editorial

Fix highway link first

Today I had an appointment in Sechelt.

I was running a little late but the road was dry and I knew that if I pushed the

speed limit a bit, I could easily make it.

After all, it was a weekday in September so the RVs and ubiquitous cars with two kayaks on top should be gone.

Who hasn't made a sub-25 minute run from Madeira to Sechelt?

It used to be a bit of competition — I've heard tales of running to Sechelt for smokes in half that time.

Drive BC estimates the 34 kilometre trip takes 30 minutes but we all know we can safely do it under 25.

Not anymore.

On this day, as soon as I pulled onto the highway I was stuck behind a five-ton truck that was stuck behind an electric car that was stuck behind someone whose adult children are probably urging him to give up driving altogether.

So, where the speed limit was 60, we did 35.

Usually I'm happy to get in the slow lane and relax while I listen to interviews on CBC radio with transgendered Syrian refugees tackling climate change — but today I was in a hurry.

But there's nothing you can do about it until you reach the passing lane in Secret Cove so when I did, I tromped on it and had the road to myself again.

That is until I reached the other end of Secret Cove Road where I caught up to another line of Sunday drivers.

So, I passed them on Halfmoon Bay Hill but by Trout Lake, I rode up on another senior who seemed to be struggling to keep his car rubber-side down.

I got by him by Leaning Tree Road but after that there's really no alternative but to join in with the throngs of West Sechelt commuters.

So, I was late.

This summer was the busiest I've seen on the Sunshine Coast Highway.

Though it's nothing like the torture of driving on the other side, it's increasingly difficult to make out what used to be an obvious spike in ferry traffic anymore — the 101 is plugged all day.

And when there's a bad accident, well, I hope you brought water.

Now, as if our rural roads weren't already strained, there's talk of building a bridge to the place we love to hate for its traffic congestion.

Do some think our ridiculous little highway with its sudden curves and hidden driveways will suddenly accomodate whatever volume increase will be delivered by a fixed link?

I would hope that during the recent feasibility discussions, those taking part recognize there can be no discussion of a fixed link without first twinning the Sunshine Coast highway.

We'll find out soon — a draft report is due this fall.

Hopefully it also considers other infrastructure weaknesses like the south Coast's limited water supply and our finite landfill capacity.

So far, much of the hysteria I've come across has been about the wash of crime that would flood our community.

Sure, the pedophiles and drug addicts on the other side must be absolutely frothing for an alternative to BC Ferries but, right now, a fixed link would overwhelm the Coast's infrastructure so quickly they wouldn't make it past the off-ramp.

Don't get me wrong, the idea does appeal to me.

It would bolster our fragile economy and what homeowner doesn't warm to the idea of cashing out on a rise in property values?

But all things considered, we have it pretty good here and if I wanted a life like on the other side. I'd still be there.



P. H. Advisory Council hosts town hall Sept. 11

There was lots to talk about when a crowd of about 125 locals packed into the Pender Harbour Community Hall for a town hall meeting Sept. 11.

The meeting was hosted by the Pender Harbour Advisory Council and included its annual general meeting immediately after the presentations.

Four featured presentations of community interest were on the agenda and up first was Dr. Michael Jackson who gave an update on the Pender Ocean Discovery Station project.

Jackson announced it has acquired funding to explore the feasibility of creating an aquarium-style learning and research centre on the shore of Pender Harbour.

Next up was Darcie Murray.

Murray is a local youth work

Murray is a local youth worker at the Pender Harbour Community School who surprised many in the audience when she described the level of need our community faces when it comes to counselling, food and housing for youth.

Murray estimates that up to 37 young people in Area A fall into this category.

Peter Robson is chair of Area A's official community plan advisory committee and spoke of the work be-

ing done in the community to update the OCP.

Robson said the SCRD will soon release an updated draft of the OCP. and a consultation process will begin soon after to provide the community an opportunity to ask questions.

Finally, Len Lee discussed the current status of the draft Pender Harbour dock management plan.

Lee said that recent agreements between the province and the Shíshálh Nation for land and revenue are a stepping stone toward more talks and future agreements.

The draft DMP is included as one of the future issues to be discussed and resolved.

Currently, the province has been continued next page

renewing dock tenures on a two-year lease basis and plans to release terms of reference for environmental and archeological studies, as recommended in consultant Barry Penner's report.

Lee said a recent request to implement Penner's recommendation of issuing permits for those applications made between 2003 and 2013 that are now "sitting in limbo" is not going to be considered at this time.

Questions from the floor during a subsequent question period included concerns about the condition of our roads and inquiries about the possibility of incorporation for Pender Harbour. Other issues brought up included the projected closure and replacement of Totem Lodge and Shorncliffe in Sechelt and the new trail at Sakinaw Lake being closed to the public.

After discussions, the Pender Harbour Advisory Council held its annual general meeting.

PHAC president Steve Luchkow listed some of the council's achievements in the last year, especially the successful rollout of the "no wake" program in Pender Harbour.

Luchkow also praised the local trail signage project done in conjunction with Pender Harbour Hikers as well as the council's work in support of community organizations. Afterwards, four new board members were appointed.

Francine Clohosey, Rose Everett, Mike Price and Alan Stewart were named to the board for two-year terms.

Steve Luchkow and Janet McIntosh stepped down from the board and were thanked for their contributions to the society, as was the SCRD, which provided the funding which made the meeting possible.

Despite the four new board appointments, there are several vacancies on the council's board.

No one injured in early morning house fire

Fire destroyed a home in the 4100-block of Francis Peninsula Road during the early hours of Sept. 1.

One person was home at the time of the fire and managed to get out without injury while saving a number of pets in the process.

The Pender Harbour Volunteer Fire Department received the call shortly before 5:30 a.m. and arrived within minutes but the fire was already fully engulfed.

Investigators did not find a cause for the fire but confirmed that it started in the living room.

The home holds the historical distinction of being the birthplace of local book maker Harbour Publishing.

Publishers Howard and Mary White still own the home and lived there while working out of the shop (which was saved) when they started the book publishing company in the early 1970s.

No injuries were reported after fire claimed a home in the 4100-bock of Francis Peninsula Road on Sept. 1.

Swim coach Bob Steele inducted into ASCA hall of fame

Garden Bay resident Bob Steele has been recognized for his swim coaching career by being one of four 2016 inductees to the American Swimming Coaches Association hall of fame.

Since 1960 Steele coached all levels of competitive swimming in the U.S. before he retired to Pender Harbour in 2006.

He coached 17 swimmers to world rankings in 37 events and coached two American record-holders.

Steele was head coach at California State University, Bakersfield winning five NCAA II national championships.

Later he served as the aquatics director at the Orlando International Aquatic Centre hosting 12 national aquatic championships.

He was also the director of athlete and coach development of USA Swimming for nine years.

During his career, Steele travelled throughout the U.S. and abroad to lecture at coaching clinics and run

his own Winning Spirit race camps.

He was a member of the USA Swimming masters coach/consultant program, visiting teams with world-ranked high school swimmers.

Steele said his foundation for recruiting, retention and improvement centres on fun, motivation and using the science of swimming to help kids excel.

"My career focus has been to help other teams and my swimmers, coaches and parents be the best they can be," said Steele in an email.

"I hope my legacy is fun training along with developing personal traits, values and skills that help every person reach a higher level."

Former swimmer Roger Von Jouanne held the U.S. record in the 200-yard butterfly and once described "Steele training" as "distracted pain."

After moving to Garden Bay, Steele came out of retirement to tackle one of the greatest challenges of his career — resurrecting and coaching the Pender Harbour Seals swim club.

SCRD introduces new rules for disposing of material with asbestos

Effective Sept. 19, the Sunshine Coast Regional District has introduced new requirements for testing and disposing of materials containing asbestos.

"Before someone begins a renovation or demolition project, they should contact a qualified company that deals with asbestos to help determine what materials require testing and to conduct the testing" said Robyn Cooper, manager of solid waste services at the SCRD.

Asbestos is a strong, fire-resistant mineral fibre once used in a wide variety of materials as insulation against heat or noise, for fire protection and to increase structural strength in materials such as cement and plaster.

Its use in Canada was phased out by the early 1990s.

Asbestos is not a health risk if left intact, but if disturbed, asbestos fibres are released into the air, are easily inhaled, and stay airborne for hours or even days.

Repeated exposure can lead to lung cancer and other lethal asbestos-related diseases.

Materials testing positive for asbestos may be disposed of at the Sechelt Landfill only and must follow strict bagging, sealing and labelling procedures. Delivery must be scheduled because of specialized burial requirements and loads must have a copy of the certified asbestos test results.

The caller told the resident he could pay in iTunes gift cards as that was faster than using a credit card.


The resident complied and sent photos of the PINs on the backs of the gift cards to the caller as proof.

The caller was advised to contact iTunes to try to cancel the gift cards.



Summer is over and I hope everyone had a good one.

Since I skipped a month submitting an

article there is a lot to report for the last half of July, August, and the beginning of September as many issues came to the fore.

NOISE AND LIGHTING

We live in a collection of bays and, as we all know, sound carries over water and at times it can be a problem.

I know our residents are very tolerant of noise during the day, as many homeowners are part timers and much of the work on their properties is performed during the summer.

The time of day that noise can be generated can be defined in the noise bylaw which can be found at www.scrd.ca/files/File/Administration/Bylaws/597-noise-consolidatedto-597_1.pdf.

Bylaw enforcement only occurs when a resident submits a complaint to the SCRD.

The complainant is never identified and the bylaw officer will investigate.

The bylaw is fairly strong with significant potential penalties.

Light pollution can be a very annoying problem and certainly not the expectation of many in a rural setting such as ours.

Currently there is no bylaw to control lighting but the SCRD supplies lighting guidelines with all building permit applications.

They can be found at www.scrd. ca/files/File/Community/Planning/ Approved%20final%20Outdoor%20 Lighting%20Guidelines.pdf.

Hopefully residents will comply voluntarily with the guidelines.

They can also be useful for discussions with a neighbor who installs inadvertently obtrusive outdoor lighting.

DERELICT STRUCTURES

I previously wrote in the June issue of the Harbour Spiel about illegal anchoring and since it has been a concern for many, here is an update.

Working with Transport Canada and the RCMP resulted in the issuance of an "order to remove" to the boat-



house and the derelict float in Garden Bay, which had broken free of its anchor and ended up on the shore of Garden Bay Marine Park.

The boathouse was removed and ended up tied up to a float in Whiskey Slough which also may not be appropriate.

The float was towed out of the harbour.

I continue to work with Transport Canada, FLNRO, natural resource enforcement officers, the RCMP and the environment ministry regarding the permanently anchored boats and live-aboards around the harbour.

I participated in a conference call with Transport Canada which is currently developing a strategy to address abandoned, derelict and wrecked vessels and preparing legislation to

address the issue.

I again appeal to the owners of these vessels and structures to voluntarily take action to move them to appropriate moorage facilities.

I will repeat that permanently anchoring on Crown land is not appropriate, not neighbourly and most certainly illegal.

CAMPING IN SCRD PARKS

This summer has seen a increase in campers inappropriately using roadsides and SCRD parks to camp.

Katherine Lake and Klein Lake are the only SCRD campgrounds in our area.

Camping in the other parks, which do not have appropriate facilities, pose risks of fire, sanitary issues, and noise in neighbourhoods.

In response to incidents in one park, the SCRD installed "No Camping" and "No Fires" signs.

Similar signs also are already installed on many other parks.

If you notice camping in SCRD parks that are not designated for camping, please report it at (604) 885-6817.

Also, if you notice inappropriate use of Crown land, please call the provincial RAPP line at 1(877) 952-7277 or visit the website to report it.

The same number is used for both conservation officers and natural resource officers.

Descendants of Pender pioneer visit Sarah Wray Hall

The progeny of one of Pender Harbour's earliest pioneers visited Irvines Landing last month.

Three great-great-granddaughters and one great-great-granddaughter of "Portugese" Joe and Susan (Harris) Gonsalves visited in search of their family roots in early September.

Brenda Murray, Cindy Svendsen, Michelle Mills and Michelle's daughter, Sarah, made a pilgrimage from their homes on Vancouver Island to find the early home of their ancestor, a fisherman from the Portugese island of Madeira.

Volunteers Dorothy Faulkner, Cathy Jenks, Nonie McCuaig and Joe Wilson from the Pender Harbour Living Heritage Society welcomed the visitors to the Sarah Wray Heritage Centre and shared photos and information about the Gonsalves family from the society archives.

They revealed how Portugese Joe (not to be confused with the other local pioneer who shares the same nickname but who settled in Egmont, Portuguese Joe Silvey) made his patch of waterfront at Irvines Landing into a hub of regional economic activity.

Gonsalves stowed away on a ship leaving the Madeira Islands when he was only 12 and landed in New Westminster.

He grew up in Vancouver working in his uncle's store.

Later, he married Susan, the daughter of a chief from the nearby Capilano First Nation on the north shore of Burrard Inlet and the two had four children.

Prior to coming Pender Harbour, the Gonsalves family lived on Brockton Point in what is now Stanley Park.

It's been said a quarrel over land

made him pack up his family and move to Irvines Landing in 1904.

With his partner Steve Dames (who married Gonsalves' daughter Matilda), Gonsalves expanded the small store and post office beside the dock at the harbour entrance.

The two of them built a new hotel and saloon to serve passengers disembarking from the Union Steamships as well as a growing local population of loggers and fishing families.

He is also credited with installing the first public telephone in Pender Harbour.

Gonsalves owned much of the land around Irvines Landing but also took up 260 acres of Crown land in what is now Madeira Park in 1907.

He later donated much of it back to the community and today the Pender Harbour Community Hall and the Madeira Park Elementary School sit on what was once his land.

The BC Archives lists the death of Joseph Gonsalves on June 3, 1939 at the age of 82.

Descendants of Gonsalves still reside in the community and include members of the Duncan family.

A cedar effigy carved by Jack Crabb gazes out over Pender Harbour from the Harbour Authority grounds beside the government dock.

It was the first visit to Pender Harbour for three of the four visitors, descendants of Gonsalves' daughter, Virgina.

After Virginia married local logger Neil McDonald, the couple moved to Union Bay on Vancouver Island in the 1920s where they ran the McDonald and Murphy Logging Company.

That branch of the family remains based on the island.

"This was a fabulous afternoon,"

said Brenda Murray, as the visitors thanked their hosts from the P. H. Living Heritage Society.

"The information was awesome. We really enjoyed our tea party."

The Gonsalves family members donated a digital portrait of their great-great-grandfather as well as family tree information that will be preserved in the society's growing database and archives.

Youth initiative needs help

Dear Editor.

While the youth outreach worker, Darcie, was speaking at the town hall meeting last Sunday, I was looking around the room.

When she told the crowd that there are homeless youth in Madeira Park, I saw mouths gaping open in disbelief.

Because the majority of Pender citizens are senior and many of those are affluent, they tend to forget what it is like to be young and on your own.

Many of them have never felt the pangs of hunger or the cold night air while they sleep under a blanket of trees.

When we are in our comfort zones it is hard to remember those who have no comfort.

There are many programs in this community for seniors but few for the children.

Because our schools are so small, the number of parents available to volunteer for kids programs is also very small.

When you take into consideration that the vast majority of parents have at least one full-time job (single parents often need two jobs to make ends meet) it becomes obvious that the parents alone are unable to run the programs for their kids.

The Pender Harbour Community Club Youth Initiative runs an activity program from 3-9:30 p.m. on the last two Fridays of the month as well as

the open mike nights.

There are only three committed volunteers for this program, though we have actively searched for more.

It is the PHCCYI goal to add a meal program to our activity Fridays where all youth (under 25) can have a free healthy meal and adults can eat by donation with no obligation.

The only thing preventing this program trom starting is a list of 10 people who will give two hours of their time, one time per year.

The money is there, but in 10 months of asking, there are only four names on the list.

So if you were one of those people at the town hall meeting who were shocked to find out that there are children in need in our rich little community, perhaps you would like to offer your time (which is more precious than money) to volunteer for one of the understaffed child/youth programs here in Pender.

Just a few hours per year can make a huge impact. Money helps too but your time is what will make these programs run.

Give the PHCCYI a call at (604) 741-3303 if you would like to volunteer for the meal program or call the P. H. Community School at (604) 883-2826 if you want to volunteer for other kids' programs.

Your gift of time will make a difference to our children in need.

Avoid burning within 500 metre radius of schools please

Dear Editor.

Every year during the allowed open burning season, I watch as often weekly open fires, in close proximity to the Madeira Park Elementary School, burn during school hours.

The BC Environmental Management Act states that "open burning of debris must be carried out at least 500 metres from schools in session..."

Smoke drifting from open fires, larger machine piled debris as well as smaller piles can significantly decrease air quality in the school yard and the building, thereby causing irritation and damage to our children's developing lungs.

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency states that "particle pollution — especially fine particles — contains microscopic solids or liquid droplets that are so small that they can get deep into the lungs and cause serious health problems."

It goes on, "...children and older adults are the most likely to be affected by particle pollution exposure."

This is why the BC law restricting open burning within a 500-metre radius around schools exists.


I understand why people burn yard debris (although there are alternatives like mulching) but I do not understand why MPES neighbours burn during school hours.

Perhaps they are not aware of the law and/or perhaps they aren't aware that the smoke reaches the school.

However, so many times the smoke is low and the children are playing and running directly in it.

So many times the smell of the smoke is in the building itself.

It can be very uncomfortable to breathe and very irritating to the nose, and throat and lungs.

This graphic shows a legislated 500-metre boundary around MPES for open burning during school hours.

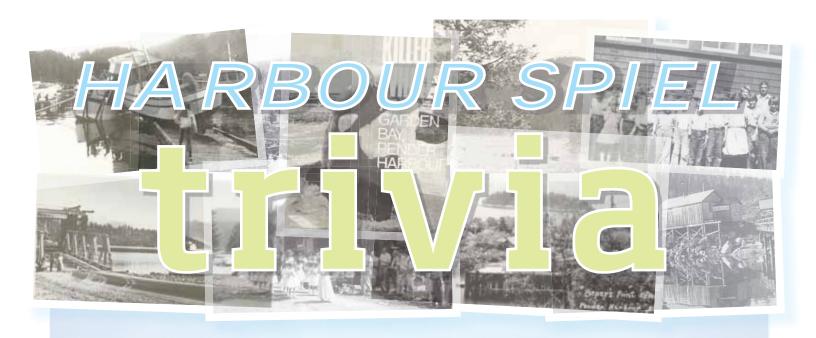
For the safety and health of our children while in the school building and while playing outside at recess, I kindly ask that residents and businesses within the 500-metre radius be mindful and not burn any debris piles (large or small) during school hours.

Please wait until after 3:15 p.m. or the weekend and put our children's health and well being first.

School hours are from 8:10 a.m. to 3:15 p.m., Monday to Friday.

Choosing members for your group is important.


To be successful, members need to share the same philosophy about the objectives of the group.





RN First Call allows us to manage conjunctivitis (pink eye), corneal abrasions, ear infections, sore throats and female urinary tract infections.

This means that we can see you at the health centre and provide you with the necessary treatment.


RN First Call allows us to prescribe medication for these treatments, as needed.

Therefore, instead of waiting for an appointment with your family doctor, you are welcome to book an appointment with one of our nurses.

Our nurses can assist with intravenous antibiotics, ear syringes, suturing, injections, suture/staple removal, and ostomy/urostomy care, along with many other services.

If you are feeling unwell and unable to get in to see your doctor, the nurses are available to see you in our clinic and refer you to the necessary health care provider as needed.

Although we are not a walk-in clinic, please call us if you are unwell



to see if an appointment is available.

The PHHC also has home care nurses available to the community.

The home care nurse specializes in palliative care and works in close conjunction with family physicians, Sunshine Coast Home Care Services, and other health care professionals to support families and clients.

Home care nurses help with wound care, bloodwork, flu shots, and various referrals for clients who are in need of assistance at home.

If you or someone you know is in need of home care services, please contact our nurse clinic for further information.

PHHC has a dietician who is

available for one day every two weeks.

She can assist with dietary counselling for diabetes and cardiac-related issues, as well as various other dietary needs.

If you are interested in seeking her services, please call the PHHC.

There is also a very large loan cupboard at the health centre with everything from crutches, bath stools, wheelchairs, walkers, and oxygen concentrators that are available for all members of the community.

The Holing of the Suez, 1952

We were pulling out from Murdoch's in the *Suez* to go home after loading up with fuel and parts and groceries.

My dad, Frank White, was driving while I was out in the stern taking a last look at the exciting scene before we retreated back to our isolated home up Agamemnon Channel on Nelson Island.

There was the usual Saturday crowd of people coming and going to Murdoch's which at that time was the busiest place in Pender Harbour.

It was at the mouth of Pender on Page 38

the south side opposite Irvine's Landing and oldtimers sometimes called it Pope's Landing but we only called it Murdoch's after Royal Murdoch, who owned the big grocery store and most of the other stuff.

I thought he must be one of the world's richest men.

The store stood on pilings at the water's edge just like the bunkhouses at our logging camp in Green's Bay and there was an old beached houseboat propped up on pilings next to it where Art Cherry had his water taxi business and Mrs. Cherry ran a café that was mostly closed.

People laughed about Art Cherry because he was so miserable all the time and wouldn't go out in his water taxi if the stars weren't right.

Mrs. Cherry wasn't very nice either because she wouldn't let me use the toilet in her café and there was nowhere else at Murdoch's for a guy to take a leak.

The Cherry's had a daughter much bigger than me named Faye but she was nice.

The gas and fish dock were run by Johnny Duncan and always accompanied by many seagulls.

One had a missing leg and al-

ways stood atop the same piling that you had to pass when you went up the ramp to the store.

My heart went out to him and I used to beg Dad to let me throw him a slice of bread but the other mean gulls always took it away from him.

Somehow he seemed to stay healthy and plump despite his stumpy leg and that made me glad.

I liked going to Murdoch's store because it was full of candy and comic books and Nan, the nice lady behind the counter, always gave me a penny candy for free.

She was so nice and Johnny Duncan was so nice, I told her they should get married but she just laughed and got real red and I knew I had said something I shouldn't have again.

I hated to leave Murdoch's.

Coming down to Pender Harbour on the Saturday grocery run was the most exciting thing in my life and my sisters and I always took turns.

But it was also good to be going back home to our logging camp in Green's Bay with my new Fox and Crow comic book to read.

Dad went ahead slowly and turned the boat to pull away from the dock.

I could see he turned a bit too hard and was going to make the back of the boat slide sideways and brush against the wharf.

I looked down at the water to see what we were going to hit.

There was a cedar float log all slippery and green with moss and anemones, and it hadn't been trimmed off flush with the dock.

A twisted end of it was sticking out, just right to catch the old *Suez's* planking in a vulnerable place above the chine.

It didn't look good but I was only a little boy and as far as I knew my dad was master of the universe and never made a mistake, so it was not my place to worry.

The projecting log end whacked our blue planking with a sickly cracking noise I had never heard before in hundreds of dockings.

I saw a small section of hull about the size of a loaf of bread break away and cave in.

It was partly below the water line and sea water immediately started flooding into the boat.

I knew this was not good and it gave me a sick feeling just like the time I broke my arm running down Murdoch's ramp.

I knew something big had happened.

Something big and bad.

"What was that son? Are we in trouble?"

I said there was a bunch of water coming in and I thought probably we were in trouble, all right.

Dad came running back and yelled,

"Holy Christ! We're sinking!"
He quickly ripped off his shirt
and stuffed it into the hole.

It slowed down the water but didn't stop it because the force of the water made it come away.

"Howie, you just stick your foot

in there and hold that shirt in there good and tight so we don't sink while I get us back to the wharf," Dad ordered.

Naturally, I had my gumboots on so I was well equipped to do the job, but the responsibility for keeping from sinking weighed heavily upon me.

I was in a panic.

I seemed to have trouble getting my breath and had this terrible freezing sensation in my tummy that I had only ever felt a few times before, when I fell off the roof and got knocked out or when Cindy accidentally set fire to our house while lighting matches in the closet to look for her dolly's underpants.

I had sunk my rowboat back at camp so I knew what sinking was all about.

A mess.

My rowboat stayed afloat even when full of water, but I knew bigger boats with heavy engines went to the bottom of the sea when they sank.

The *Suez* was our proud possession and our only means of getting back to Green Bay where Mom and Cindy and Aunt Jean and Uncle Charlie and our dog Lassie and my warm bed were.


If it should sink, how would we ever manage to get back home?

Murdoch's Landing (or Pope's Landing) at the southern mouth of Pender Harbour was a bustling place in the 1950s. It was originally owned by the Pope family and sold to Royal and Lily Murdoch in the early 1940s. The Murdochs raised a son, Bill, and daughter Jean who would later marry Olli Sladey and start what became Lowes Resort (later Painted Boat Resort). According to the author, the Murdochs sold to a man named McLintock. He and his business partner renamed it Indian Isles Marina. Later, another man by the name of McKitrick bought it but kept the name. McKitrick owned the business when it burnt down in 1972.

without our wonderful boat — which was once a rumrunner with an airplane engine in it that made it go almost as fast as a plane — to get back home in?

There was an instant crowd, all shouting instructions and suggestions. We pulled the boat into dock and tied it up.

Somebody ran over to Royal Murdoch's big fish packer the Murpak and got a dirty-looking bedsheet to serve in place of Dad's shirt, which worked a bit better.

I was getting a lot of compliments for my brave boot work.

Somebody made reference to the little Dutch boy keeping his finger in

the dyke, which I knew about from our Books of Knowledge.

Then somebody else appeared with a hammer and saw and made a little plywood patch, slathered it with Caulk-Tite and nailed it over the hole from the outside.

That stopped the leaking, much to my relief, but I was a bit crestfallen to be relieved of my important duties with my boot and be relegated to the background once more.

But it did look a little messy, this unpainted hunk of wood nailed to the side of our sleek blue hull, and I gathered it was only temporary.

"Can we go home now, Daddy?" I asked.

"No," he said.

"Why not, Daddy?"

"Howie, get out of the way and

Eventually it was arranged that we would be towed over to Johnny Haddock's marine ways by the *Murpak*.

They lashed the *Suez* alongside the bigger boat and tilted it over so the hole was above water.

They must have been unsure it would hold, even for the short trip across the Harbour.

It was getting dark.

The *Murpak* trundled us along slowly, making a chuckling sound.

Eventually we turned into a little bay and the *Murpak* shone its brilliant searchlight at the shore where I could see a couple of men and a boy about my size running around.

They eased us into a wharf and cut us loose.

A loud-voiced man yelled at the boy to drop the carriage and I saw him run up the beach to a little shed where I heard an engine start and a rumbling noise as the carriage of the boat ways trundled down its railway and into the water.

The men pike-poled the *Suez* into the beach and nosed it into the carriage, which had almost disappeared under the water, leaving only a few posts sticking out.

"Whoa! Spike 'er there," the big voiced man yelled to the boy.

I was filled with envy.

Back at camp I ran the dump winch sometimes, helping my dad to unload logs from our logging truck, and I liked to think I was the only seven-year-old in the world who could run a winch.

Now here was this boy being entrusted with the running of a similar winch, but at a much more public and important task.

I comforted myself in decid-

ing he was quite a bit older than me, maybe as much as three years.

Eventually everybody got the *Suez* buckled into the cradle and the loud man, who I realized must be the much-discussed Johnny Haddock, former boxer and disk jockey and owner of Haddock's Machine Shop, signaled to his son by circling rapidly with his flashlight.

The winch engine revved and the *Suez* leapt dripping out of the water and rode up the railway to a place where it could be safely worked on the next day.

We got a ride over to Garden Bay with Art Cherry in his little water taxi, had dinner in the restaurant and took a room in Lloyd Davis's hotel.

Marnie Davis made a big thing of me and gave me ice cream for dessert.

She was a nice lady who made me feel a little better but I really felt all wrong in this strange place with our faithful boat disabled and our regular routine all disrupted.

I wanted to be home with my Mom who I knew would be worried.

We didn't belong here and I was all off-kilter to be spending a night in this strange place.

Dad noticed my worried mood.

As he tucked me into bed, he told me we were like sailors out on the seas, always spending nights in foreign ports.

I didn't think I ever wanted to be a sailor.




