

SCRD presents the state of the 2022 budget after round 1

Higher assessments will combine with lower tax rates but, overall, 2022 property taxes should rise "slightly," said Tina Perrault, Sunshine Coast Regional District chief financial officer, during an online presentation of the SCRD's 2022 budget on Jan. 13.

The budget is still a work in progress after the first round of deliberations but Perrault provided a peak at how it will look when formally adopted later this month.

To get to this point, the SCRD board was presented the results of a community survey at a pre-budget deliberation held Nov. 1.

The board then attended round 1 budget information sessions on Dec. 13 and 14.

Perrault said the purpose of the Jan. 13 information session was to update the community on the outcomes of these last three meetings.

SCRD held round 2 of budget deliberations on Jan. 24.


WHAT'S AFFECTING THIS YEAR'S BUDGET?

"At the start of round one, we were projecting that we had approximately 147 projects that were carried forward from prior years into the 2022 budget," said Perrault.

"And we have about 90 proposed new projects and in those projects also include any associated staffing resources," said Perrault.

In addition to the list of proposed projects, Perrault said the SCRD is required to undertake a number of mandatory items to bring SCRD infrastructure into regulatory compliance such as Ministry of Environment regulations regarding the Sechelt landfill or safety requirements for staff.

In addition to those budget items, Perrault said the SCRD will add 16

additional full-time positions in 2022 "to ensure service delivery is maintained" in addition to ongoing maintenance and equipment upgrades.

Some of the larger projects impacting Area A taxation will be post-closure funding for the Sechelt landfill (\$100,000), North and South Pender Harbour water main replacement (\$1.45 million), dam upgrades at McNeill Lake and Chapman Lake (\$2 million) and recreation facility upgrades.

UTILITY RATES

Perrault said that the SCRD utility rates were approved in December.

For the regional water system, rates are going up by \$58.55.

North Pender Harbour water users (Garden Bay) will go up \$86.24 and South Pender water users (McNeill Lake) will go up \$61.38.

OPERATING BUDGET

The operating budget refers to the plan for day-to-day operations of the SCRD including salaries, legal and insurance costs, and winter control. These expenses are required annually to run the regional district.

The SCRD's total operating budget for 2022 after round one sits at just over \$52 million.

"We have seen a significant increase in our operational and capital budgets for the Sunshine Coast Regional District," said Perrault.

"I would say that over the last 10 years, it has near doubled."

Recreation and cultural services (including funding to libraries, museums and Dakota Ridge ski area) account for 26 per cent of the operating budget followed closely by water and waste water services at 24 per cent.

CAPITAL BUDGET

The SCRD's capital budget is the annual plan for the purchase and financing of the SCRD's capital assets.

Capital assets are projects and expenses where the benefits can be seen over the course of many years, such as roads, bridges, land, buildings, machinery and equipment.

For 2022, the SCRD's capital budget (after round 1) sits at \$41.9 million.

"It's important to understand that these are not new investments, these are carried forward," said Perrault.

"So, some of those 147 projects like Church Road, completion of the water metering program and several of our facility upgrades.

"For instance, in our community recreation facilities where we invest over \$750,000 on average (annually)."

The majority of the capital budget, 64 per cent, is taken up by water and wastewater costs.

Perrault pointed to ongoing demand for improvements to water supply, especially on the south Coast.

SUNSHINE COAST ASSESSMENTS AND TAXATION

Perrault pointed to a dramatic increase in the recently released property assessments for 2022 — a 34.27 per cent increase throughout the Sunshine Coast over 2021.

"Some properties up in Area A saw over a 46 per cent increase in valuations," said Perrault.


Last year in Area A, the SCRD tax rate was \$257.98 per \$100,000 in assessment.

For 2022, that rate went down to \$203.79 per \$100,000 of assessed home value.

As Perrault pointed out, even though the tax rate is lower than 2021, the amount people pay will be slightly higher due to the rise in assessments.

"It looks deceiving, like your taxes are going to decrease because that rate has decreased, but if your assessment has gone up, the rate naturally goes down, said Perrault.

"In essence, you end up paying a

little more in taxation anyway because of the natural increase in assessment."

On average, for a home assessed at \$750,000, the property tax bill will be \$1,528.

The Area B (Halfmoon Bay) 2022 preliminary tax rate is \$243 per \$100,000 of assessed value.

WHERE DO TAXES GO IN AREA A?

"Area A is a very diverse area with little communities within there and it depends on which services you participate in," said Perrault.

"So, it does vary quite significantly depending on which community you live in," said Perrault.

For instance, Perrault pointed to the SCRD-managed Egmont and District Volunteer Fire Department as a specific tax responsibility for Egmonsters versus the Pender Harbour Fire Protection District which is an improvement district outside of the SCRD taxation budget that funds the P. H. Volunteer Fire Department.

In Area A, like the broader SCRD, the largest piece of the tax pie will fund recreation and cultural services at just over 34 per cent.

Local examples that fall under this funding category are the Pender Harbour Reading Room, Sechelt Library and Egmont Heritage Centre.


Area A's second largest taxation draw is environmental services which involves solid waste services like the Pender Harbour Transfer Station.

NEXT STEPS

The adoption of the financial plan bylaw is scheduled for Feb. 24 at the SCRD board meeting.





Are your taxes going up by 35 per cent?

ARE YOUR TAXES GOING UP 35%?

Our residential property assessments for 2022 increased

about 35 per cent, reflecting an exodus of people from urban areas, which increased selling prices and demand due to limited availability.

But commercial property and business assessments bucked this trend, likely because of COVID-19's impact on their businesses.

The SCRD projects an approximate seven-per-cent budget increase, with Area A's share expected to increase by 10 to 11 per cent (other areas will increase by four to 11 per cent).

Assessments do not determine property tax; it's calculated with the money required to support each service, then shared according to assessed value amongst all properties receiving the services.

Assessed values and mill rates determine only your share of the tax money requisitioned, and that figure will remain unknown until you receive your 2022 tax notice.

SCRD taxes will not automatically be 11 per cent higher in Area A because the budget is 11 per cent higher, nor will they automatically be lower because we have 1.4 per cent more property owners contributing.

We likely face a modest increase — but definitely not 37 per cent caused by increased assessments.

The 2022 budget will be adopted on Feb. 24.

PENDER HARBOUR LANDFILL PROJECT

Based on the 2021 "Pender Harbour Transfer Station site assessment results and next steps" report, which identified repairs necessary for continued, safe operation of the transfer station and Share Shed, the SCRD will undertake the project in two phases for completion by 2023.

We chose to repair and continue operating the Share Shed for \$96,000 rather than demolish it for \$70,000.

PHASE 1: SAFETY FIRST

- Replace the Share Shed roof, fascia, and eaves, repair an excessively moist and rotting inside area, and install a new rain barrel in a better location:
- Replace and relocate the propane storage bin, which shows severe

rot and decay and to which the public has direct access:

- Relocate, delineate and limit public access to the wood and greenwaste drop off areas, which are dangerously close to the steep slopes surrounding the property, an escalating risk of someone driving over the edge or causing a slope failure, and
- Conduct an engineering design for phase 2.

PHASE 2: REDESIGN AND REBUILD

- Construct a new, relocated, commercial tipping-pad (the existing one is heavily damaged);
- Construct a new scale house and foundation (the existing floor is cracked and uneven, storage is lacking, and excess moisture and rodent urine/feces odours are present);
- Upgrade the 40-yard and 20yard bin drop-off areas with appropriate fill, geogrid, drainage, and grading (soil erosion and surface-water collection occurs at the north end);
- Replace the damaged shipping container used for storage;
- Rebuild the unsound concrete Lock-Block wall (blocks damaged, tipped out, tipped in, heaved upwards, and sunk):
- Rebuild the cracked, decaying concrete bin pads;
- Rebuild the uneven cardboardbin area (separating wall is leaning);
- Conduct general site grading and drainage improvements, and
- Repair damaged areas of the perimeter electric fence.

Phase 2 will be included in 2023 budget discussions.

EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS IS A PRIORITY

Over the last few years we've

experienced the impacts of climate change, including increasingly severe seasonal drought, wildfires, rising sea levels and extreme weather events.

We brace ourselves for the next big event, very likely to occur again this year.

The SCRD is committed to informing, preparing, and protecting residents, and protecting and adapting our infrastructure, but we also must be ready and able to restore our infrastructure when mitigation efforts fail.

This year, climate change-driven projects will cost \$1.76 million (\$360,000 plus \$1.4 million carried over from 2021).

The \$360,000 will be spent on food-waste recycling, moving towards electric vehicles, creating decarbonizing designs for three recreation facilities and a community energy and emissions inventory.

The \$1.4 million is being spent on emergency preparedness including:

- Completing a mass communications system with at least 3,000 people registered (register at www. scrd.ca/alert-system);
- Upgrading emergency communications equipment including 911 emergency-telephone radio towers;
- Establishing an evacuation plan for Egmont;
- Installing new or replacement emergency backup (generators) for the North Pender Harbour pump station, Pender Harbour Transfer Station, and Gibsons and District firehalls;
- Training selected staff in first aid, danger-tree assessment, and power-saw safety;
- Completing FireSmart assessments of forest-interface homes, as specified in a FireSmart economic recovery fund grant;
 - Establishing a "demonstration

forest" as an example of a fire-smart, fuel-managed area;

- Supplying Gibsons and Robert's Creek Fire Departments with personal protective equipment and wildland clothing, and
- Establishing a full-time emergency management and planning co-ordinator.

In future columns, I'll describe current projects to address water shortages, fire-hydrant expansion and a longer-term plan to increase water sources in anticipation of increased drought frequency and duration

Simmonds travelled to Japan while still a student to teach English to Japanese businessmen.

She returned to complete her bachelor of education at UBC.

Her teaching career began in Richmond, and later moved to Madeira Park where she taught several elementary grades.

After a number of years at MPES, she got a posting at Pender Harbour Secondary School.

Simmonds had a thirst for learning and teaching and it transposed to many of her students who found inspiration in her classes and in her vivacious personality.

She taught art, English, English literature, comparative civilizations, business education, accounting, home economics and computer science.

Simmonds was also hired to teach a district computer technology course in Sechelt from which the students received a certificate normally achieved at the post-secondary level.

Extracurricular student activities she sponsored included students' council, track and field and yearbook.

Simmonds personal leisure activities included travelling, camping, boating and generally exploring the ocean with her family.

She enjoyed reading, playing

golf and softball.

However, painting was the activity that really took hold of her.





Do you have osteoarthritis?

Osteoarthritis is a disease that causes the cartilage in your joint to break down.

Cartilage is the hard, white tissue that caps the ends of your bones and acts as a shock absorber for your joint.

You can see it when you tear a drumstick off a chicken.

When you move, it cushions the impact and lets your bones glide smoothly over each other.

As osteoarthritis develops, the cartilage begins to fray and may even wear away entirely, causing your bones to rub directly against each other.

This can make it painful to move your joint. In some cases, little bumpy growths, or spurs, develop on the ends of the bone.

Osteoarthritis can develop in any joint but it usually affects those that carry your bodyweight like the lower back, feet, hips and knees.

It is also seen in finger joints and the joint at the base of the thumb.

SIGNS AND SYMPTOMS

- Continuous achy feeling in your joint;
- Pain when you put weight on your joint;
- Pain in your joint when walking, climbing stairs, sitting down or getting up out of a chair;
- Stiffness, swelling or a loss of flexibility in your joint, and
- Stiffness in your joint for more than half an hour after you get out of bed in the morning.

CAUSES

• Age — osteoarthritis is not a



result of aging, but your chance of developing the disease goes up as you get older;

- Weight excess weight can strain the joints that carry your body weight, like hips and knees;
- Heredity if you have a family history of osteoarthritis you may be more likely to develop the disease,

and

• Injury and overuse — old injuries and repetitive activities like heavy lifting, kneeling, or squatting can leave lasting damage in your joints.

Take control of your osteoarthritis through eating well, exercising and learning how you can continue to enjoy everyday life.

The legend of ts'unay (Deserted Bay)

This story originally appeared in Al Lloyd's "Harbour Remembered" column in the Harbour Spiel, June 1996

When I first came to Pender Harbour, a few native people still lived in Garden Bay.

Among them was Chief Dan Johnson and his wife.

They used to travel to Lloyd's Store and around the Harbour in a two-man dugout canoe.

She would be in the bow paddling, while he in the stern, his paddle athwart ships, with arms folded serenely and dignified as he scanned the water and the shore.

Once in awhile he would speak quietly to his wife and sometimes he would pick up his paddle and give a few quick strokes to correct their course.

I did not get to know Dan Johnson until I opened my store in Garden Bay.

He came in sometimes but was always quiet and reserved.

In time we became friends and he would talk of the old days, when many of his people lived at Garden Bay.

Most of his stories had a thread of humour running through them and his eyes would sparkle as he told me of the fun they had, of the girls they chased, the tricks they played and how the Sechelts were converted to Catholicism.

Too often his stories were interrupted by customers but we had many good laughs.

One day he told me a story in a sad, quiet voice.

Gone was the sparkle in his eye

and perhaps for this reason it remains very clear in my mind.

This is the story he told and I only wish I could use his own words but my memory will have to serve:

When the white men first settled on the Coast, the native people were very interested in all the strange and different things he did.

We got great amusement from watching his everyday life; how he worked and especially how he amused himself.

Gastown was the only place on the lower coast where there were lots of white men and was a favourite place for white man watching.

The native families would travel by canoe and spend days and sometimes weeks watching with great interest and quiet amusement.

They watched how the white man worked and the tools he used.

They observed the food he ate and the clothes he wore, they wondered about the houses he lived in, because you must realize that for the most part they had never seen any of these things before and they were totally different from the native ways they had always known.

Of particular interest was the white man's habit of drinking and getting into arguments and fights and sometimes ending up in jail.

Some of the native people tried this strange custom but the results

were not too happy.

One other thing the white men brought was disease.

Diseases like chickenpox, measles and smallpox.

The white men had been exposed to the diseases for generations and had developed some immunity and know-how to treat them.

Chickenpox and measles were called children's diseases and almost all white children had them early and were not very sick with them.

Smallpox was worse but not considered too serious.

But for the native people these diseases were very bad. Very dangerous.

They never had them before and did not know how people who caught them should be treated.

So, many of the people who caught smallpox were certain to die.

It happened that a group of people from Jervis Inlet were in Gastown when an outbreak of smallpox happened.

When they saw people become very sick and covered with spots, they decided that home was the best place to be.

They gathered up their belongings and their children loaded them in their canoes and they headed up the inlet as fast as their paddles would drive them.

They did not know that they were carrying not only their belongings and children but the dreaded smallpox germs back to their families and friends at ts'unay.

A short time after this, two men were fishing off ts'unay.

As they fished, they thought it was funny that they couldn't see anyone on the shore or around the houses — no sign of life at all.

They talked about this and their curiosity made them go into the shore to investigate.

As soon as they put their boat on the beach, they had a bad feeling that something was very wrong.

They looked at the houses and they just saw dead people and more dead people — all dead from the smallpox.

There were many houses but each one was the same — more dead people.

They were not afraid of smallpox as they had both had it so they looked to see if perhaps there was anyone still alive.

Just as they were about to give up, they heard a baby cry, very faint.

They looked and there at her dead mother's breast was a baby

girl, hungrily trying to get milk.

They took the little baby and washed her in the salt chuck, wrapped her in clean clothes and took her — the only living person in ts'unay — to Gastown to be cared for by her own people.

No native people went back to ts'unay for many years and it was called Deserted Bay and is still on the white man's map.

By the time Dan had got this far, his voice was very low and his eyes were sad from remembering.

The a ghost of a smile played over his face and the hint of mischief came back to his eyes and he said,

"That girl, she grew to be a beautiful lady, got herself a good man and had many children."


