August boil water advisory: Post-mortem

TIMELINE

Monday Aug. 21:

At about 8 a.m. maintenance staff discovers there is no "chlorine residual" in the water at the Pender Harbour Health Clinic. The chlorination station at Haslam Creek is not working due to low water pressure, probably caused by an air lock in the supply line from MacNeill Lake. The secondary pressure system has also failed. Vancouver Coastal Health drinking water officer Tim Adams is alerted at 9:30 a.m. He orders morning and afternoon samples from all six sample sites on the water line. These are delivered to the Sechelt office by 4 p.m.

Meanwhile the backup system is wired to run continuously, and chlorine is entering the water system again by 9:45 a.m.

Tuesday Aug. 22:

The district starts drawing water from a lower intake at Haslam Creek near the chlorine station, solving the low-pressure problem. Tests of the Monday samples show E. coli at sites 2 (Gulfview Road) and 3 (Edgecombe Road). But now chlorine is reaching all parts of the system, and Adams decides that a boil-water advisory is not necessary. Another set of water samples is sent to the B.C. Centre for Disease Control lab in Vancouver.

Saturday Aug. 26:

At about 1:15 p.m. the Vancouver lab contacts Medical Health Officer Dr. Paul Martiquet and the SPHWD pager to confirm E. coli at site 3. A fresh sample from a home on Edgecombe Road shows adequate chlorine. But after consulting with Adams, the District issues a boilwater advisory for the area from the junction of Cochrane and Warnock to the closed ends of Clay, Edgecombe, Whitestone, Cameron and Malcolm. Notices are hand-delivered by 2:30 pm. Residents with "gastrointestinal difficulties" are advised to see a doctor.

MONTHS AFTER A BOIL-WATER WARNING SOME FOLKS ARE STILL STEAMING.

And they gave water and health officials an earful Oct. 23 at a public meeting to discuss the action taken in response to the failure of the chlorination system in August and the improvements being implemented.

Present were the South Pender Harbour Waterworks District Board of Trustees and the Provincial Medical and Drinking Water Officers for the Vancouver Coastal Health Authority as well as 42 community members.

Yovhan Burega of Baker Road said that soon after the failure, his wife had diarrhea while a houseguest staying with the couple was hospitalized at St. Mary's for severe flu-like symptoms.

Dr. Paul Martiquet, The Medical Health Officer for the Vancouver Coastal Health Authority said repeatedly he wasn't convinced there is a danger present in the local water system.

Martiquet said that illnesses reported at the meeting might be caused by something outside of the water system.

"I haven't received a lab report for six months," he said "I would know if the problem was due to a waterborne bacterium."

But Burega and other residents said the lack of lab reports was not surprising, since those who sought help at the Pender Harbour Health Clinic were not asked to give samples of stool or body fluids.

Some said their symptoms vanished when they switched to bottled water.

Martiquet said it is important for people suffering from the symptoms described to get a stool sample taken so that he can identify potential waterborne dangers and said that the Pender Harbour Health Clinic was notified, of the danger.

SPHWD Trustee Ted Taylor said he had a letter to VCH and the Board from Judy Georgetti, Nurse Administrator of the PHHC, claiming that she was not aware of it.

During the weekend of August 19/20, the chlorination system servicing the SPHWD failed and was discovered Monday.

A boiled water advisory was not issued until the following Saturday for residents of Warnock Rd. where a local sample tested positive for E. coli.

Reacting to a number of questions as to why it took five days to be alerted to the failure of the chlorination system and potential danger, VCH Drinking Water Officer Tim Adams said "that when they discovered the chlorination failure they immediately asked for a chlorine residual test, got the system working, hand chlorinated and flushed the system."

He went on to say that the first set of samples tested negative.

In the second set of six samples, taken on Wednesday, Aug. 23, one

tested positive for E. coli.

Engineer David Gibson said that telephone alarms would be operable within two to three weeks and outlined possible steps to improve the system's reliability, including:

- Amalgamation with the SCRD system;
- Amalgamation with the North Pender Harbour Water District;
- Investigate the feasibility of drawing water from Chapman Creek;
- Installation of a multi barrier treatment plant;
- A "source-to-tap" study of the system (to be completed in February 2007).

"The system has been tested every day since and will be... until these systems are in place."

SPHWD Administrator Bobbi Bennett said.

"We're fixing it so that this situation won't happen again."

1 tired in collision

A Pender Harbour man is in stable condition after a head-on collision with that town's monthly newspaper.

At approximately 12:30 p.m. on Sept. 25, Brian Lee, 35, was talking on his mobile phone while inside his parked vehicle outside the Hope Visitor's Centre.

The *Harbour Spiel*, operated by Kleindale resident Myrtle Winchester, slammed into Lee, causing extensive damage.

He's currently undergoing treatment at a local pub but is expected to make a full recovery.

Witnesses report that the other vehicle had been seen driving erratically for months but it is not yet known if alcohol was a factor.


Daniel Rd. housefire

Even thoughthe RCMP's involvement was minimal, the Fire Department remained on the scene.



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








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Robin Reid





What a rush!


It was an experience of a lifetime to meet such courageous young men doing something so totally from the heart.

Don't Throw that Old Sour Paw Away

Let's take a moment to think about chainsaws.

I don't mean any of these new plastic jobs designed to be run by teenage girls.

I mean a good hefty Titan Bluestreak, which weighed 60 lb. with no bar and was once fitted with a bar 22 feet long.

It didn't have quite enough power to pull all that chain so they put an engine at both ends.

The Bluestreak was built in Seattle in 1948 and was one of the first powersaws that began to turn up everywhere, even small logging camps like the one my dad had on Nelson Island in the fifties.

Like most saws in those days, it only ran sometimes, and I remember it being cursed at a lot, but I liked its beautiful metallic blue paintjob.

It had handlebars like a wheel-barrow.

Years later my brother Don used the engine from it to power Madeira Park's first go-kart.

Among the dozens of saws that came into our camp to be used and abused, my favourites were the IEL Pioneers.

We had both a Twin two-man and a Super Pioneer one-man

I have fond memories of them, both I think be-

cause they were well regarded by the grown-ups due to their reliability and because they were painted fire-engine red and had a neat square shape, unlike the Titan, which had knobs and fins and pipes sticking out like a giant pincushion.

Some other saws I remember from those days were the Mall, the McCulloch and the Hornet.

Just hearing those names takes me back.

Old power saws are part of the nostalgia industry these days.

You seem them hoisted to places of honour in country pubs and hardware stores, and there is always a crowd of standing around admiring them the way others admire old cars.

Didn't Ruby Lake restaurant used to have one nailed to the wall?

David Lee, who used to service saws at the local tool rental, has just written the world's first-ever book about classic chainsaws and paging through it is sure to set loose a flood of memories for anybody who's been around here hacking at trees for any length of time.

There are all sorts of pictures here of saws I once saw all over the place but haven't seen for years.

There's the old two-man Mc-Culloch 1225A with a square top so flat and wide you could play cards on by a playboy who'd built airplanes during the war, and he brought all kinds of new tricks to the saw scene.

The main one was an airplanetype carburettor that allowed the engine to run on its side or upside down.

Earlier saws had float carbs that had to be kept more or less upright, a real drawback in a powersaw.

He knew how to make ultra-thin castings using ultra-light magnesium and his 1949 3-25 was revolutionary for its lightness—only 25 lb!

That was the one that was kind of comma-shaped in profile and had big holes cut out of the bar.

I remember seeing them around for years, but had no idea they were historic breakthroughs.

In 1964 the Homelite Corp. came out with its XL-12 that was only twelve pounds and later Frontier Chainsaws of Trail BC came out with a saw that only weighed 6 lb, so within a few years 25 lb didn't seem all that brilliant.

In general the story of chainsaws is like a lot of stories: once upon a time there were many independent

brands, a lot of them made in Canada, but now there are but a handful mass-produced in foreign lands.

The last Canadian factory went out of business in 1993.

But we're lucky to have a few collectors and chainsaw buffs around who

have kept tabs on all those grand old brands that are no more.

In his book David partnered with Mike Acres, one of the top collectors in the world, and he runs a great website at www.acresinternet.com.

We look around and are fortunate to see oceans and lakes, trees and mountains, eagles, loons and other birds, deer, otter, salmon, bears and the list goes on.

Our ecosystems seem intact as creatures of all shapes and sizes seem to find a place to live and thrive.

However, as our population grows is it inevitable that wildlife and humans will come into conflict?

With careful review, we must not break the balance we share with wildlife and our environment.

In this age of impending global warming, deforestation and species extinction we often hear about protecting ecosystems and wildlife habitat.

So what exactly does this mean for us living here in Pender Harbour?

To help assure that all Pender Harbourites be acknowledged when considering the landscape of the area, the Pender Harbour and District Wildlife Society promotes respect of the local fauna and flora.

In fact, the society has been keeping an eye on Pender Harbour's natural assets for over 20 years.

The society has put up purple martin nesting boxes to attract the birds back to the Harbour, removes the invasive purple loosestrife plant from Lily Lake every summer and helps keep track of our bird population every year by hosting the local survey of the Audubon's annual Christmas bird count, an event which takes place across North America.

The society has helped with the Iris Griffith marshland in Madeira Park, funded the topographical model of the region at the Iris Griffith Nature Centre at Ruby Lake Lagoon and is a steward of a local ecological reserve.

Last year the society was one of the first to witness the damage to the old growth forest in the Caren Range caused by the Pan Pacific Aggregate mine exploration.

The society helped create GRIPS and continues to encourage the recycling depot by donating a \$15 raffle prize every month. (Don't forget to enter to win next time you drop off your recyclables!)

If you appreciate the Pender Harbour wildlife, why not come along to the society who get together at 7:30 p.m. every third Tuesday from September to May (excluding December) at the Pender Harbour High School.

The guest speakers are always interesting and are followed by refreshments and the best of home baked goodies as well as a chance to win prizes.

On Tuesday Nov. 21 the Wildlife Rehabilitation Network of BC will be discussing how they advocate for wildlife through action, legislation and education throughout the province.

There will also be a slide show bringing you into the world of wildlife rehabilitation and the steps involved in caring for injured wildlife and its release back to the wild.

The PH&DWS meetings are all free and are open to new and old residents.

They welcome donations as well as new ideas on how to keep Pender Harbour's intrinsic beauty intact and minimize threats.

Perhaps with your help and that of the Wildlife Society, our mountains will remain green, our streams clear and we, together with all our wildlife, will continue to enjoy a safe and unspoiled place to call home.

On September 23, 2006 the Pender Harbour Aquatic and Fitness Centre had a farewell swim and breakfast get-together for Bob and Sheila Adkin.


Bob rarely missed his early bird swims for over 20 years.



IT CAN HAPPEN TO YOU...

A couple of days ago, it seemed that I had nothing to

say for this issue.

Then there was a house fire.

Fortunately, we don't get many these days, but when we do, firefighters are reminded just how devastating a house fire can be.

Although in this case nobody was injured, the house was a total loss; try to imagine what it is like to be suddenly left with nothing but what you stand up in and your memories.

While the cause of the fire is unknown, it seems opportune for us to think again of what we can do to make us as sure as we can be that it won't happen to us.

First, have you got a smoke alarm, or better still, smoke alarms?

Do they work? Test them regularly! If you have elementary school-age kids, they should have been reminding you to do this, following on from their visit to our "fire house" during the recent Fire Safety Week.

Next, the chimney. If you haven't cleaned it yet this burning season, do it now.

Make absolutely sure there is no

possibility of radiated heat from the hot chimney setting fire to surrounding wood trimmers, or other materials.

Look at your elecrtic dryer.

Clean the lint trap religously after every use.

Disconnect the vent pipe and clean it out, get into the back (disconnecting the electricity supply first!) and clean out the accumulated dust.

If you're unsure how to do any of this, or have any doubts about the performance of the dryer, seek professional help.

Only a couple of weeks ago, a dryer was being mentioned in connection with the investigation into the cause of a fatal house fire on Vancouver Island.

Are you absolutely certain of the integrity of the electrical system in your home?

Do any of your switches or receptacles sometimes work, sometimes not?

If so, have them checked out.

Do you pull out as many plugs as possible when you go to bed?

Do you close doors when you go to bed or leave the house unattended?

Doors make good fire barriers, delaying fire spread.

Do you ever leave food cooking on the stove while you answer the door or the phone?

It's surprising how you can get sidetracked, completely forgetting the bacon sizzling in the frying pan...

Look around you: Are the open fireplaces adequately guarded against sparks?

Is there anything, a chair perhaps, near enough to the fire to start smouldering?

Do you use any naked flames like an

oil lamp or a candle for instance?

Can it easily get knocked over, if not by you, by the cat?

Do you leave matches or lighters lying around where the kids, fascinated by them, can pick them up and try and make them work?

If you've got a passing grade so far, how about this one: Does your family have an escape plan to get out of every room in the house, does everyone know it, and do you ever practise it?

The kids know about this; ask them how to do it if you're not sure.

If we do all of the above, we should be as safe as we can be.

Just one more thing.

If the unthinkable happens due to something beyond your control, are you sure we can find you quickly?

Is your entrance clearly marked with your house number, and visible from all directions of approach?

There's a suspicion that there was confusion over the address in the Vancouver Island fire mentioned above.

WHAT A SUMMER!

It just seemed to go on and on, but at last, it seems to be over.

Today it's raining and has been, on and off, for the last two days.

While the rain won't have soaked far into the ground yet, the danger of forest fires is now low and the burning ban has been lifted.

As mentioned a couple of months ago, we had a taste of what it's like to fight a forest fire this year.

We have to thank the vast majority of you for realizing the need for the ban and abiding by it.

Thank you for your concern for our community and our environment.

HARBOUR GARDENING

Fall Gardening Tips

Jim Rutherford

Fall cleanup: What is it all about? Let Mother Nature be your guide.

She who must be obeyed.

Cutting off the browned leaves of your day lilies, peonies, astilbe and hostas accomplishes a couple of things.

This removes a hiding place for nefarious pests like aphids and slugs.

Also, now you can lightly top dress and let our winter rains (remember them?) wash the soil around the plant.

An addition of a natural soil amendment like bone meal is very helpful.

Some plants like calla lilies are very sensitive to rot.

I've killed several over the years by letting the limp summer growth collect.

A raised protected bed with good drainage will help and give years of enjoyment.



I'm always surprised by how drought tolerant they are.

Now is a good time to divide your daylilies, peonies and crocosmia.

But if perennials like *helenium* and *helianthus* are blooming late, just wait until they naturally die down.

Oriental and hybrid lilies are always a favourite.

After cutting off the bloom head, let the plant die back on its own.

Remember: in order to produce such great blooms, they need heavy feeding.

Not the Bayview buffet folks, but plant nutrients to help out.

Rotted manure, bone meal or humus should be added to build up the soil.

GRASS AND MORE GRASS.

Huron Surprise with its reddish plumes can really add colour and texture to your garden.

Grasses are just coming into their own so let them show off and don't cut them back until the rains and winds have beaten them down.

If your pampas (remember when it was all the rage?) is overpowering your landscape, the plumes can be cut off to give you a lovely fountain look and will focus attention on some of the newer grasses.

For fall colour, Callicarpa,

with purple berries, and snowberry, with white berries are hardy interesting shrubs.

When you see a fall plant sale advertised, it can be an opportune time to purchase plants.

Many nurseries do not want to carry stock over the winter as plants in landscape pots may be damaged from freezing of the root system.

So plant any you purchase in the ground, which is still warm, and mulch for protection. Heft the plant you are thinking of buying and if it feels very light, reconsider.

Azaleas, I find, are one plant that does not recover from being dried out, whereas bulbous roots have a natural reservoir of water e.g. bearded iris corms.

If your lawns are important to you then you already know that a depth of leaves on it will yellow and kill the grass if left covered.

Let's relax, enjoy the crisp air and admire the colour that surrounds us

Mother Nature does everything in her own sweet time, but we introduce non-native plants that are susceptible to creatures that were already here.

So the cleanup and prep for next year is the price we pay.

PENDER PET PATTER

Spaying and Neutering

In just seven years, one unspayed cat and her offspring can produce over 450,000 cats (average litter of three kittens, twice a year).

In seven years, one dog and her offspring can produce over 4,000 dogs (average litter of four, once a year).

WHAT DO THE TERMS SPAYING AND NEUTERING MEAN?

"Spaying" and "neutering" are surgical procedures used to prevent pets from reproducing.

In a female animal "spaying" consists of removing the uterus and ovaries. For a male animal, "neutering" involves the removal of the testicles.

WHEN SHOULD THE SURGERY BE DONE?

The usual recommendation is at 5 - 6 months of age for both cats and dogs.

Your veterinarian should be consulted to determine the best time for your pet.

SHOULDN'T A FEMALE PET HAVE ONE LITTER FIRST?

Allowing a female dog or cat to produce a litter does not have any benefits.

There are health risks to the mother during the pregnancy and when giving birth.

WILL MY PET BECOME FAT AND LAZY ONCE IT IS STERILIZED?

Pets become fat and lazy as a result of overeating and a lack of exercise, not from spaying or neutering.

WILL IT CHANGE MY PET'S PERSONALITY?

For a female there is virtually no change at all. For males it usually results in a diminishing of some aggressive behaviours.

Spayed/neutered pets are free from sexual anxiety and are usually

calmer and more content to stay at home.

WHAT DOES IT COST TO SPAY/NEUTER MY PET?

The cost of spaying or neutering your pet depends on many factors.

For example, a large dog will cost more than a small dog; if your pet is overweight or in heat this can also add to the cost.

Contact your veterinarian to get a more accurate idea of the costs involved for your pet.

Consider the possible costs if you do not spay and neuter: If your pet should wander off in search of a mate, you may be faced with costs of maintaining puppies or kittens for which finding homes may be difficult.

Worse, think of the costs involved should your pet be injured while roaming for a mate.

WHAT ARE THE BENEFITS OF SPAYING AND NEUTERING?

Spaying a female eliminates the possibility of her developing uterine and/or ovarian cancer and greatly reduces the chance of mammary (breast) cancer.

If spayed before the first heat cycle, there is less than 1% chance of developing mammary (breast) cancer.

Pets with diabetes or epilepsy should be spayed to prevent hormonal changes that may interfere with medication.

Neutering a male eliminates the risk of testicular cancer and reduces the incidence of prostate enlargement and prostate cancer.



Defying the strict morality of the day, they run off in Nathan's kicker boat to spend a few scandalous months together along the BC coast before being banished to separate continents.

Even the wild, convoluted Inside Passage can't hide them forever—they are caught and taken back to Silva Landing.

Leah is sent off to nursing school and then, when World War I breaks out, to a hospital near Etaples, France.

Nathan, a conscientious objector, goes to work logging Sitka spruce on the central coast for a surly, tight-fisted gyppo logger.

From opposite sides of the world, the lovers exchange letters when they

can, living on hope and memories.

When Leah is discharged fom her duties overseas and Nathan is injured in a horrific logging accident, they are reunited in Silva Landing.

But a new challenge awaits them—despite his best efforts, Nathan is conscripted into the Canadian army.

their government and the Great War itself.

Inspired by a real event, here on the Sunshine Coast, *Rain Before Morning*, is a heart-rending tale reminiscent of David Guterson's *Snow Falling On Cedars*.

In one way, Leah and Nathan's story could only unfold on the Sunshine Coast during World War I; in another, it is a timeless, universal tale of passion, war, tragedy and the power of love.

Mike Poole began his career as

a copy runner for the Vancouver Sun before becoming a reporter.


He earned a journalism degree in Virginia, USA, started
