Water woes push north

You can now wipe that smug grin off your face as you soak under a sprinkler on your lush green lawn.

Recent water restrictions in South Pender Harbour have revealed that Chapman Lake users down the Coast are not the only ones vulnerable

to water shortages.

On July 14, South Pender moved to Stage 3 restrictions with plenty of hot summer left and no rain in sight.

To underline the cause for alarm, South Pender was placed on Stage 2 restrictions for the first time in 2021.

While we face down Stage 4 (severe), even those poor suckers in Sechelt are still sitting at stage 2.

Last year, users on the Chapman water system hit Stage 4 on Aug. 31 and remained there until Dec. 13.

For nine months, from May 2022 until Feb. 2023, Chapman users faced water restrictions.

Stage 4 restrictions bring a complete ban on outdoor watering and a \$500 fine for anyone who gets caught washing their car.

Of course, the Chapman Lake system is facing challenges again too.

This past June, their water use

was 1.5 times higher than in 2022.

According to the SCRD, McNeill Lake is now at September 2022 levels — two months ahead of last fall's drought conditions.

How did this happen?

That drought that lasted through the fall resulted in a limited snow pack that was quickly eaten up by our overheated spring.

Recall the second week of May when temperature records were broken throughout the province with highs of over 30 C.

We did get some rain but it was warm and prematurely melted the remaining snowpack that would have supplied reservoirs like McNeill Lake.


As I write, July 20, temperatures are expected to hit close to 30 C today with no rain in the forecast.

While North Pender and Egmont are still on Stage 1, Madeira Parkers should prepare for a dry summer.

Of the 917 water connections in South Pender, only 63 have signed up for an optional monthly email detailing their current water usage.

To sign up, email *infrastruc-ture@scrd.ca* with your name, utility account number and email address to receive your water usage.

And then, conserve.



South Pender moves to Stage 3 water restrictions

Effective July 14, South Pender Harbour (McNeill Lake) water system users have been placed on Stage 3 (acute) water conservation restrictions.

According to a July 11 statement from the Sunshine Coast Regional District, the move to Stage 3 was necessary because the "water supply from McNeill Lake is at risk due to prolonged dry weather."

Water users on the Egmont, Cove Bay and North Pender Harbour water systems remain at Stage 1 for now.

In a July 18 email to the *Harbour Spiel*, Mark Brown, interim general manager of infrastructure services, explained why this season's water restrictions are so severe:

"Last summer the dry weather extended well into the fall followed by a quick drop in temperature accompanied by snow rather than the typical fall rains.

"Unfortunately, this year we had an early spring which was unusually warm and sunny.

"Both situations led to the watershed area unable to fully recover as it normally would.

"Due to the watershed not fully recovering, coupled with high usage due to the warm spring, we have seen a significant drop in lake level which has not been experienced this early in the summer months before."

STAGE 3 WATERING SCHEDULE

The watering of lawns is not permitted at any time under Stage 3 restrictions.

The watering of trees, shrubs or flowers is also not permitted with sprinklers, soaker hoses or microspray but hand-held hoses with spray trigger nozzles, hand held containers or drip irrigation is permitted up to

one hour per day between 7 and 8 a.m. or 7 and 8 p.m.

The watering of food production plants and trees with sprinklers, soaker hoses, or micro-spray is also not permitted but hand-held watering with hoses with spray trigger nozzles, hand-held containers or drip irrigation is permitted up to two hours per day, from 7 to 8 a.m. and 7 to 8 p.m.

Commercial food producing farms paying a metered rate for water are exempt from Stage 3 regulations.

The washing of vehicles or boats is only permitted to wash off sea water.

The washing of sidewalks, driveways, windows or exterior building surfaces is also not permitted, except for health and safety regulations.

Also, the filling of swimming pools, spas, garden ponds or fountains is not permitted.

"If there is continued high usage and warm weather with no rain, then there may be the need to move to Stage 4 water conservation regulations," said Brown.

"This is the first time that South Pender has been at Stage 3 water conservation regulations."



Robson: PHARA comments on name change decisions

Editor,

The Pender Harbour and Area Residents Association is extremely disappointed with the decision of the BC Geographical Naming Office to accept all 10 of the shishalh Nation's proposed name changes for our area.

Once again, decisions between the province and the shìshàlh Nation have been made with no real consultation or consideration of those most affected by their decisions (remember the dock management plan?).

In an email to PHARA, a representative from the BCGNO stated they had requested comments from eight elected governments, four organizations, including PHARA, and one provincial agency.

They wrote:

"Of the 13 organizations invited to comment, only PHARA raised objections to the proposed name change."

The distribution list (published as part of the original invitation letter sent to PHARA and which is posted on our website) actually shows 21 invitees and sheds some light on why no other groups reportedly objected.

Other than PHARA, none of the other invitees has a direct connection with our community.

Indeed, the SCRD sent a letter to the BCGNO and other government agencies, noting that there were deficiencies in the public consultation process and that other organizations should be consulted.

(Though the SCRD did not have any issues with the proposed name changes, just the process.)

A bit of background:

In the fall of 2023, PHARA invited the community — through emails to PHARA members, an article

in the *Harbour Spiel*, the PHARA website, and the PHARA Facebook page — to comment on the proposed name changes.

Just prior to the December deadline, we compiled and submitted our comments.

From the many comments received, it was clear that the community opposed all of the proposed name changes, especially changing Pender Harbour to kalpilin, although some felt it would be acceptable if both names were used — as long as the current names were not replaced.

Only a single respondent supported all of the name changes.

A copy of our submission to the BCGNO is posted on our website at *phara.ca* (scroll halfway down the home page).

It is interesting to note that the BC Geographic Naming Office has the following policy:

"First priority shall be given to names with long-standing local usage by the general public.

"Unless there are good reasons to the contrary, this policy should prevail."

It is very clear to everyone who now lives in our communities that the current name of Pender Harbour has been in "long-standing local usage" for many generations and is so named on the nautical charts of the area first published in 1860.

Why revert to a name that non-Indigenous, which represent the huge majority of those who live in Area A, have never heard of or used?

The name kalpilin no longer represents "long-standing usage by the general public."

One must wonder if the decision to adopt those name changes was a done deal and once again there was no meaningful attempt at real consultation.

While we all support reconciliation, isn't reconciliation supposed to involve all parties affected?

Why are we not at the table?



McAllister responds to June Spiel editorial 'Chakra doo-doo'

Editor,

While I agree with some of your sentiments, many of your comments display a lack of awareness of the research that has been done by those who have studied and practiced integrative therapies.

She wrote the book, *The Infinite Mind*.

Dr. Shamini Jain recently published *Healing Ourselves, Biofield Science and the Future of Health.*

In this book she delves into the

research in this area.

Dr. Jain is also a Reiki master. At page 156, she states:

"In the past decade alone, at least four different investigators at three different universities and a prestigious medical centre in the U.S. (Harvard University, Indiana University, U of Connecticut, and the MD Anderson Cancer Center) all using biofield therapies and sham control treatments have reported that different types of energy healing can affect tumor growth, tumor death, tumor migration, and related cellular immune function in different types of cancer in both animal and cell culture studies."

South Pender water crisis



Leonard Lee Area A director, SCRD

Water is no longer flowing over the Harris Lake dam, the water level behind the McNeill Dam is lower

than it was in the fall of 2022, and there is no emergency infrastructure in place.

We recently initiated stage 3 restrictions because Stage 2 did not decrease water usage but, if South Pender's water use continues at the current rate, we'll soon see Stage 4 (severe) restrictions in an attempt to deal with this fast-developing crisis.

Without a connection between the North and South Pender water systems, Garden Bay Lake isn't available as an emergency backup, although the

SCRD is investigating the idea.

The decrepit Harris Lake water release infrastructure is unlikely to function without remedial work to release stored water.

This summer, it's critical that we avoid wasting water, and that we limit our usage as best we can or risk having most of our community without water for the coming months.

If you're on an SCRD system, a private system, a well, a creek or a lake, remember that we all share the same water table and watersheds, so I urge everyone to do their part to ensure we have enough water to satisfy our essential requirements until the anticipated rains of mid-November.

NOT JUST A PENDER PROBLEM

Bowen Mah, BC minister of emergency management and climate readiness, recently stressed the need for local governments to work with the province to respond to the lengthy dry spells all areas of BC are experiencing.

BC is suffering an unprecedented wildfire season because of drought conditions and record-breaking high temperatures.

At only the beginning of the wildfire season, hundreds of people are under evacuation orders and alerts, and a state of emergency was announced for the Stikine region.

With the exception of Haida Gwaii, where campfires are still al-

Page 14 Harbour Spiel lowed, a complete burning ban is in effect throughout British Columbia.

Level 4 or 5 drought conditions are already present in over two-thirds of British Columbia's water basins.

Last year, only one area (the Sunshine Coast) went to Level 5, but that wasn't until September, when a 100-day drought caused an SCRD state of emergency in some of its jurisdictions.

In coming weeks, it's expected that the province will increase water restrictions and promote water conservation throughout British Columbia.

Mah pointed out that we don't need to wait for those restrictions, but should take action now by running only full loads in washing machines and dishwashers, and reducing the length of showers.

Bowen Mah's ministry, the first stand-alone emergency-management ministry in BC history, clearly demonstrates the reality of the climate crisis we face.

STR PARTY-HOUSE UPDATE

Bed and breakfast operations, typically involving a spare bedroom rented in a private home and a hearty meal provided at the beginning of the day by the hosts (resident property owners), have been in our neighborhoods for some time and, if not a welcome addition, were certainly not a problem.

Then along came short-term rentals run through Airbnb, Vrbo, and other online platforms, making it possible to operate a mini-hotel on residential property, without an onsite owner/host, and bypassing hotel taxes, zoning requirements and other requirements.

The SCRD responded to a proliferation of STRs and related complaints by updating bylaw 337 in 2020

to include these regulations:

Short-term rental accommodation fits the definition of "bed and breakfast" and, regardless of how it's advertised, it's considered a bed and breakfast and thus subject to regulations for bed and breakfast of the zoning bylaws.

It must be operated by an onsite property owner or manager.

These regulations have proven quite effective in bringing properties into compliance, but we don't have enough bylaw officers to investigate every complaint submitted.

There are so many non-compliant STR operations that only the most egregious violations are addressed, such as situations where the owner or manager is absent from the property, allowing a party house where large numbers of unsupervised guests disrupt neighbours with loud music and other noise well into the night.

Bylaw staff are focused on prioritizing and addressing the "frequent flyers" or repeat offenders who disturb the peace, with the hope of discouraging other operators from similar offences.

The best advice I can offer is to keep putting in the bylaw complaints; the number of those, along with the number of neighbours submitting complaints, will help staff identify and thus prioritize the worst cases.



Red meat: Only as a treat

Compiled by Pender Harbour Health Centre nursing staff

You might want to think twice before you toss that burger or steak on the grill.

Consumption of red meat is associated with coronary heart disease, stroke, diabetes, colorectal cancer and premature death.

Yet, despite all the literature to support these findings, Canadians still eat more red meat than poultry and seafood combined.

Here are six reasons to eat less red meat:

LIVE LONGER

A person who consumes two servings of red meat per day has a 30-per-cent higher risk of dying prematurely than those who eat only a half serving per day.

By decreasing consumption of red meat, we may see a drop in preventable deaths and health problems.

PROTECT YOUR HEART

Red meat accounts for the largest source of saturated fats in an average diet.

Heme iron, nitrates, salt and compounds are created when meats are cooked at a high temperatures.

Carnitine (found largely in red meats) and choline (found largely in egg yolks and liver) create compounds when ingested that have a direct relation to increased risk for cardiovascular disease.

CUT CANCER RISKS

From the National Cancer Institute:

• The risk of colon cancer/rectal cancer increases by 20 per cent for every serving of red/processed meat



eaten per day;

- Carcinogenic N-nitroso compounds are caused by nitrates used to color and preserve processed meats;
- Meat mutagens are produced when meats are cooked well-done at high temperatures, and
- The NCI recommends three servings of red meat per week. Avoid processed meats, notably ham, bacon, salami, hot hogs and sausages.

SKIP A STROKE

Most strokes experienced by Canadians are caused by clogged arteries rather than a ruptured artery or hemorrhage in the brain.

To reduce your risk of stroke you may want to make healthier choices than red meat, such as chicken, fish or nuts.

DODGE DIABETES

Red meats have been linked to an increase in type 2 diabetes.

The accumulation of byproducts

of eating red meats may damage or be toxic to cells that secrete insulin.

PROTECT THE EARTH

How does red meat harm the environment?

The core problem is that growing meat is so inefficient.

In fact, much of North American farming is devoted to growing animal feed instead of food for human consumption.

Red meat production increases water and fuel (transportation) consumption, deforestation and solid waste while it produces methane and nitrous oxide.

Cows emit greenhouse gases.

THE BOTTOM LINE

Eat as little red and processed meat as possible and replace them with beans, nuts, soy-based veggie meats, poultry or fish.

Don't take carnitine, lecithin or choline supplements.
