

EDITORIAL

A foundation of volunteers

At the Jazz Fest last weekend I tried to get around to as many events as I could and was astounded by the num-

ber of orange shirts I saw.

The orange shirts were the volunteers and it reminded me how much this community relies on them.

It's something we often take for granted in an area basically run on volunteer labour.

We may forget these people could be at home doing chores around the house or working at a paying job.

Look on page 36 and you'll find dozens of organizations operated by people like you and me who freely donate their time in order to make this a better place to live.

The Jazz Fest needs upwards of 100 volunteers to make it run smoothly.

Volunteers are called upon to sell tickets and t-shirts, set up chairs, control traffic and organize the event before it even takes place.

The Fall Faire is the same. So are the Blues Festival and May Day.

We now have three volunteer fire departments — men and women who

donate their time every week to train in case something bad happens.

Then there are the countless non-profit societies and volunteer boards that administer seniors' housing, our health centre, our water supply, our pool — all functions usually administered by paid councils in larger towns.

Look closer and you'll see that it's truly staggering how much of our community operations are handled by volunteer labour.

But it's also scary because many of these groups desperately need more help and the only problem with relying on the efforts of volunteers is the danger of collapse if people burn out or leave.

It's a constant struggle to find new help to replace them and many people in this community have been doing much more than their share for a long time.

I would estimate that a large percentage of the people I see out volunteering these days are relative newcomers to the area.

They're people who want to meet new people and have an urge to help their new community.

It bodes well for our future.

Next time you attend an event make a point of trying to identify the volunteers.

Then go and thank them.

Campagnolo did the honours on Pender Harbour's new Coast Guard Auxiliary rescue vessel that carries her name.

Toyota shoots commercial at Skookumchuck



Well known Hawaiian big wave surfer Troy Alotis just happened to be in Egmont with his family on a yacht and was persuaded to have a go at the Skookumchuck too.

Egmont and the Skookumchuck was buzzing for a couple of days last month when a production company arrived to shoot a commercial for Toyota.

It was the first commercial film production to film on the Skookum-

chuck itself and required special permission from the BC Parks Service.

The filming required a surfer to tackle the standing wave off Roland Point during maximum flood.

Production Manager Stuart Andrews owns Whistler Creek Productions and was contracted by Capital Media to run the filming.


"We spent an exorbitant amount to ensure the surfers were safe," he said on the phone from his Vancouver office.

"It went well but we did have to rearrange the surfing schedule to meet the tide."

Australian pro surfer Shannon Brown was contracted to surf the potentially

dangerous standing wave and was able to get up on the wave with help from a jet ski operated by Tofino pro surfer Sepp Buwhiler.

Bruwhiler's wife, Tamara Stephens was also contracted to surf the wave but found it too difficult the day

before and opted out.

Bruwhiler stood by while Brown carved back and forth for up to 10 minutes at a time before exiting the wave to be picked up at the back by a waiting jet boat.

While Brown rested for the next attempt, well-known Hawaiian big wave surfer Troy Alotis entertained the spectators with some spectacular wipe-outs.

Alotis was visiting the area with his family on a yacht and had hiked in the day before to find the crew practising.

Alotis knew the Tahiti water resue specialist Steve Fagan from other big wave locations and was invited to give it a try.

The economic effect of the short filming schedule could be felt throughout the community.

Approximately 45 people stayed at various hotels and B & Bs from Egmont to Sechelt with breakfast and October 2007

lunch provided by the Westcoast Wilderness Lodge.

Two High Tide water taxi vessels were contracted to transport crew and equipment to the park and were kept busy for both days.

Andrews said the commercial is not intended for Canadian release and will promote the launch of the diesel RAV4 in Europe.

The RAV4 diesel is currently not available in Canada.

Pender Harbour gets first dragon boat

It's take 2,300 years but Pender Harbour finally has a dragon boat.

On Sept. 19, 21 paddlers came out to meet the arrival of their new boat at the Garden Bay Pub.

Many tried paddling for the first time.

Rick Harmer is a longtime dragon boat enthusiast and coach and he and Charlyn McLean have organized a group of locals interested in training for what Harmer calls "the most fun you can have with your clothes on."

This is a borrowed boat and the club will have it until November.

Harmer hopes they will eventually raise enough funds to purchase one or more boats that will permanently reside in Pender Harbour.

Harmer says we have the perfect location to host races.

For those unfamiliar with the concept, dragon boating originated in China and has been around for over 2,300 years with millions of paddlers worldwide.


Festivals (racing regattas) are held year-round and Harmer hopes to one day have an annual dragon boat festival here hosting crews from all over to compete.

While it can be a sport for highly trained athletes, it is an "everyman" sport, not demanding a high degree of fitness to get into it.

Age is not a barrier; nor is a disability.

The club paddles from the Garden Bay Pub on Saturdays at 3 p.m. and Sundays at 1 p.m.

"Resolute" stolen from Sunshine Coast Resort and scuttled

A one-of-a-kind wooden boat was stolen from the Sunshine Coast Resort wharf and discovered half submerged off Ballenas Island near Nanaimo on Sept. 10

The boat's owner, Randall Platt,

didn't know the boat was missing and had tied it up after a Labour Day outing.

The Resolute is a unique 35' boat built by Sam Devlin of Olympia, Washington in the early 1980s

with extensive custom woodwork and detailing.

After his initial inspection, Devlin told Platt that the extensive damage "resembled the houses in New Orleans after the flood."

The boat was floated and returned to the Sunshine Coast Resort for assessment.

Sechelt RCMP say the investigation is ongoing but have no suspects at this time.

Platt said it is unknown how or why the boat was stolen but did say there was a lot of equipment missing.

Platt is waiting to find out how much work is involved to restore it and whether or not insurance will cover the costs of repair.

"My family's still in shock," he said.

"I just need to go through the process, I guess. It's like losing a family member."

Bear Bay Roaders fight plans to log in their neighbourhood

Residents of Bear Bay Road have organized a campaign to protect a 35.8 hectare cut-block in their neighbourhood from logging.

Residents met with BC Timber Sales employees on Aug.17 to discuss their concerns.

BCTS said they intend to put it up for auction to bidding logging companies by this spring.

Since that meeting, some residents have formed the Bear Bay Stewardship Alliance in order to inform the public about their concerns.


BBSA's website lists specific concerns they have with this proposal including impact to Sakinaw Lake water quality, well-water degradation, threat to coho spawning in nearby Mixal Creek, safety concerns over logging trucks on Bear Bay Road, visual impact and the loss of potential and existing recreational trails.

"In all of Pender Harbour, the only area that has been identified as 'old forest' is the area above Bear Bay Road," said BBSA representative Ryan Logtenberg, referring to the SCRD sensitive ecosystem inventory map viewer.

The area to be logged contains approximately 20,000 cubic metres of quality timber requiring 500 truckloads to travel through Bear Bay Road.

According to the BBSA, BCTS has revised cut-block boundary lines continually as they receive more information.

The topic of local watershed protection has been a hot issue in recent months as similar opposition has been formed against logging activities in both the Waugh Lake and Chapman Creek watersheds.





GRANT FUNDING INFORMATION

Earlier this year the SCRD

made a series of applications for supportive funding for water infrastructure improvements throughout Area A.

Several months ago we were awarded \$1 million from the Federation of Canadian Municipalities and now I am glad to announce that we are to receive a further \$1.8 million for our Area A Water Master Plan initiatives.

The water quality portion of our application was approximately \$5.5 million, therefore this good news will allow for at least a 50 per cent grant for all costs.

Areas and systems included in this funding are Earl's Cove, Egmont, Oyster Bay (North and South).

This work is for system improvements and to remove the boil water order they have been burdened with for years.

NPHWD and SPHWD will get help for water treatment plants and, in fact, the SCRD has already put out requests for feasibility and costing information to that end.

The balance of the funds will come from low-interest loans arranged by the SCRD and paid by the individual users on their water rates in the various areas over a 20-year period.

SPHWD customers were made aware of these costs prior to their amalgamation vote and this level of grant funding was considered to be the most optimistic achievable.

I would request that all of the individual groups have just a little more patience with the pace of this process — the Master Plan is after all designed to phase in improvements over the next several years.

In due course, and when more definitive costs are available, the SCRD will meet with all parties involved.

INDEPENDENT POWER PROJECTS [IPPS]



Otherwise known as green power, micro hydroelectric projects are privately owned, with sell-back contracts to BC Hydro and have discovered the Sunshine Coast big time, almost like a gold rush.

Over the last five years or so there have been a few applications for these plants and a couple have been built in the Howe Sound area.

Now there are 42 applications on the Sunshine Coast with 20 of them in Area A.

These small plants, generally around 10 MW, are located on creeks and rivers with more steep characteristics.

Some of the available water is diverted through penstocks (concrete tubes) to create higher velocity, used to drive turbines and generate electricity.

The water used is then returned to the creek or river in its original condition.

The power is collected through a network of power lines and is connected to the main grid for distribution by BC Hydro.

Jervis and Princess Louisa Inlets and beyond are the main locations for these plants with each plant having the capacity to generate enough power for 10,000 homes or 10 MW.

I see two perspectives on this, one being the economic benefits from increased industrial taxation, a 10-year period of construction jobs (estimated to be between 50 and 80 per plant) and the pass-down effect from that.

The other side is the potential disturbance, mainly caused by roads and power lines, of the unique natural beauty of this area and the effect on the future of tourism and wildlife habitat.

All of these applications will go through a long process of approvals and the SCRD is only one of many steps.

Those applications that make it through will then go into the Hydro lottery for final approval and a contract.

There will be, I am sure, a lot of local debate on the merits of these proposals over the next several years and all residents will have a chance through public information meetings and public hearings to have their say.

It is also interesting to note that the Province adopted Bill 30 last year which effectively removed the authority of local governments to determine approvals of these projects if it deemed necessary.

TYNER PARK

From the response I have had to the article appearing in the September issue of the Spiel, some clarification is required.

If this proposal (senior's lower cost housing) was adopted by the community, it seems to me that we are looking at approximately five years before it would come on stream.

This would also be sufficient time for other current projects to be completed and would at that time provide some different alternatives for our ever growing senior population.

I would also like to add that the land use suggestion came from the Tyner Trust and the family and was not an initiative of this Director or the SCRD.

We simply responded to their request.

LOCAL ELECTIONS 2008

This time next year my term (second) will be up and I do not intend to run again.

Hopefully a number of initiatives will be complete before that time but there are some ongoing issues like the Area A Water Master Plan, and the associated studies required, infrastructure improvements, OCP reviews, Transit Service, etc, all of which will need focused attention.

My advice is that anyone thinking about running for director in this area in 2008 should start tracking these projects. I will provide all the help I can if requested.

HARBOUR GARDENING

Grass, grass and more grass

You won't get busted for growing these grasses and none is as large as a Christmas tree.

Grandma would have told me to cut the lawn and any in the flower bed was to be pulled immediately.

Well times have changed, haven't they?

Now grasses are used for accent, texture and colour as well as mass planting to cover awkward areas.

Many times I use grasses in containers to get centre height.

Not only are grasses perennial, that are easily divided, but also you haven't lost them like annuals in the fall, nor the money you spent.

For fall sun, pennisetam

Purple Fountain grass has a stunning burgundy colour.

It's OK for use here but tender in colder zones; 2-3 ft tall.

P. Red Bunny Tails is fun to use for some contrast in texture but in mass planting it can look a little overdone.

Your grandchildren will love this one.

Miscanthus — if you're questioned as to what that ornamental grass in your garden is, just say miscanthus.

It'll make you look very knowledgeable, as it's a large family and you can't go too far wrong.

M. "Morning Light" 4-5 ft

M. 'Little Zebra' 3-4 ft

For fall, all the grasses can be planted new.

Perhaps in a spot where some plant has failed because of this wet summer.

I've noticed that mildew just overran some perennials I planted this spring.

You have an advantage buying grasses now, as you can see them as they would look in your garden.

Home

Cooked

A wonderful grass for shade is

Hakonechlea, Japanese Forest Grass, "Allgold."

It grows in a cascade form up to one foot and divides easily to spill over the edge of a patio container or window box.

The striped gold foliage gives in-

stant contrast to any colour scheme and when it dies down it's easy to zip off large clumps with a weed eater.

Pampas grass seems passé now so why not try Cortaderia 'Pumila' dwarf pampas three to six feet tall in

sun or partial shade?

Imperata or Red Baron Japanese Blood Grass is quite easy to work with in borders, rock gardens, containers. Try mass planting in fall with sun to part shade, but it needs fertile, moist, well-drained soil.

Clump plantings of three to five work best to avoid a scattered, uncoordinated look.

Conversely, as grandma warned, "too much of a good thing is not good."

In roadside farms and shopping malls, mass upon mass of taller grasses can become overpowering and, in my opinion, boring.

An exception is the berm just south of Chapman Creek near Big Maple Park.

Now that's a privacy berm.

A plum thing about grasses is that they are deer-proof.

So from bunny to pheasant tail grasses, have some legal fun.

Grassias!

Lyme disease and tick talk

Lyme disease is caused by a bacterium transmitted through the bite of a tick.

Once in the blood stream, the Lyme disease organism is carried through the bloodstream to various parts of the body and is likely to localize in joints.

Unlike humans, dogs do not get a bull's-eye rash at the site of infection and since symptoms are sometimes delayed, the disease often goes untreated.

The most common symptoms are swollen joints, high fevers, limping, lameness shifting from one leg to the other and no

appetite.

Some or all of these symptoms may eventually disappear, only to recur weeks or months later if left undiagnosed and

untreated.

The key to preventing Lyme disease is keeping your dog from being exposed to ticks.

Unless you have an indoor dog, this is virtually impossible on the Sunshine Coast as ticks typically live in grassy, wooded and sandy areas — all the beautiful places we love to take our dogs for walks.

Ticks are also very common on cedar trees and arbutus trees where they wait until their sensors detect a nearby animal on which to crawl or drop. After being in a tick-infested area, check your pet immediately for any ticks.

It is important to remove ticks promptly since they need to feed for approximately 12 hours for the bacterium to be transmitted.

To remove a tick that is attached to your dog, grasp the tick with fine tweezers or your finger nails near the dog's skin and firmly pull it straight out.

Do not squeeze or twist the tick while pulling it out.

If removing ticks is a common occurrence, you may want to obtain a very easy to use tick removal spoon

free of charge from your veterinarian.

Destroy the tick by placing it in rubbing alcohol or crushing it between two solid surfaces.

Do not get the tick's contents, including blood, on your skin.

The bacterium that causes Lyme disease

can pass through a wound or cut in your skin.

With the approaching tick season, a very safe and effective way of protecting dogs against Lyme disease is through an annual vaccine.

If you have any suspicion your dog may have contracted Lyme disease it is important to see your veterinarian so that your pet can receive a course of antibiotics to eradicate the bacterium.

A few weeks ago I had the misfortune of experiencing firsthand an overreactive response by our local police.

A Pender Harbour outdoor marijuana grow-op bust handled by local RCMP and an emergency response team has left innocent people traumatized and it could have just as easily been you.

I feel compelled to speak up about an insensitive and unneccesary altercation my partner endured during this bust when police forcefully handcuffed him on a public road bordering our driveway with rifles aimed.

They made a mistake, but there was no apology. This use of excessive force was defended by the RCMP as necessary because "since Mayerthor-

pe" [referring to the Alberta tragedy where four Mounties were killed] we as citizens apparently have to accept that this is how policing looks now.

The RCMP's inflated level of fear is the catalyst for over-reactive, adrenaline-pumped and potentially dangerous encounters with police.

A climate of fear is also their excuse for storming innocent bystanders as if a bomb were about to go off.

I am sympathetic to the risks that law enforcement officers must take to do their job, but is it really what Community Policing is all about?

Pender Harbour may have its share of marijuana growing in the bush, but it is also a quiet, residential neighbourhood with law-abiding and community-minded families everywhere.

The majority of Canadians have indicated that pot is not an issue worthy

of spending tax dollars and stretched police resources.

So why does our community police force, over-zealously pursuing interests that its citizens deem fairly inoffensive, resemble an American-style SWAT team?

Do the ends justify the means?

Under the circumstances, which parallelled some kind of siege with police helicopters and cruisers closing in on our community, there should have been a protocol in place to warn and protect the innocent neighbours.

The local RCMP need to seriously consider that when the people they think they're protecting start to feel like victims, there's a problem.

Are you wondering, like me, where our rights are in all of this?



because so many people have a vested interest in what's happening.

To bring you up to speed, here's a sample conversation I had recently with "Owen Omeowner."

"Hey Big Al, seems like the market is slowing down."

"Really, why do you say that, Owen?"

"Well, it looks like there's a lot more For Sale signs around and, I don't know, it just seems - quieter."

"Well, the resale housing market has been screaming Owen." I said.

"In fact, so far in 2007 we've seen 28 per cent more home sales in the Pender area than in 2006. With 59 sales so far this year, we are only eight sales off of the record of 67 sales for the same period in 2005 — our busiest year ever!"

Owen scratches his head. "You're kidding! The missus figured we'd missed the boat and that the real estate frenzy was over. What's happened to prices?"

"Things have really leveled off. We saw a 33 per cent increase in the average sale price from 2005 to 2006 but this year we've only seen a modest increase of 2.2 per cent. The average price of a home in Pender Harbour and Egmont is now about \$562,000."

"What? \$562,000! How is that possible? A really nice home just sold around the corner from me for \$381,000."

"You have to remember that waterfront sales skew the picture. We've seen seven sales over \$1,000,000 in the Harbour this year with four of those over \$1,500,000," I told him.

"If you omit the waterfront sales in our area and the sales of mobile homes or strata properties, the average price of detached house is more like \$443,000. The least expensive detached house sale in Pender this year was a little three bedroom rancher on Merrill Crescent which sold for \$270,000."

"Wow! But I heard there was too much for sale and people weren't buying?"

"Right now there are 82 houses for sale with a median asking price of \$630,000 — that means that one half of all active listings are priced less than that and half of them are priced higher. Given the median selling price of \$415,000, some sellers are going to have to wait a while for the market to catch up to them. The truth is that in this busy market, if your house is priced right, it should be getting attention from buyers."

"We bought our place four years ago, so what's our house worth?"

"Great question. The average price of homes in the area has roughly doubled since you bought it but some types of properties, like waterfront homes with moorage, have outperformed the rest of the market. The only way to know for sure is for me to come over and prepare an evaluation report. When is a good time?"

Owen and his wife were surprised by the results of my report.



EID-UL-FITR: OCTOBER 13

Eid ul-Fitr or Id-Ul-Fitr, often abbreviated as simply Eid, is an Islamic holiday that marks the end of Ramadan, the month of fasting. Fitr means "to break the fast" and therefore symbolizes the breaking of the fasting period.

On the day of the celebration, a typical Muslim family is awake very early and then after praying the first normal everyday prayer, is required to eat in a small quantity, symbolizing the end of Ramadan. They then attend special congregational prayers held only for this occasion in mosques, in large open areas, stadiums or arenas. The prayer is generally short, and is followed by a sermon (khuba). Worshippers greet and embrace each other in a spirit of peace and love after the congregational prayer.

After the special prayers, festivities and merriment are commonly observed with visits to the homes of relatives and friends to thank God for all blessings.



Getting Around the Northwest Coast, circa 1700

Scott Smith takes downhill longboarding world cup in Mary Hill, WA

Local boy Scott "Scoot" Smith has won his, and Pender Harbour's, first ever world cup downhill longboarding event at Goldendale, WA on Sept. 15.

Only 20 years old, Smith took out 96 of the world's best downhill long boarders in one of only eight International Gravity Sports Association sanctioned world cup events.

Dubbed the Mary Hill Festival of Speed, Smith says it's the toughest to win because, not only is it the longest race in the world at 2.2 miles, but it attracts just about every top pro in the world.

A stones throw from Oregon, the historic Mary Hill Loops road course was built in 1913 by Sam Hill and was the first paved road in the Pacific Northwest.

Though it's now preserved as a monument to asphalt and closed to motorized vehicles, it often pops up in car commercials because of its curving road and scenic rolling hills.

It's the longest race in the world and with the fastest qualifer clocking

in at just over three minutes, it tests a racer's endurance as well as their adrenaline tolerance.

Each heat had six racers and Smith said every one was intense but the final heat was "true gnar."

Taken from the Coast Longboarding website, this was Smith's description of the final:

"I started out in third off the push trailing Nate (Lang) and Martin (Siegrist) with Kevin (Reimer) on my ass! We went through the first three corners and got out into the first straight. I had a double draft so I was gaining on Nate and ended up side by side with him in the left and passed!

"Now I was in Martin's draft. Mwaha-ha-ha! He was shutting the door on the inside on me time after time and I was thinking how the f*** am I gonna pass this guy?

"We headed down the long straight on the way to the left right combo and both of us drifted a bit to the outside in the left. Martin dove back to the left side of the road to make a nice line and I just stayed on the inside.

"I came out hot and tucked as hard as I f**king could, took the inside and waited for that dreaded wheel sound... BUT IT NEVER CAME!"

Two other Pender locals and fellow Team Green members, Sandy "Sandman" Charlton and Ryland "Raggie" English both finished in the

Top 20, an incredible feat in itself.

Mischa Erban and Kevin Reimer placed second and third giving Canadians the top three places in a field stacked with competitive Europeans like two-time World Champion Martin Siegrist from Switzerland.

After the race, an upset Siegrist took out his frustrations on Reimer with a gut-punch, claiming he "stole his line."

"There's no such thing as stealing lines," Smith says.

"You earn lines when you're longboarding and if he leaves it open then tough luck, right?"

It may be illuminating a darker side to the sport — the greed that comes with increased money and exposure.

After Smith's win a representative from big US TV came up to him and told him to keep in touch because they are planning to include downhill

longboarding in the X Games.

"It would be kind of weird to see longboarding go into the X Games," Smith said.

"It's kind of like a brotherhood we have in Canada. If I go anywhere and see a longboarder it's like an

automatic friend. When there's lots of money, people get too serious about it."

Smith is off to Tutonia, Brazil in October to compete with the fastest in the world for the world downhill speed record.

Representatives from the Guiness Book of World Record will be there as racers hit speeds of over 120 km/h on a straight downhill course.

also be there and there's a
very good chance one of them
will bring home the world

are stacking up and the athletes are anxiously looking for sponsors to help them continue to compete.

Smith is currently sponsored by Landyachtz Longboards and picked up a new sponsor, wheel bearing company ABEC 11, after his race at Mary Hill.

In the past, Roosendal Farm has sponsored some of Team Green's travel costs and entry fees but this new level of competition is bringing with it a new level of financial commitment as well.

"I really think I have a good chance of setting the downhill speed record," Smith says.

"I don't think anyone can beat me in the straights."

THE LAST WORD

Clearing the air on outdoor smoking

For fatties it's a small world, getting smaller every day.

The Ontario Medical Association says parents should

be prosecuted for letting their children eat snacks high in trans fats or sugar.

In related developments:

- Vancouver city council has banned chocolate bars, soft drinks and ice cream from all public buildings including any outdoor patios.
- The provincial government plans to ban consumption of processed snacks in all public areas of the province starting next spring.
- B.C. Ferries will restrict junk food to designated zones on outdoor decks of large ferries by year-end and is considering banning the snacks altogether.

Just kidding. But if you replace "snacks" with "second-hand smoke" it's almost all true. The OMA seriously suggested fines for parents who smoke when their kids are in the car.

For the moment, smoking is permitted on all B.C. Ferries exterior decks, but the corporation said last spring it would restrict it to designated areas on its 18 largest vessels by the end of this year. The company indicated it may eventually ban puffers entirely to appease anti-smoking groups who have compared ferries to "floating patios." (Floating at up to 40 km/h in crosswinds, but why quibble?)

Vancouver council voted in late September to ban smoking within six metres of any doorway, window or air intake in the city. Of course, once you're more than six metres from one doorway, you're within six metres of the next, so the bylaw effectively bans smoking from the entire downtown.

Similar bans have been introduced in Ireland, the U.K., France and Australia. Throughout the western world there is now more hysteria than smoke in the air.

I don't smoke cigarettes. Filthy habit, quit 14 years ago, won't allow it in my house, etc. I hate even a whiff of smoke while I'm dining and I think it's great I can leave the pub of an evening with my clothes reeking of nothing worse than whatever beer I spilled.

That said, I would rather drive cross-country with a busload of chain-smokers than sit through one more sanctimonious harangue from the smoke prefects.

In more than three decades as a journalist, I have encountered few people more loathsome than anti-smoking crusaders. The movement seems to attract crabbed and bitter losers desperate to persecute someone even lower on the social register.

What better target than smokers? They cough and wheeze, their homes and clothes stink, they foul the air and if they smoke in the car while taking Jennifer and Kieran to soccer practice then yes, they are bad parents.

But so are parents who beam proudly as their obnoxious whelps lip off to grown-up smokers. The world doesn't need another generation of finger-pointers clamouring to ostracize somebody. Today it's smokers, tomorrow it's Jews or gays or atheists or people who wear socks with sandals.

Let's face it, the anti-smoking frenzy left the medical arena long ago. The 2007 State of the Air Report for B.C. tots up the pollutants that cause smog and greenhouse gases in the province. Emissions from cars, trains and planes are the chief villains, followed by home furnaces, farms and factories.

Nowhere does it mention cigarette smoke. That's because unless you spend a lot of time in a confined space with a smoker, second-hand smoke is going to hurt you as much as that extra dollop of whipped cream on your pumpkin pie at Thanksgiving. In fact, obesity is now a more serious ep-

idemic in North America than cigarette-induced cancer.

More evidence that smoking bans are more political than medical: Vancouver's bylaw exempts hookah lounges. Muslims told council they are important cultural centres for those barred by religion from the

camaraderie of the pub.

My favourite bending of the rules comes from politically correct Santa Cruz, Calif., where the citywide smoking ban was lifted for five hours on Sept. 29 for the annual medical marijuana festival.

Councilman Mike Rotkin compared the smoking exemption with the city's sleeping ban, which prevents camping in city parks.

"If the Boy Scouts wanted to have a sleep out ... we'd say yes," Rotkin said.

Boy Scouts!
