

Preparing for the ride back down

The Coast has experienced phenomenal growth in the past few years.

While it's left us all brimming with wealth, it has also strained access to housing and services.

But it wasn't always like this.

A fresh crop of newcomers have yet to live through a crushing downturn in our micro-economy.

As regular as promises from BC Ferries to upgrade the Langdale run, every five to 10 years or so we seem to just crawl out of a slump only to stumble backwards into another one.

Many of you have never shopped at the IGA when there weren't full check out lines.

Or known times when local restaurants reduced hours because of a lack of customers — not a lack of staff.

But bad economic stuff has suddenly blown our inflation rate up to 8.1 per cent.

In 1981, Madeira Park had three banks and inflation hit 12.5 per cent.

The Bank of Canada recently raised its overnight lending rate a full point to 2.5 per cent and is expected to raise it another 0.75 per cent or more this fall.

In September 1981, it peaked at 21.46 per cent.

Back then I didn't know what interest rates were.

I was too busy mastering long division and working odd jobs to fulfil my financial obligations to the Columbia House Record and Tape Club.

But I do remember the stress in my parents' voices when they talked money.

COVID helped drive the BoC's prime rate (the interest rate that banks use to determine the interest rates for

loans and lines of credit) to record lows of 2.45 per cent in 2020.

Since then, it has arced up to 4.7 per cent.

Nobody expects prime to hit 22.75 per cent as it did in 1981 but we have been assured that rates are rising.

That should dent our hot housing market and the construction boom we've enjoyed over the past decade.

But don't take the shotgun out to the back shed just yet.

Current momentum should fuel employment for a while as legions of baby boomers and young families continue to exit the Lower Mainland.

But it's naive to think that the Coast's established pattern of cyclical boom and bust won't show itself again.

If you haven't been through a downturn in the local economy, here's what to expect.

First, there will be a lot of excavators for sale.

They're the glorious symbol of land development but when things go south, the newcomers who flood in during the good times start selling.

In the mid-2000s, just about everyone offered excavator services.

By 2011, only the familiar local names remained.

Where the rest moved on to, no-body knows.

Probably Fort Mac.

Downturns also bring fewer visitors and shipments of goods, which frees up space on our ferries.

Consequently, locals will reacquaint themselves with lost friends and relatives who live on the other side.

Housing prices will drop and approach parity with income levels.

In turn, landlords will covet tenants again, homelessness will be eased and tradespeople will return calls.

You'll like it.

Some Gunboat Bay docks ordered to be removed by Aug. 31

The owners of at least one Gunboat Bay property have until Aug. 31 to remove their docks according to a May 18 letter from the province.

Gunboat Bay is listed as a "red zone" in the Pender Harbour dock management plan, a controversial document handed down by the province in 2018 after consultation with the shishalh Nation.

Susan Armstrong told the *Har-bour Spiel* that because she and husband Craig were in Ireland, she didn't receive the letter until June.

The letter from Hugo Sloos, Coast area natural resource officer, said the province considers the Armstrong's dock as "occupying Crown land without authorization."

"The compliance review of information related to your dock or foreshore structure did not reveal any lawful justification or current authorization for the structure to occupy Crown land," wrote Sloos.

"Additionally, the structure is not eligible for authorization as it falls within zone 1 area under the Pender Harbour dock management plan."

An attached "trespass notice" threatens that failure to comply could bring \$1,000 in fines and removal of the structures by the province with associated costs "billed back to property owners through cost recovery mechanisms under the Land Act."

Like most of Gunboat Bay, the province lists her property as containing a registered archaeological site requiring a site alteration permit from the archaeology branch of the Ministry of Forests before before she can begin removing the dock.

Armstrong told the *Harbour Spiel* that at least four of her neighbours have received similar notices.

Armstrong knew the dock wasn't

permitted when they bought their property in 2015 but there was no way to get a permit at that time.

She said they've been in the dark ever since.

In 2003, the province initiated discussions about the management of docks in Pender Harbour with the shishálh Nation at which time they announced they were issuing a moratorium on new dock applications and renewals of current tenures.

Since April 2015 when the first draft of the shishall Nation and province's Pender Harbour dock management plan was released, residents questioned its politics and lack of consultation.

The DMP will eliminate many of the docks in zone 1, or red zone, (Gunboat Bay and western Francis Peninsula) while forcing dock owners in more favourable zones to rebuild theirs to meet new requirements.

Armstrong said that it wasn't until after they purchased the property that they learned the DMP designated Gunboat Bay as an area in which "new applications for docks or boathouses tenure will not be accepted."

"And then, about two years ago, we got a more official letter saying, "We are looking specifically at your property. Do you have any information to add?" said Armstrong.

"So, we said we only use the dock for swimming and to launch kayaks or paddleboards."

Armstrong's dock dries at low tide but her property drops into the ocean steeply so, without it, there is no practical way to access the water.

In an email, a Ministry of Forests spokesperson told the *Harbour Spiel*:

"The investigation into unauthorized docks is ongoing, and more notifications for zone 1 (the red zone) may be sent out in future.

"At this time, 16 landowners (or landowner groups) within zone 1 have been sent notices for noncompliance.

"There are numerous docks and structures within the red zone that are not in violation and will not be cleared."

When asked if an appeal mechanism is available, the ministry said:

"Yes. These trespass notices are eligible for judicial review through the BC Supreme Court."

"I feel for our neighbour," said Armstrong.

"She's 78 and stays in great shape swimming and kayaking every day and now she's been told to take her dock down as well."

Most burning activities now prohibited on the Coast

Effective July 15, most open burning activities are now prohibited throughout the Coastal Fire Centre's jurisdiction, which includes the Sunshine Coast.

Category 2 and category 3 open fires are now prohibited throughout the Coastal Fire Centre's jurisdiction.

This prohibition will be in place until Oct. 28, or until the order is rescinded.

A category 2 open fire refers to an open fire, other than a campfire, that:

- Burns material in one pile not exceeding two metres in height and three metres in width;
- Burns material concurrently in two piles each not exceeding two metres in height and three metres in width, or
- Burns stubble or grass over an area that does not exceed 0.2 hectares.

A category 3 open fire is an open fire that burns:

• Material concurrently in three or more piles each not exceeding two metres in height and three metres in width;

- Material in one or more piles each exceeding two metres in height or three metres in width:
 - One or more windrows, or
- Stubble or grass over an area exceeding 0.2 hectares.

Also prohibited are the activities listed below (Wildfire Act, section 12):

- Fireworks:
- Sky lanterns;
- Binary exploding targets;
- Burn barrels or burn cages of any size or description, and
 - Air curtain burners.

This prohibition does not apply to campfires that are a half-metre high by a half-metre wide or smaller, or to cooking stoves that use gas, propane or briquettes.

Anyone lighting a campfire must maintain a fireguard by removing flammable debris from around the campfire area and have a hand tool or at least eight litres of water available nearby to properly extinguish the fire.

The Coastal Fire Centre covers the

area west of the height of land on the Coast Mountain Range from the U.S.-Canada border at Manning Park, including Tweedsmuir South Provincial Park in the north, the Sunshine Coast, the Lower Mainland, Vancouver Island, the Gulf Islands and Haida Gwaii.

Anyone found in contravention of an open fire prohibition may be issued a violation ticket for \$1,150, required to pay an administrative penalty of up to \$10,000 or, if convicted in court, fined up to \$100,000 and may be sentenced to one year in jail.

If the contravention causes or contributes to a wildfire, the person responsible may be ordered to pay all firefighting and associated costs.

To report a wildfire, unattended campfire or open fire violation, call 1 (800) 663-5555 toll-free or *5555 on a cell phone.

Health centre society changes voting rules

Some are questioning recent changes to the voting structure of the not-for-profit society that manages the Pender Harbour Health Centre.

The health centre officially opened on Dec. 8, 1976 and is owned and operated by the Pender Harbour and District Health Centre Society (incorporated in 1974).

Last April, the PHDHCS passed a special resolution restricting voting on board matters to a maximum of 20 voting members.

Of those 20 voting members, eight will sit on the board of directors.

The remaining 12 will be chosen by the board and all 20 voting members get one vote on board matters.

Non-voting members can attend members meetings but not vote, and have some but not all participatory rights.

Les Falk, chair of the PHDHCS, told the Harbour Spiel that the BC government introduced the concept of voting and non-voting membership in 2016's Societies Act.

"Initially, non-profit societies were of the nature that they provided social services and they didn't have any business attributes," said Falk.

"As non-profits started having many more business characteristics, this broad change intended to streamline and modernize it."

As an example, Falk points to the Pender Harbour and District Health Centre Auxiliary Society, the organization that raises funds for the health centre through the Bargain Barn, which has set up a similar voting membership structure for its society.

Falk said it is hoped these changes will allow the board to react quicker to business matters by having a dedicated base from which to establish a quorum.

"It also provides the ability to utilize the voting members in committees and can provide a transition where, as people become familiar with the organization, they can be groomed for board membership," said Falk.

"So, it's an attempt to get closer involvement and a more reliable source of board members."

Falk said another key mandate of the society's governance structure is to maintain gender equity in both the board and voting membership.

Falk said the society still accepts, and encourages, non-voting members and there is no longer a fee involved.

Opponents (including a letter on p. 13) say they don't trust that PHHC business should be concentrated in so few voting members and have concerns about the lack of public consultation regarding the decision.

"Look, it's been absolutely concentrated during the time I've known it because it's just been the board," said Falk.

"In reality, this has the potential to open it up to additional contributions."

Andreas Tize (Roberts Creek), Mark Hiltz (West Howe Sound), and Bill Beamish (SCRD director and Gibsons mayor) will not be seeking re-election and are moving on to focus on other commitments and situations.

Democracy is fragile, as recent events have shown, and it's up to each of us to recognize that and, at least, vote when we have the opportunity.

FIRE SEASON IS UPON US

The recent Egmont wildfire showed us that, in spite of a cool and

rainy spring, risk quickly elevates with a bit of warm, dry weather.

Both droughts and wildfires are becoming more common even here on the Sunshine Coast.

Pender-Egmont is currently under an open-fire ban for all but campfires 0.5 metres high by 0.5 metres wide or smaller.

Restrictions change quickly, depending on environmental conditions, and may progress to a complete openfire ban and possibly closures of lakes, parks and backcountry areas.

Check before lighting any open fire and note that it is illegal to burn construction waste or toxic material and garbage unless authorized by written permit.

Restrictions are described in the BC Wildfire Act, BC Wildfire Regulation, BC Environmental Management

\$6 MILLION GRANT TOWARDS WATER METER INSTALLATION

Water supply is a challenge on the Sunshine Coast and water meters are proven to reduce water use by 20 to 30 per cent, so they are in our future if not here already.

Meters identify previously unknown leaks and allow more efficient repair of leaks as their location is quickly found.

Meters also allow users to reduce their consumption habits as they can see where water is being unnecessarily wasted.

The first two stages of meter installation in the North and South Pender water systems are complete, with funding provided by provincial and federal grants.

Because there were no grants available to install nearly 5,000 water meters in the Sechelt area serviced by the Chapman water system, the SCRD authorized borrowing up to \$7.2 million over 15 years, to be repaid through rate increases for everyone in

the regional water service, including Earls Cove/Egmont users.

Last month the SCRD applied for a \$6 million Canada Community-Building grant towards the universal water metering project, which will cover about 80 per cent of the costs and thus reduce the need for borrowing.

We expect a formal decision and approval before year-end, and will soon issue requests for proposals on this multi-year project partially funded by the province and slated to begin by early next year.

APPLIANCE DISPOSAL UPDATE

Disposal of large household appliances at the Pender Harbour Transfer Station now costs \$150/tonne and \$30/item containing freon, but we're hoping to offer the service free of charge by the end of the year.

The SCRD is in discussions with the Major Appliance Recycling Roundtable about their program for large household appliance recycling in BC, which would allow us to end the current charges.

TEXTILES RECYCLING UPDATE

GRIPS no longer accepts textiles because the Return-It textiles program was discontinued.

Clothing donated to the Bargain Barn and Egmont Thrift Store not sold to the public, previously taken to GRIPS for free recycling, will now likely be discarded as garbage at an additional expense to everyone.

The SCRD is currently exploring other options to make textile recycling available free of charge at the Pender Harbour Transfer Station and other locations.

His family will miss watching him meticulously prep a meal and his celebration of their successes with such pride and love.

He adored all the children in the family, taking an interest in everything they did.

His family pledges to continue to make him proud by reflecting on the joie de vivre that was so apparent in his attitude towards life.

What you need to know if you are taking blood thinners

We all look forward to this time of year and part of summer's appeal is the variety of fresh greens and vegetables available from the garden.

But for some, the increased intake of vitamin K in foods from the garden can cause problems.

Folks who take warfarin (Coumadin) might find fluctuations in the results of their international normalized ratio blood tests.

This month's article is aimed at helping those on warfarin enjoy the fruits (and vegetables) of their labour, with minimal fluctuations in their INR level.

WARFARIN

Warfarin is a medication used to reduce the formation of blood clots.

It is prescribed for conditions such as irregular heartbeat, artificial heart valves, clotting in the veins, post heart attack and stroke.

Too much warfarin may lead to serious bleeding and too little will not prevent clotting.


To prevent this from occurring, your doctor will request that you have frequent blood (INR) tests.

Your doctor will determine the range of INR that is right for you and decide how frequently it should be checked.

You should take your medication at the same time everyday, and store it in a cool dry place (i.e. not in the bathroom cabinet).

There are many factors that can affect your INR including illness, heavy alcohol consumption and use of herbs and supplements.

Common over-the-counter products that can affect your INR are



Aspirin, Tylenol, ibuprofen (including Motrin, Advil, Aleve etc.) and herbs such as gingko, danshen and devil's claw.

All of these can increase the effect of warfarin so you need to discuss this first with your doctor.

VITAMIN K

Vitamin K helps our blood clot.

Therefore an increase in vitamin K will cause warfarin to be less effective leading to possible complications.

The best way to avoid these problems is to keep the vitamin K content of your diet consistent.

You shouldn't avoid vitamin K rich foods but simply ensure that the content in your diet remains consistent.

Should you introduce big chang-

es to your diet, you should inform your doctor.

OTHER SUMMER CONSIDERATIONS

Summer is also a time where we engage in new activities that may result in injury.

Be aware of injuries that result in new bruising and bleeding.

Continue to use soft toothbrushes and brush softly, as well use an electric razor if possible.

If you have any bruising or bleeding concerns, contact your family doctor as soon as possible.

If your have to see any other health care providers like specialists, emergency room physicians, dentists or pharmacists etc., make sure to tell them you are taking warfarin.



Tips from the SCRD's 'Good Neighbour Guidelines,' No. 6



The Sunshine Coast Regional District's "Good Neighbour Guidelines" provide thoughtful recommendations and a summary of SCRD bylaws governing neighbourhood issues intended to protect and enhance the peaceful enjoyment of our community.

If you have any questions or require more information regarding specific bylaws, visit www.scrd.ca/bylaws, or call the SCRD at (604) 885-6800. While informal communication with neighbours is the best way of addressing many neighbourhood concerns, in situations where this is not a viable option, contact the SCRD to make an inquiry, or to file a complaint for investigation.

RESPONSIBLE PET OWNERSHIP

DOG LICENSING

The SCRD encourages responsible pet ownership through licensing, public education and enforcement.

Although there is no dog control service in Pender Harbour and Egmont, the SCRD provides dog control services in Halfmoon Bay, Roberts Creek, Elphinstone, Sechelt Indian Government District, and West Howe Sound.

Keats Island is the only island in West Howe Sound that receives the dog control service.

The SCRD issues your dog a "permanent tag" — you will not receive a new tag every year.

Dog licences are valid from Jan. 1 to Dec. 31.

A licence for spayed or neutered dogs is \$25 while a licence for an unaltered dog is \$50.

Dog licences purchased after Jan. 31 double in price.

A senior discount of two per cent applies to individuals aged 65 or older.

DOGS RUNNING AT LARGE

The dog control officer responds to complaints from the public regarding violations of the Sunshine Coast Regional District Dog Regulation and Impounding Bylaw.

To report a dog running at large or to file a complaint, please call the SCRD dog control officer at (604) 885-6817 or email *bylaw.compli*-

ance@scrd.ca.

Dogs found running at large can be impounded and taken to the Sunshine Coast Branch of the BC SPCA located at 4376 Solar Road (off Field Road in Sechelt) where the dog will be cared for until it is collected by its owner.

Impoundment fees start at \$60, and for vicious dogs, the fee starts at \$250.

LOST PETS AND NUISANCES

If your pet has gone missing, or you are in the possession of a stray pet, please contact the Sunshine Coast Branch of the BC SPCA at (604) 740-0301 or a local veterinarian.

When off their property, pet owners must pick up and properly dispose of their animal's waste.

Owners must ensure that their animals do not disturb neighbours by barking or howling.

A good way to make sure you are reunited with your lost pet is to get a dog licence.

PETS IN PUBLIC PLACES

Dogs must be on a leash in all SCRD parks, sports fields, and trails as per the parks regulation bylaw.

Make sure that dogs are wearing a licence tag on their collar and all dogs must be under the control of their handler at all times.

Keep pets away from streams — animal waste is polluting and harmful to wildlife and the environment.

Pets entering streams can erode stream banks, cause siltation and disturb wildlife.

Dogs are not permitted on playgrounds, waterparks and cemeteries.

Owners should not leave their pet unattended in a vehicle unless there is suitable ventilation and weather conditions are appropriate.

When in a vehicle, a pet's movement must be restricted to prevent access to people outside the vehicle.




