



Christmas in the time of COVID

With heavy hearts, the world learned late last week that COVID-19 pre-

cautions have forced Santa Claus to cancel his annual gift run.

Rumours circulated for weeks prior to the release of a Nov. 25 statement from the International Order of Elves (delivered in North Pole elvish):

mpa magay mpa admad adm

A linguistics expert contracted by the *Harbour Spiel* eventually confirmed that, yes, Claus has been grounded indefinitely.

The IOE's main concern surrounds the "extreme danger associated with Santa Claus spreading and/ or contracting the virus."

It is reasonable — he's elderly, overweight and thinks COVID-19 is a Green Party hoax.

Surely it's reckless to allow someone in his condition to visit every home in the Fraser Health region.

It will be the first time Claus has sat out the Christmas tradition since undergoing a stint in rehab in 1957.

The release went on to reassure folks that Christmas is not cancelled:

"Instead, we elfin gaze upon it as our duty, the deliverance of Christmas in an exalted one's place."

Balin Voronwe, IOE spokeself, told the *Harbour Spiel* that after lengthy haggling over compensation, Santa's 4,011 elves voted unanimously to accept a contract expanding their scope and authorizing them to administer Christmas in Claus's place.

According to Voronwe, elves possess viral immunity but Dec. 25 still presents a massive logistical challenge for the order.

Few have travelled outside the North Pole let alone experienced climates like they will in Kleindale and Indonesia during monsoon season.

Their challenge was made even more daunting Thursday after President Donald Trump tweeted he has withdrawn all U.S. funding for the plan after learning Joe Biden will appear on the "nice" list.

Facing a slashed budget and the busiest Yule run since the advent of Amazon.com, the elves are now undergoing a mammoth overhaul of systems and delivery equipment.

Because of that, Voronwe warns children should expect Christmas to be "less generous" than past years.

"Due to the unprecedented amount of elfin effort being thrown at building thousands of smaller sleds and procuring enough flying hares to power them, the elves have fallen short on their 2020 toy production targets," he said.

"It should be expected there will be shortages of popular items like tablets, video games and iPhones."

Asked what parents should tell their children to temper expectations this Christmas, Voronwe was blunt.

"Suck it up and go outside, kid — it's COVID."

Voronwe said his organization has maintained close contact with

Canada Border Services agency.

Starting exactly two weeks before Christmas, 211 elves and 1,477 hares will arrive in Gander, NL to isolate in quarantine so they can safely visit each of the 12.4 million Canadian homes on Dec. 25.

Voronwe urges folks not to leave treats out for the elves in order to avoid "giving them uppity notions."

"Besides, it's a myth that elves like cookies," Voronwe said, "We eat puppies."

Fever, cough and difficulty breathing remain the most common symptoms, but COVID-19 infection can also include a new runny nose, a sore throat, muscle aches, chills, headaches, fatigue, nausea, vomiting and/or diarrhea. If you develop any of the above symptoms, please call your family doctor or contact the Respiratory Assessment Clinic directly for further assessment and testing (if indicated). Most of the time this will be on the same day. Anyone who is seen at the clinic will also receive a follow-up phone call or appointment within 24 to 48 hours. The RAC operates on an appointment basis only and will not see walk-in patients. Call or text (604) 740-1252 or email *coastrespelinic@gmail.com*.

Dodging COVID: Serendipity Christmas craft fair moves online

A staple of community fundraising and seasonal socializing, the 2020 Serendipity Christmas craft fair seemed all but impossible due to tightening COVID restrictions.

So, the Serendipity Child Care Centre's volunteer board got creative.

The SCCC is a not-for-profit licensed daycare in the Madeira Park Cultural Centre for ages 2.5 to 5 years.

Each year it hosts the biggest craft fair of the season at the P. H. Community Hall in an effort to raise funds to offset operating expenses.

With the virus in mind, they took the craft fair online for 2020.

The SCCC's new website *seren-dipityfair.myshopify.com* showcases the works of local artisans and accepts online payment for specific items.

From the website:

A second pickup location at the Roberts Creek Library (across the street from the Gumboot Restaurant) will run from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. on Sunday, Dec. 13.

Items won't be mailed but arrangements may be made for those unable to pick up the items in person by contacting *SerendipityCraftFair@gmail.com* before making a purchase.







THEFT

QUARANTINE ACT VIOLATIONS ISSUED

On Oct. 29, Sunshine Coast RCMP was advised that two people who had just returned from Europe the previous day and were required to quarantine for 14 days, had visited two local businesses.

The RCMP contacted Canada Border Services Agency and confirmed the couple flew into Vancouver Airport from Europe on Oct. 28.

A police officer attended the couple's address and confirmed these details with them.

Each individual was issued a \$1,000 ticket for failure to comply with an order in accordance with section 58 of the Quarantine Act.

"While the fines are one additional tool for police officers to help ensure people are following provincial health guidelines," said Const. Karen Whitby, Sunshine Coast RCMP, in the statement.

"The BC RCMP will continue to educate people about the guidelines and the impacts during this pandemic."

SCAM

A Coast resident reported falling for a scam after replying to a job ad in Craigslist.

The "job" involved the resi-

dent being sent a cheque for a large amount, which she was instructed to cash.

The resident was then asked to return a good portion of that amount in Bitcoin, and to keep a much smaller portion as "payment."

After completing the Bitcoin transaction, the resident learned that the original cheque was fraudulent and the resident is now out the amount sent by Bitcoin.

UNSAFE LOAD

The uninjured driver said she consumed alcohol shortly before driving.

6. Additional cleaning staff

A extra team member has been hired and specifically tasked to maintain additional deep cleaning and infection control protocols throughout the day.

7. Personal protection equipment

You may see masks you haven't seen before, face shields, gowns, head covering and gloves. These items will be disinfected or discarded (as per manufacturer instructions) between patients.

Budgeting in the time of COVID

DANGER BAY WITH COVID RESTRICTIONS

RCMP Staff Sgt. Poppy Hallam

advised the SCRD that last month's Attack of Danger Bay longboard race "went well."

She informed organizer Bricin Lyons that he faced \$2,300 fines if more than 50 people attended, but there were few spectators and only 20 people at the campsite.

DAM UPDATE FOR PENDER HARBOUR

The SCRD owns and operates

four dams, with South Pender water district paying for the two at McNeill Lake, a concrete dam and an ancillary saddle dam.

We are assessing failure consequences, safety reviews, structural improvements, and preparing operation and maintenance manuals.

Preliminary designs and costestimates will form the basis of 2021 budget proposals, including \$230,000 for upgrades and \$42,500 for staff and engineering support for regular inspections required by the BC dam safety regulation.

BUDGET 2021 PROCESS

The COVID-19 pandemic has left many of us to suspect that the old saying, "Nothing is certain but death and taxes," is true, but the SCRD soldiers on to ensure things like running

water, waste water disposal, personal safety, garbage disposal and health care are in place and provided in the manner we have come to expect.

To accomplish that, we need the financial capability to pay for it, and that's how we devise the budget.

These are the steps to establishing the 2021 SCRD budget:

- Nov. 5 to 6 pre-budget;
- Feb. 1 to 2 round one;
- Feb. 23 to 26 municipal and public presentations;
 - March 4 to 5 round two, and
- March 25 financial plan adoption.

PRE-BUDGET CHALLENGES

This earliest stage of the SCRD planning process translates into approximately 48 per cent of your rural property tax notice (local services and

parcel tax).

It's difficult to predict how today's decisions will affect homeowners as the rule is "user pay," so taxes depend on the services you get.

Most noticeable for us is the potential for a significant property tax increase for a typical homeowner on a wastewater plant and in a local water-service area.

It indicated a "first cut" showing an approximate 20 per cent, or \$295, increase from 2020 in Pender Harbour, while a typical Egmont homeowner would be faced with a 13 per cent, or \$183, increase.

Faced with double-digit property tax increases and a desire to reduce them to a manageable level, we requested more information on some projects, postponed others, and axed two items worth \$150,000 to study the future of North and South Pender Water System.

We reviewed 115 ongoing and 104 proposed projects and 22 funding requests from community partners and stakeholders to assess financial and staffing implications of executing the initiatives and set priorities for round one budget deliberations.

Years of practicing a policy of zero-based budgeting have created a situation where there is very little we can put off until another day, and the reality of COVID-19 has greatly increased the cost of providing essential services.

In 2020, we started using reserve funds to ease the impact of COVID-19 and will continue to do so in 2021.

However, this depletes our reserves so, eventually, we will be forced to borrow money to provide the things they were earmarked for.

STRATEGIC PLAN UPDATE

Earlier this year, the SCRD updated its strategic plan, setting December 2020

10 priorities and goals, including developing a growth-management plan, implementing a water metering program and identifying solid waste management and recycling options.

Senior staff used these guiding principles to revisit existing projects and develop new ones, all considered essential to "keep the lights on" and achieve the strategies. As a result of our November meetings, staff will revise the list and update financial and staffing impacts to present at our Feb. 1 and 2 round one meetings.

Next steps include local, grassroots feedback by developing meaningful conversation with the community members and engagement with community groups.





Something to squirrel away?

Preparing for the Coast's inevitable power outages

Compiled from Public Safety Canada's "Power Outages: What to Do?"

Our area suffers more than most from power outages.

With a rural population spread throughout a variety of heavily forested roads, most accept it is a fact of life that we will lose power.

For many in outlying areas, a power outage often lasts for days causing not just discomfort but a potential safety concern.

Hydro crews prioritize repairs affecting the highest number of residents.

That means those living in relatively unpopulated and isolated locations are required to prepare themselves for the extended periods.

PREPARING YOUR HOME

- You can install a non-electric standby stove or heater. Choose heating units that are not dependent on an electric motor, electric fan, or some other electric device to function. It is important to adequately vent the stove or heater with the type of chimney flue specified for it.
- Before considering the use of an emergency generator during a power outage, check with furnace, appliance and lighting fixture dealers or manufacturers regarding power requirements and proper operating

procedures.

- Make sure your home has a working carbon monoxide detector. If it is hard-wired to the house's electrical supply, ensure it has a batterypowered back-up.
- Protect sensitive electrical appliances such as TVs, computer, and DVD players with a surge-protecting powerbar.

PEOPLE WITH DISABILITIES

Consider how you may be affected in a power outage, including:

• Your evacuation route.

- Planning a backup power supply for essential medical equipment.
- Keeping a flashlight and a cell phone handy to signal for help.
- Establishing a help network to assist and check on you during an emergency.
- Enrolling in a medical alert program that will signal for help if you are immobilized.

DURING A POWER OUTAGE

- Check whether the power outage is limited to your home. If your neighbours' power is still on, check your own circuit breaker panel or fuse box. If the problem is not a breaker or a fuse, check the service wires leading to the house. If they are obviously damaged or on the ground, stay at least 10 metres back and notify your electric supply authority. Keep the number along with other emergency numbers near your telephone.
- If your neighbours' power is also out, notify your electric supply

Page 14 Harbour Spiel authority.

- Turn off all tools, appliances and electronic equipment, and turn the thermostat(s) for the home heating system down to minimum to prevent damage from a power surge when power is restored.
- Turn off all lights, except one inside and one outside, so that both you and hydro crews outside know that power has been restored.
- Don't open your freezer or fridge unless it is absolutely necessary. A full freezer will keep food frozen for 24 to 36 hours if the door remains closed.
- Never use charcoal or gas barbecues, camping heating equipment, or home generators indoors. They give off carbon monoxide. Because you can't smell or see it, carbon monoxide can cause health problems and is lifethreatening.
- Use proper candle holders. Never leave lit candles unattended and keep out of reach of children. Extinguish candles before going to bed.
- Listen to your battery-powered or wind-up radio for information and advice from authorities.

USE OF HOME GENERATORS

Home generators are handy for backup electricity in case of an outage but must only be used in accordance with the manufacturer's guidelines.

A backup generator may only be connected to your home's electrical system through an approved transfer panel and switch that has been installed by a qualified electrician.

Never plug a generator into a wall outlet as serious injury can result when the current produced by the home generator is fed back into the electrical lines, and transformed to a higher voltage.



PREPARING AN EMERGENCY KIT

In an emergency you will need some basic supplies. You may need to get by without power or tap water and should be prepared to be self-sufficient for at least 72 hours.

BASIC EMERGENCY KIT

- Water at least two litres of water per person per day.
- Food that won't spoil, such as canned food, energy bars and dried foods (replace the food and water once a year).
- Manual can opener.
- Wind-up or battery-powered flashlight (and extra batteries) in waterproof container(s).
- Wind-up or battery-powered radio (and extra batteries).
- First aid kit.
- Special items such as prescription medications, infant formula and equipment for people with disabilities
- Extra keys to your car and house.
- Cash in smaller bills, such as \$10 bills (travellers' cheques are also useful) and change for payphones.
- A copy of your **emergency plan** and **contact information**.
- You may want to ensure you have a land line and corded phone in your home as most cordless phones will not work during a power outage.

This can endanger the lives of utility employees working to restore the power.

AFTER THE POWER RETURNS

• Switch on the main electric switch (but first, check to ensure appliances, electric heaters, TVs, microwaves computers, etc. were unplugged to prevent damage from a power surge).

• Give the electrical system a chance to stabilize before reconnecting tools and appliances. Turn the heating-system thermostats up first, followed in a couple of minutes by reconnection of the fridge and freezer. Wait 10 to 15 minutes before reconnecting all other tools and appliances.

Coastal memories (Harbour Spiel, Dec. 2010)

In 1954 there was a bitter cold northwesterly gale that hung around for a week or so.

At that time it

was common for the Pender Harbour gillnetters to fish out in the gulf at night and come in during the day.

When that gale came up, everybody made it back to the Harbour but Mervin Reid.

Mervin was our next door neighbour, the youngest son of Cedric and "Granny" Reid.

The weather was so severe that no one dared set out to look for him.

There was no Coast Guard then and Mervin carried very few supplies as the fishermen were home daily.

After no sign of him for days everyone thought he'd gone down.

I was outside our home when his father Cedric came by and asked, "Is your Daddy home?"

I said yes and he went in for a short time.

When he passed me on his way out he was sobbing. It was the first time I'd seen a grown man cry.

Not long after that, word reached us that Mervin was alive.

He had hung on the end of his net and drifted clear down to Friday

Harbour in the U.S.

But it wasn't a warm welcome for the saved Pender Harbour boy.

The Americans fined him for faulty running lights and a lack of life jackets, among other things.

Cedric was forced to make the trip south to bring his son home but then, at the border, Cedric was detained.

He was diabetic and U.S. Customs was suspicious that he might be a drug addict because of the hypodermic needles he carried for his insulin.

Somehow it was all straightened

out and he was able to deliver Mervin back home to the Harbour.

For a young kid like me, it was like seeing someone return from the dead.

Should you get the pneumonia vaccine?

As winter approaches, so does cold and flu season.

Most people have had their annual flu vaccine by now but what about your pneumococcal polysaccharide vaccine?

Better known as the pneumonia or pneumovax 23 vaccine, this vaccine is approved by Health Canada and is provided free to people who are at high risk of getting sick from pneumococcal infections:

- Seniors 65 years and older, and
- Anyone living in residential care or assisted living facilities.

It is also provided free to anyone over two years of age and older with the following conditions:

- No spleen, or one that is not fully functioning;
 - Sickle cell disease;
- Immunocompromised by disease or medical treatment;
- Chronic liver disease, including cirrhosis, chronic hepatitis (B or C);
- Chronic kidney, heart or lung disease;
- Organ transplant, cochlear implant or anyone waiting for one;
 - Stem cell transplant;
- Diabetes, cystic fibrosis, or a chronic cerebrospinal fluid leak;
 - Alcohol dependency;
 - Homelessness, or
- Illicit drug users, especially those who smoke crack cocaine.

A small group of individuals with certain medical conditions will qualify for a second dose of the vaccine.

You can inquire about this with your health care provider.



Common side effects from the vaccine are a localized reaction, including swelling, redness and discomfort where the vaccine was given.

You may also experience a fever.

These symptoms are usually mild and last one to two days.

The bacteria, *Streptococcus pneumoniae*, can cause serious and sometimes fatal pneumococcal infections such as meningitis (an infection of the lining of the brain), septicemia (an infection of the blood) and pneumonia (an infection of the lungs).

Brain damage and deafness can be a permanent complication of this infection.

These infections are transmitted from person to person by face to face contact, sneezing or coughing.

It can also be spread through saliva from sharing food, drinks, cigarettes, lipsticks, water bottles, etc.

Children under two years of age qualify for the pneumococcal conjugate vaccine as part of routine childhood immunizations. They are given three doses at two, four and 12 months of age.

If the child is high risk, then another dose is offered at six months of age.

At two years of age the child is eligible for the Pneumovax 23.

Those five years of age and older who are considered high risk for pneumococcal disease may be eligible for a free PVC or Prevnar 13 vaccine if they are:

- Five to 18 years of age with no spleen or not functioning fully, or
- Adults and children five years and older with HIV or who have had a stem cell transplant.

If you are an adult and do not qualify for a publicly funded booster vaccine, you can purchase a PVC or Prevnar 13 vaccine from your local pharmacy.

Speak with your health care provider to see if it is recommended for you.

Remember when you get immunized, you help protect others as well.

CORRECTION: In a failed effort to standardize measurements, the editor inserted an error into last month's Harbour Health column, "It's never been more important to boost your immune system." A mathematical error inflated the recommended daily dose of vitamin D to unsafe levels. To clarify, "For seniors, extra vitamin D is a good idea, 1,000-2,000 IU daily (or 25-50 *micrograms*) for bone health and immunity."






