Our failing ferry system

Now that winter has taken firm hold of the Coast, our summer's ferry

horrors are fading from memory.

Or are they?

The off-season once offered respite but I've noticed it's not uncommon, even mid-week, for too many cars to be left after the ferry pulls out.

In October, friends who live on the Coast but have a business in town arrived at Horseshoe Bay in the midafternoon and were told they wouldn't get on a ferry until 11 p.m.

Because it was an unplanned work trip, with an unknown schedule, reservations were impossible.

When introduced, I recall reservations were capped at 15 per cent.

Now, according to BC Ferries, the percentage of available deck space for reservations varies from 45 per cent to 75 per cent.

Unfettered access to ferry travel is vital to a micro-economy that has evolved over many decades to be dependent on the Lower Mainland.

By ignoring capacity issues and pursuing expansionist reservation policies, BC Ferries is hurting residents in favour of those who have the luxury of planning — like visitors who book their holidays and subsequent accommodation months out.

Instead of recognizing this, the SCRD board voted unanimously in April to endorse BC Ferries' proposed trial to bump Langdale's reservations to 95 per cent capacity.

Residents fussed, the trial was snuffed and BCF went away butthurt.

Now, BCF deflects criticism by labelling passenger complaints of missed appointments or suffering in 35C heat the result of poor planning.

"Not our fault — shoulda got a reservation," they chastise.

Clearly they aim get as close to 100 per cent reservations as they can.

And why not?

It hides those messy overloads and the optics of having hundreds of cars stacked outside the terminal.

But the casualty is the convenient access people who live, work and raise kids on the Coast depend on.

Instead of leaving an hour and a half before a sailing, the casual passenger may need to leave two or three or more hours ahead to get on.

Or, they won't go at all.

Absent from this discussion is the daily reality of residents forced to make a sudden trip for a mechanical part, a last-minute opening for a medical procedure or a family illness.

If there was only someone who could speak up for us.

Since 2003, MLA Nick Simons has had a unique perspective from serving a riding with five BCF routes.

But to say he has been ineffective at relaying the severity of our transportation issues to his government is letting him off too lightly.

In 2018, BC Ferries promised Coast residents that by 2024, we would see two-vessel service on the Langdale-Horseshoe Bay route.

Since it's almost 2022, I tried to contact a BCF spokesperson to confirm this commitment is still intact, but their website was down — all day.

By the time it came back online, it was late in the week and I haven't received a reply by press time.

But I think I know the answer — the whole thing is broken.



Body of pilot in Killam Bay helicopter crash recovered Oct. 18

RCMP have confirmed that the body of a pilot who died when their helicopter crashed and sank in Jervis Inlet Oct. 4 was recovered on Oct. 18.

In an email to the *Harbour Spiel*, Dean Campbell, Transportation Safety Board of Canada spokesperson, wrote the wreckage was also recovered that day and delivered to a facility on Oct. 19 for further examination by the TSBC.

RCMP did not release the name of the pilot and lone occupant who went down with the Kaman K-Max helicopter at a heli-logging operation in Killam Bay.

At approximately 2 p.m. on Oct. 4, the Sunshine Coast RCMP were contacted by the RCMP West Coast Marine section that there had been a distress call made regarding a suspected helicopter crash in Killam Bay.

Witnesses arrived within minutes and some debris was found but the pilot couldn't be located.

A search was conducted in the area without success.

The Joint Rescue Coordination Centre was immediately involved along with the Coast Guard from Powell River.

In an Oct. 5 statement, the RCMP confirmed they were working with several partners in the investigation including Transport Canada, and the BC Coroner's Service who "has been made aware of the crash, and the belief that there is a fatality involved."

The TSBC said the helicopter was operated by Black Tusk Helicopters Inc. based in Brackendale.

The recovery of the body and wreckage was delayed by poor weather and the depth at the crash site, estimated to be approximately 150

metres deep.

"The investigation is ongoing and at this point is determined to be a Class 4, which typically have a target timeline of 220 days," said Campbell.

"However, the initial evaluation is still ongoing and this classification could change, which would potentially change target timelines."

According to the TSBC website, Class 4 investigations are "limited in scope, and while the final reports may contain limited analysis, they do not contain findings or recommendations."

Pender Rotary proposes signage project in Tyner Park

The SCRD has agreed to support a proposal by the Rotary Club of Pender Harbour to install "storybook interpretive signs" along the Lily Lake Trail in SCRD's Tyner Park.

In a letter to the SCRD dated April 25, 2021, the Rotary club requested approval to design and install approximately 21 signs as part of their proposed "Storybook Walk Interpretive Signage Project."


The club has agreed to pay for the cost associated with installation and future maintenance of the signage.

In a staff report delivered to the SCRD planning and development committee meeting on Oct. 21, Kevin Clarkson, SCRD parks superintendent, recommended that the SCRD support the project provided they adhere to conditions outlined by the shishálh Nation, acquire all neccessary funding and permits and enter into a "construction agreement/operating agreement" with the SCRD.

In the report, Clarkson wrote that Rotary foresees including stories from the shishalh Nation and which has engaged with the band and has received support in principle for the project.

If the project moves goes ahead, Pender's Rotary club will maintain ownership of the signs and be responsible for costs associated with their repair and or removal.

On Oct. 21, the committee accepted the staff recommendation to


proceed with the project providing the conditions were met.

Thieves struck Madeira Park's Rona rental shop on Oct. 18 in what Sunshine Coast RCMP are calling a "significant break and enter."

According to RCMP, thousands of dollars of Stihl chainsaws, leaf blowers, Hilti drill kits, and a Firman generator along with other items were stolen from the store.

The break in occurred at approximately 3 a.m. to 3:30 a.m. Monday, Oct. 18.

Two male suspects were driving a white SUV, possibly a Dodge Journey.

Police are still investigating and reviewing surveillance video including the photos pictured here.

RCMP said that despite the poor quality of the images, they hope someone may recognize the suspects or the vehicle.

Winter is coming

The rainy season is upon us once again and along with it comes requests to the SCRD for road

repairs caused by water damage and urgent demands for snow removal after a storm.

But, the SCRD isn't responsible for road maintenance, so these requests fall upon deaf ears.

The Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure is responsible for roads maintenance including filling potholes, plowing, and repairing damage to road beds and surfaces.

MOTI finances the work and contracts Capilano Highway Services to perform it.

If Capilano's attention is needed, contact them at *info@capilanohigh-ways.ca* or (604) 983-24115.

If we receive a substantial snowfall this year, remember that removal is prioritized by road classification:

- A) High-volume arterial;
- B) Main highways, i.e., Hwy. 101 and Madeira Park Road;
- C) Bus and industrial routes, i.e., Egmont, Garden Bay, Francis Peninsula, and Irvine's Landing Roads, and

D/E) Rural routes, e.g., Panorama, Bear Bay, Warnock, Dubois.

Class B is Capilano's priority; they cannot have over six centimetres of snow in travelling lanes, accumulations must be removed every two hours, and lanes must be bare 36 hours after a snowfall when the pavement is -9°C or warmer.

Class C roads cannot have over

10 centimetres of snow in travelling lanes, accumulations must be removed every six hours, and lanes must be bare 48 hours after a snowfall when the pavement is -9°C or warmer.

Classes D and E are the lowest priority; accumulations of 25 centimetres or less don't have to be removed.

Capilano workers keep our highways in a condition to allow safe passage, and usually they significantly exceed their contract terms, leading us to expect it, but circumstances beyond their control occasionally prevent it.

WASTEWATER WOES

Wastewater plant failures cause a real mess, not only physically but financially, and the SCRD owns and operates eight Pender Harbour plants, with a ninth scheduled for 2022.

These stand-alone plants are "gifted" to the SCRD by the developers, and residents using the plants pay maintenance and replacement costs.

The challenge is to anticipate failures and plan for dealing with upgrades when they happen.

Ideally, an adequate capital cost reserve will be in place before a plant fails, to prevent a bump in utility bills when infrastructure must be replaced.

The 2019 wastewater service review identified the Merrill Crescent and Greaves Road plants as most in need, and a recent performance report showed that minor improvements will mitigate issues and add 10 to 30 years to each plant's lifespan.

These projects will likely be in the 2022/23 budget, and we will apply for grants to conduct studies to identify challenges facing other plants.

HEARING THE PUBLIC

Land development projects begin when the proponent discusses their proposal with SCRD planning and development department staff.

If the proposed development doesn't meet official community plan and land-use/zoning bylaw requirements, either or both must be amended, requiring public hearings and staff reports and recommendations.

Applications are referred to the advisory planning commission, First Nations, and sometimes other agencies for comment and further information, which generates an updated staff

report including wording for a possible bylaw amendment.

This goes to committee and board for first reading and, if passed, scheduling of a public hearing and community input to consider factors such as the housing crisis, economy, and demographic shifts.

After the hearing and subsequent staff reports, the proposal is considered for third reading and then approved or defeated.

A defeated proposal may be modified for resubmission, and then the whole process is repeated.

Two recent public hearings sparked controversy over unpopular density increases versus the need for more housing but both failed to meet the local government acts.

Both hearings must now be repeated because, with one, written submissions were omitted from the staff report and, with the other, the *Coast Reporter* forgot to run the second ad

for the hearing.

After the new hearings, the bylaws will go for third reading, but some residents believe the delays were orchestrated — an attempt by staff to facilitate development.

Director Tize commented, accurately, that staff has no skin in the game; they aren't paid more for successful applications, they don't need to create more work for themselves, and they are bound by a professional code of ethics.

It is the board who decides whether an application passes or fails.

Peter James Paget

DECEMBER 7, 1946 — SEPTEMBER 20, 2021



Peter Paget died Sept. 20 at home surrounded by family.

Paget was pre-deceased by his father Alan, mother Nancy, brother David, dear friend and best man at his wedding, Dan, and his beloved border collie Jake.

He leaves behind his wife and co-adventurer, Heather, brother George Paget (Barb Gabrielson), stepdaughter Leslie Street (Chris Dick), grandson Liam Street, niece Katharine McMillin (Mario Ayala), great niece Olivia Crombie, great nephew Elliott Crombie, brother-in-law Bob McMillin (Andrea Newsom), sister-in-law Elaine Paget (widow of David), niece Alison Gomez (Hector), great niece Sofia, great nephew Sebastian, nephew Derek Paget (Kari), great niece Skylie and his niece Jennifer and her family.

Many friends from Pender Harbour as well as the Lower Mainland, USA, New Zealand, Australia and Austria will have fond memories of him as well.

Paget was born and raised in Vancouver, attended Prince of Wales and (on occasion) UBC, graduating with a degree in mathematics with an emphasis on computer science.

He was a keen skier in his youth, boarding the bus at age 11 in Kerrisdale with his skis over his shoulder and busing to Grouse Mountain.

High school and university courses were planned around ski trips and parties organized by "Chief."

His love of travel started on a solo trip to Europe in 1964 at age 17, departing on the Cunard ship *Carmania*.

Interestingly, his later wife Heather sailed on the same ship two weeks earlier on a tour and though the two didn't meet until 1979, they saw and experienced many of the same things while first travelling.

In his last year of university, he convinced a group of friends to buy the sailboat *Galadriel*, and sail around the world.

The five of them left False Creek from Clay's Marina on Sept. 18, 1971 but Paget was the only one who completed the circumnavigation, eventually returning to Vancouver.

While home in March 1979, in order to earn more money to continue cruising, Paget gave a talk and slide show at the Jib Set sailing club.

Future wife Heather was taking lessons there and attended his presentation and was so fascinated by the idea of travelling like a turtle and taking your house with you that she

introduced herself after the show and the rest is history.

He returned to his boat in June 1979 but came back to Vancouver in May 1980 when Mt. St. Helen's blew up.

The couple worked to buy their 40-foot ketch *Harmonie II* before sailing away in 1989.

They arrived in New Zealand in late 1990 where they stayed until 1999.

After completing their circumnavigation, the two arrived back in Vancouver in 2002.

Paget's favourite place was French Polynesia — he loved the warm tropical breezes and the beautiful islands.

After living on Bowen Island for a few years, they eventually sold their New Zealand property and the Bowen Island house and retired to Madeira Park.

Paget was extremely happy here, especially when he could escape south in the winter to California or Mexico.

He loved *Harmonie II* but sold it to good friends for a proper restoration and bought *Slow Dance* (*Northern Hunter*) from another good friend for retirement cruising.

He also had to have a racy little sailboat so *Dark Horse* soon joined his fleet.

Paget's father had a plaque made for his first voyage quoting Robert Louis Stevenson:

"Perpetual devotion to what a man calls his business is only to be sustained by perpetual neglect of many other things."



Be aware of the black bear

The American black bear (*Ursus americanus*) is abundant throughout the Sunshine Coast and never more so than in the fall when they sometimes come into conflict with humans in their search for calories to store fat for the winter.

It's estimated that B.C.'s healthy black bear population is about 120,000 to 160,000.

There are an estimated 900,000 black bears in North America and they can be found in Mexico, 41 states of the United States, and all the provinces and territories of Canada except Prince Edward Island.

Despite that, conflicts resulting in human deaths are rare.

According to bear.org, black

bears have killed 61 people across North America since 1900.

But it isn't the same case for the bears.

According to a recent CTV News story, this past August, BC conservation officers killed an average of 2.4 black bears per day.

From 2016 to 2020, an average of 494 bears were destroyed each year.

By early September 2021, 236 black bears were killed by conservation officers across the province.

Provincial statistics posted in September noted over 3,500 calls to BC's Conservation Officer Service in August.

Of the 74 bears killed in BC that month, the majority were considered by BCCOS to be "food conditioned,"

or bears that learned to associate humans with food.

A number of organizations, including the Sunshine Coast Bear Alliance, are calling for more preventive measures, educational tools and rehabilitation prior to lethal measures.

They are also pushing the BC-COS to increase fines and press charges to individuals and organizations guilty of providing wildlife attractants.

This past summer, a Whistler woman received the highest penalty ever imposed under B.C.'s Wildlife Act — a combined \$60,000 fine — for feeding bears in her backyard in the summer of 2018.

She believed she was helping the animals but the three bears were subsequently euthanized.

To avoid conflicts that will result in a bear's euthanization, the Sunshine Coast Bear Alliance recommends managing the following bear attractants around your home:

- · Unsecured garbage;
- · Unsecured recycling;
- · Bird feeders:
- · Fruit trees and berry bushes;
- · Barbeques including grease traps;
- Vehicles with food remnants, food wrappers, scented air fresheners;
- · Pet food;
- Citronella candles;
- Vegetable gardens;

- · Bee houses;
- · Compost;
- · Backyard chickens and other livestock;
- · Salt or mineral blocks, and
- · Petroleum products.



Harbour Spiel, Nov. 2011: Economist speaks on Coast's future



This story originally appeared in the Nov. 2011 issue of the Harbour Spiel.

As the rest of the economy goes, so go

the fortunes of the Sunshine Coast.

That's a quick summary of a report on the future business environment for the Sunshine Coast prepared by the Central 1 Credit Union.

Central 1 chief economist Helmut Pastrick, presented the report to over 100 community members in an invitation only event sponsored by the Sunshine Coast Credit Union at West Sechelt's Holy Family Catholic Church on Oct. 18.

Central 1 Credit Union is the central financial facility and trade association for the B.C. and Ontario credit union systems.

Pastrick's presentation relied on mostly hard data pulled from such sources as the Census of Canada, Statistics Canada, B.C. Stats, Landcor Data Corp and the Real Estate Board of Greater Vancouver.

The report did not include the most recent (2011) census data which is not yet available.

For the most part, Pastrick confirmed what most already understand
— the Sunshine Coast is dependent
on external economic pressures and
the trend toward an aging demographic will continue.

But the report also provided a variety of tables taking a deeper look at what some of these trends mean to the Sunshine Coast.

REPORT HIGHLIGHTS

• Non-employment sources of income account for more than 40 per cent of total income, with pension in-

come the largest source, reflecting the demographic makeup of the region.

- The large difference between employed by place of residence and employed by place of work suggests a substantial mobile or commuter segment.
- The private sector is generally populated by smaller enterprises with the majority of businesses in the SCRD having no employees; firms with employees are generally small.
- By far, the strongest gains in net business formation during the decade were in the construction industry.
- B.C.'s economic growth is moderate through to 2014 followed by a pickup to about 3.5 per cent annual growth between 2015 and 2018
- The SCRD's industry growth leaders in the next 10 years are construction, real estate, retail trade, and professional/technical services.

Below-average growth is forecast in logging, agriculture, aquaculture, health, education, and public administration.

- Migration will continue to be the main source of growth and will remain driven by demographics and the business and housing cycles.
- Total population is projected to top 36,000 in 2021, up 20 per cent from 2010.

The SCRD's high quality of life and proximity to Metro Vancouver's aging population will lift net migration along with growth in professionals able to work remotely.

Those aged 65 and up will account for 30 per cent of the population (or 11,000 persons) in 2021, up from 20 per cent and 5,800 persons in 2006.

• Between the 2001 and 2006 census, population growth was strongest in Electoral Area A (Egmont/Pender Harbour) which observed a

10.5 per cent gain in the population level. The District of Sechelt grew by 8.7 per cent.

- The median age in the SCRD is projected to reach a peak of 52.3 years of age in 2025, up from 50.4 in 2010.
- While B.C.'s population is projected to rise by 21 per cent between 2010 and 2025 (representing average annual growth of 1.3 per cent), the SCRD is projected to expand by 15 per cent over the same period.
- There is a large share of external ownership suggesting a large contingent of recreation or second vacation homes.

By examining property records showing owners with a different address than the property itself, it can be estimated that roughly 54 per cent of homes on the Sunshine Coast were owned by non-local individuals in 2010.

The vast majority of external ownership can be traced to Metro Vancouver.

New data from Canada's 2021 census will be disseminated in seven "themed" release dates starting with the first on Feb. 9, 2022. ~ ed.

Donley's Landing

Robert Donley's first store at Donley's Landing, Pender Harbour. It was built in 1913 on the harbour side of Beaver Island at the bottom of what today would be Hassan Road. In 1915 it became Pender Harbour's first school. All children attending the school would arrive by boat, even those from nearby Whiskey Slough as trails to the site had yet to be created.

According to *Women of Pender Harbour*, "Martha Warnock's recollection of the school roll included 10 names: May Dames, Ida Donley, Bill Donley, Harley Duncan, Theresa Gonsalves, Norman Lee, Billy May, Susie Page, Charlie Page and Fred Warnock."

Shingles facts and treatment

WHAT IS SHINGLES?

Shingles is a skin rash caused by the same virus that causes chickenpox.

After a person has chickenpox, the virus lives dormant in the nervous system and is never fully cleared from the body.

Under certain circumstances, such as stress, or when your immune system is suppressed, the virus reactivates and causes shingles.

Anyone who has had chickenpox is at risk for developing shingles, although it occurs mostly in those over 60 years of age.

WHAT ARE THE SYMPTOMS AND SIGNS OF SHINGLES AND HOW LONG DO THEY LAST?

Even when there is no rash, the pain of shingles may be apparent.

Before the rash appears the patient may notice several days to a week of burning and sensitive skin.

Shingles starts as small blisters on a red base, with new blisters continuing to form for three to five days.

The blisters follow the path of individual nerves that come out of the spinal cord and appear in a band like pattern on an area of the skin.

Generally only one nerve is involved.

The duration of the outbreak may take three to four weeks from start to finish.

On occasion, pain will be present but the blisters may never appear.

IS SHINGLES CONTAGIOUS?

Yes, shingles is contagious.

Shingles can spread from an affected person to babies, children or adults who have not had chickenpox.



If you've had chickenpox, you cannot catch shingles from someone else.

Once infected, people have the potential to develop shingles later in life.

Shingles is contagious to people who have not previously had chickenpox as long as there are new blisters forming and old blisters healing.

Similar to chickenpox, the time prior to healing or crusting of the blisters is the contagious stage.

IS THERE A VACCINE TO PREVENT SHINGLES?

Yes.

The vaccine for prevention of shingles is called Zostavax.

WHAT CAN I DO IF I GET SHINGLES?

If you are suspicious that you have the signs and symptoms of shingles you need to get to a doctor ASAP.

It is crucial for you to get diagnosed and started on antiviral medication within 48 hours of the start of your symptoms.

Your doctor may also order steroids to reduce your symptoms.


