Find a dry roof before winter sets in

As the first real rain since mid-June gently taps my roof, it feels like the

worst of our summer's drought might finally be over.

In a few weeks, we'll have forgotten about heat and fires and be back to complaining about the monotony of a drizzly winter.

It's a luxury that won't be shared by everyone.

For a growing number of folks who find themselves living in a recreational vehicle, winter delivers significant challenges.

According to one Realtor's website, the average price for a detached home on the Sunshine Coast remains relatively unchanged over the last three months at \$1,020,000.

As homeowners sip prosecco in the Millionaire's Lounge, a lack of affordable housing has fostered a new industry — businesses that rent sites for RVs to be used as full-time homes.

And it's booming — I'm told customers fall out of the sky and the business model blushes when you remark how nice its math is.

Sites rent for \$500 to \$700 per month, or more, and with no end to the affordable housing crisis in sight, we should expect more of them.

But winter is coming.

The tenants are often low-income seniors, and a fierce market for RVs has removed the luxury of purchase choices, so many may not be equipped to endure a 30-day onslaught of Pender rain.

What tarps can't fix is the population's vulnerability to gaps in protection enjoyed by traditional tenancy models.

From the BC government website:

"Under the Manufactured Home

Park Tenancy Act, it's possible that an RV, park model (manufactured home smaller than 560 square feet) or a tiny home could fit the definition of a manufactured home.

"However, determining whether the Manufactured Home Park Tenancy Act applies would depend on whether a tenancy has been established."

The courts seem to be leaning towards future recognition of this new breed but depending on the rental agreement, tenants may be unprotected and evicted without notice.

Still, the camps fill a void that would otherwise leave people homeless; but not everyone is suited to living in an RV.

It's been decades since we started kicking around ideas about how to house our growing senior population in a community without purpose-built housing, taxis or bus service.

The S.C. Community Foundation's 2019 Vital Signs report pegged the median rental cost on the Sunshine Coast at over \$1,000 per month.

A glance at Craigslist suggests that figure is now at the very low end of the rental market with two bedroom condos starting at \$1,500 per month.

The average sale price for a condo or townhome on the Sunshine Coast right now is \$560,000.

Unfortunately, there are virtually none of these traditionally more affordable housing options in Area A.

And, despite two decades of discussion and fundraising effort, there is still not a single affordable housing project for seniors in the works.

Why hasn't some greedy developer jumped on the opportunity to take advantage of a regional district that would bend over backwards to accomodate them?

While we wait for an answer, RV parks have become our seniors' housing.

Somehow we need to change that.

South Pender water system moved to Stage 2

Effective Aug. 20, the Sunshine Coast Regional District has announced that the South Pender Harbour water system has been moved to Stage 2 water conservation regulations.

SCRD water users on the Egmont, Earls Cove and North Pender Harbour water systems remain at Stage 1 until further notice.

The Stage 2 regulations are outlined below:

WATERING LAWNS

- Not permitted, and
- Watering permits to establish new lawns will not be issued at Stage 2 but existing permits are still valid.

WATERING TREES, SHRUBS OR FLOWERS

- Sprinklers or soaker hoses can be used two days per week on Thursday and Sunday for even-numbered addresses from 7 a.m. to 9 a.m. and on Wednesday and Saturday for oddnumbered addresses from 7 a.m. to 9 a.m., and
- Hand held hoses with spray trigger nozzles, containers or micro/drip-irrigation can be used anytime.

WATERING FOOD-PRODUCING PLANTS AND TREES

- Sprinklers or soaker hoses can be used two days per week on Thursday and Sunday for even-numbered addresses from 7 a.m. to 9 a.m. and 7 p.m. to 9 p.m. and on Wednesday and Saturday for odd-numbered addresses from 7 a.m. to 9 a.m. and 7 p.m. to 9 p.m., and
- Hand held hoses with spray trigger nozzles, containers or micro/drip-irrigation can be used any time.

EXEMPTION FOR COMMERCIAL FOOD PRODUCING FARMS

• Commercial food producing farms paying a metered rate for water are exempt from Stage 2 regulations.

WASHING VEHICLES OR BOATS

• Permitted with container, handheld hose with spray trigger nozzles, or commercial car washes.

FILLING SWIMMING POOLS, SPAS, GARDEN PONDS, OR FOUNTAINS

• Permitted.

WASHING SIDEWALKS AND DRIVEWAYS, WINDOWS OR EX-TERIOR BUILDING SURFACES

• Permitted only for preparing surfaces for painting or paving and for

health and safety.

SCRD staff patrol neighbourhoods to enforce regulations and staff follow up on all complaints received.

The SCRD issues warnings to properties in violation of regulations and provides information about water conservation regulations.

If there is continued non-compliance, bylaw officers will issue a bylaw enforcement notice and a fine of \$300.

Two years after the last federal election, Prime Minister Justin Trudeau has called it — Canadians are headed back to the polls on Sept. 20.

This time around, the West Vancouver–Sunshine Coast–Sea to Sky Country riding will see some new names on the card.

In 2019, Liberal incumbent Patrick Weiler earned the seat by capturing 35% of the votes.

He will be opposed by a former MP of this riding (2008-2015) Conser-

vative John Weston.

Weston is a lawyer and lives in West Vancouver and did not take part in the 2019 election.

Robert (Doug) Bebb of the People's Party of Canada lives in Whistler.

Bebb is a semi-retired mechanical engineer who also ran in the 2019 election, receiving 1.6% of the vote.

The NDP has entered a star candidate in Avi Lewis.

Now based out of Halfmoon Bay,

Lewis was raised in Ontario where he was a well-known journalist and film-maker who spent 25 years focused on stories of people fighting for justice.

The Green Party came third in 2019 and new candidate Michael Simpson hopes to improve on that.

Simpson lives in Gibsons and prior to politics was a documentary filmmaker and executive director of the BC Council for International Cooperation.

Voting takes place Sept. 20.

Chamber of commerce working to make Madeira Park biffy spiffy

It's time to renovate the bath-rooms.

The Pender Harbour Chamber of Commerce recently confirmed plans to renovate the public washrooms at Madeira Park's visitor information centre.

The washroom facility is owned by the Pender Harbour Community Club but managed, and funded, by the P. H. Chamber of Commerce and is the only year-round public bathroom in Madeira Park.

"The washrooms need a complete makeover with new tiling, toilets, wall mount sinks and accessible with wall bars to assist those who need it," said Dave Milligan, PHCC chair person, in an email.

"Lighting will also be changed and yesterday we had a man trapped in one of the rooms and had to have the Pender Harbour firemen break him out so doors and new locks are required as well."

Milligan estimates the cost will be approximately \$35,000.

To that end, the Rotary Club of Pender Harbour has been running ongoing 50/50 draws through June, July and August in support of the washroom upgrade.

Though Rotary is hosting another draw this month in support of Serendipity Preschool, the last draw specifically for the washroom renovation took place Aug. 31 and the total raised for the three draws was \$3,000.

Milligan said the PHCC received donations from Ken Mellquist's Gunboat Bay dock concert earlier this summer and has collected \$1,700 from private individuals.

The chamber of commerce recently sent a letter out to local businesses and encourage any private individuals to contact them if they

would like to donate.

Milligan said the work will likely begin in October and continue into early 2022

"Renovations to these facilities have been done on a shoestring budget for many years," said Milligan. "Now is a very good time to make these facilities attractive to the many who rely on their use."

Milligan said a letter has been sent out to local businesses and he welcomes private donations "to make this a project we can all be proud of."





THEFT

WILDFIRE ACT

On July 23, police assisted the Pender Harbour Volunteer Fire Department with a report of a large campfire at a residence in the 4800 block of Arthur Way, Madeira Park.

From the street, police could see the glow of the fire as well as sparks and embers floating into the trees.

Police entered the property and found a large gathering of people and a log burning in an open brick fire pit.

The fire department educated the property owner on the current fire regulations banning all campfires as well as the state of emergency due to the ongoing wildfires, and police issued him a ticket for failure to comply with a fire restriction, which carries a fine of \$1,150.

WILDFIRE ACT

Late on July 24, a witness reported a campfire in a driveway in the

11600 block of Highway 101, Madeira Park.

Police attended and noted embers flying into the air in the heavily forested area and spoke with one of the males at the fire.

The male, who stated ignorance of the current complete campfire ban and provincial state of emergency, was issued a ticket for failure to comply with fire restrictions which carries a fine of \$1,150, and instructed to completely extinguish the fire.

WILDFIRE ACT

On July 26, police received a report of two suspicious brush fires half a kilometre apart on Highway 101 just north of the Smugglers Cove turnoff in Halfmoon Bay.

Given the close proximity to the roadway, it appears the fires started when someone threw a cigarette butt from their vehicle.

Fortunately, the Halfmoon Bay Volunteer Fire Department was able to extinguish both fires before they grew out of control.

Smokers are reminded to discard their cigarette butts responsibly to avoid causing fires during these extremely dry conditions.

Anyone with information about this incident is asked to contact RCMP, police file 2021-5069.

THEFT

Sometime between July 20 and 27, a suspect siphoned nearly 100 litres of gas from a vehicle parked at the Madeira Park government wharf.

Anyone with information about this incident is asked to contact RCMP, police file 2021-5075.

COLLISION

On Aug. 4, police attended a single vehicle incident in the 11900 block of Highway 101, Madeira Park, after an inexperienced scooter rider failed to negotiate a sharp corner and collided with a guard rail.

The rider was thrown off the scooter, sustained non-life-threatening injuries and was taken to Sechelt Hospital for treatment.

IMPAIRED COLLISION

On Aug. 12, police attended a of Egmont Road, Egmont after the first vehicle collided into a second unoccupied parked vehicle and rolled over as a result.

One passenger was taken to Sechelt Hospital for non-life-threatening injuries and the first vehicle sustained significant damage.

Police noted the driver exhibiting signs of impairment from alcohol and gave the driver a roadside alcohol screening test.

After two fail results, the out-ofprovince driver was issued a 90-day roadside prohibition and her vehicle was impounded for 30 days.

THEFT OF GASOLINE

Between Aug. 12 and 15, a suspect stole gasoline by drilling a hole in gas tanks of vehicles parked in the 12600 block of Madeira Park Road.

One driver managed to drive to a business before discovering the gasoline pouring out of the hole.

A second driver discovered the suspect drained most of the tank before plugging the hole with a screw, leaving enough gas to get home.

Police believe this kind of theft has been an ongoing, under-reported, issue for the past month or so.

COLLISION

On Aug. 18, police attended a two-vehicle incident on Highway 101 at Parkview Road, Madeira Park, after the first vehicle turned off Parkview

Road into oncoming traffic and collided with the second vehicle.

Both drivers and a passenger in the second vehicle sustained non-lifethreatening injuries and were taken to Sechelt Hospital for treatment and both vehicles were towed from the scene.

Impairment is not considered a factor, however the first vehicle driver was issued a ticket for failing to yield after stop and the matter has been referred to ICBC.

The fate of Roberts' Sunray cabin

In late 2014, the Area A director and planning staff were involved in discussions with BC Hydro

about the future of their Cockburn Point (Nelson Island) bare-land subdivision, which includes Harry Roberts' former home, "Sunray Cabin," on lot one of strata plan 462, adjacent to the SCRD's Roberts Homesite Park, and subject to Bylaw 122.

BC Hydro considered the land surplus, wanted to sell it on the open market and was offering additional land (where Sunray is located) to the SCRD in the form of a park dedication to be added to the existing SCRD Roberts Homesite Park.

Acquisition of the park land would be achieved through removing the land-use contract, rezoning, and subsequently re-subdividing the property, all done through the standard application process.

In Aug. 2021, the *Harbour Spiel* stated that Margaret Pearson and her late husband, Barry Pearson, had been leasing two waterfront lots on which Sunray and a smaller guest house sit, with the hope that they could become a public park.

But she was told by BC Hydro and others that the lease would be terminated and the property sold, first offered to (other) Crown agencies and then made available to First Nations.

The 2018 shíshálh/British Columbia Foundation Agreement contains this:

"4.20 - The Province will provide

shíshálh Nation with a cash payment of \$900,000 as soon as practical after the effective date to enable shíshálh Nation to work with BC Hydro to purchase the Nelson Island Lands."

Several considerations include upland access from the water, the foreshore status of being a prime area for marine culture and aquaculture, and completion of a study on viable projects for the area.

Negotiation is ongoing but not a done deal, and there is room for further discussion about Sunray, but its future depends entirely on historical use and what the shíshálh propose for it.

age, and as easy as it is to blame past and present SCRD directors, history shows that it's not so simple.

In the beginning, the SCRD committed to ensure an adequate water source for Halfmoon Bay to Gibsons, primarily sourced from Chapman and Gray Creeks, outfalls of Chapman and Edwards Lakes, and fed by the Tetrahedron watershed.

In spite of two watershed reserves within the Chapman and Gray headwaters, logging was a concern to recreational-use groups, and to the SCRD because of slides along Chapman Creek.

- 1995 The Tetrahedron (Class A) Provincial Park was created, followed by a parks management plan to protect the freshwater supply areas and recognize an increasing demand and future need to raise the Chapman dam level:
- 1997 It was apparent that severe droughts and emergency situations could drop Chapman below outlet control, so we explored a floating pump station, raising the dam, and installing a gravity-fed system to access substantially more water;
- •2015 Record-low snowpacks, drought and high temperatures caused a severe water shortage; we were within days of running out when the province approved diversion of one million cubic metres of water from the lake using a siphon system.

We installed a gravity-fed system to access a million cubic metres of water from Chapman Lake, and explored metering, elevating the dam, ground-water wells, aquifers, and a reservoir below Tetrahedron.

After lengthy due process by the SCRD, the province consulted the public about the proposed Chapman supply expansion, which required

either cancelling the park's Class A designation or redesignating the 130-hectare Chapman-Edwards Lakes area as a "Protected Area."

In strong opposition were environmental and recreation groups (S.C. Conservation Association, Tetrahedron Alliance, Mountain Clubs of BC, etc.) and Sechelt Mayor, Bruce Milne;

•2019 — Past Sierra Club director, now current NDP Minister of Environmental and Climate Change Strategy, George Heyman, agreed with the opposition, thus quashing our affordable, timely solution of a gravity-fed system and/or raising the dam.


Directors moved to the next quickest and cheapest solutions, conservation using water meters and installing ground-water wells;

•2020 — Test drilling identified the Church Road well field as the most productive and quickest to bring online and, because studies indicated it's not in the Gibsons aquifer, the well was drilled.

But, follow-up studies indicate it is in the Gibsons aquifer, so the province isn't sure if the well will jeopardize the viability of the aquifer to service everyone.

Our requests for the necessary provincial licence have not been approved, and

•2021 — The July AAP to fund meters passed, but we are still in a desperate situation.

Saress: Katherine Lake too sensitive for park expansion

Editor.

PHARA's proposal to expand a trail system to circumnavigate Katherine Lake provokes my concerns.

Firstly, and most importantly, the possible degradation of the water quality of the lake arises.

If a path is built that circumnavigates the lake, many pet owners will be walking their dogs around the lake year round.

The feces of the dogs will be washed into the lake by the rains, introducing fecal matter into the lake.

Dog waste can contain bacteria and parasites including giardia, salmonella and toxocara (an animalto-human infection caused by roundworms).

At the public beach on Katherine Lake, managed by a caretaker, dogs are not permitted to go onto the beach.

What is going to prevent dogs from accessing the lake where there is no caretaker?

Also, pet waste can bring about the closing of public beaches since,

swallowing the water when swimming, can be the cause of microbial and parasitic diseases in humans.

Furthermore, nutrients in pet waste can cause excess algae in lakes, using up oxygen needed by the fish.

All of this would be intensified due to the small size of Katherine Lake.

Secondly, who will oversee the access to the lake?

Who will clean up the garbage, the bottles, the cans and prevent campfires with no campground manager present?

Thirdly, next to the proposed boardwalk, is a thriving wetland area.

It acts like the kidneys of the lake, cleaning the water and reducing greenhouse gases.

This wetland would be at risk from fecal matter, as well as dog and human activity.

It is my understanding that to install a boardwalk next to this wetland, would require bringing in heavy machinery to drive the pylons into the ground in order to support the boardwalk.

This would be very destructive to the wetland area and the wildlife living within it.

If PHARA is committed to supporting the vitality of the community of Pender Harbour, as it says on their website, should it not also be concerned with the vitality of Katherine Lake, so that many people can enjoy the lake's beauty and vibrant ecosystem for years to come?





It must be a frequent occurrence at the spot because while her SCUBA diver friend Vince attempted to retrieve them, he surfaced with at least 7 other pairs. Unfortunately, Klein's glasses couldn't be found and are still down there. To console herself, she posted the haul on social media hoping someone recognized a cherished pair.

'So, even though my glasses were never found it was an interesting and melancholy experience that made me smile along with many people on Pender Harbour Uncut as they watched the story unfold,' Klein told the *Harbour Spiel*.

Harbour Spiel, Sept. 2011: A most unlikely spot to build a home

This story originally appeared in the Sept. 2011 issue of the Harbour Spiel.

It sits like a question mark on a page with no words.

A curious mystery, barely visible to passing boaters behind the overgrown fir and arbutus and a sign pointing to the Pender Harbour Landing development on the bank above.

I'd passed by the spot a hundred times without really taking notice of its remnant lumber and rock foundation.

It could easily stand as one of the most unlikely locations to build a house anywhere in the Harbour.

The intact foundation clings to a small chunk of rock, wedged tightly between the granite cliff face and the high tide mark only 10 feet away.

The spot lacks fresh water and access by foot is extremely dangerous.

The site is now labelled "Lot 16" and is a collateral accessory to the sprawling home above it.

Forgotten and ignored, it sits as a

crumbling remnant of lives lived and a story untold.

At some point someone lived there and I wondered if the memories, like the house itself, had all but disintegrated.

After snooping around, I snapped some photos and forgot about it.

Sometime later, I ran into a man named Fred Brooks at the building supply store who told me he had some photos he wanted to share.

A year went by before he contacted me again to say he had pulled his collection together.

As we sat going through an album of his family photographs, I turned a page and there it was.

Though it looked set in an entirely different collection of trees, it was unmistakably the same house.

Brooks says his dad, also named Fred, mother Alethea and younger brother Bob came to Pender Harbour in the early 1940s from Cortes Island

He was seven years old.

His dad was an electrician who dabbled in electronics repairs and beachcombing.

He made the trip from Cortes to upgrade the wiring in Bill Pieper's hotel in Irvines Landing.

chase 30 acres of what is now Pender Harbour Landing.

"No one wanted it in those days," said Brooks.

"You couldn't drive there — there was no water, it was just rock. You couldn't even plant a garden there.

"Most people wouldn't build a place there, just my Dad would."

While it was being built, the family lived in a float house down the beach.


Brooks said the lumber for the two bedroom house came from Reg Spicer's mill over in Bargain Harbour and he recalls that it came in "terrible dimensions — all sizes."

After the home was completed in 1946, the family of four moved in and lived in it for the next five years or so.

Fred Sr. posted a sign for boaters advertising electrical repairs and battery sales.

Radios were popular then and it kept Brooks' dad busy when he wasn't log salvaging.

Brooks recalls his dad once came across a bounty of big cedar logs after a storm and had them rafted up in the bay in front of the house.

Brooks can't recall why he then had to go to Vancouver — possibly to register the salvage rights — but he left strict instructions not to let anyone take them while he was gone.

Not long after the elder Brooks had departed, a tug pulled up in front of the home claiming ownership of the logs.

They were greeted by Alethea

Brooks staring down at them through the sights of her rifle.

Brooks can't recall what was said but the logs were still there when his dad returned.

Later, the family moved on to North Vancouver so the boys could attend high school.

They only used the home occasionally on weekends and Brooks remembers the place was looked after by a crippled Indigenous neighbour who lived on the Skardon Islands.

Gradually they stopped using it altogether as the family also had property where the Sakinaw Ridge development sits now.

"It was so awkward to get to that place and it was easier to go to Sakinaw," says Brooks.

In the 1960s, "hippie types" helped themselves to the windows and anything else of value.

Soon after that the family sold it and the home was left to the elements.

Diabetics: Take a step toward foot care

Compiled by Pender Harbour Health Centre nursing staff

Foot problems are common in diabetics, occurring in 15 per cent of all who suffer from this disease.

A simple foot wound or ulcer can potentially become a serious infection and ultimately lead to amputation of a foot or lower limb.

People with diabetes may experience peripheral neuropathy or loss of feeling to the feet and not notice irritation or a wound.

Diabetics may also experience circulatory problems or poor blood supply that in turn slows down the healing process of sores and wounds.

FOOT ULCER

A foot ulcer occurs when there is breakdown of the skin, leaving the foot vulnerable to invasion of harmful bacteria that cause infection.

The longer the ulcer goes untreated the more likely it is to become infected.

Foot ulcers can be caused by pressure on the skin most often started by poorly fitting shoes or sources within the skin such as thick toenails and calluses.

The first sign of an ulcer is a blister.

If infection sets in, symptoms include redness, swelling, drainage, elevated blood sugars, fever, chills and fatigue.

Pain is not usually a symptom due to the decreased sensation in the foot.

TREATMENT

The best treatment is to recognize and eliminate the cause.

Poorly fitting shoes should be replaced or altered, thereby reducing the pressure on the skin.

Treatment may also include antibiotics, surgery, wound care and dressings.

Remember — diabetics are slow healers.

Important foot care for diabetics should include:

• Having your shoes

professionally fitted; Inspecting

quently;

• Washing your feet daily (taking care to dry between toes, moisturizing your feet to prevent dryness), and

• Having regular checks by a health care professional.

Practices to avoid in order to

maintain healthy feet include walking barefoot, cutting corners of toenails, cutting your own callouses or your own feet frecorns, soaking your feet and smoking.


