
P. H. COMMUNITY CLUB BINGO STARTS UP FOR THE SEASON: Thursday, March 6, doors 5:30 p.m.

Shíshálh Nation's foundation agreement with province renewed

On Jan. 29 the shíshálh Nation and the province announced completion of an addendum to their 2018 shíshálh Nation – British Columbia Foundation Agreement.

The foundation agreement, dated Aug. 16, 2024, is a 44-page document intended to be "a long-term phased agreement focused on government-to-government relations that recognize inherent rights and title" that renews every five years.

From the province's website:

"Through the agreement renewal, the province has committed to ongoing funding to support shishálh Nation's work in a number of initiatives, including:

- \$47.58 million over five years for economic development;
- \$15 million to support the construction of a cultural centre;
- \$8.83 million over five years for agreement implementation and further negotiations under the agreement:
- \$2.77 million over five years for environmental and cultural restoration work;
- \$1.85 million to implement and further develop water infrastructure initiatives on shishálh lands;
- \$1.6 million over five years for culture and language revitalization;
- Up to \$710,000 over four years towards a collaborative monitoring and enforcement program in the shíshálh swiya;
- \$500,000 to carry out environmental and ecological studies, and
- \$200,000 for infrastructure to support cultural initiatives.

In addition to funding, the renewal builds "a path for the next phase of the province and shishalh Nation's shared commitments," including:

• Identifying and transferring

provincial Crown lands to shishalh Nation for both cultural (100 hectares) and economic use (500 hectares);

- Exploring shared and exclusive decision-making opportunities;
- Supporting shíshálh Nation's economic development, culture and language, and
- Integrating existing updates to the dock management plan to respond to concerns and balance interests.

"This includes working together in the coming months to identify six square kilometres of provincial Crown land for transfer to shishalh Nation, with one square kilometre allocated for cultural use purposes and five square kilometres for economic development purposes."

The document also reaffirms the province's pledge to pursue negotiations granting the shishall aboriginal title over their traditional territory.

From the "shíshálh Nation – British Columbia Foundation Agreement Renewal" fact sheet:

"Shíshálh Nation and the province have agreed to negotiate and attempt to reach an agreement that recognises shíshálh Nation's Aboriginal title within shíshálh swiya.

"This marks the beginning of a multi-year process that will involve detailed negotiations, in-depth consultation and approval from decisionmaking bodies like cabinet.

"At this time, negotiations have not begun.

"If an agreement is negotiated and approved, it would then be implemented through legislation in the legislature of British Columbia and by shishálh Nation."

In a written response to the foundation agreement renewal provided to the *Harbour Spiel*, Sean McAllister of the Pender Harbour and Area Resi-

dents had this to say:

"The new agreement commits BC to negotiating recognition of shishalh Aboriginal title within our area.

"Specific lands have not yet been set but private property is not excluded.

"This update agreement is also the next step in negotiating 'exclusive' shíshálh decision making authority, meaning shíshálh could govern the general public in some areas."

McAllister said when the government recently recognized Aboriginal title on Haida Gwaii, they included provisions to supposedly protect private property.


"But legal experts are divided on its effect and we worry a First Nation might at minimum try to impose more taxes, control zoning, and maybe restrict whose properties can be sold to in future."

PHARA, through their lawyers at McMillan LLP, has filed a case in BC Supreme Court asking the court to declare the Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples Act, the province's framework for implementing their reconciliation agenda, as being unconstitutional.

McAllister said that they expect it to be heard this year.

SCRD appoints Tina Perreault as chief administrative officer

Senior employee Tina Perreault has been promoted to the Sunshine Coast Regional District's top job.

"After an extensive search which attracted candidates both nationally and internationally," on Feb. 4 the SCRD announced Perreault would assume the role of chief administrative officer.

Former CAO Dean McKinley resigned from his position last August.

McKinley joined the SCRD as the CAO in January 2020.

Perreault has been with the SCRD's finance division since 2008, working up through many roles to becoming the SCRD's chief financial officer in 2011 and general manager of corporate services in 2016.

Perreault has been in the CAO position on an interim basis since May 2024.

"We had over 40 candidates for this highly sought-after position, and after two rounds of interviews with candidates, Tina was the unanimous choice for the SCRD Board," said Alton Toth, SCRD board chair, in a statement.

"As a long-time member of our community, Tina knows the challenges and opportunities that exist within our region and we are confident that under Tina's leadership, the SCRD can continue to grow and thrive."

"Having raised my family on the Coast and called this community home for nearly 20 years, I hold a deep connection to this place and the vital work being done every day to deliver essential services," said Perreault.

"While we face significant challenges ahead, I am confident in the dedication and talent of the SCRD team.

"I am honoured to lead such a committed group and look forward

Perreault has taken up the permanent SCRD CAO role effective immediately.

Snowy winter roads

Snow plowing in our area is the responsibility of the Ministry of Transportation and Transit, which con-

tracts the service to Capilano Road Services with the following snowremoval criteria.

Snow removal is prioritized in order of an A-F classification unless the temperatures dives below -9°C.

Classes A and B (Highway 101) cannot have over six centimetres of snow, accumulation must be removed every two hours, and lanes must be bare within 36 hours.

Class C (Egmont, Garden Bay, Francis Peninsula, and Irvine's Landing Roads) cannot have over 10 centimetres of snow, accumulation must be removed every six hours, and lanes must be bare within 48 hours.

Classes D and E (other roads) don't require removal of 15 centimetres or less of snow.

Capilano almost always exceeds these requirements and did it again during our latest storm which dumped over 30 centimetres of snow and blocked roads with downed trees and power lines.

Their extraordinary efforts cleared access for hydro trucks and ambulances, regardless of road class, outside their contract requirements, and with equipment from Squamish.

CAO SEARCH SUCCESSFUL

The journey to hire a new chief administrative officer started last September and concluded with a Feb. 4 announcement of the appointment of Tina Perreault as the CAO of the SCRD.

We expected it would cost up to \$60,000 to fill the position, but we fine-tuned that to \$25,000 and hired Tall Cedars Recruitment, a professional headhunting agency in North Saanich, to get it done.

They found us over 40 serious candidates.

We shortlisted that to seven, then three, and Tina was our unanimous choice after the final interviews.

THE BUDGET IS ADOPTED

After months of fine-tuning to determine the SCRD portion of your 2025 property tax notice, a final budget was approved Feb. 13.

These sections of our provincial property tax notices detail where the

- Provincial service school, provincial rural tax and police tax;
- Local services (Egmont/Pender Harbour) bike, Pender Harbour library, fire, Sunshine Coast hospital, BC Assessment and municipal finance authority, and
- Parcel tax Pender Harbour pool debt and land charges such as North Pender Harbour water.

The SCRD portion of our 2025 property tax shows our share of a \$4.38 million Area A tax levy for SCRD local services, a \$219,331 (5.27 per cent) increase for all property classes, plus increases of 6.05 per cent on residential properties in all services except fire and water, 6.74 per cent on properties within the North Pender water service, 7.03 per cent on properties within the South Pender water service and 8.33 per cent on properties within the Egmont fire and water service.

School tax, provincial rural tax, police tax, Pender Harbour fire tax, and Sunshine Coast hospital tax are administered by the province or fire improvement district.

HEALTH CENTRE CORRECTION

I apologize for an error about Pender Harbour Health Centre funding in last month's "Lee Side."

Pender Harbour Health Centre was granted an increase of \$8,243 (4.36 per cent), not the \$76,175 stated in last month's column.

Writing the column after a day of discussions, I searched for a mistake in the documentation but couldn't find one, so I asked staff to double-check.

A day or so later they told me that our "last minute" decision to defer the health centre's funding request hadn't yet made it to the financial plan.

I scrambled to submit a correction, but it was too late, the *Harbour Spiel* had gone to the printer just a couple of hours before.

I apologize to our Health Centre representatives, noting that I understand the value of their services perhaps more than many because I was here when our hospital was moved to Sechelt, and I strongly believe we need to ensure our health centre continues to service our community.

CAPITAL BUDGET

The SCRD budgeted approximately \$138 million for capital and operational items, a 24.8 per cent increase in spending year over year.

Capital expenditures cover production or supply of goods and services for rental, administration, development, construction, maintenance, or repair of assets such as water treatment plants, water mains, buildings, and vehicles.

Our capital plan includes \$240,000 from property taxes (52.8 per cent reduction year over year) and \$67.9 million from debt proceeds, transfers, grants, and user fees.

Property taxes mostly fund stable expenses, reducing our need to subsidize capital, thus the 5.3 per cent tax increase with a 24.8 per cent budget increase.

With 74.9 per cent of our capi-

tal budget unspent for the past three years, we implemented initiatives to prioritize and fund priority projects and postpone or cancel the rest.

Operational expenditures include administration, wages and disposable items such as electricity and water treatment chemicals.

Our operations budget includes \$35.3M from property taxes and \$34.8M from parcel taxes, user fees, and grants.

We fell short of our budgeted operations expenditures by at least 7 per cent for many years and 2025 will likely be no different.





Rick Smalley

FEBRUARY 18, 1947 — JANUARY 9, 2025



With profound sadness and love, the family of Rick Smalley announces his death.

During a spectacular sunset on Jan. 9, his wife Jan and her supporters shared the peaceful passing of her best friend and husband, at age 77.

Throughout Smalley's life he was known by many names: Redhead Ricky, Dad, Grandpa, Bro', Husband, Hubby, Partner, Uncle Rick, Doc, Doc Holiday, the Dog Whisperer, Dr. Rick, Rotary Dad, mentor and soulmate.

Smalley joins those who died before him, including his father, mother, younger brother, daughter Keri, cousins, grandparents, friends, those who were like family, many four-legged buddies and animals in nature.

He is remembered for his compassion, generosity, love, mentorship, fantastic (sometimes dark) humour, humility, veterinary skills, tenacity, courage, legacy and faith.

Included are his sister Marilyn and family, his daughter Keri's mom Shirley (Smalley's first wife) and her husband Bruce, stepson Kirk and grandchildren Danielle and Evan LeBlanc, brother-in-law Glenn Sernyk, spiritual friend/family Myra Ferguson, cousin Judy Clements and many relatives and friends.

Smalley's Mom, known as Lil' March 2025 Mary, recalled the nightly ritual of toddler Ricky "tucking his nine stuffed animals into bed before squeezing into whatever room was let over."

Dreams of his veterinary medicine career started early in his life.

After two years in a pre-vet program at the University of Alberta and four more years at the University of Saskatchewan, he graduated as a Doctor of Veterinary Medicine in 1972.

He accepted his first position in Burnaby and learned "Coastal life" which included deep water scuba diving around Egmont, boating and completing flight school at Pitt Meadows Airport.

After three years he returned to Edmonton to establish Westbook Veterinary Clinic.

There he embarked on adventures with new friends on motorcycles, horseback and boats via Port Moody, to anchorages in coastal BC.

His most memorable times were when his teenage daughter Keri moved to Edmonton to enjoy farm life (in the city) with Jan and staff.

They helped maintain the historic Keillor Farm, its horses and community-based programs, for Whitemud Equine Centre.

Smalley felt honoured to live a portion of his life in the old log home as steward to help keep the aging facility alive.

After growing his vet business to a three-person practice, he sold the hospital and tried retirement, moving to Pender Harbour in the mid-1990s.

Smalley truly missed his connection with animals and eventually accepted offers to work locums for vets going on holidays.

He was so thankful when Keri relocated to BC and completed undergrad and graduate work closer to Pender.

Always active in the community, he served on the board of the P. H. Health Centre for seven years and was presented with the Paul Harris Fellowship award for his service to Rotary International's Pender Harbour club.

He and Jan committed to mentoring young people through work experience programs and summer jobs, hosting Rotary Youth exchange students, counselling and driving youth for leadership and camp programs.

Being true to his tenacious nature and with a risky business plan to service his community, he developed Madeira Park Veterinary Hospital.

With incredible support from his staff, clients and work experience students, Smalley hoped the hospital would remain after he was gone.

And so, it was to be.

Smalley requested that a celebration of his life take place in the spring of 2025, to bring family, community and friends together, to celebrate the ongoing work of Madeira Park Veterinary Hospital and to recognize the dedicated staff and community-minded, caring people and their animals.

His family extends its heartfelt appreciation to the team of dedicated doctors, nurses, and staff at VCH, Cowrie Medical Clinic and Pender Harbour and District Health Centre for their care and compassion.

Being the humble and kind guy that he was, Smalley requested that if donations are made, they go to one's charity of choice, remembering that it takes the whole village, and a whole lot of non-profit groups and stewards, to keep the community spirit alive.

A celebration of Rick Smalley's life for memory sharing, storytelling and some fun will take place at the Pender Harbour Community Hall (wheelchair and guide dog accessible) on Saturday May 3 at 2 p.m.



It is with heavy hearts that the family of Greg Gray shares the news of his sudden loss.

On Thursday, Jan. 23, his boat was found adrift and he was reported missing.

Shortly thereafter the Coast Guard found him in the inlet.

His family was "lucky to have him for 68 years but we always knew he belonged to the ocean."

Gray was born in Winnipeg to parents who served in World War II and was the youngest of three with two older brothers, Michael and Brian.

His family lived in multiple Canadian cities before settling in Vancouver in the early 1960s.

After high school, he moved north to Kitimat and worked at the Alcan aluminum smelter.

It was there he fell in love with boats.

He also met his first wife, Laurie, there and they moved to Jervis Inlet in 1985 and had their son Jarvis.

Later on, he met Annie and they started a family.

The couple farmed oysters and lived on a floathouse in Jervis Inlet before moving to Earls Cove so the kids could go to school.

Outside of his friends and family, boating was his life and how he made his living. Jervis Inlet was his favourite location and his resting place.

Gray loved taking people out on the water and sharing the bounty of the sea — prawns, oyster, crabs and fish.

He will be remembered for his storytelling, his amazing memory, his barbecue skills and how he showed up for the people in his life.

Gray is survived by his four children, Jarvis, James, Charlotte and Amelia and his beloved boat of 30-plus years, the *Arctic Courier*.

Gray's family would like to thank everyone in his life for their outpouring of love and support during this time.





PHHC: Bringing Partners to the Harbour

Over the past year the Pender Harbour Health Centre staff and leadership have been working purposefully to collaborate with our Sunshine Coast community partners to bring new resources, information and education to the Pender Harbour community. As your Community Health Centre we understand the importance of our role in bringing these partners to our patients and community locally here in Pender Harbour.

Already in 2025, we hosted the Sunshine Coast Community Response Network who provided a presentation on Excessive Clutter in January to 23

folks at the P. H. Community Hall.

Further, in February the PHHC hosted the Mobile Response Team from Vancouver who provided a facilitated workshop on grief and loss at the Health Centre for those working on the front-line of the toxic drug crisis in our community.

As we enter March, we would like to share with you

some important events from our partners in conjunction with the Pender Harbour Health Centre that are coming to the community this month:

John Dunlop's 1963 Peninsula Times column 'The Egmont Eye'

John Dunlop

John Dunlop wrote a regular column ("The Egmont Eye") in The Peninsula Times. John and Lily Dunlop purchased the Egmont Consumer Co-op Association store and renamed it Dunlop's Store (now Bathgate Resort and Marina) in 1954. The couple sold it to Jack and Bob Bathgate in June 1963.

"The longest way round is the shortest way home" — so goes the old proverb.

Each passing weekend demonstrates the inadequacy of the ferry system serving the Sunshine Coast between Horseshoe Bay and Langdale.

It is not uncommon for automobile traffic to be delayed four to six hours at either terminal, particularly so on holiday weekends.

The hourly summer service will certainly improve conditions but it is not the answer.

Weekend congestion will remain and angry, dissatisfied residents and visitors will increase.

Ask the owners of any resort on the peninsula what their clients have to say about the ferry system when they ultimately arrive at their destination, often at midnight or later, and after several hours in a car, in many cases with children.

Their remarks are far from complimentary and in many instances a telephone cancellation arrives in place of the expected guest.

With almost three quarters of a million population in the Lower Mainland area, and many of them seeking recreational space for their vacations, the Sunshine Coast is bound to get an increasing number of visitors.

Some will build summer homes while others will eventually seek retirement in our district.

The greater proportion, however,

will be those who wish to spend their vacations or part of their leisure time away from the maddening rush of the big city conditions.

The Sunshine Coast has everything to offer in the way of natural facilities for vacationers.

As more of the Lower Mainland's urban population becomes aware of this wonderful area, almost in their backyard, so will the facilities by which they reach the Sunshine Coast become more of a concern.

These facilities presently consist of two ferries in the summer months and one for the rest of the year.

No! Ferries across Howe Sound are not the answer to our transportation problems.

Possibly larger and faster vessels would help to alleviate the situation but they will not solve it.

We also need an overland route.
Capital expenditure and a year's operating costs of two suitable ferries would go a long way toward the construction of a Squamish to Port Mellon highway, a road link that must be built eventually.

Why not now?

The Honourable Mr. Gaglardi has already stated in public that construction of the Squamish-Port Mellon highway is included in his department's future planning.

He has stated that it definitely will be built but, like the good politician that he is, he did not say WHEN.

This column would suggest that NOW is the time for action.

Construction costs will certainly not be less in the foreseeable future.

Increasing automobile traffic to and from the Sunshine Coast, both local and tourist, has already demonstrated that the two ferries cannot cope with the repeating peak traffic periods. A highway around Howe Sound would not be detrimental to the ferry service, it would complement it.

Hundreds of Lower Mainland motorists, who avoid the district due to the long and frustrating delays at the ferry terminals, would have the choice of an alternate route.

Tourists would enjoy the scenic 70- to 80-mile drive and almost anyone, facing a long delay, would prefer to take the long way around.

Completion of this highway would open up new recreational areas and the provincial treasury would benefit from taxes on property, business and increased gasoline consumption.

Government, which after all, represents the people, should also be concerned.

"The squeaking wheel gets the grease," so let's do a little squeaking.

A united effort on the part of all organizations, business establishments and individuals who are interested in a highway route around Howe Sound is our only hope of success.


