

## Everyone's a little bit hippie

Hippies never got a lot of respect around here.

When they arrived in the late-1960s through the 1970s, folks in Pender Harbour and Egmont weren't prepared.

When locals uttered the word, it was often accompanied by an adjective like "dirty," "lazy" or "smelly."

The area had experienced significant growth by then and was already a popular destination for townies to fish and drink.

But everyone still looked the same — with hair matching the styles of whatever country music stars were popular a decade prior.

Then along came these young, dropout — too chicken to fight, too lazy to work — drug freaks.

For the staid logging and fishing families that lived here, it must have seemed too much.

I grew up with the kids of hippies and by then hippie-ish families were just part of the landscape.

That's why I'm happy to have someone set the record straight.

In his book, *No Longhairs: The Odyssey of a Vietnam Draft Dodger*, Jon Van Arsdell exposes the local hippie scene with honesty and humor.

(See review, p. 32.)

I probably met Van Arsdell in the mid-1970s when he and his family lived across the road from my grand-parents in Egmont.

His son Kinji invited me in to try some hearty cereal he was really passionate about.

Though we were only about six or seven, the memory stuck.

I didn't know what it was but I knew I'd stepped into a different world.

My recollection of the interiors of 1970s hippie houses were that they were always wood heat warm, finished with natural wood throughout and smelled like an exotic amalgam of spice, damp potting soil and cedar.

There were always musical instruments and a wood bookshelf filled with books in their living room.

The Van Arsdells moved away sometime later but they stayed on the Coast and I've bumped into Kinji every couple of decades or so since.

Many of those who stuck around have carved out multigenerational families here.

As a teenager, hippies had the best music and threw the best parties — Egmont's "hippie stomps" were legendary.

But their impact has been absent from discussions of local history until now.

We'll never know just how large a role the outdoor marijuana industry played in our weakling micro-economy during the 1980s and 1990s.

But it likely wouldn't have existed without the early expertise, and seeds, that arrived with the hippies.

Many were college educated, including Van Arsdell who had a biology degree.

His education positioned him at the forefront of salmon farming as it developed, eventually teaching programs for others entering the industry.

Perhaps even more importantly, the hippies influenced the established conservatism of our isolated community by delivering fresh perspectives during a politically charged time.

Now, everyone's a little bit hippie and Egmont and Pender Harbour wouldn't be the same without them.

Thanks to Jon Van Arsdell, we now know a little more about why.

## PHARA questions the province about DRIPA process

On Jan. 18, the Pender Harbour and Area Residents Association sent a letter to key members of the provincial government and chief and council of the Sechelt Indian Band regarding what they call a lack of consultation around ongoing negotiations with the First Nation.

Last summer, the province announced they had entered into discussion with the shìshàlh First Nation regarding new legislation aimed at implementing the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples.

Article 7 of the Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples Act is the province's blueprint for decision making with First Nations:

"For the purposes of reconciliation, the Lieutenant Governor in Council may authorize a member of the Executive Council, on behalf of the government, to negotiate and enter into an agreement with an Indigenous governing body relating to one or both of the following:

"(a) The exercise of a statutory power of decision jointly by the Indigenous governing body, and the government or another decision-maker;

"(b) The consent of the Indigenous governing body before the exercise of a statutory power of decision."

In the letter, PHARA poses 22 questions about the process.

Board member Sean McAllister has taken the lead on this file.

McAllister is a former lawyer who now lives in Pender Harbour and told the *Harbour Spiel* that in light of the province's handling of the dock management plan, he is concerned about what DRIPA will mean.

McAllister points to rhetoric in an Aug. 2022 press release announcing the DRIPA process that hints how it will be used as the framework for other authorizations in the province.

"It's not going to just be docks," said McAllister.

"It will be forestry, mining, fishing and it might even get down to building permits — anything you need an authorization for from the government, you may be going to the province for one stamp and going to the shìshàlh office for another."

In October 2018, the shishalh Nation and the BC government signed a "foundation agreement" that committed them to a shared decision-making process for land and resource authorizations throughout their traditional territory.

McAllister said DRIPA moves that relationship from "shareddecision making" to "joint-decision making" but, so fare, the province has refused PHARA's request to be included in the process.

"We're taking exception to the fact that they are proceeding with that type of agreement, or they are starting the negotiations with the shìshàlh, without any consultation from the local population here," said McAllister.

"The result is going to be the government basically giving up its statutory decision-making position."

McAllister and PHARA are still questioning the implementation of the BC government and SIB's 2018 dock management plan.

With almost no consultation, the province and the SIB co-authored a plan that would see some waterfront property owners lose their foreshore rights or be required to rebuild their docks according to new requirements.

"We've had one Zoom meeting in July of 2021 and they basically will not schedule another one with us," said McAllister. "They've refused."

Because this isn't his area of legal expertise, McAllister said PHARA consulted a lawyer specializing in Aboriginal law who informed much of the wording in their letter.

PHARA isn't alone in its concern about how the province is implementing UNDRIP.

In a June 15, 2021 *Vancouver Sun* column by Vaughn Palmer, Robin Junger, a former deputy minister of energy now specializing in Aboriginal law had this to say about the provincial government's move:

The plan "commits the B.C. government to entering into agreements that give Indigenous governing bodies statutory decision-making powers over non-Indigenous people and companies and/or a veto over decision-making by other statutory decision-makers."

Said Junger, "This is clearly more than the Crown's duty to consult, that has been established by the Supreme Court of Canada in relation to constitutionally protected assertions of Aboriginal rights and title.

"It is even more than the powers held by Indigenous groups in respect of proven Aboriginal title — as the Court has been clear, Indigenous groups do not have a complete veto even there."

McAllister said PHARA is just asking for a seat at the table to voice their concerns before it is too late.

"In the letter they sent us, they basically said, 'We've started negotiations with the shìshàlh and we're not ready to talk to you guys," he said.

"So, I guess they'll come out with their agreement and they'll give us 30 days to respond.

"They're terrible when it comes to discussions with the public."



## Thieves attempt theft of two ATMs in Madeira Park Dec. 22

On Dec. 22, Sunshine Coast RCMP were alerted to two brazen break and enters involving attempted thefts of ATM machines in Madeira Park.

The Madeira Park branch of the Sunshine Coast Credit Union was broken into and an attempt made to remove the bank machine.

It is believed that the same suspect(s) also broke through the front entrance of the Grasshopper Pub where part of the ATM was removed.

Both attempts occurred between 5 a.m. and 6 a.m.

Police are looking for what appears to be a black or dark-coloured, first generation SuperDuty Ford F250 or F350 pick-up truck.

A truck matching this description that may be related to the break and enters that occurred in Madeira Park was stolen sometime after 8 p.m. on Dec. 21 from Binnacle Avenue in Sechelt.

That truck is a blue 2005 Ford F350 which was bearing BC licence plate HR2110 and is pictured right.

The truck has a grey strip running along the bottom of the truck and chrome over the windows.

Police are also looking to identify a suspect in security images seen

## 2022 was record year for whales in the Strait of Georgia

According to the Pacific Whale Watch Association, 2022 saw record-breaking numbers of Bigg's killer whales and humpback whales spotted in the waters of British Columbia and Washington state.

There were 1,221 unique sightings of Bigg's killer whales in 2022 — 154 more than 2021's record and double the number of sightings five years ago, according to year-end data put together by the PWWA and local researchers.

Bigg's killer whales and humpback whales were the two types most frequently documented by whale watchers in 2022, spotted by PWWA crew members on 278 days and 274 days, respectively.

Grey whales were reported by the PWWA on 200 days, and minke whales on 158 days of the year.

While the salmon-eating southern resident killer whale population remains endangered and is rarely

encountered by professional whale watchers, Bigg's (formerly "transient") killer whales feed on marine mammals, and have been increasing steadily for the past decade.

According to BC research group Bay Cetology, the coastal Bigg's population continues to grow, with approximately 370 individuals including 10 new calves welcomed in 2022.

Researchers with the Canadian Pacific Humpback Collaboration

reported that 396 individual hump-back whales were photographed in the Strait of Georgia, Strait of Juan de Fuca and Puget Sound over the course of the 2022 season — the highest number documented in a single year for at least the past century.

That figure includes a recordbreaking 34 mothers with calves who traveled from their tropical birthing grounds in Hawaii, Mexico, and Central America.

## Local groups continue to benefit from the late Pat and Wayne Jobb

Pat and Wayne Jobb moved to Irvines Landing to retire in 2008.

The couple lived in Pender Harbour for only a short time but had an outsized effect by lending their skills and volunteering for a number of local organizations.

They brought considerable skills

with them which included a notable joint career in community newspapers before Pat diverged to library school (University of Alberta) and pursued a second equally distinguished career as a regional and public library director.

Pat died in 2012 and Wayne in 2021 but the community continues to

benefit from their generosity.

It was recently announced by their executor, Wayne's sister Gayle Collier, that the couple left over \$157,000 to a variety of local organizations.

The Jobbs left \$31,365 each to the Pender Harbour and District Chamber of Commerce and the Pender Harbour Music Society.

The Pender Harbour Reading Centre and the Harbour Gallery Artists' Co-op in the Madeira Park Cultural Centre both received \$15,682.

Finally, Sechelt Hospital received \$62,913 from their estate.

The couple are buried together in Gibsons' Seaview Cemetary.

## Coast property values go up and down

According to recent data released by BC Assessment, growth in the Sunshine Coast real estate market depends on location.

BC Assessment develops and maintains real property assessments throughout BC in addition to providing real property information.

Egmont and Earls Cove properties rose by by 9.9 per cent while in Pender Harbour, the average "single family residential" home rose by 9.5 per cent last year.

BC Assessment's "Market Movement" data doesn't reflect the current state of the market.

Instead, the data presented reflects change from July 1, 2021 to July 1, 2022.

The high flying property values of Ruby and Sakinaw Lakes slowed somewhat, only seeing a modest one per cent average rise in value.

Across Agamemnon Channel, Nelson and Hardy Island homeowners saw their assessed values drop by 2.4 per cent.

The popular recreation properties on Thormanby Island held strong, rising by 10.1 per cent on average.

Meanwhile, down the Coast in Halfmoon Bay, a single family home's value rose by 10 per cent.

Residents living in the District of Sechelt saw the highest gains on the Coast with where the average value rose by 13.6 per cent.

Commercial properties in the

DoS rose by 17.9 per cent.

Not a single Sunshine Coast property cracked the Top 500 list for "top valued residential properties" in BC although four from Bowen Island did, all valued over \$12 million.

## Recycling just got easier

Plastic bags and overwrap from other plastic packaging no longer needs to be separated but can go

directly into a single GRIPS bin called "flexible plastics," replacing the two former categories of plastic bags and overwrap and other flexible plastic packaging, and adding more common items including plastic sandwich bags, freezer bags and plastic drop sheets.

This change is the result of an amendment to the BC Recycling Regulation, which also expanded the list of items which can be deposited for free at "the right side" of GRIPS, including packaging and single-use

products such as plastic straws, stir sticks, knives, spoons and forks.

Visit *RecycleBC.ca/Materials* for a downloadable list of over 30 more items now accepted for recycling.

For the very curious, scroll to the bottom of that page for background information and click "View the details of the regulation amendment" and "View the amendments to the recycling regulation explanatory notes" for amazingly detailed but easy to read details of how all this came to be.

## **WATER SUMMIT**

On Jan. 16, all our local governments met for a water summit at the shishálh Nation Hall to explore how we can work together on the Coast's water crisis.

This meeting focused on the

history of our water services, projects that are underway, and the nature of the challenges we face.

After Chief Warren Paull welcomed us to the gathering, Steven Feschuk, protector of culture, gave an interesting talk on the history of how the shishalh people came together in ch'atlich, and the early history of the Chapman water system, which consisted of a wooden trough that supplied water to shishalh lands.

Due to COVID, it's been about three years since our locally elected officials and senior management came together in person, and we agreed on the need to meet more often to build communication and collaboration.

provide their constituents with monthly updates on the items they believe are of special interest, including two SCRD directors to the south of us.

Donna McMahon, Area E (Elphinstone) director and SCRD board vice-chair, continues her monthly newsletter found at *EverythingElphinstone.ca*.

Justine Gabias, Area B (Halfmoon Bay) director, provides "The Towhee" newsletter at *Halfmoon-BayNews.ca*.

## **SCRD BUDGET 2023**

The 2023 SCRD budget cycle started Dec. 5, 2022, and is scheduled to end March 23.

In the pre-budget meetings of Dec. 5 to 7, most projects and initiatives championed by one or more SCRD departments progressed to the formal budget process, but some were cancelled and others were shelved for future consideration.

## **UTILITY RATES**

A Dec. 9 special SCRD committee of the whole meeting finalized amendments for 2023 water and wastewater utility rates, which were adopted Dec. 15.

## **ROUND ONE**

Between Jan. 23-25, the SCRD board considered projects and initiatives from pre-budget meetings, new initiatives, and recent community partner funding requests from groups that support established SCRD functions such as libraries, museums, and community schools.

Funds granted to the P. H. Reading Centre, P. H. Health Centre, P. H. Community School, and P. H. Chamber of Commerce are typically requisitioned only from Area A (Egmont

and Pender Harbour) taxpayers.

A Sechelt Public Library request will likely be funded by Egmont-Pender, Sechelt, Halfmoon Bay, and Roberts Creek.

The P. H. Community School's youth programs and the Sechelt Community School's youth centre will be funded by all five rural areas (Egmont and Pender, Halfmoon Bay, Roberts Creek, Elphinstone, and Howe Sound), the District of Sechelt, Town of Gibsons, and shishalh Nation government district).

Round one tax increases included about \$1.6 million of community partners funding, an approximate 8 per cent increase from 2022, and an increase to the overall taxation of the 2023-2027 financial plan by \$2.3 million or 9.01 per cent from 2022 (Area A preliminary results indicate increases from 4.5 per cent to 18 per cent).

## **ROUND TWO**

On Feb. 21-22, "sober second thought" will be given to the projects and initiatives that made it out of round one and possibly new projects, but changes are typically fine tuning.

## **BUDGET ADOPTION**

March 23 will see final adoption of our 2023 budget, with big bills for things like water, wastewater, and solid waste — which will leave no one happy.

## PENDER HARBOUR WILDLIFE SOCIETY

The Pender Harbour Wildlife Society is hosting their annual general meeting on Feb. 21 with guest speaker Ray Kostaschuk.

A local resident and geoscientist specializing in sedimentary processes in rivers, lakes and estuaries, Ray Kostaschuk will be presenting to the PHWS the environmental impacts of the Mount Polley mine tailing dam catastrophe.

On Aug. 4, 2014, the collapse of the Mount Polley mine tailings dam in central British Columbia released 25 million cubic metres of water, tailings solids, dam construction materials and heavy metals into nearby Hazeltine Creek. The spill created a massive debris flow that scoured the creek, removing sediment and vegetation from the channel and floodplain. The debris flow transported 18.6 million cubic metres of contaminated sediment into previously pristine Quesnel Lake, forming a deposit up to 15m. thick on the lake bed.

Swift removal of tailings and river corridor stabilization of Hazeltine Creek has reduced long-term chemical impacts from the stream. However, fine sediment and contaminants continue to be seasonally mobilized from the lake deposit into the water column of Quesnel Lake and released into the Quesnel River, part of the Fraser River watershed. The Mount Polley mine tailings dam failure will impact the environment, wildlife and First Nations for decades to come.

The wildlife society invites all that are interested to learn more about the spill and the cleanup of Hazeltine Creek to a virtual presentation on Feb. 21 at 7 p.m. Please email *info@penderharbourwildlife.com* for a link to the Zoom meeting. The society's AGM will follow the meeting with the appointment of officers to the 2023 board of directors.







The tea was organized by volunteers and members of the P. H. Community Club and featured a few close friends and acquaintances of Cameron who shared some memories.

Each of the speakers made an effort to reassure Cameron that she deserved the award by listing some of her contributions to the community over the years.

Cameron was born a Wray and was the first person to graduate from high school in Pender Harbour.

She married Bill Cameron soon after and in 1948 the two of them moved to the property on Shark Lane she still calls home.

Sunny Charboneau recalled a recent story in which members of the P. H. Community Club were frustrated with highways maintenance crews for not fixing a dangerous pothole in front of the community hall.

"Then one day I was looking out the window and I see this lady with rollers in her hair — she usually has rollers in her hair, she must have a terrible hairdresser — a bucket and a bag.

"Later I found out Muriel took a bucket of rocks, a bag of cement and February 2023

## This month, think of your heart too

February is heart awareness month, dedicated to raising awareness about heart disease and prevention.

In 2020, heart disease (53,704) was the second leading cause of death in Canada after cancer, and stroke (13,695) was the fifth leading cause of death.

Deaths directly attributable to COVID-19 ranked third in Canada in 2020.

Eight in 10 Canadians have at least one risk factor and 11 per cent have three or more.

## **RISK FACTORS**

- High blood pressure;
- Smoking;
- High blood glucose or diabetes;
- Physical inactivity;
- Unhealthy diet;
- High blood cholesterol/lipids levels:
  - Excess weight and,
  - Family history.

If you have one or more of these risk factors, let's help you get motivated on making some changes.

If you have high blood pressure make sure that you are getting it checked regularly and if you are on blood pressure medications it is important to take them as ordered.


## **SMOKING**

## **HIGH BLOOD SUGAR**

Make sure you monitor your blood sugars regularly at home.

## PHYSICAL INACTIVITY

Start small, exercising 10 minutes, three times a day rather than 30 minutes straight.

Get a buddy to help you be more accountable.

Talk to the folks at the P. H. Aquatic and Fitness Centre about some of the excellent programs being offered.

## UNHEALTHY DIET

Start by reading food labels. Consider choices that are lower

in salt, sugar and fats.

Eating three meals a day reduces the vulnerability to unhealthy snack-

Increase your intake of fruits and vegetables.

## HIGH CHOLESTEROL/LIPIDS

See your doctor regularly and get your fasting blood work done.

If you are on medications, take them as ordered.

Meet with a dietician if you have questions or concerns.

## **EXCESS WEIGHT**

There are some simple things that can help you lose weight.

Try using a smaller plate.

Eating whole grains, fruits and vegetables will reduce calories while adding bulk and giving you a satisfied feeling.

## **FAMILY HISTORY**

If you have a family history of cardiovascular disease, make sure that you are taking the steps to maintain a healthy lifestyle.

Make sure your doctor is aware of the family history so that screening tests will be ordered as needed.

## Pender Harbour Golf Course, 1985

The Pender Harbour Golf Course clubhouse as it looked in 1985. The 9-hole course officially opened on June 21, 1986.

## From "Pender Harbour Golf Course hits 25 year milestone," (Harbour Spiel, June 2011):

"It was initially expected that the nine-hole golf course would cost approximately \$550,000 with financing obtained through a combination of federal and provincial grants, debentures, the sale of memberships and a variety of fundraising efforts. A federal grant was available to get the project off the ground but first the club needed to raise \$75,000 of its own.

"The society decided to sell 150 'charter life memberships' for \$500 each. Charter memberships were different than the Pathfinder memberships that were to come later. They could be 'transferred, sold or willed at any future time.' Pathfinder memberships could only be sold once offering substantial value to the charter memberships.

"They were a hot commodity and the club sold 153 of them before anyone noticed they'd exceeded their limit of 150. Many of the memberships were 'social memberships,' purchased by local families who had no intention of golfing but wanted to support the project. Similar to buying shares in the future of the area, many are still held by the original owners, a certificate of their early support.

"With financing in hand and an army of willing volunteers itching to start, the construction of the Pender Harbour Golf Course began in early 1984. As work began, revised budget predictions (reported by then president Bill Lawrenuk in the society's spring 1985 newsletter) had climbed to \$783,000."

## No Longhairs: The Odyssey of a Vietnam Draft Dodger

When do stories of our past become sufficiently aged to be considered topics of historical importance?

Jon Van Arsdell answers that question with his recent book, *No Longhairs: The Odyssey of a Vietnam Draft Dodger*.

In the late-1960s and 1970s, conservative old Pender Harbour and Egmont received a surge of free-spirited hippies.

Many, including the author, were young Americans avoiding the Vietnam draft.

It's no secret that there was plenty of local resistance to their arrival.

Even the title of the book refers to a sign, "No Longhairs Allowed," that greeted him at the entrance to the Garden Bay Pub after he arrived in the summer of 1970

Longhairs were allowed to purchase cases of beer to go but were forbidden to sit in the pub and drink with the locals.

That prejudice can still be found today and sometimes causes the 1970s counterculture to be dismissed as an inconsequential sidebar to the industrial culture of fishing and logging that dominated Highway 101.

But as Van Arsdell's book makes clear, his "people" weren't "dirty hippies" who relied on the generosity of others.

As he writes in his introduction, "Those of that sort weren't in our circle."

Instead, Van Arsdell did whatever he could to support his family including working in construction, aquaculture, forestry, cabinet-making, commercial fishing and gravel mining.

"I opened an account in the Bank of Montreal in Madeira Park back in the day before the advent of computers, and one time I asked to see my account card.


The teller handed me a large yellow sheet with my personal information at the top.

Under the heading "occupation," I had been given the designation "working hippie."

Now, 50 years later,

Van Arsdell's firsthand account paints a picture of the contribution the hippie movement and its accompanying back-to-the-land mentality had on the Sunshine Coast.

For instance, how many can recall which popular local band's music made it on to an Academy Award winning animated short?



Hint: Van Arsdell played mandolin on it.

Or which local individuals were involved in what is possibly Pender Harbour's only case of cattle rustling?


As in much of the book, Van Arsdell humorously recounts the tale with plenty of detail and full names of those involved.

The story ends with one of the more memorable quotes in the book, supplied by Dwight Young:

"Justice was meated out."

Van Arsdell's book jumps around in time, almost psychedelically, dropping a name referred to in an earlier story or suddenly taking the reader on an introspective trip back in time to his childhood in Akron, Ohio.

It's all part of the fun because

along the way, it offers an entertaining and chaotic glimpse into a colourful time in our history.

And, who knew Greg Howitt was responsible for so many local nick-names?

"The Egmont wharf/dock hosted some really colourful and interesting characters over the years.

One such wharf rat was a guy named Bob Grandillo.

He sported a couple of great nicknames that were both attributed to Greg Howitt.

The first prize for dry humour goes to Greg.

He was the king of nicknamers.

He could access the character of somebody and apply an often hilarious and usually descriptive handle to anyone who stood out.

Greg met Bob Grandillo and it all fell together.

He was initially called "Bob the Wop" as deference to his professed Italian roots (and he was OK with it), but in the end we settled on "The Codfather" as his liveaboard vessel was previously a C-licensed, double-ender cod boat.

Ha ha, another good one Greg. But Van Arsdell doesn't gloss over the diffcult stuff:

I guess Bob wasn't really that happy because after a few years at the dock, some kids found him on his boat after he'd eaten a large-calibre pistol.

While sometimes blunt, his sense

of humour wafts through each story like open weed in '56 Ford Fairlane.

But the book's entertainment value is only part of its appeal.

It's also an invaluable historical document.

Though it records a time that doesn't seem in the distant past, Van Arsdell points out in the book that there are very few of his contemporaries left to tell these stories.

History is like that, often lost before it's valued.

Luckily, Van Arsdell took the time to not only record the details he could recall but he interviewed a number of the people in the book to double check that he got his facts right.

In this way, the book is a welcome record of not only his hippie friends but of the locals who treated them well — the Silveys, the Kammerles, the Campbells and the Griffiths, to name a few.

But when you name names in a small town, you risk making some uncomfortable.

Some will be.

More than one story in the book reveals details a local family might prefer to be forgotten.

Whether outing a local fishing icon and his crew for taking too many abalone while commercial fishing up north or implicating old friends in the aforementioned cattle rustling caper, Van Arsdell works to provide

an honest retelling of his life during a time that couldn't be separated by the culture and politics of the day.

In that vein, he includes his own battle with alcohol.

Though Van Arsdell avoided the harder drugs that were available at the time, alcohol makes frequent appearances throughout the book and he painfully admits that it led to the dissolution of his marriage.

He describes the process of kicking it in 1990 and finding a life on the other side.

It's a life well-lived with few regrets while surrounded by friends during a colourful time in our history.

What struck me most after finishing *No Longhairs* is what would have been lost if he hadn't taken the time to write it.

Despite what we may often believe, our lives and the people we share them are rich in value.

If there's a message in the book, that may be it.


