How to spot a Grinch

It's become a symbol of our times — a growing demographic of desperate

people suffering from a potent combination of unaffordability, lack of housing and addiction.

Desperate people hustle and while property thieves steal the headlines, fraudsters are also casing our community.

We're all familiar with phone call scams from someone with an accent requesting gift cards to get your grandchild out of jail.

We hear less about the quiet frauds and ongoing predations in our community enabled by trust and vulnerability.

Those in which vulnerable people — the handicapped, the elderly or those suffering dementia — are taken advantage of by pretend caregivers or even family members.

In the past few years, I can think of a few local examples of someone "helping" a vulnerable person only to later hear whispers or outright accusations that the caregiver took advantage of that trust.

Charges are rarely laid because the intimacy of the relationship makes theft difficult to prove.

Cases go unreported because victims may not have the faculties to understand how they are being exploited or who they should turn to if they suspect something is wrong.

According to experts, there are typically two types of financial abuse committed by caregivers.

Financial theft, when a caregiver gains access to financial documents and undertakes financial transactions — banking and bill payments.

And property theft, often caught when family members start noticing that certain personal items go missing.

I recently met a relative newcomer to the community claiming to be helping a lonely person with poor coping abilities.

This person has no credentials or affiliation with any agency and lives on the client's property as their "life coach."

Hopefully it's an honest and mutually beneficial transaction, but a thought lingers.

From the *CBC* (Dec. 17, 2018):

A former caregiver who gradually stole \$260,000 from an elderly Coquitlam couple over a period of 16 months has been sentenced to a year in jail.

Fifty-year-old Antonette Dizon of Burnaby pleaded guilty earlier this year to a single count of fraud over \$5,000, admitting that she regularly withdrew \$1,000 in cash a day from the couple's chequing and savings accounts.

From disinherited.com:

A BC nurse was fined \$17,500 by the College of Registered Nurses plus ordered to pay investigation costs of \$16,500 for financial abuse of an elderly couple, now deceased.

The nurses' misdeeds included being the couple's power of attorney, putting her name on title to their mobile home, paying for her dentistry, vision care and \$1,600 a month medications, all on top of her monthly salary.

From the *Vancouver Sun*, (Feb. 2, 2023):

Another 65 fraud-related charges involving 19 elderly victims have been laid against a former Surrey care aide, including fraud over \$5,000, unlawfully entering a dwelling, assault, theft of credit cards and possession of a forged document.

This issue's "Harbour Health" column (p. 27) offers five ways you can identify and stop caregiver fraud.

The quickest way to spot an unscrupulous caregiver?

Their pronouns are I/me/mine.

Province/shìshàlh drop surprises in new DMP draft amendment

On Nov. 24, the province released an update to its 2021 Pender Harbour dock management plan.

The draft amendment, "shíshálh swiya Dock Management Plan," will apply to all of the shìshàlh Nation's traditional territory and surprised dock owners with a number of controversial changes from the 2021 document.

The province has given until Dec. 15 for public engagement and to receive feedback on the plan.

WHAT'S CHANGED?

New rules banning all noncommercial boathouses stipulate that existing boathouses must be removed at owners' expense at the end of their current interim tenure.

Previously, boathouses were allowed.

Floats will now be limited to

30m² (323 sq. ft.), with no width restrictions.

A subsequent Pender Harbour and Area Residents' Association note on the new rules points out that many recently approved docks will not meet this new requirement.

Previously, the DMP indicated that the maximum float width should be 1.5 metres.

The maximum width of access ramps and walkways for both private and commercial docks is boosted from 1.2 metres to 1.8 metres in the new document.

Also included in the draft are rules clarifying standards for freshwater docks on lakes.

The draft indicates that the new DMP will apply to docks on all freshwater lakes on the Sunshine Coast.

PHARA plans to meet with gov-

ernment officials in early December to share feedback from residents.

Some of PHARA's immediate concerns are that a 22-day consultation period leaves residents with insufficient time to understand and respond adequately to the proposed changes.


PHARA also noted concerns with the sudden ban on boathouses and the reduction in the maximum float size to 30m^2 as they will "present immediate challenges for property owners and creates uncertainty moving forward."

Two candidates step up for Upper Coast in S. D. 46 byelection

School District No. 46 has announced a byelection to fill a vacant position as Egmont, Pender Harbour and Halfmoon Bay's school trustee.

The seat on the school district board represents Electoral Area 1 (Upper Coast) which is made up of electoral Areas A and B of the Sunshine Coast Regional District.

The position was vacated last spring by Samantha Haines after she moved out of province.

On Dec. 9, a byelection will take place with voting at the P. H. Community School and Coopers Green Hall with two candidates on the card, Tracey McClelland and Jay O'Keeffe.

JAY O'KEEFE

Jay O'Keeffe has made his home in Pender Harbour with his partner Anna since 2005.

Their children, Solly and Jude, attend Madeira Park Elementary.

An award-winning record producer and musician, O'Keefe has held positions as vice-president of IATSE local 118 (representing theatre and stage technicians) and as the longtime CUPE roster representative while he headed the audio department at UBC's Chan Centre for the Performing Arts.

Locally, O'Keefe has volunteered as vice-chair of the Serendipity Child Development Society, helping the organization meet its statutory, legal and legislative obligations and code compliances.

O'Keefe "has long believed in the importance of being of service to others and if elected as school trustee, he is confident that his skills and experience will positively benefit the Sunshine Coast School District 46."

in Garden Bay and graduated from Pender Harbour Secondary School.

With two of her four children already graduated from PHSS, McClelland recently enrolled her youngest child at Madeira Park Elementary.

While managing a career as a bookkeeper and administrator, for 17 years she has volunteered in school programs like Hot Lunch, bottle drives and chicken sales as well as board positions (usually as treasurer) at Serendipity Preschool, MPES PAC, PHSS PAC, SD46 DPAC and treasurer positions at S. C. Baseball Association and the Loon Foundation.

"My length of time in this system as a parent and my involvement as an active participant in day-to-day functions at the school gives me a good lens in today's education system, particularly being a parent in this area and understanding the challenges that are specific to Halfmoon Bay and Pender Harbour," said McClelland.

North and South Pender Harbour water rates rising for 2024

At the SCRD committee of the whole meeting on Nov. 10, the board supported staff recommendations to raise rates for 2024.

The North Pender Harbour water service area consists of 775 parcels and 580 billable water users.

The current parcel tax and user rates per single family residential dwelling are \$385.33 and \$918.22, respectively.

Pending approval at a Dec. 14 board meeting, in the North Pender Harbour water service area users should expect a 5.11% increase to user rates and 14.19% increase to parcel tax rates for an overall rate increase of 7.79%.

The South Pender Harbour water service area consists of approximately 1,047 parcels and 1,027 billable water users.

The current parcel tax and user rates per single family residential dwelling are \$431.83 and \$762.95, respectively.

For 2024, staff recommend a 10.75% increase to user rates and 19.26% increase to parcel tax rates for an overall rate increase of 13.83%.

Final decisions on utility rates for 2024 will be made by the SCRD Board on Dec. 14.

All three chambers on the Coast vote to dissolve and join as one

Membership of the Pender Harbour and District Chamber of Commerce voted unanimously to dissolve the organization on Nov. 8.

The vote came after months of planning by all three chambers of commerce on the Sunshine Coast to merge into a single organization, the Sunshine Coast Chamber of Commerce.

In a joint Aug. 14 press release titled "Stronger as one," the boards of directors of the three chambers of commerce on the Sunshine Coast announced they had signed letters of intent to merge into one organization by the end of the year:

"The decision to pursue a merger revolves mainly around enhancing member benefits, services, and sales.

"By combining into one organization, members will pay one annual membership fee to achieve expanded exposure to customers, suppliers, and vendors from Port Mellon to Egmont.

"One board of directors also unifies and strengthens positions on advocacy, public policy and legislative priorities for all businesses on the Sunshine Coast."

Members of both the Sechelt and District Chamber of Commerce and the Gibsons and District Chamber of Commerce also voted unanimously to

A unanimous vote at the Fuse Work Hub in Madeira Park on Dec. 8 by members of the Pender Harbour and District Chamber of Commerce resulted in the Pender group dissolving. All three chambers of commerce on the Coast voted to dissolve their organizations in order to form a single group, the Sunshine Coast Chamber of Commerce, in the new year.

dissolve their organizations in order to pursue the merger.

At least 13 members attended the special general meeting on Nov. 8 either virtually or in person.

Ron Badley, president of the former Pender Harbour and District Chamber of Commerce noted there are a few details to be worked out between now and the time the new organization is officially created.

One is the question of who will assume management of the public washrooms and visitor information centre in Madeira Park that are currently managed by the PHDCC.

Baldey said it is hoped that management of the VIC will be taken over by Sunshine Coast Tourism, the organization that already manages two other visitor centres in Sechelt and Gibsons.

Badley told members at the meeting that it is also hoped that SCT might also take over managment of the two signage billboards in Kleindale and Middlepoint as well.

Combined, the three chambers' membership base exceeds 500, and annual revenues are \$170,000.

Now that all three chambers on the Coast are dissolved, planning is underway to have the new Sunshine Coast Chamber of Commerce in place by early January.

Suncoaster Trail's 'South Kleindale Bridge' closed

A second bridge on the popular Suncoaster Trail in Kleindale has been closed "due to deterioration."

On Nov. 16, parks services staff from the Sunshine Coast Regional District closed public access to the South Kleindale Bridge on the Suncoaster trail "due to user safety and a deteriorating bridge structure."

The South Kleindale Bridge is a part of the Suncoaster Phase 1 trail network and is located off the North end of McKay Road in Pender Harbour, as shown on map.

The closure will impact access to the Suncoaster Trail between McKay Road and Lions Park (approximately one kilometre of trail).

"The next step will be to have a qualified individual perform an assessment and determine options for the Kleindale Creek crossing," said Jessica Huntington, interim SCRD parks services manager in a statement.

"A timeline for completion of the assessment is early spring 2024."


SCRD staff identified that a support structure on the downstream side of the bridge "has a major crack in it which compromises the safety of the entire bridge."

The closure comes one year after the SCRD closed the Vine Brook Bridge near the Sakinaw Lake highways works yard for similar reasons.

"This closure is being implemented for the safety of the public and so that contractors can begin the work needed to replace the damaged bridge," said Kevin Clarkson, SCRD parks services manager in a Nov. 10, 2022 statement.

"A timeline for completion of the work has not yet been established."

In a Nov. 22 email, an SCRD spokesperson told the *Harbour Spiel* that there is a budget allocated for the





Vine Brook Bridge replacement and it is still in the planning phase.

"We do not have a timeline established for completion of this

project yet but are hopeful to have the planning completed by spring 2024 dependent on staff capacity and competing priorities."

IMPAIRED MOTOR VEHICLE COLLISION

On Oct. 24 at 7:30 p.m., RCMP responded to a single-car collision in the 12000 block Sunshine Coast Hwy. in Madeira Park.

The 24 year old driver said he was travelling too fast and missed the corner hitting a telephone pole causing the lines to fall across the highway, blocking all traffic.

The driver stated he had been drinking beer prior to driving.

The driver provided a breath sample reading of "warn" which is contrary to his "N" driver restriction.

The driver was issued a 12 hour licence suspension and a violation ticket for driving contrary to driver's restriction.

IMPAIRED BY DRUGS

On Oct. 25, RCMP responded to a report that a female was slumped over in the driver seat of a green Nissan Pathfinder in a parking lot in December 2023 Pender Harbour.

The female driver awoke and identified herself to police.

A glass pipe was found on the floor and the driver admitted to smoking methamphetamine the previous night and driving to the parking lot in the morning.

The driver declined medical assistance and was issued a 24-hour driving prohibition.

Sunshine Coast RCMP have been advised that several members of the public have received an automated phone message stating that the RCMP has information on a serious matter and that they should press "9" for more information.

FULL-TIME PENDER PARAMEDICS

Pender Harbour will see an increase

in full-time paramedics and full-time, 24-hour, staffing at the Madeira Park station, thanks to a provincial government shift in its delivery of rural ambulance services.

THE COST OF WATER SERVICE

Objectives included in the 2024 water and wastewater services budget, with some being carried over from previous budgets, are:

• Update our aging distribution system to improve supply and reduce repair and maintenance costs;

- Identify necessary upgrades and ensure that infrastructure meets adequate hydraulic standards by using water-system modelling;
- Complete our water master plan to prioritize infrastructure upgrades, identify required volumes, identify sources, and address escalating climate change, and
- Execute an asset-management strategy to ensure an adequate, uninterrupted supply of water while meeting provincial requirements.

REGIONAL WATER SERVICE

Earls Cove/Cove Cay and Egmont are part of the regional water service and pay the same rates as larger communities south of us.

This year, \$600,000 is budgeted to replace the Earls Cove pump station.

To address summer water short-

ages, Budget 2024 includes \$763,050 for a Chapman Creek management plan, service review, joint Gibsons-SCRD watershed agreement, Chapman siphon removal, and Church Road monitoring.

PROPOSED 2024 REGIONAL WATER SERVICE BUDGET

- User fees \$715 (9.75% increase):
- Parcel taxes \$450 (14.78% increase).
- Capital reserve \$4,947,277 (\$4,695,432 in 2023), and
- Operational reserve \$2,797,934 (\$1,277,375 in 2023).

Pender systems, and both North and South Pender will see pilot metering programs for basing user fees on water consumption.

PROPOSED 2024 NORTH PENDER WATER SERVICE BUDGET

- User fees \$965 (5.11% increase):
- Parcel taxes \$440 (14.19% increase);
- Capital reserve \$889,025 (\$722,539 in 2023), and
- Operating reserve \$445,975 (\$247,417 in 2023).

User fees for operating expenses of \$45,452 include:

- North and South Pender system connection study and design \$34,952;
 - Service review \$7,500;

Parcel taxes for capital expenses of \$55,000 include:

- Computer hardware and software upgrades \$50,000.
- Pneumatic boring tool \$5,000.
- Light-duty truck \$365 (2024 portion).

2023 carryovers include an upgraded treatment plant design, emergency generator replacement, and water main replacement for Garden Bay's Panorama Drive.

PROPOSED 2024 SOUTH PENDER HARBOUR WATER SERVICE BUDGET:

- User fees \$845 (10.75% increase);
- Parcel taxes \$515 (19.26% increase);
- Capital reserve \$717,143 (\$745,608 in 2023), and

• Operating reserve — \$680,662 (\$688,687 in 2023).

NOTICE OF ALTERNATIVE APPROVAL PROCESS

An Alternative Approval Process (AAP) is a cost-effective method to engage with the community to determine if there is support for certain initiatives, such as long-term borrowing, or other service-related projects. If 10% or more of the eligible electors oppose the initiative, the Pender Harbour Fire Protection District (PHFPD) cannot proceed with it and must consider other options including going to an assent vote (referendum).

The PHFPD is proposing to borrow by way of short-term borrowing a sum not to exceed \$750,000.00 at a rate of prime plus 2% to fund the Pender Harbour Fire Protection District Fire Apparatus Replacement Project as outlined below. Eligible electors opposed to the initiative may submit an Electoral Response Form to indicate their **OPPOSITION** to the PHFPD

Pender Harbour Fire Protection District Fire Apparatus Replacement Project

Description: The PHFPD is replacing its 1994 Ford diesel fire apparatus.

<u>Taxpayer Impact:</u> The portion of property tax allocated to debt repayment would amount to approximately \$3.50 per \$100000.00 of assessed value on an annual basis until the debt is retired. The estimated annual principal and interest payments over a 10 year period would be approximately \$96,000.00 per year for the term of

the debt based on the current indicative long-term lending rate. The costs of the debt will be recovered through taxation on those properties within the Pender Harbour Fire Protection District.

Only eligible electors within the Pender Harbour Fire Protection District are entitled to sign an elector response form. The PHFPD may proceed with long-term borrowing to fund the project unless by the deadline at least 10% (331) of the eligible electors within the District indicate their opposition.

Five ways to spot and stop caregiver fraud

Working with a reputable, bonded agency is part of the path to peace of mind in bringing a caregiver into your loved one's home.

Experts recommend taking these additional steps to safeguard a care recipient from financial exploitation.

SECURE VALUABLES, CASH AND CARDS

Create an inventory of all the valuables in the house, including photo or video records of items and a list of where they are stored.

Keep smaller items like jewelry locked up at all times.

Limit an in-home aide's access to their charge's cash, chequebooks and credit cards.

If their job includes buying groceries or running errands for the older person, consider giving them prepaid debit cards for the purpose, so they can spend only up to the loaded amount.

BE PRESENT

Check in regularly with both the caregiver and the care recipient to monitor the quality of service and see how the relationship is developing.

Make unannounced visits if you are close by.

If you live far away, ask a trusted friend of your loved one to pop in at least once or twice a month.

USE TECHNOLOGY

If your loved one will allow it, install a doorbell video camera on the front door so you know exactly when the caregiver comes and goes.

Video cameras in common areas like the kitchen or living room can provide additional monitoring and theft protection, but make sure to follow laws on the use of security cam-



eras to supervise people working in your home.

MONITOR TRANSACTIONS

Contact your loved one's bank or credit union to arrange "view only" access to their accounts.

These options allow you to view but not transact on the account, much like an accountant on a business account.

WATCH FOR WARNING SIGNS

Unusual financial activity can be a tipoff that an older loved one is being exploited by a caregiver or other person who has gained access to their money.

Here are some red flags to look out for:

- Large, frequent or unexplained bank withdrawals or fund transfers;
- Changing from a basic bank account to one with more complicated services;
- A new person conducting financial transactions on a loved one's behalf without proper documentation (such as a financial power of attorney);
- Cheques that are written as "loans" or "gifts" or have suspicious-looking signatures;

- Sudden overdrafts or unpaid bills, or
- Changes to wills, trusts or powers of attorney.

If you suspect caregiver fraud or theft, contact the Sunshine Coast RCMP non-emergency line at (604) 885-2266.

You can also contact Victim-LinkBC, a toll-free, confidential and multilingual telephone service available across B.C. 24 hours a day, seven days a week at 1(800)563-0808

It provides information and referral services to all victims of crime and immediate crisis support to victims of family and sexual violence.




