The squatter conundrum

It's an interesting conundrum, that camp on the side of Garden Bay Road.

It stirs up a swarm of issues involving just about every facet of our social and emergency health services.

For most, the site brings feelings of disgust.

Disgust at the mess, and disgust at the perceived lack of accountability and enforcement that has allowed this problem to flourish.

Its presence risks encouraging more camps, creating a domino effect of disregard for public land.

If squatters can set up near Myers Creek, why not near Garden Bay Lake or Dan Bosch Park?

Seeing that corridor restored to what it was before will provide welcome relief for those of us who drive through it every day.

But it might not solve much.

Whether it's addiction, mental health issues or lack of affordable housing, the roots of the problem ensure that simply evicting the squatters means they will pop up elsewhere.

BC Housing and Vancouver Coastal Health have a program to provide a "stable, short-term place to live for individuals who are participating in a substance use recovery program."

But one of the many eligibility requirements is that candidates be off drugs and alcohol for 90 days.

I can only think of a handful of people I know who would qualify.

It's impossible for looky-loos in heated vehicles to understand how living in a damp trailer with little hope of escape, while suffering chronic illness and dental pain, must encourage the use of drugs like heroin or methamphetamine.

The federal government's 2018

"Report on addiction, substance use and homelessness" found that the proportion of those who reported addiction or substance use increases with time spent homeless — from 19 per cent for up to two months of homelessness to over 28 per cent for those reporting six months or more.

More than a quarter of survey respondents indicated that addiction or substance use was also the reason for their housing loss in the first place.

So housing is crucial and in many cases, impossible.

A 30-day trespass order gave the the squatters until April 29 to clear out (see story, p. 5).

By the time you read this, the camp might already be cleaned up.

I would be very surprised if that's the case but if it does happen, where did they go?

Perhaps BC Hydro property near the Malaspina Substation?

Or forest service roads near Mc-Neill Lake?

Despite the environmental and other hazards posed by the camp, at least it was visible and accessible to emergency services.

If driven further into the bush, are we just increasing the chances of a devastating forest fire this summer?

There's been a lot of chatter about the eyesore but very few genuine solutions to tackle the underlying issues that exist at this camp and hundreds like it across BC.

It's possible there aren't any.

Someone suggested the squatters make use of the derelict Garden Bay Pub property.

Its owners have left the charred building exactly as it was after it burned up on Nov. 26, 2020.

The Myers Creek crew might even improve the place.


78th ANNUAL PENDER HARBOUR MAY DAY: Saturday, May 20, all day

Myers Creek squatters told to be out by April 29

Those living on the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure right-of-way near Myers Creek on Garden Bay Road have until April 29 to vacate the controversial squatters' camp.

A 30-day trespass notice was dated March 27.

According to the notice, under BC's Trespass Act, "A peace officer may arrest without warrant any person found on the lands if the peace officer believes on reasonable and probable grounds that the person is committing an offence under s. 4 of the Trespass Act in relation to the land."

Also dated March 27, a 30-day "notice of unauthorized use and occupation" under the Transportation Act was delivered.

That order requires occupants and personal property be removed by April 29 or the minister will take "steps to have the occupants and their personal property removed at the expense of the occupants."

From an MOTI statement to the *Harbour Spiel*:

"Ministry staff continue to monitor the site as people vacate and is in discussions with multiple agencies on next steps.

"Once the 30 days is up, the ministry's next steps will depend on the situation at the site with various options possible."

S.C. Credit Union ATM still out of order

Normally, one of the longest lineups to be expected at Pender Harbour May Day is at the automatic teller machine at the Sunshine Coast Credit Union.

That's because much of the attractions set up on and off the elemetary school require cash.

This year, May Day organizers are telling people to bring cash with them because the SCCU's ATM is still out of operation since a December 2022 break-in attempt.

Instead, that sum was left to the Pender Harbour Health Centre. ~ed.

In an email, Jodi Fichtner, SCCU chief impact and marketing officer, told the *Harbour Spiel*:

"The credit union is seeking alternative options due to global supply chain uncertainty and will share updates when additional information becomes available."

Meanwhile, Fichtner said cash services are available during branch hours, and alternate ATMs are located at the Oak Tree Market, John Henry's Marina and Kleindale Petro-Canada.

Organizations receive funds to protect people and the environment

The provincial government recently awarded \$676,200 to Powell River and Sunshine Coast organizations working to protect ecosystems and keep people safe.

Announced March 23, the funding comes from the province's community gaming grants program for environmental and public safety initiatives.

The following community organizations will receive funding for public safety work, "which can include restorative justice, firefighting, search and rescue, emergency preparedness and community safety:"

- Pender Harbour and District Marine Rescue Society (\$26,000);
- Gibsons Marine Rescue Society (\$44,700);
- The B.C. Search Dog Association (\$123,000);
- Qathet Community Radio Society (\$4,000);
- The B.C. Search Dog Association (\$119,900);

- Powell River Search and Rescue Society (\$95,500);
- Sunshine Coast Marine Rescue Society (\$40,000);
- Restorative Justice Program of the Sunshine Coast (\$12,000), and
- Sunshine Coast Marine Rescue Society (\$33,000).

Other local organizations will receiving funding for environmental initiatives, such as animal protection, conservation and environmental awareness programs:

- The Loon Foundation (\$80,100);
- Powell River Orphaned Wildlife Society (\$9,500);
 - The Jellyfish Project (\$16,000);
- Sunshine Coast Salmonid Enhancement Society (\$40,000);
- Society for Atmosphere Solutions (\$7,500), and
- Sunshine Coast Conservation Association (\$25,000).



Pender dump's share shed reopens

The popular "share shed" at the Pender Harbour Transfer Station Share is open once again.

The dedicated space at the transfer station allows users to leave items that can be reused by other community members at no charge.

It has been closed since 2020 as part of the Sunshine Coast Regional District's response to the COVID-19 pandemic.

The share shed is being reintroduced as a six-month pilot program where items can be dropped off at no cost

This will be reassessed and drop-off charges may be applied in the future.

The service will be open from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. Wednesday to Saturday.

According to a SCRD press release:

"It's important for residents to note that the share shed is not there to bypass paying for waste brought to the transfer station.

"Pender Harbour and Egmont

residents are encouraged to contribute good quality items that are no longer wanted but could still be used by others in the community.

"Staff at the site will be providing quality control of the items going into the share shed and will have the final say on whether items can be added."

The following items are permitted (must be clean and in good/working condition):

- Children's toys;
- Housewares;
- Furniture (as space permits);
- Small appliances;
- Large appliances (in neutral colours and as space permits);
 - Sports equipment, and
 - Tools.

The following items are not permitted:

- Baby/child safety items (including car seats);
- Clothing, fabric, textiles, bedding, curtains, towels;
 - Construction materials;

- Household hazardous waste program (paint, cleaning products, or fuel);
 - Mattresses;

Are organics smelly?

Many of us separate our organics (food waste) from regular garbage, with no unpleasant odours.

Some even keep it to create valuable, nutrient-rich soil amendments.

Countertop collection pails can hold several days' worth of organics, and some feature air-tight lids with charcoal filters to trap odours, but once it's in the pail, what's next?

Transfer organics to a food-waste bag for disposal at our transfer station, freeze smaller amounts to consolidate later, or compost them.

Outdoor composters use "friendly" bacteria and worms to create

compost, while indoor systems create compost tea or thicker products.

- A traditional compost bin or compost heap is the cheapest system to set up and requires minimal attention:
- An in-ground (semi-submerged) system produces compost faster but harvesting is an effort;
- A rotating or tumbling system makes mixing or turning and harvesting easier;
- A stacked system produces compost faster but requires added soil and worms:
- An indoor vermi-composter uses worms to quickly break down organics:
- Fermentation units like Bokashi quickly convert food waste into a soil amendment, and

• Electric recycler units process all foods including meat, fish, eggs, dairy, and bones in two to four hours and use carbon filters to reduce odours.

With the SCRD starting its home composter rebate program this month, now is the time to start helping yourself and the environment.

hon, was elected AVICC electoral area representative.

Besides attending presentations and workshops, we heard addresses by Union of British Columbia Municipalities president Jen Ford, Minister of Municipal Affairs Anne Kang, and Sheila Malcolmson, Minister of Social Development and Poverty Reduction.

A highlight of the convention is the provincial advocacy opportunity offered by way of pre-submitted resolutions, which, if the majority of delegates approve, are forwarded to the UBCM with a chance to eventually be presented to the province as a call to action.

Six SCRD and Sechelt resolutions were approved for UBCM submission including provincial water licensing approval improvements, local government parcel tax and utility fee deferments, local government property transfer tax sharing, provincial archeological requirement support, and local government act modernization.

Several resolutions of interest to the Sunshine Coast passed:

- Demand immediate minister of housing and BC Housing action on the homeless crisis and related community impact;
- Urge the Ministry of Health to, with local governments and BC Emergency Health Services, increase funding and staff to avoid overburdening local fire departments;
- Request the province increase regional health authority budgets to attract and retain nurses and physicians, and include opportunities for other healthcare providers;
- Work with the province to control Scotch broom, and
- Request the province to increase resources to process water

licence applications with a priority on health and safety.

Two highly controversial resolutions passed:

- Lobby the province to review the Residential Homeowner Protection Act to allow building contractors to maintain their licences without annual continuing education units, and
- Lobby the province to engage and consult with local governments in the old growth review implementation.

These heavily debated resolutions were defeated:

- Urge the province to protect all remaining old growth forests from logging;
- Request the province to partner with FortisBC to supply natural gas to commercial agriculture in AVICC areas;
- Request the province to annually adjust homeowner grants to offset inflation, and
- Request the Agriculture Land Commission to permit more new farm worker housing to only be occupied by farmers working the land.

CUT THE BLOOMIN' BROOM

Scotch broom, designated the "top worst offender" in a 2021 study of BC invasive species, is a toxic, invasive shrub.

It increases wildfire risk, compromises forest regrowth, impedes growth of agricultural crops and crowds out native species to degrade wetlands and wildlife habitats.

Scotch broom is highly flammable with a high oil content which makes a volatile fuel.

This is especially dangerous with our increasing temperatures and prolonged droughts caused by climate change.

Cut off blooming Scotch broom at ground level in mid-April through May while disturbing the soil as little as possible to discourage seed germination.

When cutting on roadsides, contact Broombusters at (250) 752-4816 for Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure rules.

Dispose of broom from your property at the dump, compost it, or burn it in fall.

It is accepted as garbage (tipping fees apply) but must be in clear bags and free of flowers and seed pods.

Attack of Danger Bay turns 22 on May 21

Attack of Danger Bay is back for its 22nd year on the May long weekend and we are inviting the world back to Pender Harbour for the world's longest running downhill skateboard race.

After stripping the event down to bare bones in order to keep it alive during three very tricky years of running small tight races in October, we're ecstatic to open it up to the world again.

Pender Harbour is an epicentre of the sport and we settle for nothing less then world champions here.

How about locals Danger Dane Hanna and Team Irene?

Hanna went from sucking his thumb in a stroller on the side-lines of the race track to racing world wide blowing away the best racers in the world for years now.

He won the world championships in Barcelona in 2021 and again in Argentina in 2022 making him a two-time defending world champion.

And, it should be noted, he's also a two-time defending Danger Bay champion.

So, our local boy is the obvious one to watch.

For those who don't know Danger Bay, in total it is a seven-day event.

We shut down two world famous roads and build two racetracks to race and freeride during the week.

We also host a slide competition and an eight-team skate hockey tournament.

After the May Queen is crowned, we meet on the field for a huge game of rough skateboard hockey.

Next is a nine-kilometre push race through Egmont's dense and

refreshing rainforest.

The finish line is off a launch pad into the Skookumchuck where competitors are judged by height and distance before they hit the water.

There is still nothing like it in the world.

The big race day is on Sunday, May 21.

Danger Dane has a huge target on his back but to get to him, racers will need to claw their way through Pender Harbour locals Team Irene and Team Green.

This year we are closing off our racer camp and keeping it private so the racers have a safe place to relax and focus on racing.

Thank you all for understanding.

Most important, none of this has been possible without the local residents up and down the race hill who have been so generous for the past two decades.

We are all thankful for a safe place to demonstrate our sport.

Out of respect for residents in the neighbourhood of the race hill, there is absolutely no driving to or parking at the race.

Please take the shuttle that leaves from the Oak Tree Market in Madeira Park starting at 8 a.m.

BC commercial spot prawn fishery opens May 15

When buying live BC spot prawns, look for lively, almost translucent prawns. The tail should be straight in line with the head. The head should be firm with no black colour.

- If the prawn is pink in colour, with the tail curled under the head, it is not freshly harvested.
- If the head is showing a black colour the meat has started to deteriorate already.
- If the prawn head is soft or mushy when touched, the meat will also be mushy.

After buying your prawns, immediately get them into a cooler or on ice. This will help prevent the prawn meat from deteriorating.

BC spot prawns harvested "live" should be cooked immediately or have their heads removed as soon as possible.

After the heads are removed the tails should be thoroughly rinsed. Spot prawns have an enzyme that begins to permeate through the tail and turns the meat mushy. The head of the prawn can be removed from the tail by swiftly turning it and pulling it away from the tail.

Preparing live wild BC spot prawns

- Remove heads immediately.
- Pack into a bowl or container of your choosing.
- Cover with ice and refrigerate to ensure prawns maintain their structure for up to three days.
- Pour off melted ice each day and replace.

Freezing live wild BC spot prawns

Remove the head and pack prawn tails loosely into a plastic container. Completely cover tails with saline solution (1 tsp salt to 1.5 cup water) remembering that water expands as it freezes.

Preparing frozen wild BC spot prawns

• Thaw in refrigerator overnight or cool water bath an hour before use.

Removing the shell

Prawns are often cooked shell on, but the shells are easily peeled off. Begin by tearing the legs away from the meat in a circular motion. To remove the fanned tail, gently squeeze the meat out of the bottom of the shell.

Cooking your wild BC spot prawns

Prawns can be prepared in any number of ways but the trick is to make sure they do not get overcooked. Cook only one to two minutes or until the prawns just turn pink. This is applicable for whole or tails, live, fresh or frozen.

Where to buy prawns locally





Is it time for your cervical screening?

Cervical screening (or Pap test) is a systematic search for risks and early manifestations of disease in asymptomatic women.

Current BC Cancer Agency screening recommendations are that anyone with a cervix, including women and transgender people, age 25 to 69 should be screened every three years.

An estimated 1,450 Canadian women will be diagnosed with cervical cancer in 2022.

An estimated 380 will die from it.

PAP TEST

Not many women know that 50 per cent of invasive cervical carcinomas diagnosed are on patients who did not have the Pap test done in at least seven years.

On the other hand, carcinoma in situ (which is a pre-malignant lesion on the cervix) has a cure rate of 100 per cent.

Stage 1 cancers have a cure rate from 80 per cent to 90 per cent.

Many women are not entirely comfortable with the actual procedure.


It is unfortunately perceived as an invasive and, sometimes, painful and scary process.

Cervical screening involves a Pap test that can find abnormal cells in the cervix before they become cancer.

If these abnormal cells are found and treated early, cervical cancer can be stopped from developing.

By having a Pap test every three years, as recommended by BC Cancer, you reduce your risk of developing cervical cancer by up to 70 per cent.

The whole pelvic exam is now



taught in a way that focuses on a positive experience women deserve to have.

Cervix screening can be done by a doctor, nurse practitioner, registered nurse, midwife, or naturopathic doctor at their office or clinic.

It's about approaching it with respect, devotion and reverence.

It is important that women are comfortable and well informed before the exam.

The examination should never be a one-person act.

It is a process where practitioner and patient work together and are comfortable with each other.

For the test, you will need to undress from the waist down.

You will be provided with a

gown or a sheet to cover up.

Then lie back on the medical table and put your feet up.

When you're comfortable, the health care provider will gently insert an instrument called a speculum into your vagina so they can see your cervix.

Next, the health care provider will use a small spatula or brush to collect some cells from your cervix.

Cervix screening is not usually painful but can be uncomfortable.

The sample then goes to a lab to be examined.

Your results will be sent to your health care provider.

If there are any abnormal cells present, your health care provider will contact you.

Garden Bay Hotel, 1950

The Garden Bay Hotel and Pub opened in 1932 and ran continually as a restaurant and pub until it was destroyed by a fire on the morning of Nov. 26, 2020.

In 1982, Ron Johnston and Marita Jokela purchased the property and would run it for the next 32 years, making it into one of the Sunshine Coast's top live music venues.

On March 17, 2014, the two sold the business to current owners Gary and Natalie Lee.

Since 2020, the pub's burnt-out remains look much the same as it did after the Pender Harbour Volunteer Fire Department extinguished the fire.

For both events, doors open at 9:30 a.m. There is a drop-in fee of \$4.



ABOUT THE NEW HARBOUR LEARNING CENTRE BUILDING

In February 2019, the **Pender Harbour Rotary Club** commenced a "Community Needs Assessment" in the areas of education, health care, recreation, business and the workforce.

The **Pender Harbour Learning Centre** was found in greatest need, as it grows to meet the expanding needs of the community. In its unique position, it is integral to both our Elementary and Secondary schools, youth in need, support for educational and recreational programs as well as mental health.

The existing building is too small to provide for our current and growing services. It is in dire need of repair or replacement. The building has no running water and no toilet facilities. The foundation posts are rotting and sinking. There is little if any insulation and the roof is constantly leaking.

The **Community School Society Board** appointed the Rotary team to propose a building repair or replacement project. Almost immediately, it became apparent that repairing the aging building was not financially viable.

Following a review of options, the PH Rotary team submitted a proposal to the Community School Society to replace the aging building with a new structure. The funding would need to be secured through grants. Ultimately we were approved for a Federal grant for \$268,655 in May of 2022. But this would provide only 75% of the funding requirement, with the Society having to pay the remaining 25 percent.

Rotary and the Society actively sought other funding partners for the remaining 25%, which amounted to approximately \$90,000. The **Pender Harbour Rotary Club** initially donated **\$20,000** (followed later with an additional \$10,000), \$5,000 was donated by the **Sunshine Coast Community Foundation** and a further \$65,000 was donated by the **Art & Pearl van der Linden Foundation**. We also received support from the SCRD, shíshálh First Nation, the Pender Harbour Chamber of Commerce, School District 46, our MLA Nicholas Simons, and our MP Patrick Weiler.

Though excellent news for our community, but unfortunate timing for the Society, School District 46 simultaneously received approval for a new Child Care Centre to be placed on the Elementary School grounds. Determining the site of their new building has impacted the location of the new Learning Centre Building. This, plus increased building and transportation costs brought about by COVID, has resulted in the Society being short of funds to complete the project. The shortfall to the Society is estimated at \$50,000, which includes a 20% contingency.

To make up for this shortfall, the Society has commenced a fundraising effort with a goal of raising \$50,000 by July 2023. A tall order! The Society is requesting community support from the generous businesses and residents of Pender Harbour to complete this important project by late summer 2023.

Donations will be recognized in advertising and on an entire wall in the new building dedicated to donors.

ElderDog volunteers 'paw it forward'

A year ago, one dog owner's visit to the vet revealed that Quinn, her seven-year-old King shepherd was tipping the scales at over 60 kilograms (135 pounds).

While the unique breed is large, Quinn clearly needed more exercise.

But due to several chronic health issues, its owner, Sharon, was no longer able to provide the high energy exercise he required to stay fit and healthy.

Her vet recommended that she investigate ElderDog.

Sharon discovered the Pender Harbour chapter of ElderDog, a Canada-wide charity that supports older adults in the care and well-being of their canine companions.

Through its volunteers, ElderDog provides care and companionship for older dogs whose lives have been disrupted due to illness or death of a human companion.

Keeping the human-animal bond healthy and intact is at the core of ElderDog's mission.

After contacting Sunshine Coast ElderDog, Kira Sufalko soon responded and set up a house visit between

Sharon and Quinn and Madeira Park rehoming co-ordinator Karen Wells.

Soon after, two volunteers were matched with Quinn.

A meet up and short walk transpired to ensure mutual compatibility.

Volunteers exchanged information with Sharon and they created a flexible schedule that suited everyone.

After a few volunteer-led dog walks, Sharon learned she must be careful not to mention the walkers to Quinn by name as he recognizes them, their voices, and the sound of their cars as they approach the house.

Once alerted, Quinn can hardly contain himself, or his giant wagging tail.

After Quinn returns home from his adventures, he is content to take a well-deserved nap.

HOW IT WORKS

Depending upon the volunteer, walks occur on familiar roads within the owner's neighbourhood or dogs are driven to new adventures agreed upon by the owner and volunteer.

In Quinn's case, he's up for anything.

Walks can vary from 30 minutes to an hour or longer.

Many of the volunteers have dogs of their own and enjoy sharing the fun with their ElderDog "clients."

There is a lot of flexibility within the program and the dogs get healthy exposure to a range of other dog lovers in the process.

Wells said she gets a kick out of watching the dogs develop their own furry friendships and personally gains as much joy from the outings as her canine companions.

On the other end of the size spectrum is "Diego the Dynamo," a corgi, a small dog with a big dog personality.

Diego's owner Sue hasn't looked back since she joined ElderDog four years ago.

Her friend saw an ElderDog booth outside of the Pender Harbour IGA and mentioned the program to Sue.

"I had heard about ElderDog in Sechelt but didn't realize it existed in Pender Harbour," Sue explained.

"I was waiting for knee surgery and knew that I was going to need help keeping Diego, my very active corgi, healthy and well exercised.

"As further health issues arose, I have realized I can't walk very far anymore."

Knowing that Diego is getting the exercise he needs running with the big dogs also gives Sue the ability to keep her dog.

Diego livens up her days and makes her feel younger.

Sue can't say enough about the program.

"Diego gives me life and makes such a difference and ElderDog volunteers have made this possible."

- All volunteers have been vetted through an application process, including their willingness to undergo and pass a police check.
- There are eight active volunteers in Pender Harbour, with three

dogs currently participating in the walking programme.

- There are 35-plus dog clients on the Coast, from Gibsons to Ruby Lake.
- At least 14 dogs have been "rehomed" on the Sunshine Coast through ElderDog's program, including relocation from Vancouver, Chilliwack, and Nanaimo.
- ElderDog doesn't charge for its services. Funds are raised through its online store at *www.elderdogcanadastore.ca* and tax-deductible donations.

There are also non-dog walking volunteer roles available.


