Alternative health seems to be an alternative reality where "divine intuition" and "universal energy" have replaced science.

When was the last time your doctor told you that you suffered from an acute misalignment of your chakras?

In *The New Alchemists: The Rise* of *Deceptive Healthcare*, UBC professor Bernie Garrett shines a light on a broad range of deception in the health industry from Big Pharma to homeopathy and naturopathy to reiki and Gwyneth Paltrow.

Garrett offers little consolation to the alternative health crowd other

than, if they're lucky, they may have stumbled upon an expensive placebo.

Though science has yet to find a chakra, down in the Creek, an "emotional freedom techniques practitioner" will "intuitively read the body to find places of unresolved trauma and energetic blockages."

There's a tea healer who promises to "facilitate the healing of ANY health issues including the ones which are not treatable by other healers."

A "quantum intuitive healer" provides "detailed energy field/health analysis, testing the strength of all your organs, glands, tissues, and systems as well as your levels of nutrients, and whether pathogens, toxins, miasms/inherited diseases are contributing to your health concerns."

Once diagnosed, she applies a "comprehensive healing plan with vibrational water formulas" to treat issues with "specific frequencies."

Cancer? Gone.

If you need someone to activate dormant DNA while recoding your energetic grid, there's an "intuitive energy worker and reiki master" for that.

School bus overturned in Madeira Park May 24

The driver of a school bus was treated for minor injuries after a school bus carrying one student overturned near Johnstone Road May 24.

A Sunshine Coast RCMP spokesperson told the *Harbour Spiel* that they received a call at 8:37 a.m. regarding a single vehicle incident involving a school bus.

One child passenger was picked up by a guardian while the driver was transported to hospital with minor injuries.

"At this time, we are working closely with local authorities and emergency responders to ensure the safety and well-being of all those involved," said Stephanie Murawsky, School District no. 46 communications officer, in a statement.

Burning ban now in place throughout Sunshine Coast

Effective May 18, most open fires are now prohibited throughout the Coastal Fire Centre's jurisdiction.

The ban includes category 2 and category 3 open fires throughout the Coastal Fire Centre's jurisdiction.

A category 2 open fire is an open fire that:

- Burns material in a pile not exceeding two metres in height and three metres in width, or
- Burns stubble or grass over an area that does not exceed 0.2 hectares.

A category 3 open fire is an open

fire that burns:

- Material in one or more piles each exceeding two metres in height or three metres in width;
- Stubble or grass over an area exceeding 0.2 hectares.

Also prohibited are fireworks, sky lanterns, binary exploding targets, burn barrels and air curtain burners.

As of press time (May 26), this ban does not yet apply to campfires (half-metre high by a half-metre wide or smaller), or cooking stoves that use gas or briquettes. To report a wildfire, unattended campfire, or open fire violation, call 1(800) 663-5555 or *5555 on a cell phone.

Reduction in Physician Hours over the Summer

Dear patients

The Sunshine Coast has lost 20% of the emergency physician work force over the past 6 months, this has adversely impacted our ability to fully staff the emergency department. (Coverage has now been reduced to a single physician on shift resulting in longer wait times.)

Given the ongoing staffing crisis, particularly as we go into the summer, the remaining ER physicians have had to increase their shifts to prevent closure of the ER. This unfortunately will impact Family Practice in Pender Harbour.

Management and Physicians are meeting regularly with Vancouver Coastal Health to stabilize the work force and we will update patients as the situation changes.

Disc golf arrives in Pender

The Pender Harbour Golf Club recently announced it will begin hosting disc golf on the nine-hole course in Kleindale on a trial basis.

Disc golf, formerly known as frisbee golf, is a flying disc sport in which players throw a disc at a target.

The sport is played using rules similar to golf and instead of holes, players target an elevated basket.

George Brown, PHGC pro shop director, told the *Harbour Spiel* that the idea was planted last fall after the Sunshine Coast Disc Golf Association held a successful tournament here.

Disc golfers can only book tee times after 2 p.m. on week days.

"While their pace of play is similar to regular golfers, the course will be set up to have 18 holes within our nine," said Brown.

"This means that some of our longer holes will have two or three disc golf holes crossing the fairway."

"So, if you're out there with disc golfers, please watch for people in unusual places."

Brown said a disc golf tournament is slated for July 9 if anyone wants to come out to learn about the sport.

Wildfire season arrives early

Because summer-like conditions made our area ripe for rapidly spreading wildfires, the Coastal

Fire Centre prohibited all category 2 and category 3 open fires, including burn barrels and burn cages of any size or description, fireworks, sky lanterns, binary exploding targets and air curtain burners.

Campfires meeting these requirements are allowed for now:

- Maximum 0.5 metres high by 0.5 metres wide;
- Surrounding fire guard required;
 - Have ready access to eight

litres of water and/or a shovel;

- Never leave campfires unattended, and
- Completely extinguish fire and ensure ashes are cool before leaving.

With more severe environmental conditions, restrictions can expand to a complete open-fire ban and closures of lakes, parks, and backcountry areas.

It remains illegal to burn garbage, construction waste, and toxic material unless authorized by permit.

WATER METERS COMING

Area A has been waiting since 2015 for new infrastructure planning tools, leak-detection software, and a user-pay system.

With contracts for meter installation in Sechelt and the shishalh Nation, we can see completion of the improvements.

With roughly 10,560 water connections still requiring meters, the SCRD initiated a three-stage water metering program.

Phase 1 saw meter installations in North and South Pender Harbour water service areas in 2014 and 2015.

Phase 2 saw meter installations in remaining rural areas between 2016-2018.

Combined, phases 1 and 2 introduced 6,186 meters.

Phase 3 will see 4,028 new meter installations within the Sechelt and shishálh municipal boundaries, with completion expected July, 2025.

Current situation:

• 347 residential and commercial accounts have water meters, with 194 needing new transmitters;

FINDING MORE WATER

We have ample rain on a yearly basis, but storing it for year-round access at reasonable cost is a challenge.

Area A residents were confident we had it aced with four systems to access abundant surface water, but we weren't prepared for the exceptionally long and dry 2021-2022 summers.

The situation proved the reality of climate change, and underlined the need to plan and implement for a new reality, which we are now doing, but not without struggles.

Sechelt's Chapman water system is a prime example of best-laid plans going off the rails, and we should all be learning from it.

It's not like the problem hadn't been studied to death and a solution designed and funded.

In 2018, it was accepted that stage 2 water restrictions would be the maximum, with a plan to annually reduce demand by 520,000 cubic metres and increase supply by over 1,012,000 cubic metres, resulting in about 1.5 million cubic metres of new stored water.

Water meters, used mainly to reduce demand, were installed everywhere but Sechelt by 2017.

Although planned, in 2018, voters refused to fund the project.

In 2019, SCRD directors and staff were stunned when George Heyman, minister of environment and climate change strategy, killed a major project by withholding his approval to deepen the Chapman Dam to supply an additional 1,000,000 cubic metres.

Stopping both projects caused

four more years of planning, designing and securing additional funding to install siphons to deepen channels (supposedly temporarily) in Chapman and Edwards Lakes, resuming the metering project, delivering the new Church Road well field, and starting work on one in Langdale.

Impacts of stopping the projects were worsened by the unforeseen, extreme summers of 2021-2022.

Chapman water users endured frustrating restrictions pretty much every summer since 2015 and, in 2019, were faced with suffering beyond the estimated 2020 resolution date.

Our 2026 targets of annually reducing demand by 586,000 cubic metres and increasing supply by at least 1,724,000 cubic metres should yield an increase of 2,310,000 cubic metres since the 2018 assessment.

This means our projected target increased by 778,000 cubic metres a year, but Chapman and Edwards Lakes store 1,641,000 cubic metres of water, so storage must be increased by 140 per cent.

With the 2023 delivery of the Chapman well and interim solutions such as siphons, minimum environmental flow needs reductions, purchasing water from Gibsons and accessing wells early to delay the release of stored water, we expect that 2023 may see greatly delayed water restriction impositions.

By spending one time/lost money for Gibsons water and renting a filtration plant for Gray Creek, we could achieve a worst-case scenario of stage 3 in September and stage 4 in October.

By 2026, stage 3 and 4 water restrictions should be history, and Chapman water service users will soon have enough water, or at least as much as they want to pay for.



Aline Bunt died in Sechelt Hospital at age 86.

She was survived by her husband of 63 years, Raymond Bunt, daughter Rachel (John), sister Yolande (Peter), brother Richard (Monique) and numerous nieces and nephews.

She is predeceased by parents Anna-Marie and Edouard Samson, and sisters Colette and Marie (Gerard).

Bunt was born in the small village of Rivière-Bleue, Que.

At age 18, she joined the Canadian Armed Forces and chose the Royal Canadian Air Force.

After training she worked in aircraft maintenance and was stationed in Cold Lake, Alta.

There, she met her husband Ray Bunt and they married in 1959.

One year later her daughter Rachel was born.

After Cold Lake, the family moved to France as part of Canada's contribution to NATO.

Upon returning to Canada, in 1967, she changed duties and started a career in secretarial work, becoming an executive secretary to the base commander in Bagotville, Que.

When Ray was assigned to the Dept. of National Defence headquarters in Ottawa, Bunt became executive secretary to the commissioner of the public service commission.

Ray Bunt died at home at age 86. He is survived by his daughter Rachel (John), brother Walter (Shirley), brother Ralph (Gerlind), and several nieces and nephews.

He is predeceased by his parents Rose and Walter Bunt.

He was born in Fort William, Ont., but called Thunder Bay his hometown.

Bunt joined the Canadian Armed Forces and chose the RCAF as his

preferred branch of the military, with jet aircraft mechanics as his career.

His first assignment was in Cold Lake, Alta., where he met Aline.

The couple had Rachel in 1960.

Two years later they was transferred to an air force base in France.

These were the Cold War years and the stress of the frequent drills was relieved by taking vacations as far as North Africa.

Safety and senior drivers

Age alone does not make an older adult an unsafe driver.

Many older adults continue to be safe drivers and make decisions to avoid driving situations in which they feel less confident.

However, as we age, changes in abilities make some activities more difficult.

Here are examples of concerns you or your family member may have experienced:

Vision — you may notice glare and find it difficult to see in the dark or things in your peripheral vision.

Physical — you may feel weak, stiff, experience pain or move slowly

Cognition — you may have difficulty remembering things, making decisions or coping with distractions

Reaction time — you may find it difficult to react quickly.

WARNING SIGNS OF UNSAFE DRIVING

Have you been involved in near or minor collisions?

Do you seem distracted by the radio or passengers talking to you while driving the car?

Do other drivers honk at you?

Do you lack confidence when driving?

Do you miss stop signs or traffic lights?

Do you get lost, forget where you parked your car or where you are going?

Do you have problems changing lanes or merging?

Do your family or friends refuse to drive with you?

If these warning signs reflect your situation, maybe it is time to



make some changes and have your driving evaluated.

The following are some safe driving strategies:

- Choose a vehicle that is easier to drive, such as one that is automatic and has good visibility;
- Make sure the vehicle is in good working condition;
- Make sure the seat, steering wheel and mirror are properly adjusted, and
- Limit driving at night, in bad weather, or on limited access highways;
 - Maintain a safe following dis-

tance;

- Take regular breaks when driving long distances;
- Have regular medical checkups including a regular eye exam and ask your medical doctor about your ability to drive, and
- If you are diabetic, some effects of the disease, such as blood sugar levels, may affect your ability to drive.

Varying blood sugars may make you feel sleepy, dizzy, confused and less alert.

Poorly controlled blood sugars may cause you to experience blurred vision or a sudden loss of vision.

The naked caretakers of Sabine Channel

In the 1970s, Keray Farrell and I took on a caretaking job on Texada Island, just south of Partington Point across from Jedediah Island.

Sabine Channel was a bustling neighbourhood in those days.

It was reasonably populated with a variety of folks from all over and many of us managed properties for the wealthies who still had to work to afford their summer holiday in a place we enjoyed all year-long.

To earn a living, we did whatever jobs fell in our paths.

Finding employment required that you owned a boat and could manage winter and summer living remotely.

As the locations were usually boat access only, without neighbours within walking distance, it could be a challenge to keep the place functioning for the owners when they wanted to visit.

It paid \$300 a month, a princely sum in those days.

Keray and I arrived with four school-aged children, our own boat, a

happy mouser cat, and all of the experience that we could muster.

In Keray's case, this was considerable as he had grown up in and around Pender Harbour where he learned the skills required for this sort of undertaking.

I was a Vietnam draft resister who met the Farrells on Lasqueti Island.

I was well-educated in universities for jobs not needed on the Coast, and most unskilled by local standards.

But I learned fast.

And my education did come in handy when I was required to supervise correspondence school for my four children who were without a school.

Since only two years of university was required at that time, in any discipline, I could supervise a classroom of four as a paid teacher.

My seemingly useless training did pay off.

A few years before we took over the place on Texada, Lindal Cedar Homes had dispatched a barge loaded with the house to be constructed at the site.

Hearty fellows arrived to build the home but, as the story goes, Lindal forgot to collect them again.

They must have been running out of supplies, relying probably on the Jones boys, Bruce and Gordon, to help them keep it together.

One of these builders finally walked north to the populated end of Texada via decommissioned logging roads and managed to get the word out that they needed pickup.

Remarkably, my son Yolan explored the area by boat recently and found the Lindal home has held up wonderfully with very little maintenance over these decades, facing straight into the southeast wind.

We built our own little house at the top of the former log dump.

It had a terrific view and there was a cleared area behind it where trucks had turned around and there were lots of old roads for walking.

We used a friend's little tugboat, the *Wee Geordie*, and a block at the

top of the dump to haul up skids of plywood and dimensional lumber.

Friends came to help and in a few weeks we had a basic house to live in.

In the meantime, we camped in homemade tents and cooked on the beach over campfires making wonderful memories.

That little home served us and the caretaker after us for many years, but recently burned down.

On Texada, clothes were optional a great deal of the time.

It seemed natural and only partly because doing laundry was such a difficult chore.

We had an old wringer washer powered by a one-cylinder kick start Iron Horse engine — that was not easy to start.

One of the advantages of the gas engine running the machine was that it could be forced to operate really vigorously, wild sloshing followed by jeans zooming out of the wringer into rinse water below in a galvanized tub.

Great stuff for mom and children on wash day.

Then the clothes were hung on a length of halibut longline that ran from the top of our log dump to a fir tree a great distance away.

It was dandy material and we had miles of it that came with our former fish boat, *Sarita Bay*.

On warm summer days, the whole group of us would wander around with very little on.

The beach out front was lovely with a stream that came down from Mount Shepherd alongside the beach to rinse off in.

Nearby trees provided shade and the beach itself was composed of billions of perfectly round pebbles.

Snuggling into these warm

pebbles after a cool swim is one of my favourite memories of this lifetime.

We were paid to look after the 40-acre property by a family from Ontario — Herb and Dorothy Patterson and their children, David and Caroline.

They always arrived in the summer for a lengthy stay when we were required to vacate.

We took advantage of this time off to roam the Coast in our own boat and once Herb brought a grand yacht that he allowed us to use for a trip to Princess Louisa Inlet with friends.

Herb would sometimes come on his own to decompress, letting us know by mail approximately when the visit might happen.

We had a radio phone, single sideband and citizens band for regular communication and mail was picked up on Lasqueti Island.

But contact was sketchy at best.

On one particular day, Allen and Sharie Farrell, my in-laws at the time, were visiting.

Their *Native Girl*, a gorgeous sailboat they built in Green Bay with hand tools and the most basic of purchased items, was anchored out.

Picture this scene.

Our huge pebble beach faced south with bare bums in and out of the water everywhere, all bathed in sunshine.

Such bliss, until the sound.

Suddenly, a floatplane roared around the bottom end of Texada.

It was *Blossom*, everyone's favourite Beaver, piloted by Blackie, everyone's favourite pilot, and he was delivering Herb.

It was time to run.

We all tore out of the water, buck naked, and ran as fast as we could up the hill to our house. Our clothes were still all over the beach, which wasn't a problem for those of us who lived there because we had more in our home, but poor Allen (Sharie had stayed on *Native Girl*) had nothing to wear.

My boys were still too small to have anything that might have fit him so he was forced to squeeze into Keray's pants and shirt, also too small.

He looked quite silly, this fabulous boat builder, dressed as a clown.

Allen could be a very gracious and self-effacing man and took it in stride.

Meanwhile, Blackie nosed his plane onto the beach to unload Herb.

We meekly made our way back down the hill to welcome him.

He and Blackie were still in fits of giggles over the sight of all of us running up the hill with nothing on.

They had tears streaming out of their eyes and Herb said it was the best possible way for him to arrive at his beloved property.

Now more than 45 years on, Herb and Dorothy are both gone, as are Allen and Sharie and even Keray and his daughter, Kari-Ann.

Blackie too, and *Blossom* is sold.

But that beach south of Partington Point still shines in the sun and I hope there are still naked swimmers on it to honour their memory.


