editorial

Can we share the secret map?

Like many, I'm fascinated by what life here must have been like before Europeans.

But much of the surface evidence was

gone by the time I hunted for arrowheads on my grandparents' beach.

There's no clear picture of what life was like in, say, Gerrans Bay 300 years ago and part of the reason for it is that scientific knowledge about Pender Harbour and Egmont's archaeological record isn't made public.

Much of what we know comes from what has been unearthed (and destroyed) during construction efforts.

In *Raincoast Chronicles 17*, Howard White wrote:

"I once had a job installing a sewer system on the Sallahus reserve at Canoe Pass and found myself digging down in ancient fire ash and clamshell deposits to a depth of six feet, encountering more than a few human bones along the way.

"There was another large deposit of bone-laden midden soil at Irvines Landing ... and sizable ones at Gerrans Bay and on the fertile mudflats at the head of Oyster Bay."

Ironically, this might be the best public record of archaeological sites in Pender Harbour.

There is a secret map that shows where they are but only the province, the SCRD and the band are privy to it because it's feared people will pillage them and, given our record so far, it's a legitimate concern.

But it poses a problem to landowners because our "provincial heritage inventory" isn't tied to land title.

That means those who purchase a property aren't notified if it contains an archaeological site.

The province's "developer pays" policy means costs for remediation or

assessment are borne by the owner.

And, though we don't know where these sites are, we know they're everywhere.

A recent interest in archaeological study ensures that list will continue to grow as new sites are found.

I wrote a story this month (see p. 5) about a Gunboat Bay property owner whose land was clearly inhabited long before he bought it in 1980.

He admits there's a midden on the foreshore but cried foul when told his upland building site must be inspected because it's on the secret map.

Like many, he (mis)understood that he needed to notify authorities only when he finds archaeological evidence during construction.

That is the law — unless your property shows up on the secret map.

Then you need an archaeological consult each time you disturb the ground.

But you won't know this until you apply for a building permit.

People here are looking to mend the relationship with the Shíshálh Nation over the 14-year dock conflict.

There's renewed hope that the area might find a genuine relationship with its rich pre-contact past.

That must begin with trust.

Many know the whereabouts of local petroglyphs but because they also recognize their value, as far as I know, none are defaced.

I hope one day the Shíshálh Nation will share their discoveries, and in turn, trust the residents of Pender and Egmont to protect them.

A fisheries manager once told me he preferred people to live and play near lakes and streams because it was his experience that when they did, they protected it.

If we don't know something exists, or are not told what it is, how can we ensure we aren't destroying it?

And how can we value it?



Narrows Road construction project runs afoul of Heritage Act

A Madeira Park resident received a stark lesson about BC's Heritage Conservation Act after receiving an order initiated by the Shishálh Nation, and delivered by the RCMP, to halt work on a construction project.

"They put a kibosh on my garage which started a couple years back and now they want to do a \$1,400 land survey," said Vito Ialungo.

Ialungo has owned his six-acre property since 1980 and holds a valid building permit from the SCRD.

"I was told by an [RCMP] officer, that the people who came around the foreshore to check the docks decided I didn't have a legitimate permit from the band to release the site."

Soon after, Ilalungo received a letter from Tal Fisher, an archaeologist with the Ministry of Forests, Natural Resource Operations and Rural Development telling him that:

"Provincial records indicate archaeological site DjSa-49 is recorded along the waterfront portion of your property.

"DjSa-49 has been recorded as a shell midden site and is protected under provisions of the Heritage Conservation Act."

Section 13(2) (d) of the Heritage Conservation Act states that:

"Except as authorized by a permit issued under section 12 or 14, or an order issued under section 14, a person must not damage, excavate, dig in or alter or remove any heritage object from a site that contains artifacts, features, materials, or other physical evidence of human habitation or use before 1846."

The SCRD has access to provincial mapping which allows staff to alert those taking out building permits on these sites that they must also consult with the band.

Allen Whittleton, SCRD chief building official, told the *Harbour* December 2017 Spiel that because Ialungo's property sits on a known cultural site, he would have received a notice with his building permit that pointed out his obligation to consult with the band before starting construction.

Ialungo said he received the notice but insists it was unclear and only reaffirmed his belief that he was only required to stop construction if he found archaeological evidence.

Ialungo's subsequent letter from the province advised that:

"Prior to any land-altering activities, an eligible consulting archaeologist must be engaged to determine the steps in managing impacts to the archaeological site.

"An eligible consulting archaeologist holds a provincial heritage permit that allows them to conduct archaeological studies."

"Consulting archaeologists can be contacted through the BC Association of Professional Archaeologists (www.bcapa.ca)."

After meeting with band staff, Ialungo received an estimate for \$1,394.53 from archaeological consultant In Situ.

Billing at \$106.25 an hour, it estimates that one half-hour of research, four hours of field work and eight hours of "preliminary field reconnaissance/permit application" will be

required.

"But one of the things that really bothers me is the 'to be determined,'" Ialungo said, referring to a fourth line item on his quote that lists a "TBD" amount for a "site form."

The estimate indicates a site form "will be completed in the event previously unidentified archaeological resources are observed during this survey/as a result of this study."

Ilalungo said SIB staff informed him that before In Situ can begin work, he must sign a three page "services agreement" between himself and the Shishálh Nation.

Ialungo said he is currently seeking legal advice before he signs it but what concerns him most is the prospect of restarting this process each time he wants to work on his property.

"This will happen every time I put a shovel into the soil," he said.

When asked if the SCRD will disclose this information to property owners, Ian Hall, SCRD's GM of planning and community development emailed:

"SCRD can provide general information to enquiring owners or agents but staff do not give out maps or detailed information.

"If additional information is required, staff direct such enquiries to the provincial archaeology branch."



Blu Earth Renewables installing hydroelectric line across Caren

Anyone attempting to find the end of the road past Klein Lake will find the end has moved.

Calgary-based Blu Earth Renewables Inc. recently restored a decommissioned forestry road to extend transmission lines from four hydroelectric generating projects at the head of Narrows Inlet.

Jamey Fitzgibbon, BER's executive vice president of engineering and construction, told the *Harbour Spiel* they recently installed a 2.5-kilometre submerged cable crossing Sechelt Inlet.

"It was kind of an interesting process because we had to find a window where the tides were slack enough and there was enough daylight to be able to do the work," said Fitzgibbon.

The cable pops out near Doriston before extending seven kilometres over the Caren range to its connection with the Cheekeye Dunsmuir hydro line above Ruby Lake.





Blu Earth Renewables

This map shows the pathway of Blu Earth Renewables Inc.'s hydroelectric line that connects its power projects in Narrows Inlet to the BC Hydro grid above Ruby Lake.

When the cables are powered up later this spring, they will deliver a peak capacity of 42 megawatts into the BC Hydro grid.

Unfortunately for off-road enthusiasts, the access road itself doesn't go all the way over the Caren Range — Fitzgibbon said the terrain required certain sections to be installed by helicopter.

Because it is an active logging and construction site, anyone access-

ing the forestry road is urged to obey posted signs at the entrance indicating when it is safe to do so.

At the time the photo below was taken, access during weekdays was forbidden.

Fitzgibbon said future recreational access will depend on BC's Ministry of Forests, Lands, Natural Resource Operations and Rural Development because it is in an active logging tenure.

Telus cancels Egmont meeting — twice

For the second time in two months, Telus representatives cancelled a meeting with Egmont residents to discuss options for establishing cellular service to the community.

George Connell started the discussion with Telus representatives, who agreed to meet at the Egmont Community Hall on Oct. 19.

That meeting was postponed until Nov. 16.

On that day, Connell learned that meeting would be cancelled too.

"We had about three dozen people there and a number of them came anyway, knowing the meeting was cancelled," said Connell.

"But others came from as far

away as Vancouver and we couldn't get in touch with everybody."

Connell said attendees included Lucie McKiernan, constituency assistant for MP Pamela Goldsmith-Jones and Frank Mauro, SCRD director.

"The priority is emergency cellular service for the Skookumchuck — for the thousands of people who come every year," said Connell.

"But they are apparently not issuing hard-wired telephone numbers in Egmont anymore because the equipment is so bad, it won't take anymore."

A Telus representative did not reply to the *Harbour Spiel's* request for an interview.

NEW BOARD DIRECTOR AND SCRD CHAIR

Based on the latest census, the SCRD board has been expanded to include one

additional director from the District of Sechelt.

The Sechelt council appointed Mayor Bruce Milne for this position, which became effective Nov. 1.

In the SCRD, an area is assigned one vote for every 2,000 population or a portion thereof.

If a municipality has more than five votes, a second director is required and the votes must be distributed as evenly as possible between the directors from that municipality.

The voting rules are established by letters patent and the Local Government Act.

On Nov 9, the board held an election for chair and vice-chair.

Director (and Mayor) Milne and I accepted nominations as candidates for chair.

Director Milne won the election for chair and director Ian Winn was acclaimed as vice-chair.

I believe the water issue on the lower Coast had an effect on the vote.

I have stated that this board has shown the ability to collaborate and move forward on many issues and I believe it will continue to do so and plan to work towards that end.

Pender Harbour Music Society toasts 30 years

From the early days, Pender Harbour residents have made their own fun and, for many, that involved music.

Those with musical talents organized concerts, played at legendary community dances and offered instruction so that children and adults could learn to sing and play an instrument.

Starting in the early 1960s, young community members like Doreen and Ray Lee, Joan and Marshall Rae, and Joyce and Les Fowler were the movers and shakers behind the Harbour Lights swing band, the Prime-Time Family Fun concerts and the Pender Harbour Choir.

The choir was founded by Les Fowler and is now led by Kenneth Johnson.

It recently celebrated its 40th birthday with original members such as Gwen Hawkins continuing to make beautiful music.

In 1983, Fowler led the charge to convince SCRD director Gordon Wilson to support leasing a cluster of retired former BC Forest Service buildings in Madeira Park to the community.

At that time, it was for the princely sum of \$1 per year.

Hundreds of volunteer hours invested in refurbishing the buildings resulted in the creation of what we all know now as the Pender Harbour Cultural Centre — the P. H. School of Music, Harbour Artists Art Gallery, P. H. Reading Centre and the Serendipity Preschool.

The Pender Harbour Music Society was founded in 1987 and took over responsibilities for the P. H. School of Music building.

Minutes of the first board meeting on Sept. 8, 1987 contain a glowing reference to a short recital presented by Nancy Mackay and Merv Charbonneau in advance of the main business agenda — it was then, and continues to be, all about the music.

Over the intervening years, the music society has renovated, expanded and steadily improved the P. H. School of Music.

Many visitors and newcomers to the Harbour find it hard to believe that they can enjoy international stars of the music world playing happily for sold out audiences in a tiny venue that seats 100 on a good day.

In addition to the popular winter concert series, the music society subcommittees established highly respected festivals focusing on jazz and chamber music and the monthly Coffee House gives local talent an opportunity to perform on a real stage with professional lighting and sound.

As with so many activities in the Harbour, none of this would have been possible without stellar volunteers who work tirelessly to bring the finest examples of varied musical genres to our community.

A snapshot of favourite concerts in recent years includes classical luminaries like violinists James Ehnes and Corey Cerovsek, the Gryphon Trio, the Lafayette String Quartet, cellists Andrés Diaz, Ariel Barnes and Adrian Brendel; pianists Alexander Tselyakov, Michelle Mares and Sara Davis Beuchner and clarinetist James Campbell.

From the more contemporary side of the musical street came pianists Michael Kaeshammer and Robert Kortgaard, jazz icons Bill Coon and Oliver Gannon; children's entertainers Fred Penner and Charlotte Diamond; folk/roots favouritesThe Good Lovelies, Archie Fisher and CÒIG and Pender Harbour's own Penny Lang.

The concert list goes on and on
— all presented to knowledgeable,
enthusiastic audiences in our intimate
concert hall perched on the hill.

Artistic renaissance underway in Garden Bay

After 30 years of teaching art to Burnaby high school students, Shelley Stunnell thought she left her career behind when she moved to her home near Ruby Lake.

Stunnell is a professional artist who sells her work internationally.

In 2013, she started sharing her skills with a small group of students at the Sarah Wray Hall in Irvines Landing.

"The school was built in 1933 and to have it renovated and to have a teacher working in the school again is such an honour," Stunnell told the *Harbour Spiel*.

Now, four years later, she teaches 30- to 40 students divided between advanced, intermediate and beginner classes on a twice weekly basis.

"Sometimes I combine them all, depending on the lesson, and sometimes I make it separate," she said.

Stunnell pulls on her career as an art teacher for lessons on Canadian artists and categories (like realism or impressionism) as well as the technical aspects of painting.

"Because this is a heritage society, I try to focus on Canadian artists.

"So we've done Mary Pratt, Emily Carr and so on."

Stunnell estimates she has now taught over 100 aspiring artists.

On Nov. 19 her students opened their one-room classroom to display their 2017 work.

It was their fourth Christmas art show and the art on display covered a broad spectrum of styles and media.

"We did a lot of pen and ink this year," said Stunnell.

"I wanted them to understand animals better so I got pictures of skulls from Dr. (Rick) Smalley of the Madeira Park Veterinary Hospital.

"And then we learned how to do fur and different types of fur in pen and ink.

"Some of those animals you can pat out there."

Stunnell says having real models like skulls is important to aspiring art-

ists in order to teach proportion.

"It's like when I teach them how to do a person — you have to know the skull, then the muscle structure, then the skin structure and you have to know the proportion.

"The skull dictates the proportion. So unless you understand the skull structure underneath, how are

you going to draw that?"

As an example, Stunnell points to some anatomical rules she uses.

"We have two eyes but, regardless of how big your eyes are, they are always one eye width apart," said Stunnell.

"The top of your ear comes to your eye — so they learn what proportion is.

"And everybody draws eyes in the forehead. Everybody!"

Stunnell said her class is strictly a drawing and painting class and she makes it clear that she teaches fine art, not craft art.

"It's learning to work with all the media and the only thing we do not do is water colour because it takes too long and too many years too teach.

"And it's not very forgiving."

Beginners start with drawing in pencil in order to learn the foundational skills required for other media. That includes how to see.

"A big part of it is teaching people how to see what's out there.

"They thank me over and over again because they're starting to see shadows, highlights or patterns on the road where the sun gets through the trees.

"They get very excited because their eyes are opened to what's out there."

A community paramedic provides primary care to augment basic health care in non-urgent settings, at the patient's homes or within the community.

The community paramedic will work with physicians, nurses and home support staff as a team to assist you and your family to age in your community.

I have been a resident of Madeira Park for close to 50 years and have been a paramedic in this community for 21 years with only a short time away as a training co-ordinator at the Justice Institute of BC (paramedic academy).

I am hope this new role, in conjunction with your health care professionals, will help our community see the value in keeping our aging population at home for as long as they are able.

Finding truth (and reconciliation) in Canadian literature

The ideals of "truth and reconciliation" still remain abstract and out of reach for many Canadians.

It could be the sheer ambitiousness of its goal or perhaps many are

still unclear about why revitalizing the relationship between Indigenous people and Canadian society is necessary at all.

At it's simplest, truth and reconciliation could mean understanding
— understanding the complex history

of Canada's Indigenous people in the hope that truth will lead to empathy and then action.

First, the following books are chosen because they page turners and deserving of recognition for their entertainment value alone.

JOSEPH BOYDEN

Three Day Road



Though there's been plenty of debate about Joseph Boyden's roots — it's alleged he embellished the depths of his Indigenous heritage — there has been

none about his writing talent.

Three Day Road shot Boyden to the Canadian author A-list in 2005 winning both the Amazon/Books in Canada first novel award and the Rogers Writers' Trust fiction prize.

With a main character inspired in part by real life World War I Ojibwa war hero Francis Pegahmagabow, *Three Day Road* is a gripping story of a deadly Canadian sniper returning from the horrors of WWI to the bush of northern Ontario

As his mother paddles the wounded Xavier Bird on a three-day journey home, the story of why his brother did not return with him unfolds.

Through Black Spruce



Boyden hit it out of the park again with his second novel, winning the 2008 Scotiabank Giller Prize for *Through Black Spruce*.

This time he chose a setting of contemporary aboriginal life

for a sequel to *Three Day Road* that whips back and forth between Manhattan and the bush country of Northern Ontario.


From the jacket copy:

"Will Bird is a legendary Cree bush pilot, now lying in a coma in a hospital in his hometown of Moose Factory, Ontario.

"His niece Annie Bird, beautiful and self-reliant, has returned from her own perilous journey to sit beside his bed.

"Broken in different ways, the two take silent communion in their unspoken kinship, and the story that unfolds is rife with heartbreak, fierce love, ancient blood feuds, mysterious disappearances, fires, plane crashes, murders, and the bonds that hold a family, and a people, together."

The Orenda



In *The Orenda*, Boyden takes the reader back to what would become Canada in the early 1600s.

The Orenda's epic saga is one of contrasts
— brutal conflicts be-

tween indigenous tribes amid the slower yet even more deadly encroachment of European missionaries.

The story is narrated by a Huron warrior named Bird, a young Iroquois girl named Snow Falls and a French

Jesuit missionary named Christophe.

Though it's set 400 years ago, the reader will recognize common human themes reconciling suspicion and trust, kinship and honour, and hatred and love.

The Orenda was a shortlisted nominee for the 2013 Governor General's Literary Award for English fiction and won the 2014 edition of CBC's Canada Reads.

EDEN ROBINSON

Monkey Beach



Eden Robinson has written four other books but *Monkey Beach*, published in 2000, was the Haisla author's first novel.

It won a 2001 BC Book Award — the Ethel

Wilson Fiction Prize — and was a shortlisted nominee for the Scotiabank Giller Prize and the Governor General's Award.

Set in modern-day Kitimat, the story opens on the morning after the narrator Lisa's brother fails to return from commercial fishing.

Lisa is spiritually gifted and as she sits vigil for her brother, she tells her own fascinating story.

Throughout, Robinson draws the reader in with mystery and vivid imagery of the Douglas Channel at whose head Kitimat sits.

But each is also written by a Canadian First Nations author and baked into each story is a hint of what it means to be Indigenous in Canada today.

Like all good books, they magnify human commonalities and offer a

fresh perspective on our relationship with the world.

"That's what fiction is for," wrote Tim O'Brien.

"It's for getting at the truth when the truth isn't sufficient for the truth."

If philosophical concepts like

truth and reconciliation can be broadly assimilated, these books are as good as any place to start.

You will come away from each of these books with an enjoyable reading experience — but you might come away with more than that too.

RICHARD WAGAMESE

Indian Horse



Richard Wagamese is a celebrated Ojibway author of 12 books.

He is best known for this story of Saul Indian Horse, a troubled boy who eventually escapes the horrors of

residential school with his talent for hockey.

But even there, the Indian kid from northern Ontario learns there's no escape from intergenerational trauma nor the gritty reality of 1960s Canada.

Saul's story of overcoming abuse, abandonment, racism and alcoholism is inspiring and humorous.

Wagamese writes with vivid detail, making it clear that the tragedies Saul witnesses were not his alone.

The cinematic adaptation of *Indian Horse* played at October's 2017 Vancouver International Film Festival.

One Native Life



One Native Life is
Wagamese's memoir.
It's a beautifully
written and honest account of a man coming

to terms with a life lived.

When he was a child, Wagamese and

his three siblings were abandoned at a bush camp by their parents who took off on a binge drinking trip.

They left the camp when they ran out of food and sheltered at a Kenora railway depot where they were found by a policeman.

He didn't see his family again for 21 years.

He hit the street at 16, abused drugs and alcohol and made intermittent trips to prison before he was able to claw his way out of a life he saw taking many others.

In 2005, he and his partner left the cities that they had lived in for much of their life to find peace on Paul Lake near Kamloops.

It's here Wagamese finds the peace to reflect on his remarkable life and show readers that if he can appreciate what is left of his 52 years, we all can.

He writes:

Everyone has a story.

We become better people, a better species, when we take time to hear them.

"That's how you change the world, really.

One story, one voice at a time. Wagamese died in March.

THOMAS KING

The Inconvenient Indian: A Curious Account of Native People in North America



Thomas King is an American-Canadian broadcaster, author of 15 books and member of the Order of Canada.

King often writes with humour, something readers should

be tipped off to after reading the title of his 2012 book, *The Inconvenient Indian*.

But it is not really a humour book, nor is it really history, as King admits in his prologue:

Although The Inconvenient Indian is fraught with history, the underlying narrative is a series of conversations and arguments that I've been having with myself and others for most of my adult life.

At it's simplest, the book is the result of a great storyteller walking the reader through what it means to be "Indian" in North America today.

Along the way he tackles treaties, pop culture, kids' games and, yes, history, all with his endearing wit and disarming sense of humour.

The Egmont Story

In the 1920s, Gladys Disney married Egmont logger Fred McNutt and moved to Egmont.

She had previously taught school in Roberts Creek and Wilson Creek and would later teach at the Egmont School.

McNutt wrote a series of articles about the history of Egmont

that appeared in the Coast News in 1955.

McNutt died in 1968.

It was about this time that Mr. Earl sent the two older boys, Leslie and Norman, up to the back of the ranch (Earls Cove) to fell a tree for wood.

Some considerable time elapsed and listen as he might, he could hear no sound of a tree falling nor any noise that might suggest that they were working at the job.

Thinking that they were fooling around and wasting time, he decided to go quietly up to see what they were doing.

Just as he got there, the tree fell with a crash and there was no time for him to get out of the way.

The boys were horrified to see what had happened.

As soon as they had extricated him, they carried him down to their small fish boat and started for the hospital in Pender Harbour.

It was a stormy day and very rough on the water.

When they got to Norman (Daniel) Point they could go no farther and were forced to turn back and wait for the sea to calm before they started out again.

They made it on the second time but on the way there, their father had died.

One day word went around that there was ice cream to be had at Taki and Maida's store.

This was before the days of dry ice, so ice cream was rather a rare commodity in Egmont.

When word reached the Anderson girls who lived with their parents through the Chuck, nothing would do but they must have some.

Their father was away with the gas boat at the time and the row boat they were in the habit of

using was up for repairs, so they borrowed one.

They were quite familiar with the ways of the Skookumchuck too familiar, their mother sometimes thought.

They usually figured to come out with the last of the ebb, hurry to the store, where they were always waited upon immediately, and get back just as the flood had barely got started.

The second oldest daughter, Doris, was in Vancouver at the time so, taking a container for the ice cream, the oldest girl Mary and the two youngest girls shoved off in the borrowed boat.

When they usual time had elapsed and they had not returned, their mother began to worry but consoled herself with the thought that they had gone to visit the school teacher.

The next slack tide was at night.

Unable to contain her fears, Mrs. Anderson went over to Mrs. Cuttle's to wait for her husband's return in the morning.

As soon as Mr. Anderson arrived, he was told about the girls so he went through the Chuck to the store.

There he learned that the girls had never been there.

A hurried inquiry around drew a blank.

A search was started and the row boat was found floating upside down.

It was learned that Mrs. Points had seen the container floating in the water.

Days were spent cutting kelp in the Chuck and people searched everywhere but the three girls' bodies were never found.

It was a terrible blow to the family.


