Into the chamber of the unknown

Anyone who has lived here longer than 10 years

understands that the micro-economy of Pender Harbour and Egmont has always been fragile.

It's one reason why the Pender Harbour Board of Trade was formed in 1949 — to bolster industry in our isolated community.

Things are booming these days but the transition from fishing and logging dominance to include tourism and construction has taken awhile and there has been much discussion during that time about how to keep the lights on in the winter.

At some point, the PHBT evolved into the Pender Harbour and District Chamber of Commerce.

The local "voice of business," dedicated itself to welcoming visitors by supporting initiatives like the early 2000s Madeira Park beautification projects and ongoing management of the visitor information centre.

A brief housing boom during that time was followed by the 2008 financial crisis.

The resulting slowdown forced some families to split and our school's enrolment took a subsequent dip.

The school district talked about combining our two schools, again, and the SCRD, not knowing what else to do, started throwing money at a new organization they created called the Sunshine Coast Regional Economic Development Organization, intended to "enhance economic capacity" on the Coast.

But even then, most knew that our proximity to the Lower Mainland meant that the Sunshine Coast would be discovered, some day.

After COVID accomplished what

well-meaning organizations couldn't, concern about the state of our economy has taken a back seat to how we can preserve it while maintaining the quality of life folks stay here for.

With that in mind, our chamber of commerce directors have proposed a merger with the other two chambers on the Coast (see story, p. 5).

It makes sense in many ways.

Some of the biggest threats to our lifestyle involve pan-Sunshine Coast issues like the failing ferry system and developing infrastructure required to accommodate the influx of refugees from the Lower Mainland.

A unified Sunshine Coast Chamber of Commerce might be more effective at advocating for solutions to these issues that are increasingly tied to provincial authority.

But I wonder, will it work?

Pender Harbour and Egmont have a history of distrust of the larger population centres down the Coast.

And there's a reason our politics hasn't always aligned with the Lower

At less than 10 per cent of the Coast, our population deficit sometimes means that matters important to us are not seen as urgent by those south of Secret Cove.

So, when an issue specific to Pendmont inevitably arises, will this new entity take action?

Time will tell.

The merger is worth the shot but there's a risk that when a divisive topic does rear up, if left unsatisfied, our members will vote with their feet.

And then we'll be without chamber of commerce representation.

Until, I suppose, we resurrect an alternative to replace it.

Like the "Pender Harbour and Egmont Board of Trade."

FRESHWATER JELLYFISH IN BRITISH COLUMBIA & BEYOND: Saturday, Sept. 9, 2 p.m.

Dr. Florian Lüskow presents an informative update on "Freshwater Jellyfish in British Columbia & Beyond: Knowledge gaps and current progress" on Sept. 9 at 2 p.m. at the Sarah Wray Hall in Irvines Landing (4334 Irvines Landing Road). Since at least 1990, an invasive freshwater jellyfish called *Craspedacusta sowerbii* from China has been observed and is spreading across BC, mostly on Vancouver Island, the Lower Mainland, and the Sunshine Coast. The species is not dangerous to humans, but its function in local freshwater systems is still unclear. Their numbers are increasing with ongoing climate change and to be able to predict (and manage) their future populations, we now require an understanding of their seasonal appearance, population development and interplay with fish, zooplankton and algae.


10TH ANNUAL TRASH BASH: Saturday, Sept. 16, 10 a.m.

Sunshine Coast chambers of commerce propose merger

Members of the three chambers of commerce on the Sunshine Coast, including the Pender Harbour and District Chamber of Commerce, will soon vote on a proposed merger.

According to a joint Aug. 14 press release titled "Stronger as one," the boards of directors of the three chambers of commerce on the Sunshine Coast recently signed letters of intent to merge into one organization by the end of the year:

"The decision to pursue a merger revolves mainly around enhancing member benefits, services, and sales.

"By combining into one organization, members will pay one annual membership fee to achieve expanded exposure to customers, suppliers, and vendors from Port Mellon to Egmont.

"One board of directors also unifies and strengthens positions on advocacy, public policy and legislative priorities for all businesses on the Sunshine Coast."

In an interview with the *Harbour Spiel*, Ron Badley, president of the Pender Harbour and District Chamber of Commerce, said this wasn't the first time the topic of merging the three chambers of commerce on the Sunshine Coast has come up.

"They tried a few years ago and made an effort but there was a bunch of personality clashes," he said.

"In the spring, we did a bit of a meet and greet up at the Fuse Work Hub at the Harbour Spirit Centre and everybody was there and we all got along really well and it sort of popped up then as a possibility."

Badley said meetings took place afterward and then a consultant, Janice Iversen, was hired to facilitate the process.

Combined, the three chambers' membership base exceeds 500, and

annual revenues are \$170,000.

Badley said that details are still coming together about what the Sunshine Coast Chamber of Commerce would look like but the groups are aiming to send a vote to their membership in November.

In order to conduct a vote, Badley is consulting bylaws that were written in 1949 when the "Pender Harbour Board of Trade," which later became the current chamber of commerce, was created.

"The representation would be the same or better because it would be more Coast-wide and a lot of the businesses are Coast-wide," he said.

"I think they (local businesses) are going to get more exposure to the southern part of the Coast."

Essentially, Badley sees benefits from having a "bigger voice in a bigger group" in order to advocate for some of the broader Sunshine Coast issues like ferry travel and to access more funding for projects.

"We've been talking about it a lot and it's hard to find a bad side," said Badley.

Badley said the initial plan is to have two members from each chamber on the new board plus one more, likely a representative from an organization like Sunshine Coast Community Futures or the Sunshine Coast Regional Economic Development Organization.

"Each chamber does slightly different stuff but it would be more organized for sure," he said.

"Less looking after bathrooms and more looking after businesses," he said referring to the PHDCC's responsibility to maintain the washrooms at the Madeira Park Visitor Information Centre.

Badley said that post-merger, the (continued on p. 7)

VIC could be taken over by Sunshine Coast Tourism who already run the Sechelt and Gibsons visitor information centres.

If the chamber members vote to move ahead with the merger, Badley said his group hopes the new entity will operable by Jan. 1.

Currently, the heads of the three chambers have been meeting with members and other organizations to consider a blueprint for the merger process.

Badley said they are meeting every two weeks and hashing out details ahead of the planned vote in November.


Though the plan is still coming together, Badley said details about

how the new organization will operate will be forthcoming prior to the vote planned for November.

"There will be a solid plan in place and all of the details will be worked out."

Keighley: Irvines Landing Rd. too narrow, too tight, too dangerous

Editor,

Everyone knows that driving accidents happen all the time wherever there are vehicles on roads.

But when a particular outcome begins to repeat at a single location, highway engineers begin to look for reasons beyond human error to see if poor road conditions or design are contributing factors, and if they are, take steps to correct them.

In the last 17 years, there have been four vehicles off the Irvines Landing Road at the Mixal Lake curve and into the lake.

In 2006 a body was retrieved from a submerged van.

Since then, three other vehicles have gone into the lake, fortunately all without fatalities.

The latest incident this past May involved Fay and Ian Wright of Irvines Landing.

Fay was driving them home when they encountered a construction truck towing an equipment trailer over the centre line.

Fay moved onto the very narrow shoulder to avoid a head-on collision, but the shoulder quickly disappeared and they plunged into the lake.

Their car floated forward and miraculously came to rest on a submerged alder trunk, which kept them from slipping into 25 feet of water, and their probable deaths.

There's little room for error on this narrow section of Irvines Landing Road.

The key contributing factors to those four vehicles ending up in the lake are the extreme tightness of the curve and the absence of concrete barriers to keep vehicles on the road.

There is zero shoulder at the critical point along the curve.

The bank slopes steeply down from the pavement into deep water.

There is no land on which to mount a secure barrier.

Irvines Landing Road was pushed through as a narrow gravel road around 1936 during the Great Depression and still follows its original 87-year-old placement.

Back then vehicles were smaller and fewer.

Today, as development proceeds apace, vehicles are substantially larger and traffic volume is much heavier.

The Mixal Lake curve is simply too narrow, too tight and too dangerous.

It's time for our Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure to "Fix the Mixal Lake Curve."

Before it's too late.

Fortunately, the existing curve only occupies the outer one-half of the 66-foot road allowance, meaning there is plenty of MOTI land to blast out the rock on the inside of the curve, move the driving surface over away from the lake and easing the curve.

Help us convince MOTI to fix the Mixal Lake curve by joining with the already 500 other citizens who have signed our online and print petition to MOTI Minister Rob Fleming at *change.org/fixthemixalcurve*.

Tying up dead ends

A dead end occurs when a water pipe terminates at a small cluster of users.

An eight-inch

water main is required for fire hydrants, but if there are too few users, they can't generate enough flow to prevent stagnation resulting in bacterial growth caused by sediment buildup and chlorine loss.

Insufficient flow causes decreased pressure, deteriorated quality, health concerns, and user complaints including odour, discoloration and an unpleasant taste.

Dead ends are avoided by looping mains to create a "grid," but a grid doesn't work until enough homes

have been built.

At the Sakinaw Ridge subdivision, a hydrant is opened regularly to generate flow, but it's costly to dispatch technicians, and it deteriorates water quality for the following day.

At the end of Porter Road, flow is ensured by a small branch pipe, continuously running into the ocean.

I've been asked why this waste of water occurs and how it could be avoided, so an investigation is underway with these considerations:

- The flushing hasn't diminished Garden Bay Lake or violated our water licence;
- Flushing is dependable, cheap, proven and effective;
- We could use technology solutions to release water at predetermined times and volumes;
 - We plan to extend the Porter

Road main further into Kleindale;

- Discussions of connecting the North and South Pender systems, with a crossing at Gunboat/Oyster Bay;
- Who should pay for a more expensive, temporary solution;
- Can we use the flushed water, perhaps making it available via an always-on yard hydrant, and
- Should we continue flushing during a drought?

We shouldn't reduce water quality simply to respond to public perception that isn't supported by fact.

WATER CRISIS

South Pender remains on Stage 3 restrictions while Stage 4 depends on weather, water demand, and availability from Harris and McNeill Lakes.

Seven of the last eight years saw far below average summer precipita-

tion, amounts that climate models predicted for 2050, and there has been a dramatic decrease in summer creek flow over the last decade.

The maximum drought period could be 200 days, from May 1 to mid-November, but we can't be certain because weather patterns are now unpredictable.

We need a budget to close the gap between current and future water demands.

We've done well in reducing individual water use at Stage 3 restrictions, with daily use dropping from 591 litres/person in June to 432 litres/person in July, but we could likely do better (Gibsons, at Stage 1, reports 408 daily litres/person).

HARRIS AND MCNEILL LAKES

Watching the McNeill Lake water level, it would appear everything is all OK but that's not the real story.

On Aug. 1, for the first time in decades, we began releasing stored Harris Lake water, which is licensed only for emergency use during a drought and which feeds McNeill Lake, thus slowing the rate at which it drops.

We have licences to use about half the stored water in McNeill and Harris.

If we can get the Harris Lake water to McNeill, if our licences allow, we could probably manage 200 days of drought and still retain a reserve in case of emergencies such as structure fires and wildfire as we experienced at Cecil Hill a few years ago.

Today's challenge is that the existing outlet channel will only allow us 22 per cent of the stored Harris

Lake water, leaving us well short of water before the end of the drought.

The SCRD is exploring ways to access the last 78 per cent of stored water at Harris Lake.

If the drought drags on, interim solutions might be possible, such as siphons like at Chapman, or perhaps a pump similar to what was used to refill McNeill Lake from Harris Lake after water was released for expansion and maintenance many years ago.

Local action remains the best way to retain water for essential use throughout late summer and fall, and we all know how to do it, but we must want to do it.

JOINING THE NORTH AND THE SOUTH

Rumblings about joining our two water systems for a single service with one budget and rate make me wonder if it's an idea whose time has come:

- If one plant fails, the other can provide water;
- We need the volume of both plants to fight a wildfire;
- Expansions of both systems will be more efficient and cheaper, and
- If done now, it can prevent further South Pender restrictions.
- It worked for our fire departments, why not our water services?

As with most great ideas there are challenges, but with resident support, it can be done quickly.

Gardening with native plants and natural processes

On Tuesday, Sept. 19, the Pender Harbour Wildlife Society hosts its first in-person monthly presentation since the start of the pandemic.

Presenting "Healthy habitats at home: Gardening with native plants and natural processes" will be Karen Cummins and Jan Smith.

Cummins and Smith are members of the habitat stewardship team with the MARS Wildlife Rescue Centre in Merville, BC.

MARS was recently recognized by the 2022 Greener Greenspaces program, initiated by the Society for Organic Urban Land Care.



Pazur seized every day of her life with both hands, and her family only wishes they had more days to spend with her.


Pazur died in her home on July 9 surrounded by her family.

#### You are not alone

Dying and bereavement can sometimes be the most challenging time in our life.

There are many unfamiliar things to deal with and emotions get ragged.

Where do you turn?

The Sunshine Coast Hospice Society has volunteers from Egmont to Langdale who can support you and your family and friends through the end of life journey.

More than 30 per cent of the population on the Sunshine Coast is 65 years of age or older.

Clearly the demographics on the Coast underscore the need for improved hospice residential and home care services.

The SCHS has more than 60 volunteers who have participated in a rigorous curriculum set by the national and provincial hospice palliative care associations.

Everything you tell a hospice volunteer is kept confidential.

Volunteers meet with people at the end of life and/or those who are close to the one who is dying.

They offer friendship, a listening non-judgmental ear or a break for the caregiver to get out of the house and know their loved one is safe.

Some people seek out hospice only after a loved one has died and they want to talk to someone who has been through a similar experience.



The Pender Harbour volunteers offer a bereavement group that runs in the fall or spring.

There is such a relief in meeting with others who know what you're going through, where you don't have to pretend that everything's OK, or worry that you're "not moving on fast enough."

While most of us want to die at home surrounded by our loved ones, this is not possible for many families.

The Sunshine Coast Hospice Society offers two hospice rooms at Shorncliffe in Sechelt, which provides a home-like environment with the benefit of 24-hour nursing care.

Hospice volunteers offer respite for families at this time so their loved one has company if they want.

Sunshine Coast Hospice is located at Hospice House, our program and office space in Davis Bay.

It is a short, uphill walk from Davis Bay Beach and around the corner from the Davis Bay Community Hall at 4602 Simpkins Road.

Visitors are welcome to drop by anytime during office hours, but in order to best support you, they recommend scheduling appointments in advance.

The Kate Webb resource library is open to the public during office hours, and our tranquil outdoor memory garden space is always available for the public to enjoy.

#### Kim Hedges becomes first American to swim the Strait of Georgia

On July 9, Kim Hedges achieved her goal of being the first American to swim across the Strait of Georgia, from Nanaimo to the Sunshine Coast.

She completed this remarkable 29 kilometre feat non-stop and unassisted, except for a pilot boat and support personnel that acted as a safety resource for the trip.

Accompanying Hedges were Dan Tresa of Garden Bay who captained *Palapa*, a 37-foot sailboat moored in Pender Harbour, and mates Dave Maskell of Nanoose Bay and Steve Barbour, also of Garden Bay.

Also on board was fellow swimmer Jessi Harewicz, who acted as the official witness and timekeeper.

Hedges is a marathon swimmer — a member of the South End Rowing Club in San Francisco and the Marathon Swimmers Federation.

In 2014, she discovered the sport of open water swimming and considers herself a "built for distance rather than speed" type of athlete.

She has completed several marathon swims already but this achievement was hard earned.

#### **MARATHON SWIMMING**

Marathon swimming has a long history, with the sport dating back to at least 1875, or perhaps even to

ancient Greece.

The Marathon Swimmers Federation states that "marathon swimmers embrace the challenge of crossing wild, open bodies of water with minimal assistance beyond their own physical strength and mental fortitude."

A marathon swim is a nonstop open water swim over 10 kilometres.

The swim begins when the swimmer enters the water from a natural shore and ends when the swimmer clears the water on a natural shore.

Swimmers remain in the water for the entire duration of the swim without physical contact with escort vessels, support personnel or other objects.

When following "English Channel rules," as Kim does, swimmers must wear only a swimsuit made of porous, textile materials — no neoprene.

They may also use a bathing cap of latex or silicone, goggles, earplugs or a nose clip, and they may use grease to combat chafing and sunscreen to help prevent burning.

They may also use an escort boat, pilot and crew who can provide safety support and nutrition; however, at no time may the swimmer be towed or supported, and they may not draft the vessel.

For a swim to be formally logged in marathon swimming archives and widely recognized by the marathon swimming community, the entire effort must be observed and documented by a qualified individual who can verify adherence to the marathon swimming rules and keep time.

In 1972, Frances Cannon (Caldwell) was the first woman recorded to swim across the Strait of Georgia.

Marathon swimming is not for the faint of heart.

It can take multiple attempts and crushing disappointment before finally completing a route.

Cannon made four attempts to complete the swim before achieving success.

According to *longswims.com*, Debbie Collins became the second woman in 1995.

In 2014, Rachel Schoeler became the third woman to cross.

In 2016, Jessi Harewicz of Vancouver became the fourth woman to complete the swim.

On July 9, Hedges became the fifth woman, and the first American, to complete this route.

#### THE SWIM

This was Hedges third attempt at this crossing.

Her first two attempts were hampered by current and weather — the Georgia Strait is notorious for unpredictable seas.

The tides are strong, with rocks and islands that can make it treacherous for support vessels, let alone a lone swimmer in the water.

Tresa and Barbour supported Hedges on her second attempt in September 2022.

That time, the team started on the Sunshine Coast and swam toward Nanaimo.

Unfortunately, the swim took them into nightfall, and with the winds, a rocky shoreline and the dark, they were not able to complete the crossing safely.

Learning from that experience, crew and swimmer made changes to the route.

This time they started the swim in Nanaimo during the early hours of the morning, with the intention to make the Sunshine Coast during daylight; and to a location with a safe landing.

Hedges and the crew, along with official timekeeper Harewicz, loaded into *Palapa* in the afternoon of July 8 and sailed across the strait from

Pender Harbour.

Even though it had been calm for days, the wind picked up to a steady blow, threatening the entire swim.

If there was too much wind, the boat might be driven off course more easily, which would be unsafe for the crew and for the swimmer.

By around 1:30 a.m., the wind had eased, and at 1:58 a.m., Hedges entered the water.

She re-emerged almost 15 and 1/2 hours later when, at 5:24 p.m., her

feet found Welcome Beach.

Hedges swam approximately 29.6 kilometres (18.4 miles).

A small group came to the beach wondering about the commotion and promptly provided cheers of encouragement as the marathon swimmer touched land.

Hedges said later that her focus, words of motivation, the memories of her incomplete attempts, and sheer determination kept her going through the long hours in the water.




