A canary in our coal mine?

Everywhere I look, I find dead western red cedar trees.

I first noticed it on my property this spring, orange beacons

standing out against the familiar wall of green.

A closer look revealed dozens of them, all with matching red foliage indicating a simultaneous end.

Death seemed to favour the immature trees but not exclusively so, because the orange often stretched high up into the canopy.

I started noticing it in other places, such as Francis Point Marine Park and along the highway or shore of any lake.

I challenge you to not see it the next time you gaze at a wall of bush.

Clearly we have experienced a significant die-off — likely the delayed effects of last summer's extreme drought.

According to the Regional District of Nanaimo, last summer saw only four per cent of normal seasonal rainfall.

This past June, YVR recorded 58.2 mm of precipitation compared to 11 mm last year.

By July 19, we accumulated 32.8 mm of rain compared to 20.8 mm for the entire month of July 2015.

Cedars need plenty of water and suffer more than species like Douglas fir during drought conditions.

But the number of mature (20-plus year old) trees affected that must have survived other, less severe droughts, makes for an interesting discussion about the potential for a rapid shift in the distribution of species.

Scientific consensus tells us that we should expect occurrences like last summer's drought to be more frequent.

On my property, which is mostly rocky slope, I'd say 20-30 per cent of the cedar are red and dead.

If nothing else, the volume of dead, dry cedar has created a fire hazard.

But it's also another reminder of how our natural landscape is changing faster than ever before in human history.

We know arbutus trees have also suffered in recent years, possibly due to natural fungi that seem to be more lethal than previously seen.

In the ocean, sea urchins have proliferated as their natural predator, the starfish, mysteriously disappeared.

The sea urchins are already having an impact on kelp forests, described in one CBC news report investigating the phenomenon as a "kelp clearcut."

Acidification of the ocean (caused by increasing levels of carbon dioxide in the atmosphere) is having a profound effect on the ability of shellfish like scallops and oysters to reproduce.

Increased acidity reduces the calcium carbonate available that shellfish larvae use to grow their shells.

The Province newspaper recently reported that Island Scallops, which provides seed oysters and scallops for farmers, lost 90 per cent of its oyster larvae last year due to acidification.

But climate change isn't the only culprit set to alter our natural landscape.

According to British Columbia: A History by Richard and Sydney Cannings, over 4,000 species have been introduced to British Columbia by humans.

Over 500 of those are plants.

If you take note of plant life along the highway, you'll find species we take for granted, like salmonberry, being rapidly overtaken by Japanese knotweed.

Knotweed's rampant growth is made all the more threatening by the fact that it spreads faster when cut.

As our industrial momentum pushes us past the point where we can expect to reverse our impact, we can only observe these ominous trends and wonder what else is to yet to come.

Bursary for Sunshine Coast entrepreneurs honours local volunteer

Longtime volunteer and business leader Barrie Wilbee has been honoured for his contributions to the Sunshine Coast with an endowment in his name.

The Barrie Wilbee Bursary for Sunshine Coast Entrepreneurs was seeded through a contribution from Community Futures Sunshine Coast and matched by the Sunshine Coast Community Foundation.

From a July 11 CFSC release:

"Funds accrued within the endowment will be awarded annually to Sunshine Coast residents who require funding to further their education and knowledge in community economic development, entrepreneurship and business skills."

Wilbee is a former partner of Lowes Resort and helped run the business for many years.

Throughout that time he was involved with salmon conservation and sports fishing initiatives.

He also volunteered with the Pender Harbour Volunteer Fire Department since its early days and still holds an important role in the fire protection district's administration.

Later on he would come to focus on issues of economic development and helped start Community Futures of the Sunshine Coast in 1987.

CFSC provides services and program support to small- and mediumsized business owners and entrepreneurs.

Wilbee is currently co-chair of the CFSC's investments and loans committee and has sat on the nonprofit's board since 2008.

Over the past 35 years, Wilbee has also held volunteer leadership roles with the Sunshine Coast Economic Development Commission, Sunshine Coast Employment Development Develop

opment Society and the Area A advisory planning committee.

"Barrie is a tireless advocate for economic development and generously shares his time, expertise and wisdom with individuals and organizations committed to ensuring a healthy and sustainable Sunshine Coast," said Janice Iverson, executive director of Community Futures Sunshine Coast.

"He is a master collaborator and community connector."

Wilbee took the announcement with characteristic humility.

"When these kinds of things happen, you don't expect it but it kind of leaves you feeling funny," Wilbee told the *Harbour Spiel*.

"Not funny bad, but funny good — you think, 'Well God, what do I say?"


According to Wilbee, the endowment was seeded with \$10,000 but may double by next year.

When asked why he thought he received the honour, Wilbee said,

"Sometimes, I think maybe the value of somebody working in the community is hard to understand at the time because there's always change going on.

"But if some of the things you do stand the test of time, then I think people look differently at the people involved.

"And it's the network that comes from all the things you do — 20 years

on the APC, you know.

"The guy who was part of the group that finally got the first official community plan done after two or three attempts before that.

"The volunteer fire department—you learn a lot there too, like how to get the best out of people when they aren't being paid.

Reconciliation deal with SIB provides land, cash and consultation

On July 17, the province announced it will soon hand over 40 hectares of fee simple land on the west side of Sechelt Inlet near Egmont to the Sechelt Indian Band.

The "Egmont Parcel" and two other parcels, including 148 hectares in Narrows Inlet and 100 hectares in Salmon Inlet, are part of what is being described as a first step in a reconciliation agreement process.

The threeagreement deal also guarantees a share of forestry revenues and a new "government-to-government" framework intended "to further reconcile the interests and goals of the Shíshálh Nation and the province."

The announcement said "BC and the Shíshálh Nation will also work toward finalizing the Pender Harbour dock management plan once further environmental and archaeological studies in the area have been carried out."



The province will soon hand over the above 40 hectare parcel on the west side of Sechelt Inlet near Egmont to the Sechelt Indian Band as part of a reconciliation agreement process.

Three struck by lightning at Egmont campsite

Three men were injured when lightning hit their Egmont campsite on July 17.

Cheyenne Ramsey, owner/operator of Strongwater Camping and Cabins in Egmont told the Harbour Spiel the three were brothers.

One of them lives in Egmont and was visiting the campsite when it hit.

"They were all sitting by the fire and Eric was sitting on a picnic table under a tarp by a tree.

"So when the crack hit, it hit him and left a hole in his leg, burnt his pants and made his foot feel like jelly.

"It took his brother, who was sitting in a chair with a can of beer in his hand, and left his footprints in the ground and threw him 10 feet, flat on his back."

Ramsey said the third brother suffered holes in his pants and a red line up his leg.

"It was a pretty ferocious strike."

Ramsey called 911 and Eric spent the night in the hospital before returning home the next day.

"The other two guys refused to go down," said Ramsey.

"But Ron, the guy who was thrown from his chair ten feet, had to take his shoes off because his feet were so hot."

The charge took out Internet service in the area and Ramsey said all campers upgraded to cabins that night.

"Eric gave us his white sport sock with burn holes in it to frame," she said.

"We're calling him Flash Gordon now."

Perfect conditions for Malaspina Regatta

The weather conditions on July 1 were perfect, with a southeast wind of 10-15 knots blowing down the Strait.

This was a big change from the forecast a day earlier when it was calling for only five knots.

For the record 29 boats that entered the race, it could not have been better.

The 10-nautical-mile triangular course starts between Martin and Pearson Islands just outside the entrance to Pender Harbour, then heads out three miles to Hospital Reef, where it turns north to Ackland Rock before turning back to the finish where they started.

All boats got off to a good start and were soon out in the open waters of Malaspina Strait, where the waves increased in size and the wind settled to a steady 12 knots.

The first to Hospital Reef was Sean McAllister's EluaMakani, just ahead of David Pritchard in Deviant.

The second leg would, in lighter wind conditions, have seen most boats hoisting their spinnakers, but with the increase in the wind and a rougher sea state, only four boats chose to do so.

Those that did were able to gain on the boats ahead, but not without experiencing some problems with their spinnakers.

By the time the fleet reached

Ackland Rock, the lead had switched and *Deviant* was in front.

The final leg was into a rough and mixed sea with four-foot waves, which proved tough for the smaller boats.

As forecast, the wind had also increased and was between 15 and 20 knots.

The choice for skippers is always tricky at this point in the race as the conditions can be very different away from Nelson Island, compared to along its shores.

The fleet split with some choosing to head out while a few kept to the coastline.

The larger boats were able to

slice through the waves and were soon leading the way to the finish.

These conditions did cause two boats to tear their genoas, but no other damage was reported.

The finishing results were the closest that we have seen, with the first across the line honour awarded to Sean McAllister and the crew of EluaMakani.

Only 20 seconds behind was Andy Paulus in Wings II.

All boats crossed the line by two hours and 42 minutes — the fastest completion for all entrants on record.

First overall (on corrected time) was Munson McKinney in About Time.

The four divisional winners: AA: EluaMakani, Sean McAllister:

A: Wings II, Andy Paulus;

B: About Time, Munson McKinney, and

C: Yippee-Ki-Yae, Diana Valiela. Following the race a barbeque for crews and families was held at John Henry's where the trophies were awarded.

THEFT


Between mid-June and July 4, a thief stole an outboard motor from a boat parked in the 5700-block of Francis Peninsula Road, Madeira Park.



LILY LAKE WALKING TRAIL

Work toward the completion of the Lily Lake walkway is

expected to be completed this month.

NEW SCRD SIGNAGE

New, more visible and standard signs are being installed in many SCRD facilities.

BROADBAND AND CELL COVERAGE

In the last four years, since being first elected, I have heard from many residents regarding communications gaps in our area and the entire Sunshine Coast.

The installation of the Telus fibre optic network on the Sunshine Coast added an additional dimension to service here, and in doing so, brought to everyone's attention that there remain some pockets which have no broadband internet.

I have been working with Network BC, Telus and two other independent service providers to expand coverage on the Sunshine Coast and in our area in particular.

The latest news provided by the two independent providers is that the technology they are employing enables them to provide both broadband and cell service.

The ability to improve cell service is of particular interest to us since, through personal experience and from reports made to me, we are all acutely aware of dropped calls and gaps in cell service in our area.

Recently the federal government announced an additional grant program to assist with broadband connectivity.

This, in addition to the available

provincial government grants and the fact that proposals have been submitted by the independent service providers, certainly raises the odds of seeing a resolution to the broadband problem.

The possibility that improved cell phone coverage may also be provided with the new technology would be a bonus.

Pender Harbour Days

It's estimated that over 1,000 people descended on Madeira Park for the second annual Pender Harbour Days on July 8 and 9.

Tattoos and your health

Rose Everett

Tattoos have become much more socially acceptable in recent years, now seen as a form of art and personal expression rather than rebellion.

Studies suggest that 40 per cent of people between the age of 26 and 40 have tattoos.

Before you get on the bandwagon, you should be aware that tattoo removal procedures are also exploding.

They are costly, uncomfortable and may not be entirely successful.

Think carefully and do your homework before getting inked.

Check out the service provider before you commit.

The BC Ministry of Health offers extensive guidelines for body modification, addressing the providers' obligations of cleanliness and obtaining your informed consent.

Some of the questions you should want answered are:

• Are the premises clean and are hand sinks with soap and paper towels readily accessible?

Are written sanitation procedures in place?

- What risks are associated with the procedure, and how does the facility minimize or eliminate those risks?
- What after-care will be necessary?
- How are instruments sanitized and sterilized?

Does the establishment use single-use instruments from sterile packaging?

Is an autoclave used, and has it been tested recently for bacterial growth?

Are any needles single-use? (All needles, ink and other materials that cannot be properly sanitized must only



be used on one client, then discarded, even if the tattoo application will continue on another day.)

• How will your skin be prepared for the procedure?

Will it be properly cleaned and disinfected, or even shaved?

Modern tattoo machines use a needle that rapidly causes tiny puncture wounds in your skin at rate of 50 to 3000 times per minute.

The ink is inserted into the dermal layer of your skin at a depth of 1/64th to 1/16th of an inch.

Many of the ingredients used in tattoo ink pigments are not known to tattoo artists or consumers.

Some tattoo pigments contain mercury, heavy metals, cadmium, titanium, iron oxides and aluminum.

Ask about ink ingredients before getting your tattoo.

After procedure care is largely a matter of common sense.

Of utmost importance is to keep it clean — wash gently with unscented soap and cool water.

Do not tear off dressing or cloth-

ing that may be stuck to the wound.

Keep it moist and use an ointment that helps retain your skin's natural moisture, while protecting it.

Don't scratch.

Do not expose your tattooed skin to direct sunlight.

Do not swim in chlorinated or salt water until your wound has healed.

The healing process should take two to three weeks.

During that time you may experience slight bleeding, fluid discharge, inflammation, raised lines, changes in colour, warmth, pain, itching and scabbing.

If you experience any excessive or abnormal symptoms, infections or allergic reactions you should seek medical attention.

While much reduced with improvements in procedures, tattooing can still be a vehicle for Hepatitis B and C, HIV and other viral or bacterial infections.

Your skin is your body's largest organ — take good care of it.

Geraldine Fischer recalls her childhood in 1930s Irvines Landing

In 1932, Geraldine Fischer and her family lived in a small floathouse they rented from Charlie Sundquist in the south head of Gunboat Bay.

She was the youngest of four children — Jack, Louie and May were all born outside of Canada.

Her parents, Jacob Fischer and Marie Louise Juster, met in China where her father was a British customs agent.

They fled China sometime after the Boxer Rebellion at the turn of the last century and with three kids in tow, they landed on Canada's West Coast.

In 1925, Fischer was born at St. Paul's Hospital in Vancouver to become the first Canadian in the family.

Not long after, her family moved to Pender Harbour

She attended her first year of school at the Kleindale School on Anderson Creek near Pender Harbour

Diesel.

Each day she would make the two-kilometre trek with the Sundquist children from the head of the bay to school and then back in the afternoon.

When the "new school" (now the

Sarah Wray Hall) opened September 1932, her family moved to Irvines Landing to start the school year.

They made a home of what was the former schoolhouse on the waterfront near the Irvines Landing Hotel.

Her father had a logging camp in Vancouver Bay where he and her brothers worked and she spent much of her summers.

Gerry became a keen student who enjoyed school but secondary education wasn't an option in Pender Harbour until 1939.

So, after completing Grade 8 in 1937 with only one other classmate — Mulvert Duncan — Fischer left Pender Harbour to attend high school in North Vancouver.

She lived there with her mother while the rest of her family stayed behind in Vancouver Bay and though she visited, she never lived in Pender Harbour again.

Last month, Fischer, now 91, and her son Bruce McGillivray visited Pender Harbour from Ontario.

It had been 30 years since her

last trip so they stopped in at her old school.

"I wondered if it was still there,"
Not only did they find it standing but it was restored and in as good condition as she had ever seen it.

And the doors were open.

The Pender Harbour Living Heritage Society has opened the Sarah Wray Hall to the public this summer with displays of historic photos and stories about Pender Harbour.

As Fischer browsed the photos on the wall, she was shocked to find her childhood self staring back at her.

"I saw a picture of myself," Fischer laughs.

"There I was — this surly little creature standing in the front row."

And it wasn't the only one.

There were other class photos and even one of her home near the Irvines Landing Hotel.

As she recounted stories of Irvines Landing during the Depression, Joe Wilson, a Pender Harbour Secondary student working as summer manager at the hall, thought others might be interested in hearing them too.

Fischer was gracious enough to return the next day to chat with members of the Heritage Society and the *Harbour Spiel*.

IRVINES LANDING SCHOOL

Though she apologizes for a crackly voice, Fischer has a vivid memory of her childhood.

"I loved going to school." she says.

"It wasn't a chore for me because I wanted to learn."

Her first teacher in Irvines Landing was Ms. Moscrop.

"She was very strict but she taught the kids a lot of things — she was very well-educated," Fischer recalls.

"We did a lot of poetry and things like that. More or less things that perhaps local children didn't come in contact with."

She doesn't recall the Irvines Landing School ever being cold in the winter, likely a testament to the early arrival of the teacher to light the woodstove in the one-room school.

But she remembers it was cold outside in the winter and common to go skating on nearby Hotel Lake.


But Fischer says it was an accepted understanding that people wouldn't swim in Hotel Lake because they all relied on it for water.

LIFE AS A CHILD

One of the highlights of the year for children living in Irvines Landing during the 1930s came on sports day.

Four years after Geraldine Fischer left her home in **Irvines Landing** to attend school in North Vancouver, it was rented to Elizabeth Smart who arrived pregnant on the steamship Lady Cynthia. There, in the former

schoolhouse, Smart would pen what has been described as one of the finest pieces of writing in the English language, By Grand Central Station I Sat Down and Wept.

It was the one day children could have ice cream.

"They used to get up these big tubs of ice cream bars that were kept in dry ice and that was a real treat."

When asked what kids did for fun, Fischer remembers playing in Joe Bay, swimming or rowing their boats around Irvines Landing.

"In the summer we were like ducks in the water," recalls Fischer.

"We'd go out in two boats out in the Harbour between Irvines Landing and those two islands and we'd swamp each other's boats.

"No one had any fear of the water — we'd just empty them out and climb back in."

The nearby Skardon Islands were home to many Shíshálh families but she says the children rarely mixed.

"Maybe in those days they were still making them go to those special (residential) schools," said Fischer.

Fischer recalls the Shíshálh people stayed almost exclusively on the Skardon Islands and she never once set foot on them.

"It just wasn't a place you went."

IRVINES LANDING

Irvines Landing came alive when

the Union Steamships arrived with passengers and freight and the kids would all turn out to watch.

"Oh that was the big deal of the day," Fischer said.

Bill Matier was the Irvines Landing wharfinger for a quarter of a century.

"I remember old Bill Matier well — he was a real fixture here," said Fischer.

"He liked to drink quite a lot and he was going down the wharf to do something and about halfway down the walkway he fell over the side and it's all rocks down there.

"But I think he was so relaxed and limber, he didn't hurt himself."

The hotel no longer served alcohol and though she and her friends would often find themselves in the building, Fischer doesn't recall it being very remarkable, describing the interior as "rather bleak."

Instead, the local kids would be outside, playing games or exploring.

"I never understood why anyone would walk when you could run," she says, describing how she enjoyed running down the hills coming back from Sakinaw Lake.

"Skipping rope, hopscotching, soccer and another game called pris-

oner's base — we were never still for a minute.

"You didn't see any fat kids back in those days because we were always on the move."

J. FISCHER AND SONS LOGGING CAMP

Ray Phillips' mentions Fischer's family in the *Royal Fjord: Memories* of *Jervis Inlet:*

Fisher (sic) was working at the mouth of High Creek on the north shore of Vancouver Bay.

Fisher's wife was a Chinese woman he had married when he worked in China years before and they had two sons who helped their dad, mostly handlogging.

In the book, Geraldine's father is listed as "Lord Fisher," which she claims wasn't a title but a nickname her father commonly used.

But Fischer bristles at the Chinese label as if it was a familiar error.

Fischer says her father did meet her mother in China but she was Portuguese — not Chinese.

"I remember my mother telling me that when the Boxer Rebellion happened in the late 1890s, they slept with their clothes on in case something happened."

Around the turn of the century, a violent political uprising against imperial expansion and Christian missionaries created a hostile political situation for foreigners.

It eventually forced them out and they came here.

"They had a really easy life there
— they didn't have to do a thing, you
know, everybody had servants."

Fischer recalls some kids would pick on her because of her family's Chinese roots.

"Often things that would happen

to me, I wouldn't tell my mother because then of course she would come scrambling up to the school and complain and that makes it twice as bad.

"But the thing is, you can be fighting with someone one day and the next day you're all playing together."

After fleeing China, Jacob Fischer owned a retail store and a real estate business in Vancouver before landing here around 1930.

He would go on to log in Vancouver Bay for a couple of decades and Marie was often the camp cook.

Geraldine agrees her parents must have seemed like unlikely candidates for a life in the bush.

"Why they would do that, I don't know because my mother didn't have a clue.

"She'd never cooked a thing in her life, or done anything practical. Despite that, Fischer doesn't recall too many setbacks except one that occurred years after she moved away.

"I think it was 1947, just after the war, and they were really going to do well," recalls Fischer of an unfortunate incident at Vancouver Bay.

"They had a quarter million dollars worth of logs pulled up to the spar tree... and overnight there was a fire and it burnt up the whole thing — machinery and everything."

"The moss got very dry and I

guess the wires sparked something and it started smouldering.

"They had these big gasoline tanks they said were going up like rockets. They lost everything."

Despite that, Fischer says her Dad started over again.

"People don't give up easily on the Coast, do they?"

AFTER PENDER HARBOUR

Fischer worked for the Royal Bank and later for the federal government in Toronto.

Her late husband was an engineer and they raised their children in Toronto.

She says she has always been fond of city life and credits Pender Harbour for that.

"I always thought it would be wonderful to live in a big city with all that went on, going out for dinner and that sort of thing," she says.

"The city, being only something you saw occasionally, was facinating."

Reading *Women of Pender Har-bour* convinced Fischer that she made some excellent choices in life.

"I was amazed at all these women — thank goodness I didn't marry anyone locally," she laughs.

"No, but here they're going fishing with their husbands and they're doing all sorts of physical things.

"Terrible! I wasn't keen on doing anything too physical — I had office jobs."
