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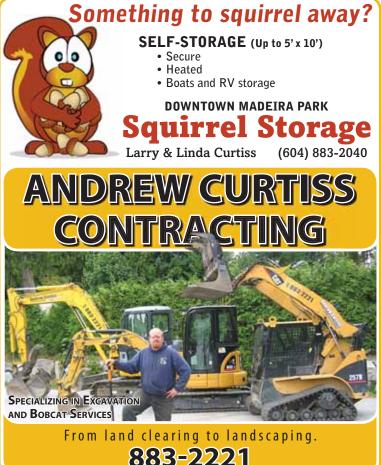

What to believe?

Wearing certain types of sanitary pads causes uterine and bladder cancer resulting in the death of 56 girls.

That's not true and

neither is much of the stuff you come across on sites like Facebook these days.

Don't we wish that we only had to "like" a child with her legs fused together so that Facebook and CNN would pay \$20 per to help pay her medical expenses.

Or that "the fruit from the graviola tree is a miraculous natural cancer cell killer 10,000 times stronger than chemo" was true?

Some of these efforts are simple "like farming" — deceptive methods to boost a site's profile on Facebook, (thereby boosting its profit power in the site's news feed algorithm).

Others are malicious, sophisticated pranks hoping to garner attention and find out how many suckers bite.

And there are a lot of us who do.

Every day, Facebook (and Internet) users are likely to come across dozens of these erroneous tidbits of information and, without checking a website like Snopes or Hoax-Slayer, will dutifully pass it on to their friends.

Some are the modern equivalent of the Weekly World News, the satirical newspaper of the 90s that made the cavedwelling "Bat Boy" famous.

Back then, we seemed to know when something seemed fishy and maybe even enjoyed its ironic humour.

The Weekly World News is still alive online as are other humorous newsy sites like The Onion or Daily Mash.

But nowadays, bombarded with headlines like "97% of Terminal Cancer Patients Previously Had This Dental Procedure...," we don't know what to believe.

Incidentally, that too is false and

widely debunked by the medical community simply because, at 97%, the dental procedure — root canals could just as easily have been haircuts.

With more and more older (and vounger) folks climbing onto the intertube's information train, it's become a colossal time drain for anyone concerned enough to continually point out that Bill Gates didn't write the oft recirculated "Rules Kids Won't Learn in School." (See p. 27 for the complete list and the real author.)

Ditto for many quotes attributed to Morgan Freeman, Nelson Mandela or Albert Einstein.

Photos of a python eating a man? False.

Free iPhones? False.

Man convicted of manslaughter for accidentally killing his wife with a "Dutch oven?" False.

The Gardasil HPV vaccine proved to have caused the deaths of 32 women? False.

> Missing child? Probably false. Mom, are you getting this?

We seem to accept anything if someone shares it digitally.

Some of this blind acceptance may stem from a growing mistrust of "mainstream media" — a pejorative term implying major news sources are under the thumb of corporate political alliances with ulterior motives.

While that's hard to deny, only at newspapers like the Globe and Mail and New York Times will you still find real journalists tasked with the hassles of verifying sources and providing evidence-based facts before they publish a story, whether online or on a broadsheet.

So, the first thing you should ask yourself when your Facebook friend posts something outrageous or revolutionary in its importance is,

"Why is the Man keeping it secret?"

It ain't real if it's not in the Spiel.

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Development at Madeira Park entrance causes flurry of rumours

Some of the rumours are true but, sorry gamblers, it's not a casino.

So says Ron Badley about his building currently under construction at the entrance to Madeira Park.

Badley describes the 10.000 square-foot, two storey building as "multi-use retail."

Badley has owned the property for approximately 10 years and is currently building forms for the foundation

Because of zoning restrictions, he says his company, Pender Harbour Development, was only allowed to include one residential suite so the building will be occupied mainly by businesses.

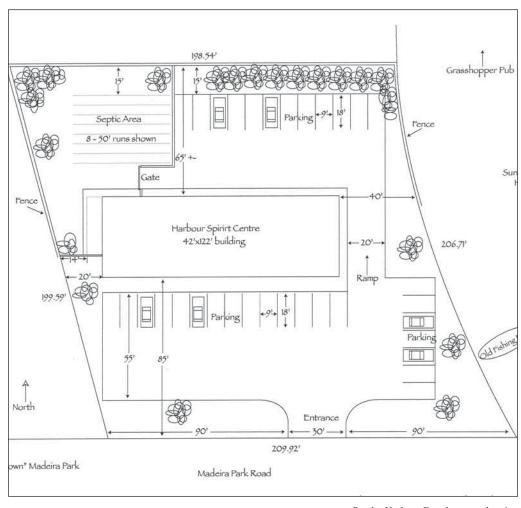
There are 11 potential commercial spaces but he says it's likely some tenants will lease more than one depending on their space needs.

Badley says he has letters of intent from tenants to fill approximately three quarters of the space.

"It's a really good mix — almost all businesses expanding up from Sechelt," says Badley.

"I'm trying really hard not steal anything out of the village. The idea is to add to Madeira Park, not to take away."

As far as who the potential tenants are, Badley wouldn't say but listed a couple of galleries, a bike store, a coffee shop, an eye care office

and a realtor.

Badley says he's also looking for a restaurant to move into the building.

"When we get a little bit closer and people can wander around inside, then we'll be able to confirm things,"

he says.

Badley also said there was no rezoning required for the development and that he expects the building to be ready for occupancy by May 2014.

Pender Harbour's newest oldest author launches book

At age 99, one might think Frank White would start taking it easy.

White was on hand Dec. 1 for the promotional launch of his first book *Milk Spills and One-Log Loads: Memories of a Pioneer Truck Driver.*

The party was held at the P. H. School of Music and the crowd arriving throughout White's reading overflowed the place.

White's son and publisher, Howard, wrote the introduction for the book and MCed the event.

White junior described the process of taking years of his Dad's writing and oral transcripts and wrestling it into book form:

"Last year we decided to take the first part of his life and put it into one volume — this one only comes up to 1945," said White.

"He's still percolating away on the rest of it and I hope to see it one of these years."

The elder White read for 10 minutes, part of which included this passage:

"One of my earliest memories is of going on a ride with Uncle Tom, my mother's younger brother, from my father's farm in Aldergrove to my grandparents' place in Bradner, an

easy 15-minute drive today but then a long, dusty crawl in his old horse-and-buggy.

"He drove in the middle of the road and let the team find its own way, like a pioneer version of cruise control. The road ran die-straight for miles so he decided to catch a snooze and tucked his chin down on his chest.

"Wake me up if a car comes, he said.

"That was how you got around in those days. It took a little longer but

there was no road rage."

Afterward, Howard White once again took the mike and read a few more passages before ending with his own description of the book.

"It's not just a bunch of little anecdotes," said White.

"We sort of advertised it as a book about pioneer trucking because we sort of thought, and hoped, that might get it into the bookstores. But really, it's the story of a man's life and the century that he's lived through."





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Graduate students to put local economy under the microscope

The Pender Harbour and District Chamber of Commerce has convinced UBC's Sauder School of Business to include the Pender Harbour area as a focus for one of their "community business projects" for 2014.

Starting this month, four masters students will map "existing social and economic resources of Pender Harbour, identify potential for economic expansion and outline near-term and long-term strategies for economic development to support the continued well-being of the community."

In other words, the students will investigate solutions to offset a declining local economy.

"What we want is an economic development plan but we can't afford to hire a consultant," says PHDCC president Len Lee.

Lee says that often, before grants for various projects can be applied for, funding organizations require information in the form of consultants' reports.

"So, with this, there's no cost to us and they use it as a case study."

He hopes this project could be a stepping stone for future projects.

In a press release, the PHDCC indicated they intend to "use recommendations from the study as the basis for an application to the Island Coastal Economic Trust for economic development project funding."

The Pender Harbour and District Chamber of Commerce has approximately 75 member businesses.

"It's been holding pretty steady the last three years, but it's down from historical levels," says Lee.

But they're working to turn that around.

"The chamber's focus is to get more business on the Coast but also to have a future, and if you don't have young families and young people working, you don't have a future."

The team of four will work with

faculty advisers and the local business community between January and May 2014 to come up with recommendations for strategies to expand business and employment opportunities.

In what may require a number of visits to the area, the students — Emma Yu, Tonner Jackson, Gigi Chiu and Tiziano Menconi — will be requesting interviews with business representatives and touring local industries and tourist attractions.

The Community Business Project is listed as a mandatory course in Sauder's masters in management program and is "intended to combine community service with academic learning."

Past community business projects aided organizations such as the Canadian Parks and Wilderness Society, the YWCA, the North Vancouver Outdoor School and Whistler Sport Legacies.

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Hotel Lake Road flooding an ongoing concern for residents

Residents concerned about a chronically submerged section of Hotel Lake Road will likely have to wait even longer before a solution is found.

It's thought an aging culvert has collapsed under the road, blocking drainage from a swamp across the road from Hotel Lake.

Icy conditions last month made the section more treacherous than normal causing one elderly woman to suffering bruising after she slipped and many more to ask the question, "Why hasn't it been fixed?"

Don Legault, area manager of roads with the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure, says the delay has been caused by the location's sensitive environmental nature.

"There's at least one red-listed species in the lake," says Legault.

"And then there are issues around timing. The project has to be done from August to the end of October."

Legault says an environmental

consultant hired by Capilano Highways has pointed to late summer as a time when construction will have the least impact on nesting and feeding habits of various species in the lake, particularily western painted turtles.

In the meantime, Legault says they plan to have the issue looked at by regional engineers in January to see if they can determine the upland source of the water and find a temporary solution to redirect its flow.

• Beaver Lake;

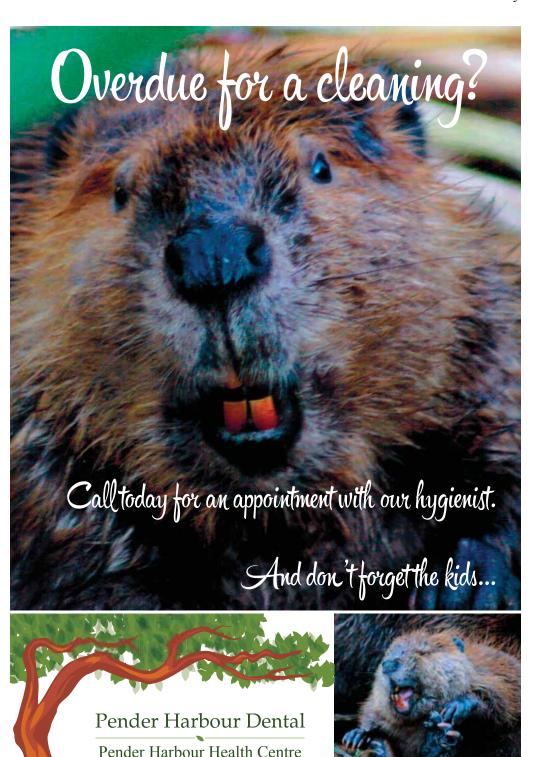
Or my favorite, although difficult to put on one of the signs that we so

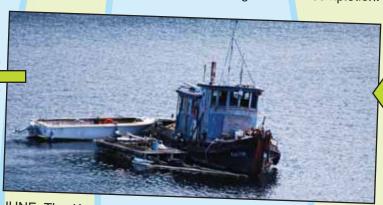

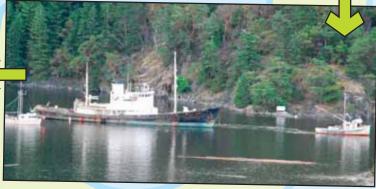

Improvements underway

HUNTING IN RESIDENTIAL AREAS

As reported in the last issue of the

Spiel, hunters were spotted in the Daniel Point area.

The activity caused great concern among residents and I received many emails on the topic.

Upon investigation it is obvious areas designated as "no hunting" and "no shooting" in the hunting regulations have not kept up with development.

The Daniel Point area is now well populated and mostly zoned single-family residential, yet bow and shotgun hunting are still allowed. Another interesting note is that the P. H. Golf Course and Lions Field are zoned as public assembly areas but bow and shotgun hunting are also allowed.

We passed a resolution at the SCRD to have planning staff co-ordinate with the Conservation Service to update the no shooting areas and maps on the hunting regulations.

We will follow up on this and try to ensure they are revised before the next hunting season.

BIKEWAYS/WALKWAYS

Work is progressing on the bikeways/walkways function.

The priority project has been identified as the connector between the Madeira Park business area and the P. H. Health Centre/Rona area.

A consultant (landscape archi-

tect) has been engaged, a preliminary tour was performed and the project process has been identified at an introductory meeting with the bikeways/ walkways advisory subcommittee of the Pender Harbour Advisory Council.

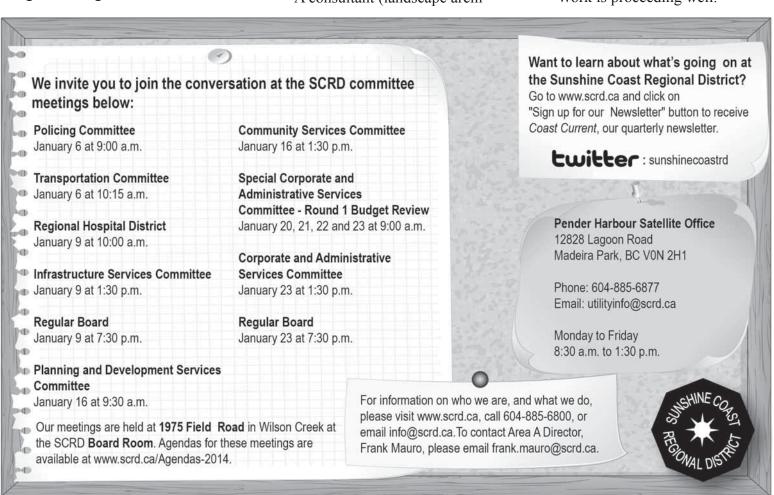
Some potential routes have been identified and consultations will be held with adjacent property owners and the advisory committee to identify favourable options.

The goal is to build the safest, most direct, flattest route possible and to ensure that it is easily accessible by the most people.

There are some hurdles to overcome but, if things go well, hopefully we can start construction this spring.

SOUTH PENDER WATER TREATMENT PLANT

Work is proceeding well.



The power line is in and the drying pits reservoir and overflow have been constructed.

The slab on top of the reservoir was poured in mid-November and the building components arrived in early December.

The plant equipment will arrive in January after the building is erected and it is expected to be operating by April or May 2014.

A meeting and tour of the facility was held with the South Pender Water Advisory Committee.

Members seemed pleased with the progress and are looking forward to receiving treated, filtered water by this summer, as I am sure we all are.

BUDGET

We have been reviewing progress and carryovers from the 2013 budget and laying the framework for the 2014 budget process, which will start the third week of January.

We have set the goal of zero increase in the base operating budget but we will have significant challenges in maintaining a low overall increase when capital and non-base budget items are considered.

The budget items which provide direct benefits and will have the most visible effect on Area A are:

- The construction of the resource recovery facility for dealing with solid waste and recycling;
- Seismic and safety upgrades for the McNeill Lake Dam structure:
- Universal metering for North and South Pender water systems;
- Several water main replacements, and
- The aforementioned treatment plant construction and bikeway/walkway construction.

As I have mentioned before in

this column there will be challenges in dealing with green waste costs.

We should see a small reduction in taxation for recycling costs with the Multi Materials BC implementation for a part of the year.

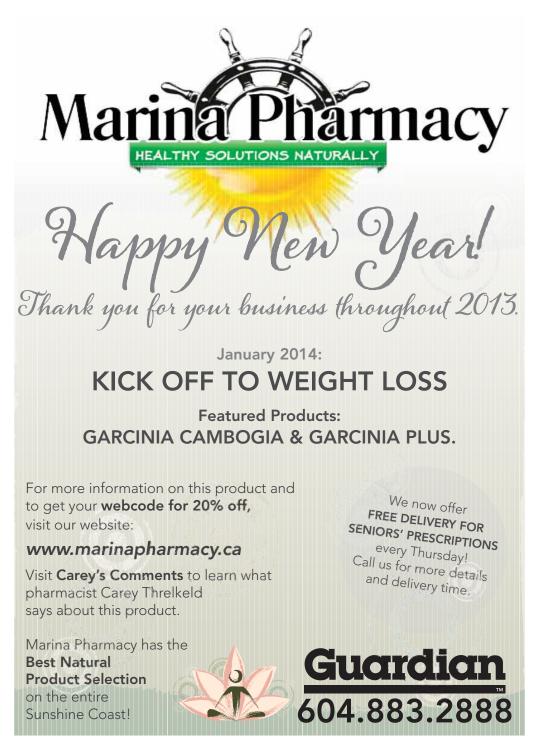

Hi D.C.,

The trick with bringing a pup into household with an existing dog, or two dogs at the same time, is to make sure that the bond they develop together doesn't override the bond you hope to build with yourself.

That can make training a little harder and can be a little disappointing on a personal level from the "man/woman best friend" perspective.

I find that is easily overcome by making sure the pup's leash is left on a lot so that you can connect whenever you wish to.

Clipping it to your belt for a



while every day can really help.

The pup just has to follow you about as you do your thing around the house.

Gender and personality can impact the relationship the dogs have with each other as well.

It often doesn't rear its head in

an ugly way until the youngster gets to the point of achieving young adulthood.

I've found the the likelihood of conflict is higher when the dogs are of the same gender.

Bargain Barn receives yet another facelift

The building that houses the Bargain Barn has undergone many facelifts over the years.

It started as a bunkhouse moved to this site and was the home of the Legion, the Credit Union, the fire hall and a hamburger joint.

Eventually, in about 1977, it became the Bargain Barn Thrift Store, operated by the Pender Harbour & District Health Centre Auxiliary.

In 2003/2004, the Bargain Barn expanded, enabling the auxiliary to increase its income from an average of \$10,500 per year to \$50,000 per year in 2012.

From 1977 to 2012, the Bargain Barn has earned over \$700,000, funding the P. H. Health Centre's emergency generator, many staff programs, occasional salaries and numerous pieces of equipment.

The money also funds bursaries for high school students and supports the Harbourside Friendship Group.

The success of the Bargain Barn and the overwhelming generosity of community donations, has made the

sorting room impossible to work in.

So, the Health Centre auxiliary once again undertook another expansion project — the construction of a brand new 20-foot by 8-foot sorting room at the back of the building.

Nobody likes a cute bronchitis

Bronchitis is a viral infection similar to the common cold that causes a cough.

Tubes in the lungs called bronchi become inflamed and irritated producing mucus, leading to the most common symptom — a cough that lasts more than five days and up to three weeks.

The cough may be productive for mucus that can be yellow, green or clear

Other symptoms may include chest wall tenderness caused by muscle strain from coughing, wheezing, mild shortness of breath, mild headache, fatigue or sore throat.

Fever is not usually a symptom.

The diagnosis of viral bronchitis can usually be based on the history alone although an exam may be necessary.

Chest X-rays are not useful as changes in the lungs are not usually seen.

A chest X-ray may be required if a patient complains of fever, increased heart rate or difficulty breathing with signs of congestion in the chest on physical exam.

These symptoms could indicate pneumonia.

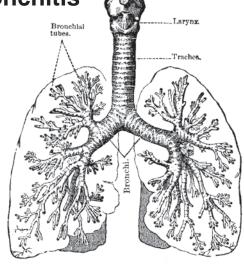
Treatment is aimed at symptom relief and making breathing easier.

Tylenol and anti-inflammatories, rest, fluids and warm, humidified moist air can help.

Over the counter cough and cold remedies from the pharmacy may help alleviate symptoms but do not shorten the duration of the illness.

Cough suppressants are not shown to be helpful because coughing can help clear the airways of mucus.

Your physician may prescribe in-



haled medications to open the airways which may reduce cough and help breathing.

Antibiotics do not work for viruses as they treat bacterial infections only and repeated antibiotic use promotes development of antibiotic-resistant bacteria.

These resistant germs multiply and are the No. 1 cause of increased drug resistance.

The 2013 report from the Centres for Disease Control and Prevention suggests that antibiotic resistance is a serious health threat impairing the ability to fight infectious diseases.

The "Get Smart for Health Care" program is a campaign aimed at avoiding the use of antibiotics for conditions such as acute viral bronchitis.

There are also the unwanted side effects of antibiotics to consider, including nausea, rashes, diarrhea and allergic reactions.

It is also important to distinguish acute viral bronchitis from chronic bronchitis or chronic obstructive pulmonary disease.

COPD is usually acquired from years of smoking and can be defined as a cough with phlegm production every day for three months of the year or longer.

Usually, pulmonary function tests

are required to confirm the diagnosis.

The lungs in the COPD patient are damaged due to scarring and result in narrowed airways.

Since these patients have compromised lungs, infection can be more serious, therefore chest infections for this group may require antibiotics, steroids and inhalers.

If you acquire a chest cold or cough that is of concern, you should see a physician:

- For a fever greater than 38 degrees;
- If the cough lasts longer than 10 days to two weeks;
- If you develop hemoptysis (bloody sputum), or
- If you develop a barking cough or if you have a cough with unexplained weight loss.

To help prevent the spread of infection it is important to wash hands frequently and always cover the mouth when coughing.

Approaching your life 'mindfully'

By Francine Clohosey

Mindfulness is an active state of open attention on the present – a deliberate attention to the present moment with

a focus on current experiences. You observe your thoughts and feelings, without judging them as good or bad.

Here's a sampling of mindful exercises you could try in less than one minute: attention here and now with kindness and curiosity.

Mindfulness is paying

Notice your breath: Sit quietly for one minute and no-

tice the sensations as your breath flows in and out of your body.

First two bites: Try mindful eating for the first two bites of any meal or snack. Pay attention to the texture, taste, smell, and appearance of the food and the sounds when you bite into your food.

Give your brain a break: Stop what you're doing and look up. Spend one minute watching something in your field of vision (the leaves fluttering, a cat sleeping, clouds passing).

Do one action mindfully every day: Pick an every-day action (like putting toothpaste on your toothbrush) and do it mindfully.

Scan your body: Scan your body from head to toes for any sensations of discomfort or tension. Attempt to soften to the sensations of discomfort. Scan your body again for any sensations of comfort or ease.

MINDFULNESS IN OUR SCHOOLS

Research over the last 10 years clearly indicates that attending to the social and emotional learning of children is a wise investment in their success in school as well as their success in the future. Mindfulness education is at the forefront of this important work and School District No.

46 is leading the way with one of the first mindfulness education projects in Canada taking place just down the road at Chatelech Secondary in Sechelt.

Funded by Health Canada and spearheaded by project manager Stacia Leech, during the past four years over 400 Mindfulness reconnects students to their five senses, bringing them into a moment to moment awareness of themselves and their surroundings.

Grade 8 students have received 13 weeks of mindfulness instruction. The curriculum is based on Jon Kabet Zinn's *Mindfulness Based Stress Reduction* and consists of mindfulness exercises complemented by other activities such as presentations by drug and alcohol experts, and non-violent communication skills training.

"Social and emotional competence builds resiliency in children and resiliency is a key factor in reducing at-risk behaviours," says Leech.

"Many of the programs that teach social and emotional skills have been evaluated and found to have positive impacts. Research shows that schools are the most effective setting for teaching social and emotional learning."

With the knowledge that increasing the capacity to deliver mindfulness education takes time, thought and care, efforts are underway to bring this project to other high schools in our community.

In March, the P. H. Community School hosts a presentation with Ron Skene, a mindfulness education facilitator.

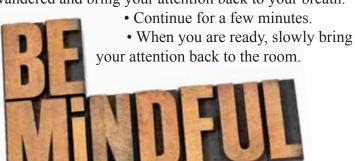

 - If you are comfortable, close your eyes.
- Begin with a slow, deep breath, bringing all your attention and awareness to the sensation of your breath.
- Continue to breathe at a natural pace, maintaining your focus on your breath.
- If your mind wanders, simply take notice that it has wandered and bring your attention back to your breath.

FROM BELGIUM TO B.C. — TOWNSITE BREWING'S CÉDRIC DAUCHOT

A key part of Townsite Brewing's story is its brewer, Cédric Dauchot, the only Belgian-born-and-trained brewer in B.C.

Dauchot grew up just south of Brussels, close to France.

He graduated from L'Institut Meurice in Brussels in 2004 as a chemistry-biochemistry engineer with an emphasis on fermentation and the brewing industries.

Most of his classmates ended up taking jobs with Belgian brewing empire Interbrew (now called Anheuser Busch-InBev), the world's largest brewer with 25 per cent of the global market share. His own experience there as a lab technician for a few months made him realize he did not want to go that route with his brewing career. Little did he know he'd end up about as far from that as one can get, both figuratively and physically.

After graduating, he took a job with the French chain Les 3 Brasseurs, which sent him to Montreal to set

up several brewpubs in Quebec.

During his four years there, he met and married a Canadian woman named Chloe Smith, a brewer herself.

After learning everything there is to know about setting up breweries, they moved to her hometown of Saskatoon to try to open their own, the Shiny Penny Brewery, which they intended to be the first "gastronomic brewpub" in Saskatchewan.

But after "chasing our own tail for a year and a half," Dauchot saw an advertisement for a head brewer in Powell River and decided to apply.

Townsite's founder, Karen Skad-

sheim, says she definitely wanted to hire him, but admits she was nervous about bringing this couple — who were about to have their first baby — all the way to the remote northern end of the Sunshine Coast, far from family and friends.

She needn't have worried. As Dauchot explains in his accented but perfect English,

"Saskatoon to Powell River is less far than Belgium to Canada."

It turned out to be the perfect fit. Cédric and Chloe love the Townsite neighbourhood's laid back, artistic vibe. Most importantly, Dauchot says:

"I had the freedom to put the brewery together the way I wanted."

Chloe also hopes to brew at Townsite once baby Béatrix lets her.

With the recent surge in interest in Belgian styles in the craft beer world, Townsite is lucky to have its own resident expert, and he has already demonstrated his skills with a

delicious Tripel he brewed for the Biercraft Belgian Showcase event during Vancouver Craft Beer Week in 2012, just a few months after Townsite Brewing opened. I had the pleasure of hanging out with Dauchot that night—we sampled various Belgian beers and he shared his memories of many of them. ("This is the one I used to drink when I was 16 and getting into trouble," or, "This brewery is five minutes from my father's house.")

Late in the evening, the restaurant owner walked over with a small, unlabelled bottle and offered us each a tiny glassful. It was the fabled Westvleteren 12, a Trappist beer that is brewed exclusively by monks in Belgium and is incredibly hard to find. The monastery only sells the beer to the public once in a while, and usually with the proviso that it may not be resold. Of course, that only increases its value: I have seen a price tag of \$25 for a single 250 mL bottle.

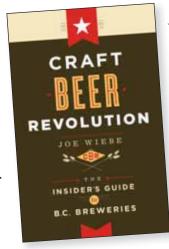
I was thrilled to try it at Biercraft, but Dauchot's reaction to it was priceless.

"This should not be here!" he sputtered in shock, staring at the small glass in his hands as if it were liquid gold. He said we should find a quiet corner and insisted we warm the small glassful a little in our hands be-

fore sipping it.

How was it? You'll have to try it yourself to find out. I want to keep that moment between Cédric and me.

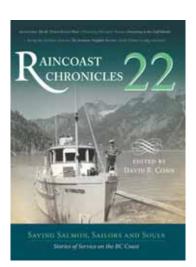
