

Squeaky wheel politics and the DMP

Pender Harbour learned last month that a 15-year fight over how docks are to be managed is over.

But I haven't heard cheering. That's because the meaningful consultation that the Penner report confirmed was lacking, still is.

As proof, this dock management plan differs little from the draft that shocked residents three years ago.

Predictably, science has confirmed that Pender Harbour's environmental and archeological health are affected by the people living here.

Many might even agree that curtailing the construction of docks is a laudable goal.

But not like this.

Interpretations of how Aboriginal title should be applied is so complicated that our top courts continue to stumble over it.

Certainly our politicians are no better equipped to interpret the legal landscape with respect to First Nations in Canada.

They should be forgiven for their inability to find a solution — but they shouldn't be forgiven for being lazy.

The concept of reconciliation is threatened by mistrust and turmoil if property owners can no longer count on a clear definition of their rights.

Folks rightly fear a transfer of power on matters as important as who governs freehold and Crown property.

Perhaps even more so when that power is transferred to an organization that lacks the transparency we expect from decision-makers. But if we as a nation have decided that outcomes like the DMP are an acceptable cost of reconciliation, then governments have a responsibility to step up and shoulder the burden on behalf of all taxpayers.

Instead, this plan and policies like it — such as increasingly common requirements for expensive archeological assessments — foist costs on property owners in an arbitrary scatter according to whims of a local government we didn't elect.

That isn't reconciliation.

It's hopeful politicking by bewildered bureacrats who have identified that the path of least resistance is to accommodate First Nations demands over the rest of us.

If there was an honest attempt to listen to the Pender Harbour community in this process, those empowered to dictate policy like the DMP might understand that the unwavering resistance of the past 15 years comes from a perceived attack on our maritime culture.

Many are sympathetic to the concept of limiting docks in Pender Harbour but many also know the tag "Venice of the North" wasn't applied to Pender Harbour by accident.

Our community developed from the water, and it fostered a culture of moving around it by boat.

That wouldn't have been possible without a network of docks.

Should the culture that evolved in Pender Harbour over many generations be any less meaningful than claims of cultural value from an Indigenous person?

It seems it is, and that's the crux of the problem.



Province releases Pender dock management plan 2.0

If waterfront property owners in Pender Harbour were hoping for good news in the latest version of the province's dock management plan, they are likely disappointed.

That's because there is little change to controversial zoning that will prohibit some Pender Harbour waterfront owners from having docks on their property.

"My first reaction was that they didn't implement Penner's recommendations," said Leonard Lee, chair of the P. H. Chamber of Commerce dock management plan working group.

"But the main thing we're against is the regulation against zones and the fact the government didn't consult with us.

"They consulted with the SIB but not us, and we are stakeholders."

The stated objective of the DMP is to promote responsible dock development in Pender Harbour by:

- 1. Minimizing and mitigating impacts to marine resource values;
 - 2. Protecting archeological re-

sources from future disturbance;

- 3. Addressing individual and cumulative impacts of dock development on Aboriginal interests; and
- 4. Advancing collaborative management between the Shíshálh Nation and the Province of BC.

Unlike the previous draft version of the DMP that divided Pender Harbour into four zones, the new document contains three.

Zone one (red) includes the western portion of Francis Peninsula and Gunboat Bay.

The DMP states that "new applications for docks or boathouses tenure will not be accepted" in this area.

Zone two (purple) combines much of the yellow and purple zones in the previous draft and includes western Garden Bay, the islands and a large portion of Bargain Harbour:

"New applications for group moorage or commercial moorage will be considered provided the application meets the DMP.

"New applications for private

moorage facilities or boathouse tenure will not be accepted.

"The application must demonstrate that the dock does not impact/influence critical habitat."

Zone three (green) includes much of the mainland portion of Pender Harbour and is the least restrictive but will still require applicants to "demonstrate that the dock does not impact/ influence critical habitat."

The province will consider new dock tenure applications in this zone but, "in order to reduce the environmental impact of multiple private moorages, residents will be encouraged to pursue group moorage facilities or strata title moorage facilities."

"The only place you can really justify no docks at all is right at the head of the Harbour, up in Oyster Bay itself because it's a saltwater marsh," said Lee.

"We shouldn't put docks there and I don't think anybody in their right mind would argue with that one.

"But the bulk of Gunboat Bay is rock and straight into deep water.

"There's no way there'd ever be any archeological remains on the foreshore and there's no way you would ever grow eelgrass there.

"So why they made that zone all red, we don't understand."

Area A director Frank Mauro acknowledged that some will be frustrated with the new version of the DMP.

"There's going to be folks that are certainly not happy in the red zone, most particularly in Gunboat Bay with regards to this current plan which really hasn't changed much."

Also included in the DMP are mandatory requirements for dock design and construction to meet environmental and archeological concerns.

For new tenures, the province encourages prospective applicants to "engage with the Shíshálh Nation early."

After that, the DMP states it will require the applicant to provide the following information as part of the application:

1. The identification of any critical habitat within the tenure area and dock footprint and the plan for the protection of any identified critical habitat;

2. A preliminary field reconnaissance assessment of archeological resources in the foreshore of the tenure.

If the PFR identifies new archeological sites, then the provincial process under the Heritage Conservation Act applies.

3. A management plan, including specifications regarding the design of the dock and describe how ongoing maintenance activities will be consistent with the best management practices set out in section 8.0.

"My feeling is that this will be translated and be done to the rest of the province," said Mauro.

"That being said, I've commented that I don't believe that the dock width should be a maximum of 1.5 metres.

"That's not really feasible in the ocean with associated winds."

But Mauro accepts the necessity for dock owners to comply with the requirements for dock construction.

"Docks do last a long time so it's going to take some time for existing tenures to be rebuilt to the point where they meet the current standards.

"So I don't see that as being a huge issue," he said.

DMP ARCHEOLOGICAL STUDY

In October 2017, consultants In-

lailawatash conducted an archeological survey of Pender Harbour.

The Inlailawatash report indicates that 66 previously recorded archeological sites were assessed.

"Forty-one were observed to have docks, marinas or other built structures, such as retaining walls, on the adjacent foreshore, most with the potential to negatively impact archeological materials.

"Twenty-nine of the 41 sites observed may be negatively impacting an archeological site, but require further study to verify any potential impacts.

"However, 12 of the 41 sites are known to have been negatively impacted.

Among other recommendations, the study called for more archeological study in the area and that a public education program be conducted "to inform the public about the nature, value and protection of archeological sites in their community."

DMP ENVIRONMENTAL STUDY

In March 2018, M.C. Wright and Associates Ltd. concluded their environmental study of Pender Harbour.

That study consisted of two phases of which the first involved conducting a review of literature on the subject.

The report's author acknowledged a lack of scientific data on the subject:

"This is the first field assessment of private dock impacts on the marine environment in BC, and perhaps in Canada.

"On an international scale, this study is one of the few field assessments of dock impacts at such a northerly latitude, which other researchers have previously acknowledged to be a

data gap."

MCW included input from Shíshálh elders' traditional knowledge regarding "marine fish and fish habitat in Pender Harbour."

MCW intended that, "local ecological knowledge also be collected from members of the public through interview-based surveys.

"However, due to the politically sensitive nature of this project, this was not undertaken."

A variety of other sources provided background data on historical levels of fecal coliform, the effects of boats on the environment, including fuel spills and antifouling paints, and the effects of agricultural runoff.

MCW consulted historical photos to paint a picture of the growth of docks in Pender Harbour.

From the report:

"In 2014, there were 326 private docks throughout the harbour and 22 community docks and marinas.

"Almost one-third of the private docks in Pender Harbour have at least one boathouse (73 docks with one boathouse and 16 with at least two boathouses)."

Using the zoning from the draft DMP, MCW found that one-third of docks in zones 1, 2, and 3 are unlicensed while 15 per cent of docks in zone 4 (green zone) are unlicensed.

Of the 267 docks with associated leases or licences, 163 did not fall entirely within the bounds of the tenured area permitted for dock construction or were often entirely outside the bounds of the tenured area.

The study also concluded that docks shade the ocean floor which hinders vegetative growth — especially eelgrass.

Eelgrass is a critical component in marine ecosystems and in the sec-

ond phase of their study, MCW found it was not growing under docks or areas where boats might be moored, due to shading.

The report also noted that "the affected area of eelgrass underneath a dock ranged from 2.6 to 5.4 times larger than the dock itself."

MCW found that Bargain Harbour had the largest and densest eelgrass beds within the study area, covering 21,148 square metres.

Bargain Harbour also had the greatest destruction of eelgrass due to docks.

"The median area of eelgrass lost in Bargain Harbour around and under each dock with an evident footprint was 170 square metres."

The report indicated these areas were 4.4 times larger than the area of the docks themselves and "conservatively estimated" the loss as 2,337

square metres, or 11 per cent of the eelgrass in Bargain Bay.

"In comparison, the area of eelgrass that was projected to be lost on Flora Bank due to construction of the proposed Pacific NorthWest LNG Project was 1,839 square metres."

In light of this finding, MCW recommended that "dock construction should therefore be more, not less, restricted in these areas."

The western shore of Bargain Harbour was in the draft DMP's yellow zone but found itself in the more restrictive purple zone in this version.

Lee said he will present the position of the DMPWG at a May 6 town hall meeting in Madeira Park.

The DMPWG will likely host a later meeting strictly about the DMP.

"And we'll ask the community if we should continue, or if we should accept the policies the way they are."

Pender Harbour DMP — April 4, 2018, "Dock construction and maintenance guidelines - best managment practices" (partial list):

- 8.1 Critical habitats should be avoided within the dock footprint. New docks must not be installed over these habitats unless the design mitigates for potential impacts and does not result in losses to these habitats. Boathouses must not be built over critical habitat.
- 8.2 Design of a dock or boathouse should not include components that block the free movement of water along the shoreline. Crib foundations or solid core structures made of cement or steel sheeting should be avoided as these types of structures result in large areas of vegetation removal and erosion in riparian areas.
- 8.3 The bottom of all floats must be a minimum of 1.5 metres above the sea bed during the lowest tide. Dock height above lowest water level must be increased if deep draft vessels are to be moored at the dock.
- 8.4 The size of all docks should be minimized. Access ramps, walkways or docks should be a minimum of 1.0 metre above the highest high water mark of the tide. Access ramps and walkways should not exceed a maximum width of 1.2 metres. Docks should not exceed a maximum width of 1.5 metres.
- 8.6 Docks must be constructed to allow light penetration under the structure and used decking materials must allow for minimum of 43% open space allowing for light penetration to the water surface. Light transmitting materials may be made of various materials shaped in the form of grids, grates, and lattices to allow for light passage.
- 8.7 Docks should be aligned in a north-south direction to the maximum extent that is practicable.





ROTARY CLUB ANNOUNCES NEW POSITION

SCRD COMPLETES 2018 BUDGET

The Sunshine Coast Regional District budget for 2018 was adopted at the March 22 board meeting.

According to an SCRD statement, the overall tax increase for 2018 is 4.3 per cent over 2017.

"The impact in each electoral area varies depending on the services provided and changes in assessment values relative to other areas and to other property taxes."

Because of that, Area A's rate increase only rose to 3.68 per cent.

"Over 70 new proposals came forward . . . totalling over \$9.5 million and an additional \$390,000 from community groups.

"Projects were prioritized based

on four key criteria — mandatory/ business continuity, direct link to the SCRD's strategic plan, identified in the SCRD's integrated five-year plan, and low cost and high value."

MARINA PHARMACY UNDER NEW OWNERSHIP

Multiple local sources have confirmed that Island Pharmacy Group is the new owner of Madeira Park's Marina Pharmacy.

Island Pharmacy operates nine locations between Victoria and Gabriola Island.

Pender Banana Peppers clinch Sunshine Coast championship

For the first time since they entered the Sunshine Coast women's soccer league seven seasons ago, the Pender Harbour Banana Peppers have won the league championship.

Though the Sitas posted the best regular season record, the BPs coach Brent Sheppard knew it would come down to his team and the Source to battle it out for the hardware on April 6, 7 and 8 at Kinnikinnick field.

"We were the two teams to beat," said Sheppard.

"The Source are a really solid team and they're really athletic."

They Source have also made it to the championship final in each of the last three seasons.

"But they hadn't won — so we knew they were going to give us everything," said Sheppard.

Despite their coach's confidence, the BPs dropped their first game to the Ya Yas, 2-1.

They bounced back against the Supremes and took that game 2-1.

The Banana Peppers went on to shut out the Blazers 4-0 before clinching a berth in Sunday's final by beating the Sitas 2-1.

In a championship final preview, late Saturday saw the BPs and the Source meet for the first time.

"We knew were to meet in the final so we wanted to place some doubt in the other team going into Sunday," said Sheppard.

The Banana Peppers beat the Source 1-0, setting up an intense showdown for the coveted champion-ship cup.

In the first half of Sunday's championship game, the BPs 199th, a double-header combination by Mary Mackay and Nicole Caithness put the BPs up by one.

Soon after, Dani Pazur found the back of the net to give the BPs a 2-0 lead going into the second half.

"The Source made some changes and came out hard in the second half and managed to get a goal back," said Sheppard.

"It turned into a dogfight after that and it got super intense right down to the final seconds."

But the game ended 2-1 with newly crowned champions, the first for Pender's Banana Peppers.

ROAD MAINTENANCE

The SCRD board recently met with the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure to discuss

changes regarding road maintenance with the tendering of new long-term maintenance contracts.

The biggest change will be an increase in road sweeping (particularly roads used for bike lanes) and several changes in the standard specifications for some aspects of road maintenance.

It has been previously reported that there will be work done on Irvine's Landing road, especially near Mixal Lake.

Another welcome note is the

replacement of the centre-line "cat's eyes" on Highway 101.

This is something that is frequently mentioned as a serious issue, particularly for driving on dark rainy nights.

ROADSIDE MOWING

The recent mowing along Highway 101 brought to mind an item I wrote in this column about five years ago.

It is springtime and MOTI contractors will be out mowing along roadside rights-of-way to improve visibility and safety.

They have many kilometres of roadway to maintain and we are all familiar with the loader-mounted mowers they use for the job.

Obviously this type of equipment is designed to quickly clear large ar-

eas and can't be used for detail work.

In residential areas, if you have hedges or other such vegetation on the road right-of-way, it is important to keep the vegetation trimmed a couple of metres back from the travelled portion of the roadway.

The people who operate the equipment are usually local folks who give homeowners the benefit of the doubt and generally won't mow if the vegetation is well back and looks like it has been tended.

Remember that the road rightof-way in most places is 20 metres wide so it usually extends at least four metres past the edge of the pavement.

MOTI generally does not mow more than 1.5 metres past the edge of the pavement so there is a lot of leeway.

It is best to keep hedges trees etc.

clear of this margin; otherwise they may be mowed.

AVICC

I attended the Association of Vancouver Island and Coastal Communities conference in mid-April.

While several useful topics were discussed, the most informative workshop I attended was named "cannabis regulation after legislation."

The main theme was the BC provincial government regulations that have been drafted in preparation for the passing of the federal legalization in July.

While it is not possible in this space to spell out all the "rules," a few notable ones are worth mentioning.

First, the legal age for possession in BC will be the same as the drinking age, 19 years.

Second, distribution and control will be assigned to the BC Liquor Control Board but sales of cannabis will not be allowed in the same outlets where liquor is sold except in remote or rural areas where there is a lack of available outlets.

It was not made clear, though, how "remote" eligibility would be decided so no definitive statements can be made about our area at this time.

Third, the test for determining impaired driving due to cannabis is going to be problematic as current

available equipment can only detect the presence of cannabis, not the quantity.

There are plans to provide some "sobriety testing training" to law enforcement officials.

The actual implementation of this could be interesting.

The province intends to refer all distribution applications to the local government for comment as part of the approval process.

This will allow local government to determine the density of retail outlets, the distance from schools, parks and other sensitive areas.

This collaboration has not been well defined to date but is welcome. although it will require local policy and bylaw development.

Also, the associated enforcement needs have not yet been defined.

Implementation and operating costs for local governments will be significant and, as the province will receive a substantial share of any revenues generated, local governments passed resolutions at AVICC regarding recovering costs from the province.





The facilitators of the Kids Fishign Club, Tom Talarico and Patti Soos, welcome (and receive) many parent volunteers to help and hang out.


It runs from April to June and September to November, weather permitting.







10 years ago - spiel archives (may 2008 issue)

EDITORS NOTE: This archive section is a new series in the Harbour Spiel that looks back at notable stories from the issue one decade previous. The first installment started in the April 2018 issue with a previously published story about the original Frances' Burger stand being replaced with the one that now occupies the Madeira Park site. Apparently, some misunderstood that Triple Bs Burgers is moving. It is not. Like the story below, it happened 10 years ago this month.



May 2008: It was hard to find an idle dump truck for a few days when 480 truckloads of sand were trucked to the Lions' Park soccer field from the Dean Bosch Barge Terminal in Egmont. Seven thousand tons of river sand had to be barged in because the type specified by engineers wasn't available on the Coast. What makes this sand ideal is that the silica particles are rounded from years of natural erosion rather than having sharp edges typical of crushed sand. This property offers a distinct advantage to a soccer field because, as it compacts, it will still allow water to drain.

Tick talk: Timely tips for safe management of tick bites

WHAT'S THE BIG DEAL ABOUT TICKS?

According to data collected in BC and the Sunshine Coast, fewer than one per cent of all ticks tested positive for Lyme disease.

It's always wise to be prepared and prevention is the best advice.

With the advent of the internet, we are bombarded by supposed experts selling advice, offering gadgets and leaving us with a baffling array of misinformation.

WHAT IS A TICK?

Ticks are tiny spider-like bugs that fasten themselves to the skin and feed on blood.

There are more than 850 species around the world but the basics of tick identification can help you know if you've been bitten by ticks or another outdoor pest.

Tick larvae are the size of a grain of sand, nymphs are size of sesame seed and unfed adults are the size of an apple seed.

They have no wings, can't fly, and can have 6 or 8 legs when fully grown.


A tick that is fully fed will appear engorged and can be the size of a small grape.

Because of the way they feed, ticks can appear headless when you see them on yourself.

So, if you have been recently out in areas with high brush or grass, and you see small dark spots on your legs, pants or socks, you may have a hitchhiker, aka a "tick buddy."

SAFE MANAGEMENT OF A TICK BITE

Try to remove the tick as soon as



The most important thing is to get a hold of the tick as close to the skin as possible.

Without squeezing the tick, steadily lift it straight off the skin.

Try to make sure that all of the tick is removed and clean the bite area with soap and water.

Then disinfect the wound with an antiseptic and wash your hands.

If you are unable to completely remove the tick, seek medical advice and removal

WHEN TO SEEK MEDICAL ADVICE

Symptoms usually appear within 3 to 30 days after being bitten.

A small red bump may appear at the site of the tick bite; this is normal.

But if it develops into a larger rash, perhaps with a bull's eye pattern, the rash may indicate Lyme disease.

This can produce flu-like symptoms.

If you think the bite site is in-

If possible, bring the tick with you to your medical appointment.

However, if you develop a severe headache, have difficulty breathing, or experience paralysis or heart palpitations, call 911.

MORE TIPS

When you're enjoying the outdoors, wear light colored long sleeves, pants tucked into socks and a hat.

You can also use a variety of tick deterrents, including Deet with 0.5% Permethrin, and a variety of essential oils such as lavender, pennyroyal, lemon grass and eucalyptus.

These products can be sprayed on your body, backpack, shoes and your hat.

If you suspect ticks have attached to your backpack, put it in a sealed plastic bag.

When home, put in a hot dryer and then in a washing machine.

The Egmont Story

This article appeared in the Coast News, May 24, 1956.

Continued from April 2018 issue.

When in the interests of security the Japanese were evacuated from the two stores at Egmont during the last war, the police gave them such short notice that they had no time to take stock or look around for suitable persons to take charge of the stores.

Although we were not aware of it at the time, their affairs were supposed to be in the hands of a government official known as the "custodian of the alien property."

It was his duty to dispose of such property and hold the money in trust for the owners until matters were straightened up.

Apparently it was not intended that they should ever come back even after the war.

During that distracting night when they were apprehended, the Japanese got two people from the south side (modern day Egmont) to look after Taki and Maeda's floating store and two fishermen promised to

act as caretakers for Hatashita's store.

After the Japanese were gone, it was pointed out to the police that the people of Egmont had no source for supplies until someone could be found to buy one of the stores.

And that would take time.

A consultation took place and the upshot was that it was decided to open up Taki and Maeda's floating store and sell off the stock.

When this was all gone, the store would be closed and then Hatashita's store would be opened and kept supplied until a buyer was found for it.

The temporary shopkeepers in the floating store were supplied with a price list for all the goods in the store and were soon open for business.

It was impossible to memorize the prices in such a short time.

They started out conscientiously referring to the list for every item

As most people came by boat and ordered enough stuff to last them a week at least, it became a painfully long business to wait on a customer and many a customer grew impatient at the delay.

After a day or two of this tedious business the price list was discarded.

Among other things customers found that all canned goods, irre-

spective of their contents, were quite nonchalantly being sold at two for a quarter.

In the meantime, the top store (Hatashita's) was closed.

The two fishermen who had accepted the job as caretakers were Herbert Madsen, known to all and sundry as Murphy, and Dave Mowat.

They were living on their boats which were tied to floats.

Murphy's name has appeared in print several times.

His boat, the *Nimbus*, was also well known.

At one time he had been a camp tender for the long established logging camp at Rock Bay — often referred to as the "Old Man's Home."

As the lower store (Taki and Maeda's) was about to be opened one morning, it was noticed that Murphy's boat was absent.

His partner didn't seem to be around, although his boat was there.

They went over and called on him and then looked in the boat.

He was in his boat alright but was quite dead.

All sorts of things were imagined as a hurried search was instituted for Murphy and the *Nimbus*.

He was found anchored in Green Bay.

He seemed to be alright.

Why he had pulled out is hard to say.

It finally came out that they had been having a celebration and had run out of refreshment.

They remembered a row of large brown bottles in the store room so decided to go up and investigate.

They thought the bottles contained wine or sake.

It turned out they contained bleach.

Evidently the sample hadn't bothered Murphy too much but Dave Mowat already had an ulcerated stomach and the bleach was the last straw

When the stock in the lower store was finally sold, the upper store was opened.

Two rowboat fishermen had taken the place of Murphy and his friend as caretakers.

I do not know how these fellows made out but I do remember our going to the store one day, seeing no one inside, and after knocking in vain we tried the door and found it open so went inside and shouted,

"Yoo-hoo. Anyone around?"

With that, the two men ambled out from the living quarters and informed us they were just about to have a Japanese steam bath.

One of them announced he needed some clean undershirts so, while his partner waited on us, he reached up on a shelf for a box from which he extracted two new undershirts and carried them off into the back room.

In the meantime, the Queen Charlotte Fishing Company had been negotiating for the store and when the deal was completed, they sent up one of their old-time fish buyers to take over.

He admitted it had been some time since he had run a store and then only on a fish scow.

He found it difficult to estimate the needs of the local residents with regard to meat and other fresh produce.

He was generally so overstocked that the greater part of each week's order went to feed the fishes.

Finally, the company sent Jack Parry to take charge and things soon underwent an improvement.

By this time, the old floating store had become the fish buyer's house and he lived there until it was sold and taken away.


