An AAP shines a light on Area A's ROI

I was close to finishing this issue when someone alerted me to a notice in the Oct. 17 *Coast Reporter* of an SCRD alternative approval process to borrow \$13.18 million on our behalf (story, p. 8).

I was shocked.

I recalled receiving a press release on it but I ignored it.

Why?

Because the loan was needed to build wells in Langdale that will feed into the Chapman water system that supplies the Lower Coast with water.

I assumed it didn't apply to us — until I read the notice:

"The costs of the debt will be recovered through the regional water service parcel tax on those properties that have access to SCRD water in the water supply and distribution area."

The notice then listed Area A (Egmont/Pender Harbour) as part of this group and included Area A's entirety in a map of the water supply distribution area.

It seemed like Area A property owners would be on the hook for an average of \$97 per parcel annually until the debt is repaid in 20 years.

I couldn't recall Keats Islanders or Creekers chipping in for our ongoing and expensive water projects but it had been a few years since I paid close attention to what service costs are shared in the SCRD, so I delved.

On a tight deadline, I finally got a response from the SCRD.

It turns out that, no, South Pender and North Pender water service areas will not be on the hook for this annual tax hit.

And the confusion is Egmont, Earls Cove and the SCRD's fault.

But mostly the SCRD's.

The SCRD has three water service areas made up of seven water

systems, including:

- The regional water service area which includes Chapman, Langdale, Eastbourne (Keats Island), Cove Cay and Egmont water systems;
- South Pender Harbour water service area (McNeill Lake), and
- North Pender Harbour water service area (Garden Bay lakes).

Both Egmont (Waugh Lake) and Cove Cay (Ruby Lake) are small water systems with about 118 service connections combined.

The rest of the regional water service systems supply water to over 10,000 homes from Halfmoon Bay to Howe Sound.

Due to some complicated provincial bureacracy and because Egmont and Cove Cay are our Area A brethren, but also part of the Lower Coast's regional water service, Pender Harbour must be included in the AAP but is not responsible for the loan.

That's a relief for Pender Harbour but what about the poor suckers in Egmont and Earls Cove?

They're forced to split a \$13 million dollar bill for water they'll never drink, 90 kilometres away.

To be fair, the regional water system users share costs in Egmont and Cove Cay too, which, with today's safety standards and maintenance costs, helps offset the burden carried by a relatively small connection base.

But, if nothing else, this goofy AAP brings up questions:

Considering the costly issues with water down south, are Egmont and Earls Cove getting value for their contributions to regional water service?

Would an amalgamated Area A water service combining all four systems (S. Pender, N. Pender, Egmont and Cove Cay) make more sense?

It would certainly be much less confusing.

20TH ANNUAL SUNSHINE COAST BIOBLITZ KICK-OFF: Saturday, Nov. 8 (7 days), 10 a.m.

At the Madeira Park kick-off, Loon Foundation staff will teach you how to use the iNaturalist app and sign up to the project, answer questions and jump start your observations by looking at organisms on display in the PODS showroom and Tranquility Garden. Michael Jackson steps down from Loon Foundation

On Oct. 2, the Loon Foundation announced that Michael Jackson, its executive director, has retired.

Jackson steps down after 25 years as one of the original founders of the Ruby Lake Lagoon Society, builders of the Iris & Billy Griffith Nature Centre.

In 2020, the RLLS became the Loon Foundation and Jackson supplied much of the vision and leadership behind the PODS development planned for Irvines Landing.

Filling his shoes as interim executive director of the foundation is Lana Brandt, formerly the director of communications and marketing for the organization.

A resident of Gibsons, Brandt comes with 20 years of non-profit experience including stints working with the David Suzuki Foundation, Fish-Wise and the Rob Stewart Sharkwater Foundation.

Brandt told the *Harbour Spiel* that she has a six-month contract and they are currently "shuffling the team around" to fill her previous position while starting a recruitment process to find a new executive director.

After spending two decades in non-profit spaces, mostly in marine conservation projects, Brandt said it's her dream to work where there's an intersection of scientific research, culture and education, art, community connection.

"I'm so excited because this is such a pivotal time for the Loon Foundation and for PODS," said Brandt.

"I think that everything that is at the heart of our mission, whether it's the (Coastal Waters) monitoring program, education, youth and community engagement, it's such important work and it's all a pathway to PODS and it's leading up to something beautiful here."

With plans and building permits in place, Brandt said construction at the PODS site will begin in early 2026.

The Loon Foundation has announced several times that ground-breaking would occur soon.

Jackson told the *Harbour Spiel* that construction would begin in the "fall of 2024," (*Harbour Spiel*, July 2024).

On Feb. 27, the foundation announced it had received a building permit for the project.

In March, Jackson said (*Harbour Spiel*, April 2025 issue) he expected construction to "begin next month, if not sooner."

Brandt understands why some are questioning the delays.

"I will say, it's a huge project and with that there's so many milestones that need to be achieved before you can actually begin," said Brandt.

"I'd like to improve communications with the community on what those are because I think everyone's wondering when they will see construction start."

Brandt said the mass timbers, a key architectural feature of the buildings, are currently under construction in Squamish.

While the project's momentum ensures it will move ahead without him, Brandt said Jackson's departure

leaves a big role to fill.

"He was the dreamer behind all of this and made it possible," she said.

So, we're seeing it as the next phase to bring it to life."

"The way I've come to sort of wrap my head around this is that it's such a huge project and I think that the next phase of bringing it to life — milestones, fundraising, closing that gap — all of those things, it requires

maybe a different skill set.

"Plus, I'm assuming, that with his retirement, maybe he didn't want to commit to taking on that next phase."

Jackson confirmed that sentiment.

"Basically, I just came to the conclusion that I can't go on forever, and I am 71 now," Jackson told the *Harbour Spiel*.

"It was just that there's so much going on now and that was one of the reasons that I was like really thinking about retirement.

"I was getting so stressed out the workload was just enormous.

"I was just doing 12-hour days, back-to-back, over weekends.

"It was just an impossible amount of work."

Jackson said he is also suffering a serious shoulder injury, which may require surgery and he decided it was time to pay more attention to his health and pass on the reins of the project that has taken up much of his life for the past decade.

"I just don't think I have the gas left in me to go on," he said.

Jackson helped form the Ruby Lake Lagoon Society in May of 2003.

Since that time, he estimates he and his colleagues have raised over \$40 million for projects including the Iris & Billy Griffith Nature Centre and PODS.

"There's a whole new group coming in here," said Jackson.

"They are active fundraisers and know what they're doing.

"It's kind of a younger generation coming in to take on the next steps and I think that's absolutely fine."

Jackson leaves proud of what

they accomplished.

"I remember when we first started planning discussions on PODS and I was at Pender Harbour and Area Residents Association meeting and I asked, 'What do you want me to do with this project?"" Jackson said.

"They said, 'Put Pender Harbour on the map.'

"I think we definitely did that.

"Everybody knows about PODS on the Coast and lot of people know about Pender Harbour now."

Brandt and Jackson both told the *Harbour Spiel* that it was coincidence that weeks before his retirement, five of seven directors of the Loon Foundation also resigned.

Stepping down are Ryan Miller (chair), Locke Rowe (vice chair), Jim Cameron (secretary), Jeff McGuire (treasurer) and Rhian Piprell (director).

"It was a natural time for many of them to move on," said Brandt.

"I think with PODS construction on the horizon and everything we need to bring that to life, it was just a natural time for this transition to take place."

"A lot of them had been in their role for a long period of time and so it is a period of renewal."

Their departures leave Brandt and two other directors, Brendan Glauser and Will Corse, to manage the foundation, overseeing millions of dollars in funding, until replacements can be elected.

Brandt said that will happen at the foundation's annual general meeting on Nov. 29 at 11 a.m. at the PODS showroom in Madeira Park.

"We're excited to connect with the community and provide transparency on everything," said Brandt.

"There's been lots of changes — from leadership to also, I think,

questions about why aren't we seeing PODS being constructed.

"So, it's going to be an exciting time to connect with and update the community and our members."

AAP: Most of Area A will not pay for costs of Langdale well project

Some Pender Harbour residents were shocked to read an SCRD notice in the Oct. 17 *Coast Reporter* that seemed to include them in a Sunshine Coast Regional District alternative approval process to borrow \$13.18 million to build three wells in Langdale.

An AAP is a process where taxpayers submit a response form only if they are opposed to the borrowing and, in this case, it includes electoral areas A (Egmont/Pender Harbour), B (Halfmoon Bay), D (Roberts Creek), E (Elphinstone), F (West Howe Sound) and the District of Sechelt.

The wells will contribute an additional 60 litres per second (5,184 cubic metres/day) once connected to the water system that serves the lower Sunshine Coast, but not Area A.

The SCRD has three water service areas with seven water systems:

- Regional water service area including Chapman, Langdale, Eastbourne, Cove Cay (Earls Cove) and Egmont;
- South Pender Harbour water service area, and
- North Pender Harbour water service area.

According to an SCRD spokesperson, all residents of Area A are eligible to take part in the AAP by submitting elector response forms but only those in Cove Cay (Earls Cove) and the Egmont water system will be responsible for the \$13.18 million debt repayment.

"This is due to provincial rules and the way the initial regional water service was established in the SCRD.

"The provincial rules specify that eligible participants are determined by the geographic area defined in the original service establishing bylaw (SCRD Bylaw 1002) for the water supply and service distribution area."

"While North and South Pender Harbour have since established separate water services, they still remain part of the initial service establishment for the water supply and distribution area and therefore must be included as participants in the AAP, but will not be responsible for repayment of the loan as North and South Pender water systems are each part of a separate and distinct service with their own parcel tax roll."

If approved, the loan will result in an estimated annual cost of \$97.28 over a 20-year term for approximately 118 water customers in Egmont and Cove Cay and will be applied through the regional water service parcel tax until the debt is retired.

A bright hat or even fluorescent wrist bands could save your life.


Best option is vizzy vest that you wear over your stylish outfit.

An upwardly mobile landfill

Since 2011, people believed that 90 per cent of our garbage could be recycled, reused, or composted

with an efficient resource recovery infrastructure, and we're still heading in that direction.

The recent water pond project at the Sechelt Landfill will extend its life until approximately 2031, but that looming expiry date demands an immediate solution.

The SCRD will undertake a vertical expansion of the Sechelt Landfill to extend its life about 30 more years, on the same footprint, at a lower cost, with easier permitting and with minimal service disruptions.

This provides us with a solution to our garbage problem until we can achieve our ultimate objective of reducing landfill volume by 90 per cent and we hope that continued and increased education, enforcement and diversion programs will significantly extend that 30-year lifespan.

Landfill expansion is the most cost effective at \$438.79/tonne and we still have one of the lowest disposal rates (kilogram/person of waste being landfilled) in the province.

Other considered options were ultimately trashed because of cost, time and other factors.

Lateral expansion of the landfill is feasible, but it's not supported by the landowner, the shishalh Nation.

A new landfill site involved location constraints, high development costs and implementation would be

years away.

Exporting garbage from Hillside Industrial Park was considered because it has barge access, the SCRD owns it and existing industry would mask noise and odour.

We lack the volume to employ a waste-to-energy project, but a waste shredder could add an additional four years of life at a lower cost than exporting the garbage (\$451 tonne versus \$588 tonne).

We recently awarded contracts of up to five years to operate Recycle BC depots to Gibsons Disposal (\$3,281,508), Salish Environmental Group (\$1,085,832) and our very own Pender Harbour Recycling Depot (\$1,093,315) to ensure they continue to divert residential packaging and paper products from our landfill.

SLAYING THE (WATER) DRAGON

The water dragon is one slippery beast so we won't slay it anytime soon, but we haven't quit trying.

Irresistible forces from inside and outside our communities have mandated updates to our water systems to a standard we never envisioned.

We expected to deal with infrastructure renewal, population growth, and backup sources, but we never imagined events beyond our control that dramatically increased our costs, such as escalating climate change, stricter fire-flow standards, skyrocketing construction costs, even more demands from senior governments, and the increasing threat of non-compliance fines.

It might seem hopeless, but we're chipping away at it as water continues to flow from our taps, and fire hydrants remain operational and our top-priority projects are either under construction or nearing that phase.

In 2018, the SCRD embarked on two grant-funded projects to replace failing watermains on Francis Peninsula (Pope to Rondeview Roads), Garden Bay Road and Claydon Road.

The work looked straightforward but the per-kilometre cost was much higher than estimated and by 2019, both projects were scaled back for lack of money, with significant lengths of the old watermains still in the ground.

The South Pender project, which included replacement of asbestos cement pipes, was stalled with a watermain break this spring that demanded immediate emergency work.

This increased the project's costper-kilometre by approximately 50 per cent, so we not only ran out of money November 2025

but had to convince the board to add \$90,200 to the paving budget.

Paving was authorized last month, with the intent of completion before year-end, but the Beaver to Rondeview Roads section can't happen until the board approves a supporting budget, hopefully in early 2026.

The North Pender project still needs watermain replacement along Panorama Drive, Panorama Place, the end of Garden Bay Road and part of Pool Road.

Prioritized sections of the project will proceed at the discretion of the SCRD, contingent upon available money.

We hope to see work begin in early 2026, which will reveal the actual cost per kilometre and refine our options.

North Pender's emergency generator, planned to be operational by fall, is expected closer to year-end as a design still must be provided for technical analysis.

The Dogwood reservoir construction and Cove Cay pump station upgrades should be completed in early 2026.

Some projects are being investigated for costs versus benefit and others because we want to avoid noncompliance fines.

Completion of a study and preliminary design for Egmont's water treatment plant is expected by the end of the year.

Predesign work for Garden Bay treatment plant upgrades likely won't make the year-end completion date target because of staff shortages (vacancies).

Deferment of a study and design to connect the North and South Pender water systems and a South Pender water-supply analysis pushed their original completion dates to late 2026.

Everybody gets to eat: The PHSS hot lunch and breakfast program

Isla Mackay Grade 12 student at Pender Harbour Secondary School

Imagine you're hungry.

Imagine trying to write a math test, do a chemistry lab and edit an English essay without breakfast.

And then, after, you have the 12-minute run waiting for you in phys ed.

Now, imagine that's been your life every day for the past five years.

We can't do our best work when we're hungry — it's biological.

The cost of not feeding children is greater than the cost of feeding them and by investing in the nourishment of our children, we invest in the future of our community.

As a student about to graduate from PHSS, I've seen how much food support matters.

I've also seen how fragile it can be.

A Feb. 2024 report by Nicholas Weswick, School District 46 secretary-treasurer, estimated that about 5.1 per cent of the 82 PHSS students, were "vulnerable."

A vulnerable child is typically defined as one who is unable to protect themselves and is dependent on others for sustenance and protection.

By November 2024, that number had jumped to 11 per cent — more than doubling in less than a year.

And, it's important to note that it's likely numbers don't tell the full story.

Many families face barriers to reporting their situation.

Based on what local volunteers and staff see every day, it's estimated that 25 to 30 per cent of PHSS students are living with some level of vulnerability.

Not every student is going to November 2025

reply to surveys as "hungry" because of the shame that surrounds food insecurity.

It means that in every classroom, some students are quietly facing food insecurity.

Some are forced to skip breakfast or come to school without a lunch.

According to Cheyenne Howitt at the Pender Harbour Community School, there are at least 8 different food and nutrition programs helping PHSS students and families.

Some reach as much as 70 to 80 per cent of our school community.

The hot lunch and breakfast program makes a huge difference, and all thanks to parent volunteers and the community school staff who are dedicated to ensuring a warm meal is provided five days of the week.

PHSS doesn't have a cafeteria, and there aren't many places nearby to buy a healthy lunch.

Rural distance, transportation costs and financial stress are all barriers.

Available Sunshine Coast data doesn't fully capture the situation in our area.

Pender Harbour isn't included in the Sunshine Coast Food Bank statistics counted from Gibsons to Sechelt.

That means poverty and food insecurity are under-represented locally, and likely higher than official numbers suggest.

This makes local programs even more important.

By feeding students in school, we help to close the gaps that bigger systems can miss.

One of the strengths of the PHSS hot lunch program is that it's open to everyone.

When food is available to all students, not just those who "qualify,"

the shame disappears.

Making food universally available also improves nutrition overall.

When healthy meals reach more students, they reach the ones who need them most.

It's community care in its simplest form.

On Nov. 19, I'll host a concert fundraiser from 7 to 8:15 p.m. at the Pender Harbour Community Church (13625 Sunshine Coast Hwy.), with all proceeds going directly to the PHSS hot lunch program.

Performers will include various Sunshine Coast musicians (pianists, violinists, guitarists, and ukulelists).

Pre-sale tickets will be available at the P. H. Community School and the PHSS by donation (suggested donation \$10- to 20 per ticket.)

Tickets will also be for sale at the door of the PHCC, neighbouring the high school, on the night of the event with all proceeds benefitting the dietary health of local students.







Poul Larsen JANUARY 31, 1940 — AUGUST 23, 2025



It is with deep sadness that the family of Poul Larsen announces that he died unexpectedly at Sechelt Hospital on Saturday, Aug. 23, surrounded by his closest family and friends.

Larsen was born in Fredericia, Denmark, to Karl and Erna, and had two younger brothers, George and Hans.

His professional life began at the age of 16 when he was hired as an apprentice in the press room of a local newspaper, thus embarking on a lifelong career in the printing industry.



PHWS presents Judy Myers: Dealing with invasive species in BC

Join the Pender Harbour Wildlife Society on Tuesday, Nov. 18 at 7 p.m. at Pender Harbour Secondary School for an engaging presentation by population ecologist Judy Myers,

Invasive species are one of the greatest threats to biodiversity in British Columbia and beyond.

Why do they thrive so successfully in new environments?

How do we manage their impact? Judy Myers is professor emerita in the department of zoology at the University of British Columbia.

She will explore the challenges and successes of dealing with invasive plants and insects, touching on natural declines, biological control and what we can learn for the future.

Myers' 35-year career at UBC as a population ecologist focused on

invasive species such as European cranefly, winter moth, knapweed and purple loosestrife.

She has studied everything from biological control to pesticide resistance, and co-authored *Ecology and Control of Introduced Plants* (Cambridge University Press, 2003).

In 2004, she was awarded the Entomological Society of Canada's gold medal for contributions to the theory and practice of biological control.

In 2014, she was elected president of the Canadian Society for Ecology and Evolution and served in that role until 2016.

Her other research passion has been the population cycles of the Western tent caterpillar, explored in collaboration with Jenny Cory at

She also helped launch UBC's first conservation biology course and has been a strong advocate for women in science.





Some names in this story have been changed to protect the guilty.

Decades ago, I had an amazing opportunity to caretake a 40 acre, water-access only property on the southwest side of Texada Island.

Mary and Al Palmer on Jedediah Island and "Skinny" Jimmy Dougan and his family on Texada's southern tip were our closest neighbours.

The Jones boys, Bruce and Gordan, along with their parents, were culturing oysters in Skerry Bay, just across Sabine Channel on Lasqueti Page 32

Island.

Neighbouring Bull and Boho Islands also had caretakers.

Joe Brown and his wife had a miner's lease further up the coast and picked huckleberry greens for florists.

Aside from being paid caretakers, my partner Keray Farrell and I dug clams commercially to make ends meet.

I was paid to teach the four kids as well (see "Correspondence education for dummies," Harbour Spiel, May 2025).

It was a great little community and we happily visited one another by boat and did frequent checks on various families by radio in the evening (see "The naked caretakers of Sabine Channel," Harbour Spiel June 2023).

Keray, my marine and parenting partner, and I lived and worked there with our four children from 1977 until early 1981.

It was during this time, about 1980, that our car was stolen from French Creek.

French Creek is close to Parksville and is a major boat basin for both commercial and pleasure craft.

Like most folks living on the outlying islands do, we kept a car in the

gravel lot there for our use when we visited the metropolises of Parksville or Qualicum or Nanaimo to shop, do business or whatever.

At that time here was no charge to park a car in this lot, nor was there any security, and theft was a problem — especially the siphoning of fuel out of the vehicles.

Honour among thieves dictated that the siphoners left enough fuel to get to the gas station on the way in to Parksville.

This seemed to work out OK and we all lived with this arrangement.

But, the theft of a whole car was rare.

On the morning of this particular ill-fated shopping excursion, our little blended family of children and both parents arrived in French Creek by speedboat prepared to launch a hectic day of foraging for necessary items.

These trips to Vancouver Island were quite infrequent.

Sometimes a few months passed between opportunities to get supplies that couldn't be grown or gathered.

These trips also provided a welcome opportunity to interact with the outside world.

It always surprised me that people found so much to do that involved driving around buying things.

But, as usual, we had a lot to accomplish that trip and the kids quickly spread out on the huge parking lot to locate our old white station wagon.

So much time had passed since our last trip off Texada that we couldn't remember where exactly we had left it.

"No car," was the report.

"It's not here."

How could that be?

It must have been stolen, but truly, could it have really been stolen?

The whole car, not just the battery or the fuel?

This was pretty bad news, but with little choice, we flagged down a ride into Parksville and reported the theft at ICBC (or whoever it was that insured and registered a car in those days).

Their reply was that we had not bought comprehensive insurance, which covers fire, theft, and glass.

So, the vehicle was not insured for theft.

Being survivors, we walked over to the bank and emptied the account, carrying on to the closest car lot that had another old station wagon available.

The new car was virtually the same as the stolen one and, \$400 later, we transferred the existing insurance onto it and moved on with our day.

Of course, we didn't bother with the comprehensive insurance option, which cost \$4 extra.

Many months later, friends on Lasqueti Island where we collected our mail and travelled frequently for all sorts of work and recreational events, reported that the Duval brothers from Parksville were bragging about stealing a white station wagon in French Creek.

The Duvals were then and still are a respected Parksville family, captains of the local logging industry who are generally very well thought of.

There is even a Duval Street in Parksville.

Apparently, they coveted its valuable engine and junked the rest of it in a logging slash where their family was working.

Well, that was interesting information but what could we do with it?

In 1980, these four sons were all in their 20s and considered the whole area their playpen and that they were somehow permitted to behave badly.

I was in my early 30s, so not much older, but I had no family other than the ones living on a side hill on Texada Island.

Nothing much could be done from the Sabine Channel side of Lasqueti Island, water access only.

Time passed by, maybe even a year, before Keray and I were back in Parksville with the children captive in the back of the fresh station wagon.

Let's go for a beverage, we thought.

We parked behind the Rod and Gun, a historic hotel in downtown Parksville.

We left the children to entertain themselves while we had a rare social occasion at a pub.

In we go and Keray hisses, "There's the Duval brothers. Don't make eye contact."

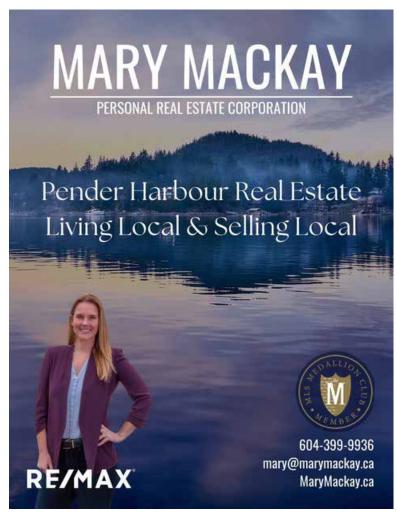

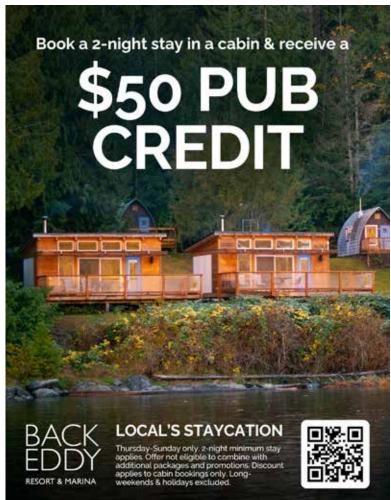
