

Marking 109 days without rain

Has anyone else acquired a morbid fascination with our record weather?

Last summer's extreme heat dome caused untold damage to local ecosystems and outdoor weddings.

Then, after record rain storms over the winter, enter our Saharan drought.

By Oct. 20, at least 10 areas of the province, from the East Peace River to Western Vancouver Island, were suffering a level 5 (the highest) drought.

By press time on Oct. 23, we haven't had a significant rainfall (10 mm in an hour or 25 mm per day) since July 6 — over 109 days ago.

During July, August and September, the Sunshine Coast was drier than Death Valley and the Mojave Desert.

October is even drier, not recording any precipitation at the Sechelt airport until Oct. 21 when 0.3 mm fell.

Even dusty August and September had 3.1 mm and 4.2 mm respectively.

It's the fourth time in seven years that we have experienced serious drought.

According to the Globe and Mail, "More than 150 daytime temperature records were broken across B.C. in September. Another 33 were set in the first week of October."

Despite that, water supply in Pender Harbour and Egmont held strong once again while the Lower Coast has now endured stage 4 restrictions in five of the past eight years.

Stage 4 means a ban on all outdoor water use.

If they had a garden, it died.
On Oct. 18, a local state of emergency was called and a subsequent
SCRD press release warned that rain currently forecast is unlikely to help:

"... it may take weeks for the required 150 mm of rain to fall to com-

pletely recharge the watershed.

"The Chapman watershed must be fully recharged in order for water regulations to be scaled back and for a state of local emergency to be lifted."

Restrictions mean the Chinook Swim Club can't swim and our breweries can't brew.

While it's business as usual up here, a few weeks ago I noticed that many of the native plants in my neighbourhood finally gave up.

Water suckers like cedar trees have been dying off for years but now even hardier plants look stressed.

In rocky areas, deciduous trees seemed to hang on for the drought's first 70 days or so, but then suddenly withered.

Many of the ferns and salal are now wilted or dead.

A dramatic local example of how climate change has already affected our landscape are the Hodgson Islands that sit outside Pender Harbour.

My photo archive shows that a decade ago, the most northerly of the islets boasted plenty of mature pine trees and vegetation.

Today, it's almost all dead skeletons and stands as a gruesome reminder of the shift happening all around us.

There is still plenty of scientific debate about what killed the dinosaurs but none around climate change.

Studies find that more than 90 per cent of scientists who study Earth's climate assure us that the planet is warming and we are the primary cause.

Humans spew carbon dioxide and the global population will hit 8 billion later this month.

As countries like Canada barely wince when we miss our emission reduction targets, the planet grows by 215,000 people every day.

There may be little else to do but adapt and take photos as the landscape, and our way of life, continue to change.

PENDER HARBOUR WILDLIFE SOCIETY PRESENTS DR. SUE GRAYSTON: Tuesday, Nov. 15, 7 p.m.

At the PHWS monthly meeting, Dr. Sue Grayston will describe the often unseen forest biodiversity that exists below ground. In the last two decades, new techniques have provided unprecedented insights into the incredible diversity, organization and functioning of the below-ground ecosystem. Grayston will also describe research that has demonstrated the importance of living roots in sustaining this below-ground ecosystem. One-third to one-half of the carbon fixed by trees is exuded into the soil via roots and mycorrhizal fungi, and supports this vast food web of organisms. This finding has profound implications for how we manage forests, especially clearcut-harvesting and clearcut-with-reserves harvesting, which currently dominate forestry in BC.

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Human remains found in suspicious car fire at Dan Bosch Park

The Sunshine Coast RCMP and the Integrated Homicide Investigation Team are investigating after a Sept. 28 car fire at Dan Bosch Park was found to contain human remains.

Just before midnight on Sept. 27, a suspicious car fire was reported at Dan Bosch Park by a passerby travelling north on Highway 101.

According to witnesses staying across the lake from the regional park, a series of explosions, one large and two small, could be heard followed by "some yelling" at 11:57 p.m.

The Egmont Fire Department arrived soon after and put out the fire that had spread to surrounding bushes.

The burning vehicle was positioned near tinder dry bush and surrounding forest.

After the fire was extinguished humans remains were found in the vehicle.

The entire parking area was cordoned off awaiting IHIT who arrived later that day.

The park was reopened by the following day.

On Oct. 13, Sunshine Coast RCMP told the *Harbour Spiel* that the victim has yet to be identified and the cause of death is not yet available pending autopsy results.

According to Sunshine Coast RCMP, the Integrated Homicide Unit has now taken over the file.

"Police have a suspicion of who it is in the car but due to the condition, DNA comparison will be required," said Const. Karen Whitby.

"The vehicle involved was a white Volvo hatchback."

Break and enter at Mountain View Service

Kleindale's Mountain View Service was the site of a break and enter on Oct. 6.

According to Sunshine Coast RCMP, thieves broke into the Petro Canada gas station at 13525 Sunshine Coast Hwy. around 4:30 a.m.

Two suspects fled after they spotted an employee.

Const. Karen Whitby told the *Harbour Spiel* that rumours of an employee being pepper-sprayed at the scene are false.

"A can of bear spray was located in

the area but there were no reports that it had been used on anyone," said Whitby.

"Suspects saw the employee and fled without having any contact with him — no assault or bear spray."

The thieves made off with cash removed from the automated teller machine, cigarettes and lottery tickets.

Police said they have no descriptions of the two suspects as they were fully covered with masks and gloves.

The suspects used a black Dodge Dakota that had been stolen from Sechelt a few hours earlier.

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BC naming office requests comment on shishalh name proposal

The shishall Nation has applied to the BC Geographical Names Office to change the name of a number of local sites, including Pender Harbour.

A letter was received from the BCGNO at the Sept. 22 SCRD board meeting requesting comments on a proposal by the band to change the names of 10 geographical features throughout the Sunshine Coast.

Included in the proposal is a request to change Pender Harbour to "kalpalin," its she shashishalhem name.

According to the letter, the place name kalpilin has been associated with the use of the region to shelter from the wind and rough sea.

Therefore, the shíshálh associate the name kalpilin with its use as a "sheltered area."

The direct translation of kalpilin means "coming around/detouring in a

certain direction."

Other geographical names up for review are:

- Change the name of Hunaechin Creek to "enichen stulu" for the creek that flows SW into Skwawka River;
- Change the name of Mount Victoria to "k'els" for the mountain at the head of Queens Reach, Jervis Inlet (lekw'emin);
- Adopt the name "enichen" for the site located at the junction of Hunaechin Creek (enichen stulu) and Skwawka River;
- Change the name of Deserted River to "ts'unay stulu" for the river that flows SW into Deserted Bay (ts'unay);
- Change the name of Deserted Bay to "ts'unay" for the bay at the NE end of Princess Royal Reach, Jervis Inlet (lekw'emin);
 - Adopt the name "ts'unay" for the


site located at the mouth of Deserted River (ts'unay stulu), on the shore of Deserted Bay (ts'unay);

- Change the name of the NE part of Jervis Inlet to "lekw'emin," made up of Prince of Whales Reach, Princess Royal Reach, and Queens Reach;
- Change the name of Earls Cove to "skelh" for the cove at the north end of Sechelt Peninsula, facing the north end of Agamemnon Channel, and
- Adopt the name of "mala/Hind-Smith Lake" for the lake east of Chapman Lake, NW of Panther Peak, within Tetrahedron Park.

The Pender Harbour and Area Residents Association is compiling comments from community members regarding the proposed name changes to forward to the BCGNO by Dec. 18.

Pedestrian struck in Madeira Park in stable condition in ICU

A pedestrian struck by a car on the Sunshine Coast Highway near the Grasshopper Pub on Oct. 9 is in stable condition in Vancouver General Hospital's intensive care unit.

At 8:30 p.m. on Oct. 9, Sunshine Coast RCMP responded to a pedestrian struck on the highway near the Grasshopper Pub.

The 33-year-old woman, described by RCMP as "a local female," was airlifted to VGH.

As of Oct. 13, the victim was still in stable condition in the ICU.

Sunshine Coast RCMP told the *Harbour Spiel* that there was "no sign of impairment from the driver."


The incident occurred at 8:30 p.m. so it would have been dark with no illumination in the area.

Police are still investigating how the victim came to be on the roadway as witnesses report the victim had been lying on the road prior to getting hit by a vehicle driven by a Sunshine Coast resident.

New SCRD board



Leonard Lee Area A director, SCRD

With the 2022 local government elections over, a new SCRD board of directors will be formed

with nine members acclaimed, elected, and yet to be decided.

This term's rural directors are Leonard Lee (Egmont-Pender), Justine Gabias (Halfmoon Bay), Kelly Backs (Roberts Creek), Donna Mc-Mahon (Elphinstone), and Kate-Louise Stamford (West Howe Sound).

The municipalities will announce their new director appointments (three) by the Nov. 10 inaugural SCRD board meeting.

Philip Paul (Sechelt Indian

Government District) will continue as director at least until the Sechelt Nation's Feb. 2023 elections.

Christine Alexander will remain as my alternate.

FOOD WASTE

We've already heard that food waste will have to be separated from household garbage and placed in a different bin at the P. H. Transfer Station, and charged at the same rate as household garbage, but there's uncertainty about the implementation date.

The start date, originally scheduled for Oct. 1, has been tentatively advanced to Nov. 1, but will be formally announced via the SCRD website and the Facebook page.

So, until you hear otherwise, continue to include your food waste in

your regular garbage or separate it and drop it off, free of charge, at Salish Soils in Sechelt.

TRANSFER STATION PROGRESS

A 2021 assessment of the Pender Harbour Transfer Station identified multiple improvements required for continued safe operation of the facility, including a new scale house and commercial tipping-pad, and repair/relocation of the wood and green-waste areas, propane storage bin, 20- and 40-yard bin areas, concrete Lock-Block wall, and the perimeter electric fence.

Before reopening, the Share Shed needs a new roof, fascia and eaves, repair to an excessively moist and rotting interior, and installation of a new rain barrel in a better location.

Residents in Pender Harbour and Egmont have the option to drop off their food waste at the Pender Harbour transfer station.

Compostable bags that are BPI certified can be used for food waste. Bags with this certification are sold at many local retailers.

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Although the Share Shed could have been demolished for \$70,000, the SCRD chose to repair it for \$96,000.

Early this year, the SCRD approved the 2022 planning work to allow construction to begin in 2023, so, we expect completion of a greatly improved transfer station next year.

UBCM'S REAL PURPOSE

Annual Union of BC Municipalities conferences allow local governments to express concerns, share experiences, suggest resolutions and, if all goes well, see positive results.

Following is a summary of resolutions submitted by Sunshine Coast local governments.

These resolutions support established UBCM policy, are recommended for endorsement, and expected to be approved as a block:

- Province to implement and make available tools to local governments to mitigate climate change impacts in our communities;
- Province to require ICBC to provide access to their database that includes vehicle details, so a better estimate of greenhouse-gas emissions can be determined, and
- UBCM to urge the provincial government to bring together the Ministry of Transport and Infrastructure, Forest Lands and Natural Resource Operations and Rural Development, Deptartment of Fisheries and Oceans and local governments to develop a stormwater action plan.

The following, pulled for discussion, was amended to remove an implication of local government financial support, and then passed:

• Province to provide funding to community-based hospice programs.

These new resolutions, with no


committee recommendation, were considered individually:

- Endorsed UBCM to urge the province to develop and implement short-term rental enforcement solutions for local governments;
- Endorsed UBCM to encourage the province to recognize that recreational vehicles are used for year-round living, including development of regulations to ensure health and safety for the use of RVs for year-round living, and to include RVs in the BC Housing Action Plan.
- Not endorsed UBCM to encourage the province to shift taxation for road infrastructure to a more equitable, user-pay model through alternative funding mechanisms or other means not reliant on fuel sales.

The following, contrary to UBCM policy, was given a recommendation against endorsement policy, and

• UBCM to establish options for electronic UBCM conference attendance to establish broader democratic participation and reduce greenhousegas emissions.

We expect a response from the province in early 2023 that will either provide resolution to our issues or information on how we can take further action.

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Household appliance disposal free of charge

Starting Nov. 1, the Sunshine Coast Regional District's Sechelt Landfill and Pender Harbour Transfer station will be accepting, for free, major household and residential appliances in partnership with the Major Appliance Recycling Roundtable.

MARR is a stewardship program responsible for large residential appliance recycling in BC.

From an SCRD press release:
"With the new public drop-off
area now completed at the Sechelt
Landfill, the SCRD is in a position to
partner with the MARR program to
provide collection sites," said Rebecca
Porte, SCRD interim manager of solid
waste services.

"We anticipate that the elimination of disposal fees will result in an increase in the number of appliances being dropped off at our disposal facilities and, as a consequence, a reduction of illegal dumping of such appliances is also to be expected."

The household appliances that are accepted at the landfill and transfer station include refrigerators, freezers, clothes washers, clothes dryers, dishwashers, ranges, range hoods, built-in ovens, built-in microwaves or over-the-range microwave ovens, air conditioners, trash compactors, food waste disposers, electric hot beverage dispensers, water coolers and dehumidifiers.

The landfill and transfer station facilities have limited capacity and space and there may be some delays when arriving at the facilities.



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Whiskey Slough icon Lulu Island sinks

One of two derelict tugs moored for many years in Pender

Harbour's Whiskey Slough has sunk.

The 90-year old *Lulu Island* now sits partially submerged beside its anchormate the *Kwatna*, after sinking during the night of Sept. 29.

Small amounts of contaminants could be seen floating on the surface before Canadian Coast Guard crews installed oil booms around the stricken vessel Sept. 30.

In an email reply to the *Harbour Spiel* on Oct. 24, communication officer for the Canadian Coast Guard, Dan Bates, wrote:

"When a Coast Guard crew attended the scene, they advised that no pollution was evident.

"Later that day the vessel owners were onscene attempting to pump out the vessel. The owner indicated there was no fuel onboard the vessel."

Bates also said that a crew from Coast Guard Environmental Response investigated the site on Oct. 17 and confirmed no pollutants were found.

Though the tugs have taken on iconic status and are popular with local photographers, they have also been a source of controversy for a many years due to their apparent lack of seaworthiness and state of disrepair.

Bates confirmed the responsibility for the vessel remains with the owner, "... who has indicated that he is arranging divers and a tug to salvage the vessel."

Jillian Glover, senior communications advisor with Transport Canada, confirmed that they are currently monitoring the vessel.

Originally named the *Thomas Crosby*, the *Lulu Island* was built in 1922 for the United Church as a Coast Columbia Mission Boat and now sits partially submerged beside her anchormate *Kwatna* in Whiskey Slough.

Editors note: The *Kwatna* sank two years later in June of 2014. Both sunken vessels were removed in 2019.

She said in cases like this, its authority extends only to navigational obstructions.

"If there is a threat of pollution from a vessel then the Coast Guard takes the lead," said Glover.

"We would not have legal grounds to take action on a vessel if


it's not a threat to navigation."

The Lulu Island and the Kwatna are owned by Pender Harbour resident Ray Kucher.

Kucher was reported in the Sept. 2001 issue of the *Harbour Spiel* as planning to soon "restore them to working condition."

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

Movember is upon us

Growing a mustache is probably not the first thing one thinks about when November rolls around but it is becoming increasingly popular with many men who wish to promote a greater awareness for prostate cancer.

Movember, aka November, may be a fun way to get the message out there, but prostate cancer is definitely an important issue.

Prostate cancer is the most common cancer among Canadian men (excluding non-melanoma skin cancer).

In 2022, 4,600 Canadian men will die from prostate cancer.

This represents 10 per cent of all cancer deaths in men in 2022.

CAUSES:

Some factors appear to increase the risk of developing prostate cancer.

These include being 65 or older, a family history of prostate cancer and African ancestry.

High-fat diets and working with a metal called cadmium are being studied as possible risk factors.

However, it is possible to develop prostate cancer without any of these risk factors.

And though one can't change some of the risk factors such as age and ancestry, eating healthier is manageable.


A healthy diet is not only good for you in general, it may help reduce your risk of prostate cancer.

This includes eating less fat and eating a diet high in vegetables and fruit.

SIGNS AND SYMPTOMS

In the early stages, there may be no symptoms.

Prostate cancer is usually found November 2022



during a routine physical examination.

As men age, the prostate can become enlarged for a number of reasons and can lead to difficulties with urination.

These symptoms don't mean that cancer is present, but they should be checked with a physician:

- Starting or stopping urination is a problem;
- Slow stream, painful urination or ejaculation, or
- Dribbling, frequent urination, loss of urinary control, blood in urine or ejaculate, night-time voiding.

In advanced cases of prostate cancer, symptoms can include weight loss, fatigue, backache or swelling of the legs that won't go away.

Prostate cancer can be detected early using a prostate specific antigen

blood test and a digital rectal exam.

Other tests used to help diagnose this type of cancer include imaging studies and biopsy.

It's time to talk with your doctor if you're a man and you:

- Will soon be 50 years old;
- Are over 50 and you haven't talked about prostate cancer with your doctor yet;
- May be at a higher risk of developing prostate cancer because of family history or if you are of African ancestry, or
- Have symptoms of prostate cancer.

It's important to know that prostate cancer is highly curable if caught in its early stages.

Therefore early detection, diagnosis and effective treatment are key.
