unprepared to offer any further solutions.

Joe Harrison added "My experience here after 30 years is that Fisheries is completely dysfunctional. It seems to be organized with nobody in charge and everybody is worried about their backside at all times. Nothing gets done and it's almost intentional."

Ted Taylor stood to ask how many in the assembled crowd were from Area A.

Nine people responded by putting their hands up.

"My goodness, I'm not sure how to interpret that," Taylor said.

"Either you have a lot of work to do or you're a shoo-in for this part of the riding."

### Huge outdoor marijuana grow op busted near Barabash Road

RCMP aerial photographs show the extent of one of the biggest outdoor dope busts on the Sunshine Coast in years.

It was the biggest outdoor marijuana grow op seen in years, say RCMP.

Though it's just one of a record 77 outdoor marijuana grow operations plotted for take-down by RCMP this season, its unusual size required extra

precaution.

An Emergency Response Team from the Lower Mainland was called in to help the Sunshine Coast RCMP, three police dogs and their handlers execute a search warrant on a property near Kleindale's Barabash Road.

Enough pot to fuel the Bonfire Festival for decades.

Constable Jason Rumming of the Sunshine Coast General Investigation Section of the RCMP explained why the ERT was needed to assist in the operation.

"Since Mayerthorpe, safety is a huge concern for us," said Rumming referring to an investigation in Alberta where four Mounties were killed. "Whenever there's a situation where we're taking down a rather large grow operation that's worth in the neighbourhood of \$10 million to \$15 million dollars, there are higher stakes and, for the safety of all involved, the ERT team was brought in so it could be safely handled."

Rumming denied reports that a curious neighbour, who was arrested, handcuffed and later released, was taken down with excessive force.

"If something had happened there that he was taken down in a violent fashion because of the way he acted or if there's anything like that then we would have heard about

it. I was told he was arrested without incident and was released."

The execution of the warrant revealed a grow operation with approximately 2,500 Christmas tree-sized marijuana plants spanning approximately one acre.

Two male suspects have been identified in relation to the Garden Bay grow operation and charges will be recommended by police.

The total weight of the plants seized was three tons and RCMP estimate the potential yield of the crop to be worth approximately \$10 million if sold at street value of \$2,200 per pound..

"When you translate how much weight a plant can produce, it could be anywhere from two to three pounds of product." Rummings says.

The RCMP's Sunshine Coast

Marijuana Eradication program is an operation directed by Rumming and Constable Bryson Hill, the two members who make up the General Investigation Unit/Street Crew for the Sunshine Coast.

"We use our helicopter to do our GPS spotting from the air and it may drop us down in remote locations and we'll hike in or other times we may take our vehicles in or use ATVs."

Rumming says his team will be busy for the next month and a half taking down the 77 locations they've already plotted.

To do this he'll draw from the resources on the regular watches.

"We always get people who are interested in going out to the woods for a day." he says.

"There are obviously safety protocol concerns we have but it's a day to get out and see the other side of policing."

### Chevron prepares to sell Madeira Park property

Chevron Canada has confirmed that they have no intention of redeveloping the site of their former service station at the corner of Highway 101 and Francis Peninsula Road.

"That site switched over to surplus site status and came into my portfolio," says Jeff Linke, Site Remediation Specialist for Chevron Canada.

"I manage all of our non-operating sites in the province and make sure they meet Ministry of Environment standards for whatever they're zoned for and then we get the certificate of compliance and sell them."

A certificate of compliance is required for sites like this with past contamination issues to ensure that the soil and groundwater meet Ministry of Environment standards.

Independent consultants have been onsite recently taking samples to document that the property has been treated effectively and is now uncontaminated.



Chevron Canada plans to sell this property at the corner of Highway 101 and Francis Peninsula Road as soon as they get the green light from the Ministry of Environment.

"It's a very prescriptive process that the province has and very welldefined about what it takes to ensure that you've done the work properly and that it's well documented." Linke said.

Chevron Canada hopes to submit their application this year

but Linke says he has way of knowing how long it might take after that for the ministry to issue the certificate.

As soon as Chevron Canada receives the green light, the property will be listed for sale in the general market.



### SCRD looking at rezoningTyner Park

SCRD Area A Director John Rees has proposed that a property at the south end of Lily Lake be rezoned in order to allow development of low cost seniors' accommodation.

The 5.3-acre property was bequeathed to the "residents of the Sunshine Coast for their use and enjoyment in perpetuity as parkland" by the late Vi and Jim Tyner.

The transfer to the SCRD was completed on December 24, 2003 and required that the land be maintained as a park under the name Tyner Park.

The SCRD claims that, after

a recent visit, the Tyner family "was disappointed that little or nothing had developed with the property" and it was suggested the property be put to better use to help alleviate the shortage of seniors housing.

Jim and Vi Tyner were active community participants who valued the preservation of Pender Harbour's rural lifestyle and left wishes for their property to remain in its natural state.

Lily Lake is a small lake bordering Highway 101 just south of the entrance to Madeira Park.

### **Behind the Pender Harbour Jazz Festival**



What other jazz festival has a fishboat with musicians playing as it cruises the harbour.?

Around the time the Oak Tree was called the Holiday Market and Harbour Pet Food was still a bank, the seed of a Pender Harbour jazz festival was conceived in a beer mug.

Monty Rolston and Les Fowler wanted to produce something to help extend the tourist season past Labour Day and since they were both musicians and avid jazz fans, a festival seemed the ideal choice.

It's possible that too much inspiration that evening blurred their memories the next day because their dream remained dormant until 1995 when Monty finally persuaded Les, the chairman of the Pender Harbour

Music Society, that the society should launch the festival.

Monty and Les both played in the Harbour Lights Dance Band, which was instrumental in acquiring the Pender Harbour School of Music and forming the Pender Harbour Music Society to administer it.


"Right from the start it was going to be in the month of September." Monty says in his home office, decorated with the trophies of his three passions — the P. H. Jazz Fest, the BC Lions and moose hunting.

"The whole idea behind it was to create another weekend for the resort and business communities."

Meetings were held and things progressed but a major catalyst was provided by the town of Gibsons when Les got wind that they were also planning to start a jazz festival in 1996.

Les wanted to be first and so the race was on but it was already June.

Les would be away fishing for most of the summer and they didn't have enough time to get it together.

So, they reluctantly decided to put it off until the next year giving the Pender Harbour Jazz Fest Committee 15 months to plan and do it right.

Things moved along from there with help from the Vancouver Coastal Jazz and Blues society, organizers of the Vancouver International Jazz Festival, who gave a one-day seminar offering tips to ease them through the first-year pains.

Their advice was to start small and build.

Even the current logo was supplied that first year by Monty's son Steve, a budding artist who has gone on to a successful career as a graphic novelist.

He drew the seal on a rock playing a saxophone and Jim McGillveray helped with the musical scale.

Musicians might recognize that the melody the seal is playing is from *Harbour Lights*.

For a real treat, ask Monty to sing it for you.

With only five acts and a budget of \$15,000 the first Jazz Fest was a resounding success.

After it was all over, Monty called Michael Campbell, who had just put on the first Pentastic Jazz Festival in Penticton that September.

Campbell was ecstatic.

With a budget of \$70,000 they'd only lost \$10,000!

Monty smiled knowing their little festival actually made a \$7,500 surplus, money that would help them nurture the festival through its formative years.

It was clear they were on to something good.

later — success of the festival were David Lee and Jim McGillveray whose experience and contacts in the music industry helped land top name acts to build its prestige.

Pretty soon they were inundated with promo kits and CDs of various artists who had heard about this little spot on the coast that was gaining a reputation for putting on a show that even had one act playing on a fish boat as it cruised around the harbour.

Musicians are often an eccentric lot so I ask Monty if there have ever

been problems with difficult performers.

He's reluctant but can't help himself as he tells me about one performer David Lee booked in the early years who was living in the New York at the time and couldn't get Canada Council funding to attend.

She used up her own Air Miles to get here and everything was wonderful until she arrived and was appalled at the quality of accommodation provided for her so she lit into Monty.

"She was just an absolute witch for the rest of the weekend," He says.

"Nothing was good enough for her!"

But she was an anomaly, says Monty, and the majority of the performers come because they love it here.

Within jazz there's a huge diver-

sity but jazz fans will recognize that diversity doesn't seem to be reflected in Pender Harbour's lineup of musicians.

I ask Monty how they go about choosing the acts every year.

"The jazz spectrum is huge and we're just trying to show that much of it," He says, holding his hands apart in a way that could mean he just caught a one pound salmon.

"What some people are now calling jazz, to me, is just a bunch of kids playing with instruments to see how horrible they can make them sound."

Clearly the Pender Harbour Jazz Festival line-up is "safe" meaning the acts booked are intended to please a wide swath of music buffs.

One of the keys to their success is that they have avoided some of the more avant garde acts that might not appeal to the broad audience that attends every year.

"Beep and squawk" is better left to larger festivals like Vancouver where they can pull from a wider variety of eclectic tastes.

What you'll find in Pender Harbour is "smooth" jazz with hints of blues or Dixieland to offer variety.

Rolston challenges anyone who claims they "don't like jazz" to come out and give it a try.

"The first year or two a lot of the locals that think there's two types of music, country and western, didn't like jazz," he says.

"They didn't like the festival but with so many free events going on around the shopping centre, if they were in Madeira Park, they had to be exposed to some of it. And after three or four years they were becoming sponsors and volunteers and they decided it wasn't so bad."

Though the Jazz Fest continues to lose venues like Irvines Landing and Lowes, this year's festival should prove to be the biggest ever with 23 acts — 18 of which are free.

But despite its apparent success, all isn't rosy for the Pender Harbour Jazz Festival.

"We've been losing attendance for the last four years because there are no places for people to stay," Monty says.

"With developers and private people buying up all the resorts and rooms, there's no place for people."

To combat this, Jazz Fest organizers have concentrated their marketing efforts towards attracting the boating crowd by advertising in publications like Pacific Yachting.

Though they arrive with their own beds, this demographic presents its own problems.

Monty recalls a big attendance drop last year when the weather turned poor on the Sunday and boaters beat a hasty exit out the harbour in order to avoid a bumpy ride back to Vancouver.

It was only the second year the festival lost money in its 10 year history.

Ticket sales only account for about 24% of revenue needed to break even and this year's budget tops \$60,000, a third of which is taken up by artist's fees and expenses.

Integral to the continuation of the Pender Harbour Jazz Festival is the financial support it receives from local businesses like Target Marine or the Sunshine Coast Credit Union and Monty is quick to credit the continued success to community support.

Completely volunteer driven, the Jazz fest has always relied on the dedication of people like Marlene Cymbalist or Bonnie Murray who have been instrumental in its growth and taken on a huge workload.

Requiring close to 100 volunteers every year, Jazz Fest has never had a salaried employee on the committee

and it's something Monty says is kind of unusual for a festival of its size.

Monty attended a conference for festival organizers a while back and asked how many in the audience of 24 were paid — 18 put their hands up.

He thinks he's put more than \$10,000 of his own money over the years into costs like photocopying or long distance phone calls but insists a part-time salary would eat up half of their budget and is simply out of the question.

Of the original members of the committee, there are only three left who actively take part in the organization — Joyce and Les Fowler and Monty.

With such a huge workload that keeps growing every year, the problem of succession is looming.




Monty's son Steve drew it and Jim McGillveray added the music. What's the seal playing?

Though Monty resists talking about the future he does insist that, despite the challenges facing the Jazz Fest, the best years are still ahead.

"It was never intended to be a profit making enterprise," He says. "We never set out to sell Jazz Fest. We set out to sell Pender Harbour."

## WATERSHED LOGGING ISSUES

The SCRD, acting as a Health

Board, has issued a conditional "Stop Work" order on the Chapman Creek watershed.

As this order is currently before the B.C. Supreme Court, I cannot comment on the substance but I can tell you this order is resonating around the province and is being followed very closely by several other municipalities.

The issue at hand is that the Ministry of Forests continues to sanction industrial activity in watersheds where local governments have the responsi-

bility to supply clean drinking water.

Similar logging approvals have been given closer to home, namely Ruby and Waugh Lakes, both of which are community drinking water sources.

At the moment it is too early to tell how several SCRD initiatives will be responded to on this separate issue by the rovince or whether progress can be made by a local committee structured to review the logging plans, meet with representatives of the logging company and make recommendations to the SCRD and the community.

Both of these issues are being well covered in coastal newspapers.

#### **TYNER PARK**

In 2002, the SCRD inherited a five-acre parcel of land from the estate of the Tyner family to be used as a park.

The property is located on Francis Peninsula Road approximately 200 metres west of the Pender Harbour Clinic and, on the opposite side of the road, it borders Lily Lake.

Other than the demolition of some derelict buildings that had been trashed by transients, removal of some abandoned vehicles and partially blockading the entrance, the SCRD has not proceeded with further development as yet.

We understood that the trust

wished the property remain in its natural state.

In May the SCRD received a letter from the trust lawyer in which he stated that the family were disappointed that little or nothing had developed with the property.

One family member, visiting from P.E.I. noted "the shortage of quality seniors residential facilities" and suggested that the SCRD could use this property to help alleviate that situation.

I might add that the trust lawyer agreed with that offer.

I moved this correspondence through committee and board and in July the SCRD responded to the estate lawyer requesting a three to six month period to prepare a proposal that would satisfy the trust: a combination of park and low-cost seniors accommodation, including rental and sales, single units and multi-tenant options.

The property would have to be re zoned, resulting in several community processes and input.

This idea would not compete in any way with the ongoing efforts for seniors' housing.

This proposal would come somewhere between the two options currently being developed in the community — smaller, more compact with rental options than the Lily Lake village project — and larger, providing accommodation for couples which

is not available in the Abbeyfield plan.

Local government is not in the housing market, however, it can help with zoning possibilities to make these projects more achievable.

In this case there is the added advantage of owning the land, a huge benefit to start with.

If and when the property was rezoned, a process of about two years, the SCRD could then entertain proposals from non-profit organizations and private development interests on how to make best use of the property, with maximum return and benefit to the community.

In doing so, we'd also meet the new recommendations of the trust.

This property is strategically located for the use proposed, close to

the clinic and will soon be connected with trails to shopping, fire and ambulance services, and lakeside.

Please let me know how you feel about this suggestion.

### Pender Harbour Health Centre – name that garden

Miss Judy at the Pender Harbour Health Clinic will be running a contest at the clinic and will be spelling out the prize for the winning name.

The design of the garden is done, and it's to be calm and cool with some year-round colour.

The gravel path will be redefined, but will be a focal point for the overall theme.

To complete the garden and stretch the budget, plant donations are welcome and appreciated — I'll drop off a list of plants at the nurse's desk that would be appropriate.

We could come to your home and dig a donated plant if needed or give me a call (604) 883-9597, as I can warehouse it until the season is right.

Also I hope to have a posting of who donated what plant.

Perhaps some kind people have glass Japanese fishing floats to donate for interest.

No deer problems here so away we go with hostas, azalea mollis, hydrangeas, etc. but keep in mind that the courtyard is pretty shady so look

for the naming of the courtyard garden

at your garden with that thought. Space is also quite limited.

Some of the names tossed around have been "The Healing Path," "The Keep Smiling Garden" and from poet Terry Bosner, "The Path of Hope."

#### **FALL COLOUR**

That's right, fall.

After such a wet June and July I really feel cheated this year but here are some plants to bring colour to your garden as summer wanes.

Hamamelis, commonly known as witch hazel, is rewarding spring and

Early varieties bud and bloom right along with forsythia in shades of yellow and peach to red.

H. "Red Imp" is native to eastern North America, growing up to two metres and an especially dark red flowering variety.

Other witch hazels can grow quite tall so check the label.

They do best in moist acid soil in semi shade.

Not to worry, I've planted them in sunny spots, not watered when established and they've done well.

Euonymus alatas, commonly

called winged euonymus in fall foliage, can literally look like it's on fire.

A good example to look at is right in the entry to Pender Harbour Diesel in Klein-

Winged euony-June and can grow up to two metres in length, in any type of soil, in sun to part shade.

Also an euonymus, "japonicas" varieties are very different in that they are evergreen shrubs, flowering in June and July and fruiting in December and January.

For waterfront folks, "microphyllus" is a dwarf from up to one metre and used in group planting near the ocean.

On the other hand E. "fortunei" (emerald gaiety) makes a good evergreen ground cover, white E. "fortune" (gracilis) is upright to 40 centimetres or creeping/climbing with aerial roots.

Striking in their variation, these varieties do great on rock walls and are readily available locally.

To wow your garden guest, callicarpa will do the trick.

Flowering from June to August and fruiting in October and onwards, this deciduous shrub grows to two metres and produces dense clusters of maroon to purple berries in dense clusters at each node along the stem.

Don't hesitate to buy this shrub when you see it in our nurseries.

Cornus and more cornus – dogwoods that is!

Cornus alba and its relatives

give great red twigs in winter and colourful fall foliage.

Prune every two to three years for good shaping.

Cornus alba "Elegantissima" has pale green leaves with a broad white edge and you can use it to

brighten any dark spot in your garden. So relax and enjoy some colour!

### PENDER PET PATTER

### **Pet Obesity**

In North America, 40 percent of dogs and cats are considered obese.

As with humans, overweight and obese pets are at higher risk of developing serious diseases including diabetes, heart disease and arthritis.

Pets may also suffer from difficulty breathing, reduced capacity for exercise, heat intolerance, urinary problems and ultimately a shorter lifespan if their weight is not kept in check.

There are several ways to determine if your pet is facing a weight problem.

Firstly, palpate the tissue overlying your pet's ribs.

You should be able to feel the ribs under the skin with a very small amount of fat in between.

Secondly, you should see a definite waistline just behind the ribs when looking down at your pet's body.

Lastly, be aware of behavioral changes.

If your dog or cat is not wanting to play, reluctant to climb stairs or jump into a car and often pants excessively after minor exertion it may be time to consider a weight loss program.

Obesity is most likely caused by an excess intake of calories combined with too little physical activity.

However, there may be a genetic factor associated with weight gain.

It is always recommended to

check with your veterinarian to test for hypothyroidism or other metabolic problems.

#### **COUNTING CALORIES FOR CATS**

Indoor cats tend to eat more out of boredom and usually have less opportunity to burn calories through

exercise.

Reduce meal time portions and take the time to encourage play on a regular basis.

Be aware that weight loss plans for cats need to be approached carefully.

Rapid weight loss puts cats at risk of developing severe liver failure so it's

best to achieve optimal body weight slowly but steadily.



If your dog is tipping the scale it is best to discontinue feeding table foods and treats as they add calories and increase weight quickly.

Try offering carrots, broccoli or veterinary-approved low-calorie treats instead.

Although cutting down on calories is a great treatment for obesity it is just half of the solution.

Regular exercise is so important.

An overweight dog should be encouraged to walk for 30 minutes, twice a day.

Prevention is better than treatment so talk to your veterinarian about the food that is best suited for your pet as well as a safe strategy for effective weight management.


The "Book Project" was initiated to help document and honour the important role that women have played in our community.



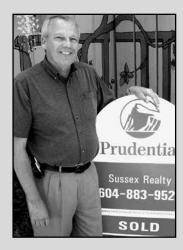



### The last voyage of MV Harold Clay

It was a day

when the MV Harold Clay left Pender
Harbour on the first leg of its journey

Saying goodbye to a vessel that provided support to boaters in the Pender Harbour Area was difficult but it is good to know that it going to continue in service in the Canadian North.

The MV Harold Clay will be trucked to Hay River in the Northwest Territories to be stored over the winter, as the river has already begun to freeze.

It will then be sailed down the Mackenzie River next spring to see further service as the dedicated vessel of the Canadian Coast Guard Auxiliary Unit in Inuvik and be renamed.

Our new vessel, Iona C, is now in service and had its first rescue call the next day.

It was named after Iona Campagnolo, the Lieutenant-Governor of BC, who was instrumental in the creation of the Canadian Marine Rescue Soci-

ety which has evolved into the Canadian Coast Guard Auxiliary.

They started providing marine rescue services using the owner-operator boats of Harold Clay, David White and Don MacDougall in 1997.

In 2004 the MV Harold Clay was purchased by the Pender Harbour & District Marine Rescue society for use by the Pender Harbour CCGA-P Unit 61.

The Marine Rescue society has also purchased the Iona C which is now in current service.

Harold Clay, for whom the Auxiliary vessel was named, was on hand to say farewell.

During the 25th Anniversary celebration of the Canadian Coast Guard Society, Harold was made a life member.

On a sad note Harold's wife, Joyce, passed away the day after the vessel's departure.

The day after the Harold Clay left, the Iona C was tasked with its first rescue, to attend a 22-foot vessel which had a mechanical breakdown after dark near the entrance to Jervis Inlet.

Mechanical breakdown is the major cause of vessels needing assistance.

It is clear that a brief inspection of fuel and oil is not a sufficient check

#### SEPTEMBER IS KIDNEY MONTH

So what is so important about these small bean-like organs?

Kidneys regulate your fluid balance which is vital to your overall health.

They are the body's filter system and keep the amount of sodium, potassium and other necessary minerals in balance so that the body can function properly.

When the balance of these minerals is disrupted the vital organs such as heart and brain are adversely affected and can have severe implications such as heart attacks and strokes.

Chemical waste products produced from what we ingest, both food and medications, are filtered and eliminated by the kidneys.

People with diabetes and high blood pressure are at much greater risk of getting kidney disease.

Recent estimates are that more than two million Canadians have chronic kidney disease and many are unaware of it.

Come to the Health Centre in September and pick up some literature about kidney diseases.

### Why fix it now?

Very often after the dentist examines a patient's teeth and goes over the treatment options, the question is

"If it isn't broken right now, why fix it?"

While it may be true that there are no clinical symptoms at the present time, there may be advantages to treating some teeth before they cause problems.

Your dentist can often predict which teeth will eventually fail.

By taking action now we are able to prevent dental emergencies and restorative complications, as well, treatment can be scheduled at a convenient time.

The most obvious indication that a tooth will fail is the presence of decay.

Tooth decay is a slow progressive disease that does not always present symptoms until it is quite advanced.

Most new cavities occur on the biting surfaces or in between teeth and are easily diagnosed during a dental exam.

More difficult to diagnose but very common are cavities around old restorations.

Once the seal on a filling or crown is no longer intact, the tooth around the restoration may start to slowly decay.

Intact (non filled) teeth are very

strong and very resistant to fracture, however the strength of a tooth is dramatically decreased once a filling is placed.

In most cases a filled tooth is strong enough to function normally, but when over half the biting surface is filled the underlying tooth is prone to crack.

Continual flexing of the unsupported tooth creates small cracks that eventually lead to a fracture.

This usually occurs over a long period of time and for some reason the final fracture will happen while only eating bread or some other soft food!

A crown is the treatment of choice for teeth that have excessively large restorations.

The function of a crown is to hold the tooth together much like a casing.

Placing a crown on a tooth with a large filling or evidence of a crack before the tooth fractures will likely prevent the tooth from breaking.

Waiting until the tooth breaks may cause more problems.

Early prevention of dental problems is always our first choice.

So even if you do not have symptoms, sometimes it is best to fix it even if it isn't broken!

### Seasonal maintenance pays in peace of mind

We all know how great it is to spend time in the Harbour over the summer.

It's a time to enjoy warm days at the

lake, cruise the surrounding waterways or just entertaining visitors on the patio.

But for a lot of homeowners in Pender Harbour and Egmont, September means shutting down their vacation homes until the following spring, or at least until their next visit





— which may be months away.

Preparing your cabin for winter is an important part of protecting your investment.

Although we suffer relatively mild winters in our area, you can never be too safe.

Bursting waterlines are rare but not unheard of.

After suffering a rather costly plumbing and restoration bill last year, one of our clients has taken to turning down baseboard heaters to just above freezing.

The hydro bills are a little higher but he says it is worth it for the peace of mind.

Canada Housing and Mortgage has put together a list of seasonal maintenance items for homeowners.

Here are some things CMHC suggests you look after in advance of winter, and ideas for getting your vacation home ready for spring.

- If you don't plan to use your cabin for an extended period of time during the winter, have the septic tank pumped out before you leave to avoid the possibility of it freezing. (Unlikely in our climate, but ask your septic professional for advice)
- Have your furnace or heating system serviced by a qualified service company every two years for a gas furnace, and every year for an oil furnace. You can examine the forced air furnace fan belt yourself for

wear, looseness or noise; and clean fan blades of any dirt buildup (after disconnecting the electricity to the motor first).

- Replace window screens with storm windows. Remove screens from the inside of casement windows to allow air from the heating system to keep condensation off window glass.
- Clean fallen leaves from eaves troughs and roofs, and test down spouts to ensure proper drainage from the roof. Check chimneys for obstructions such as nests.
- Drain and store outdoor hoses. Close any outdoor hose connection and drain the hose bib (exterior faucet), unless your house has frost-proof hose bibs.
- Check electrical cords, plugs and outlets for all indoor and outdoor seasonal lights to ensure fire safety. If they are worn or cords feel warm to the touch replace immediately.
- When spring arrives, have well water tested for quality. It is recommended that you test for bacteria every six months.
- Clean windows, screens and hardware, and replace storm windows with screens. Check screens first and repair replace if needed.
- Ensure sump pump is operating properly before the spring thaw sets in. Ensure discharge pipe is connected and allows water to drain away from the foundation.
- Check eavestroughs and downspouts for loose joints and secure attachment to your home, clear any obstructions, and ensure water flows away from your foundation.

A little care and prevention now can make for a great spring opening in 2008 rather than a nightmarish experience for everyone!

### THE EQUINOX

An equinox in astronomy is the event when the sun can be observed to be directly above the earth's equator, occurring around March 20 and September 22 each year.

On these dates, night and day are nearly of the same length and the sun crosses the celestial equator (i.e., declination 0).

More technically, the equinox happens when the sun is at one of two opposite points on the celestial sphere where the celestial equator and ecliptic intersect.

In a wider sense, the equinoxes are the two days each year when the centre of the sun spends an equal amount of time above and below the horizon at every location on Earth.

The word equinox derives from the Latin words aeguus (equal) and nox (night).

## Blackfish Yachts to be built in Pender Harbour

Up an unassuming dirt road behind the GRIPS recycling centre lies potential.

It's the site of carpenter turned boat builder Murray Warman's venture, Blackfish Yachts Ltd.

Warman leases the property from L. & H. Swanson Ltd. of Sechelt and it seems an unlikely spot for a world class yacht building venture.

With two large shops on the property and plenty of room for expansion, Warman claims its ideal.

Inside the bigger of the two buildings is the embryo of his dream,

the almost completed mould of a 42-foot coastal cruiser that would compete for market share with more established Pacific Northwest yacht companies like Nordic Tug or American Tug.

"It's a cross-over boat, really, between what we'd call a sedan cruiser and a pilothouse boat like the tugs," Warman says outside his fumes-filled glassing shop.

"We've built a combination to take advantage of the space a little bit better."

The Blackfish 42 will have two sleeping berths, a galley and head with shower, ample deck space and

will cruise at approximately 18 knots with a top speed of 22 knots.

"The boats aimed at a fairly specific market — for the serious cruising couple. Not really a party boat." He says.

"More than likely a husband and wife out with grandkids on the odd weekend."

Warman hopes to pop his first hull from the mould in late October but that would just be the start.

He estimates that it will take 4,000 man-hours to complete the boat after popping the hull but, in as soon as five years, Warman hopes to go into full production, producing up to eight boats per year, preferably all from the current site.

To do this he estimates he'll need 18 full-time employees ranging from fitters and electricians to glassers and fishing carpenters.

With an estimated selling price of \$550,000 it seems to be a startlingly ambitious enterprise to be based in Pender Harbour but as you listen to Warman talk about his plans, it makes perfect sense.

"We're in a phase right now where there's just an unprecedented amount of money out of there for the number of boomers retiring," he says.

"You look at any of the recreational markets like RVs or cars and trucks that are dedicated toys... and they've been consistently elevated

over the last few years and that dictates how much money there really is out there to buy these toys."

Murray's wife, Joanne Sankew, has handled much of the marketing efforts for the last two years and most interest has been from dealers in Florida or the Pacific Northwest.

They've been advertising in Passagemaker magazine out of Annapolis, Maryland for a couple of years now.

"Seventy-five per cent of the response we get is from the East Coast of the US," he says. "But they're not close enough geographically to come and look so our strategy at this point is to advertise a little closer to home."

Warman will be attending boat shows throughout the U.S. and Canada over the next couple of years to create some buzz.


The big shows take place in Vancouver, Seattle, Los Angeles, Miami and Maine and until the first boat is completed, he'll be armed only with conceptual drawings.

After production starts rolling smoothly, Blackfish Yachts will handle Canadian sales themselves and service the U.S. market with the help of brokers.

It seems like he's far away from the action so I ask if there are any potential disadvantages to basing a business like this in Pender Harbour or if he has fears there's a possibility of outgrowing his current location.

"My reasons for being here right now, believe it or not, are I think I can draw talented people from other areas because, until now, the lack of work here has kept them away," he says.

"The other thing is my overhead, on paper, is much less here, less taxa-

tion and rent is cheaper and everything else."

Warman claims transportation costs for materials are coming down all the time as companies like City Transport are gaining more business which in turn enables them to reduce their rates and allow companies like his to consider the area as a viable location to base themselves.

"I don't want to be all wishywashy about it or anything but I love this community, you know?" he says. "I'd just love to be able to be a part of it and hire some people and everything and see something like this really work."



## You love jazz, you just don't know it yet

With all the Jazz Fest-related material in this issue of the Spiel, Brian thought it might be useful to offer a primer for

those who aren't jazz fans ... yet.

There is a persistent belief that jazz is "difficult" music requiring years of study, a goatee and a beret.

Not true (though you'd look good in a beret).

Here's an untrained fan's fivecent tour of a few easy-to-enjoy CDs from several genres.

#### **NEW ORLEANS JAZZ**

This music was born in New Orleans but it grew up in Chicago in the 1920s.

It is often called Dixieland, a term that grates on some.

Whatever you call it, once you get past the scratchy sound you can still hear how exciting and revolutionary it is.

• Louis Armstrong, This is Jazz Vol. 1 (Columbia/Legacy). Even 79 years later the breakneck opening riff of "West End Blues" is thrilling. You can pick this up for \$7.50 US via amazon.com; it's \$15.95 Cdn at amazon. ca.

#### **SWING**

Big bands accounted for up to 70 per cent of record sales in the U.S. between the late 1920s and the end of the Second World War.

• Benny Goodman Carnegie Hall Concert 1938 (Jasmine). This was the first jazz gig in Carnegie Hall. Goodman's band was at its peak, augment-

ed by stars from the Ellington and Basie outfits, more than could be said for the recording equipment. Worth the price just for Gene Krupa's manic drumming on "Sing, Sing, Sing."

• Duke Ellington Ken Burns Jazz

Collection: Duke Ellington (Sony). Burns' PBS series was deeply flawed but entertaining. This is a reasonable one-disc survey of the Duke, covering the late 1920s to about 1960. Plus it's cheap and widely available.

#### **BEBOP**

Bebop originated in the 1940s as a reaction to big-band swing.

Trumpeter Dizzy Gillespie and saxophonist Charlie Parker replaced swing's set arrangements with

freewheeling improvisation, usually in small groups.

Much of bop is "beep and squawk" but at its best it's dazzling and even humorous, as in Dizzy Gillespie's "Salt Peanuts."

• Charlie Parker Bird: Original Motion Picture Soundtrack (Columbia). Director Clint Eastwood made the most of technology on the soundtrack to his 1988 biopic about Parker. Forest Whitaker "plays" actual Bird solos lifted out of the original recordings and accompanied by contemporary musicians. Selections range from the frantic "Lester Leaps In" to mellow string arrangements of "Laura" and "April in Paris."

#### MODAL AND COOL

In the late '50s Miles Davis and others led a shift away from the lightning speed and chord structures of bop and swing to base melodies on "modes" or scales.

> The results could be extremely melodic. Cool (aka West Coast cool) jazz, as its name suggests, also trended away from flash and passion toward melody and groove.

• Miles Davis Kind of Blue (Columbia Legacy). The bestselling jazz album of all time was recorded in two just two sessions in 1959. It still sounds fresh, from the opening groove of "So What," to the fading - Duke Ellington, 1954 notes of Davis's muted trumpet in "Flamenco

Sketches." Be sure to get the Columbia reissue from 1997 or later; earlier versions were mastered from faulty recordings.

#### **MAINSTREAM**

Like "progressive" or "modern" this is a catch-all term that changes with the times.

- Charlie Haden Quartet West Haunted Heart (Gitanes). Luscious, romantic retro sound incorporating vintage recordings by Jo Stafford, Jeri Southern and Billie Holiday.
- Keith Jarrett The Melody At Night, With You (ECM). Achingly tender solo piano: "Someone to Watch Over Me," "Blame It on My Youth" "Shenandoah."
