SCRD budget will please the cynics

Cynicism comes easily when assessing the performance of local government.

Faced with an increasingly complex regulatory system, we outsiders often rush to judge without fully understanding the bureacratic constraints SCRD staff work under.

Despite that hazard, it's a healthy excercise to question what value we receive for the spending decisions that are made on our behalf down at Field Road.

And there's never a better time to do it than during budget deliberations.

Like all of us, the SCRD is battling escalating costs.

Taxation funding for the 2019 budget increased 6.47% from 2018.

Then, in 2020, it dropped by 4.7%. Since then it has risen substantially each year — by 15.63% in 2021, 7.42% in 2022, 11.7% in 2023 and 12.55% last year.

What should we expect when the 2025 budget is delivered in February?

Preliminary estimates for 2025 portend an 11.3 per cent tax hike for Area A.

Though the list of proposed projects may receive further trimming before final budget approval, some of the costs might make you go, "Huh?"

I wasn't the only one to spot this zinger in a recent staff report estimating \$35,000 to replace an eyewash station in the Pender Pool mechanical room.

It's a WorkSafeBC necessity but the most expensive unit I could find includes a shower from a reputable industrial safety equipment firm for \$2,793.

That leaves \$32,000 for the install. Plumbers don't work cheap but if a contractor charged \$500 an hour, they would have eight full days to complete the work before exhausting their budget.

Then there's \$60,000 budgeted for the SCRD's recruitment of a new CAO.

And, if you want another reason why government costs are ballooning these days, consider reconciliation.

In the service agreement to install

1,837 water meters in Sechelt, \$681,261 (excluding GST) was budgeted for archaeological monitoring by the shìshàlh Nation.

The project was 71% completed when a Nov. 28 staff report requested a further \$255,068 because the Nation estimated that "an additional 35% funding will be required to complete the program as many of the remaining meter sites are in archeological high potential areas."

Though 10% of the project's cost—almost \$1 million—will be paid to the same outfit that demands the work to be completed in the first place, I don't expect to ever learn what high value archeological evidence turned up.

Remember warnings about the future costs of ignoring Japanese knotweed?

The 2025 list of proposed projects includes "noxious weed removal" at John Daly Park in Kleindale as an "ongoing financial implication requiring \$63,100 funded through taxation and ongoing annual maintenance of a further \$33,000."

And there's an ominous hint about future costs of water for North Pender in Area A director Len Lee's column (p. 8):

"Climate change... could cause the need for major upgrades to the Garden Bay treatment system (a preliminary estimate is over \$9 million)."

Also in this issue, on p. 11, a letter writer questions the estimate of \$820,000 to replace the Vinebrook Creek bridge (Suncoaster Trail above Sakinaw Lake).

And, there's four more in Cliff Gilker Park which, according to the *Coast Reporter* (July 16), after a \$38,000 consultant's opinion, "Staff have recommended a \$1.67 million plan to replace the upper waterfall and gorge bridges, make accessibility upgrades and repairs to trails and decommission the lower waterfall and zig-zag bridges."

We can't just blame the SCRD for this stuff — liability and committees of do-gooders at all levels of government have created standards that are out of touch with practical and financial reality.

But it seems no one is even making an effort to reign it in.



PHARA gauging support for community garden tax garden funding

The Pender Harbour and Area Residents Association is circulating a petition to gauge resident support for a tax increase to fund ongoing maintenance of the "Pender Harbour Community Gardens."

The non-binding petition describes itself as an "informal expression of interest" of support for the tax increase.

At a PHARA town hall meeting in Oct. 2023, director Bill Charlton provided an update on the current state of funding and maintenance of the Madeira Park community gardens around the Pender Harbour Community Hall and at the entrance to Madeira Park.

Up to that point, Charlton said, much of the maintenance and the cost of the gardens had been borne by Don Fraser who developed the vision for Madeira Park's lush vegetation.

Charlton also presented a proposal to build new gardens at the Kleindale crossroads, P. H. Health Centre and in downtown Garden Bay.

At that time, Charlton estimated the annual cost of ongoing maintenance at \$60,000 to \$100,000 per year.

A show of hands indicated broadsupport for an average increase of property tax of an estimated \$24 per year to cover that bill.

The current petition requests support for a "support a small increase

of \$35 to \$45 in your annual property tax."

In an email, Charlton told the *Harbour Spiel* that their initial estimate on costs were over a year old and "we anticipate these going up by the time the SCRD proposal gets to the final stage, when the SCRD gets to develop its own cost estimate, which is likely a year or two away."


Charlton said that at that time, another survey will be put forward with current cost estimates and tax proposals

If PHARA is successful in gathering 1,000 signatures (limited to one signature per household), which is

roughly 50 per cent of resident households in Area A, the SCRD will undertake an assessment of the feasibility, cost and scope of the service and prepare a formal petition for residents to sign before the tax increase will move ahead.

The Coast has a slightly higher percentage of residents with post-secondary degrees than the rest of BC, public library programs are well supported and high school completion rates for local students are increasing.

School District 46 also has a higher percentage of Indigenous students completing grade 12 than the BC average, and one third of the students registered at Capilano University's kálax-ay campus are studying programs related to shíshálh language and culture.

The Early Development Instrument is a 103-item questionnaire completed by kindergarten teachers that measures a student's ability to meet age-appropriate developmental expectations in five general domains:

- Physical health and well-being
 Social competence
- Emotional maturity
 Language and cognitive development
 - Communication skills and general knowledge

It found the percentage of the Coast's kindergartners considered vulnerable on one or more scales was 35%, slightly above the provincial average of 33%.

Christ the Redeemer and P. H. Community churches combine

With one at near capacity and the other struggling to fill seats, Pender Harbour's two churches have combined to form one.

Starting last month, the congregation of the Pender Harbour Community Church in Madeira Park will join those at the former Christ the Redeemer Church location near the Pender Harbour High School.

PHCC pastor Rich Phillips now leads Sunday services for both congregations in Kleindale.

"We would continue to serve our community here but continue to do it more effectively together," Phillips told the *Harbour Spiel*.

"They've been in the community for a long time and so has the P. H. Community Church, so there's a lot of connection there, so we think it would be a good fit for everyone.

Phillips said the Pender Harbour Community Church would attract approximately 60 people for a typical Sunday morning service but he said they only had approximately 70 seats at the Madeira Park church.

"We've been slowly growing, and the Anglican Church (CTRC) holds about 120 seats, so basically we'll have more room together."

Phillips said attendance at Christ the Redeemer was down to about 20 people so it provided an opportunity for the Madeira Park congregation to find more space and fill some empty seats in Kleindale.

Phillips said the CTR church approached them about joining.

"All of the Sunday services will be at the other building (at the high school) and the one in town will continue to operate as a ministry centre and the main offices," said Phillips.

"It's also the home of the Pender Harbour Food Bank so we'll continue

to run programs like we have been out of there."

Phillips will replace Reverend Barclay Mayo, the former leader and founder of Christ the Redeemer Church who has been filling in recently as an "Interim Priest-in-Charge."

Accord to CTR's website:

"In 1978, St. Andrew's Anglican Church was built at the corner of Hwy 101 and Front Road in Madeira Park, where it still stands today.

"Under Rev. Barclay Mayo's leadership, Christ the Redeemer was formed in 2004.

"Our present building was purchased in Campbell River, barged to Pender Harbour in 2006, and dedicated in March 2007."

Mayo led the formation of Christ the Redeemer Church following a dispute over ownership of the former St. Andrew's Anglican Church on Front Road in Madeira Park.

From the *Coast Reporter* (Nancy Moote, April 8, 2005):

"After more than a year of disputes over the ownership of St. Andrew's Anglican Church in Madeira Park, Rev. Barclay Mayo and his congregation have decided to move

out of the building.

"Along with several other conservative B.C. parishes, they left the Anglican Church of Canada in 2004 after the Diocese of New Westminster approved the blessing of homosexual couples.

"The Pender Harbour congregation joined the Anglican church of Rwanda and changed the name of their church to Christ the Redeemer."

The former Christ the Redeemer Church will now become the Pender Harbour Community Church and the former P. H. Community Church will now be known as the P. H. Community Church Ministry Centre.

Phillips said traditions will remain the same as part of the Pentecostal Assemblies of Canada.

"But we are through and through, a very family-oriented community church in style and flavour."

Christ the Redeemer's final service was Dec. 8 and the first service of the combined congregation in Kleindale was Dec. 22.

How does it cost \$35,000 to wash your eyes?

Last month's Lee Side inspired both confusion and outrage with \$35,000 mentioned as the cost of an

eyewash station at the pool.

It wasn't a typo, but the eyewash station includes an emergency shower, required to meet Workers Compensation Act and occupational health and safety regulations because of the caustic chemicals used in the pool's operating system.

Our current eyewash station is broken, parts aren't available, it's obsolete, and it doesn't meet today's requirements, e.g. it lacks a tempering valve to ensure continuous warm water.

The cost is mainly the plumbing upgrades necessary to install the whole system, as we did at the Sechelt and Gibsons pools.

\$35,000 is reasonable for a safety feature we consider absolutely essential to protect our employees and anyone else facing possible exposure to dangerous chemicals.

ARE UTILITY CHARGES A HIDDEN TAX?

Depending on your property and its available services, you may receive an annual utility invoice separate from your property tax, which is calculated on your property assessment.

Although the SCRD charges for water and wastewater services appear to be a "hidden tax," they are user fees, charged to cover operating costs and infrastructure expenses.

The SCRD budget will be finalized in February with final adoption of the 2025 financial plan, the province will bill for our local property taxes in June via property tax notices, and taxes collected will be remitted to the SCRD.

Here's what to expect with water: Our North and South Pender water systems, with extensive supply, treatment and distribution infrastructures, are suffering performance issues typical for any aging system and require ongoing repairs and parts replacements (water main replacements

are multi-million-dollar projects).

North Pender water increased by \$124.96 or 8.89% to \$1,530, largely to strengthen operating and capital reserves, to prevent huge increases when we're faced with inevitable, expensive infrastructure repairs, and to avoid interest charges if loans are needed to fund these projects.

South Pender water increased by \$165.03 or 12.13% to \$1,525, mainly to reduce maintenance costs by bringing the distribution system up to today's standards.

Regional water (Egmont and Earls Cove systems) increased by \$64.25 or 5.52% to \$1,229.

The SCRD is collaborating with the shishalh Nation to consider a joint reservoir on nation-owned land, which could be operational in 2026 (pending the nation's funding for construction), but the financial implications for the SCRD's operating and maintenance of the reservoir are unconfirmed.

Significant financial investments were and will continue to be made to address the supply situation today and beyond, including studies on new sources, designs, and permitting, and to cover new construction.

We expect user fee and parcel tax increases will sufficiently grow reserves to service future supply and infrastructure projects, and we anticipate volumetric billing for water services in 2027.

While the SCRD continues to seek grants to reduce offset costs, most of these grants are heavily oversubscribed, reducing the likelihood of us obtaining them.

Wastewater Treatment Plants:

• Greaves Road increased by \$113 or 8.97% to \$1,377 for funding

operational expenses;

- Canoe Road increased by \$50 or 3.31% to \$1,559;
- Merrill Crescent increased by \$50 or 2.04% to \$2.498:
- Lillies Lake increased by \$50 or 3.45% to \$1,497;
- Lee Bay increased by \$50 or 6.33% to \$840;
- Sakinaw Ridge increased by \$17.24 or 0.79% to \$2,203, and
- Painted Boat increased by \$113.87 or 11.52% to \$1,102 for its UV disinfection system maintenance (specialized UV light bulbs).

AREA A DIRECTOR IS NOT UNEMPLOYED

Some people assumed if I was no longer chair of the SCRD board then I no longer had a job.

The reality is that the SCRD board chair's term is for a single year and the board must select a chair from our nine elected or appointed SCRD directors every November, so for most of 2023 and 2024 I had two jobs, SCRD chair and SCRD Area A (Egmont-Pender) director.

Although I'm not unemployed, now I have only one job, as your regional director.

SCRD directors, elected to fouryear terms, have two years remaining in their current term.

I'm more than happy to accept the challenge until you no longer want me, or we find someone who we can all agree is much better suited for this important job.

I felt I was doing an okay job, but without the additional job of SCRD chair, I think I'll do even better.

In the meantime, I'm hanging around, at least until the next general local election in October 2026.

Vinebrook Bridge repair: Consider another option SCRD

Editor,

I was reading the proposed budget for the replacement of the bridge across Vinebrook Creek (on the Suncoast Trail near the Malaspina Substation) for \$820,000.

I would like to suggest a more reasonable alternative.

I propose a new switchback trail be developed that would lead from the failed bridge site down to the highway which would allow a much shorter bridge just up from the road followed by another switchback up to the original trail on the other side.

I contracted the building of the Sakinaw lake access switchback trail based on the SCRD Lily Lake trail contract terms.

The trail is a similar length and grade of the potential new switchback trail and only cost \$27,000 built by Andy Curtiss.

Given the new bridge would be less than a 1/4 of the old bridge length, the cost would be substantially reduced.

The new switchbacks would also add a great feature for bike riders and walkers for less than \$50,000.

I realize it would be great if the trail could be kept away from the highway but you must remember that two kilometres down the road the trail comes down to the highway in order to avoid another creek crossing.

Ideally, funding could be focused on the Katherine Lake circle trail.

Currently hundreds of people may be using the Vinebrook section of the trail but thought should be given to the thousands of people who come to Katherine Lake and would greatly benefit from the circle trail.



Mining in the Caren Range, part 1

I'll be 93 years old in a few days and unless the Lord makes an exception in my case, which is not likely, I thought I'd better scribble down what I can still remember about copper mining up in the Caren Range.

Still a teenager, I was on the Klein brothers crew from the beginning and people often ask me about the mine up by Mount Hallowell.

THE BEGINNING

The ore deposit was discovered by Dave Gibbs, who showed it to my uncle Fred Klein.

Uncle Fred was always interested in prospecting — by that time he had already staked a zinc outcrop above Anderson Creek.

So, he staked a big area where Dave Gibbs showed him the ore.

Gibbs had no interest in it himself, so it came to be known locally as "Fred's Mine."

Later, during the depression years, Uncle Fred got a grant to build a road from the highway by the high school.

They pushed it up to the foot of the mountain where the grade got too steep to continue, and then the money ran out.

A very steep trail up the south side of the canyon led nearly up to the mine site.

Every thing had to be backpacked up approximately 450 metres (1,500 feet) in elevation higher.

Building the road by hand to the foot of the mountain employed some local men, who were very glad for a job in the depression.

My dad, Jim Phillips, worked on the road and, later, packed and hauled freight from Irvine's Landing wharf

to the steep packing trail at the end of the mine road.

His freight truck was his Jordan Motor Car company sedan, that Aunt Florence (my Mom's sister) gave him after her husband Jim Lyman, who worked for the railroad, was killed in a train wreck.

In 1939, a big mining company, Sheep Creek Mining, took an option on the property.

Because the assays were so promising, they were willing to spend a lot on exploring the ore body.

They tunnelled under the ore body for 220 feet and found the high grade was all just a surface outcrop.

The adit (a nearly horizontal passage) for this tunnel can be found on the southwest side, about 200 feet lower than the mine elevation.

The granite diorite from the tunnel can still be seen — a grey colour different from the surroundings.

Some of the local men who were prepared to spend weeks away from their families got several months employment packing in materials or tunnelling as all of the holes were drilled by hammer and hand-held steel.

One man turned the chisel bit steel, while the partner swung the hammer.

The steels had to be continually reforged to size because as the set wore out, so the holes would get smaller.

An old blacksmith from Irvines Landing, John Gooldrup and his son Jack, kept the steel tempered just right — if it was too hard, it broke up, if it was too soft, it didn't last.

The workers would take turns and it took three or more packers to keep the miners fed and supplied with all the required supplies.

My Dad took me along at 9 years old — I packed 20 pounds and he packed 70 pounds.

We got 10 cents per pound — big money in those days — bu it took us all day to make the trip.

After the mining company proved the ore body was not enough

for their needs and let their lease go, nothing happened with the mine until about 1949, when my uncle John Klein (he spelled his name Cline) took up a new angle.

He was six feet three inches tall and close to 200 pounds at 15 years old.

When he lied about his age and enlisted in the army during World War II, because of his size, he was immediately accepted.

After training, he was sent overseas and experienced some of the worst battles Canadian troops fought.

Somehow he survived to bring his warbride, Mollie (Scott) back to Kleindale where his mother and most of his siblings had moved to.

He bought some acreage from his brother Fred, built a log house, cleared some land and started farming.

Mollie must have come into some money from England because he was soon able to afford to buy a RD8 Caterpillar tractor.

Partnering with brother Pete, the two began to log some of the old growth fir that was still selling well.

After that was gone, they moved up Jervis Inlet to Beaver (Treat) Creek, and a few years later to Chonat Bay.

There, Pete left Uncle John to move back home to Kleindale and

marry his wife Hazel.

John then went big time in Elk Bay where he ran a large and very successful logging show.

His son Bobbie did all his trucking and all was good until one day their loading donkey engineer refused to work while the other donkey was bringing logs in to the same spartree.

Rather than slow production, Bobbie took over.

Not long after, two boomsticks came in together, and when the yarding engineer set them down, one came out of the choker and landed on Bobbie who was running the loading machine.

After the loss of their only son, John and Mollie Klein quit and moved to an apartment in Vancouver where John bought a big yacht and cruised the Coast to ease his grief.

After some time he began to miss his friends from the logging days and Pete, his old partner.

At that time, my dad and Pete were logging in Cockburn Bay when our house burned down.

Dad was happy to sell his share to spend time building a new house.

So, John and Pete partnered again in a new company, Pender Harbour Explorations.

Together they bought a new Kenworth logging truck and relogged the

whole head of Pender Harbour.

After punching the first road out to Sakinaw Lake, they also logged the foothills of the Caren Range.

They kept looking at the timber on the top of the mountain but had no road to get there.

They needed some help to build it and John's business sense told him that Fred's mine was the answer.

After taking a lease on the mine, he managed to get a government grant to pay for a large part of the road construction to the top.

They would go on to haul out 700 tons of high grade copper that was shipped to the smelter in Tacoma, Wash.

Much later, a large part of the timber that was up there came down that road as well.

Some would say it should never have been logged — some of the Western hemlocks were close to 1,000 years old.

The Kleins never did log it because half of the trees we fell up there were just a shell.

The hollow went to all but the top of the log, which was poor quality anyways because of the limbs.

Only the cedar and fir were any good so, instead of logging, they decided to reactivate the mine.


