







It's been almost a week and folks are still buzzing about May Day's triumphant return.

Yes, the weather and attendance were spectacular but it was only afterwards, basking in the sunburnt glow of day beers, that I realized I hadn't thought of COVID all day.

After two years of isolation, it was refreshing to get reacquainted with friendships that got put on hold.

Even if only a pause from viral vigilance, it felt normal.

Even better than normal.

Despite a gaggle of young-ish moms (see p. 11) taking it on with little May Day combat experience and only a faint template to follow, they pulled off one of the best ever.

The rainbow theme was perfect and universally adopted in the form of costumes, face painting, flags and general silliness.

In a time of hope for inclusivity when it comes to gender and sexuality, the colourful symbol of LGBTQ Pride wasn't lost on many but was embraced and celebrated.

And two bouncy castles?! Even the beer garden was chill.

Long the black sheep of the May Day roster, it just blended into the scene while families came and went as freely as the conversations.

The only downside to the day were the sunburns testifying to the best weather of the year so far.

We needed it.

Praise for the day lit up social media afterwards:

"My heart is full."

"What a grand community we have the honour of living and breathing in!"

So, it's ironic that before May Day, I received an email suggesting I write an editorial calling on younger people and newcomers to assume more of the burden carried by our aging volunteers.

I've written many times about the crucial role volunteers play in maintaining our quality of life here and it got me thinking about why some vital community organizations fail to attract younglings.

They might look inward.

Non-profits formed decades ago might not resonate with the values and goals of millennials and newcomers.

For instance, the Pender Harbour Fish Wives for Summer Chastity Society was popular in 1974 but hasn't signed anyone new in ages.

In recent times, I've witnessed younger volunteers spend much of their time counselling board members who don't know the difference between a PDF and a word document and can't attach either in an email.

Or raising funds for capital projects with bake sales because that's what has always been done.

Savvy boards know you can pull more from grants than from selling cookies and for a couple of recent examples, see the story on p. 5.

According to 2021 census data, Area A boasts 705 people between the ages of 20 and 49.

Most are busy with work and family but like the organizers of May Day, they can be motivated by ambitious goals yielding clear results — like revitalizing a traditionally fun day for their kids and community.

But they want to be with their kind — and there should at least be the option of alcohol at informal meetings.

The youngsters aren't *necessarily* alcoholics but with hectic schedules, if they can accomplish something positive for the community and catch up on social time, they're in.

Huge funding coming for local child care and community school

Madeira Park and the entire Area A community will soon benefit from recently announced funding that will boost child care and fund construction of a replacement for the aging Harbour Learning Centre.

P. H. COMMUNITY SCHOOL TO RECEIVE NEW BUILDING

Two years in development, a joint project between the P. H. Community School Society and the Rotary Club of Pender Harbour has been green-lighted with the announcement they will receive \$268,655 to replace the Harbour Learning Centre.

The federal government's Canada Community Revitalization Fund will provide 75 per cent of the estimated construction cost of \$358,655.

In a press release on behalf of the P. H. Community School Society, Bill Charlton said the remaining 25 per cent, or \$90,000, is being provided with cash donations from the Pender Harbour Rotary Club, Sunshine Coast Community Foundation and the Art and Pearl van der Linden Foundation.

"Our shovel-ready project, located on School District 46 property in Madeira Park, will replace the existing 50-year-old Harbour Learning Centre building, which has no washrooms, no water and poor insulation, with a larger, fully plumbed, disabled (wheelchair) accessible and energy efficient building," said Charlton.

"The existing structure (800 square feet) will be removed, and two 12-foot x 60-foot fully ready units will be constructed which, when assembled, will make the structure 24-foot x 60-foot (1,440 square feet)."

New foundations will be constructed on the present site, the new building placed, plumbing connected, hydro connected, skirting, access

At May Day, Patrick Weiler (I), MP for West Vancouver-Sunshine Coast-Sea to Sky Country, officially announced a federal grant of \$268,655 that will provide 75 per cent of the cost of replacing the aging Harbour Learning Centre. Weiler was followed by Samantha Haines, School District no. 46 trustee and Nicholas Simons, MLA for Powell River-Sunshine Coast, who announced the province is kicking in funding for 66 new licensed child care spaces in Madeira Park.

ramps (wheelchair access) and outside deck installed.

"We are excited to move forward and would like to thank the federal government, our generous donors, and our community, for their support during our project development," said Charlton.

As Francine Clohosey, manager of the PHCS, said to the crowd at a recent announcement at May Day,

"We'll finally have a bathroom!"
The estimated time frame for

PENDER HARBOUR CHILD CARE RECEIVES BOOST

completion is the end of March, 2023.

Families in Pender Harbour will soon have access to 66 new licensed child care spaces as part of the provincial government's commitment to increasing access to child care with the Childcare BC New Spaces fund.

In a May 13 press release, School District no. 46 announced the funding award that will support the district to create 12 infant/toddler spaces, 24 spaces for children aged three years to kindergarten and 30 spaces for schoolage children.

The after-school care will be provided in Madeira Park Elementary

and the district plans to build a new facility on the school grounds to house child care for the younger children.

"Serendipity Child Care is thrilled to know more spaces will now be available in our community," said Beau Sladey, chair of the Serendipity Child Care Society in Madeira Park.

"Our board members have worked hard to support the application for this grant, through surveys, data collection and letters of support.

"The child care crisis has been especially difficult for small, rural communities, and we see first-hand the challenges families have been facing."

DRUG TRAFFICKING CHARGES LAID

A 62-year-old Sechelt male faces drug charges after a drug raid in Sechelt. Sunshine Coast RCMP had been investigating allegations of drug trafficking out of a residence in the 5500 block of Inlet Avenue.

On Feb. 17, 2022, the RCMP executed a search warrant at the residence, seized cash, a wide variety of illegal drugs and arrested the male suspect.

On May 10, charges associated with the Controlled Drugs and Substances Act were approved in Sechelt provincial court.

Anthony Benedict Pearce faces three charges for possession of a controlled substance for the purpose of trafficking in fentanyl, lysergic acid diethlamide (LSD) and methamphetamine.

Second round of 2021 census released

We now know more about "Canada's shifting demographic profile" after the second round of Canada's 2021 census results were released April 27.

The first round of seven 'themed' data releases from Statistics Canada was released Feb. 9 with a focus on "Canada's growing population and where they are living."

CANADA

This second set of data takes a look at the demographics of our population and, according to Statistics Canada, the average Canadian is now 41.9 years old.

It's no surprise that Canadians are generally aging — over 861,000 people aged 85 and older were counted in the 2021 census, more than twice the number observed in the 2001 census.

Statistics Canada predicts that over the next 25 years (by 2046), that population aged 85 and older could triple to almost 2.5 million people.

The centenarian population (aged 100 years and older) is growing at an even faster rate.

This population increased by 16 per cent between 2016 and 2021.

Canada now has over 9.500 people who are 100 years of age or older, or 0.03% of the population.

Although the majority of people aged 85 and older are still women, the number of men in that age group is increasing at a faster pace.

In 2021, there were 1.7 women for every man aged 85 and older compared with 1.9 women for every man in 2016.

AREA A

In Area A, 40% of residents are aged 56 or older while 1,585 residents, or 52% of the population, are

aged 15-64.

It should be noted that of those aged 15 to 64, over 55% are between the ages of 50-64.

Our average age rose to 55.3, well above Canada's and BC's average age of 41.9 and 43.1 respectively.

The average age of everyone living within the Sunshine Coast Regional District is 50.4.

Broken down further, of the 1,260 people living in South Pender Harbour (Madeira Park area), the average is 54.9.

Though it's growing faster at 8.5% versus the South Shore's 6.5%, Garden Bay's 2021 population of 395 is older with an average age of 61.

South Pender also had more kids in 2021 with 105 aged 14 years ad younger, while Garden Bay shows 15.

Separate data is not available for Egmont though the total number of children aged 14 or younger for Area A is listed at 230, which may indicate 110 children live in Secret Cove/Middlepoint and Egmont.

The census results also indicates that five people in Area A were over 100 years of age but showed none in Garden Bay or South Pender.

The next set of data is scheduled to be released July 13 and will include a "portrait of Canada's families and households, Canadian military experience and income profile of Canadians."

The May Day committee is made of mostly moms who have toddlers and families and jobs and commutes from Egmont and busy lives.


Yet they committed themselves to this event for their kids and their community and we all have benefited and will enjoy wonderful memories from May Day 2022.

SCRD bylaws get teeth

Because the SCRD has seen a steady rise in reports of deliberate land-use violations and dam-

age to sensitive ecosystems, including riparian areas and steep slopes, on May 12 they updated multiple bylaws in response to continued flouting of the law.

The "planning and development procedure and fees" bylaw 522 is now clear that a development permit is required and must be strictly followed for any land alteration or construction within a development permit area.

Ticketing bylaws 558 and 638 were updated to increase fines for failure to obtain a permit for alteration

of land or a structure within a DPA, or failure to comply with land use permit conditions.

Anyone who allows a bylaw violation to continue is charged with committing a separate offence each day it continues, and can earn a separate \$1,000 fine each day they work in a DPA without authorization or without following the mitigation plan.

Bylaw officers assume offences are committed without malice, so they first seek voluntary compliance but, if that approach fails, they now have another motivational tool in their box.

RECREATIONAL VEHICLES AS PERMANENT HOUSING

The only option for a land owner within the SCRD to legally provide space for year-round RV occupancy is with a mobile-home park or RV/

campground business.

If space is rented in violation of zoning and other bylaws, the SCRD will act on complaints.

The precedent-setting decision was made May 12 to resolve a long-standing (since 2020) problem of complaints about RVs and travel trailers used as permanent housing at 1220 Lockyer Road in Roberts Creek, a contravention of the official community plan and zoning bylaw.

Preceding discussions referred to RVs successfully being used as long-term housing, i.e. when located in a mobile-home park or in a legal RV park/campsite, but the SCRD lacks authority to permit RVs as dwelling units because it contravenes building code, an area of exclusive provincial jurisdiction.

Last year one possible solution was for the property owner to apply for a mobile-home park or campground designation rather than remove the RVs to meet land requirements because, in a mobile-home park or campground, compliance is the responsibility of the individual.

But, he applied for a temporary use permit (exclusive to Robert's Creek), which triggered a public information meeting, agency referrals, and numerous SCRD meetings.

Last month, the board refused the application and moved to develop a compliance agreement, develop enforcement policy, and pursue compliance gently, to gradually end unpermitted uses.

The illegally placed RVs at Lockyer Road will be removed.

THE SAGA OF COOPERS GREEN HALL

A May 19 SCRD committee meeting was another go/no go decision for Halfmoon Bay's desire to ensure Coopers Green Park remain a key venue for recreation and social activity.

Now passed at the May 26 board meeting, the next stage will be construction drawings, contract documentation, and tendering the construction of a new hall, set to start in 2023 with a completion date early in 2025, 13 long years after the HBCA's quest to replace their community hall began.

This saga started in 2011 when the Welcome Beach Community Association, now the Halfmoon Bay Community Association, privately sold their Welcome Beach Hall and gave the remaining property to the SCRD.

In 2014, a memorandum of understanding was signed between the

HBCA and the SCRD to support their vision, and \$140,000 was transferred from the sale towards the project.

By 2016, the community had provided design input and raised over \$20,000 for the estimated \$1 million project.

A design task force was formed in 2017, and a 2018 open house established the new hall's location, size, and configuration.

The SCRD now held \$207,859 in trust and the budget increased to \$2.5 million.

In 2020, the SCRD's grant application to the Investing in Canada Program was approved for a maximum of \$2,013,641, capped at 73.3 per cent of eligible costs and with other conditions.

A new project estimate of \$3,088,020 and concern over climate change led to public consultation on the location and scope of the project, and a possible arrangement with the HBCA regarding the hall's operation.

In early 2021, the SCRD approved a budget for completing the design and construction of the Coopers Green Hall, including a maximum contribution of \$528,378 by the SCRD through a short-term loan.

The HBCA increased their contribution to \$345,000, and the design was amended to be "net zero ready" in anticipation of an operations part-


nership with the HBCA, to provide a cost-control strategy.

Today the project cost has been updated to \$4.5 million, increasing the taxpayer cost of the short-term loan from \$528,378 to \$949,855.





The use and misuse of antibiotics

In 1928, Alexander Fleming discovered the bacteria-killing properties of penicillin.

This life-saving drug would go on to alter the treatment of bacterial infections forever and change the course of history.

Since its discovery, a huge pharmaceutical industry has evolved and conquered some of the most difficult strains of bacterial infections worldwide.

Typically, mankind went overboard with its use, taking antibiotics for every cough and sniffle.

Even farmers introduced antibiotics into their livestock's diet not knowing the long-term effects.

In Fleming's 1945 Nobel Prize lecture, he warned of the danger of bacteria becoming resistant to the cure.

The B.C. Centre for Disease Control reports there has been a decline of overall consumption of antibiotics since 2005 (with a notable decrease in 2008-2009) but we still must educate ourselves about the ongoing problem of antibiotic resistance.

Both viruses and bacteria cause infections but antibiotics only work against bacteria.

Not all bugs are created equally.

VIRAL INFECTIONS

- Are more contagious than bacterial infections.
- It is most likely to be a viral infection if more than one person in your family has the same illness.
- Can make you just as sick as a bacterial infection.
 - Usually you get better in four



to five days but it may take as long as three weeks to fully recover.

• Antibiotics do not work against most viruses.

BACTERIAL INFECTIONS

- Are less common than viral infections.
- Do not spread as easily from one person to another as viral infections do.
- Cause infections such as pneumonia and strep throat.
- Antibiotics do work against most bacteria.

Most respiratory tract infections, including colds, the flu, croup, laryngitis, bronchitis, most sore throats as well as some ear/sinus infections do not need antibiotics.

This does not mean that you should not see your doctor to rule out pneumonia but trust their judgment and don't put pressure on them to get antibiotics.

If you are prescribed antibiotics, finish your medication even if you are starting to feel better.

Don't stockpile antibiotics and try to self-medicate but stay healthy by eating a balanced diet, getting plenty of sleep, exercise and practise good respiratory hygiene.

- Cough and sneeze into your sleeve.
 - Stay home when you're sick.

Tips from the SCRD's Good Neighbour Guidelines, No. 4



The Sunshine Coast Regional District's "Good Neighbour Guidelines" provide thoughtful recommendations and a summary of SCRD bylaws governing neighbourhood issues intended to protect and enhance the peaceful enjoyment of our community.

If you have any questions or require more information regarding specific bylaws, visit www.scrd.ca/bylaws, or call the SCRD at (604) 885-6800. While informal communication with neighbours is the best way of addressing many neighbourhood concerns, in situations where this is not a viable option, contact the SCRD to make an inquiry, or to file a complaint for investigation.

ON AND AROUND YOUR PROPERTY

HOME-BASED BUSINESSES

- Before setting up a home-based business, you should confirm whether the SCRD zoning bylaws permit one in your zone;
- The SCRD property viewer can be used to find your property zoning. Visit www.scrd.ca/myscrdmaps;
 - Some neighbourhoods have

very restrictive regulations about the type of home-based business that is permitted;

- Consider your neighbours when you have guests or customers attending your home-based business and provide parking for them off the street, and
- You can place one three centimetre by 30 centimetre (12" x 12") non-illuminated sign on your property advertising your home-based business.

CIVIC ADDRESSING

- Civic addressing is the system of giving a unique number and road name to a building or property, to make it easier to locate.
- A civic address includes a unit number (when needed), a civic number, a street name and type;
- The purpose of your civic address is to provide an easy, visible reference for emergency services.

• The SCRD intends to assign every occupied building a civic address.

This includes residential dwellings and businesses;

KEEPING OF POULTRY, RABBITS OR LIVESTOCK

• In most zones, on a parcel having an area of 1,500 square metres or more, the keeping of poultry or rabbits for domestic consumption is permitted



g garbage properly. If you recognize your

provided that:

- Poultry and rabbits are kept in pens or similar enclosures, and
- Structures or buildings for keeping poultry or rabbits, drinking or feeding troughs, and manure piles are located 15 metres away from a parcel line except for enclosure fences under two metres in height.

In most zones, the keeping of livestock is permitted on a parcel of land having an area of 3,500 square metres or more providing that:

- The keeping of livestock is for domestic consumption only;
- Structures or buildings for keeping livestock, drinking or feeding troughs, manure, feed storage and bedding are located 20 metres away from a parcel line.

MANAGING WILDLIFE

The SCRD discourages any person from keeping attractants on their premises that are accessible to wildlife.

Collaborate with your neighbours so that your immediate neighbourhood follows preventative measures to reduce human-wildlife conflicts.

To discourage wildlife from scavenging while you sleep, put your garbage out in a closed container on the morning (before 8 a.m.) of your collection day.

Wildlife attractants include:

- Odorous garbage and unwashed recycling;
 - Fruit-bearing plants and trees;
 - Piled grass clippings;
 - Bird feeders:
 - Chicken coops;
 - Dirty barbeques;

 - Accessible pet food, and
- Poorly maintained compost (not frequently mixed and aerated, or containing unacceptable items).






