EDITORIAL

Life in Egmont

In 1960, when my grandparents sold their house in Point Grey for \$16,000 and moved to Egmont, life was pretty much the same there as it was in Pender Harbour.

They had power and water but not much else and people relied on their neighbours for help when things went bad.

Nowadays, people in Pender Harbour take for granted such things as cable TV or high-speed internet and when we have chest pains, we expect the ambulance in minutes.

In Egmont, a windstorm often knocks out emergency communications, cutting the community off from the basic health services we all rely on.

I attended the AGM of the Egmont Community Club a few days ago and it's funny how different life is only 20 minutes away.

The residents don't just gather to discuss this year's May Day theme.

They discussed strategies on how best to cope with a natural disaster and went over developments for preparing the community hall as a refuge where people can warm up, get some cooked food and share information, knowing it's likely they'll be completely cut off from the outside world.

After one of the many storms of this past year, Egmont was without telephone service for eight days.

Cell phones rarely work past the "S" bends at Ruby Lake.

As one person at the meeting said, this is what you expect when you move to Egmont and you have to be prepared to take car of yourself.

That means having a generator, a chainsaw and a four-wheel drive.

Recently, an elderly woman took a bad fall during a storm when the phone lines were down and it identified the potential for an unnecesary tragedy.

During another outage this past winter, an ambulance was stationed outside the entrance to the Skookumchuck Trail 24 hours a day in case of such an emergency.

Or, recall our water problems from this past fall.

Egmont has been on a boil water advisory for *8 years*.

Until recently, with the formation of the Egmont Volunteer Fire Department, if an Egmonster's house started to burn, he or she could only rely on their neighbours for help because they were outside the fire protection district.

Being outside of a fire protection district means that most home insurers won't grant protection, so when the house does burn, it's gone.

Egmont is as close to living off the grid as you can get and still be near paved roads and the town has always attracted independent people who appreciate and are equipped to cope with these challenges.

Living here does require people to prepare for emergencies and look out for each other and clearly it keeps the community close.

Maybe this is the biggest difference between life in Pender Harbour and Egmont and I'll probably get hate mail for even suggesting improvements should be considered.

Many Egmonsters wouldn't have it any other way and I'm not sure I blame them.

Area A Water Master Plan unveiled

On Feb. 27 more than 150 people packed into the Royal Canadian Legion to applaud the efforts of community members and local government for their efforts in creating the Area A Water Master Plan.

Presenting the culmination of 14 months of research and consultation were representatives from the SCRD, Ministry of Environment, Vancouver Coastal Health Authority, private consultants, Department of Fisheries, local water boards and the Sechelt Indian Band.

The WMP was first proposed to the SCRD by Area A representative John Rees in 2003.

Since then an Environmental Appeal ruling on Hotel Lake Water license transfers required the SCRD to devise a water master plan to support the transfers, backed by the Ministry of Environment, for future water extraction from the area.

The main purpose of the report is to outline a framework outlining tasks and related schedules to meet the needs of at least eight community water systems and individual water licensees.

Immediately apparent are common issues such as demands on water supply due to projected growth, health related water quality concerns about arsenic concentrations, infrastructure improvement requirements, management capacity and corresponding liability, availability of grant funding and drinking-water source protection.


The WMP is a massive document

that spells out deficiencies in current community water supply systems and outlines possible measures that could correct them.

It also offers potential funding alternatives that must be pursued in order to achieve them.

The final draft of the WMP was repeatedly praised throughout the presentation for providing local government with a tool to apply for the funding needed to meet the needs of short and medium term improvements and for mapping out longer-term strategies for dealing with future needs.

Water treatment facilities and the infrastructure required to deliver it is extremely expensive and it seems clear that Area A residents would not be able to carry the cost of the many

required upgrades listed throughout the document.

"It's not a magic solution but it's a great blueprint, but to continue the blueprint from where we are at the moment to implementation, we need funding." John Rees said at the meeting, "The water treatment plant at Chapman Creek cost in the region of

\$7 million and we had grant funding of 50% of that. All of the areas outside of Area A are paying the balance of the \$3.5 million on a 10 year plan."

After a number of questions loosely related to local water issues and the plan itself, meeting chair Dr. Michael Jackson asked for a motion to gauge public support for the Wa-

ter Master Plan to which the crowd offered a nearly unanimous show of favour.

Mount Daniel rockslide

A recent rock slide on Mt. Daniel has some residents of the area concerned for their safety.

A large portion of the south slope of the mountain came down in the early hours of February 26 startling resident Sandra Aikenhead,

"There was a tremendous roar around 4:30 in the morning. It was like the largest plane you could imagine flying really low overhead and went on for about a minute."

The slide area stretches for about 100m and ends approximately 100m above homes along Daniel Road.

The Geotechnical Assessment portion of the Official Community Plan lists the area as a rockfall hazard area.


Other designated rockfall hazard areas include areas on the steep slopes of Pender Hill, Harbour Peak, above Highway 101 on east side of Ruby Lake and between Klein Lake and North Lake.

According to the Official Community Plan, "These areas are comprised of fractured bedrock slopes with high potential for slope instability and rockfall."

SCRD Emergency Program Coordinator Bill Elsner told the Spiel that he visited the location of the slide to determine if there was any imminent risk and notified the BC Parks Branch when he found it was on Crown land and part of the Garden Bay Marine Park.

Ryan Elphick of BC Parks confirmed that they are in the process of sending a geotechnical engineer to assess the slide but were not able to confirm when that might be. Aikenhead is curious to learn the results of the proposed geotechnical assessment but isn't concerned for her safety,

"We've been here for 34 years and we haven't seen anything like it before."

Will we soon have more homes than people?

If you haven't been on an exploratory Sunday drive lately, you'll be amazed at the startling changes to the Pender Harbour landscape.

High-end, large-scale subdivision developments have been the norm rather than the exception lately.

They're providing a relief from a housing shortage but there's a perception that the changes taking place here are more influenced from afar than within and threaten the rural lifestyle many have grown accustomed to.

More importantly, can the infrastructure accommodate such massive growth and what restrictions, if any, are put on those groups pouring millions of dollars into the local soil?

Developers speak a different language than the rest of us and many are confused about who these people are and how our land resource is being managed.

Terms such as "Bare Land Strata" or "Fee Simple" are thrown around but how many of us really know how these terms apply to the developers needs?

I've taken seven large developments that are in various stages of permit approval to try to shed some light on the projects most often discussed over coffee at John Henry's.

The number of lots proposed for these seven developments alone is a staggering 250 new homes.

What's even more startling is the cost of many of single building lots, some listing for close to \$2 million.

DANIEL POINT COTTAGES

The fourth phase of developer Les Allen's Daniel Point development,

Daniel Point Cottages consists of 40 lots, each with an 800-square-foot home on a freehold half acre.

The parcels went on sale last year and sold out within three months for between \$199,000 and \$279,000 each.

Stonewater Homes, a construction company created for this project by Les Allen, is the builder.

Allen told the Harbour Spiel that he wishes he'd built houses or cottages on each plot of land from the start,

"People from outside of the area are afraid of buying a piece of land when they don't if they'll be able to build on it." he said,

"If you ask a local builder, he'll tell you to come back in three years

because that's when he's booked until and who knows what construction costs will be by that time so forget about getting a quote."

FARRINGTON COVE

The
20-acre Farrington Cove
development
sits between
Duncan Cove
and Irvine's
Landing in
Garden Bay
and has been
an eyesore for
many years as
the result of a
failed develop-

ment in the 1980s that left it empty and unfinished.

Planners at the SCRD suggest that the lack of vegetation would probably not be allowable today but was the result of a rezoning amendment from years ago that allowed higher density.

The new developer, Rick Barbieri, owner of 1425 West Pender Holdings Ltd., has taken the 20 acre site and created 51 bare land strata lots, of which 22 are waterfront, ranging in price from \$175,000 to \$410,000.

According to the website, www. farringtoncove.com, 44 lots have already sold.

Zoning is also in place for a six-

plex townhome development that is almost completed.

The town-home development is built on the site of the former developer's condominium site that was torn down at the start of the current project.

The town-homes are 2400 square foot each on 3 levels and are listed between \$559,000 and \$659,000.

BARE LAND STRATA

Essentially takes the lot density that the whole property would allow under current zoning and compresses it down to smaller and denser lot footprints to leave more non-sub dividable, open space around the development. This allows for more open space but building sites are more compact. In these cases, the developer must maintain road maintenance and septic systems. The Bare Land Strata act does not allow the SCRD to manage infrastructure unless the developer requests it although it still must be designed to SCRD standards and requirements.

FEE SIMPLE

Also called freehold, fee simple is the most common form of property ownership and basically represents absolute ownership for real property but is still limited by basic government powers like taxation.

LILY LAKE VILLAGE

A bare land strata development, Lily Lake

LOCAL ISSUES

Village sits between Lagoon Road and Lily Lake in Madeira Park.

The development has all of its rezoning permits complete and has occupants already moved in.

Developer Ryan Campbell originally bought two lots that were subdividable to a maximum of 16-20 half acre lots and applied for rezoning for 27 single family or duplex building lots.

Part of the terms of the rezoning agreement with the SCRD were to supply a fully-furnished building lot to Area A Seniors Housing for the Abbeyfield House project, a 10-suite assisted-living home for seniors on top of a 13.7% park dedication that provides a public access trail down to and along Lily Lake.

According to the realtor's website, 11 of the 27 lots have been sold.

PAINTED BOAT

Painted Boat is the name of the development currently being built where Lowe's Resort used to stand.

The preferred term for what used to be called a time share is now fractional ownership.

In this case, 31 "vacation villas" are sold with quarter shares in each.

The BC Assessment Authority has determined that fractional ownership is more commercial than residential and has taxed such developments much higher.

After some concern, it seems this is a non-issue for the Painted Boat Development as Project Manager, Ronaye Matthew, explains:

"The developer investigated with legal counsel and local BC Assessment Authorities to ensure management has been set up to support the residential assessment for regional tax purposes for the fractional interest owners."

Painted Boat required rezoning to CD2 (Comprehensive Development Two) which allows for a variety of building uses though "no one person can occupy an accommodation unit for more than a total of 26 weeks in a calendar year."



This view could be yours... for a mere \$1.2 million *plus* building costs.

This is the first development of its kind in the Pender Harbour area and may be the litmus test for similar developments in the future.

In lieu of 5% park dedication that would have been required if they were subdividing, the developers put up \$70,000 in cash.

This money will be directly applied to construction costs of the Lagoon Road Bicycle/Walking Path, a 1.5 metre-wide paved path that will run from Gonzales Road to Lily Lake Village and eventually may circumnavigate Lily Lake.

The septic system will be a community system for the entire development and the SCRD will take over its operation after one year, as is normally the case with similar developments.

David Rafael, senior planner with the SCRD, said: "Building permit applications have been received for the accommodation units. Discussions are ongoing with the SCRD's Infrastructure Services Department regarding the details of the septic system."

There is planned commercial activity such as a spa and a restaurant but, according to the SCRD, no such permits have been applied for yet.

Matthew said that designs are in place and they are just waiting for DFO approval before they begin construction of the restaurant this May.

PENDER HARBOUR LANDING

Pender Harbour Landing sits above Irvine's Landing and is best accessed via Hotel Lake Road.

The development company, Pender Harbour Landing Ltd., is the partnership of Bob Fielding, Doug Sladey and Lorne Embree.

They have preliminary lot approval and the lots are listed for sale but technically don't exist yet because not all permits are in place.

The development will consist of 39 freehold properties on a parcel of

land that theoretically could have accommodated close to 200.

The developers have opted to keep larger parcel sizes in favour of green space and a less cramped lot plan and have created a strict building scheme in order to ensure compatible architectural characteristics.

The lots vary in size and cost with lots available anywhere from \$175,000 to \$2 million.

The majority of the dedicated park land sits at the entrance to the development along Hotel Lake Road.

Pender Harbour Landing will have a community septic system and developer Bob Fielding says he expects that all approvals and permits will be in place by mid-April. After the system has been approved, the SCRD will take over ownership and management.

SAKINAW RIDGE

Sakinaw Ridge developer BGD Holdings of Langley consists of a number of partners that hold 155 hectares along Lee Bay Road to Sakinaw Lake and out to the ocean around to the Daniel Point Development.

They're currently involved in subdividing one-third of their land holdings for a total of 31 lots.

John Enevoldsen Engineering is

managing their application for a conventional, or fee simple, sub-division

with lot sizes of 1.6 to 5.96 acres and are listed for sale for anywhere between \$275,000 and \$1.2 million.

According to Alan Stewart of Re/Max Realty, 10 out of the 31 lots have been sold.

The developers provided approximately \$68,000 plus land for park dedication to satisfy the requirements of the SCRD.

The park land is a 4.81 hectare sitethat is situated away

from the current development toward Mixal Lake in an area that may be developed in the future.

Water supply is yet to be resolved but a possible solution is in the works with the SCRD applying to draw water from Sakinaw Lake.

The septic system should be a mixture of community and on-site but has not yet gained approval.

The developer is working with the SCRD to refine the design.

WHITTAKER'S AT PENDER HARBOUR

With a nod to the history of its namesake, Whittaker's at Pender Harbour is being developed by Rockwater Properties, the same company that bought Lord Jim's Resort and operates

it now as Rockwater Secret Cove Resort.

Situated directly between Pender Harbour Landing and Farrington Cove, Rockwater Properties bills Whittaker's as "a luxury, architect-designed oceanfront community" in an "undisturbed and natural setting."

Like Farrington, Whittaker's is a bare land strata development and has opted to increase the density of housing towards

the water's edge and leave the back end of the property in its natural state.

The development consists of 25 lots with custom designed homes that will cost between \$989,000 and \$1.75 million.

In lieu of land dedication for rezoning, Rockwater Properties gave 5% of the land's appraised value to the SCRD Parks Acquisition fund and will be applied to future park expenditures on the Sunshine Coast.

The SCRD has signed off on all permits for this development.

It is more than 50% sold.

PARK DEDICATION

When negotiating park dedication, the SCRD usually tries to get as much land as possible rather than an equivalent value of cash because of the obvious long-term benefits.

Planners will reject land that doesn't make sense and suggest more appropriate locations that align with the Official Community Plan or planned projects that are in the community interest.

A developer applying for a Bare Land Stata development usually provides a cash payment in lieu of park dedication because they aren't subdividing, just rezoning.

This should dramatically im-


prove the comfort levels for any winter events where people might have thought the air was a little damp!





AREA A 2007 BUDGET (SCRD PORTION)

As promised last month here is a breakdown.

The overall SCRD budget for 2007 is \$11.2 million, an increase of 6.9% over 2006.

The Area A budget for 2007 is \$1.4 million, an increase of 7.5% over 2006.

REASONS FOR THE INCREASE

As I explained in last month's column, high assessment in this area is responsible for at least 2% of this increase.

Increases are as follows:

• Pender Harbour Clinic:

Due to additional operating costs as a result of the clinic expansion, we have increased that budget by \$15,000, or 1.1% of our Area A budget.

• Pender Harbour Pool:

We are now in the process of making payments to cover the costs of the repairs caused by mold in the walls.

The Area A portion was established as \$173,000, of which we have

repaid \$88,000 from the savings created while the pool was shut down.

The remaining \$85,000 has been borrowed from the SCRD at low interest and will be turned over to the school district upon completion of this budget process.

We will make five payments of approximately \$18,000 each to cover this debt and the first is included in this budget.

Other than this item, the pool budget is status quo and that portion of our increase is 1.4%.

• Pender Harbour Landfill:

This landfill, which normally runs at a loss, is included with the Sechelt Landfill, which normally operates at a profit, and recycling Coast wide under one function called Solid Waste.

This function ran up a large deficit in 2006, mostly due to lower than anticipated tipping fees from the Sechelt operation caused mainly by atrocious weather in November and December.

This deficit has to be accounted for in this budget and for our area is \$35,000.

The landfill portion of our increase is 2.5%.

• All other functions:

I have only talked about three functions but our area participates in 22 other separate services at the SCRD such as parks, bylaw control, planning, 911, emergency Planning etc.

Fortunately, all of these services balanced out, some up, some down, with a net result of no tax increase for this year.

Believe it or not, even general government (administration) was down!

SUMMARY

Area A increases:
 Clinic 1.1% = \$15,000
 Pool 1.4% = \$18,000
 Landfill 2.5% = \$35,000

Assessment increases (Prov.):
 2.0% = \$28,000

Area A will pay about \$100,000 above the 2006 level, almost all of which will stay right at home.

COAST GUARD AUXILIARY

I am very pleased to announce that, contained in the overall budget, there is an annual stipend of \$5,000 to help out with the training and equipment costs for this wonderful group of volunteers.

This allowance will not only help Unit 61 here in Pender Harbour but is available to the Halfmoon Bay and Gibsons units also.

There is also a modest increase for our Recreation Programs, operated by the Community School, for the Skookumchuk Heritage Museum and the budget also contains Info Centre and public washroom support as usual.

Keep in mind also that we have \$500,000 for our soccer field, \$40,000 for trails and \$70,000.00 for the Lagoon Road pathway, all in hand and waiting to spend.

The South Pender Harbour Waterworks District AGM will be held on Monday, April 30, 2007 at the Pender Harbour Community Hall at 7:00 pm.

There are two Trustee positions up for election. Nominations will not be accepted from the floor. Forms and requirements for nominations are available from the District office at 12828 Lagoon Road, Madeira Park during regular office hours. Regular office hours are 9:00 am – 1:00 pm, Monday – Friday except statutory holidays. Nominations of qualified candidates will be received at the District Office until noon April 13, 2007.

Persons entitled to hold the position of Water Board Trustee must meet all of the following qualifications:

- 1. A Canadian Citizen.
- 2. Eighteen years of age or older.
- 3. An owner of land in the South Pender Harbour Waterworks Improvement District.
- 4. A resident of British Columbia for the last six consecutive months.

Persons nominating and seconding the nomination must also meet the above qualifications.

Source to Tap

The District's engineer is awaiting information from the SCRD to complete the 9th module of the Source to Tap which will address the merits of remaining independent or joining up with the SCRD. Once the information is provided by the SCRD, Draft #2 of the Source to Tap report will be completed.

Following the completion of Draft #2, a Source to Tap committee meeting will be held. At that time the committee will finalize the Risk Characterization (Module 7), establish the Risk Management Strategy (Module 8) and establish a communication plan for presenting the information to the public. Following the committee meeting, the report will be finalized and the communication plan implemented. Public presentations will be made and then a vote will be held.

The Source to Tap report to the ratepayers of SPHWD will be presented in a neutral, non-biased fashion. Regardless of the outcome of any vote, importance must be given to the delivery of water to your household. Water can no longer be taken for granted nor be undercharged.

PPA letter to Premier Campbell

[Letter sent to Premier Gordon Campbell, dated March 7, 2007]

Premier Campbell,

Pan Pacific Aggregates Ltd. is currently in the exploration and pre-application stage of developing a proposed limestone quarry (Sechelt Carbonate Project) on the Caren Range of the Sunshine Coast and we are defining the parameters of our required Environmental Assessment for both provincial and federal governments.

We refer to a letter to you from Eleanor Lenz on February 13, 2007 regarding the Sechelt Carbonate Project and made available to the public through www.sosc.com (Save Our Sunshine Coast).

Because this letter contains misinformation, and we expect this misinformation to initiate further correspondence to you from the public and our local representative, MLA Nicholas Simons, we would like to address the issues.

Ms. Lenz request that you, "consider expansion of Spipyus Provincial Park in the Caren Range to encompass the existing unique wetlands that form the Carlson Creek Watershed."

Ms. Lenz is misinformed; this area is not a unique wetland, it is an area of relict post-glacial features with limited habitat capacity.

The word "pristine" is frequently bandied about by Ms. Lenz and others opposed to our company's work on the Sunshine Coast, and this too is propagation of misinformation.

The area has been clearcut logged at least twice and mining activity has taken place on the Sechelt

Peninsula since the 1880s (Ms. Lenz wrote that the Sechelt Peninsula does not have a long history of mining).

Ms. Lenz states that we propose an open-pit mine in the area.

An open-pit mine generally refers to metal extraction, which produces waste relative to volume of material extracted, but we propose a limestone quarry which does not result in waste material from the entirely mechanical extraction process.

In wild speculation, Ms. Lenz adds that our project would, "surely destroy what is there now."

Ms. Lenz identifies the Carlson Lake Watershed as an alternative source for Sunshine Coast drinking water, but our scientific data collected since 2005 indicates that Carlson Lake is unsuitable for this purpose without construction of substantial dams and dykes.

Water-flows and topography of the area, along with the limited capacity of this shallow lake, do not support its use as a reservoir.

We would like to remind you of our proposal, at the Sunshine Coast Water Summit of March 2006, to develop a reservoir with 20 times the capacity of the Chapman Creek water system, the current primary source of Sunshine Coast drinking water.

We could complete this alternate water source in conjunction with our proposed quarry operations at no cost to the taxpayer.

There is much to be gained by working co-operatively with Pan Pacific Aggregates, especially in view of the recent, rapid development on the Sunshine Coast and the resulting concerns about a supply of potable water in the future.


We have extensive hydrological and hydrogeological data on this area, and our proposed quarry, in carbonate rocks, would be a natural, ideal storage area for clean water.

At this stage of our project, it would not be a problem to include an end-use water reservoir for the Sunshine Coast in our development plan, but this would require a joint initiative from the community and Pan Pacific Aggregates.

We thank you for your consideration of this matter, and invite you to meet with us for more information about the Sechelt Carbonate Project on your next visit to the Sunshine Coast.

SPHWD Ratepayers: Know what's in your water?



- 1. Turbidity of McNeil Lake and Haslam Creek **routinely exceeds** the Canadian Drinking Water Quality Guidelines (CDWQG).
 - Disinfection is not effective.
- 2. SPHWD **disinfection levels vary** depending on consumption rates.

 - Drawings of the system as built are almost non-existent.

 - ❖ Pipe material information throughout the system and cross connections.
- 9. SPHWD system leakage is **18.4 million gallons/year** (22% of usage).
 - ❖ Wasted water is enough to supply nearly 200 homes for a year.
 - ❖ A SPHWD proposal to conserve water by installing water meters will cost between \$500K & \$1 Million dollars.
 - * This proposal will not save as much water as fixing the leakage problems.





Since 2000, Paul has been President and Artistic Director


of Canada's annual Agassiz Summer Chamber Music Festival in Winnipeg.



HARBOUR GARDENING

Sustainable Everything

by Jim Rutherford

Low-maintenance and sustainable gardening go hand in hand.

Layering plant materials from tall to short is the answer.

This is to create an over story and an under story.

Picture your herbaceous border cascading towards you, not in the formal English garden way, but more relaxed to suit the Coast.

Your friends will be impressed and you'll have more time to relax rather than shrugging it out in your garden month after month.

For height, perhaps start with a lilac, Norway maple or a witch hazel.

If you want privacy year round, use an evergreen, rather than a deciduous tree.

You can insert one of these taller shrubs/trees at any time.

To add interest, make a long sweeping curve in the border and add

something like a curly willow, contort hazel or a cascading caragana to make a good focal point.

Now working forward to the lawn or patio something mid-height like rhodos, hydrangeas or azalea mollis will work nicely.

Mexican orange (choisga, sun dancer) prune easily, are deer proof and can take it quite dry.

For a hillside, as many of us have, this approach works just as well.

California lilac (ceanothus) is very drought tolerant and, if you have lots of space, need not be pruned.

But watch out, it can get pretty big.

The saying goes, "If you look after your soil, the plants will look after themselves."

Well, that's true only if you start with a superior deep soil base.

Around here, rocks can put a limit on that effort.

By layering your plants you can provide shade to the roots of adjacent plants from the hot sun and cheat on soil depth.

Nobody wants to be a water hog so the shade you provide will reduce the evaporation from the soil and transpiration from the foliage.

Finally the short stuff.

Coral bells (heuchera), day lilies,

coreopsis, or black-eyed Susans as perennials provide a lot of colour.

Just space the plants a little further apart if you plan to insert annuals.

Now is a good time to make a move on perennials but be sure to consider the whole year when you shop.

It's easy to be seduced with the beautiful perennials that are on display, but leave some space for summer and autumn ones that show up later on.

In amending soils for better plant growth, the easiest way is to top dress.

Raw cow manure will have weed seeds in it that will germinate.

Lama manure, available from Lori and John O'Reilly at 883-2021, is ready to use right from the animal with no weed seeds to germinate.

Never use raw chicken droppings, the concentration of urea will severally burn your plants and must be well composted.

For convenience, I often use pre- packaged steer manure which, in processing, has been sterilized to kill weed seeds and pathogens.

Mushroom manure is fine; however it just has some of the available nutrients used up naturally, but is sterile.

Jeanie at Kleindale Nursery has some choice early pansies and ranunculus to spot-plant for colour in your borders and containers.

We're doing our part now or starting to be more sensitive about water conservation.

So let's sit back and relax, replete in the knowledge that we've started towards sustainability.

PENDER PET PATTER

Pain and your pet

By Doretta Morland

One of the most frequent questions asked of a veterinary office is, "How would I know if my pet is in any discomfort or pain?"

While there is no blanket statement that will give a complete answer to this question, there are indicators to watch for which may help you to determine the presence of any pain your animal may be

Many people believe that if their animal isn't whimpering or whining, they must not be suffering very much when, in fact, it may be quite the opposite.

experiencing.

Keep in mind their ancestry dictates "survival of the fittest" and therefore showing any sign of weakness, i.e. pain, in animal-speak could be viewed by them as asking for trouble.

Try to remember the last time you cried out when you were in pain.

Vocalizing is usually a sign of acute pain—think touching the hot stove.

Chronic pain seldom involves crying out.

Like us, most signs of pain in our pets are actually fairly subtle like loss of appetite or lethargy.

Really, anything from a minor change in behavior to yowling could be a sign that your pet is hurting.

Watch for any of the following symptoms:

Limping

- Splinting (tensing when touched)
 - Unexplained panting
- Hesitating to move a certain body part or to move at all
- Inexplicable aggression when approached, touched or moved
- Avoiding use of the litter box or unwilling to settle down to eliminate
 - Crying or whining

Remember, animals don't always show pain in the way we think they should.

So, when in doubt call your veterinary office and they can help you decide if it's something that might need further investigation.



The British Columbia Veterinary Medical Association

has been made aware of recent reports of suspected parvovirus outbreaks in the canine community of the lower mainland and BC Interior.

Two deaths have been reported over the last month, both suspected parvovirus victims.

The BCVMA highly recommends regular vaccinations to guard against parvovirus and other diseases.

Parvo presents with extreme vomiting and bloody, foul smelling diarrhea and can be fatal, particularly in the very young and elderly dogs.

To be fully protected, puppies should be vaccinated at 8, 12 and 16 weeks and annually thereafter.

Gum disease - More trouble than you think!

The Journal of the Canadian Dental Association shows gum disease may be more prevalent among diabetic patients than non-diabetic people.

Diabetics are more likely than non-diabetics to suffer severe bone loss, tooth loss and infections from gum disease.

Despite its harmful effects, gum disease can be prevented and easily reversed if caught in the early stages by practising good oral health habits.

Brush at least twice a day and floss once a day and be sure to have a dental check-up at least once a year.

Mountain biking in Pender Harbour

A local group of mountain bikers have been developing single track trails (a narrow trail, generally wide enough for one rider at a time) in Pender Harbour for a few years now and have recognized the potential to increase the exposure for the Pender Harbour area through the mountain bike community.

The Pender Mountain Bike Club, originally called the Mud Sluts, has formed to promote mountain biking and trail building in our area.

It is unknown how many people mountain bike in Area A regularily but it's generally estimated to be quite small.

One limiting factor is the small number of trails available in our area.

Mountain bikers prefer single track trails that are not only more challenging than regular logging roads but are also more scenic and interesting.

According to an economic impact study sponsored by the Western Canada Mountain Bike Tourism Association, "The trail systems of the North Shore, Squamish and Whistler, are estimated to have collectively generated \$10.3 million in spending from riders that live outside of the host community over the period from June 4 to September 17, 2006."

The study shows that trails attract

visitors with disposable income with the majority being in the age 30-45 demographic.

Mountain biking offers one more reason for people who come to our area to stay another day.

Aside from the potential tourism benefits, mountain biking is fun and a social sport that doesn't need to cost a lot.

The PMBC is an informal group of local people who have recognized a need for such a club to introduce new members to the sport, as they were once introduced themselves.

Mountain biking is a sport that often requires a couple of guided trips for a newcomer to become familiar with the terrain and where to find the *fun* trails.


Many routes aren't marked or maintained by the SCRD because of issues with liability so locations are often passed around by word of mouth.

The plan is to have a fun ride every month in a different trail system to encourage locals to come out and use what has the potential to become a mountain bike mecca.

The Pender Harbour area has an abundance of rolling terrain with scenic viewpoints around every corner and many

will be surprised at the extensive network of trails that exist a short ride off the highway.

The club will meet for their first group ride on Sunday,



TOP 3 APRILS FOOLS DAY HOAXES

#1: THE SWISS SPAGHETTI HARVEST

In 1957 the respected BBC news show Panorama announced that thanks to a very mild winter and the virtual elimination of the dreaded spaghetti weevil, Swiss farmers were enjoying a bumper spaghetti crop. It accompanied this announcement with footage of Swiss peasants pulling strands of spaghetti down from trees. Huge numbers of viewers were taken in, and many called up wanting to know how they could grow their own spaghetti trees. To this question, the BBC diplomatically replied that they should "place a sprig of spaghetti in a tin of tomato sauce and hope for the best."

#2: SIDD FINCH

In its April 1985 edition, Sports Illustrated published a story about a new rookie pitcher who planned to play for the Mets. His name was Sidd Finch and he could reportedly throw a baseball with startling, pinpoint accuracy at 168 mph (65 mph faster than anyone else has ever been able to throw a ball). Surprisingly, Sidd Finch had never even played the game before. Instead, he had mastered the "art of the pitch" in a Tibetan monastery under the guidance of the "great poet-saint Lama Milaraspa." Mets fans everywhere celebrated at their teams's amazing luck at having found such a gifted player, and Sports Illustrated was flooded with requests for more information. #3: INSTANT COLOR TV

In 1962 there was only one TV channel in Sweden and it broadcast in black and white. The station's technical expert, Kjell Stensson, appeared on the news to announce that thanks to a newly developed technology, all viewers could now quickly and easily convert their existing sets to display color reception. All they had to do was pull a nylon stocking over their tv screen, and they would begin to see their favorite shows in color. Stensson then proceeded to demonstrate the process. Reportedly, hundreds of thousands of people, out of the population of seven million, were taken in. Actual color tv transmission only commenced in Sweden on April 1, 1970.

• On the putting green, watch where everyone else's ball is, and don't step in their line to the hole.




