







How to make Garden Bay great again?

What happened to Garden Bay?

When I was growing up on the mean street of Madeira Park, Garden Bay was a distant jewel—it had the lakes, the coolest pub and all the pretty girls lived there.

Some even argued that it was the home of the Coast's best hamburger at Colonel Flounders.

Those people were wrong, of course, Madeira's Frances Burger wore that title.

But while North Pender defenders will vigorously protest this claim, they should be protesting what has happened to their business core.

Garden Bay boasts some of the highest value real estate in the area while former institutions like the Garden Bay Pub, the Sundowner Inn and what was formerly Colonel Flounders, then LaVerne's Grill, sit empty.

Within the small community of Garden Bay, the concern is that the downfall of these community assets, all within a stone's toss apart, might negatively influence the appeal of this once thriving area.

A cultural and business anchor of Garden Bay, the Garden Bay Pub and Restaurant served live music with dinner most nights of the summer season.

Boaters made it a regular stop on trips upcoast to spend a night and a dime or two.

Since its sale in March of 2014, apathetic ownership has turned the GBP into a sad emblem of Garden Bay's former status as Pender Harbour's tourist hub.

As someone said to me the other day, "How long before there's a fire?"

A true heritage site, the Sundowner Inn was the Sunshine Coast's first and only hospital until 1964.

It has sat empty for years with no sign the owner is willing or capable of returning it to its past glory as a working inn.

And for anyone visiting for the first time, the drive into downtown Garden Bay must etch a bleak first impression as they pass by the decaying Auto Court.

That's not to say Garden Bay no longer lives up to its name.

It boasts more sundrenched properties and lakes than anywhere else on the Sunshine Coast and thanks to efforts by the Rotary Club and other folks, public areas around the docks and lagoon have never looked better.

Same with the revitalized John Henry's Store and Fisherman's Resort which have combined to anchor the focus of hope in Garden Bay by adding a restaurant and other amenities to pick up the slack.

Down the beach, Pender Harbour Resort has seen recent expansion of its accommodation and docks and farther west sits the promise of the Pender Harbour Ocean Discovery Station.

The Vancouver Yacht Club opposite the pub still provides a popular outpost for the yachting club crowd and if you turn the page, you'll find a story about Garden Bay's newest resort, opening later this month.

Meanwhile, Garden Bay's shuttered landmarks risk encouraging a notion that folks skip it altogether.

That would be a shame because for over 100 years, Garden Bay has been an essential destination.

Perhaps a residents' association might investigate how to help return Garden Bay's idle attractions to their past vitality?

That may be as simple as encouraging the current owners to sell.

Garden Bay's newest resort aims to open Aug. 1

There's a new business opening in Garden Bay this August.

Garden Bay RV Resort sits along Garden Bay Road, just before it descends into the business core of Garden Bay.

Though still under construction, the 12-acre property also borders Garden Bay Marine Provincial Park and Claydon Road.

Mark Durland told the *Harbour Spiel* that he bought the property in 2006.

Since then, he has built a house, took on a partner in the venture and has been overseeing the site's development since construction began in 2017.

"It will be a combination of everything," Durland said.

"It will be a combination of people interested in permanent RV parking year-round or we'll have some spots that are always available for people to be booking year-round.

"You know, if you're working on a construction project, like BC Hydro, for instance, for two months in the winter, you can book a site for two months."


Durland said they also plan to offer tent sites and RVs on site that will be available for rent as well.

"Because we're a work in progress, we're not opening everything in one fell swoop."

Durland said he plans to open 30 sites this season out of an eventual build-out of 51 sites, all of which will be fully-serviced.

"They're quite large spots, most of them — our average size is about 60-feet long by 35-feet wide."

Durland said the full build-out will depend on a number of factors including COVID-19 restrictions and will proceed "as the market dictates."

The property also boasts an RV and boat storage area, a barbecue area, group fire pit and a large enclosed dog walking area.

"What's nice about it is that all of the RV sites are very private because we back up against a provincial park."

At press time, Durland was overseeing the installation of power, septic and water services to sites and bathroom, shower and laundry facilities but said he expects to open on or before Aug. 1.

THEFT

Water and waste continue to dominate SCRD planning

SIGN, SIGNS, EVERYWHERE A SIGN

To balance the recent and contentious

dual-language highway sign and the Madeira Park renaming controversies, I wanted to share a related but positive story of another signage project initiated by several local community groups in 2017 and undertaken by them in collaboration with the Sechelt Elders language group and the SCRD.

Local park names were translated into shashishalhem (the shishalh language) to be included on informational signs to celebrate our own history and that of the shishalh Nation.

Because some names were lost

over time, existing geographical features were identified for translation into shashishalhem, such as Baker Beach or kwilkwilem, meaning "covered with sand" and Daniel Point or Payalus, meaning "lookout."

Everyone involved is pleased with the design and format of these attractive parks signs, and look forward to the installation of more of them as the project continues — another step in our journey to becoming a cohesive, modern, and forward-looking community.

PUBLIC PARTICIPATION IS CRITICAL

Long-term planning documents are the foundation that lets the SCRD provide essential services.

These documents include the solid waste management plan, Area A

water master plan, and comprehensive regional water plan, all now old and sorely in need of updating.

To ensure these plans are fair and unbiased, public participation is critical so I urge you to add your voice to the discussions.

HOT TOPIC: WASTE WATER

Waste water plants or community sewage treatment facilities continue to be a hot topic in Area A.

We have nine waste-water plants each serving from six to 179 properties, and each with a closed user group within a predefined service area.

The oldest system has been in service 43 years and the newest is not yet completed.

Each system was designed and installed by the subdivision developer, who recovered or will recover their

investment, a little at a time, as individual lots sell.

Typically, the developer operates the treatment facility for a short while before gifting it to the SCRD after a formal transfer request by the users.

Once the SCRD agrees to own, manage, and operate a system, it becomes a "community waste water system," but remains for the exclusive use of those in the predefined service area, who are billed for it annually as defined and allowed by a bylaw.

The SCRD is struggling with developing waste water asset management plans, which are long-term plans for ongoing management, operation, and maintenance of the systems.

The first phase of this planning exercise revealed the previous funding model was not sustainable, and thus our recent user-fee increase.

IRVINES LANDING WASTE WATER

Irvines Landing residents are questioning why every home in the area wasn't connected, or allowed the option to connect, to one of the three modern waste-water plants there.

One proposed solution is to join the systems together, with users sharing both the costs and benefits of a large, single system.

Because the existing plants are owned by the SCRD, it should be possible to extend the service area if the residents and/or businesses that request it, agree to bear the one-time cost and share in the operational costs.

WATER SUPPLY ADVISORY COMMITTEE

The water supply advisory committee advises the SCRD on the development and implementation of water supply and conservation plans, according to the SCRD commitment

that public representation from their water systems be pursued in a manner ensuring that the interests of residential users are adequately represented.

The SCRD is now seeking folks to participate in the WASAC.

I hope to see interested community members, ideally, residents from the North Pender, South Pender, Egmont and Earls Cove (Cove Cay) water system service areas, step forward to serve on this committee.

We expect both the Area A water master plan and comprehensive regional water plan to be updated or replaced, based on recommendations made by this committee.

CHURCH ROAD WELL FIELD ALTERNATE APPROVAL **PROCESS**

Construction of the Church Road well field involves drilling new wells and connecting the Granthams, Soames, and Chapman systems to significantly increase supply in the Chapman water system, reducing the

stress during summer droughts.

It will cost \$8 million, to be repaid through a tax on those properties in the regional water supply and distribution service areas that have access to the water — North and South Pender are not in this service area.

If you oppose the loan, complete an elector response form available at www.scrd.ca/Alternative-Approval-*Process* or at the SCRD office at 1975 Field Road.

The AAP closes July 20, 2020.

SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT **ADVISORY COMMITTEE**

We recently re-established our solid waste management plan monitoring advisory committee and two residents have volunteered to serve on it to make recommendations on, for example, strategies to extend the life of our landfill.

We hope to see members of this group participate in our proposed "future waste disposal options" study, expected to start work later this year.



A welcome visitor to local gardens in late spring, the Canadian tiger swallowtail is one of the best-known butterflies in Canada.

According to the Nature Conservancy of Canada, it can be found in all provinces and territories — including the Arctic Circle — but not Labrador.

Because of its size — its wingspan typically measures between 53 and 90 millimetres — and distinctive pattern, the Canadian tiger swallowtail is easily recognized.

Its yellow colouring overlaid with wide, black tiger stripes is hard to miss.

It has a wide, black band along the inner margin of the hindwing.

The underside of the Canadian tiger swallowtail is yellow, often with extensive over-scaling of orange, and black.

Depending on latitude, the butterfly can be found throughout Canada between mid-May and late July.

According to the Canadian Biodiversity Information Facility, since 1906, when it was first named, canadensis was considered a subspecies of the more southerly Eastern tiger swallowtail (P. glaucus), found throughout the eastern U.S.

It was separated in 1991 based on detailed physiological and genetic characteristics.

The more northern swallowtail butterfly has only one generation per year, while glaucus has two.

Females lay eggs singly on a host plant.

The caterpillar folds the host plant's leaves and ties them together with silk; they then eat from this structure.

The pupae overwinter, then

emerge in May.

Mature larvae are dark green, with two spots that look like eyes on the swollen section of the body behind the head.

Immature larvae are brown and white, resembling bird droppings.

The larvae use a wide variety of trees as food plants, including willow, cherry, poplar and ash.

Though mainly a species of open woodlands and adjacent areas, it also flies north of tree line in Canada where stunted trees and dwarf willows can be found.

The Canadian tiger swallowtail can often be found in mud puddles where hundreds might gather at the same small puddle, jostling for position.

Made with love: Masks for the Coast

Christine Fearn is no stranger to masks.

Six years ago, the PHSS grad and Halfmoon Bay resident's second son was born.

Thane was a "micro preemie"—a child born weighing less than 1,000 grams or at less than 28 weeks gestation.

For the first three months of his life, everyone who interacted with him had to wear a mask and Fearn saw first-hand how a simple piece of cloth can protect the people you love.

Those memories spurred her to action when the coronavirus landed in BC this spring.

Fearn founded a group that since mid-March has made over 10,000 masks for the Coast.

The group, "Friends Wear Masks to Save Friends," which she co-heads with Jennifer Stapleton, started by making masks for patients of the respiratory assessment clinic in Sechelt.

They soon expanded to providing masks for essential businesses.

Then Fearn learned that many workers found the masks uncomfortable to wear for long stretches, though several told her they felt "one hundred times safer" when customers wore them.

So, she set up shop in front of the Madeira Park IGA, distributing masks

to anyone who wanted them.

"Madeira Park is my hometown," she said.

"I had to start there."

Friends Wear Masks to Save Friends has volunteer sewers, drivers and coordinators up and down the Coast, including Gerri Fenn, Dorothy Miller and Rhonda Van Tent here in Pender Harbour.

The group has received an outpouring of support from Coast businesses, including Coastal Craft in Gibsons, which fabricated a custom "pleating machine." The device does one thing and does it really well — it pleats a long swath of fabric in a matter of seconds.

The innovation has saved hours of work, though Christine doesn't use it herself.

After months of experience, she can now sew a mask, start to finish, in a blistering 2.5 minutes.

But Fearn and her group are not the only volunteers producing masks to protect Sunshine Coasters.

In late-March, Garden Bay resident Aurelia Cardiff asked, "How can I love my neighbour during CO-VID-19?"

Cardiff was tracking the virus's progression in France, where her family lives, when she noticed that face masks there were "becoming a big deal."

It sparked an idea.

She approached the sewing group at her church, Christ the Redeemer Anglican, about making masks.

Bernie Kretschmer, Nancy Enns and Sue Campbell were enthusiastic.

They received "acres of fabric" from local community members like Rose Everett.

This allowed funds raised through the masks to be directed toward charity on the Coast and Lower Mainland.

The group has raised more than \$800 for coronavirus relief efforts, including financial support for laid-off restaurant workers, some of them new immigrants who aren't eligible for government assistance; housing through Sunshine Coast Community Services for women fleeing domestic abuse during quarantine, and other COVID-related needs.

Kretschmer, Enns and Campbell have sewn hundreds of masks so far, with Cardiff organizing distribution, often during her lunch break at the Madeira Park Veterinary Clinic.

For Enns and the others, the initiative has been a way to continue helping the community during social distancing.

"When people are walking







After retiring in his 50s, the couple moved to Madeira Park where he loved to do home improvement projects, golf, fish and hike.


He will be remembered for his love of family, sense of humour, witty remarks, and willingness to lend a hand to his many friends.

FREE 'BOAT ONLY' CONCERT

Courtesy of Gunboat Bay's Mellquist family, the Peter Van Deursen Trio will perform a waterfront concert on Saturday, July 18. The blues trio will perform at 6 p.m. on the Mellquist's dock on the north side of Gunboat Bay and the family invites boaters to attend.

Host Ken Mellquist checked the tides and confirms they will be perfect with a rising tide all afternoon, high slack at around showtime and then a slow ebb back out the bay. The event should be over some time around 8 p.m.

For anchoring, the bottom surrounding the dock/stage varies between 30 and 50 feet. Mellquist asks people to arrive a little early and try to be at anchor or quiet with motors off by around 6 p.m.

Due to COVID-19 concerns, the hosts ask that boaters and neighbours limit people to immediate family members and follow proper social distancing and hygiene guidelines, including no rafting of boats while anchoring a minimum of 30 feet from other boats.

PENDER HARBOUR READING CENTRE

The Pender Harbour Reading Centre is set to re-open in early July for full service and takeout services. Because of COVID-19, things will be different at the PHRC, as they are everywhere else.

Recently, the PHRC has been open on Tuesdays and Saturdays for the return of books only. Please bring your books back in a paper or plastic bag clearly marked with your name. If you cannot put them in a bag, put a slip of paper with your name in each book pocket. This is important because they need to connect your name with the book card to put the books back on the shelf.

Once they re-open the following changes will apply:

- Volunteers and members who are ill should not visit the PHRC;
 - Extra cleaning by volunteers will be ongoing;
- They will quarantine returned items for 72 hours to assure that they are virus-free;
 - Masks are required to be worn in the PHRC by all;
 - Masks, gloves, wipes and sanitizer will be available;
- They will install screens where social distancing measures are not possible;
- Members may be asked to check-out their own materials to enhance the distancing from volunteer staff and reduce the handling of the books, and
- Members may take out six books at a time, two of which can be new books.

Play it safe in the sun this summer

We can all say this spring has had its fair share of hot sunny days.

And we know there will be more to come over the summer, when we will find ourselves relaxing on the beach (hopefully), gardening or taking part in other outdoor activities where we will be exposed to the sun's rays.

So, with this in mind, comes the talk — the sun safety talk.

And yes, this may sound like a repeat of previous years, but it's an important repeat because skin cancer is the most common cancer in Canada.

It was estimated in 2014 that 6,500 new cases of malignant melanoma and another 76,100 cases of non-melanoma skin cancers were diagnosed.

With these alarming numbers and the fact that skin cancer, including melanoma, is one of the most preventable types of cancers, it seems pertinent to reinform ourselves of sun safety behaviours and practices.

SUN SAFETY

Recently, the Canadian Cancer Society, along with other national health partners, released updated sun safety recommendations:

- Peak times to cover up are between 11 a.m. and 3 p.m. (previously, it was 11 a.m. 4 p.m.).
- It recommends using sunscreen of SPF 30 (previously it was 15).
- Clothing is preferred as it generally provides better protection.

Unchanged recommendations include seeking shade, wearing wide brimmed hats, wearing UVA/UVB protectant sunglasses, avoid indoor tanning beds and getting Vitamin D from diet and vitamin supplements July 2020

rather than UV ray exposure.

There are many ways we can protect ourselves.

Unfortunately, there are also many misconceptions too.

MYTH NO. 1: CHEMICALS IN SUNSCREEN CAUSE CANCER

There is no evidence that approved sunscreens cause cancer and, in fact, the opposite is true.

Not wearing sunscreen is proven to pose a significant cancer risk (BC Cancer Agency).

One of the ingredients, oxybenzone (a synthetic estrogen) was used in a 2001 study with rats fed a large dose of the ingredient each day.

However, this study is not clinically relevant for humans since the amount actually absorbed by the skin is minuscule compared to the extremely high dose in the study.

If there is a seal of approval from the Canadian Dermatology Association on the bottle, the product is safe.

MYTH NO. 2: IT DOESN'T MATTER HOW YOU APPLY YOUR SUNSCREEN

It's suggested from research that most people only apply about a third to half of the amount that they need.

You need about one ounce (a shot glass) of sunscreen to cover your entire body.

For best protection, reapply after heavy sweating or swimming.

For further information on sun safety, melanoma and sun protection, please visit the Canadian Cancer Society or BC Cancer Agency websites where you can find relevant and research-based information.

The P. H. Health Centre is open for in-person services.




