# See it through their eyes

After a dull winter, Sunshine Coasters can be excused if they suffer

bittersweet disappointment when summer finally arrives.

That's because the off-season doldrums coax summer fantasies of weeks spent stretching out with cocktails on a local patio after a relaxing day of lounging at the lake.

The reality is usually different.

As summer booms, the people who kept the lights on all winter suddenly have to compete for recreation, and tables.

One day in mid-July, I counted over 20 people on the ubiquitous Costco stand up paddleboards and kayaks just around the central island in Garden Bay Lake.

But, if I'm nostalgic and sometimes miffed that things aren't like they used to be, I also enjoy a sense of pride that my home is being enjoyed by so many.

Summer can also be hectic juggling the train of friends and family who, not coincidentally, also pass through in July and August.

There's nothing better than reconnecting without having to leave the Coast to do it, but it can be a strain.

Entertaining guests has a way of making you forget that you're not on vacation too — and that you still have to go to work the next day.

They tend to make you drink more, stay up later and fill your day with outdoor activities.

If you're young, it's fantastic. If not, it can be exhausting.

But the stream of summer visitors also force you out of your habits in other, unexpected ways.

Who hasn't guided out-of-town friends to old favourites like Pender

Hill or the Skookumchuck?

Or to a beach you hadn't explored for decades?

Each time I do, I wonder why I don't do it more often.

I think one of the hazards of living here full time is that it's easy for the familiar to become invisible and playing tour guide serves up a powerful reminder of what we have.

I relished growing up here but when I graduated from PHSS in 1989, I was leaving for good.

When I returned in 2000, I saw the place in a new light.

The familiar had become magical.

Whether strolling Francis Point Park on a sunny spring morning or sitting out on a still night and seeing stars again, I finally appreciated the powerful experiences that people who don't live here are having all around us, all the time.

The young couple falling in love with a little help from Dan Bosch Park's Douglas fir and sparkling azure lake backdrop.

The parental pride in watching children getting along and squealing with laughter as they tip over rocks at Baker Beach.

Or the awesome contemplation of life and nature brought on by sipping a glass of wine on the deck at the Wilderness Lodge.

They might drive too slow or clog the aisles at the IGA but we should be patient with these people.

Many endure the daily strain of living in the Lower Mainland and come here to rescue their mental health.

They might be experiencing something profound — a way of life we take for granted.

And I've found that tagging along with them is one of the best ways to discover it again.

# Volunteers 'Dive Against Debris' at Irvines Landing

The future site of the Pender Harbour Ocean Discovery Station received some underwater care this past month.

Volunteers came from as far away as Vancouver to Dive Against Debris on Sunday July 14.

The event aimed to both improve the health of Pender Harbour's ecosystem and to collect information about marine debris which may help inform policy change.

Divers entered the water and, over the course of an hour, brought bag upon bag of debris to the surface.

Volunteers on shore hauled the debris bags to the sorting area for processing.

Loon Foundation monitoring staff and volunteers then removed ocean life that surfaced with the debris and promptly returned the marine life to the ocean.

Much of the debris included bottles and metal, with some interesting finds like a ceramic teapot.

Tires were removed by roping and towing out by boat and truck.

All debris was transported to the marine debris collection facility, operated by Ocean Legacy, at the SCRD solid waste facilities in Sechelt.

In total, volunteers removed 690 kilograms (1,520 pounds) of debris from the waters off Irvines landing.

One diver shared underwater footage of Irvines Landing with the group and said, "We probably only

collected one per cent of the debris.

"There is a lot down there."

Divers were also able to make ecosystem observations while collecting debris.

Sightings included opalescent squid eggs, booted sponge, schools of shiner perch, leather sea stars, sea cucumbers, and small species of octopus.

Local marine diving specialists Sea Wolf Diving supported the event with a safety team as well as vessel and winch support for heavy items like tires.



# Blanket campfire ban now in place

As of July 12, all open burning, including campfires, are prohibited on the Sunshine Coast.

The ban includes all fires whether for warmth or cooking and all beach fires, burning barrels, fireworks, firecrackers and sky lanterns.

The campfire prohibition does not apply to cooking stoves that use gas, propane or briquettes, or portable campfire devices that use briquettes, liquid, or gaseous fuel, provided they are CSA or ULC approved, and the height of the flame is less than 15 centimetres.

This ban will be in place until Thursday, Oct. 31 or until the order is rescinded.

# Bylaw 337 and OCP updates

Some feel that any and all regulations are an assault on property rights, but the reality is that soci-

ety requires laws to let us live together peaceably in our communities.

Our OCP was last updated in 2018 and our zoning Bylaw 337 was created in 1990, so they both need updates.

On the SCRD website, the public hearing information binder and a public hearing presentation describes three legislated bylaw updates and five optional updates for Area A.

While the legislated (mandated) items are insignificant, the optional updates could be delayed until the

OCP update, rejected altogether or be accepted as discretionary.

"Hardscaping" in riparian assessment areas (not ocean setbacks because the ocean is not a riparian area) refers to fixtures constructed of wood and aggregate materials, e.g. patios, decks, decorative and retaining walls, roads and parking lots, campground pads, pavers and fill placement.

Ocean setbacks aim to protect property from wave and high-tide damage, but grandparenting permissions will remain, leaving ocean-waterfront homeowners unaffected.

Lakefront properties are subject to riparian setbacks but, with a reasonable request supported by a qualified professional, building variances have been and will continue to be granted.

The proposed changes include:

1. Minimum parcel size calcula-

tion will exclude:

- Community sewer field and related equipment areas;
  - Public open space;
  - Parkland;
- Property returned to the province;
  - Highway dedication;
- Land covered by flowing or standing water, e.g. lake, pond, river, creek, spring, ravine, and wetland, whether or not they are usually covered, and
- Areas containing a stream protection and enhancement area (SPEA) as established under provincial riparian areas protection regulations.
- 2. No buildings, structures, hardscaping or any part thereof shall be constructed, reconstructed, moved, located, or extended within five metres of an SPEA boundary or default

TIPS to help conserve community water supply and prepare for drought:



- 1. Convert unused lawns to native plant meadows or drought tolerant ground cover.
- 2. Add mulch (wood chips, seaweed, cardboard) around plants to help retain moisture in the soil.
- 3. Around the house, don't rush to flush, take short showers, run full loads of dishes and laundry.
- 4. Rainwater catchment and greywater use is encouraged where possible. Check public health quidelines first.

riparian assessment area if a provincially approved SPEA has not been established.

- 3. Watercourse setbacks will be increased:
- Increase to 30 metres the natural boundary of Brittain, Skawaka, Deserted and Vancouver Rivers and Smanit, Seshal, Hunaechin, Stakawus, Potato, Loquilts, Tsuadhdi and Osgood Creeks, and
- Increase all other setbacks from water bodies and watercourses from 7.5 metres to 15 metres or 17 metres.

If implemented, these bylaw 337 and OCP changes will not supersede provincial or federal legislation, or the strata act.

Although the public hearing is over, feedback won't be presented until September, so submissions can still be directed to staff.

### NO BUS FOR US

The province strives to provide innovative transportation solutions to rural residents and businesses, but they prioritize more populated communities than ours, so we're still waiting.

Since 2012, and until 2022, the SCRD has made and supported motions at the yearly Union of British Columbia Municipalities conference, including:

- Amend the Passenger Transportation Act so that safe and competitive transportation services can become viable in small rural and remote communities:
- Establish an area-based and tiered regulatory system;
  - Implement a viable and flexible

ride-sharing service regulation;

- Assess and determine the sustainability of passenger-directed vehicle operations including public transit and taxi service in rural communities, and
- Provide adequate funding to support local and intercommunity transportation in rural communities.

After the 2022 convention, the province directed the legislative assembly to appoint an all-party committee to review their legislative framework, enacted in 2019.

Among other objectives, the committee was tasked with evaluating whether the act promotes passenger directed vehicle services, including transportation network services in small, rural communities.

The committee was given one year from its appointment to submit a report on its review and, in their report, could include recommendations they deemed appropriate and helpful.

In this report, presented in May, the committee identified service shortcomings in small, rural, and remote communities and stated that the act does not do enough to promote PDV services in these communities, nor does the framework consider problems in small, rural communities.

They noted the difficulty in finding a market to support sustainable PDV services and discussed the role PDVs could fill within the broader system, notably linking to other transportation modes to improve connectivity within rural communities.

Among other items, they recommended the province, "take a holistic approach to improve transportation connectivity within and between communities in small, rural, and remote areas that recognizes unique needs and includes viable passenger directed vehicle options in conjunction with other transportation modes."

So, there's still no bus for us, but there's now a glimmer of hope that the province, at the urging of its own special committee, will act to resolve our public transportation challenges.

# 2. HOUSING



The Sunshine Coast remains an area dominated by the single family home, while other housing types lag behind. Housing advocates are hoping to see future construction correct that imbalance.

As things are, the region is lacking in the types of housing that provide a pathway to ownership for people entering the market and options for single-family homeowners, in particular seniors, looking to downsize.

A 2023 report from McGill University's Urban Politics and Governance Research Group found that the Sunshine Coast had the **second highest density of short term rentals** in the Vancouver Coast and Mountains tourism region (Whistler was highest by a wide margin).

The report estimated the loss of housing units to STRs of **110** in 2023, down from **120** in 2022 and an impact on average rents in 2022 of **\$50/month**.

The Sunshine Coast Community Foundation is a charitable organization that brings together people who care about the Sunshine Coast community. Community foundations across Canada prepare Vital Signs reports, reporting on key areas of local life which are measurable, accountable and of interest to their communities. 

In his later years, he enjoyed gardening, fishing and appreciating the birds, wildlife and the many flowers and trees on the property.

After being diagnosed with dementia, likely Alzheimer's, he accepted it gracefully and didn't fight the changes that were beyond his control.

Because he was always so fit and healthy, it was harder for others to accept.

Home care services and Better at Home made an extraordinary difference as did the support of family, friends and Drs. Colin Sutton and Carol Bosch.

His family also sends thanks to Lana and the ambulance attendants for their resuscitation attempts.

A celebration of his life was held in Egmont on July 27.

His family and friends will miss him.

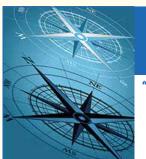

# Family physicians and the Pender Harbour Health Centre

We often hear from the community about your need for family physicians at the Pender Harbour Health Centre.

We wanted to use this opportunity to update you on our recruitment efforts, explain how to access our current physician and information around alternative ways to access physician care.

# PHYSICIAN RECRUITMENT

The PHHC leadership is actively looking for ways to bring more physicians to the PHHC.

We have been working with the local Division of Family Practice and their Recruitment and Retention Team.

This year, the PHHC leadership have had meetings with three physicians who are interested in coming to practice on the Coast.

The PHHC also has physician job postings on various job boards including Health Match, the new provincial healthcare recruitment website.

Finally, we are also working with the Sunshine Coast Primary Care Network to bring new physicians to the community.

# **CURRENT PHYSICIAN ACCESS**

As mentioned in last month's edition of the *Harbour Spiel*, we currently have a part-time family physician at the PHHC — Dr. Bazilli.

Dr. Bazilli currently provides a clinic on Tuesday and Thursday mornings and is taking appointments with patients previously connected to Dr. Sutton who remain unattached.

# **ALTERNATIVE PHYSICIAN ACCESS**

Due to a current lack of physician access at PHHC we would like to make you aware of two other op-

tions to access a physician.

You can connect with a physician daily by using the TELUS Health MyCare App.

Simply download the app and follow the prompts to book an appointment with a practicing physician in BC.

You can also access the walk-in clinic at Cowrie Medical Clinic on Saturdays from 10am – 4pm (604-670-6222).

# GETTING CONNECTED TO THE PENDER HARBOUR HEALTH CENTRE

As we look to bring more physicians to the PHHC, it is important for you to know how we will be connecting new patients to these physicians.

Recently the Ministry of Health launched the Health Connect Registry.

Unattached patients will need to sign up to this online registry and when new physicians are recruited, patients are attached from this new online waitlist.

If you do not have a family doctor, please go to the Health Connect Registry at www.healthlinkbc.ca or call 811 and sign up.

# **HOW YOU CAN HELP**

As you have heard, the recruitment of physicians is a challenge province-wide and, on the Coast, we have many folks who are seeking a physician.

One barrier to recruitment is access to housing.

We have already had some community members step forward and offer accommodation, either free or heavily subsidized.

# An Egmonster working the Coast, part 1

Living on the Coast often requires one to be entrepreneurial throughout life in order to survive its fragile economy.

Historically, fishing and logging held sway but eventually ebbed over the decades as resources dwindled from over harvesting, mismanagement, the sands of time or whatever.

I arrived in 1970, meeting all of you busy people and jumped in feet first.

In 1974, I was hired by the Lasqueti Fish Company.

Along with plenty of other unemployed locals on the island, we were hired to build a seine net to outfit one of their boats for the herring fishery.

It was the first year it had reopened after a closure of many years in order to allow the fish to recover from the previous fishery.

I don't know how this first net performed for Billy Forbes, who fished it that year, but he's still fishing herring.

This net hanging skill served me well over the years as a commercial fisherman with my partner Keray Farrell and his family.

Later, I was able to spin it into a whole new career in Jervis Inlet and Agamemnon Channel when the fish farms arrived in the area.

It was a busy time in the inlet for fish farmers in the mid-1980s.

The term "aquaculture" was a fresh buzzword and money was just waiting to be made.

Little farms were floating in every available bay, sheltered or not.

I had been shucking oysters at Angus's Totem Bay for over a year and in that time had figured out how to hang web in a cube and create sea

pens to raise salmon smolts in.

When my son wanted to go to high school instead of taking correspondence education, I relocated to Dean Bosch's in Agamemnon Bay, where I was very generously given one of their skid houses to stay in as long as I needed.

It was rented by the Goliath Bay log sorting grounds and saw little use.

Gordon Cawley and John Nelson, as well as Dean Bosch, really helped me out with this leg up for a single mom.

At Bosch's, I turned my limited experience into a cottage industry using new, clean web delivered to the driveway and distributed to moms in Egmont who were home with kids.

Even Charlie Hitchens and his wife Beryl, who lived next door, got in on the business.

While we watched Dean run around on booms in the bay, we hung web on the porches, all supervised by attentive springer spaniels.

One busy day I had a visit from two enterprising brothers from Powell River, Patrick and Paul Dohm.

They were interested in starting a net loft there to make net pens for the fish farms that were by then dotting the coastline of Jervis and Agamemnon Inlets.

They needed someone to show them how and had asked around and learned that several farms were using my nets.

Even though it meant catching the 6:30 a.m. ferry from Earls Cove every morning and returning at 6:30 pm, I told then I would do it, but only if they hired my oldest step-daughter, Lisa Farrell, who was living in Powell River and needed a job.

After a few years, the Powell River Net Loft was the largest employer in Powell River second only to the mill.

Eventually I got tired of the daily commute and took a net loft job at the fish farm in Wood Bay.

That soon ended with a back injury and being ordered off the job by WCB.

I had to down the net needle and reinvent myself.

Again.

The word in Egmont was that there was a census coming up.

Though the census took place on June 4, 1991, the workers would be busy long before, canvassing the neighbourhoods and doing interviews.

In the supervising chair was Shirley Hall of North Lake.

Also on board was Lynn Mees, later queen of the fabulous bakery on the Skookumchuck trail.

This was the core group but then a number of census takers were required with one even requiring a boat to enumerate souls from Egmont through to Gordondale inside the Chuck, and then all the way up Jervis Inlet, including folks tied up at Chatterbox Falls.

Elaine Griffith had already taken the area from North Lake south so I took the road into Egmont from there and to the head of Jervis Inlet.

I planned to use my junk-rigged sailboat, *Meleet*.

"Wow," I thought.

"I hope I can do this alone."

The job was heavy on printed matter but it gave me a chance to use my excess university education which, frankly, had never paid as well as digging clams.

Driving around the Egmont community doing interviews was interesting.

I had a fine time questioning locals like Killer Kelly, Teepee Tim, Bob the Wop, Bruce Silvey about all aspects of their lives.

This was the long form and took an hour of tiptoeing around what these

boys did for a living.

I qualified for the Jervis Inlet portion of the job only because I had a boat.

Around this time, my new paramour, "Hydro" Denny Bohmer, had removed the wiring harness from the Isuzu diesel in my little ship as he figured it was substandard.

Then he became involved in work out of the area and left *Meleet* dead in the water.

Thinking this good job should be shared anyway, I asked around for a boat and driver to work with.

Enter the fabulous Buddy Cook and his wife Sue.





