# editorial

## And... it's over

It's three weeks past Labour Day and I'm still sighing with relief from the departed crowds.

I know I'll be

whacking my testicles with a pipe wrench in January to distract myself from the monotony of a Pender Harbour winter but, for now, who doesn't enjoy September's sudden serenity?

After the U.S. dropped its economic hush on the planet in 2008, things looked bleak for this place.

I resolved that if our economy ever bounced back, I wouldn't be so quick to complain about the pace of development again.

And I haven't — I'm excited about changes that are taking place and welcome the economic optimism.

Growth doesn't come painlessly but I've accepted that it's better than the bleak alternative of closing schools.

Still, if the secret really is out about this place, we need to prepare for those sacrifices and challenges that come with popularity.

In July, 66,528 cars travelled from Langdale to Horseshoe Bay.

That's an eight-per-cent increase over July 2016, which was a 4.22-per-cent increase over July 2015.

In August, I travelled to Vancouver on a Wednesday morning and arrived at the terminal over 90 minutes before the sailing.

I was nine cars from getting on with a hundred or more behind me.

I accept the hazard of overloads on a weekend but I've been hitting the same Wednesday in August for 11 years and have seen nothing like it.

The service we rely on to access the rest of the world no longer

requires a tweak to the schedule — we clearly need more capacity.

Luckily, for the first time since his 2005 election, our MLA, Nicholas Simons, is also a member of the governing party.

But even after Mr. Simons fixes the ferries, the growing traffic volume is sure to trigger nostalgia for a time when summer was more ... leisurely.

When you could roll into Dan Bosch park for a picnic and the whole family could find a spot on the beach to lay out towels.

Or find a parking spot in Madeira Park.

Or take some time off.

Our acute shortage of long-term rental housing has left many businesses short-staffed during the summer.

An abundance of employment should be cheered but I couldn't help but notice that it often showed in the faces of overworked service staff.

Short-term vacation rentals are blamed for the LTR problem but they satisfy a hungry market.

Those guests are the reason you saw full cashier lines at the IGA or needed reservations for dinner at La-Verne's Grill.

There are over 250 STRs operating in Pender Harbour and Egmont (story p. 9) but I didn't talk to one hotelier this summer who wasn't close to fully booked.

That tells me we don't have enough traditional accommodation to meet demand.


With the reality of PODS, that shortage might inspire a savvy developer to give up on Gibsons and build a George Hotel here.

That would have sounded preposterous a few years ago but the pace of change has shifted once again and we must adapt.

We don't have a choice.


#### P. H. BLUES SOCIETY HALLOWEEN HOWL: Saturday, Oct. 28, 8 p.m.

# P. H. Advisory Council town hall meeting Sept. 10

In what has become a signal marking the end of the summer season in Area A, the Pender Harbour Advisory Council held its annual fall town hall meeting on Sept. 10 at the Pender Harbour Community Hall.

Over 150 people packed the hall for a diverse agenda promising updates on local issues including youth at risk, the Pender Harbour dock management plan, derelict boats, PODS and community Christmas planning.

# PENDER HARBOUR COMMUNITY VOLUNTEER AWARDS

Meeting chair Alan Stewart first introduced Mike Price from the Rotary Club of Pender Harbour to present the inaugural Pender Harbour Community Volunteer awards.

Bill Gilkes received the volunteer of the year award for, among other things, being part of a team of P. H. fire department volunteers who attended a traffic accident involving an SUV which went off the road, plunging over a waterfall and into a creek just south of Madeira Park.

The rescue was a joint effort of the PHVFD and the Sechelt Fire Department but Gilkes rushed down to the vehicle, ignoring the personal risk involved, to secure the SUV so that it would not plummet farther down the rushing creek.

Gilkes stayed with driver Carolynne Drane of Surrey until she was pulled to safety hours later.

Doreen Lee received a lifetime achievement award for her long history of volunteering.

In 1966, with Joan Rae and Elna Warnock, Lee began to organize Pender Harbour's first community library, collecting books door to door, and launching the project from a room in

the P. H. Community Hall.

Lee was also a founding member of the P. H. Health Centre board in the 1970s and served on the board for the first three years of its existence.

Lee was also a founder of the Bargain Barn thrift store, which has raised many thousands of dollars over the last 40 years to benefit the health centre.

Barrie Wilbee also received a lifetime achievement award.

In 1971, Wilbee arrived in Madeira Park and immediately became a volunteer firefighter.

In 1995, he joined the P. H. fire protection district board, which he has chaired since 2001.

He has been a member of the Area A planning commission (1985 to 2005), the official community planning committee for Area A (2000 to 2005), the Area A incorporation planning committee (2000 to 2002), the Area A water master plan committee (2005 to 2006) and was a founding member of the Sunshine Coast economic development commission.

Wilbee was a founder of the Sunshine Coast employment development society and was a member and chairman from 1985 to 1995.

He also sat on the board of the Sunshine Coast salmon enhancement

society (2005 to 2007), was a member of the Sakinaw Lake sockeye salmon recovery team (2004 to 2006) and served as the Area A alternate director from 2005 until 2015.

# MLA NICHOLAS SIMONS AND THE P. H. DOCK MANAGEMENT PLAN

MLA Nicholas Simons addressed the Pender Harbour dock management plan and, to speak about its current status, he introduced the Chief of the Shíshálh Nation, Warren Paull.

Paull hinted that the change in leadership at the band offers hope for

forging a positive path forward when it comes to contentious issues like the dock management plan.

"When I first met with the regional board, I gave them a long spiel about how, yes, Tsilhqot'in (a landmark decision of the Supreme Court of Canada which established Aboriginal land title for the Tsilhqot'in First Nation) did say something about the fact that we have rights and we have to be consulted about what is going on within our territory," said Paull.

"But what Tsilhqot'in also did say, and it's something that is very (relevant), is the fact that all the people that are here now are still here and they're not going to go anywhere and we have to find a way to work together."

Speaking specifically about docks, Paull said,

"I know that there are questions with regards to the Pender Harbour dock management plan which have raised blood pressures.

"I am here to tell you that the Shíshálh Nation wants to work together with everyone.

"We're not going to get everything that we want, and we know that, and not everybody else is going to get everything that they want, but somewhere in there is middle ground and we look forward to finding it with you."

Simons spoke again next.

"I found out that after the Barry Penner report that studies were going to be undertaken on the environmental and archaeological aspects of the plan," said Simons.

"My understanding is that this week the contracts have been awarded to two companies to undertake those studies."

Simons added that the two reports are to be completed by "early next year."

# DERELICT BOATS IN PENDER HARBOUR

SCRD Area A director Frank Mauro outlined some of developments and issues surrounding derelict boats in Pender Harbour.

"It would be nice to say that local government has jurisdiction on this but they don't," said Mauro.

"However, I guess the director's role is to advocate for everything and one of the people I will be advocating to is our MLA, who does have some jurisdiction."

Mauro said he receives more calls on this topic than anything else.

"It's one of the most misunderstood terms — there's derelict boats, there's abandoned boats, there's vessels of concern — there's an entire gamut of the status of these boats that I get called about," said Mauro.

He then noted some success so far in removing hazards, pointing to a green boathouse anchored in Garden Bay last year that was removed last winter (but subsequently reappeared in

Green Bay).

Despite a small number of successes, Mauro acknowledged the hazard to navigation posed by boats when they sink, pointing to concerns over the sinking of two derelict tug boats in Gerrans Bay in past years.

"This is obviously one of the derelicts we have to deal with," said Mauro.

He listed some of the restrictions Transport Canada lays out for "permanently anchored boats" as well as Ministry of Environment regulations regarding discharging laws.

"The discharge laws are that you have to be one mile from the nearest shore before you can discharge overboard," said Mauros.

"Obviously, there's nowhere in Pender Harbour that meets that criteria.

"So these people are actually breaking the law by being there."

Regarding what can be done about the problems, Mauro listed two federal programs that provide funding for the assessment and removal of derelict boats and suggested a non-profit could apply for it, with the SCRD's assistance through grant-in-aid funding.

He then noted a federal private member's bill (C-219) that has been

introduced to make the Canadian Coast Guard responsible for all vessels.

"It's a private member's bill and many of those don't become law," said Mauro.

"So we need to make sure that we at least support the concept of having a single agency look after this."

Mauro next spoke on controversies surrounding short-term vacation rentals and mentioned an SCRD report that was due back in "a week or so," (see story p. 9).

# AREA A YOUTH UPDATE AND P. H. COMMUNITY SCHOOL OVERVIEW

Francine Clohosey and Darcie Murray outlined some of the programs administered through the P. H. Community School with a focus on youth programs.

Darcie Murray is a local youth worker who surprised many at a town hall meeting one year ago when she described the level of need our community faces when it comes to counselling, food and housing for youth.

"A lot of people weren't aware of the situation of the kids at risk and once we talked here last year, the overwhelming support has been amazing," said Murray.

"We've been able to make a lot of changes, with the biggest one being that we're able to act proactively instead of reactively."

Murray listed a number of programs that have been added to overcome some of the problems affecting local youth.

A hot breakfast program runs at the high school three days per week to ensure kids arrive in class fed.

Through donations, a refrigerator was also purchased for PHSS to be stocked with food for other times when students might arrive hungry.

"It's exciting because before I always felt that we were just handling problems as they came.

"Now we're able to put programs into place so we act before the problems actually happen," said Murray.


# PENDER OCEAN DISCOVERY STATION

# Lagoon society within a whisker of fundraising goal

With a week left before the Sept. 29 deadline to purchase the Irvines Landing Marina property to build PODS, the Ruby Lake Lagoon Society was just \$40,000 short of the \$2.4 million required.

Michael Jackson, executive director of the RLLS, said that only included what was in the bank, but more had been pledged. "We're pretty confident we're going to get there but we don't want to count our chickens before they hatch," said Jackson.

Last month the *Harbour Spiel* reported the non-profit had come within \$295,000 of the goal.

Since then, Jackson said all sizes of donations have poured in including a \$10,000 donation from the Rotary

Club of Pender Harbour, the largest donation in the club's history.

By Sept. 22, Jackson said they were averaging \$10,000 a day.

"We've been so stunned by how many people have contributed to this that we really don't think there will be too much trouble in raising the rest," said Jackson.

"So we're quietly confident."

# Consultation gauges residents' thoughts on short-term rentals

Sunshine Coast residents fear short-term rentals are depleting the long-term rental accommodation stock and are contributing to parking and noise problems.

Those are the two biggest impacts of STRs according to respondents in an SCRD consultation this summer.

The results were compiled in a staff report by SCRD senior planner David Rafael and presented to the Sept. 21 SCRD infrastructure services committee.

The report compiles 662 responses to an on-line workbook and questionnaire that was open from June 19 until Aug. 15 of this year.

In February, SCRD staff located 276 STR units in Pender Harbour and Egmont in just four websites — vrbo. com, tripping.com, airbnb.ca and homeaway.com.

The staff report says:

"STRs are generally considered as the rental of one or more rooms or an entire dwelling for periods of less than 30 days.

"Within the SCRD an STR is not a permitted use in rural and residential zones and is considered different from a traditional bed and breakfast, which is defined and regulated in ... SCRD zoning bylaws." Respondents cited the most important benefit of STRs as providing "revenue potential that enables home ownership."

Not far behind was the benefit of providing "more accommodation options and range of prices for visitors."

Over 40 per cent of respondents said STRs should be allowed but with conditions, while almost 30 per cent said they should be allowed with no conditions.

Almost 30 per cent do not want them allowed at all.

The questionnaire also attracted over 100 STR operators.

When asked what the space would be used for if it were not an STR, the most frequent response was that the unit would be available for friends/family.

Only six per cent of STR operators said they would be used for longterm rental if not used as an STR.

Others noted challenges they experienced with long-term renters and the perception that the BC Residential Tenancy Act is weighted in favour of tenants (though the report points out that several comments from non-operators considered that the legislation was weighted in favour of landlords).

Over half of operators who responded indicated they earn less than \$10,000 per year from STRs while over 30 per cent earn more than \$15,000.

Targeted meetings with key stakeholders will continue through the rest of the year and a report outlining options available to the SCRD is due in early 2018.

# Rotary kicks off RCM SAR fundraising for new boat with \$5,000

Pender Harbour's Royal Canadian Marina Search and Rescue (Unit 61) response boat, the *Iona C*, is nearing the end of its mandated service life. To kick off fundraising for the purchase of a new boat, the Rotary Club of Pender Harbour stepped up with this giant cheque for \$5,000 on Sept. 21. Now more than 10 years old, Pender Harbour's Royal Canadian Marina Search and Rescue (Unit 61) response boat, the *Iona C*, needs to be replaced.

The Rotary Club of Pender Harbour officially kicked off the local RCM SAR's fundraising drive with a donation of \$5,000 on Sept. 22.

RCM SAR volunteers provide marine search and rescue for approximately a 50-kilometre radius in the Strait of Georgia that includes Malaspina Strait, Bjerre Shoals, Jervis Inlet, Egmont and Princess Louisa inlet.

The charitable society that manages the local unit, the P. H. and District Marine Rescue Society, is required to raise funds for a replacement vessel by 2021.

The total estimated cost of a replacement boat is \$800,000 but the PHDMRS expects that a large portion of the cost will be provided through grants from the gaming corporation of BC as well as from the sale of the current vessel.

October 2017

David Lacey, station leader coxswain of Unit 61, told the *Harbour Spiel* the boat had a rescue life expectancy of 10 years.

"It at least needs a refit but even with that we would only get a few more years out of it," said Lacey.

"RCM SAR has a fleet managment plan in which they're trying to standardize their fleet.

"So, every station, fleet-wide, must have one of two vessels."

The vessel selected by the society is a type two Falkins class which is a 36-foot rigid hull inflatable with an enclosed cabin, much like the *Iona* 

C, but six feet longer.

"The thing about the new vessel is that it has a 30-year service span," said Lacey.

"It's also a jet boat which serves us well in SAR because we can get into tight areas with more maneuvrability and we don't have to worry about props and skegs hitting rocks.

Another key safety feature of the Falkins class vessel is that it is self-righting in case of rollover in rough weather.

The new vessel will be powered by twin 870HP diesel engines and will reach speeds of 39 knots.



### rcmp news

#### **MVA**

On Aug. 28, police attended a single-vehicle incident on Highway 101 near Middle Point Road.

A northbound vehicle made an abrupt turn into the ditch, ending up wedged between the edge of the roadway and a rock face.

The driver of the vehicle had to be extracted from the vehicle by the P. H. Volunteer Fire Department before being transported to Sechelt Hospital with extensive, non-life-threatening injuries.

have had some success in having two structures removed.

I gave an update at the community meeting and made an appeal for support from a volunteer group to apply under a recently announced federal government grant program to dispose of derelicts in our harbour.

The program has an assessment and removal component which provides 100 per cent of eligible costs for boat removal assessments and 75 per cent of total eligible costs for the actual removal and disposal of boats.

Eligible recipients include local governments, First Nations, not-forprofits and private businesses.

The SCRD has no service (and no jurisdiction) to apply for or provide funds for such a grant application, but could possibly provide funds through a grant-in-aid to a not-for-profit society to assist with the funding.

I plan to continue to work with our MP, who has been very supportive, and our MLA, now a member of the governing party, in order to simplify the current complex regulatory regime regarding these issues.

I must stress how important this is since local government is usually saddled with the consequences of the derelict vessel problem and has no iurisdiction.

Proposed federal legislation changes include two proposed bills.

The first is M-40 to improve education, ownership identification and to help to remove abandoned boats.

The second is C-219 to make the coast guard responsible for removal.

#### **UBCM CONFERENCE**

By the time you read this, I will have attended the Union of BC Municipalities conference during the last week in September.

It is noteworthy that there is another resolution on abandoned vessels proposed to add to the many already endorsed at UBCM.

It will be a busy conference as there are some 96 resolutions to be considered and workshops include such issues as the effect of the imminent legalization of marijuana on local governments.

I will report on the conference next month.







# What are your end-of-life decisions and wishes?

Here in Pender Harbour the median age of our population is 59.4.

That makes ours the oldest age demographic on the Sunshine Coast.

So here, more than anywhere else, it is important to recognize that it is every individual's responsibility to prepare for their own death or the possibility of being incapable of making their own decisions.

To not do so is irresponsible.

Advance care planning ensures your wishes regarding your future health care treatments are fulfilled.

It requires having meaningful conversations with your loved ones and your family doctor, to ensure your desires for which health care treatments you deem acceptable or non-acceptable if you become unable to express your own decisions.

#### **PLANNING AHEAD**

Why is this important?

Planning makes your wishes and instructions for your future health care known.


Planning provides your doctors and loved ones with valuable information to help guide them when providing health care for you.

Having this conversation now is important because you never know what life has in store for you.

Perhaps you will have a massive stroke or heart attack or develop dementia or get cancer or perhaps develop another illness that will make you incapable of making your own personal and health care treatment decisions.

Writing down your wishes and instructions for your future health care is creating an advance care plan.

Start by having discussions with



your loved ones and family doctor.

A written record of your wishes for future health care treatments creates a guideline for people to follow.

Provide contact information for someone you trust to be your temporary, substitute decision-maker.

# APPOINT YOUR ENDURING POWER OF ATTORNEY

This takes effect only when you become incapable of making your own decisions, for example, in the event of dementia.

The enduring power of attorney will be able to make decisions about your financial affairs.

Develop a representation agreement in which you write your health care instructions and identify an individual to make your health care decisions if you become incapable of doing so yourself.

There are two types of representation agreements:

1. Enhanced, which allows deci-

sions to refuse life-support, or

2. Standard, which does not allow decisions to refuse life-support.

Finally creating an advance directive will provide instructions for doctors and other health care providers in regards your health and personal care if you are incapable of making your own decisions.

As the French might say, "Mettez votre merde en l'ordre."

To help develop your advance care plan, use the provincial workbook, My Voice: Expressing My Wishes for Future Health Care Treatment.

"Hey, Nannie, Nannie," he called.


A goat came trotting in.




