# EDITORIAL

# Severe flooding expected...

It's probably no secret to most, but Area A is soon to undergo major flooding... in the form of a water debate.

Interested parties are right now preparing their strategies for what could quickly become an ugly political battle.

On Jan. 19, the SCRD adopted the final amendments to the "Area A Water Master Plan" and it will soon be made available to the public.

The WMP was initiated and developed by the Sunshine Coast Regional District to study water quality on the Sunshine Coast and to propose solutions for long term improvements.

The plan was developed by representatives from our local water boards, Dept. of Fisheries, conservation groups and the Vancouver Coastal Health Authority, with the majority of the group composed of representatives from the SCRD.

It has already been disclosed that recommendations included in the plan will include a sufficient budget, based on assessed need, and Area A has been allocated \$6.91 million, the highest on the Sunshine Coast.

The WMP should not be confused with the "Drinking Water Source-to-Tap Assessment," initiated by the South Pender Harbour Water District.

Unlike SCRD-managed water systems like the newly formed North Pender Harbour Waterworks District, the SPHWD is an independent water improvement district and, as such, will not necessarily qualify for projects proposed in the water master plan because only municipalities and regional districts qualify for infrastructure funding.

The Source-to-Tap was initiated by the SPHWD to "identify hazards and vulnerabilities that may threaten the safety and sustainability of the water supply" but also to demonstrate to the provincial government that well-run water improvement districts should be eligible for infrastructure funding.

Such funding would allow the SPHWD to construct a multi-barrier water treatment system, estimated by some at \$2.5 million.

Without infrastructure funding, this system would place a heavy burden on the local ratepayer.

The results of both studies will be available soon but it seems clear that there is already some advance posturing by interested stakeholders.

Our Area A representative, John Rees, seems to favour the amalgamation of water districts under a consolidated SCRD management system.

The SPHWD board is also preparing a reaction to the inevitable question of whether or not control should be granted to the SCRD.

The vigorous debate should provide positive steps to improve our water quality throughout Area A.

I'm satisfied all involved have the best interests of our local water supply at stake and one thing all parties agree on is that there is a need for improvement but that is clearly where the agreement ends.

Many questions still need to be answered and hopefully they will soon.

For instance, is it still OK to pee while you're swimming in Garden Bay Lake if you live on Francis Peninsula?

I don't see why not.

Nobody drinks our tap water anymore anyway.

# **BREAKING NEWS**

South Pender Harbour Waterworks trustee, Ted Taylor, resigned his position on Jan. 26, a day after the monthly meeting of the SPHWD board.

He e-mailed the remaining trustees the morning after the meeting and followed up with a written letter later that day.

"I just don't like the way the board operates." he said, "In my opinion, it's not a totally democratic process." When asked to comment on Mr. Taylor's resignation, board chairperson Richard Frappier indicated that Mr. Taylor proabaly felt outnumbered during the voting process because he often disagreed with the other four trustees.

Frappier said "I guess, basically, he wasn't a team player."

Mr. Taylor did say that he plans to continue to be actively involved with issues concerning Area A water quality.

# Fatal motor vehicle accident on Francis Peninsula Road

One person is dead after a single vehicle accident on Francis Peninsula Road.

The sole female occupant of the vehicle was transported to St. Mary's Hospital in Sechelt where she was pronounced dead by hospital staff.

The victim, 37 year-old Angela Cole, was an employee at the Madeira Park Liquor Store.

She was driving west on Francis Peninsula Road near Lagoon Road at approximately 11 p.m. on Jan. 17 when she lost control of her vehicle. The police investigation is ongoing but weather conditions are believed to have contributed to the accident.

This is the second fatal MVA on the Sunshine Coast in 2007.

# **Human remains on Merry Island still a mystery**

On December 30, the Sunshine Coast RCMP were contacted by the lighthouse keeper on Merry Island who advised that what appeared to be human remains had been located in a small cove on the island.

The lighthouse keeper had been out for a walk and had come across the remains in the cove and contacted RCMP immediately.

Merry Island is a small island located southeast of Thormanby Island.

The cove where the remains were

found is on the north side of the island and is approximately 50 metres across and about 75 metres deep.

It is also completely saturated with dead logs and wood debris.

The remains consisted of a partial spine, pelvis, leg bones and some attached skin and flesh.

In addition to the remains, clothing items were located which included long pants, tattered cloth that may be a T-shirt or a blouse and a sock.

There was nothing located at the

scene that gave any indication as to the cause of death or that the unknown person's death occurred at that location.

The coroner was contacted and the remains and clothing were collected.

No new information was available at press time.

The coroner's report and a DNA profile should be completed in February.

The driver of the vehicle stopped to yell at the pedestrian and then drove off.

On Dec. 5, a Madeira Park resident reported the window of his vehicle had been broken.

Vandalism was assumed but

not confirmed.

On Dec. 7, beaver traps that had been set up at a Pender Harbour location were reported stolen.

Apparently the work of beavers resulted in the flow of water through a street culvert being blocked causing flooding.

The owner of two generators reported on Dec. 8 that both had been stolen from a shed in Pender Harbour sometime during the previous three weeks.

The RCMP arrested an impaired, male driver Dec. 10 on Hwy. 101 near

Madeira Park.

His erratic driving had been reported by a concerned citizen.

#### DEC. 18 TO JAN. 17, 2007

On Dec. 29, an Egmont home was broken into.

Various items were removed.

The Egmont Fire Department had five used vinyl windows stolen from their property.

Extensive damage and mischief to property was reported in the 4600 block of Francis Peninsula Road.

# **Grieg Seafoods purchases Target Marine**

In a deal completed Jan. 17, Campbell River-based Grieg Seafood BC Ltd., a subsidiary of the Norwegian Grieg Group, purchased locally owned aquaculture company Target Marine.

The terms of the deal are undisclosed but Target Marine owner Bernard Bennett said it was "a good business deal for both parties and I'm pleased there will be no job losses resulting from the sale."

Not included in the deal are the Target Marine hatchery as well as a sturgeon farming operation.

Target Marine currently has 110 employees of which 20 will continue to work for Bennett's remaining enterprises.

The Grieg Group is a family

owned business employing approximately 900 people, with companies specializing in shipping, ship broking, fish farming and processing, global logistics, insurance broking and asset management.

When asked what his plans are now that he has sold the majority of his business, Bennett said "I'm going to throttle back a bit."

# Abbeyfield gains title to land and \$100,000

The Area A Seniors Housing Project recently gained title to land on Lagoon Road for the proposed Abbeyfield House project.

The fully serviced lot, valued at approximately \$300,000, was provided by developer Ryan Campbell as part of the terms of his rezoning application for the three-acre Lily Lake Village development.

Campbell is building 27 recre-

ational and retirement homes at Lily Lake Village on Lagoon Road and has 10 homes, sold with another six currently under construction.

The Area A Seniors Housing Project, a not-for-profit society with charitable status, is raising funds to build an Abbeyfield House in Pender Harbour to provide supportive housing for seniors not in need of nursing care. The Abbeyfield model is well established in western Canada with 21 operating houses and four under construction.


It will provide bed and sittingroom rental accommodation for 10 single, assisted-living residents, as well as many common rooms to allow residents an opportunity to socialize.

Only a day after the title was secured, the B.C. Real Estate Foundation donated \$100,000 for the construction of the Pender Harbour Abbeyfield House.

"The Foundation was "very impressed with our application. Thanks to Marg Penny, who did the application for us." said Paul Cuppen, chairman/director of the housing project, "We were very lucky and proud to get this kind of recognition for our project."

# RCMP admit fault in bungled search warrant

On July 12, 2004, the Sunshine Coast RCMP executed a search warrant on premises in Garden Bay where a marijuana grow operation with over 300 plants was found.

It was later revealed that the location was correct but the incorrect address and owner's name had been recorded on the warrant.

Mr. Reynold Syms of Madeira Park was incorrectly identified as the owner of this property by the investigating officer, Cst. Jean Gelderblom.

A warrant was authorized on July 12 to be executed on the property at 13873 Casano Road in Garden Bay.

According to RCMP, background checks of that property erroneously showed it to be owned by Mr. George Reynold Syms.

The warrant was executed and a marijuana grow-op was found but no residents of the property were present.

Shortly after the search began, Cst. Gelderblom realized the property they were on was not 13873 Casano Rd. but on Garden Bay Rd.

Although a grow-op had been found at this location, the error in the execution of the search warrant virtually negated the possibility of any charges.

As required by law, a copy of the warrant was left at the premises at the conclusion of the search and somehow ended up posted on a bulletin board in Garden Bay displaying the address and name of Mr. Syms.

News of this was not discovered by Mr. Syms until a couple of weeks later, who then brought it to the attention of the Sechelt RCMP office.

In the meantime, the August 2005 issue of the *Harbour Spiel* published "George Syms, 44, of Garden Bay, faces charges of production of marijuana."

For her part, former Harbour

Spiel publisher Myrtle Winchester regrets that she "unwittingly harmed Mr. Syms' reputation by assuming the police report she was given was accurate."

The RCMP acknowledged their error in a written letter dated Dec. 19, 2006 from Staff Sergeant Brad Zalys to Reynold Syms.

The letter supports Syms' claim

that the investigating officer, Cst. Jean Gelderblom, was indeed "neglectful in his duty in not ensuring all provisions for obtaining and executing a search warrant had been met."

After two and a half years of presenting his case, Mr. Syms is "finally satisfied that the RCMP have acknowledged their mistake."



In the last edition of this column I brought you an update of the Area A Water Master Plan.

I'd like to continue with that theme and other water-related issues.

Coincidentally, in the same issue of the *Harbour Spiel* there was a notice on page 10, placed there presumably by the Board of Trustees of the SPHWD, that mentioned that the rough draft of the WMP contained material that was either "wrong, incomplete or misleading," and then went on to state that, since it was a draft only, it was not yet ready for public distribution.

The WMP core group had another meeting on January 19th, and at this time I am pleased to announce that we achieved a full consensus on the finished product, once we make some minor changes that will not change the scope or intent of the document.

It was most gratifying to get full support for all the hard work put in to this plan and I would like to quote our District Health Officer, Tim Adams, who, besides praising its contents, said, "This water master plan is unprecedented in the province."

After the minor changes are made, the plan will be presented to the

SCRD board for approval at which time it will then become a public document and will be the subject of some public meetings or open houses.

To help with this, I have requested that its main features be prepared in a PowerPoint presentation for a fullscreen effect.

The WMP will then form the base for the creation of a new function at the SCRD, the idea being to establish funding to continue all the studies required in Area A to implement this overall master plan.

It also should be acknowledged that planning and study grants can more readily be leveraged if the community is prepared to fund a portion of the costs and a vision is in place.

This plan alone will not be a magic solution to all the water concerns in Area A but is a working tool that, for the first time, outlines the majority of the problem areas, suggestions to improve those areas, and options for growth development.

Successful implementation will depend upon co-operation by the community at large and a desire for a long term plan.

# SPHWD PROPOSED RATE INCREASES.

I received in the mail a notice of a rather substantial rate increase from SPHWD.

The reasons given for the proposed increase were to finance the design costs of a treatment plant.

I would respectfully point out that under the water master plan described above, the SCRD has made an application for funding towards a treatment plant for SPHWD, among other issues.

To move ahead unilaterally and commit design funds would constitute a start of the project, thereby disqualifying the applicant's grant application.

I would therefore ask the trustees of the SPHWD to reconsider this decision on extra taxation, until at least we have some response on the grant distribution.

I should also point out that only municipalities or regional districts are eligible to make application for infrastructure grants.

Improvement districts do not qualify.

One other item I would mention that needs clarification by the SPHWD is the following:

In the same article, on page 10 of the January issue of the Harbour Spiel, the ninth module as described is presumably an independent review of the pros and cons of possible amalgamation with the NPHWD (SCRD).

If so, would it not be fair and appropriate to discuss the issue with the SCRD before such time as the April meeting?

There are certain procedures in place for this type of proposal.

# NPHWD (GARDEN BAY AND **HOTEL LAKE)**

I attended what might have been the last meeting of the board of trustees.

These volunteers have kindly stayed on to help with a smooth transition through amalgamation.

I respect their work, dedication and local knowledge; the same can be said for SPHWD trustees.





The existing board (the old GBWD) will soon be disbanded and replaced by an advisory committee reporting to the SCRD composed of two members of the GBWD and a new member from Hotel Lake (local advertising will take place soon), plus an APC member and yours truly.

Before leaving, the old board kept a promise and approved a 2007 budget with no increases.

In fact, for the old Hotel Lake system customers there will be a small decrease for 2007 for fee balancing purposes.

This was achieved in addition to a modest allowance to start a water conservation support program.





# EPender Harbour Waterworks District

On January 15th, the District sent out the 2007 Water Toll invoices. Office staff have been asking ratepayers, when they have been paying in person, for their reaction to the 50% increase in tolls and the proposed 35% increase for the Water Tax. The most common answer is, "the increase is inevitable, if we want to have good water."

It must be pointed out that the insert that accompanied the 2007 Water Toll invoice incorrectly stated " . . . the Board has approved a budget to enable our Engineer to start the initial work towards the planning involved."

The Board of Trustees was presented with a rough budget on December 7th so that they could see the areas of need in order to have full discussion on whether or not to increase the water tolls and taxes and, if so, to what extent. A motion was made to increase the water tolls by 50% and the water taxes by 35%. The motion was carried, with the Board approving the increase in Water Tolls and Taxes but not the budget. The error was missed and not caught until the minutes of the meeting were typed up.

The 2007 Water Toll By-law was submitted to the Ministry of Community Services for approval on December 13th. On December 21st, the Financial Analyst, charged with examining the 2007 Toll by-law for the Ministry, telephoned the water district office for more information. As a follow-up to the telephone conversation, an email was sent to the Financial Analyst with the preliminary budget as an attachment. The email read "The budget is rough, but it is enough to give the Board an idea that we had to raise the tolls and taxes". The 2007 Water Tax By-law will be submitted to the Ministry for approval prior to the issuance of the water tax notices.

# **Preparing for Summer Shortages**

The days are getting longer and it is time to start thinking about "spring cleaning." Keep in mind that the water generally stops going over the dam by June 30th. Please plan large pressure washing jobs such as driveways and metal roofs to be completed before the end of June.

# **Emergency Water Shut-Off**

A recent main break on Lagoon Road necessitated the water to be turned off without notification to the surrounding residents. When an emergency situation arises with the need to isolate a break, the District endeavors to contact people in the affected area, if time allows. On January 10th there was too much water erupting from the 6" main and there was no time to contact people.

However, they do require different care than the average outdoor child.


They need more love and attention, and thus they make better companions.

I used to kind of laugh when the lights went out.

It happened so rarely it brought a welcome shakeup to the daily routine.

But this morning the lights blinked and here I was cursing at the top of my lungs. This has gone beyond a joke.

I've had it with campstove coffee and trying to work in the cold with one flickering light bulb, the computer losing its memory every time the generator skips a beat.

As a novelty it was tolerable, but as a way of life—it's the pits.

Official BC seems to be treating it as a one-off.

You see this same thinking in the government's treatment of the

mountain pine beetle outbreak that has destroyed much of what remains of BC's merchantable timber.

The plan is to clear off all the diseased trees and plant exactly the same species in their place, as if the slowly warming trend that spawned the plague will end any day now and things will normalize over the next 80 years.

Whether you accept the consensus of scientific opinion that changing weather patterns are the result of global warming caused by human pollution or whether you side with the Fraser Institute claim that this is just a natural shift like others we've had in the past, there is no getting around the fact that a shift it is, so we'd better adjust to it.

The Vancouver parks board should redesign Stanley Park assuming that storms like those of '06 will be the norm rather than the exception for the foreseeable future.

The ministry of forests should replace the old lodgepole pine stands with species that can survive warmer winters.

And here on the Sunshine Coast,

BC Hydro better hire back some of the line crews they laid off over the past 15 years.

But just in case they don't I'm going fire up to Curtis and restock my supply of campstove propane.

# Crisis of care

You may be aware of the shortage of physicians on the Sunshine Coast.

We are not unique, in that there is a shortage of family physicians across the country, but this area is in crisis right now and we all need to be aware of the problem and direct our indignation in the most appropriate direction.

Locally, the Trail Bay doctors are losing a physician and will be down to three doctors trying to cover two clinics and emergency on-call.

Dr. Naidoo is leaving the group to take further training and there isn't a pool of family physicians from which to draw.

The Sechelt Medical Clinic has informed us that they are not able to accept any new patients as they are losing physicians to retirement and two are moving out of the area.

If you thought it was a problem to get a short notice appointment before, be prepared to wait 1-2 weeks for a non-urgent matter.

There are going to be some days when we do not have a doctor in the

building at all so the nurses will be triaging patients and determining whether the problem can wait for an appointment, be seen in Sechelt or needs a hospital referral.

We can't just overload the emergency department for non-emergent cases so my advice to you is twofold:

1. Be proactive about your health by not allowing your prescriptions to run out or run down before you make an appointment for a renewal.

When you get down to your last two weeks of medications, call the pharmacy to see if you have a renewal and, if not, make an appointment to see your family doctor.

It is your responsibility to manage your medications.

The same goes for blood tests and the like.

Don't expect that you will be "fit in" to see a doctor who is overworked and overburdened with other patients.

2. Write letters to your MLA, to the Vancouver Coastal Health Authority and to the minister of health.

Let them know that you expect

them to be actively recruiting physicians on your behalf.

Remind them that we have the right to expect access to health care equal to those in urban areas.

Our population is growing and everyone is concerned that new people coming will mean an increased burden on our water, power and sewer systems.

What about the expectations of those people with regard to having a family doctor?

My concern is with the health needs of this community and I am concerned.

Please don't take out your frustrations on the staff at the doctor's office or the health centre or even the doctors.

We can't fix this problem but I'm sure that the doctors would appreciate your help in putting some pressure on where it might do some good.

# Let's brighten up those grey days!

Primulas are already for sale and what a nice bit of colour they can bring without much fuss.

Keep in mind that store-bought ones are greenhouse-grown and very tender.

At a nursery, if the plants are on an outdoor table, they may be a little more acclimatized to colder temperatures.

Primulas and polyanthus do like it cool and sunny but not too frosty if you plan to use them outdoors.

For you or as a gift, a wicker basket makes a great and easy-to-make colourful container.

Line your basket with a plastic garbage bag and let the excess hang over the edge.

Arrange the 4 in. primulas in the basket the best you can and trim off the excess plastic.

Tuck any plastic still showing

between the pots and the side of the basket.

Not too deep now, as the plastic is your liner to catch water.

To mix and match for interest, 4 in. cyclemen, ferns or ivy can be added.

I nip off the faded blossoms and any yellowed leaves.

To keep the basket looking good longer, I put it in a cool place over night.

A sunroom or solarium is great if you have one.

The plants I've suggested to be mixed together are compatible for a cool, bright location but, in purchasing mixed planters that are pre-made, don't buy ones where African violets or other tropicals have been incorporated.

By keeping the plants in their pots, you can change them easily as they fade or switch them as other plants become available with the change of the season.

Once the primulas have bloomed, they can be planted in a perennial border, but I've found that as the weather warms, they really don't fare so well.

So, unfortunately, I treat them as disposable.

A little more on arranging cut branches in a vase.

I guess I should have mentioned that to get started, it's helpful to begin with the cut foliage.

It can be frustrating chasing the branches around the vase in an attempt to get them to stand upright or to look the way you want them to look.

Salal, dagger fern, escallonia, aucuba or any other foliage will do.

Just make sure, by stripping the lower leaves, that there is no foliage in the water as any greenery will quickly ferment and foul the water.

As you put the stems in the vase, criss-cross them at various compass points around the rim of the container and very quickly there will be a mesh through which to put your branches and/or flowers.

When you're done and don't want to rearrange everything when the water needs changing, you can tie the whole bouquet together with twine or raffia just at the rim of the vase.

This way you can lift out the designs, recut, change the water and plunk it back in.

There are some inexpensive clear glass vases of various sizes at the local IGA, and if you drop one, at least it wasn't grandmother's crystal.

Outdoors at this time of year, all your grasses that are now weather beaten can be cut back to ground level.

The pampas foliage still looks pretty good so it can be left until spring but cut off the plumes. Festuca grasses can be shaped into low balls in anticipation of new spring growth.

Thanks to Vicky and her guys at Curtis Rentals whose help and advice on equipment has been superb.

The best tool I bought last year was a Stihl gas powered Kombi System (KM55RC) with the grass trimmer head (KM-FS).

This tool allows for interchangeable heads for different tasks.

The cultivator head is a little heavy but works quite well.

# **Dental Care Adds to Your Pet's Life**

Dental care is a little known yet very necessary component of caring for your pet's overall health.

By the age of 3, some 80 percent of all dogs and 70 percent of all cats show signs of dental trouble, which can lead to the more serious problems of heart, lung and kidney disease.

If at all possible try to clean your pet's teeth and gums once a day, preferably after a meal.

Not only will this sweep away any food particles before they have a chance to set, but Fluffy may be less likely to treat your finger like a fresh-caught prawn if you wait until after she has eaten.

Try to get your pet used to having your finger in her mouth while she's still young.

You could try dipping your finger into beef bouillon or tuna water, then gently rubbing along the gums and teeth.

Focusing on the gum line, start at the front of the mouth, then move to the back upper and lower teeth and gums.

Once your pet is okay with this, gradually introduce gauze over your finger and rub the teeth and gums in a circular motion.

When you think she can handle it, try using a toothbrush specially designed for your pet or an ultra-soft people toothbrush.

You can get pet toothpaste that has been flavoured with meat or fish (no, I'm not kidding) but never use regular toothpaste made for humans or baking soda, as both will upset her stomach.

As with people, extremely bad breath is not something that can, or should, be ignored.

It may be indicative of an oral problem and the sooner you have it treated and learn to care for it yourself, the sooner you and your pet can smile proudly.

- Yellow/brownish coloured teeth
- Swollen, red, bleeding gums
- Persistent bad breath
- Loose teeth, broken teeth, loss of teeth

# A dental check-up can save your life

"This evening is about having






# FEBRUARY WEATHER

## TEMPERATURES, MERRY ISLAND

Our average February daily high temperature is 7.5 C; average low is 3.4 C, giving us a mean daily temperature of 5.5 C.

The highest February temperature recorded is 14.3 C (Feb. 27, 1986); the lowest is -10.1 C (Feb. 13, 1990).

#### PRECIPITATION, MERRY ISLAND

February should have about 85.7 hours of bright sunshine (the most since October), 16 days with measurable rainfall and one day with measurable snowfall.

February should have a total rainfall of 97.9 mm and a total snowfall of 6.7 cm.

The highest February daily rainfall recorded is 49 mm (Feb. 11, 1983); the highest February daily snowfall recorded is 22.9 cm (Feb. 15, 1983).

#### **FEBRUARY EXTREMES**

Although January is our coldest month, it's February in the rest of Canada. The coldest temperature recorded in BC is -58.9 C at (Smith River, Feb. 3, 1947).

The coldest temperature recorded in Canada is -63 C. (Snag Yukon, Feb. 3, 1947).

The coldest average monthly temperature recorded in Canada was an average temperature of -47.9 C. (Eureka NWT, February, 1979).

The greatest snowfall in 24 hours ever recorded in Canada was 112.3 cm at Kitimat BC (Feb. 18, 1972).

# ST. VALENTINE'S DAY

The history of Valentine's Day, and its patron saint, is shrouded in mystery.

We do know that February has long been a month of romance.

St. Valentine's Day, as we know it today, contains vestiges of both Christian and ancient Roman tradition.

So, who was Saint Valentine and

how did he become associated with this ancient rite?

Today, the Catholic Church recognizes at least three different saints named Valentine or Valentinus, all of whom were martyred.

One legend contends that Valentine was a priest who served during the third century A.D. in Rome.

When Emperor Claudius II decided that single men made better soldiers than those with wives and families, he outlawed marriage for young men.

Valentine, realizing the injustice of the decree, defied Claudius and continued to perform marriages for young lovers in secret.

When Valentine's actions were

discovered, Claudius ordered that he be put to death.

Other stories suggest that Valentine may have been killed for attempting to help Christians escape harsh Roman prisons where they were often beaten and tortured.

According to one legend, Valentine actually sent the first "Valentine" greeting himself.

While in prison, it is believed that Valentine fell in love with a young girl, possibly his jailor's daughter, who visited him during his confinement.

Before his death, it is alleged that he wrote her

a letter which he signed "From your Valentine," an expression that is still in use today.

Although the truth behind the Valentine legends is murky, the stories certainly emphasize his appeal as a sympathetic, heroic, and romantic figure.

It's no surprise that by the Middle Ages, Valentine was one of the most popular saints in England and France.

As part of this process, the Ministry is hosting a public meeting to receive the engineers' draft report and obtain public input. All interested parties are invited to attend.

To reduce the likelihood of the minimum water level restrictions affecting SCRD water supply services, the SCRD has applied for a water licence to use water from Sakinaw Lake. The SCRD hereby gives notice of this application (No. Z122466) to all persons affected.

The point of diversion (pump station) will be located at the foot of Lee Road near the southwest end of Sakinaw Lake. Under the proposed water licence, up to 51,439 m³/year will be used for local waterworks operations serving the North Pender Harbour Water Service Area. 
