Immigrants are destroying our ecosystems

There, now that I have the attention of People's Party of Canada voters, let

me introduce another example of how humans have wrecked the planet.

According the province's website, BC hosts almost 1,000 invasive species, each making at least some negative impact to our environment, people or the economy.

Over 86% are plants, 8.5% are invertebrates while birds, reptiles, amphibians, fish and mammals make up 4.6% of established alien species.

Globally, examples of introduced pests are many and terrifying — while those projectile-like Asian carp threaten to enter the Great Lakes, there's a growing population of 20-foot Burmese pythons eating their way through the Florida Everglades.

Here, we may soon face nasty Asian giant hornets — the largest hornet in the world and found in Nanaimo in 2019.

Most of our threats are much less dramatic, but not less costly.

We've all heard about the Mountain pine beetle's effect on BC's forest industry but I was shocked to learn from a recent CBC story that the number two threat to our forests might just be trout bait.

The common earthworm (*Lumbricus terrestris*) is a foreign pest that was introduced from Western Europe about 300 years ago.

These little guys are fundamentally changing the soil properties of Canada's forests by speeding up decomposition and altering the soil's pH, texture and nutrient enrichment.

We don't yet know what effect this will have but if you're one of those people who still believe in biology, it's as fascinating as it is scary.

Fruit growers face similiar foes.

According to the Invasive Species Council of BC, the apple maggot fly is native to Eastern North America and was introduced to BC in 2006.

It feeds on apples and stone fruits like cherries, plums and apricots, rendering them unsellable.

If apple maggots don't scare you, there is Himalayan blackberry (*Sharpus hellweedis*), Japanese knotweed, Scotch broom, stink bugs and and the black slug; each disrupting the balance in its own way.

Even our nastiest mosquitoes and tastiest oysters are foreign.

A year ago, I wrote a story about researcher Florian Lüskow who went searching for, and found, invasive freshwater jellyfish in Mixal Lake.

At the time, Lüskow said Craspedacusta sowerbyi had also been sighted in Katherine Lake, Klein Lake and Ambrose Lake.

Not surprisingly, this summer, some friend's kids consistently netted them in Garden Bay Lake.

Lueskow assured me they are harmless to humans but "... the effect on the foodweb is so far not clearly studied."

Later, I went for a swim with goggles and consistently spotted a jelly every five or 10 strokes, all a couple feet below the surface.

How might a hot summer like we just experienced, or a few stacked in a row, affect their population?

What impact would a bloom have on our drinking water?

Multiply that answer with the 1,000 other potential disasters that humans have introduced to BC and it seems clear that the Sunshine Coast is already experiencing a hefty redistribution of species.

As it happens, in most cases, there may be nothing to do but watch — and hope it's not Bengal tigers next.

Most of the time this will be on the same day. Anyone who is seen at the clinic will also receive a follow-up phone call or appointment within 24 to 48 hours.

The RAC operates on an appointment basis only and will not see walk-in patients. Call or text (604) 740-1252 or email *coastrespclinic@gmail.com*.

Pender Harbour branch of hospital auxiliary folds after 84 years

The Pender Harbour branch of the Sunshine Coast Healthcare Auxiliary has folded.

Maureen Lee, SCHA Pender Harbour branch co-chair, told the Harbour Spiel that volunteer burnout and the age of their volunteers was the underlying reason why the branch could no longer continue.

"We are sad to see it go because we've been in operation for 84 years," said Lee.

"But just about everyone in our group is in their late-70s."

The Pender Harbour Hospital Auxiliary was started in 1937 to aid in the operation of St. Mary's Hospital in Garden Bay.

Prior to this decision, the SCHA was made up of five branches — Pender Harbour, Halfmoon Bay, Gibsons, Sechelt and Hopkins Landing.

Together, the auxiliaries that make up the SCHA raise money to support patient care and offset funding shortfalls at the Sechelt Hospital as well as a variety of health-related grants and bursaries on the Sunshine Coast.

On July 21, the 21 members of the Pender Harbour branch of the auxiliary met and unanimously voted to close their branch.

Lee said the balance of their raised cash and archival material will soon be handed over to the main orga-

nization.

She said she hopes that will be completed by Oct. 1.

The first auxiliary of what was formerly St. Mary's Hospital Auxiliary was formed in Pender Harbour in 1937.

Maggie Cameron was elected as its first president.

It was followed by Halfmoon Bay in 1955, Gibsons in 1960, Sechelt in 1961, Roberts Creek in 1964 and Port Mellon (now Hopkins) also in 1964.

In 1983, the separate auxiliaries amalgamated to become one auxiliary with six branches.

In 1993, the auxiliary formed a

society and a board of directors elected from the branches now directs the business of the auxiliary.

In 2015, following the changing of St. Mary's Hospital's name to the Sechelt (shishalh) Hospital, the auxiliary adopted their current name.

In 2020, the Roberts Creek branch disbanded with many members joining other branches.

Prior to the loss of Pender Harbour, the SCHA had approximately 350 members who besides other fundraising efforts, staff the hospital gift shop and the S. C. Healthcare Auxiliary Thrift Store at 5693 Cowrie Street in Sechelt.

Pender Harbour's group mainly relied on bake sales and raffles and contributed thousands of dollars each year to the joint effort but Lee said they had problems finding new volunteers.

"The young people don't have

time to volunteer anymore," said Lee.

"They're too busy with kids and family and jobs.

"It's not just us, every organization is having the same problem."

Lee said at least seven members from the Pender Harbour branch will soon join the Halfmoon Bay branch to continue volunteering with the organization.







Attack of Danger Bay notches 20 years

The 20th annual running of the world's oldest downhill longboard race will run later this month.

Past years saw the race held on the May long weekend but COVID has forced creator and organizer Bricin Lyons to push it off to a quieter time of the year.

Last year Lyons ran ADB 19 during COVID — on Halloween of 2020.

This year will see ADB 20 take place on Saturday, Oct. 30.

But don't mark your calendars because, just like last year, due to COVID precautions, spectators are not invited.

"Last year, we were actually the only race worldwide to pull that off, so it was pretty special," Lyons told the *Harbour Spiel* from his home on Cape Breton Island.

"We're running it like it's a pandemic lockdown again.

"I wasn't sure how everything was going to pan out so we pretty much just stripped the event down to just the race."

To do that, Lyons said he has cut the field of riders from over 200 in past years to 32.

Entrants will be decided by a random draw and in addition to a maximum of 17 volunteers, he says he's committed to keeping the number under 50.

"We don't have to be under 50 people, we're just running it like that

to be totally cautious," said Lyons.

"It's about respect — I just want to show the community that were still going to run this safe."

Prizes are \$1,000 for first place and \$500, \$300 and \$100 for the next finishers.

Lyons said there will be no age classes or women's or men's event – everyone will compete together for the cash.

It's not an easy event to pull off since he moved to the other side of the country

"We're pretty much 8,000 kilometres away and not being there is tricky, especially with the whole COVID thing."

A few years ago, Lyons and his partner Patricia purchased a former church at the top of the Cabot Trail in the Cape Breton Highlands National Park.

Now the couple own and operate the Highlands Hostel with their two young children.

Since then, he has committed to return from the East Coast each year

to continue Pender Harbour's famous downhill competition.

Though spectators can't take in the spectacle in person, longboard company Landyachtz will host a live broadcast of the event at www.landyachtz.com.

It's not how Lyons planned to host the 20th race — he said he had always expected this race would bring a celebration of some kind.

Because of COVID restrictions, he admits it's been a challenge staying motivated to put in the enormous amount of work a race like this requires.

"I don't do it just for doing it, I want to do it," he said.

"I gotta feel it. And being so far away, and with this pandemic, there's so many hurdles." So, why not postpone the race until the pandemic is over?

"Because then I can't brag that we're the longest running downhill skateboard race in the world."

Lyons recently turned 40 and now that the milestone of the 20th race is almost here, one could expect him to retire it, but he says not.

"You know what it is, we kinda got 20 ripped away from us so now I gotta shoot for 25," he said.

"If I'm going to end it, I gotta end it good."

And despite the travel required and time spent away from his family and all of the associated stress involved, he still loves it.

"It gives me goosebumps still," said Lyons.

"It's been 20 years — I was only

20 years old when I put on the first race."

"I love Pender Harbour and I miss it. There's so much of my life that I owe to Pender Harbour.

"It's like a reunion every year."

OUR INVALUABLE FIREFIGHTERS

We recently learned that the tax rate was insufficient

to fund the Egmont and District Volunteer Fire Department (EDVFD) budget, and are working closely with the EDVFD to fund the training and other requirements identified in the fire services strategic plans.

In the spirit of being proactive and endeavouring to explain the reasons behind budget increases and the valuable service provided by the EDFVD, I want to tell you why we propose an increase of the Egmont fire rate by \$0.41/\$1,000.

In 2019, we implemented two of

45 recommendations in the SCRD fire department strategic plan:

- 1. We hired Matt Treit to fill the upgraded manager of protective services vacancy, to implement an emergency program, ensure training and operations meet requirements, and assist with training, budget, operational guidelines, and recordkeeping administration.
- 2. We expanded chief roles to include emergency response, equipment purchasing and maintenance, leading training sessions, recordkeeping, and ensuring government and agency compliance including Worksafe BC.

For increased workload and responsibility, the fire chief became a paid rather than volunteer position.

Volunteer recruitment remains a challenge, so we sweetened the pot with a standardized insurance package for all members.

The SCRD is responsible for the EDVFD while the Pender Harbour Fire Department is owned and operated by an improvement district with taxing authority, overseen by a publicly elected board of trustees.

Both departments provide:

- Firefighting structures, vehicles, boats, campfires, land clearing and wildfires;

• Disaster response including evacuation.

Our firefighters save lives and property year-round, 24-7, and our taxes pay for training, equipment, fire halls, etc.

In 2021, we paid \$0.36 per \$1,000 of property value in Pender and \$0.90 per \$1,000 in Egmont.

Taxpayers with fire insurance enjoy a discount about equal to their taxation cost for the service.

We get tremendous value from our volunteer fire departments and we all need to take time to consider the exceptional work they do, and find ways to let them know just how much we value the services they provide.

TOWARD RECONCILIATION

The 2015 Pender Harbour dock management plan, a reconciliation gesture to the shíshálh Nation by the province, angered many residents, largely because they were not consulted.

A 2018 memorandum of understanding between the province and the Union of BC Municipalities promised the SCRD active involvement in the reconciliation process, but we still were informed only after decisions had been made and implementations underway or imminent.

We were not involved with the 2018 shíshálh-BC foundation agreement, which acknowledges Indigenous rights and supports shíshálh self-government.

Foundation agreement implementation continues, but SCRD requests for participation in planning and implementation of initiatives, including a PHDMP update and the renaming of geographic entities, remained unanswered.

A late-2020 response acknowl-

edged, "Local governments play an important and unique role in the path to reconciliation with Indigenous peoples ... your expertise can help create a positive pathway forward on our reconciliation journey."

An updated MOU, released in September gives us hope for SCRD and local involvement in implementing reconciliation initiatives.

It acknowledges our special interest and desire for positive working relationships in these First Nations agreement negotiations:

- Local governments have unique, special interests in First Nations agreement negotiations;
- Local government knowledge and interest is key to reconciliation;
- Local governments strive for positive working relationships with First Nations, foster relationships based on honesty and respect, and undertake grass-roots initiatives, and
- The province, with local governments, will determine local government's involvement level, from receiving information to participation in meetings.

Katherine Lake trail expansion a good thing

Editor,

We have noticed recent letters to the editor expressing concerns about proposed improvements to the rough trail network that surrounds Katherine Lake, except in a few sections.

The proposal is to improve the quality of the existing trails and to join the few incomplete sections to create a walking loop around the lake.

... that staff work with the Pender Harbour and Area Residents Association to establish project authorization requirements; planning, development and maintenance cost and time estimates in order that the projects can be considered as part of the 2022 annual budget process, and further, that PHARA be encouraged to continue to gather community input on the proposals.


This project is entirely within the

Should the proposal move forward, it would be managed by the SCRD and therefore follow all SCRD approval processes which include environmental, archeological and resident's input.



The highest October temperature recorded was 21.1 C (Oct. 1, 1975); the lowest October temperature recorded was -0.4 C (Oct. 31, 1984).

PRECIPITATION (MERRY ISLAND)

October has an average of 115 hours of bright sunshine and averages 16 days with measurable rainfall and a total of 108.8 mm for the month. The highest October daily rainfall recorded at Merry Island in October was 62.2 mm (Oct. 21, 1963). The Canadian record for the greatest rainfall in a 24-hour period is 489 mm (Ucluelet BC, Oct. 6, 1967).



BADL: Basic active daily living

Basic active daily living? What is it, and how can we improve it?

Basic active daily living is just that, the activities we do on a day to day basis that are vital to our existence.

The eating, dressing, walking, bathing, using the bathroom and everything else we do that requires our bodies to move with balance, agility, flexibility and strength.

Simply getting out of a chair or transferring your weight to sit yourself down on a bed requires strength in the legs, hips and arms (to aid in rising) as well as enough balance to make these weight transfers without falling.

RANGE OF MOTION

The same sitting movement also requires flexibility or range of motion in the ankles, knees and hips.

ROM is the normal range of motion for a joint — how far it can be stretched and how far it can be bent.

In the shoulder joint, for example, how far we can stretch up to the cupboard to retrieve a can of soup and how far we can bring the arm back to put the can on a table is your shoulder's ROM.

Walking demands strength in the ankles, hips, legs and even the upper back, which will help maintain posture, proper alignment and balance.

Balance is needed to transfer weight from one foot to the next, sustain a one-footed stance and maintain an appropriate stride length and normal gait.

Confidence in your ability to walk without falling is essential for this movement.
