The old 'What business would work?' conversation

After building deer fences and complaining about the state of our roads, Pendmont's third most popular pastime

might be fantasizing about what business could really make it here.

Who doesn't ponder business ideas over drinks with friends?

Retired people.

The rest of us hope for that gig that allows us to remain in paradise and make real loot.

What about boat detailing?

Or seniors' services?

A tattoo parlour?

I see two kinds of businesses on the Sunshine Coast — those focused on the local market and those that market their product or service to off-Coast customers.

Of the former, lucrative niches still exist but with only 30,000 customers on the Coast and a high proportion of others looking to set up shop, it seems clear you need more than enthusiasm these days.

Ask any local business person who has endured a few decades on the Coast and they'll recommend cautious research before jumping in.

They might also add that they don't appreciate competitors.

That's because, for some businesses, winter here ensures weak sales

And when the North American economy sneezes, as it did back in 2008, the Coast enters a coma.

But right now, you could make a case that our micro-economy is enjoying one of its healthiest periods ever.

A September 2018 economic outlook commissioned by the Sunshine Coast Credit Union predicts that:

• Employment on the Coast is forecast to climb more than four percent from 2016 through 2021;

- Housing markets will continue to operate at a high level with a strong increase in building permits;
- The share of non-local owner housing demand will likely decline as retirees transition to the Coast fulltime, and
- Elevated home sales will near 1,000 units per year on average.

This growth is fuelling a small business boom.

The 2016 census revealed that 26 per cent of the Sunshine Coast workforce is self-employed versus 14 per cent across BC.

The lack of employment diversity on the Sunshine Coast naturally pushes some to self-employment to take advantage of their skills.

And for those who do, there's plenty of help available — the Sunshine Coast Regional Economic Development Organization and Sunshine Coast Community Futures are just two organizations mandated to promote economic growth here.

SCREDO recently announced it will establish a "Fuse work hub" (story p. 5) in Pender Harbour to offer those who are self-employed access to shared office equipment and space in order to avoid the costs of maintaining a full-time office.

Community Futures has a long track record of providing business advice while helping new ventures acquire financing.

So, the support is there, but first you need that nugget of an idea.

Many have tried rustic furniture. Ditto with photography.

Hemp sweaters?

It's a challenging puzzle.

Here's my tip:

If you get desperate, just do what everyone else does and start up another local magazine.

It is not the intent to make the final decision or approve the application at this meeting. PODS representatives will also present a recently completed business plan for the marine research centre.

PODS proposal gets feedback from Irvines Landing neighbours

The Ruby Lake Lagoon Society held the first of two sessions to inform residents about OCP and zoning amendments for their proposed Pender Ocean Discovery Station.

A Jan. 26 meeting at Sarah Wray Hall addressed why current zoning, split between the large south portion of the waterfront property (zoned commercial three) and the small north portion (zoned residential two), be changed to a PA1D (research and assembly) designation to better reflect the property's intended use.

The PODS development proposes a 200-seat auditorium, research and diving facilities, a restaurant, gift shop, aquarium and a caretaker's residence.

In a Dec. 13 SCRD staff report, planner Yuli Siao wrote, "Although some components of PODS such as the gift shop and the restaurant are commercial in nature, the facility is mainly a research, educational and assembly institution, for which the 'tourist commercial' designation is not suitable.

"The 'public uses and utilities'

designation of the OCP is more appropriate for the facility."

After being presented the most recent plan for PODS, some immediate neighbours expressed concern over traffic volume and the effect the development would have on the peacefulness of their community.

"I don't think that in these plans, there is any consideration for Irvines Landing," said David Twentyman.

Barb Kappeli, who lives directly behind the site, expressed concern over the partial loss of her view.

At one time, Bob Fielding represented the previous owner of the site.

"I want to point out to everybody what was proposed prior to this," said Fielding.

"The Kappelis have talked about their side view, but there was housing that, if you think you will be looking at a wall now, it was nothing compared to what they had planned.

"And it was all proposed under the current zoning — they didn't have to change any zoning and it wasn't going to be open to the public at all."

A second information meeting will be held Saturday, Feb. 2 at 10 a.m. in the P. H. Community Hall in Madeira Park.

SCREDO announces plans for Fuse community work hub in Pender

Pender Harbour will soon see its own Fuse community workhub.

On Jan. 21, the Sunshine Coast Regional Economic Development Organization announced a Coast-wide expansion of their Fuse community work hub program.

A community work hub is described on the Fuse website as "a modern co-working space for independent workers, creatives, and entrepreneurs living in, or visiting, the Sunshine Coast."

Facilities include desks, private consultation rooms, a board room and open space for larger events including public presentations and community events.

Participants pay a monthly membership or drop-in fee to use the facility.

From a SCREDO press release: "Fuse Community Workhub has been serving Gibsons for the past four years where its popularity is outgrowing the capacity of its single 700-square-foot location."

The proposed expansion will see two new locations opened in Pender Harbour and Sechelt as well as a doubling in size of the Gibsons location.

The Pender Harbour location is expected to open in early 2019 but SCREDO has yet to determine where that will be.

In an email to the *Harbour Spiel*, David Chisholm, SCREDO chair, said specific details will be forthcoming.

"In Madeira Park we are working with several partners with a couple of locations still in the running," said Chisholm.

"The exact location is not yet determined but we are confident that we will have it sorted in time for a March 1 opening."

Chris Hergesheimer, SCREDO program manager, said the expanded Fuse coworking network "will assist a wider Coast audience by providing professional development opportunities, entrepreneurial support, and networking events in addition to a positive space to conduct business"

The Sunshine Coast Regional Economic Development Organization is a non-profit society formed in 2016 to carry out economic development activities on behalf of the Town of Gibsons, the District of Sechelt, the Sechelt Indian Government District and the Sunshine Coast Regional District.

Pender Harbour Advisory Council to change name and widen focus

The Pender Harbour Advisory
Council will hold a meeting on Feb.
4, to change its name to the "Pender
Harbour and Area Residents Association."

According to the agenda for the meeting, "the new name has already been accepted by BC Registry Services but requires approval by membership."

Since 2013, the Pender Harbour Advisory Council has represented the interests of residents of Pender Harbour on issues such as roads, trash and derelict boats.

From its mission statement:

"The council exists to support the vitality of the communities of the Pender Harbour area as excellent places to live, work and play for residents and visitors."

PHAC intends to change its name at the Feb. 4 meeting to better

reflect a growing mandate — including the offical absorption of the Pender Harbour dock management plan working group.

The PHDMPWG will officially join the new association as a committee at the Feb. 4 meeting.

A Jan. 7 PHAC press release stated, "The purpose of this relationship is to give the DMP Working Group a parent organization with a broader base of membership in the community as they continue to focus on how to

best deal with issues related to docks in the Harbour."

An agenda for the meeting is available at www.penderharbouradvi-sorvcouncil.com.

PHAC draws its main funding from a \$5 per person membership fee and in the release, the council said it has seen a huge spurt in growth as it moves into its expanded mandate.

The meeting will be held at the Grasshopper Pub on Monday, Feb. 4 at 7 p.m.

Protecting whales through citizen science

There is an urgent need to protect British Columbia's vulnerable cetacean (whale, dolphin, and porpoise) populations.

Of the 27 species of cetaceans found in B.C.'s waters, 12 are listed as "at risk" under Canada's Species at Risk Act.

These animals are adversely

affected by human activity — prey availability, pollution, and vessel-associated impacts such as ship strike, underwater noise, and physical disturbance can disrupt critical life processes, or cause injury or death.

In order to help mitigate vesselassociated threats, the B.C. Cetacean Sightings Network is using citizen science and smartphone technology in an effort to protect these marine mam-

mals.

On Tuesday, Feb. 19, the Pender Harbour Wildlife Society will host Jess Torode-Scott, co-ordinator of the BC Cetacean Sightings Network.

Torode-Scott's presentation "Protecting Whales through Citizen Science," will feature a lesson on how to identify cetaceans and offer recent news about research and conservation projects.

She'll also let people know how they can get involved in this citizen science initiative by reporting whale sightings.

Torode-Scott has been the coordinator of the BCCSN, a division of Ocean Wise's marine mammal research program, since 2017.

She has worked in aquariums, wildlife rehabilitation centres and veterinary clinics and holds an undergraduate degree in biology from the University of Victoria.

She acquired a masters degree in marine ecology from the University of Aberdeen, where she studied the effects of commercial fishing on the diet and body condition of harbour

The new SCRD strategic plan will focus on housing for seniors, an adequate water supply, better road maintenance, an improved highway system, planning for good use and management of Crown lands, economic development and protection of the natural environment.

These are all issues of significance for Area A.

EGMONT CELL SERVICE

A local issue on which I am working currently is high speed internet and improved cell service to the Egmont Area.

Telus recently installed two mini cell sites and it has improved coverage to some portions of Egmont.

I understand that it will also provide for higher-speed wireless internet connectivity.

Raincoast Networks is now offering 30 MBs internet service over radio to at least one Egmont household.

I have scheduled a meeting with a principal of Raincoast to find out more details.

The best solution is still fibre to the home so people in Egmont can enjoy real high-speed digital communications.

In support of that goal I recently met with a senior Telus representative in Vancouver and we have agreed to further discussions.

I remain hopeful that Telus will follow up with further cell and high-speed internet improvements for Egmont and elsewhere on the coast.

There is a second opportunity for fibre to the home to be provided by Strathcona Regional District as detailed in a Jan. 2018 *Coast Reporter*

article.

I have contacted the private company interested in supplying those services and will be kept informed as the project progresses.

I was told that construction may start here on the Coast as early as this fall, but it is dependent on many variables — including the federal government releasing announced funding.

LOCAL ISSUES

I have a list of other local issues including complaints made by residents who used the appropriate RCMP or SCRD complaint process but who have seen no action or have had no status report provided.

These complaints include the following:

- Too much junk being kept on a residential rental property;
- Boats being stored on the side of the road, and
- A zoning bylaw being ignored and potholes not being attended to.

I do appreciate being made aware of these issues and will deal with them, but I must ask you to be patient.

Tracking down the status of the complaints will take time and your local district office is manned by one person who must prioritize his time (me).

Yes, it is important to me that I provide answers to your inquiries —



and I will.

If you see the need to ask for my assistance, please send me an email as it will allow me to have a written understanding of the problem to be addressed and provide a status report to you easily.

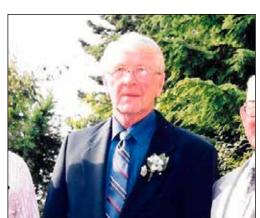

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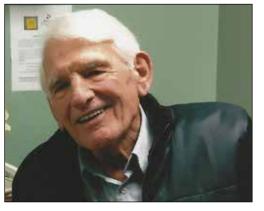

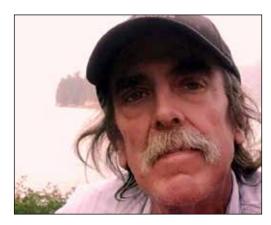

Seniors suffering from Vancouver Coastal Health care gaps

Editor,

Thanks to Alicia De Leo for her timely article on "Self assessing caregiver strain (Harbour Health, Jan. 2019).

Your article featured good information, but many of the "stay resilient" suggestion are not available or possible to access in Pender Harbour.

I am presently caring for my husband who suffers with Alzheimer's disease.

It is a 24/7 daily challenge and I am showing signs of caregiver strain.

As you wrote, it is very important to have a respite caregiver in order to be able to attend exercise programs and other self care programs.

However, Vancouver Coastal Health home care is only able to provide a respite caregiver for three hours a week (which is to start in January after being on the waiting list for months).

This will be barely enough cover age to attend to my medical appointments and necessary health treatments (and only if an appointment is available in that time slot, as there is no flexibility from VCH).

Another concern is that there is no guarantee that the same respite care aid will be available each time, even though Alzheimer patients do much better with familiarity and the same support worker.

I was recently told by a long-term VCH care co-ordinator that people should think twice about moving to Pender Harbour where the health ser-

vice is so limited.

For example, there is no Handi Dart service past Halfmoon Bay that could transport patients to adult daycare in Sechelt.

As well, it's difficult to find VCH employees willing to travel the distance to Garden Bay.

In your article you also mentioned the benefits for caregivers to attend a caregiver's support group.

To date there is none available in Pender Harbour.

Attending a support group in Sechelt requires four hours of services of a respite caregiver in order for me to attend a two hour session with a two hour drive, often in inclement weather.

Your article mentions the importance of not withdrawing from your friends and activities that you usually enjoy, however due to our financial situation, it is impractical for me to hire someone regularly at \$30 an hour to go to activities such as a Women's Connection session, book club or serve as a volunteer in the community.

Consequently, I am now forced to step down from my directorship position at the Pender Harbour Living Heritage Society.

I have had offers of help from a few friends, but dealing with a mental decline illness can be difficult and uncomfortable unless you have some

knowledge of the disease.

Seniors like me, dealing with their own health problems and caring for a spouse with a complex illness should not have to take on the extra burden of lobbying for health care funding.

I've learned that parents of Special Needs children receive a financial allowance to cover respite caregivers of their choice but this option is not available for seniors even when VCH cannot service them in their area.

Seniors should have the same choice — after all they have been lifetime taxpayers and contributors to the wealth and growth of this province.

With a program like this, caregivers could hire a familiar respite worker and schedule time when it is needed — not at the convenience of VCH.

There will be a long exhausting journey ahead as I'm told there is at least a two-year wait for placement in a care facility.

Until you are in this dire situation, you are unable to comprehend the impact and frustrations of dealing with the shortfalls in the health system that need to be actively addressed by our community.

Thanks again Alicia for raising awareness on caregiver strain as it is often suffered in silence.

Taking 'hell's stairs' to the peak of Mt. Daniel

Garden Bay's Melli McMillan is "on a mission to get back into shape."

"Since Mt. Daniel is a stone's throw from my place, I figured I should hike up it, at least once," Mc-Millan said.

The trail to the peak of Mount Daniel rises 1,061 vertical feet from the parking area.

It's a steady climb that one can

make in about 40 minutes to an hour (depending on pace).

McMillan's first ever summit attempt was back in October.

"I never made it to the top.

"The rain might have had something to do with it, but I had no climbing legs and was thoroughly gassed."

Only three months later, she has tackled the climb over 50 times.

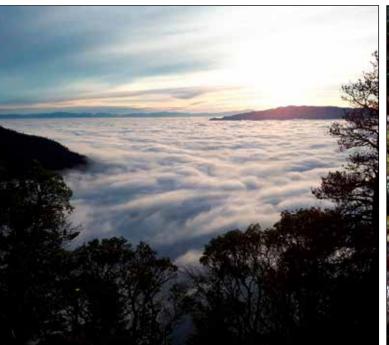
"The trail still irritates me," Mc-Millan said.

"There is nothing pleasant about it, except the view on top."

But McMillan says it's the view that keeps pulling her back.

"That's my reward — I take a picture after every climb.

"I figured I would get sick of the same view, but every day is different."



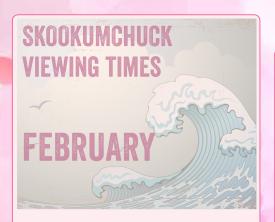

Recognize the importance of self-care

It is often easy to forget about taking good care of ourselves in our busy lives.

Many of us are working, caring for young children and some of us are acting as full-time caregivers for family members.

In our hectic and demanding schedules, we forget that taking care of ourselves should be our No. 1 priority.

If we neglect to do this, then what possible good can we be to those depending on us?

That said, most people in these types of situations do just that.

After all, surely we can put our own needs aside for our families, partners and even work.

It can feel more important somehow and the right thing to do.

In fact it is absolutely the wrong thing to do.

3.2.5 ARCHAEOLOGY AND EVIDENCE OF CULTURAL USE

The Shíshálh territory has been subject to a moderate amount of archaeological work, the majority of which has been cultural resource man agement, driven by the requirements of developers and industry.

Until 2004, little research-oriented archaeological work had been conducted by either the Shíshálh Nation or academic institutions.

Consequently, the overwhelming majority of recorded archaeological sites are concentrated in three geographic areas: stl'ítl'kwu (Secret Cove), séxw?ámin (Garden Bay) and the ayl'-khain (Nelson/Hardy Island, Saltery Bay) area.

The bias towards recorded site distribution is a consequence of three factors.

Firstly, previous studies, most notably the Gulf of Georgia archaeological survey 32, have been marine-based studies with an emphasis on recording oceanside sites.

Of the total archaeological survey conducted within Shíshálh territory, 95 per cent has occurred within one kilometre of the oceanside, while five per cent has been conducted within a one- to two-kilometre distance.

Secondly, the majority of studies within Shíshálh territory have been cultural resource management projects initiated on behalf of industry, notably forest licensees and residential Page 32

and commercial construction, which generally occur in close proximity to the oceanside.

Thirdly, in cases where assessments of timber harvesting developments have occurred in upland environments, they have been conducted in disturbed/harvested areas that provide little chance of identifying archaeological sites, most notably culturally modified trees.

To begin rectifying the bias in archaeological research, the Shíshálh Nation initiated phase I of the Shíshálh Nation archaeological inventory and site evaluation in 2004, the objectives of which were twofold:

- To gain a better understanding of archaeological site distribution, and
- To better understand the antiquity and intensity of occupation.

As part of this study, high elevation areas located within the alpine and sub-alpine biogeoclimatic zones were subject to systematic archaeological survey and four shell midden/residential sites were subject to profiling and carbon dating.

Four archaeological sites were identified in the alpine during the inventory phase of the project and three sites in the vicinity of the Sechelt isthmus were profiled and carbon-dated.

Analyses of carbon dates indicate that occupation of these three residential sites extended back at least 3,500 years.

Further, high-elevation archaeological survey was conducted in 2005 at which time six additional high-elevation sites were identified along the north and west side of lékw'émin

(Jervis Inlet).

In addition, five archaeological sites were identified in 2006 at midelevation in spipiyus swiya (Caren Mountain Range) located along the central axis of the Sechelt Peninsula.

Archaeological survey in the ?iy ch'ách'tl-am (Clowhom Reservoir) and mitigative excavation of archaeological site DkSb-30 near Saltery Bay provided dates for the occupation of residential sites at between 7900-11,000 BP (before present).

The change in focus to researchoriented studies and the subsequent archaeological findings are consistent with Shíshálh oral history that states that the entire territory from the oceanside to the mountain tops was and continues to be utilized extensively and intensively by the Shíshálh Nation from time immemorial to present.

3.3 CURRENT POLITICAL STRUCTURE AND SELF -GOVERNMENT

3.3.1 SELF-GOVERNMENT

Beginning in the 1980's, the Shíshálh Nation sought legislation for self-government in order to gain greater control over our own land, and to free ourselves from our status as wards of the federal Crown under the Indian Act.

On Oct. 9, 1986, Canada enacted the Sechelt Indian Band Self Government Act, S.C. 1986, c.27.

The stated purpose of the act was to "enable the Sechelt Indian Band to exercise and maintain self-government on Sechelt Lands, and to obtain Harbour Spiel locally

control over and administration of the resources and services available to its members.

By virtue of this act, the 33 Band Lands previously held as reserves under the Indian Act were transferred to the Shíshálh Nation in fee simple title, and the Sechelt Indian Band name also became official.

The SIB also became the first Indigenous nation in Canada with self-government powers.

However, some federal laws still apply under this new arrangement.

On July 23, 1987, British Columbia passed the Sechelt Indian Government District Enabling Act, which established the Sechelt Indian Government District council as the administrative arm of our nation responsible for band land management.

3.3.2 POLITICAL AND ADMINISTRATIVE STRUCTURE

Since amalgamation in 1925, and informally prior to it, our historical Shíshálh leadership and political structure was replaced by a Canadian political system, which was imposed upon us by the federal Crown.

The exact nature of political structures and procedures imposed upon the nation were more formally defined upon the granting of self-government in 1986.

The current SIB administrative council is made up of an elected chief and four councillors with specific portfolio responsibilities.

The headquarters of the Shíshálh Nation is at the House of Héwhíwus in Sechelt.

3.3.3 TREATY NEGOTIATIONS

The SIB engaged in treaty negotiations with British Columbia and Canada in 1994, and completed an

agreement in principle in April 1999.

The AIP included an offer of land, \$40 million as cash compensation, a variety of hunting, fishing and gathering rights (including a fishing quota and a proposed wildlife harvest area), and phasing-out of tax exemptions.

This AIP was not supported by the Shishalh Nation membership, on the grounds that the offer was inadequate.

For example, the land offer was for 0.6 per cent of the territory and represented the smallest offer of land on a hectare/person basis in Canada.

The cash offer in the AIP would also be paid out over 20 years, but the financial benefit for this would be offset against the imposition of a tax burden, resulting in a net financial loss to the nation over the long term.

The AIP also did not provide any provision for an increased decision-making role for the Shíshálh Nation.

The Shíshálh Nation leadership therefore submitted to BC and Canada in March 2003, a set of conditions required for the resumption of treaty negotiations.

These conditions have yet to be met.

In 2004, the Shíshálh Nation conducted a referendum to determine the level of support for continuing

with treaty discussions or engaging in litigation to resolve the issue.

The community provided leadership with a strong and clear mandate to proceed with litigation if necessary.

3.3.4 RELATIONSHIP TO NEIGHBOURING NATIONS

We are not a warlike people and have no tradition of conquest.

We were, however, subject to raids by northern groups and, on occasion, retaliated.

For the mainland populations, and particularly the Shíshálh, trade with inland peoples was a major feature of our commerce and provided access to exotic goods in exchange for surplus smoke-dried fish, dentalium shells, fish oil and húpit (deer) hides.

Though transportation for coastal trade was relatively easy, routes to the Interior were difficult and required considerable preparation and endurance.

In more recent times, we have negotiated agreements or a memorandum of understanding with several of our neighbouring First Nations to address boundary issues, including the Squamish Nation (1995), the Sliammon First Nation (1995) and the Te'mexw Treaty Association (1997).
