



For the first time since 2019, the December issue of the *Harbour Spiel* fea-

tures what was an annual insertion — Christmas event listings.

Danger Dane proves he's the fastest in the world, again

There is no better place in the world to learn the sport of downhill skateboarding than Pender Harbour.

On Nov. 12, as a member of Canada's six-man, six-woman downhill skateboarding team, Kleindalian Dane Hanna proved it by beating over 200 riders to win the World Skate championship in San Juan, Argentina.

World Skate is the governing body for skateboarding and roller sports and is officially recognized by the International Olympic Committee.

Hanna went into the world championship defending the title he won in in Catalonia, Spain in 2019.

Normally held every two years, the 2021 world championship race was postponed due to COVID.

The *Harbour Spiel* tracked the world champ down at his home in Coquitlam where he is back working as a pipe fitter installing sprinkler systems.

Hanna speaks with what some might call a surfer's drawl — if that surfer was a skateboarder who grew up in Pender Harbour.

After Argentina, he opted out of a popular race in Teutonia, Brazil.

"Nah. I didn't bother going to that," said Hanna.

"Good thing I didn't too because it went for a shit down there."

He explains how the organizers' inexperience caused unsafe conditions, including allowing an ambulance on the course during a race.

"Brazil things, you know?"

Since his return, Hanna's been interviewed by a handful of local media but nothing like one would expect for a repeat world champion.

It's a sport less than two decades old and most still don't get it.

That's too bad because, in that time, Pender Harbour has become the unlikely epicentre of the downhill

longboarding world.

Credit Bricin Lyons for starting up the world's first and longest running race of its kind — the Attack of Danger Bay — on Francis Peninsula in 2001.

And, Hanna isn't even the first world champion to come out of Pender Harbour.

The community has produced a number of world cup standouts including Scott Smith.

In 2008, Smith dominated races in Australia, Brazil, Europe and North America to become world champion and the first downhill skateboarder to win both the World Cup series points title and the world championship event in the same year.

Not coincidentally, that was the

year Hanna took up longboarding.

"I don't think Mom was too fond of it when I first started," Hanna said.

"You know, going down the Madeira hill."

Hanna refers to the common longboard run from the Grasshopper Pub down into Madeira Park.

It's been the site of serious accidents and plenty of near misses with cars.

"But they changed that whole thing up with Team Irene and stopped us from going down into Madeira."

Formed by parents, Team Irene gave the kids a structured and safe way to pursue the sport they were going to do anyway.

While parents with walkie-talkies controlled traffic on a hill on Sinclair

Bay Road, the riders would race up to 25 times in a single evening thanks to a minibus that whisked them back up.

Hanna credits Team Irene sessions for his dominance in the sport.

"That was probably the best practice I've ever had," said Hanna.

"Just skating that road as hard as I possibly can, being as fast as I can and not having to worry about traffic and other things like that."

But no amount of experience overcomes the sport's inherent risk.

Consider one of Hanna's competitors in the Argentinian final.

Going into the final corner, after the lead had changed a number of times, a racer behind Hanna slid out and took out another competitor that left Hanna and Spain's Diego Poncelet to battle for the finish line.

One of the two who went down came up a broken nose.

The arbitrary risk of crashing is why it's difficult to dominate in a sport like downhill longboarding.

To make the final, Hanna survived four heats — each a measured gamble between pushing for speed and increased risk of crashing.

Finding a solution to that paradox is something Hanna excels at.

Now at the age of 25, he can't even recall all of his victories.

He knows he won his local race, the hotly contested Attack of Danger Bay three times, Kimberley twice and Saltspring Island twice.

But he's also won races in New York and Vermont.

Then he won the last world championship in Spain in 2019 and earlier this year, gained a spot in Canada's final six to go to Argentina by winning a qualifying event in Kelowna.

When asked how he can be so

consistent in a sport where random mishaps should subjugate any advantages of skill, Hanna is matter of fact.

"I put in a lot of hours over the years — I started skating when I was 11 or 12 years old.

"Of course, you can't be prepared for someone crashing into the back of you but if you're focused on the things around, you can dodge and avoid that sort of stuff," he said.

"But mainly, it just comes down to practice and love for the sport."

Hanna also credits his success in Argentina to strategy.

He explains that in a race like that in the open desert, subject to strong cross and head winds, being in the lead provides a disadvantage.

"You can see when I'm going down the hill, I'm purposely not pushing out in first place because I don't want all that wind," said Hanna.

"I'm trying to draft him.

"Like NASCAR, they go in behind and then make the pass."

Team Irene still provides Hanna with monetary support to attend races

as do a handful of industry types

— Landyachtz, DT Trucks, Venom
Wheels, Rogers Bros. and Cariboo
Brewing.

But despite being the fastest in the world, and picking up the sponsors that come with it, Hanna isn't hanging up his tool belt just yet.

He said he's just happy to break even on his travel expenses.

"That's all I'm looking for, you know.

"I'm not trying to make millions off it because that's kind of out of the picture," said Hanna.

"It's just a little too small.

"That's why we're always trying to promote the sport and just get more kids riding and try to grow it bigger."

While next season's race schedule hasn't been posted yet, Hanna is already back training.

He trains very little in the gym, preferring to hit a few quiet hills near his home or in Maple Ridge.

"I would say that's the best way to become fast — just spend time on the thing."

Closure of Vinebrook Bridge access on Suncoaster Trail

Parks service staff from the Sunshine Coast Regional District have closed public access to Vinebrook Bridge on the Suncoaster Trail citing a deteriorating bridge structure that has become unsafe.

The Vinebrook Bridge is part of the Suncoaster phase 1 trail network and located off Highway 101 by the Malaspina Substation in Pender Harbour.

"This closure is being implemented for the safety of the public and so that contractors can begin the work needed to replace the damaged bridge," said Kevin Clarkson, SCRD parks services manager in a Nov. 10 statement.


"A timeline for completion of the work has not yet been established."

The bridge is about 25 years old and was constructed by Sunshine Coast Trail Society volunteers.

Signs indicating rerouting access along the highway have been posted.

Users are reminded to follow offroad vehicle regulations and to proceed with caution when using the highway.

The SCRD said they will provide updates on the work and the status of the bridge closure to residents via social media and on the SCRD website.

One of the larger projects undertaken by local volunteers of the Sunshine Coast Trail Society was the Vinebrook Creek bridge near the Malaspina Substation north of Kleindale. After 25 years, its cedar log supports have rotted and the SCRD has closed it until it can be rebuilt. The SCRD has yet to provide a timeline for reopening of the popular route.

Madeira Park IGA changes hands

The owners of Madeira Park's IGA grocery stored have "retired."

On Nov. 16, Troy and Lorie Callewaert said goodbye to the store they purchased on June 6, 2006 — over 16 years ago.

On Nov. 17, IGA no. 78 became IGA no. 82 as it reverted to corporate ownership.

Like the IGA location in Wilson Creek, the Madeira Park location is now owned by the grocery arm of HY Louie Co. Ltd., the Georgia Main Food Group.

Callewaert told the *Harbour Spiel* that conversations about divesting himself of the store started in pre-COVID times but due to the uncertainty brought on by the pandemic, he decided to stay.

"So, we just kind of put it on hold."

Former assistant manager Matt McDonald is now responsible for running the store that opened in the Madeira Park Shopping Centre in 1974 — 48 years ago.

Callewaert credits his success in building up the store to his employees.

"It's a team effort.

"Everybody here has to be a part

of it," he said.

"All I can do is start the process or lead by example and then it follows with them.

"When you get everybody on board, it's really easy."

Regarding the future of the store itself, Callewaert said he expects it will benefit from corporate's deeper pockets.

He points to looming capital upgrades required that weren't feasible for him because they would take 10 to 15 years to pay off.

When asked if they plan to fully retire, Callewaert laughs.

"I keep telling people, 'I didn't win the lottery, I sold a business.'

"For now, we're just going to do a lot of the things that we haven't been able to for years and catch up with family."

Callewaert said he'll miss his former store but still plans to shop threre and looks forward to running into his friends as a customer.

"I love the business because where else can you hang out and see your community and talk to your neighbours and friends and then go throw some stock on the shelves."

Landfill ban

Pender Harbour has joined the rest of the Sunshine Coast to declare food-waste garbage as source-

separated waste in these categories:

- Recyclable materials such as food and yard/garden waste, cardboard, paint and product-care products, mattresses, metal and tires;
- Controlled waste such as construction/demolition waste, dead animals, cut-up boats and RVs, and foam-filled tires, and
- Prohibited materials like hazardous waste, hazardous chemicals, explosive substances, waste oil and petroleum by-products, stumps, fish-

feed bags, batteries, and much more.

At our landfill, your garbage and food waste will be weighed together and charged at the same rate, but you must dump it in separate bins.

Food waste is accepted, free of charge, at Salish Soils.

Handouts at our landfill and printable versions at *scrd.ca/home-waste* detail food waste, e.g. greasy pizza boxes, eggshells, used paper napkins.

These, along with bones, shells and meat scraps typically aren't added to home composts because they attract unwanted wildlife and create foul odours.

THE CHAPMAN SAGA

Chapman Creek, along with its watershed and waterworks, has a long and tortuous history as a primary and insufficient water source for Halfmoon Bay, Sechelt, Roberts Creek, Elphinstone, and West Howe Sound.

In 1915, the creek was surveyed as a long-term community water supply and, by 1929, the Chapman Creek watershed reserve was designated for community water.

The Union Steamship Co. was granted a licence for 1.14 million litres per day for their service and to develop tourism.

In 1968, a newly incorporated SCRD bought the Union Steamship Co. water licence, but it went downhill from there.

The 1970s brought concerns

about watershed logging, the SCRD confirmed that related road building deteriorated the creek's water quality, and Chapman was designated a water shed reserve.

By 1978, the Chapman Lake Dam was built and, in 1991, the Edwards Lake Dam was completed to supplement Chapman in dry weather.

But water quality and supply continued to diminish, culminating in a temporary halt to logging and related road building that was supported by Ministry of Forests hydrologists who attributed 90 per cent of the 800-plus landslides in the Chapman and Gray to logging activity.

In 1995, the entire Tetrahedron Study area, including the upper Chapman, was designated a Class A provincial park by provincial cabinet, and parks management plans were created in 1996 and 1997.

A treatment plant for the Chapman Creek water system was put on line and, in 2013, a comprehensive regional water plan was completed.

But, in 2015, things really started deteriorating when stage 4 water restrictions had to be imposed.

Beginning in 2017 and to this day, the SCRD has relied on a "temporary" siphon installed for a seasonal, emergency water supply.

After considering raising Chapman Dam and installing a floating

pump station, the SCRD initiated the deepen channel/gravity fed outfall project, which should have gone smoothly with earlier approvals, but no.

Extensive opposition by residents and environmental groups convinced the Ministry of Environment to refuse a Tetrahedron park boundary change.

Today's initiatives include developing groundwater wells and water meter systems in the Sechelt area.

But things still aren't going well, as meter installation hasn't started and we suffered an unprecedented drought exacerbated by supply-chain issues delaying completion of the first well.

This year, the SCRD and province enacted the first drought-caused state of emergency in Sunshine Coast history, allowing us to initiate emergency measures to supply potable water to residents.

We learned important lessons:

- Be clear in what we support, and don't support;
 - Honor agreements;
- Schedule and deliver projects years earlier than needed; and
- Forget our differences, to work together for the common good.

Area A must provide backups between North and South Pender waterworks, explore ways to ensure water security, and plan together for our future.



Thomas John Scodras DECEMBER 3, 1955 — SEPTEMBER 23, 2022

TEMPERATURES (MERRY ISLAND)

Our average daily high temperature in December is 6.6 C and our average daily low is 3.3 C, giving us a mean daily temperature of 5 C. The highest December temperature recorded is 13.3 C (Dec. 14, 1962) and the lowest was -11.7 C (Dec. 28, 1968).

PRECIPITATION (MERRY ISLAND)

December has an average of 54.9 hours of bright sunshine. It usually has 19 days with measurable precipitation, an average monthly rainfall of 135 mm and an average monthly snowfall of 10 cm. Our average month-end snowfall is 4 cm. December has the highest snowfall of the year (November has the most rain). The highest December daily rainfall recorded at Merry Island was 66 mm (Dec. 25, 1972). The record daily snowfall was 40.6 cm (Dec. 31, 1968).

Understanding strokes

A stroke, or cerebrovascular accident, is the rapid loss of brain function due to disturbance in the blood supply to the brain.

This can be due to ischemia (lack of blood flow) caused by blockage or a hemorrhage (leakage of blood).

As a result, the affected area of the brain is unable to function leading to the inability to move one or more limbs on one side of the body, inability to understand or formulate speech, or visual disturbances in one or both eyes.

ISCHEMIC STROKES

Ischemic strokes account for 87 per cent of strokes.

They are defined as a sudden loss of function due to loss of blood supply to an area of the brain that controls that function.

It is usually caused by partial or complete blockage of an artery that supplies the brain.

The underlying condition for this type of obstruction is the development of fatty deposits lining the vessel walls.

This condition is called atherosclerosis.

The plaque breaks away from the vessel wall and forms a clot.

HEMORRHAGIC STROKES


Hemorrhagic strokes account for about 13 per cent of stroke cases.

They result from a weakened vessel that ruptures and bleeds into the surrounding brain.

The blood accumulates and compresses the surrounding brain tissue.

TRANSIENT ISCHEMIC ATTACK

While a transient ischemic at-December 2022



tack is often labelled "mini-stroke," it is more accurately characterized as a "warning stroke" — a warning you should take very seriously.

A TIA is caused by a clot.

The only difference between a stroke and TIA is that, with TIA, the blockage is transient (temporary).

TIA symptoms occur rapidly and last a relatively short time.

Most TIAs last less than five minutes and the average is about a minute.

Unlike a stroke, when a TIA is over, there's no permanent injury to the brain

While the vast majority of strokes are not preceded by TIA, about a third of people who experience TIA go on to have a stroke within a year.

According to the American Heart Association, a TIA is a warning stroke and gives a patient time to act and keep a permanent stroke from occurring.

By recognizing symptoms and

getting to the hospital, the patient can get help in identifying why the TIA occurred and get treatment — either through medication or surgery — that can prevent a stroke from occurring.

The warning signs of for both strokes and TIAs are as follows:

- Sudden numbness or weakness of the face, arm or leg, especially on one side of the body;
- Sudden confusion, trouble speaking or understanding;
- Sudden trouble seeing in one or both eyes;
- Sudden trouble walking, dizziness, loss of balance or co-ordination, and
- Sudden, severe headache with no known cause.

All of these warning signs should be taken seriously and people experiencing them should get to the hospital emergency department at once.

Early diagnosis can help to expedite treatment and referrals.
